WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Twenty-eight Americans are bottled up with other foreigners in the beleaguered city of Sianfu, where fighting is in progress between rival Chinese factions. They have appealed to the American officials at Peking to take immediate steps to get all foreigners from the city.

Acting on the appeal which said that the situation in Sianfu was serious, American legation officials at Peking have made representations to the Peking government and to commanders of the attacking and defending forces asking that facilities be extended that the foreigners can leave the city.

Report of this precarious situation to the state department followed advice received earlier in Shihai Sianfu. The American consul general at Hankow has reported that the city is the responsibility of Sianfu. He cannot send relief.

"Hornsby for President" Cry of St Louis Fans as Cardinals Win

**Judge Gary, on Eve of Eightieth Birthday
Sees Business Good and Getting Better;
Doesn't Like Idea of a Five Day Week**

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Moved to speech upon the eve of his eightieth birthday, Judge Elbert H. Gary leaned forward Tuesday from the seat he has so long occupied at the head of the directors' table of the United States Steel corporation and discouraged in terms of persistent optimism about business conditions and world peace.

A score of newspaper correspondents, who temporarily occupied the seats of the mighty around the table, were able to detect but two departures from the vigorous business dean's optimistic tone.

Judge Gary was distinctly pessimistic about the successful advent of the five-day working week, later advocated by Henry Ford and executive of the American Federation of Labor.

And when he touched upon his own age, with its relationship to the stockholders of the steel corporation, although he introduced the subject lightly, he closed it with a calmly fatalistic gesture.

"I am prepared for the inevitable," said Judge Gary, but his demeanor seemed to indicate that he would like to be younger and never retire.

Business conditions, presuming that the steel industry is a reliable barometer, are good and the tendency is for them to become better "than we had any reason to expect," said Judge Gary.

"More and more I am convinced that there is no necessity for any important slump in business in the United States at any time," he said.

Judge Gary was asked if he thought the recent merger of steel companies in France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany would affect the steel business and prices in this country.

"The competition of the European merger will hardly be bitter of unreasonable," he replied. "My opinion is based on conversations with foreign representatives."

As to the five-day week, Judge Gary said:

"I shall require further proof that any man or group of men can produce as much in a five-day week as under the present schedule of six days at 8 hours a day."

WANT ALL GINS IN TEXAS CLOSED

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 5.—Telegrams urging the immediate closing of all gins in Texas and enactment of legislation reducing cotton acreage were received by the senate today.

Cisco Chamber of Commerce and retail merchants association asked the legislature to request the Texas Bankers Association and the Texas Cotton Gin Association to take immediate steps to put into effect plans for obtaining a reasonable price for cotton above cost of production.

Partners of H. H. McLennan, Limestone and Freestone counties urged legislation by the present special session to reduce the cotton acreage.

SIX BODIES FROM MINE

22 More Victims of Tennessee Blast Yet To Be Found

ROCKWOOD, Tenn., Oct. 5.—Six bodies have been taken from the Boone Iron company's mine here following yesterday's explosion, which killed 23 men.

Rescue parties have gone into entry number two to recover the other bodies.

Of the 22 men in the mine when the explosion occurred, only five escaped alive, according to Federal Mine Inspector Dempsey.

**INHABITANTS FLY FROM LOW-
LANDS AS FATHER OF
WATER RAMPAGES**

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—While flood waters continued to menace sections of four Middle Western states Tuesday night, greatest apprehension was felt for Beardstown, Ill., where the rain swollen Illinois river had inundated 100 city blocks and threatened to isolate the city completely within another 24 hours.

Thousands of persons were forced from their homes through the lowlands of Illinois, Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas, and inestimable damage was wrought to crops by the floods which followed heavy October rains.

At Altoona, Ill., the Mississippi has passed the flood stage and overflowed the lowlands. In other sections of the state, many residents have fled as the water continued to rise.

ALLEGED ALIEN PROPERTY BRIBE WENT PARTLY TO HARDING CAMPAIGN FUND

MAL DAUGHERTY TELLS THE COURT

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Mal Daugherty, brother of former attorney general Harry M. Daugherty, gave testimony Tuesday which indicated that up to \$50,000 of the alleged bribe paid for the return of the American Metal Company's assets had gone into a republican campaign fund which helped elect Warren G. Harding president of the United States.

Mal's testimony as a defense witness in the trial of his brother and Colonel Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian, on charges of defrauding the government in connection with payment of a \$40,000 bribe for the return of the metal company's \$7,000,000 to Swiss claimants, followed his recent appearance as a prosecution witness when he admitted that Harry had burned records of the Midland National Bank, of which Mal is president.

The government believes these records of financial transactions following the alleged bribe would have incriminated the former attorney general.

The bank president's sensational statements late Tuesday connected some of the alleged bribe bonds with Jess Smith, Harry Daugherty's right hand man and confidant, who committed suicide and is alleged to have conferred with Richard Merton, German financier, before Merton paid the bribe; John T. King, the late republican national committeeman from Connecticut.

Mal Daugherty's testimony seemed to indicate clearly that the defense would contend that Smith and not Harry Daugherty had distributed the bonds which King had distributed and which the government had sought to trace to the former cabinet officer.

CITY GOES WILD AGAIN, AS TEAM COPS, THIRD GAME OF SERIES

SPORTSMAN'S PARK, ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 5.—The St. Louis baseball club was sitting on top of the percentage column in the world's series tonight and St. Louis itself was sitting on top of the world.

The city got that way because the Cardinals, playing like inspired men, won the first world series game that has ever been played west of the Mississippi river.

About 35,000 fans, including two pessimists with umbrellas and slickers, saw the brutal bludgeoning the Cardinals administered to those sometimes slugging Yanks in winning a 6 to 0. When it was all over they joined that part of the population which couldn't get in the park in another mad celebration.

Although they nursed a hang-over from last night's autumnalia, held to celebrate the arrival in the city of Rogers Hornsby with the National League pennant, the fans, at first a little weary, heard the magic phrase, "Play ball" and were converted into a writhing, howling mob that a straight jacket couldn't have held.

When Jess Haines hit one off to parts remote, the cheering reached the octave of a whoop, which was still in progress at this writing. When a double play, Thelma to Hornsby to Bottomley, with the rajah acting as the pivot man, ended the game, somebody yelled "Hornsby for President" and the wild demonstration of the night began all over again.

The idea of injecting the rajah into politics caught the imagination of the crowd and spread over the city like a contagion. It is safe to predict that the phrase will be written all over the town before morning by an hysterical population.

The exhibition of the Cards was enough to get excited about—even to the extent of wearing a cowbell to the watch chain which apparently has become quite the thing out here.

As though it were a burning building, the frenzied fans poured out of the park, blocking street cars and automobiles and filling the air with one long endless yell which was accompanied by the melodious tinkling of cow bells and that indescribable sound caused when a tin can is dragging over a rough pavement.

Terrified women, caught in the surge of mad humanity, screamed but they were unheard. Forming in an endless line the crowd snake danced to the city. Hundreds of automobiles followed which were occupied by other yelling fans.

Once downtown the celebration reached new heights of emotional insanity exceeding even the historic demonstration of last night.

LEGISLATORS CIRCULATE PETITION TO GET GOVERNOR TO KEEP THAT BET JIM MADE WITH DAN MOODY ON ELECTION

**DOCUMENT TO BE SUBMITTED TODAY IF ENOUGH SIGN
IT, BUT SIGNERS REFUSE TO LET NAMES BE
MADE PUBLIC YET**

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 5.—The first woman governor of Texas may be asked in a resolution to be offered in the house of the special legislative session Wednesday to resign her office in compliance with the campaign wager she made with Attorney General Dan Moody.

Signatures for such a measure were being obtained today with hopes that enough would have been affixed to warrant offering it Wednesday.

Its presentation is expected to provoke the most heated session the house has ever seen and the signers of the resolution refused to allow their names to be made known until it is offered in the house.

Former Governor James E. Ferguson in the campaign for his wife, Miriam A. Ferguson, for nomination for re-election offered to withdraw the governor's name from the race if she failed to lead Moody by 25,000 votes in the first primary.

Moody accepted the challenge saying he would withdraw if he was not leading the woman governor.

Moody won the first and second primaries by majorities well above the three hundred thousand vote mark but Mrs. Ferguson refused to act in accordance with the wager.

Moody and the Fergusons have been bitter political enemies since about a year ago when the young attorney-general attacked Ferguson administration through prosecution of what he termed "incorruptible road contracts" awarded by the state highway commission which was appointed by the governor.

At that time there were rumors of impeachment.

The special session convened at the Lone Star state capital now was called by Mrs. Ferguson for the purpose of validating \$100,000,000 worth of district road bonds clouded by a United States supreme court decision. Nine months ago the woman executive refused to call a special session although sufficient legislators signed a petition asking it.

At that time she was under the fire of the young attorney general who defeated her in the primaries for nomination on an "anti-Ferguson" platform.

First word that a resolution asking Governor Ferguson's resignation was being prepared came today shortly after Moody spoke before the house of representatives.

The governor intimated last July when she issued a special session call she would resign of her own volition after certain legislative affairs had been cleared up. Since there have been numerous investigation bills asking probe of state departments introduced in the legislature it is not believed the governor will carry out her unofficial plan and "quit under fire."

She made no requests to Lieutenant Governor Barry Miller to remain in Austin after the close of the session. The lieutenant governor would become governor in the event of Governor Ferguson's resignation.

Moody's election as governor is virtually assured as the democratic party controls politics in Texas.

And they were married. Years of happiness, struggle, poverty, years of illness, Henry Colman became a Methodist minister.

Circle riding through the wilderness of the west, Bible in his saddle-

bag, fording treacherous streams, climbing jagged, wooded heights, praying with the sick, blessing little children, holding out the candle of hope in a darkened pioneering world.

Then came years of power. Important offices in the state and general conference. In 1888 he organized the Wisconsin Anti-Saloon League. His college-day sweetheart and wife kept step with him—organizing kindergarten schools, presiding graciously over Ladies' Aids.

And ever happy, happy, happy! Happy even as they are today with the sunset of life crimson over the darkening hills—happy for 46 long years of sowing and reaping.

"Never interrupt the other in his appointed task" says Mrs. Colman. "Do not worry about the future. Let each day take care of itself."

"Don't be in a hurry when you marry. Know your man."

Rev. and Mrs. Colman are the only survivors of that class of seven in the years ago.

WADE TO FIGHT FOR TAX MEASURE

W. T. C. C. GETS BEHIND WITT'S BILL FOR EQUAL TAXATION

STAMFORD, Texas, Oct. 5.—Homer D. Wade, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has gone to Austin in the interests of the tax equalization resolution which has been introduced in the special session of the 29th legislature. This resolution provides for the state wide tax survey for which the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been fighting for the past several months, and passage of such a resolution constitutes one of the major programs of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for the year.

President of the West Texas Chamber, is now leading the state wide fight for tax readjustment. Duggan has assembled statistics which clearly show that the present system is obsolete and that some change in the system of taxation should be worked out. Thus far the efforts of the Chamber have been centered on securing a state tax survey in order that the inequities of the present system may be brought to the attention of the law making body of the state.

The organization has been proceeding cannot be expected to take action on so important a matter on statistics and information presented by any body other than an official body provided for by the legislature. Hence, the effort to secure a state wide survey.

Mr. Wade expects to confer with legislators interested in the bill while in Austin, and while there will formulate plans for the co-operation of the regional organization in securing the passage of a bill for the tax survey.

R. W. Shelby Expects to Get Forty Bales From 90 Acres

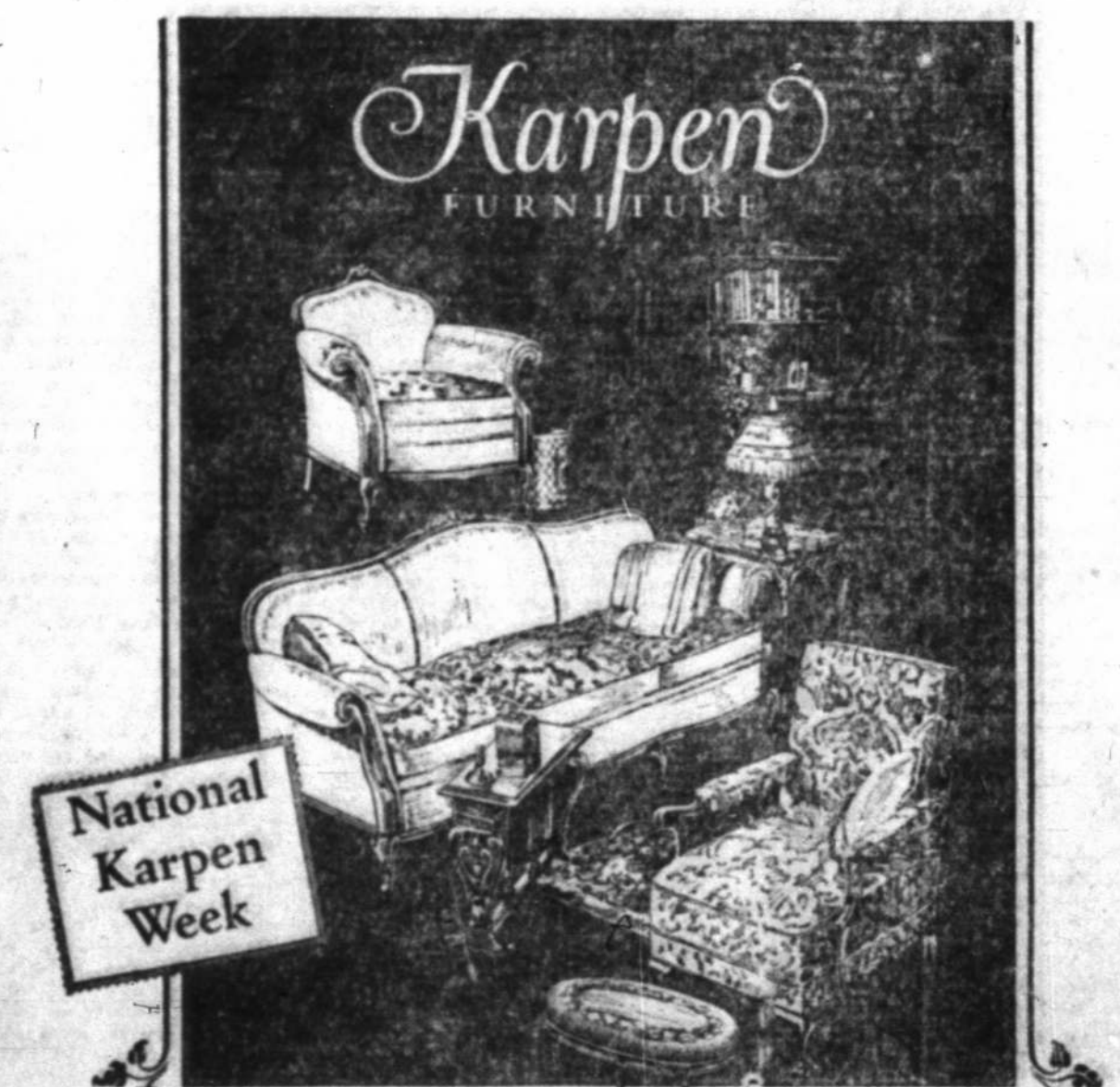

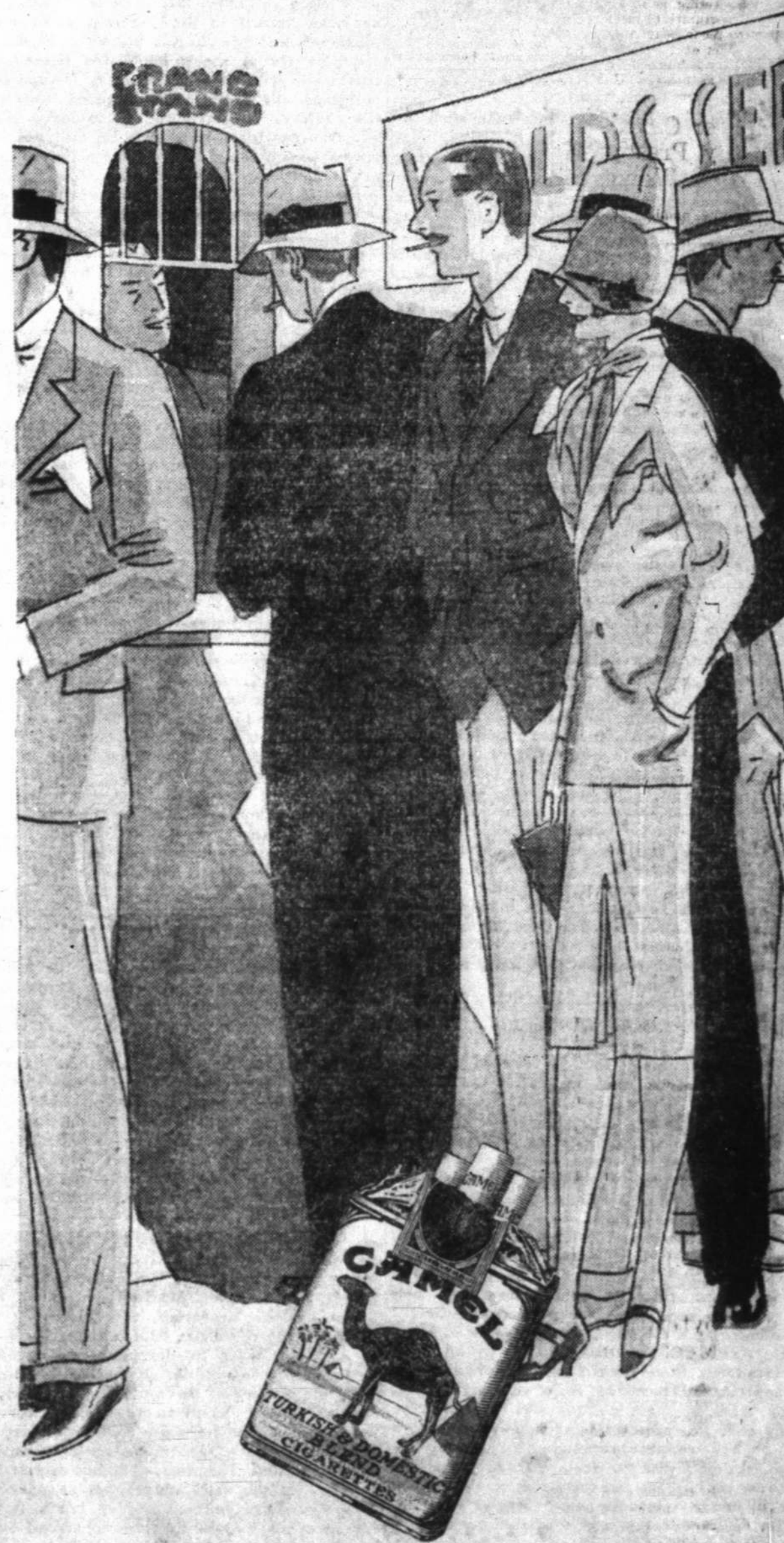

ST LOUIS SEES CARDINALS DRUB YANKS

BIG JESS HAINES HOLDS NEW YORKERS TO FIVE SCATTERED HITS, AND THEN CLOUTS OUT HOME RUN TO ICE GAME

United News Staff Correspondent—SPORTSMAN'S PARK, ST. LOUIS, Oct. 5.—St. Louis' dream of watching the Cardinals win a world-series victory came true Tuesday in a manner to satisfy the most rabid of the 37,000 fans who jammed every corner and crevice of Sportsman's park.

Thanks to the strong right arm of Big Jess Haines, who shut out the New York Yankees with but five scattered hits, Rogers Hornsby's fighting ball club won the third game of the current classic of baseball, 4 to 0.

A tremendous drive into the right field stands by this same Jess Haines in the fourth inning made certain the victory, although it was Mark Koenig's poor throw earlier in the inning which let Lester Bell romp home with the first and only necessary run.

Such a chorus of cowbells, whistles, horns and howls of joy as went up from the crowded stands had never been heard before in a ball park. The fourth dimension of pandemonium was on tap.

The Cards not only won the game in a manner to delight their admirers, but in a way that convinced the experts that they soon will be champions of the world.

Before a crowd that outdid anything in the way of enthusiasm ever brought into a world-series game, the St. Louis team put up as good an exhibition of baseball as any championship club ever produced.

While the glory went to Jess Haines who was always master of the situation and whose home run was the dramatic high spot of the affair, the Cards were backing up their pitcher brilliantly both on the defense and attack.

They drove the veteran Reuther from the box early in the game and pounded Bob Shawky when the lanky relief pitcher took up the burden.

It was a game of sunshine, shadow and showers. In the fourth inning when Babe Ruth was on second base a down pour of rain put a temporary halt to the activities. After 30 minutes delay Umpire Hildebrand ordered the game continued and it was nearly over before the next shower.

The St. Louis fans, who naturally broke a record for attendance at Sportsman's park, refused to budge throughout the game. They had come to see the Cards win—and urge them on to victory if necessary.

The climax came immediately after the rain ceased.

Haines got the Yanks out promptly and then the Cardinals went to work. Lester Bell, whose batting had been as weak as his fielding was brilliant, drove a single to center. Hays sacrificed and Bob O'Farrell walked.

Mark Koenig, trying for a double play after Tony Lazzeri had tossed him Thievenow's roller, threw too wide to first base. It was a crucial error, for Bell dashed home before Lou Gehrig could recover the ball.

The delegation that greeted this run was swelled up a moment later in a greater delirium.

Haines had hit a home run into the screaming mass of fans behind right field. It was almost too good to be true. The stands and bleachers exploded with joy. The crowd and Haines came home together.

After that the Cards had nothing to worry about. They added another run in the fifth on singles by Southworth and Hornsby and Bottomley's infield out.

This Jess Haines is a big, unemotional farmer boy who has been up with the Cards since 1915. He never pitched a better game for them than on this critical occasion at St. Louis, first world-series game.

In five different innings Haines put the first batter up on first base, and then coolly, albeit confidently, moved down the ensuing batsman.

The Cardinals' infield, down some hard hit balls to help out and Southworth and Hays roamed over the distant meadows pulling down potential doubles and triples, letting nothing get by.

The Yanks scarcely seemed to know they were in the ball game. Earl Combs made a couple of brilliant running catches and Joe Dugan jumped in with the star fielding play on the day but the New York outfit was a demoralized lot. They seem to have given up hope.

Earl Combs started off the game by flying to Hays in deep left. The fans were screaming encouragement each time Jess Haines waved his pitching arm, and went into ecstasies of delight when Koenig, second man up, fanned.

The Babe's first appearance was the signal for a mixed chorus of jeers and cheers. Haines carefully fed Ruth slow ones and the dreaded slugger hit one down to Hornsby, whose toss to Bottomley ended the inning.

Billy Southworth, hero of Sunday's game, gave the fans something to yell about when he came to bat after Douthitt had flied to Bob Meusel in right field. After looking one over, Billy cracked the second pitch past Lazzeri for a clean single. Neither Hornsby nor Bottomley could advance him, however.

With a nice change of pace, Haines retired the Yankees in the second in one-two-three order. He struck out Tony Lazzeri after the Yankee second baseman had waited until the count was three and nothing. Then Jess shot over three strikes in succession.

Chick Hays, who had not done a thing at bat before Tuesday's game, busted a solid double into deep left field in the Card's half, but it went for nothing, since "Dutch" Reuther kept the other Cards from hitting safely.

The first Yankee hit was a single by Joe Dugan in the third inning, a line drive over Thievenow's head. Hank Severid laid down a sacrifice bunt, advancing Dugan to second. Reuther popped a foul fly to O'Farrell, and then Haines walked Combs. Jim Bottomley put an end to the Yank threat by spearing to first with Mark Koenig's roller.

Jess Haines' first man up in the third, was credited with his when the right side of the Yank field mused up his roller. Reuther promptly threw four balls in succession to Taylor Douthitt. Southworth advanced the runners by jaying down a bunt.

With his chance to break up the ball game, Rogers Hornsby lifted a weak fly to Severid. Bottomley drove a long fly to Earl Combs, and the Cards' opportunity was gone.

As though foreshadowing trouble, black rain clouds came up out of the West, and Babe Ruth drove a single to center. Meusel was thrown out, and the rain came down in sheets.

Umpire Hildebrand called a halt, and the ground keepers rushed out with tarpaulins while the players raced for their dugouts.

The shower was of short duration, and after some new and rather wobbly base lines had been painted down both flanks of the infield play was resumed.

The playing field was mucky and treacherous.

With Ruth on second and one out, Lou Gehrig raised a high fly to O'Farrell in front of the plate and Hornsby threw out Lazzeri.

Lester Bell opened the fourth inning for the Cards with a solid single to center, his first hit of the series. Hays sacrificed and O'Farrell was passed.

Then the fireworks started.

Young Thievenow whiffed one down to Tony Lazzeri, who flipped the ball to Koenig, forcing O'Farrell at second. The Yank shortstop then threw past Gehrig, trying for a double play, and Lester Bell romped home with the first run.

"Dutch" Reuther failed to bear down in pitching to Haines and the Card's pitcher lifted his homer into the right field stand.

This was almost more than St. Louis fans could bear, and the cheers that went up caused the waters of the Mississippi river to rise seven feet.

After some sentences of order had been restored, Douthitt lined to Koenig for the third out.

Two nice running catches by Hays and one by Southworth put the Yankees out in order.

The Cards drove "Dutch" Reuther from the box in the fifth, Southworth hit to Lazzeri, Southworth scoring.

Bob Shawky, wearing his famed red undershirt, went in to pitch for New York. Bell and Hays went out in quick succession.

After Combs had singled in the sixth the Cards put on a fast double play, Hornsby to Thievenow to Bottomley, Koenig's bounder.

Babe Ruth was passed.

Jim Bottomley went into the air for

GENERAL SURVEY OF THE CONDITIONS INDUSTRIALLY IN THE UNITED STATES BY THE INDUSTRIES NEWS SERVICE

Industrial Employment

Business conditions in employment in nearly all of the industrial states show improvement. According to official statements the volume of employment in the textile, lumber, steel and boot and shoe industry is steadily increasing, while the prospects are generally satisfactory for full employment, and the future is bright. Leading republican newspapers, no doubt disturbed by reports that the democrats in the senate and house are getting monkey wrenches ready to throw into the political machinery, are rushing to the defense of the administration policy regarding the federal system of taxation. Other newspapers of administration persuasion think the tariff is the principal safeguard for continuing industrial and financial activity. One of these newspapers goes so far as to say in an editorial that "prosperity in the United States could be halted within a month by an announcement that the tariff was to be revised."

Living on the Farm

Only about 28 per cent of the population of the United States live on farms or in farm areas. In 1899 about 50 per cent of the people of the United States were on farm or resided in agricultural communities. The conditions with regard to farm life have changed, just as everything else has changed in our social and economic affairs. There was a time when farmers were called "mashakes" by city dwellers, and the latter were usually referred to as "dudes" by farm dwellers. All this antagonism between city and country people has been wiped out since the automobile, telephone and good roads have brought them into closer contact. City dwellers and country folks have looked into each other's eyes and they have become friends. While farms and farm areas are apparently diminishing, production is either on the increase or remaining steady. Owing to the government system of tilling in advance the world needs of different crops, and furnishing daily weather and market reports, the agricultural interests of the country know pretty well how to stock their shelves with the produce of their soil. This regulates production and systematizes distribution. In a large measure machinery has taken the place of laborers on farms, and one optimistic editorial writer furnishes the information that "before long 1,000,000 farm hands may be dispensed with, and machinery made to produce the same quantity of food products." The miracle of industry has been performed in the work of the farms just as it has in the manufacture of most everything needed for the human family.

Radio Waves Melt Metal

Wise folks who wonder that the gas man will eventually lose his job because power will be secured for automobiles from radio, may not be crazy after all. Recent experiments at the United States bureau of standards were successful in using radio waves to melt platinum, gold and other precious metals. A specially devised furnace was used for the purpose, and radio waves of high frequency were utilized in heating the furnace in which the metal was melted.

American Toys

Up to within recent years Christmas toys came principally from Germany. More lately Czechoslovakia got into the game. Now the United States is claiming its right to supply the public, and the use of such materials as bakelite, cellophane, pyralin, gum rubber and rayon, have made it possible to make a better American toy than Europe ever thought of. In consequence American merchants may conclude to buy most of their toys in the domestic markets this year. One producer of American toys recently remarked that the only objection to United States toys is that they last many times longer than European articles. However, that is not a material objection that will be stressed by grown people and parents that buy toys for children. American toy manufacturers have gotten into the game and in consequence there will likely be a gradual lessening of imported toys and a corresponding increase in the goods made at home.

Public Utility Course

Northwestern University of Chicago, is to be congratulated upon its enterprise in providing afternoon and evening courses in public utilities. Regular courses emphasizing the economic, financial, legal and managerial principles underlying effective operations and management of the problems arising out of public regulation and control are included in the courses. A bulletin from the University says: "This curriculum was established in recognition of the ever-increasing importance of the functions performed

in modern industrial society by public utilities, the desirability of promoting and encouraging sound public relations, efficient management and progressive operation of utility properties." Public utilities are usually managed under the direction of the financial interests which sponsor them. Superintendents and all employees have long been selected from the school of experience and hard knocks. Such a thing as a public utility course in a University would have been scoffed at 25 years ago by the public utility interests, and by experts themselves, as well as by the public at large. Just as "book learning" forced its way into our farm life, and as schools of journalism have won out in that profession, so will the institutions that have provided courses in public utilities gain public approval.

Bring in An Industry Together

A very interesting experiment has recently been instituted in the Federal Trade Commission, and it is working out very satisfactorily. It is called "trade practice submittal." In a recent demonstration of the plan the furniture trade of the country was asked to state its own methods for regulating competitive practices. The representatives of the furniture industry thereupon agreed upon policies covering manufacture and sale of furniture. The agreement was submitted to members of the industry and 796 business institutions subscribed to the plan that had been suggested. It was rejected by 57 concerns. Thereupon rules were made by the Federal Trade Commission in accordance with the agreements that had been accepted. These rules will be enforced as far as possible by the Trade Commission. One of the principal features of the agreement is that furniture in which the exposed surfaces are of one wood shall be designated by the name of that wood. This affects the old war that has been going on for years between mahogany manufacturers and dealers in mahogany and "veneered mahogany."

SCHOOL LEAGUE PLEASED

Scholastic Gridgers Filling in Their Eligibility Blanks Correctly

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 6.—Inter-scholastic League officials are particularly pleased with the accuracy with which eligibility blanks for football games are being filled out this year, stated Roy B. Henderson, director of the University of Texas League athletics. In only a few instances has it been necessary to return blanks because of errors or because of failure to give complete information, Henderson said.

WANTS STEPHENSON, K. K. K. LEADER, TO TALK SOME INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 5—A demand that D. C. Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Indiana Ku Klux Klan be permitted to break the silence imposed on him since he entered the state prison a year ago and tell what he knows of Indiana politics has been made by Thomas H. Adams in a telegram to Governor Ed. Jackson, who is on a speaking tour in the East.

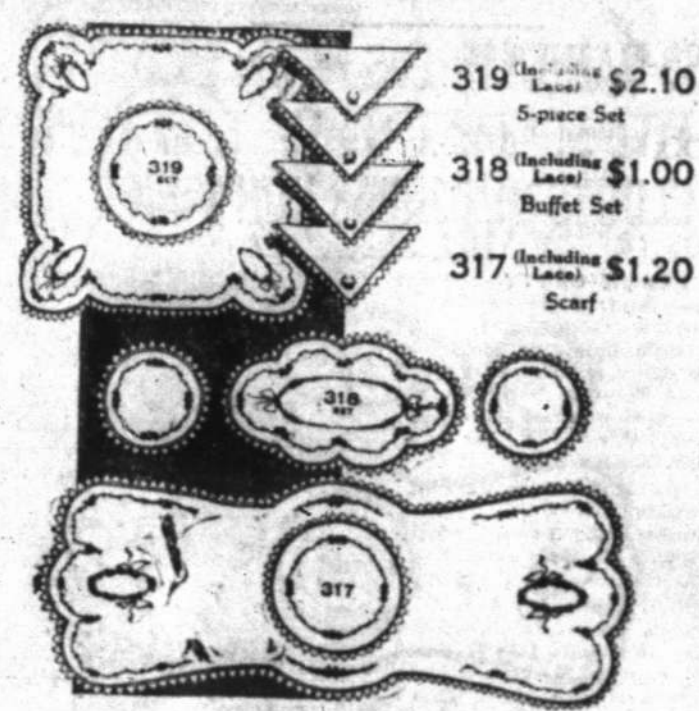

LOCAL LEGION IS AGAINST BOXING

GO CONTRARY TO STATE CONVENTION ACTION AT AMARILLO RECENTLY

The local Post of the American Legion, in a resolution adopted at the regular bi-monthly meeting here Monday night, voiced disapproval of legalized boxing in Texas, and rapped the action of the state convention at Amarillo recently when approval was given such a proposed measure for the legislature almost two to one.

The action followed bitter denunciation of the proposed legislative act by three Legionnaires, all of whom expressed the opinion that fostering of such a move not only is out of the province of the organization, but that such a measure is practically impossible so far as passage in the legislature is concerned. Darius H. Bradley in his remarks said that in event such a bill is offered for approval of the state law makers, it certainly should be surrounded with reservations to protect the public against what was termed "ham and egg" fighters.

After discussion of the matter by Dr. V. V. Clark, Mr. Bradley, Homer L. Pharr, in a stinging denunciation of action of the state convention, offered a motion to the effect that the local Post go on record as unalterably opposed to such a move, and condemning the action of the state body, where it was charged the measure was practically "railroaded" through. The motion was vigorously seconded, and unanimously adopted and a committee named by Commander Woods to draw up a resolution to be submitted to the Governor-elect, and the Senator and Representative from this district.

Other business included unanimous adoption of a motion that research work in chemical warfare should be continued as a preparatory move, an announcement that the next meeting will be a joint session of the Legion and Auxiliary. The meeting will be held in the basement of the Leader building Monday night, October 18.

BANK CASHIER ARRESTED

Charge Embezzlement in Pueblo Bank to Man Held in Chicago \$5,500 is Missing

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—Charles G. George Senior, former assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Pueblo, Colo., was arrested here today on an embezzlement warrant.

Local authorities said Senior disappeared from Pueblo four years ago and a subsequent investigation of his books showed defalcations amounting to \$5,500.

WOULD SUBSTITUTE COTTON FOR JUTE

INTERSTATE CONFERENCE MAY MEET AND DISCUSS PLANS OF THIS NATURE

STAMFORD, Texas, Oct. 5.—Manager Homer D. Wade of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, in an effort to help solve the cotton problem of the southern farmers, is formulating tentative plans this week for the calling of an interstate conference, the purpose of which will be to discuss the possibilities of using cotton baling in shipping commodities of the South rather than jute or low-sacking.

This action is being taken following the receipt of two letters at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce headquarters office suggesting the increase Use of Cotton Products Campaign, and calling upon that great organization to help put the movement over. Following an open letter in the press in which the cotton bag remedy was suggested by C. W. Linticum, secretary-treasurer of the Arkansas Wholesale Grocers' Association, 21 S. Shoaf of the Wellington Chamber of Commerce submitted motion to further the proposition and referred the matter to President Arthur P. Duggan and Manager Homer D. Wade of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Tentative plans are now being made and definite action will soon be taken.

The Arkansas Wholesale Grocers' Association at a meeting last week passed a resolution to ship all commodities to their ware houses in cotton bags whenever possible. This action was announced in the press letter, and similarly a proposal was made for calling a conference of 10,000, or more representatives from all cotton country sections of the South to go over the matter of using cotton bags for shipping purposes. The Association suggested that after the movement had been set underway in the South it will be carried into the Northern states.

Shoaf of the Wellington Chamber of Commerce, in helping the association at their own request for aid, suggested in addition to the above mentioned ways, that the matter be taken up with the East Texas Chamber of Commerce and with every chamber of commerce organization located in cities of 6000 or more in Arkansas, and with all chambers of commerce in the chief towns in Texas, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia. 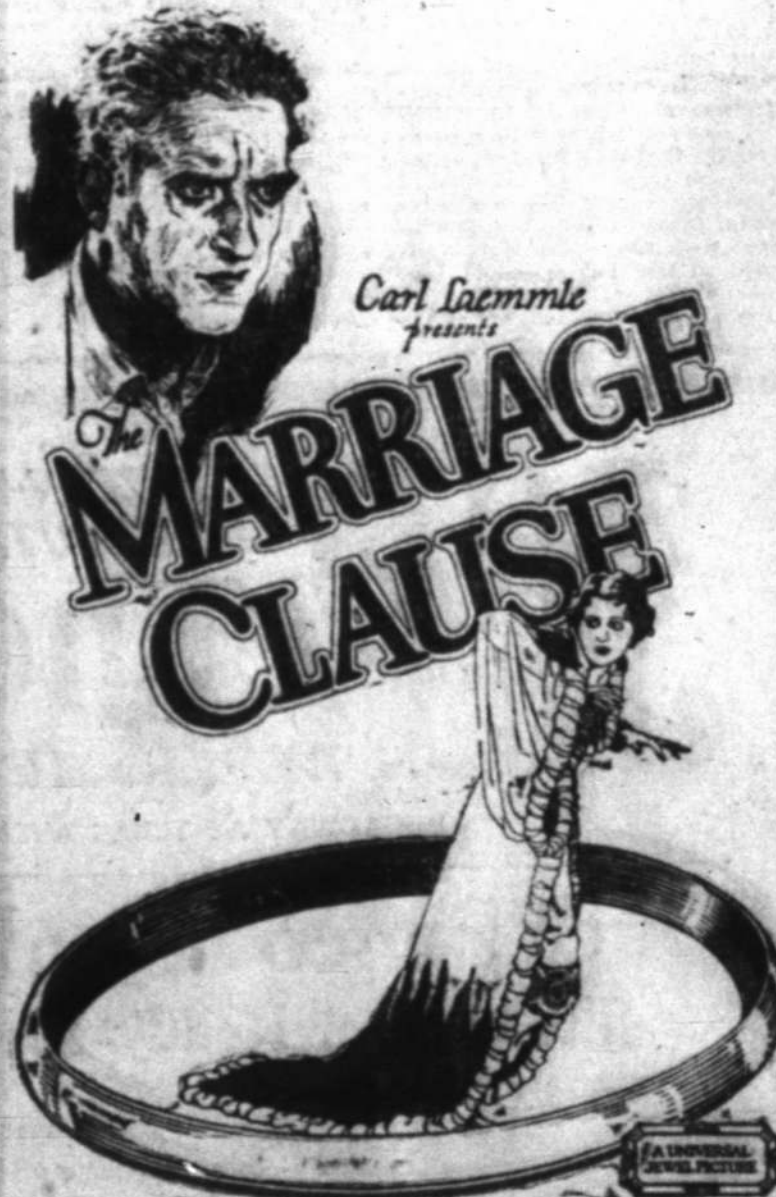

PAVED ROAD HERE- FORD TO AMARILLO

HEREFORD CHAMBER COMMERCE
FAVORS THE PROPOSITION;
MAY GO OVER

HEREFORD, Tex., Oct. 5.—Directors of the Hereford Chamber of Commerce went on record here Monday as favoring a paved highway from Hereford to Amarillo. The proposition is that a road would mean the paving of the South-west Trail from Amarillo through Randall and Deaf Smith counties to Hereford. This would give paved roads most of the way from here to Tulsa, Oklahoma, and would bring thousands of tourists through Deaf Smith county annually. It would also mean a ready market in Amarillo for fruits, vegetables, eggs, sweet milk and other products produced in the famous Hereford shallow water belt. The Highway Committee with E. W. Harrison as chairman was instructed to start work immediately on this project. Every effort will be made to secure the cooperation with Randall county on this proposition.

Seth B. Holman local editor, made a plea at the luncheon Monday for some sort of a Trades Day for Hereford. He said that this was the first year in the past nine that something of the sort has not been carried on. The committee in charge was instructed to submit a plan at the luncheon next Monday.

G. A. F. Parker spoke of the excellent showing which the Vocational Agriculture students of the Hereford High School made with their products at the Tri State Fair at Amarillo, recently. Upon his motion the local organization extended instructor C. W. Humble and the boy who won prizes as guests of the local Chamber of Commerce next Monday at luncheon.

F. B. Black said that Hereford now has a chance to secure free mail delivery, and that a committee was at work right now on this proposition. He said that requirements for the free mail delivery would be met in due time. Mr. Black also said that a survey of Hereford would be made immediately, and the data turned over to D. L. McDonald, who is trying to secure gas from the Amarillo Gas Field for Hereford.

LYNN FAIR POSTPONED

Need of Farmers in Field Causes
Exposition to Be Put Off

TAHOCA, Oct. 5.—The Lynn County Fair has been officially called off until a later date, due to the need of the farmers in the fields.

Had fair weather prevailed, the fair would have gone on in grand style but since the recent rains and cold weather, the fair officials have decided to call it off for an indefinite time.

In so doing there will be quite a lot of cotton ginned and the communities that were to participate in the events will have that much time to devote to their cotton, that needs picking very badly.

There is still a great shortage of pickers here, although a lot have been shipped here, the past few days from the south and eastern part of the state.

CORRESPONDENCE COURSE POPULAR AT CANYON SCHOOL

CANYON, TEXAS, Oct. 5.—Applications for correspondence courses are being received every day at the West Texas State Teachers' College. The correspondence division at the college has grown larger each year since the work was first offered in 1923 and promises to be much heavier than ever before this year.

During the school year 1925-26, thirty-two men and ninety-five women were enrolled; in 1924-25, thirty-nine men and one hundred sixty-seven women; in 1923-24, thirty-five men and hundred eighty-five women. The greater part of these correspondence students were teachers in the field, but quite a few are housekeepers, clerks, or workers in other fields of business.

A greater variety of correspondence courses are being offered this year by the Teachers' College to meet the increasing demands; most of the new courses are advanced work. A few courses in high school work are offered but the greater part are college courses.

WAR BEING ORGANIZED AT A. AND M. AGAINST COTTON ROOT ROT, WHICH DID MUCH DAMAGE OVER THE STATE

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Oct. 5.—Growing concern on the part of Texas business men and farmers over ravages of cotton root rot, so prevalent in some of the cotton growing sections of the state this year, is reflected in requests being received by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, A. and M. College of Texas, for information regarding ways and means for dealing with this plant disease.

One of the most recent requests of this nature was presented by Col. Clarence Ousley, director of the Texas Safe Farming Association, who came to College Station to confer with specialists of the Experiment Station on the problem. Due to the heavy losses already sustained by Texas farmers as the result of the root rot, the Texas Safe Farming Association has enlisted its efforts in a fight against this parasitic destroyer of the cotton plant, Col. Ousley said. He assured the specialists at the college that the association expects to continue its work in that field. Various angles of the situation were discussed at the College Station conference, and A. B. Conner, acting director of the Experiment Station in the absence of Dr. B. Youngblood, director, informed Col. Ousley that discoveries at the Experiment Station relative to remedial measures in dealing with the cotton pest would be made available to him for use in recommendations regarding farming practices.

Another meeting with specialists at the A. and M. College has been requested by a large group of Bell county citizens interested in combating root rot. This meeting, originally scheduled for October 1 at the college, has been postponed until October 7.

It is estimated that Dr. J. J. Taub-

enhouse, plant pathologist and physiologist of the Experiment Station who has been conducting research studies into the nature and general aspects of the root rot evil, that 16 per cent of the entire cotton crop of Texas this year has been killed by this plant disease. The extent of such loss is fully appreciated when it is known that on June 25 of this year, Texas had a total of 18,948,000 acres in cotton.

Investigation of the root rot problem has shown that the black land area of the state is the most seriously affected. According to Dr. Taub-

enhouse, root rot is caused by a parasitic growth that coils itself about the roots of the plant and saps its life. This fungus growth does not limit itself to cotton plants but attacks weeds as well. Research conducted has disclosed so far that more than 500 different weeds, not including grasses, have been found to be carriers of the

disease.

It has also been disclosed that this parasitic growth appears to be more prevalent in soils where limestone is found. Reactions brought about in such soils appears to be favorable to the development of this growth.

Since the black land soil has pronounced limestone content, the development of the disease is most pronounced in that section of the state, being more acute there than in any other section. The situation is not so acute in West Texas and Northwest Texas, Acting Director Conner pointed out. Forty-three per cent of the cotton yield of the state is produced in the black land country, however, and this renders the problem in that area one of grave portent. The total value of the Texas cotton yield is placed in round figures at \$600,000,000 to \$700,000,000 annually. Probably \$250,000,000 of this is represented by the black land yield.

As pointed out by Dr. Taubenhause, root rot is by no means a new problem. It has existed and knowledge of its ravages have been known for years. Research into its causes and characteristics has been carried on by the Experiment Station. The extent of the disease appears to vary with the years. This year's ravages are the most pronounced experienced in some

time. As pointed out by the A. and M. specialists, the extent of the disease may become only moderate in the following year.

The recent meeting at the A. and M. College for conference on the root rot problem was requested by Col. Ousley through C. H. Alvord, director of the Extension Service. Those who attended included: President T. O. Walton of the College; C. H. Alvord, director and R. R. Lancaster and John Egan, Extension Service; A. B. Conner, acting director, and Dr. G. S. Fraps, chemist, Dr. J. J. Taubenhause, plant physiologist, R. B. Reynolds, agronomist, W. B. Japtham, horticulturist, Experiment Station; Dr. J. O. Morgan and J. S. Mogford of the School of Agriculture of the College, and Colonel Ousley.

Wallasey is the best marriage market in England, and one of the best summer resorts. 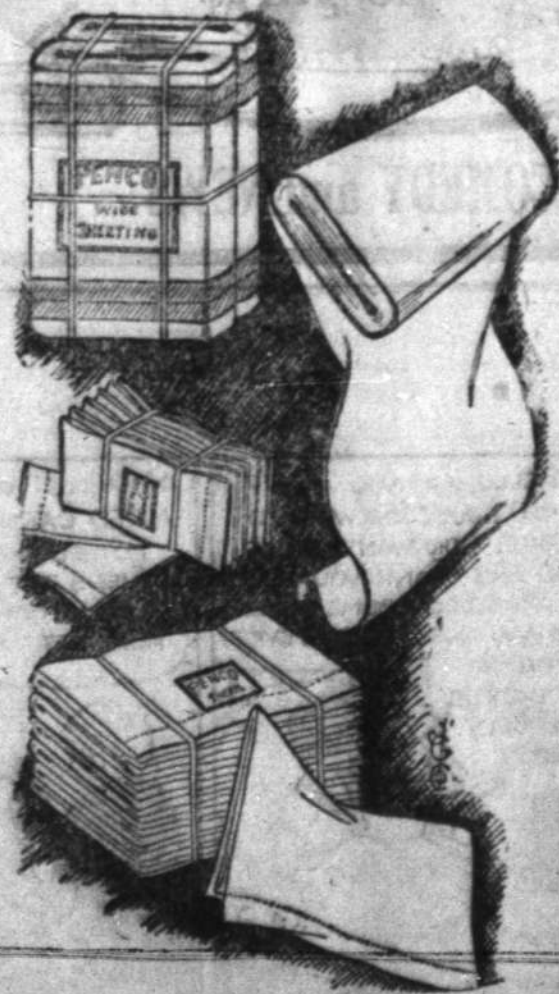

DAILY MARKET

New York Finance

By HUGH FARRELL

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Executing stop-loss orders today, brokers unloaded an avalanche of all kinds of stocks and the market was forced steadily lower during most of the morning.

At noon there was a rally and prices were firm until the attack upon Steel common which was the feature of Monday's trading was resumed in the last hour.

Under the screen of this selling and pressure against a few of the conspicuous rails, the covering movement in General Motors was carried further and as a result that stock again closed with a relatively small loss.

At the close there was evidence that the selling movement had petered out. Money which had been chief concern of the market for the last week or so was definitely easier today. Funds were in ample supply and after renewing at five percent the rate was reduced to 4 1/2 percent.

In some respects the reaction in the market during the last few days has been beneficial. Aside from the improvement in the technical position, the break in prices has removed any necessity for disciplinary action that might have been assumed to be necessary. In other words, the discount rate has sary on the part of the authorities ceased to be a factor, at least until the market again shows signs of eagerness to discount the favorable trade and business situation.

The effort to inject the break in cotton into the situation as an important disturbing factor was not very successful.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 5.—After trading somewhat higher in early session, due to better cables than expected, the market declined, but not quite as low as yesterday's lowest price levels for so far this season.

There were two additional private crop estimates released today, one placing the probable yield at 15,933,000 bales, the other at 16,635,000 bales. In the afternoon the market recovered in the face of the large private crop forecasts probably indicating market to be overvalued and rather accustomed to bumper crop ideas.

A sustaining feature of the day was advice from the interior to effect that there was more disposition on the part of the farmers to refrain from selling at present distressingly low prices, many growers hauling their cotton back home and storing it rather than selling at present prices. The fact that the weather outlook for the western half of the belt was more favorable, with prospects of clearing in the eastern half of the belt in the immediate future, was without effect on values, shows that the market is probably grounding and likely low enough, unless next Friday's government crop forecast confirms the larger of the private crop estimates.

If the holding movement becomes more in evidence and spreads through the interior, as it should, the market is likely to rule steeper, but if offerings continue free, it may be difficult to sustain the present levels of values.

Today, Paris, France, cabled "cotton is below the cost of production" indicating even Europe realizes that cotton is cheap, below its intrinsic value, since the product is selling at a price far below the cost of its making.

Not since 1921 have spinners of the world had the opportunity to obtain raw cotton in quantities at a price far below its production cost and relatively much cheaper than the value of cotton goods, and they are not likely to be slow in taking advantage of the present situation to obtain their full quotation for this season, and, perhaps, for a part of next year.

Compared with last season, exports from the United States since Friday total 255,000 bales against 91,000, making the total since August 1, 1,293,000 bales against 1,297,000 bales.
