# D-Day inspires War Bond sales

The headline in the June 2, 1944 edition of the *Colorado Record* announced that Mitchell County's quota for the fifth War Loan Bond Sale would be \$495,000 - a lot of money for a county this size in 1944!

But county residents would make and exceed this goal as they had in the preceding bond drive.

The quota in the fourth drive was \$421,000 and county residents exceeded it by buying almost a half-million dollars in bonds - \$557,000 to be exact.

The need for the extra bond money was apparent because citizens here and across the United States knew an attack on Hitler's forces was imminent - they just did not know exactly when.

One article in this edition was written by the pastor of the First Baptist Church, J. D. Simons, which also listed his sermon topic for Sunday, June 4 - "Prepare for D-Day and Our Powerful Foes."

In his article, he said "we have all been reading about D-Day in our daily papers. It is a mysterious symbol of our propaganda of war. Few people know its symbolic meaning.

This very fact makes it more effective in our war on the Axis nerves. When will D-Day come? Most people seem to feel that it will arrive when the Allied forces invade Hitler's Europe."

Two days after that sermon, D-Day was a reality.

Pat Bullock, Mitchell County's War Bond Chairman, urged citizens to buy more War Bonds by stating "the invasion is

on and thousands upon thousands of American boys have faced "D" Day with many of them Mitchell County boys. Our boys have gone over the top, facing everything the War Lords of Germany can throw at them."

She added that county residents are a part of that great invasion and asked "are we going over the top in War Bond sales as did those brave lads without murmuring, and without complaining?"

The *Record* reported on August 4 that the county had exceeded its bond sales quota again as it had throughout the war effort.

The greatest invasion force ever assembled stood ready off the French coast on the morning of June 6, 1944. There were 9 battleships, 23 cruisers, 104 destroyers and hundreds of troop transports and 5,000 ships bearing 100,000 men.

The naval bombardment began at 5:50 that morning on five beaches with the names of Utah and Omaha being the best known.

Besides the manpower mentioned above, there were another 195,700 sailors firing guns, ferrying supplies and caring for the wounded on the ships and landing crafts in the English Channel. All of this plus 31,000 airmen flying bombing runs and reconnaissance missions against the enemy.

This invasion was long in the planning and was originally planned for June 5 but five-foot swells in the channel and low clouds prompted General Dwight D. Eisenhower, commander-in-chief of the Allied Expeditionary Force, to postpone the assault to the 6th.

Airborne units led the invasion. Just past midnight, the U.S. 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions parachuted in to secure roads and beach exits if the invasion went as planned.

The landing by regiments of the 1st and 29th Infantry Divisions and Army Rangers on Omaha Beach was wrenching. The first wave landing at 6:30 a.m. found the beach was a tangle of obstructions. Enemy guns fired down from cliffs and concrete cones, logs tilted seaward and slanted poles strewn across the narrow strip of beach thwarted the assault at the water's edge for most of the morning.

Losses were high for the American troops on Omaha Beach and at one time, Lt. Gen. Omar Bradley considered pulling off the beach and landing the troops elsewhere. Omaha Beach was eventually taken as were Utah, Gold, Juno and Sword Beaches.

And back home in Mitchell County, citizens were doing everything they could for the war effort.

## Election set for Tuesday, June 7 for formation of water district

Early voting in the election to create the three-county Rolling Plains Underground Water District ended Friday with 85 votes cast early in Mitchell County.

The election will be Tuesday, June 7 in the Mitchell County District Clerk's office between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

There are two issues on the ballot. One is to form the water district and establish a taxing authority for it and the other is to select a six-member board of directors.

By law, the district may not tax more than five cents per \$100 appraisal of property value.

Seven men have filed for six places on the board. Ray Ritchey, Robert David Stubblefield and Bruce Earl Rich, all of Colorado City, will be listed on the ballot as will Tommy Marricle and Bill Eiland of Snyder, representing Scurry County. Also, E. L. Farmer of O'Donnell and Ralph Miller of Fluvanna, representing Borden County are also candidates.

If the voters approve the water district, one director in each county will serve a two-year term and the others will serve four-year terms.

Registered voters from all three counties may cast a ballot.

Those opposing the formation of the district say citizens do not

need another tax added regardless of how small it is.

Proponents, however, say there are many reasons to support it including having local control of the area's water as opposed to having it controlled in Austin.

Others reasons cited include:

Among other specifics, Texas water law provides for ground water conservation districts to:

+ "...make and enforce rules to provide for conserving, preserving, protecting, recharging and preventing waste of the underground water..."

+ "...make surveys of the underground water reservoir or subdivision and surveys of the facilities for development, production and use of the water..."

+ "...develop comprehensive plans for the most efficient use of the underground water..."

+ "...require that records be kept and reports be made of the drilling, equipping and completing of water wells and of the production and use of underground water..."

+ "...provide for the spacing of water wells and may regulate the production of wells..."

+ "...enforce its rules by injunction, mandatory injunction or other appropriate remedy in a court of competent jurisdiction..."

Those who oppose the creations

of underground water districts fear that the district is taking over ownership of the underground water. The legislature has passed a statutory provision that prevents the deprivation or divestiture of ownership of the water from the lawful owners of the land.

Simply put, a water district is a board of local residents interested in preserving water quality and maximizing the utilization of the limited amounts of water in the district and keeping control of it on a local level.

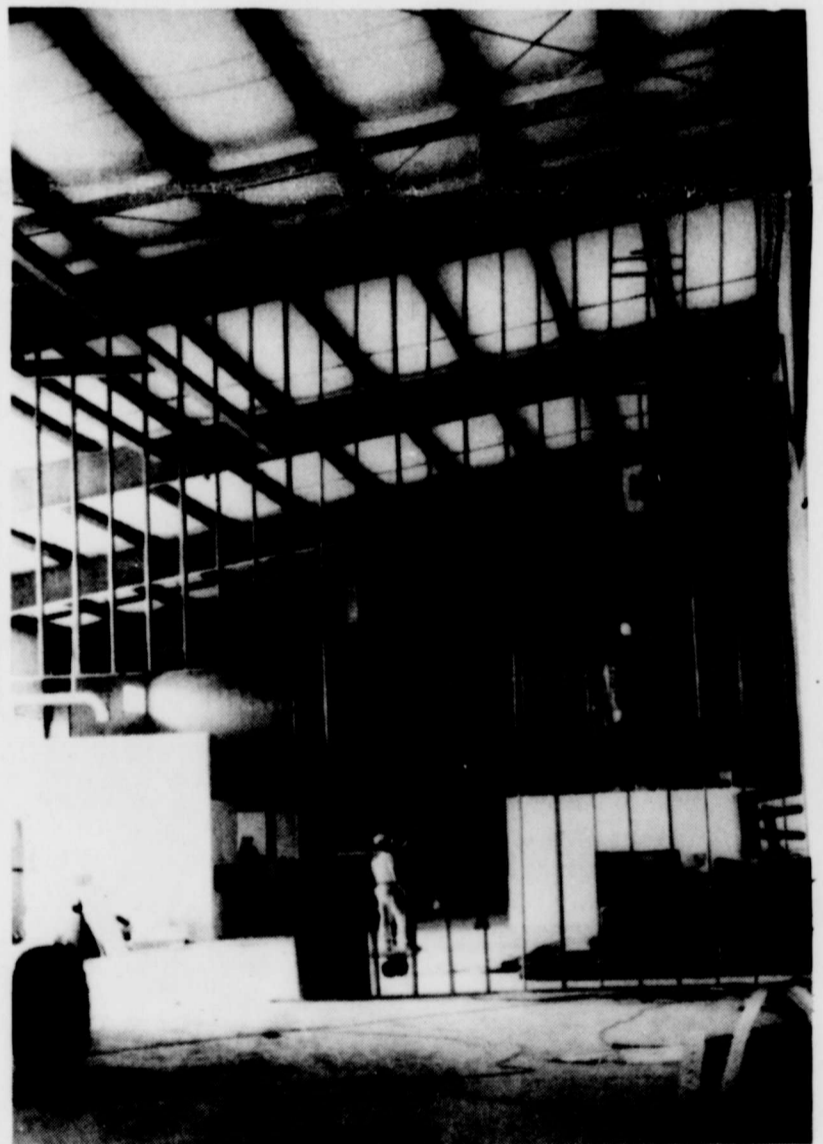
A district also has the power of eminent domain but this power is limited to purposes consistent with provision of water and protection of the underground water.

## Star Show premieres at ASU

A new star show, "The Cowboy Astronomer," premiered Thursday, June 2 in the Angelo State University Planetarium. According to ASU Planetarium Director Dr. Mark Sonntag, "The Cowboy Astronomer" is a cowboy's interpretation of the starry night sky. The connection between cowboys and astronomers might at first seem quite remote," said Sonntag. "But cowboys spend a lot of time out where the skies are dark and clear and so do astronomers. And one could say that astronomers roam the sky looking for stars and planets just like cowboys roam the range looking for cattle. Astronomers are like ranchers of the universe." Narrator for the unusual look at the night skies is America's best selling cowboy poet, Baxter Black. A noted newspaper columnist and commentator for National Public Radio, Black has been a regular guest on The Tonight Show. His witty narrative for "The Cowboy Astronomer" brings a true cowboy impression to the show. Sonntag says the show points out legendary views of the stars. "Our culture has paired cowboys and Indians for decades, so the Native American sky legends are naturally a part of the show," said Sonntag. "The show points out that we are all linked to space in lots of ways that we can often appreciate better when observing the night sky in the cowboy's wide open spaces." The show plays every Thursday at 8 p.m. and Saturday at 2 p.m. through August 11 at the University Planetarium in the Nursing-Physical Science Building on the ASU campus. Tickets for the show are \$3 for adults and \$1.50 for students, children, senior citizens and ASU faculty and staff. ## Summer camps must meet TDH guidelines

Summer camps for children in Texas must meet all the sanitation and safety standards required for small communities.

This season, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) will regulate more than 600 summer camps through its licensing and inspection program of the General Sanitation Division.

Routinely, TDH inspectors will check for safe drinking water supplies, adequate garbage and sewage disposal facilities and sanitary food service operations. But the inspectors also ensure that the camps meet the specific standards of the Texas Youth Camp Safety and Health Act.

"The Act specifies that camp activities such as swimming, archery, horseback riding and riflery must be conducted by experienced counselors whose qualifications are on record at the camp," said Jim Soper, a chief sanitarian with the TDH Youth Camp Program.

"Also, each camp must have an

infirmary or first-aid facility to handle health and emergency cases," he said.

The infirmary must keep a health record on each child and a physician must be on call at all times. Any serious accident, illness or death must be reported to the camp inspection program.

Food- or water-borne diseases, such as dysentery, salmonellosis, shigellosis or infectious hepatitis must be reported immediately.

In 1991, the 72nd Texas Legislature passed a bill amending the Texas Youth Camp Safety and Health Act by establishing standard license renewal fees and allowing administrative fines for violators.

Under the revised law, camp operators can be assessed an administrative penalty not to exceed \$100 per day if the Commissioner of Health, following a hearing, finds them in violation of the law. Violators also may be subject to a fine of \$50 to \$1,000 in civil penalties.

# Highway contracts awarded; county roadsides to be mown

Mitchell County motorists will notice freshly mown roadsides in the coming weeks. The Texas Department of Transportation recently awarded contracts totalling \$981,778.77 for mowing state rights of way in the Abilene district's 13 counties, including Mitchell County.

According to Mitchell County Maintenance Supervisor Tom Roy, one contract totalling \$78,439.14 has been awarded to contractor R&R Mowing of Bogata, Texas. "We delay the start of mowing season until late spring each year to allow the wildflowers to seed properly so we'll continue to have abundant flowers in the following springs," explained Roy.

"A later mowing also gives more time for ground nesting birds to develop and escape from the nest. The right of way grass area contains more nesting sights as compared to surrounding pasture and farm land."

In addition, Roy continued, TxDOT's mowing practices help preserve our roadside gardens. Without supplemental watering and fertilization, frequent mowing puts undue stress on native grasses whereas grasses like Johnson grass and many noxious weeds can withstand frequent mowing.

The mowing schedule prescribed by the TxDOT vegetation management policies limits summer mowing to strip mowing and spot mowing, except in urban or high-traffic areas.

Strip mowing includes cutting grass along a 15-foot wide strip of roadway from the pavement's edge, thus providing motorists with adequate sight distances.

"We all know that roadside vegetation does more than give us something pretty to look at," said

Maribel Jaso, Abilene district engineer.

"The roots, stems and leaves of plants reduce erosion, keeping the roadbase from crumbling; they're a natural erosion control. Also, grasses seven inches and taller act as water and air filters which is important for water and air quality," Jaso said.

Contractors are scheduled to perform one full-width mowing and two strip mowings during the 1994 growing season.

## Permits required for pesticide application

The Texas Department of Agriculture reminds all pesticide applicators in regulated counties to obtain spray permits before applying regulated herbicides. Applicators must obtain spray permits from their nearest TDA regional office.

Applications of 2,4,5-Trichlorophenoxyacetic acid (2,4,5-T); 2,4-Dichlorophenoxyacetic acid (2,4-D); 2-Methyl-4-Chlorophenoxyacetic acid (MCPA); and 3,5-Dichloro-anisic acid (dicamba) are regulated because of their potential effects on non-targeted vegetation. Since application regulations may vary by county, applicators should check with their TDA regional office or Texas Agricultural Extension office to determine what special provisions may be applicable.

Applications of regulated herbicides by brush, mop, wick, basal treatment or injection methods are exempt from obtaining a permit.

Copies of the petition and instructions on its completion can be obtained from your local FmHA office.

Persons nominated should have an interest in a farm as an owner, tenant or sharecropper within the county or area in which activities of the county committee are carried out. They must be citizens of the United States for permanent residence and be well qualified for committee work. Spouses of those persons who meet the eligibility criteria are also eligible for nomination for election to the county committee. Nominations must be received in Sweetwater FmHA Office no later than June 15, 1994. FmHA committee elections are open to all eligible voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, political affiliation, marital status, sex and/or handicap.

# NAFTA: answers to common questions

"Along with all the growth and opportunity that the North American Free Trade Agreement brings, it also brings something else," Railroad Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers recently told a Houston audience, "it also brings a 100% increase in truck traffic on Texas roads." Our roads and bridges are already strained, Nabers told members of the International Association of Drilling Contractors. "Truck safety—for the drivers and for Texas motorists—is quickly becoming our #1 concern."

Nabers says her office has received hundreds of calls about

NAFTA. Some of the most common questions have simply been "What happens next," "What should we expect," and "What can we do to be prepared?"

Other high-interest NAFTA issues concern insurance, truck travel restrictions between Mexico and Texas and safety regulations. The Texas Railroad Commission is working with legislators and other regulatory agencies to make sure that safety is a major issue when harmonizing laws and regulations related to transportation, said Nabers.

Transportation and NAFTA: Answers to your Questions From Railroad Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers.

**Q.** When are Mexican and U.S.-owned commercial trucks allowed to travel beyond the border and into the interior of both countries?

**A.** Mexican carriers have total access to anywhere within the four U.S. border states—Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California—beginning December 17, 1995. For the first time, a Mexican truck driver will be able to enter the U.S. in Laredo and return to Mexico through San Diego, California. Shipments from Mexico City can be brought directly to Dallas for delivery. In addition, Texas transporters will have direct access to Mexican border states. Complete access throughout North America to trucks from Mexico, Canada and the United States opens on January 1, 2000.

**Q.** What are the current insurance and registration requirements for Mexican carriers entering Texas?

**A.** The trucker can choose from two different options.

1. Commercial Vehicle Registration with the Texas Railroad Commission: Filing of Form E by the trucker's insurance company verifying liability insurance. The fee is \$100 and there is a \$10 annual cab card fee for each truck, or

2. Temporary Registration of International Commercial Carriers: Requires a \$10 payment to a

custom broker/insurance agent for a registration stamp good for one round trip to be used within seven days. In addition, temporary truck liability insurance is paid separately to the custom broker/insurance agent. The insurance agent and insurance company must be licensed to do business in Texas.

**Q.** What restrictions apply to Mexican trucks traveling into Texas at this time?

**A.** Right now, Mexican trucks can operate only within the commercial zones of ports of entry. Commercial zones vary in size, depending upon the population of the port of entry.

**Q.** Who enforces these insurance and registration requirements, and how often?

**A.** The Texas Railroad Commission and the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) enforce the requirements for insurance. Railroad Commission auditors and DPS officers periodically inspect trucks at border crossings or through road blocks for proof of compliance with Railroad Commission rules.

**Q.** Who enforces the safety regulations on motor vehicles?

**A.** DPS enforces safety regulations. The Railroad Commission assesses administrative penalties for safety violations such as failure to have required insurance. Generally, traffic and safety violations involving foreign commerce are referred to the local Justice of the Peace and in certain cases to the U.S. Department of Transportation.

**Q.** What about buying into and owning Mexican trucking firms?

**A.** Texans can begin partial ownership (up to 49%) of a Mexican trucking firm in December 1995 and up to 51% beginning January 2001. In ten years, Texans may own 100% of a Mexican trucking company that transports international cargo. NAFTA does not require either Mexico or the United States to remove restrictions on domestic transportation.

**Q.** What if I want to provide charter or tour bus service into Mexico?

**A.** Providing charter or tour bus service is possible now between both countries. However, carriers cannot be authorized to provide passenger service on regular schedules over regular routes at this time.



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# Texas lottery successful

"Besides incredible support from our players," Texas Lottery Commission Executive Director Nora Linares said, "much of the credit for our two years of success goes to our hard-working retailers and suppliers."

The Lottery celebrates its second birthday this weekend. Average sales per day for the second year are up 42 percent over the first year of operation. Average daily prize payments have grown by 62 percent; bonus and commission checks for retailers are up by 46 percent and profits earned for the state's General Revenue fund increased by 21 percent.

"With those kind of numbers, we can proudly ask, 'What sophomore slump?' " Linares said, referring to the second-year decline that many state lotteries have experienced.

"But we haven't done it alone," Linares said. "Over the past two years, long lines of customers have repeatedly put our retailers to the test. We've demanded that our suppliers meet overnight deadlines.

They delivered and they did it with a smile."

Without the state's 15,000-plus retailers selling tickets and the numerous vendors and subcontractors providing equipment, supplies and promotional materials, there would be no Texas Lottery.

Events over the past year also show the reverse to be true as well. Many of the Texas Lottery's retailer partners and minority-owned vendors can credit their success to the Lottery.

The top selling Lottery retailer in Texas is Stateline Oil Co. on the New Mexico border in Gaines County. Stateline President Al Hester Jr. said that he was considering bankruptcy before the Lottery started.

"Maybe two years of sticking it out and then shutting her down and doing something different," Hester said. "The Lottery came along and revived everything. It gave us a reason to get people in here to buy the gas and the Cokes and the candies again. A lot of the customers that knew us over the

years are just proud that we've done it."

Being No. 1 has attracted more Lottery customers as well, Hester said. "They really feel like their odds are better to buy where we're selling a lot of tickets, even though that's not true."

Jayar Daily, vice president/marketing for National Convenience Stores in Houston, points with pride to the \$324 million in Lottery tickets that Stop N Go stores have sold since May 29, 1992.

"Stop N Go has been fortunate enough to have 15 shoppers win \$114 million in *Lotto* jackpot prizes," Daily said. "And Stop N Go employees have earned \$114,000 in bonuses from selling those jackpot tickets."

WinTex Inc. is a high-tech Austin company that prints the familiar payslips and ticket stock for *Lotto Texas* and *Pick 3*.

"Doing business with the Texas Lottery has meant for us not only an opportunity to be an economic success in two years but also to showcase our ability to consistently deliver a quality product that exceeds some of the toughest standards in the printing industry," said WinTex president Gabriel Da Silva.

"Our experience with the Texas Lottery and the reputation we've developed ... has allowed us to compete for new business in security printing and continuous forms around the nation," Da Silva said.

Small suppliers also have enjoyed the opportunity to do business with the Lottery.

"I appreciate the trust the Lottery has shown in our work," said Jamie Herrera, president of Commercial Litho-Print, a Grand Prairie firm that has done almost \$420,000 in advertising work for the Lottery. "It lets me know the business generated is being shared equally by all Texans, not just a privileged few."

Joe Norman of Dallas said his two projects directing Lottery television commercials have given him the chance to employ other minority subcontractors and crew members.

"We are committed to an aggressive effort to recruit minority vendors and retailers as required by the State Lottery Act and other state laws," Linares said. "We offer suppliers the opportunity to expand their businesses and we provide retailers with a 5 percent commission for each ticket sold. Retailers who sell a *Lotto Texas* jackpot-winning ticket or certain designated instant-game winners can earn a 1 percent bonus based on the prize."

From the Texas Lottery's start-up on May 29, 1992 through April 30, 1994 the Lottery has paid almost \$220 million in retailer commission and bonuses. Over that same time period the Lottery has spent more than \$20.0 million with minority vendors and subcontractors.

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
