Arab Finds America and Hamburgers 'Just Fine'

A request to Hardin-Simmons University for someone to translate some Arabic letters created a strong friendship for an Eastland man and the young student who took on the work of translation.

Joseph Housson, who lives in the Alhambra Hotel, had many papers that his father, an Arab, had left him, but he was unable to read any of them. By chance he wrote to H-SU asking if they could translate the letters, and by chance Na'em Ateek of Nazareth, Israel happened to be a student at the college.

Na'em, who many of his friends call Stephen, had been in this country just a short time when he first met Housson. As of Sunday he has made the United States his home for 11 months.

Na'em and Housson became fast friends, and as a result the student is spending the summer with his new American friend. His biggest problem now is that he doesn't have a job and must find one. He hopes to find work in Eastland and says he will do just about any kind of work which may be available.

Na'em (whose name means heaven), is studying to be a minister. He came to this country with the help of a Baptist missionary. It took him three years to save up the \$700 needed to fly to America, but during his first year at Hardin-Simmons he was given a full scholarship. He had attended a Baptist school in Israel and can speak English fluently.

A sophomore at H-SU, Ateek is majoring in chemistry. He feels that he needs to know of science although he plans to preach in his homeland.

The 23-year-old Arab likes Texas and "the States," but says he is ready now to return to Israel. His father is very ill and he is afraid he may never see him again. Despite his yearning to return home, he plans to complete his education first.

There are 10 members of Na'em's family. They were moved to Nazareth when the Jews took over Israel under order of the United Nations. His family, who owned three houses before, now live in one rented house. They have not been paid for the houses they had to give up.

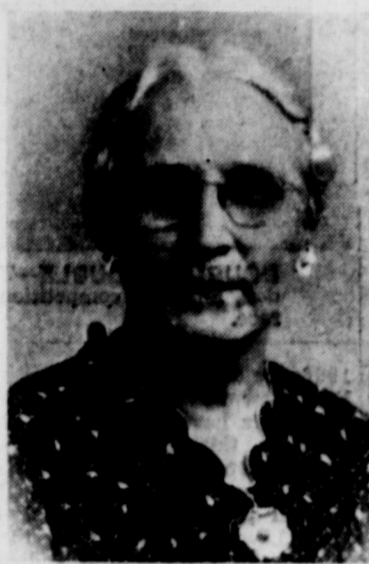
What does he think of America? He thinks it is a wonderful country which is "greatly blessed."

"Americans are living in a very blessed place, but they do not appreciate what they have," he says. He feels that God will hold America responsible for the waste which he sees.

Na'em finds it amusing that Americans do not know about the rest of the world. He says geography is lacking, and to prove his point he corrected the spelling of this reporter, who had transposed his "e" and "a" in spelling Israel. The visiting student says that

people are happy in his country although they do not have as much as Americans do. He says in Israel that only the rich have checking accounts at the bank, for instance.

But he points to the fight between communism and democracy in his country, where his ancestors have lived for more than 400 years. In Israel, which is about the size of Massachusetts (Continued On Page Four)

Eastland County's delegation to the State Democratic Convention in Austin left Monday, pledged to support Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson "all the way" in his bid for the Presidency of the United States.

The "moderate" Eastland County delegation is expected to side with other "moderates" and "conservatives" to fight off attempts of "ultra-liberals" who oppose Sen. Johnson. Mrs. Frankie Randolph, who heads the Democrats of Texas Clubs, heads the "liberals", who are expected to bolt the convention and hold a rump convention of their own. "Liberals" have almost promised that they will send a rival Texas delegation to the national convention.

Eastland County will have eight delegates and eight alternates in Austin. Delegates will be Virgil Moore and Don Parker, both of Eastland; J. A. Dunn of Rising Star; Dr. E. E. Two Agencies Praise County School Study

Dr. James C. Whittington, who heads the tri-district school study group, has received copies of two letters Rep. Omar Burleson has received from governmental agencies which have studied the proposal that Eastland, Ranger and Olden combine to build one new high school.

Here is part of the letter written by E. Glenn Featherston, assistant commissioner of the Division of State and Local School Systems with the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare:

"Each of the states has provided for a system of local districts for operations of its public schools. In many states, including Texas, legislation has been enacted relative to the reorganization of school districts. The legal basis for redistricting constitutes an important element for study by the committee or groups concerned with the problem of planning an effective district organization.

"Other important elements to be considered in the reorganization of school districts are presented in the number of research publications including those of the Office of Education. While we are not in a position to comment on the specific factors in this organization, we feel that Dr. Whittington and his committee are to be commended for their systematic study of this problem and for their interest in providing the best possible educational opportunity for citizens of their local community."

Another letter forwarded by Rep. Burleson was written by Lyle W. Ashby, deputy executive secretary of the National Education Association:

"Dr. William G. Garr, executive secretary, has been out of the city and so I am responding to your letter about the Eastland County situation. This appears to be another example where mistaken local pride and jealousy have stood in the way of better educational opportunity for boys and girls. We hope that the study now undertaken by the three districts will be helpful.

"We have on our staff some experts in such problems of school districts reorganization. Dr. Howard A. Dawson, director of our Division of Rural service, and his staff might be able to be of some service, if you care to suggest to Dr. Whittington that he write to him."

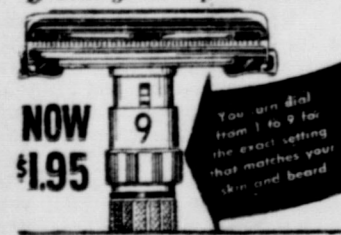

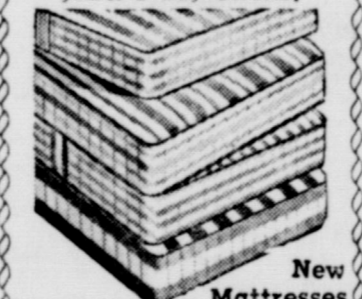

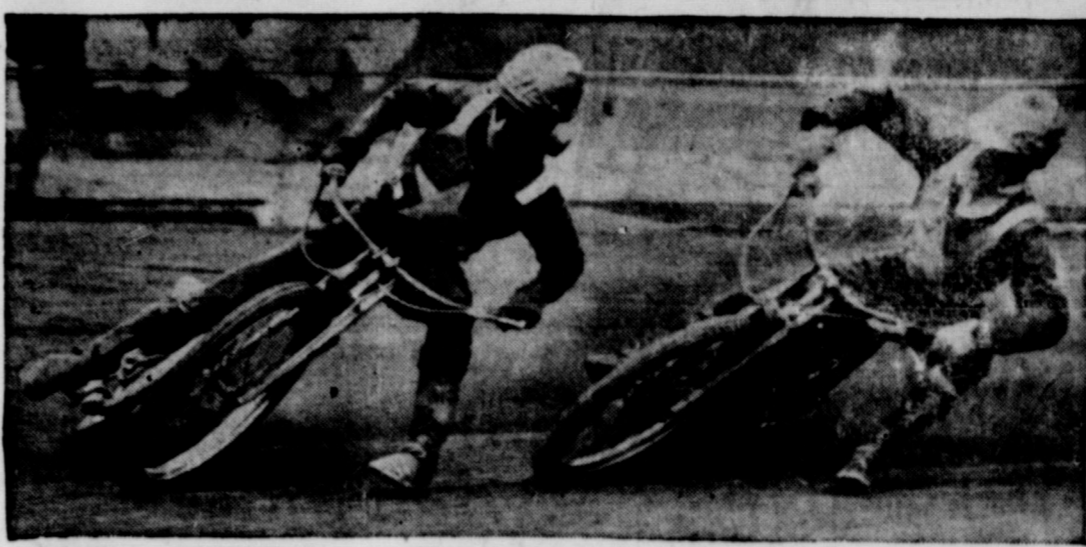

1906, the date when the first Pure Food Law was officially enacted. Canners have a particular interest in this date for several reasons. One is pride: leaders of the original provisions of the Pure Food Law. Suppored on by their cooperative efforts in this direction, they proceeded to establish the National Canners Association, the industry's official organization, one year later. But the most important reason why canners consider June 30 a date worth remembering is that the Pure Food Law reflects the same standards they have long been working for in their individual canneries. Like other intelligent businessmen, canners recognize the fact that public trust depends on delivering the goods—in this case, pure wholesome goods.

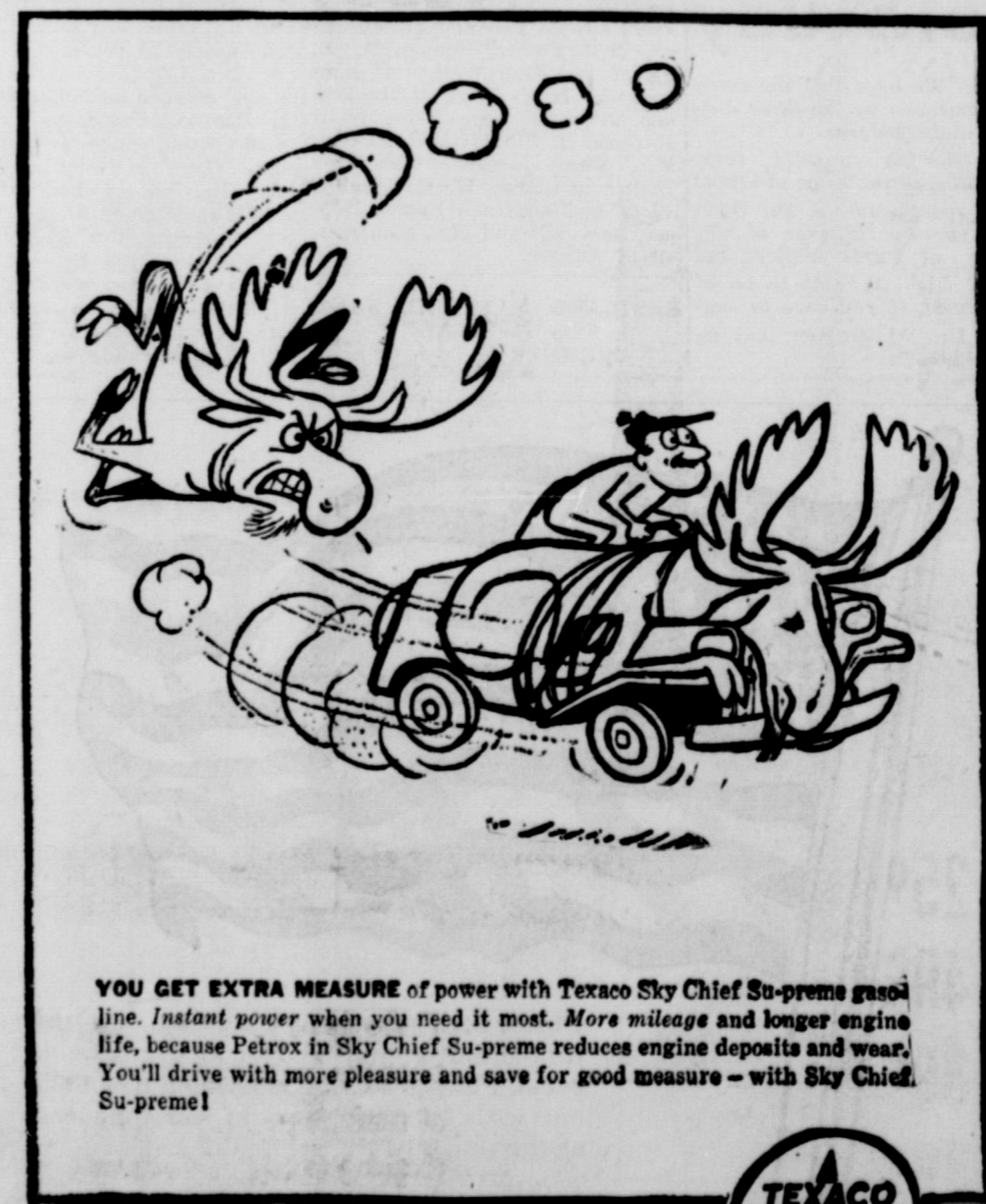
benefit of its membership. Through constant research, canners have been able to improve quality of many canned foods. They also kept a constant watch on the crops raised for canning purposes. Fruits and vegetables for canning are grown under contract for the industry or selected because the score high on every point of quality. (and judging a green bean may be more like judging a horse than many people suspect.) Agricultural scientists and canning experts work together to supervise the growth of canning crops. Many canneries have fieldmen who help the grower solve problems of selecting and planting seeds, pest control, soil analysis, and harvesting techniques. Staggering planting schedules have been developed to allow for an even flow of ripe vegetables to the cannery so that no corn, peas, or whatever vegetable it may be will show signs of old age before its turn for harvesting and canning arrives.

Canners also work closely with governmental agriculture specialists. Through the years, the professional togetherness of this team has developed new strains of fruits and vegetables and made possible improvements in existing types. They have, for example, developed wilt-resistant peas, beans, and tomatoes; they have removed the strings from what used to be the string beans and are now most decidedly green beans; they have bred clingstone peaches with smaller pits and better flavor.

When you think of the Pure Food law, you don't usually think in terms of actually redesigning foods to improve their taste, appearance, or nutritive values. But the canning industry takes its responsibility to consumers very seriously indeed.

Not content with merely delivering food free of adulteration, it wants to deliver food of the best possible quality. The Pure Food Law has great significance to the industry because it symbolizes this attitude.

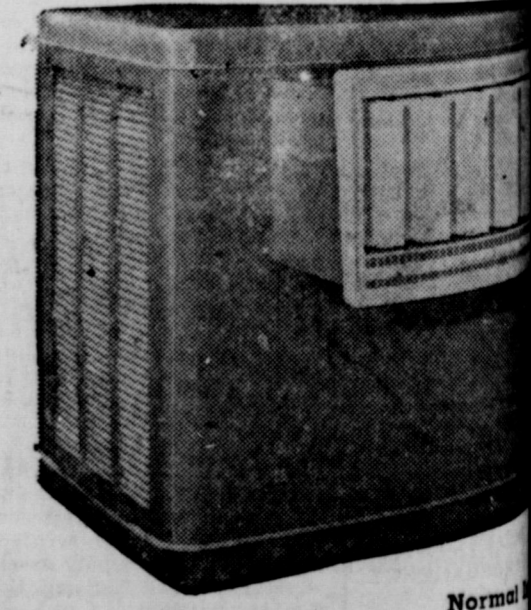

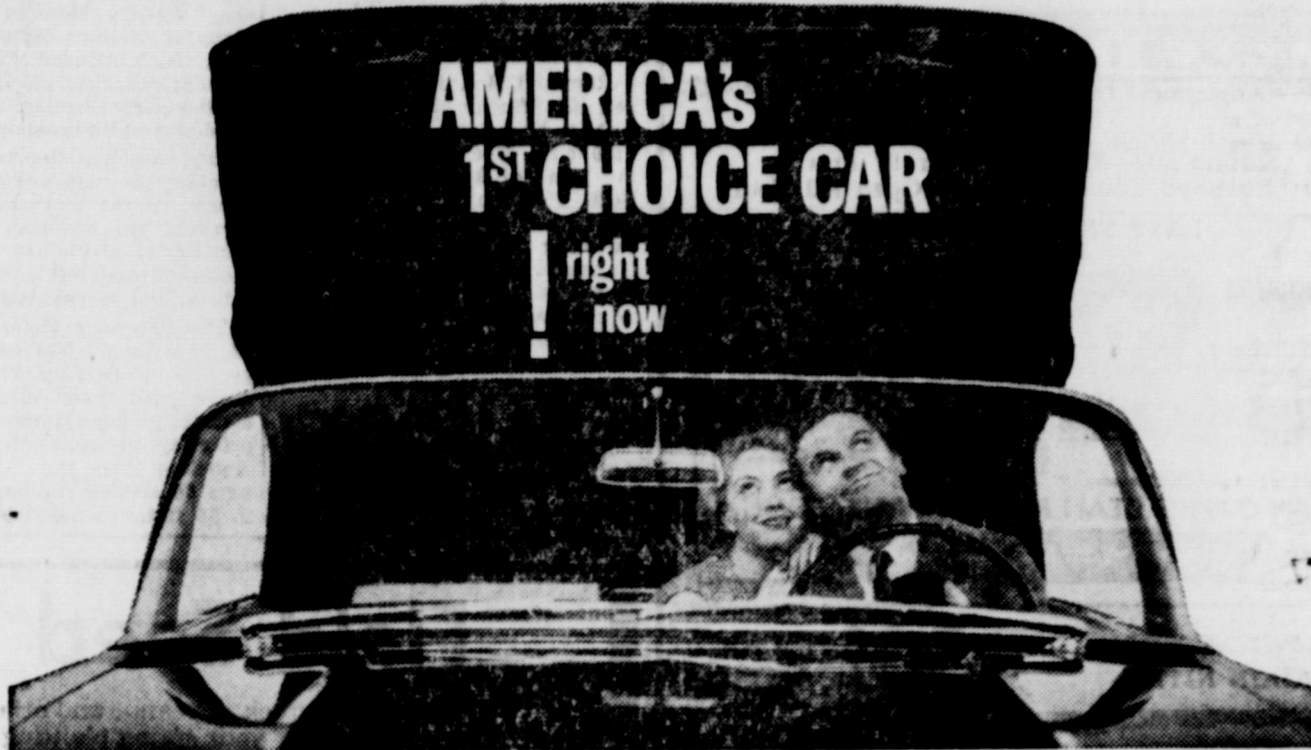

Restricted Feeding For Rearing Pullets Explained Restricted feeding of broiler strain pullets from the sixth-eighth week of the growing period until the start of egg production has been found to result in a delay in sexual maturity and a lower body weight at the beginning of egg production.

consume enough feed to meet their total energy requirement. Since mechanical restriction involves more labor expense, the use of a high fiber formula may prove to be more economical under some conditions, Deyoe stated. Birds on a higher fiber diet, however, will consume up to one and one-half times as much feed as pullets on a high energy diet, so this must be considered.

This practice has several advantages for the poultryman, said Dr. C. W. Deyoe, Texas A & M Poultry Service Department. There is an increase in the number of large, settable eggs during the production period, an overall increase in egg size, reduced mortality, and a reduction in the cost of rearing the pullets to sexual maturity. Mechanical restriction may be accomplished by limiting the amount of high energy feed given to the pullets to 10-15 pounds per day, or by limiting the length of time the birds have access to the feed. The use of a high fiber diet will restrict the caloric intake because the birds will be unable to
