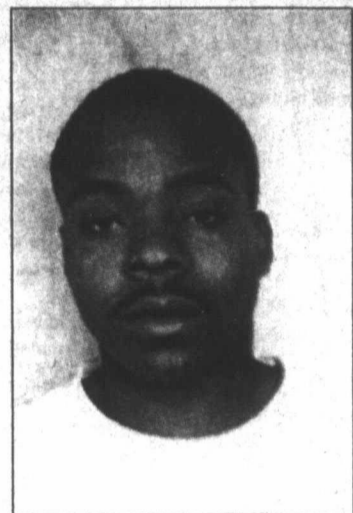

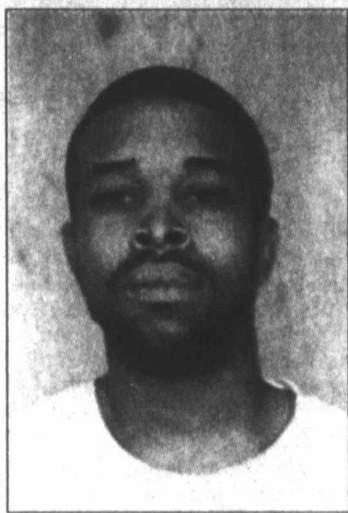

Accused capital murder trial begins in Sweetwater

The trials of the men charged with attempted capital murder for shooting at DPS State Trooper Frank Casares back in January of 2013 began this week at the Nolan County Courthouse in Sweetwater.

Christopher Johnson and Myron McDonald, both from Oklahoma City, shot at Casares and then led officers on a chase that ended in a stand-off in a house on the south side of Colorado City. The stand-off ended when a SWAT team breached the door of the home 20 long hours after the altercation began.

City manager reports on various ongoing projects

City Manager David Hoover provided an informative program for members of the Lions Club during the club's regular meeting Friday at noon in the Civic Center. Hoover reported on the many projects ongoing in the City of Colorado City.

He said that the pre-fabrication of the city's new water tower is taking place, and when pre-fab is finished, sections of the water storage facility will be delivered and installed north of town. The tower is planned for construction across the road, to the south of the landfill.

The city is also drilling water wells in the Wallace and Mitchell well fields, which will supply additional water to the tower. Easements are in the works, as a water line is being installed to connect the new tower and supply residents with water.

A new sewer line is being constructed, starting east of Austin Street, running north along Lone Wolf Creek, and eventually extending north of I-20. Hoover said the new lines will carry expected growth along the I-20 corridor.

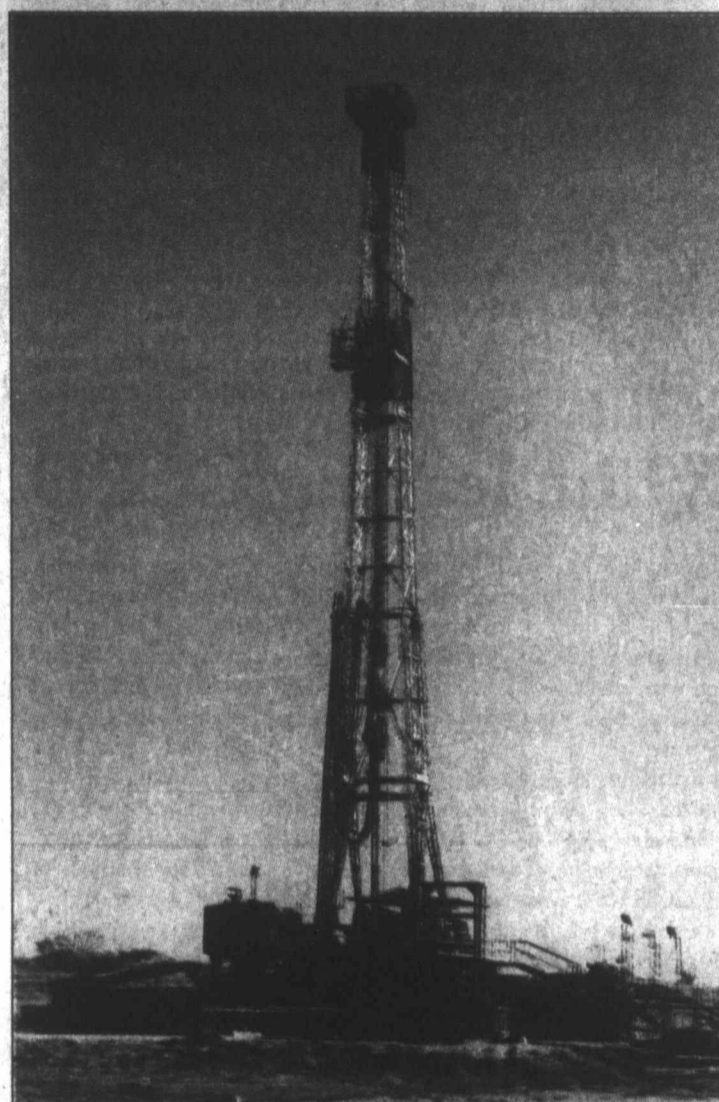
Stripes, the convenience store company, is planning to build a Travel Center just north of the Interstate, at the corner of CR 131 and the north service road of I-20. "We're glad to see it coming," Hoover said.

A USDA matching grant of \$750,000 will pay for the construction of an 8" water line and a sewer line, and Stripes has agreed to pay the "matching" part of the funds. The Travel Center will have plenty of truck parking, along with showers and bunks for travelers.

Hoover said that he has heard that plans are also in the works for the construction of a four-story La Quinta hotel, just north of the old Platter Restaurant. The location is across CR 131 from the planned Travel Center.

Lion Jay McCollum asked Hoover how many hotels are planning to build here, and Hoover said he has seen plans for the Best Western Inn & Suites, which will be built on N. Hwy. 208, behind Subway, and Cobblestone Inn, which is planned for construction on the south service road of I-20, near the newly opened Medicine Place pharmacy.

Hoover said he's also heard about the La Quinta, a Super 8 and the possibility of a Microtel Inn but has not seen any concrete plans. He said that he expects Colorado City may end up with eight to 10 new hotels during the next year, thanks to the oil expansion within the Cline Shale.

Small group attends local water meeting

Kathy Stander Benson came to Colorado City last Wednesday evening at the request of former mayor Carol Sue Dakan to raise awareness of potential problems and to discuss new innovations regarding drilling in the Cline Shale. A handful of citizens attended the meeting in the C.C. Thompson Room.

Benson began the meeting by introducing herself and telling the audience that she specializes in environmental and public utility issues. She said that she has helped write five bills, three of which have become laws, centering on water issues in Texas.

Almost immediately, Mitchell County citizen Terry Redwine spoke up and accused Benson of fear-mongering and using her own personal agenda against big oil companies. Benson responded by saying that she doesn't have an agenda of her own, but she

wanted to convey information to the local population about what has happened in other shale oil plays. Literature made available at the meeting addressed topics such as water contamination, well injection and other negatives often associated with drilling.

A resident of Granbury, she said that there have been a lot of negative things happen in association with fracking that is being used to drill for natural gas in the Barnett Shale, which is located near the Metroplex. She pointed the finger at the City of Granbury and the Brazos River Authority which, she says, unlawfully sold the water from Lake Granbury to the oil companies. An investigation into the case is ongoing.

Redwine said that he thinks that population growth and drought caused the water to dis-

Commissioners sign tax abatement agreement

The Mitchell County Commissioners' Court convened in a called meeting on Thursday, October 3rd, and went immediately into executive session. Court members consulted attorney Charles Kimbrough from a law firm in Austin regarding entering into a tax abatement agreement with FGE Texas, LLC.

After returning to open session, a public hearing was held regarding the possible abatement agreement, and Mitchell County citizen Troy Powell had a question for the court. "If this thing goes four feet in the air, do they still own the land?" he asked.

County Judge Ray Mayo answered, "Yes." And Powell said, "It's going four feet in the air."

Those were the only comments during the hearing, so Mayo called the hearing to a close, and commissioners moved on to other business.

Members of the court approved and signed an order designating 197,244 acres of land near Westbrook as a tax abatement reinvestment zone. The property is located 4.5 miles south of Westbrook and south of I-20 and is owned by FGE Texas, LLC.

Marijuana plant found growing on front porch

At 6:15 last Thursday morning, Colorado City Police Officer Brian Allen was investigating the possibility of a suspicious vehicle parked in the 800 block of Locust, when he went to a neighbor's home to inquire about the car. As he knocked on the door, Officer Allen noticed a plant growing in a planter on the porch, and its familiar-shaped leaves caught his eye.

The plant was, in fact, a marijuana plant growing on the porch, and its presence was the probable cause that led officers to seek a search warrant. After receiving the warrant, the property was searched and drug paraphernalia was found in the home. Charges for the paraphernalia are pending.

The male suspect at the home claimed that the plant was a butterfly tree, and pulled it out of its pot, though officers had asked him not to do so. Officers confiscated the plant.

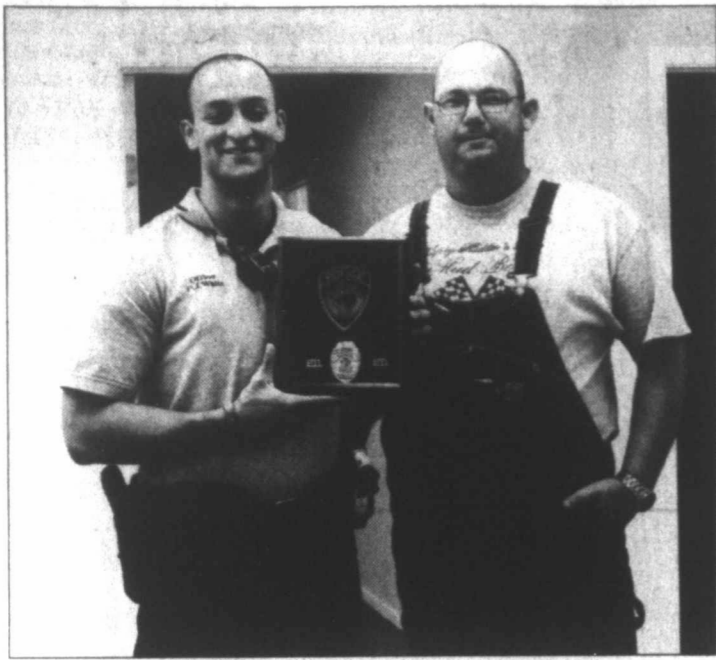

Photo ID required to vote

Mitchell County, Election Officer, Debby Carlock and Voter Registrar, Sylvia Clanton, remind voters that photo identification will now be required for voting in person.

"In Mitchell County we are working to make sure our voters understand the new ID requirements and have all the information they need to cast their ballots," said Carlock.

A voter will be required to show one of the following forms of photo identification at the polling location before the voter will be permitted to cast a vote:

- Texas driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election Identification Certificate (EIC) issued by DPS
- Texas personal identification card issued by DPS
- Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS
- United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States passport

With the exception of the U.S. citizenship certificate, the identification must be current or have expired no more than 60 days before being presented at the polling place.

This photo ID requirement is for voters casting a ballot in person, not by mail. Voters age 65 and older may vote by mail.

Election officials are encouraging voters to update their voter registrations to reflect the names on their IDs. Voters may use IDs that do not exactly match the name on their IDs if the names are substantially similar but will have to sign an affidavit stating they are the same person. Voters may look up their registration at VoteTexas.gov and if their name is not an exact match they can update their voter registration online at VoteTexas.gov.

"By preparing now, voters can help make sure voting goes smoothly when it comes time for the election," said Carlock.

To check and update their registrations, voters can visit (direct to VoteTexas.gov) or call (325)728-2606 for more information.

I think of beautiful music, art, food, wine, natural wonders, seashores with gentle breaking waves, sky formations that seem to be the doorway to heaven, stately trees and gardens with flowers of every shape and color ever dreamed of by man or God-himself.

The inside of the mango has the color of sunshine. The outside colors, red and green, remind me of love and happiness in the holiday season.

Once in Quebec I ordered a fish dish that had a mango sauce. I seldom have wine with lunch, but once I tasted the meal, a glass of wine seemed almost mandatory. Mango is like a drug that transports me up an over the ordinary experiences of man into a special realm of enjoyment. I think of love and respect and appreciation for all things that taste good. I think of a snow-capped peak at Jackson Hole, a mountain steam in Oregon with wildflowers alongside. I think of good times with family and friends all expressing their own personal joys of life.

I have never just eaten a mango. I enjoy a mango. It is the king of fruits, eaten fresh more than any other fruit. They are used in salads, juices, smoothies and ice cream. Mangoes must be what angels eat.

Really it is not all that complicated. In fact, it is rather basic.

The difference is community. Newspapers, like any business or individual, will always struggle when they stop doing the things they do well.

In a quest to be more modern, to be more business savvy, or to use more silicon, we cannot lose sight of the single most important characteristic and historically important aspect of a quality newspaper — you — our readers.

We hold public officials accountable, advocate for openness in government and champion the cause of ordinary

citizens, because we are committed to the neighborhoods, cities, county and coverage area we serve.

Watered down editorial pages, articles that read like a public relations campaign for government and page after page of wire service content will never resonate in the same way as celebrating our own community and standing up for its citizens.

Newspapers hold public officials accountable because it makes the place we call home a better place to live and because it is the right thing to do.

Newspapers do not make the news. They report it — all of it.

Of course, a newspaper wants to celebrate its community.

We share the great human interest stories, provide a slice of life in the county, highlight worthwhile causes, focus on interesting people and most especially on our young people with every edition.

With intelligent, thoughtful, compelling commentary, coupled with clearly written, straightforward news reporting we work every day to tell the truth and in that way we remain a vital and positive part of the community.

The newspaper belongs to the community.

That is why we work every day to give citizens a voice, to empower them and tell their stories.

That is why we hold government accountable because at our very core we believe that government belongs to the governed and not to the governing.

That is why we embrace the newspaper's role as the Fourth Estate.

According to historian Thomas Carlyle, Irish statesman and author Edmund Burke (1729-1797) said, "there were three Estates in Parliament, but in the Reporters Gallery yonder, there sat a Fourth Estate more important far than they all." (Heroes and Hero Worship in History, 1841).

Though in many places reporters have reduced themselves to simply being a mouthpiece for local government, reporting what officials want them to report and hiding what they don't, a community and a democracy is best served

when the newspaper provides a forum for checks and balances as the Fourth Estate of government.

Great newspapers, relevant newspapers that are embraced by their communities and consequently profitable, growing newspapers have not forgotten that role and have not abandoned these values.

We are not the enemy of government — rather we are the champions of citizens — of our community.

We know if newspapers do not stand up for citizens and protect the rights of free speech and the rights of access to government, then no one will.

Newspapers should be the most powerful advocate citizens have and be their open forum for a redress of grievances.

Any newspaper that represents the interests of the governed, more than the interests of the governed, is not worth the paper it is printed on or the ink that fills its pages.

Newspapers, the good ones, still make a difference in the communities they serve.

Burke also said, "All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is that good men do nothing."

As newspaper reporters, editors and staff, we have the weekly opportunity to do something — something that matters to our community and in all of our lives.

As long as people still read, still care about their quality of life, still love the place they call home and still pay taxes, newspapers that retain their role as the Fourth Estate and that celebrate the lives of ordinary people, will remain relevant, will matter to the community and be a part of your every day life.

I was fortunate to be employed by Devon Energy for about two years. I recently revisited a local well site which for some time has been in full production. The location is maintained and spotless to the point of possibly being cleaner than most backyards.

drought caused the water to disappear from the lake, a harsh reality for many lakes in Texas. He went on to say that Devon Energy is one of the companies interested in oil exploration in the area, and the company has a vested interest in conserving water.

Benson countered, saying that she was not there to extoll the evils of drilling for oil, as she owns mineral rights in Mitchell County. "I was there to explain the new, innovative ways of re-using, recycling water that will make the Cline Shale a better oil play," Benson said in an interview after the meeting, "and to give people an idea of what happened in other shale areas."

She said that she feared that Mitchell County could become a toxic dump ground, due to the number of injection well permit applications for this area. According to Benson, there are currently 15 applications for injection wells in the county on file with the Railroad Commission, the agency that regulates the oil industry.

Benson said that benzene has been found in the groundwater around Granbury, and she attributed it to the fracking going on in the area. Other local citizens, such as Bill Everett and Ray Ellis, voiced their positive opinions of practices used by oil field companies to protect the groundwater from pollution.

"I've been in the area since 1973, and I've never seen anything like that," Everett said.

"There are 2,000 to 3,000 disposal wells here, and none are leaking," Ellis agreed.

All in attendance agreed that using brine water or recycled water to drill for oil would be a good idea, but according to Everett, it has been done by Devon Energy and has shown to be too costly. It is common knowledge that Mitchell County is planning to build a desalination plant, but the water produced will be purchased and used by Mitchell County Utilities.

"If we ever get a desal plant, it will come from taxes paid by the oil companies," Redwine said. "We should welcome them. There are not 10 people that have interest in water like Devon."

"I'm just saying, 'Come into this with your eyes open,'" Benson said.

At one point, Dakan stood up and intervened. She said that she had asked Benson to come and tell about other alternatives to fracking with fresh water. Dakan informed those attending that she had been to the Shale Show in Sweetwater, and learned that it takes anywhere from two to eight million gallons of water to frack a well.

More issues were discussed, including the amount of water it takes to irrigate cotton vs. the amount it takes to frack an oil well. Everett said that he understands the same amount of water used to fracture an oil well is used in six hours of cotton irrigation. "We can't pick and choose," he said. If water usage is allowed to keep golf courses green, to water lawns and to irrigate crops, then why should oil companies suffer with a different set of rules.

Before the meeting came to a close, Charlie McCollum stood and thanked Benson for coming. "I would've loved to hear what you had to say," she said, commenting on the argumentative tone of the gathering.

Mitchell County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Keith Hiser announced that producers who file accurate and timely reports for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage can prevent the potential loss of FSA program benefits. Please pay close attention to the acreage reporting dates below, as some dates have changed for 2014.

"In order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements, all producers are encouraged to visit the Mitchell County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline," said Hiser.

The following acreage reporting dates are applicable for Mitchell County:

- November 15, 2013: Perennial Forage crops that includes, but is not limited to, alfalfa, clover, grass, mixed forage.
- January 15, 2014: Wheat, Triticale, Fall Barley, and Rye, except oats, planted between July 15 and January 15 with the intended use of grazing "GZ", forage "FG", and graze/grain "GS", grain "GR", cover "CO", green manure "GM", left stand-

ing "LS" or seed "SD". Oats with the intended use of grazing "GZ", forage "FG", and graze/grain "GS" planted from August 1 to December 15

• May 15, 2014: Oats with the intended use of grain "GR", cover "CO", green manure "GM", left standing "LS" or seed "SD", grazing "GZ", forage "FG", and graze/grain "GS" that are planted after December 15

• July 15, 2014: Wheat, Triticale, Fall Barley, Rye, and Annual Ryegrass, except oats, planted between January 16 and July 14. Sorghum Forage with the intended use of grazing "GZ" and forage "FG", CRP, Corn, Cotton, Sorghum, and Sunflowers

The following exceptions apply to the above acreage reporting dates:

- If the crop has not been planted by the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.
- If a producer acquires additional acreage after the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later

than 30 calendar days after purchase or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

• If a perennial forage crop is reported with the intended use of "cover only," "green manure," "left standing," or "seed" then the acreage must be reported by July 15th.

According to Hiser, Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) policy holders should note that the acreage reporting date for NAP covered crops is the earlier of the dates listed above or 15 calendar days before grazing or harvesting of the crop begins.

Additionally, producers can purchase both NAP and RMA coverage for 2014 annual forage crops. NAP coverage will not be available for 2015 annual forage crops.

After September 15, 2013, late-file fees will be assessed for 2013 and 2014 late-file acreage reports.

A local contractor has completed restoration work on two Colorado High School icons, and one CHS senior has taken it upon himself to thank the man and the business for the good deeds. Cody Tolle expressed his gratitude to Bill Ellis and CC Tank Rental employees for restoring the spirit bell and the air horn, both of which have been used at Wolves' football games.

"I would like to thank Mr. Bill Ellis and the CC Tank employees for their continued support of the youth of Colorado High School," Tolle said in a letter to the *Record*.

Though it may not have been noticeable to most Wolf fans, the spirit bell "sounded funny", and the employees at CC Tank

suspected the reason was too many coats of paint. They were correct.

According to Ellis, company personnel blasted the entire bell, along with the trailer, with an abrasive and then primed and painted the structure last year, just in time for football season. The bell came back to life and began to ring out true once more after being painted with industrial enamel paint, in traditional red, black and white.

This year, the local business took on the restoration of another CHS icon when they fully restored the air horn to working condition. The horn, used to signify a Wolves' touchdown at football games, had been sitting for many years and was not

working property.

The employees at CC Tank went through the same process with the air horn, abrasive blasting, priming and painting the noise-maker and trailer. Ellis said that automotive paints were used on the air horn, and the superior quality of the paint should give students 10 to 15 years worth of firing fans up at games.

Now, both the spirit bell and the airhorn are operational, and CHS students have enjoyed using them during the Wolves' football games this fall. Tolle said that Ellis and CC Tank employees "did an awesome job," and he wanted to thank them for donating their time and materials to bring the symbols back to life.

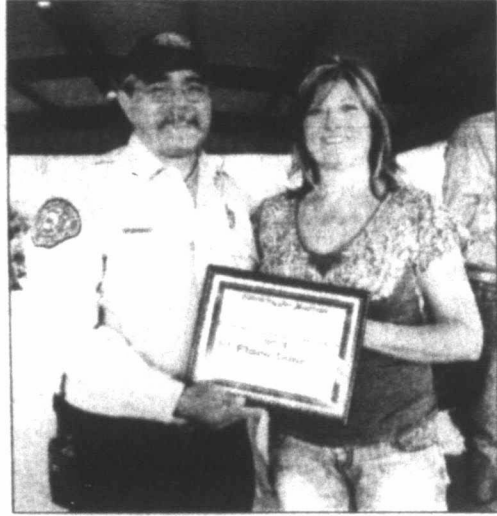

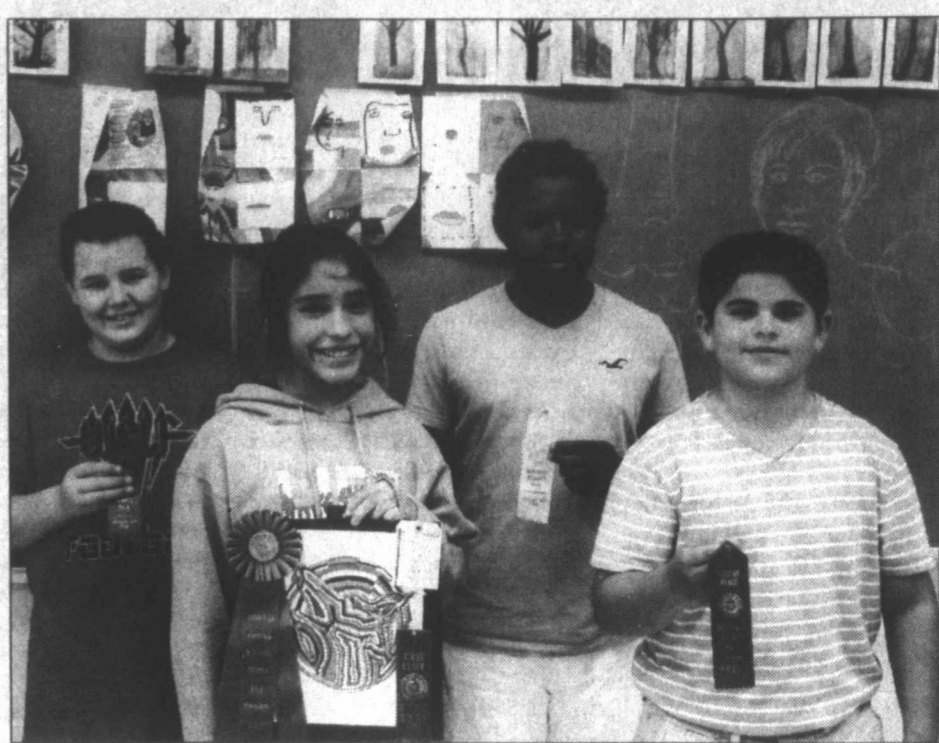

October is breast cancer awareness month

This October, Mitchell County Hospital District is proud to participate in National Breast Cancer Awareness Month and help raise awareness about the importance of screening and the early detection of breast cancer.

About 1 in 8 women born today in the United States will get breast cancer at some point during her life. After skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common kind of cancer in women.

The good news is that many

women can survive breast cancer if it is found and treated early. If you are age 40 to 49, talk to your doctor about when to start getting mammograms and how often to get them. Women ages 50 to 74 need mammograms every 2 years. You may choose to start getting mammograms earlier or to get them more often.

"Breast care and awareness is an extremely important part of taking care of yourself. As caregivers and providers for everyone in your family, it is so important to remember to be proactive in maintaining your own health."

This includes performing a breast self-exam at the same time every month and reporting any changes, such as non-movable lumps, nipple discharge, or a change in the appearance or texture of your breasts. Women over 40 should have a mammogram as part of your yearly exam. If you have a family history of breast cancer, talk with your provider about your risks and what you need to be doing for screening," says Anna Burton, R.N., F.N.P.-C of Family Medical Associates.

Talk to your doctor about your risk for breast cancer, especially if a close family member has had breast or ovarian cancer. Your doctor can help you decide when and how often to get mammograms. To make an appointment

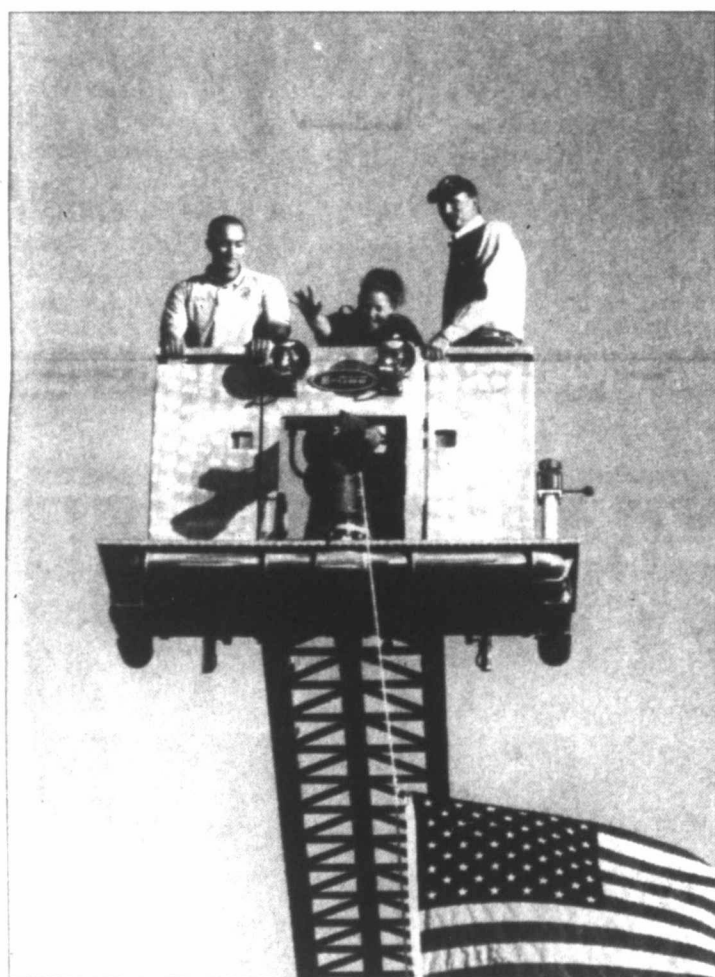
Main Street looking for scare tactics


