Sterling Acclaimed Democratic Standard Bearer Eight States Hold Primary Elections

Long Leading In Louisiana Senator Race

Governor Pacing Incumbent Senator, Incomplete Votes Show; Cousins In Ahead of Osborn in Michigan

Interest Is Shown

Heated Campaigns Brought to Close in Widely Separated States; Shaw Leading for Senator from Colorado

(By Associated Press)

PRIMARY elections were held Tuesday in Michigan, Colorado, Arizona, Washington, New Hampshire, Vermont, Louisiana, and South Carolina.

An unusual number of spirited contests were reported and more than normal interest was shown in other elections in which voting was light. Outbreaks of violence and senatorial races, many of which were characterized by sharp exchanges between opposing factions, held the spot light in most instances.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 9. (P)—On the face of approximately one-third of the total precincts in Louisiana, Governor Huey P. Long apparently has won the Democratic nomination for the United States senate over the incumbent Senator Joseph E. Ransdell.

Returns from 319 precincts out of a total of 1,423 gave Governor Long a majority of 7,527, the vote standing Long 44,621, Ransdell, 40,990.

Governor Long was leading Senator Ransdell by 6,636 on 338 precincts out of a total of 1,178 in parish outside of the city of New Orleans, the total being Long 28,790, Ransdell 21,824.

In the city of New Orleans Governor Long trailed Senator Ransdell by 3,305 on returns from 122 precincts out of a total of 245, the vote standing Long 15,981, Ransdell 19,186.

The third congressional district, considered one of the key districts in the election where each candidate fought hard for votes, gave Governor Long 8,950 and Senator Ransdell 10,100.

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Project Voted Down by C. C.

Feeder-Breeder Movement Is Not Recommended by Local Chamber of Commerce Committee in Session Here

As a result of a marked decrease in feed production the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce will not recommend that feeder-breeder projects be undertaken in Lubbock county this year, it was decided Tuesday afternoon.

The decision was reached at a meeting of a chamber of commerce committee to investigate conditions in connection with a proposal to begin the feeder-breeder movement in the county.

Insurance Firm Seeks To Cancel Policies Held By Payne; Suit Is Filed

Heated Court Fight Looms at Amarillo as Payment of Claims Contested; Lawyer For Surviving Children to Act

A court fight was taken today when attorneys for the Lincoln National Life Insurance company filed suit in the United States district court here to cancel two insurance policies, one on the life of A. D. Payne and the other on his wife, whom he killed June 27 with a dynamite explosion which demolished the Payne family automobile.

The policy on Payne's life was for \$10,000, dated August 28, 1928. He waited until the policy had been in effect a year and a day before ending his life with an explosion in his cell in the Potter county jail here, after midnight of August 28. It was believed he hoped in this manner to avoid the suicide clause in his insurance policy.

Wrote In Diary
Payne wrote in his diary, in the last entry, that he had waited long enough for his children to collect the \$10,000 insurance. The insurance company was expected to argue that Payne contemplated suicide before the year had elapsed.

The policy on Mrs. Payne's life was for \$5,000 and was issued several months ago. Payne was the beneficiary.

The suits filed today were brought against the three orphaned children of Payne and Sid Payne, his brother, their guardian. The instruments filed named Sid Payne of Tulsa, temporary administrator of the Payne estate, representing the children. He was appointed temporary guardian of the children a week ago. The hearing has been set for Sept. 15, to make his appointment permanent.

One Not Contested
Sid Payne was expected to take steps immediately to attempt to collect both policies, appeared today only one of the several policies involving Payne would be paid without protest. That one was issued by the Southwestern Life Insurance company 14 years ago, for \$2,500.

Homer Callaway, attorney for Sid Payne, said the beneficiaries expected to collect the \$10,000 policy of Payne's that was one year old, as well as the one issued in 1916, and on the three policies-carries by Mrs. Payne, totaling \$11,500. Two policies for \$5,000 each issued to Mrs. Payne carried double indemnity clauses.

Joyce Shepard Is Held Sane by Jury

ANSON, Sept. 9. (P)—Joyce Shepard, 28, alias Bill Smith, today was held sane by a jury in district court here, and Judge W. R. Chapman fixed Friday, Oct. 17, as the date for his execution for the killing of two Fisher county officers in October, 1927.

Shepard had half a dozen wild outbursts during the hearing. He was looking through a window, apparently gaining at space, when the jury verdict was read. But when deputies started to take him back to jail, he jumped around, cried "huh, huh," and led his captors out of the court room almost running.

According to testimony at the hearing, Shepard had feigned insanity for three years in an attempt to escape death in the electric chair.

Two Unmasked Robbers Loot Bank in Texas

Bandits Escape with Between \$3,000 and \$4,000 in Loot After Holding Up Cashier, Assistant at Joquin

JOAQUIN, Tex., Sept. 9.—Timing their operations while the cashier and his assistant were alone, two unmasked robbers at noon today robbed the Texas State bank here of between \$3,000 and \$4,000 and fled in an automobile toward Louisiana.

J. W. Motley, cashier, and Miss Blanche Rushing, his assistant, were the only persons in the bank when the men entered. While they gathered up their loot Miss Rushing was forced to lie on the floor.

A few seconds after the robbers had left the bank the cashier grabbed a gun and rushed to the sidewalk in time to exchange shots with the men. J. F. LaRue, who was in a store next to the bank, also fired shots, but it was not determined whether any of them took effect.

Officers pursued the car as it sped toward Logan Port, La., but today no trace of the fugitives had been reported. Joquin is about 40 miles southwest of Shreveport near the Louisiana line.

TEN BALES BOUGHT

Piggly-Wiggly Joins Moody's Cotton Movement

Ten bales of cotton have been purchased by Piggly-Wiggly stores of Lubbock, Brownfield and Slaton, operated by J. M. Davis and W. E. Humphries of Lubbock, in sympathy with the buy-a-bale movement sponsored by Governor Dan Moody.

One bale was bought for each of the six Piggly-Wiggly stores in Lubbock, two for the company's warehouse here and one for each of the out-of-town groceries operated by the Lubbock men.

E. B. Fife of New Hope sold the first bale to the Piggly-Wiggly organization Monday morning. Other growers who sold to the company's stores in Lubbock were: F. E. Minson, living eight miles south of Lubbock; J. E. Keese and J. M. Keese, northwest of here, and O. A. Matthews, W. S. Self, Fay Gilson and A. C. Burnett, all residing near Lubbock.

International Route Seen by Caverns Group

Enthusiastic Session Held by Carlsbad Highway Association Tuesday as Mexico Representatives Attend

Support Is Voiced
Extension of Road to Torreon from Juarez by Way of Chihuahua City Proposed; Lubbock Delegation at Meeting

CARLSBAD, N. M., Sept. 9.—Quarterly meeting of Carlsbad Cavern Highway association here today assumed international proportions with representatives present from old Mexico.

Officials characterized the assembly "the most enthusiastic and largest" in the history of the organization. The Carlsbad chamber of commerce was host to 100 visitors at a noon luncheon.

Support Pledged
An address by Capt. I. N. Benton of Santa Clara, Mexico, was a high point of the convention. Captain Benton asked assistance of the association in behalf of Chihuahua in interesting Mexico in building a road from Juarez to Torreon by way of Chihuahua City. Support and assistance of Juarez and Chihuahua was pledged to an extension of the cavern highway into Mexico.

Route of the highway from Chihuahua to Lawton, Oklahoma, was changed, being rerouted via Anadarko instead of via Cyril and Fletcher. The route from Altus to Paducah was designated as a two-way strip—via Hollis and Childress and via Quanah.

Committee Named
A route extension committee was appointed to extend the highway to Mayville, Ky., and east over U. S. Highway No. 62 and into old Mexico.

Committees on nominations, convention program, and other matters were also named.

Argentina Riot Leaders Slain

Provisional Government Nips Opposition to Revolution with Public Execution; Martial Law in Effect

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 9.—The provisional government tonight struck heavily at the cause of the riots and shooting which last night terrorized the heart of the capital and for an example publicly executed two alleged ringleaders of the disorder in the Plaza de Mayo.

Nothing officially was said about the execution, but it was rumored that Chief of Police Trillera of San Martin, a suburb, had also faced the firing squad and that other adherents of the deposed President Irigoyen would be shot before long.

Martial Law in Effect
Strict martial law was put into effect with soldiers in war equipment everywhere and particularly around government buildings, while foreign press correspondents were warned, under penalty of summary expulsion, not to send any messages out of the country without the approval of the government's censor.

It is understood that a number of Irigoyen followers are under arrest, including six deputies. Fifteen alleged enemies of the revolution were seized last night and condemned to be shot, but it is not known whether the sentence has been carried out.

Seven Persons Killed in Air Crash Tuesday

Pilot and Passengers Plunged to Death in Mexico After Plane Goes into Spin and Bursts into Flames

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 9.—Five persons were killed and two fatally injured in a crash of the Sikorsky amphibian Mayab two miles from Merida, Yucatan, today. The plane burst into flames.

Those killed were the pilot, Captain Jorge Llerenas, of the Mexican army; Salvador Flores Cordero, Cosio's wife, sister-in-law and small daughter. The fatally injured were another pilot, Alonso Reyes Flores, and Emilio Cebada.

Reports were the plane went into a spin two miles from the Merida landing field. Flores and Cebada escaped cremation because they were thrown clear.

Capt. Llerenas was one of the three Mexicans who took the Mayab to Costa Rica last May to return to the body of Colonel Pablo Siles, Mexico's air hero killed in an attempt at a non-stop flight to Buenos Aires.

Texas Crops 53 Per Cent Normal

AUSTIN, Sept. 9. (P)—Cotton yield in Texas will be 53 per cent of normal and will total approximately 4,321,000 five hundred pound bales, according to figures released today by the United States Department of Agriculture station here. The indicated yield is 122 pounds per acre with 18,973,000 acres under cultivation.

The ultimate outcome of the crop, according to statisticians, depends on the weather.

The condition of the crops by districts on Sept. 1 was: Northwest 44 per cent; north 51 per cent; northwest 42 per cent; west 73 per cent; west central 38 per cent; east central 58 per cent; east 55 per cent; south 74 per cent; southeast 72 per cent.

Harmonious Party Convention Brought to Close Tuesday at Galveston; Outline Platform

Demand for Strongest Enforcement of Prohibition Law in History of Democratic Party in Texas Written into Platform; Road Maintenance Plank Is Adopted

CONVENTION HALL, GALVESTON, Sept. 9.—Ross S. Sterling of Houston who only 20 years ago was a country merchant in Liberty county, tonight was acclaimed the Democratic nominee for governor of Texas.

Democrats of Texas in convention made him the party standard bearer as the last act of one of the most harmonious political sessions in the history of the state, and this in face of the fact there were eleven candidates for the nomination in the first primary.

Won Over Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson
Mr. Sterling won the nomination in the second primary over Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson in one of the warmest campaigns the state has ever experienced.

Mr. Sterling's ideas of government were incorporated in the convention platform, the candidate dictating the principles enunciated therein without opposition from any source.

Cone Johnson of Tyler, who has served on the highway commission with Mr. Sterling for the past four years, nominated the candidate. Mrs. Alex Adams of San Antonio and Mrs. Lee J. Rountree of Bryan, recently elected to the Texas house of representatives, seconded his nomination.

Mr. Sterling responded with a speech in which he recalled his Texas citizenship and mentioned his pioneering in the Lone Star state.

"For All Of Texas"
"I will be the governor for all Texas and all the people of Texas," he said.

"I heard a great deal about the things I did not do and about the things I did do. But I want to tell you I came out all right, although a bit weary, I am glad to be here as your nominee for governor."

"I hope you will not be disappointed in the big fat boy. I shall be grateful all my life for the big vote given me."

As he spoke Mrs. Sterling and their daughter, Mrs. Norma Sterling, sat on the platform surrounded by friends.

Charles E. Francis of Wichita Falls nominated James V. Altred of Wichita Falls for attorney general.

Colonel Tom Henderson of Cameron nominated Senator Edgar Witt of Waco for governor. Tom Tyson of Robertson county seconded the nomination. Senator Witt responded with a short speech.

A demand for prohibition enforcement claimed to be the strongest ever offered to the party in Texas was written tonight into the platform submitted to the floor of the Democratic state convention.

At about the same time the committee on platform, splitting as a whole, approved a sub-committee's recommendation, inspired by the forces of Ross S. Sterling, that a plank declare for construction and maintenance of state roads out of funds derived from traffic or more specifically, the gasoline tax. Perhaps the last chance for any serious discord vanished with the adoption of the plank. It is then believed the only chance for trouble would be in a possible dispute over the state wide highway bond issue proposal which Mr. Sterling supported in his campaign. That is, many believed there might be a major disagreement if the candidate insisted on having the plan in the platform.

Plank Doubly Edged
The prohibition plank was doubly edged. It expressed "unalterable opposition" to any attempt to repeal or emasculate prohibition, but it also declared the legislature to take whatever steps were deemed necessary to afford the governor facilities for absolute enforcement. The plank was submitted by Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas and was passed by a vote of about 10 to 1. The vote figures could not be obtained because of the rapidity of the division form of voting after a tumultuous argument between Senator Love and Senator T. J. Holbrook of Galveston.

Breeman Strong, an executive commissioner, joined Love in his fight and Henry Paulus of Yaukus sided with Senator Holbrook. When Love arose to seek the expression, Holbrook, turned to him and said: "If you want to kill the bill of Rights I'm against you."

Love replied so vigorously that his speech could be heard almost throughout the nearly deserted convention hall. Counting, he declared, standing up close to Holbrook, had no right to elect officers unfriendly to the league law. He was against, he shouted counting being "dominated by bootleggers and criminals."

Senator Holbrook arose to cross examine him.

"What does the governor need that he hasn't got?" he asked.

"Well," Love answered, "for one thing he needs an added constabulary and more district attorneys to go into towns and prosecute."

He then declared Holbrook knew himself that the state had closed a gambling house here recently. Holbrook replied that wasn't any-

GOP Bids for Support from Texas Voters

State Republicans Certify Nomination of Candidates and Adopt Platform During San Angelo Convention

SAN ANGELO, Sept. 9.—Openly bidding for the support of all voters irrespective of previous party affiliations, the Republican state convention adopted a ratified platform, certified the nomination of state candidates and re-elected officials of the state executive committee before adjournment today.

The motif, "a fighting chance," ran throughout the deliberations and was re-echoed in the final address of R. B. Creager of Brownsville, national committeeman, whose direction of Republican affairs in Texas was unqualifiedly approved by the convention.

Butte Praised
Dr. George C. Butte of Austin was pictured as a candidate for governor worthy of the support of all Texans—a representative of the people, an honest public servant, a sincere prohibitionist and student of civil government.

Mention of his chances for election by splitting the Democratic party, which was declared to be torn asunder by the primary campaign, brought repeated cheers from the delegates.

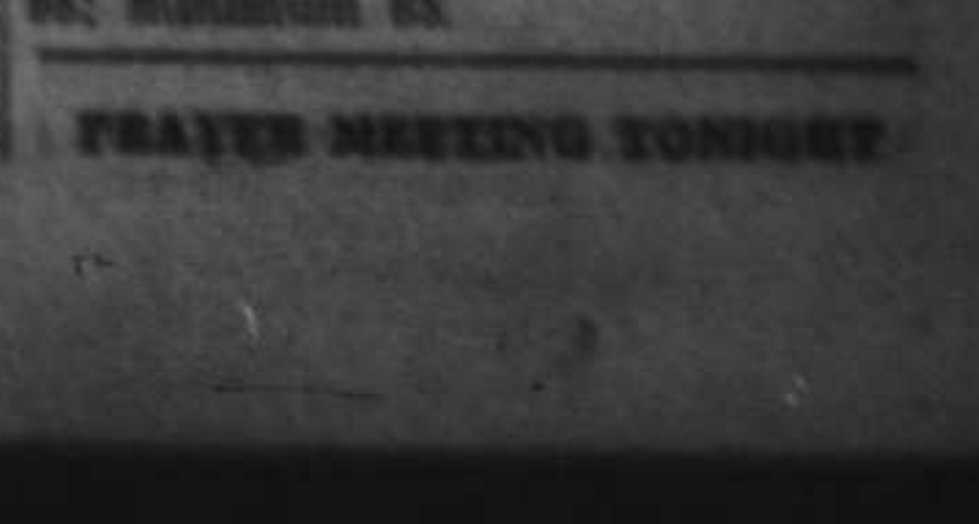
The platform, partially outlined in the morning session by Henry Zweifel of Fort Worth, temporary chairman, was enlarged to nineteen planks in the final draft.

PRAYER MEETING TONIGHT

THE WOMAN'S ANGLE

ONE of my men readers—or for all I know, my man reader—has sent in what he tags as "a huge assignment" for me and has then threatened to quit reading these daily effusions, unless I can meet his demands. First, he clips a paragraph from another column and then makes his comments and reactions. Here they are:

"It is estimated that more than a million women in the United States are living on the form of taxation without representation, knowing that a man in jail cannot earn money and if this sort of thing were continued—if the prisoner were recommitted at the end of each year for failure to discharge the last twelve-month bill, it would be tantamount to imprisonment for life."

"I know it said the woman with a shrug, and that's where he ought to be—in jail for life!"

"Clipping appeared in Joseph Van Haale's 'Bo-Broadway' for September 1. Perhaps you didn't see it and may find something which should be spiked once and for all in a woman's column. Women do things like that, you know, 'once and for all.' Van Haale, as you probably know is a Central Press writer and widely known as a columnist. After all, he's only a man. My interest will flag (whatever that means) unless you deliberately and maliciously show that women should have alimony. A huge assignment, of course but for a woman col-um-nist . . . oh well, we shall see."

"That honesty is always best, is something this columnist has been taught since she first began running bare-foot under the West Texas sun an uncertain number of years ago, so she is forced to confess that she is for the good of her country. She doesn't think that divorce should have any more than fifty per cent of the time. That percentage is allowed on the good old law of averages which probably grants that the wife is wrong half of the time and the husband the other half. She thinks that a good solution for this problem would be to make the wife pay alimony if she is wrong; the husband if he is wrong, unless she, the columnist, should happen to get married and divorced. Then the husband should have to pay, anyway. It looks like a good easy living if one can get by with it."

Seriously, I do think that most men get the worst of the alimony deal. A woman knows that in nine cases out of ten she can demand and receive alimony, even though there are no real grounds upon which she should ask support from her former husband, and there are plenty of women who are willing to make this unreasonable demand."

DOESN'T HURT THE BABY
THE independent spirit of America as a whole always rebels when the government even so much as makes suggestions about running what is so often termed as one's own affairs. And yet this same government through the United States Children's bureau has the tendency to urge parents not to spoil their babies by picking them up whenever they cry."

Crying is not harmful for a baby and it even gives him some exercise, the bureau has concluded, and has testimony to the efficiency of that cover the infant's daily life from the time he is born until he is two years old. Parents are admonished to make sure that the baby is comfortable and then to leave him in his crib until time to pick him up, even though he cries."

Young mothers these days, who more often than not, rear their children according to the schedule of a pediatrician are frequently troubled with the old-fashioned mother who fed her baby every time it was hungry and rocked it when it cried and who soiled the young modern for neglecting her child. But the healthy and happy crop of modern babies, who soon form healthful habits of sleeping and eating, even though they may cry a lot during the training period, are testimony to the efficiency of modern methods. The woman who does not rear her baby according to these tested schedules today is immediately marking herself as one who is behind the times in giving her child his birthright of proper care."

She Spins For Her Rural Library

A stray sheep, a spinning wheel, an oldtime loom, and an enterprising little grandmother to plan and toll for it, have established one of the most successful rural libraries in the country.

The library is located at Check's Corner, a rural trading post in Benton county, Arkansas, seven miles back in the hills from a highway, and the little woman whose dream it fulfilled is Mrs. Ada Check, 72.

Mrs. Check yearned for years to establish such a library but was financially unable. One wintry night a stray ewe came to her place. Mrs. Check took it in, cared for it and advertised for the owner. No one came to claim it, and in due course of time it gave birth to a lamb.

Being an old farm wife, Mrs. Check sheared the ewe's wool, spun it and wove it into old-fashioned coverlets which she sold, and used the money to found the free library.

The institution is non-endowed, its doors are never locked, no librarian is on duty and no membership cards are issued. Country people are free to come at any time of the day, take what whomever books they wish, read them at their leisure, and return them without solicitation. Mrs. Check estimates that during six years only about six books have been lost.

The library contains about 3,000 volumes of standard and worthwhile literature. About 2,500 books were donated, among the more famous of the donors being Mrs. Jack London, Calvin Coolidge and Charles A. Lindbergh.

Dickens, Scott, George Eliot, Roosevelt, Abraham Lincoln, Joseph Conrad, Galsworthy, Zane Grey, Henry Van Dyke, John Fox, Jr., and Edna Ferber are the favorite authors, according to a check of the bookshelves.

GENEVA, Sept. 9. (AP)—Aristide Briand's plan for an European federation went definitely into the state of public discussion today following the first session of the League of Nations assembly.

More Counties Asking Relief

Three Hundred Additional Counties Recommended for Low Freight Rates on Livestock Feed by Sec'y Hyde

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9. (AP)—More than three hundred additional counties were recommended by Secretary Hyde today to receive freight reductions on livestock feed bought as result of the drought, bringing the total to 1,024 counties in 18 states, or approximately one-third of all counties in the United States.

Kansas, with 41 counties listed, was the only new state added. Texas, receiving 84 additional counties, was given the largest increase of all states in the drought area.

The states in which counties now are certified to receive livestock feed at reduced freight rates are Alabama, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia and Wyoming.

The revised list takes in every county in Arkansas, all except one in Virginia and all except four in Kentucky. Counties in other states include: Oklahoma: Blaine, Custer, Dewey, Ellis, Garfield, Grant, Harper, Hughes, Kay, Kingfisher, Logan, Major, Noble, Oklahoma, Pawnee, Rogers, Mills, Seminole, Woods, Woodward.

Food Supplies Form Problem In Storm Area

Soldiers of Dominican Guard Suppress Food Riot After Supplies Unloaded by U. S. Sailors at Santo Domingo

SANTO DOMINGO, Sept. 9. (P)—Furnishing of food and water to Santo Domingo's stricken thousands today became a problem of increasing importance to national and Red Cross authorities.

Soldiers of the Dominican guard, with United States sailors standing by, suppressed a food riot yesterday at one of the wharves where relief supplies were being unloaded from the United States destroyer—Mine Sweeper Grebe.

More than 100 persons watched until the supplies had been placed on the wharf and then rushed the soldiers. Soldiers held off the rioters while speakers assured the crowds that the rations would be distributed as soon as possible. Most of the crowd had not had a meal since Wednesday, when the hurricane struck the city.

While considerable food has been brought for relief purposes by the steamships Ruth Lykes and Catoyne and the Grebe from Porto Rico, and in the steamship Tryton's cargo of rice from Europe, the amount has been little compared to what is needed. Vessels have been forced to anchor in the Caribbean while launches and small boats brought their cargoes to shore.

Another youth, said by officers to have been an accomplice in the robbery, was captured by police.

The theater's cashier, Miss Peble Brooks, failed to realize she was being held up until she saw a note pushed through the glass window to her and read: "I need money badly. Place all the currency you have in this sack and hand it to me or I will drop this bottle of nitro glycerine." She stuffed the \$1,200 in the canvas sack that accompanied the note and saw the youth fade away into the passing crowd.

The boy arrested identified himself as Harold Morris, 22 years old. He was stopped by a patrolman immediately after the robbery. Theater attendants told police Morris had bought a ticket to the show a few seconds before the note was pushed through the window and engaged the nearby ticket taker in an argument at the time of the holdup.

ATHENS, Greece, Sept. 9. (P)—Explosion of an oil-laden sailing vessel in front of the Standard Oil depot at Drapetsonas harbor last night took at least eight lives.

The blast destroyed the vessel, flaming fragments of which set fire to 18 nearby sailboats, and one steamship. Some of the boats burned rapidly and their crews were compelled to take to the water. It was feared many were burned fatally.

APPLICATIONS FILED

SLATON, Sept. 9. (Special).—Farmers of the Slaton territory are rapidly filing applications with the Slaton Chamber of Commerce for seed wheat which the organization has purchased for distribution for sowing Fall and Winter pastures.

To offset the lack of sufficient feed-stuff, more than 100 bushels were applied for in one day, said L. A. Wilson, secretary of the Slaton Chamber. A total of 1,000 bushels were bought by the body. Only farmers unable to finance the purchase of the wheat will be sold. Notes are taken to cover the amounts.

Steamer Arrives After Hurricane

NEW YORK, Sept. 9. (P)—The liner Coamo, bearing the scars of her terrific struggle against annihilation in the hurricane that swept the Caribbean last week, and spread disaster over Santo Domingo, arrived today from San Juan. She brought 253 passengers, five of whom were aboard the ship during the storm.

Capt. Thomas G. Evans, who has been with the line many years said the storm was the worst he ever experienced. Covers were torn from lifeboats; skylights were ripped loose over the public rooms and ports of the superstructure were shattered.

Captain Evans said the ship had been drenched as though it had been submerged. He and his Chief Engineer—J. J. McGough, agreed that the list of the ship was above 40 degrees, sometimes as high as 45 and 47 degrees.

"At the height of the hurricane, the wind reached a velocity such as I have never experienced and the barometer fell until it could go no lower on the Aneroid scale," said the captain.

HEADS DEMOCRATS

JEFFERSON CITY, Sept. 9. (P)—Charles M. Howell, of Kansas City, was re-elected chairman of the Democratic state committee in session here today. He was selected without opposition.

Municipal Airport Case Held Valid in Oklahoma

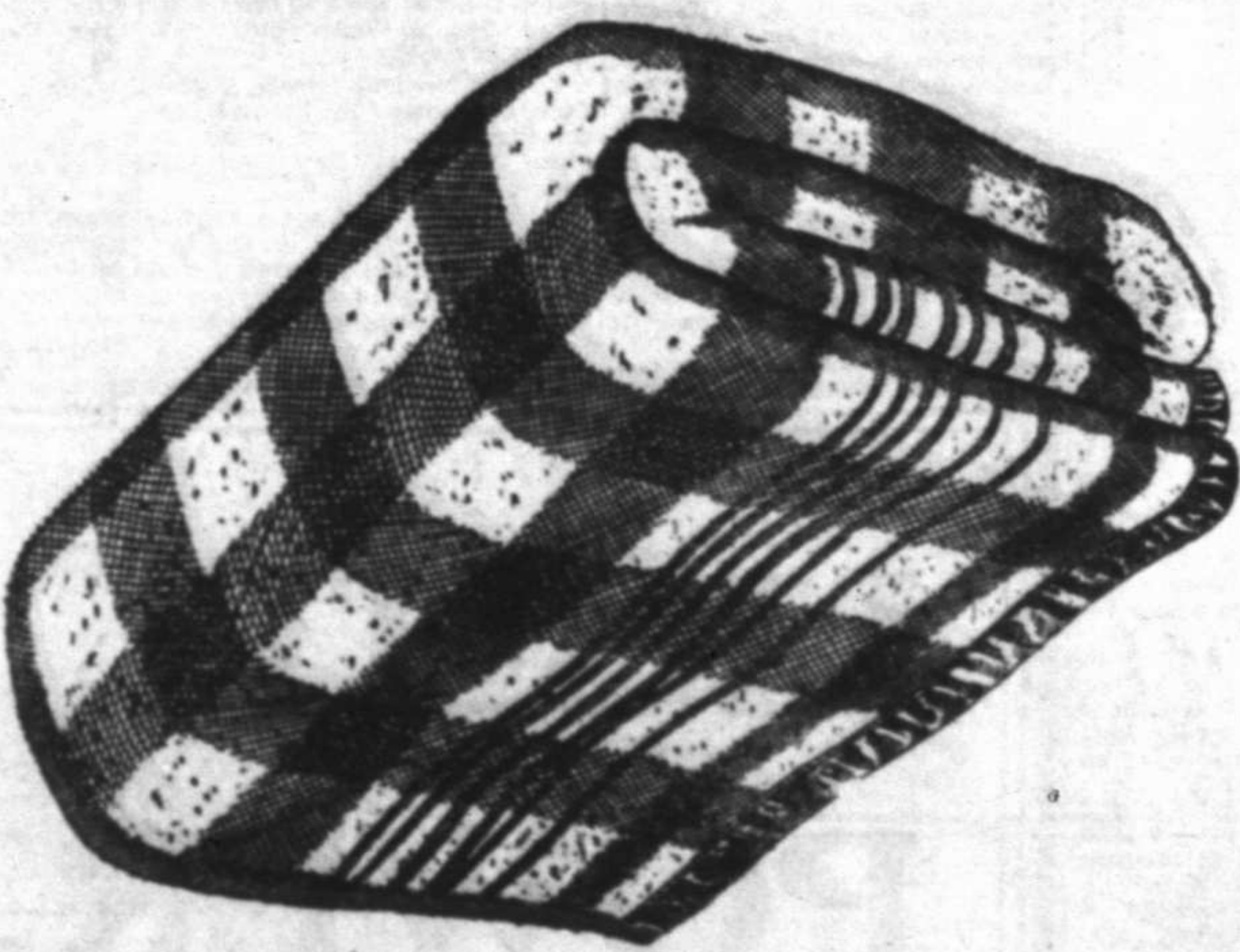

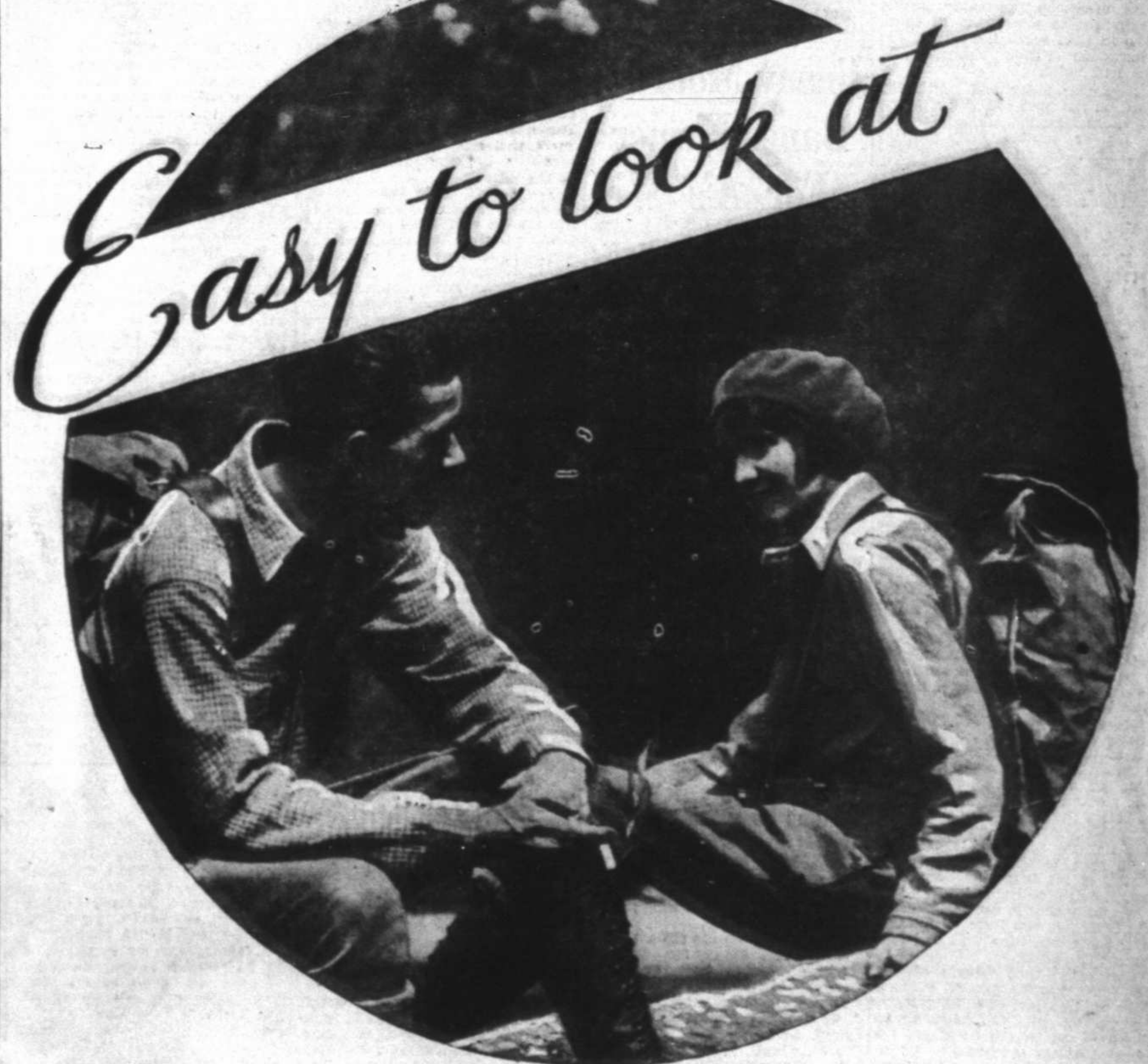

Tech Matadors Start Training Period This Morning

Seven Southwest Conference Teams Fret At Barriers

Forty-five Candidates Coming Out

Equipment Issued Yesterday to Varsity Men; Cawthon to Take Personal Charge Today As Official Season Starts

When Coach Pete Cawthon blows his whistle at 9 o'clock this morning, forty-five jersey-clad, short-haired, ambitious gridiron warriors will crash through a dressing room door and form a swiftly moving crimson and khaki line reaching from the gymnasium door to the concrete curbing which incloses the beautifully turfed field. They will be the Texas Tech Matadors of 1930, and the occasion will be the formal opening of the 1930 college team practice period.

Nearly All Candidates Here. Yesterday afternoon's check up revealed that nearly every one of the varsity candidates for this year's team had arrived in Lubbock, and coaches spent most of the afternoon yesterday issuing equipment to some forty of them, who in turn spent the rest of the afternoon fitting themselves in the new uniforms.

Beginning today and continuing through the next two weeks or ten days, the Matadors will go through a regular routine daily practice schedule. At an early hour the prospects for Coach Pete Cawthon's varsity eleven will breakfast at a common training table at the Cheri Casa apartment house, home of Tech's football teams. The first meal will be served this morning.

Follow Daily Schedule. At 9 o'clock the huskies will take the practice field and work until nearly noon. Then lunch, followed by a rest period, and a skill practice. Again at 4 o'clock the men will be marched to the field for the afternoon workout. The latter drill will continue until darkness.

Quite a number of letter men are returning whom it is hoped to build a team that can hold its head up with the best in the state. With Captain Jack Durham at the helm, Tech should have a fairly strong team, what with quite a number of returning veterans from last season's squad. They looked like a football team when they had dined the new uniforms. Perhaps they looked like football players before dressing, but no cause was given for an outburst of joy.

Coaches Work Started. Coaches Cawthon, Morgan, Smith and Goughly have done much already toward developing a creditable team for Tech by erecting and causing to be erected dressing rooms and club rooms, by bringing all of the grid candidates under a common residential shelter, and by creating a morale already among the players, but their greatest task is before them. They have a goodly supply of material on hand, and the fighting spirit seems to dominate even in all that has been seen yet, but drill and practice in quantity and quality is necessary before the Matadors can hope to triumph over the competition that will face them this season.

One thing that friends of the Matadors may be assured of is a fighting, hustling, scratching team, featured by unity and cohesion in the line and in the backfield. No team that has ever worked under Pete Cawthon has been otherwise. He does not tolerate laziness and sluggishness, and makes no bones in telling his candidates about it. If strenuous drill, cooperation, and still more drill instigated by coaches have anything to do with a team's power, Texas Tech may boast of a first class team this year and in years to come. If pre-season examples are a criterion of lasting truth.

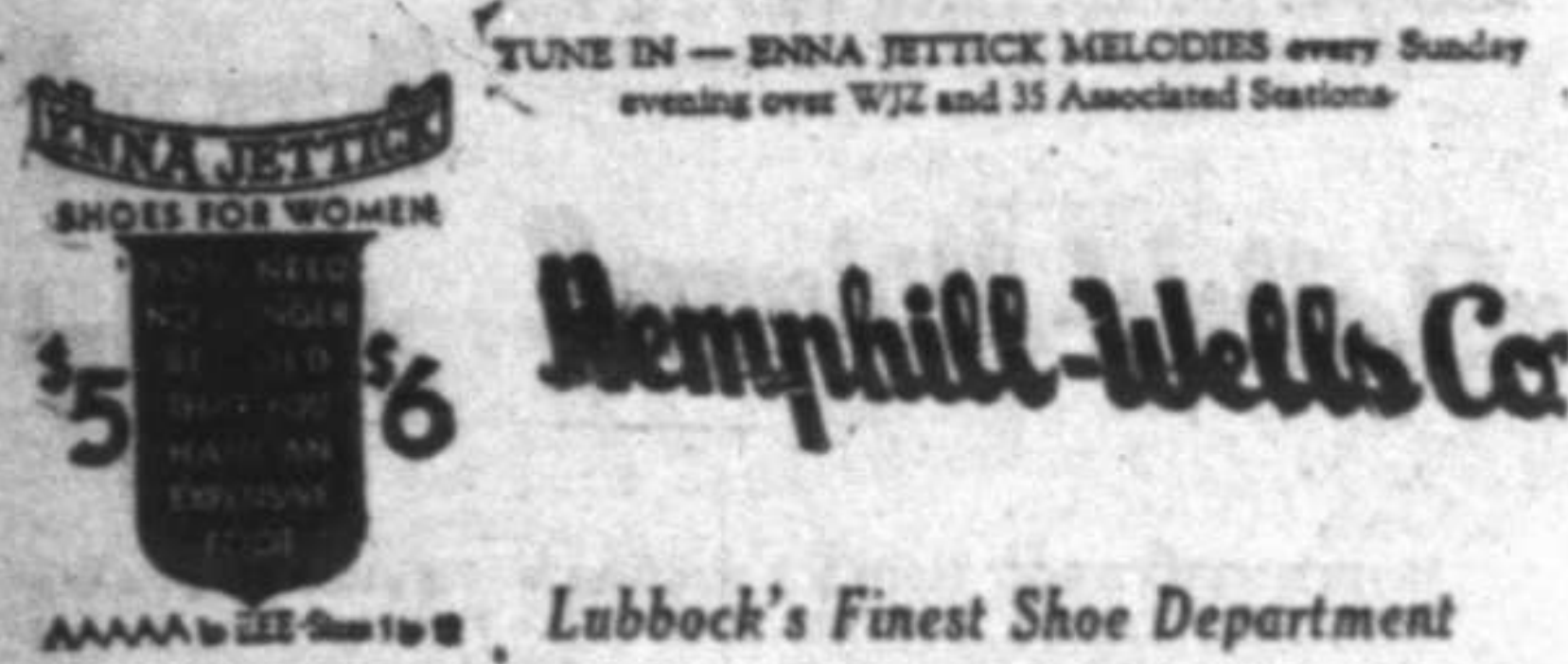

Mexico Moves To Solve Two Chief Puzzles

Early Solution of Labor and Agrarian Problems Seen by Competent Observers; Both Born of Revolution

By JOHN LLOYD
(Associated Press Correspondent)

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 9. (AP)—Competent observers here foresee an early solution, or at least amelioration, of the two principal problems in Mexico's path to permanent stability.

These problems are the agrarian and the labor questions, both born of the revolutionary movement which followed the downfall of the Porfiriato Diaz regime almost two decades ago.

There already is a noticeable tendency by the country's leaders to give guarantees to large as well as small landowners that their land titles will remain intact, a tendency which is expected to grow into a well defined policy and bring with it a confidence permitting renewal of agricultural investments.

The government cannot, however, go back on its pledge to give land to the people, a disturbing factor in the title question. The way to settle the problem, as a man prominent in the country's guiding forces recently said, is to set a time limit for the distribution, after which the agrarian pledges would be considered fulfilled. This solution, observers say, is likely to be adopted.

Another of the government's pledges obliged it to give industrial workers certain concessions. These concessions grew out of hand, until the then president, Emilio Portes Gil, died in the wool laborite, admitted that the pendulum had swung from a domination by capital to a domination by labor and that it would have to settle back to a resting point.

The effect on the country's prosperity was apparent and slowly the pendulum has started its backward swing. Arbitration courts are more moderate now in their findings, heads of industries have more control over their workers and there is a renewed interest in industrial developments.

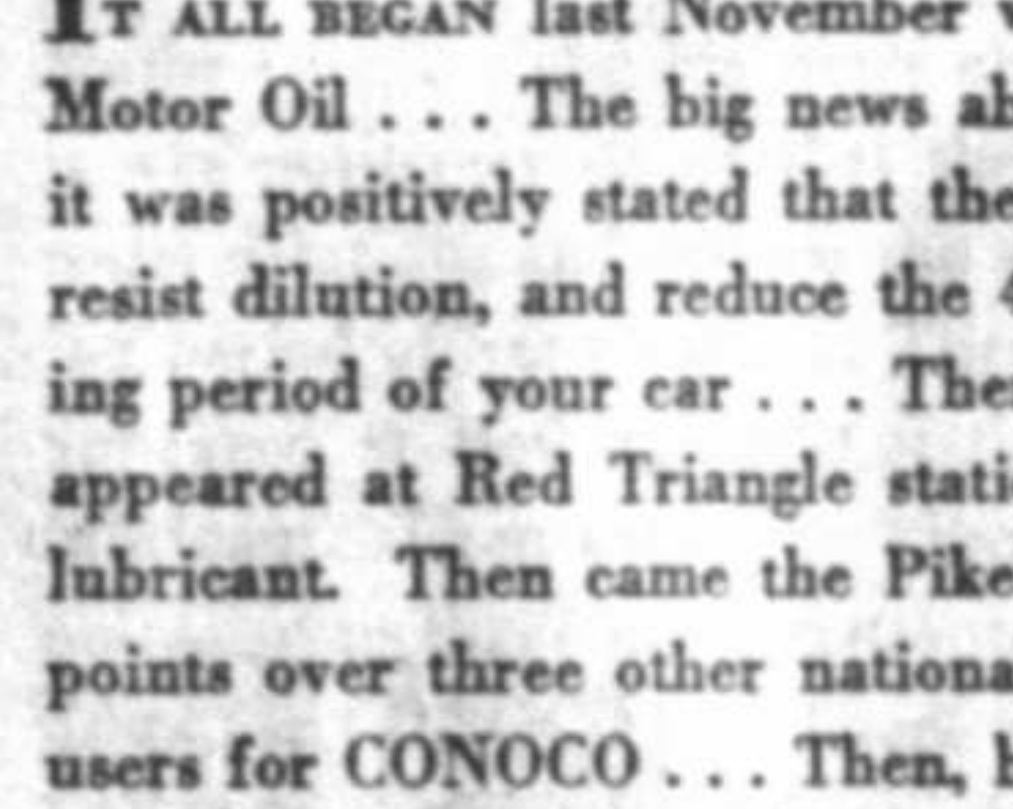

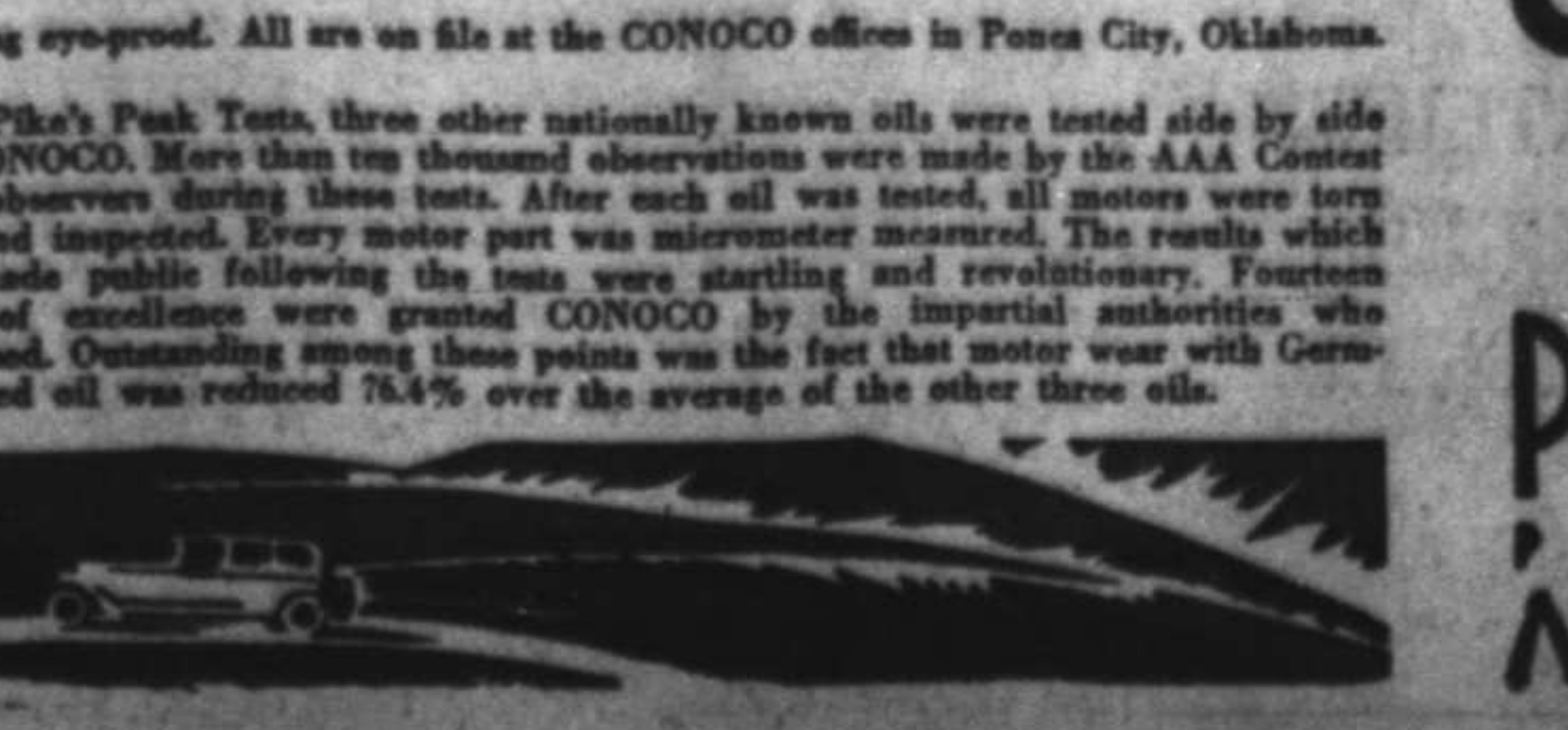
