300 ATTEND DESIGNATION

Approximately 300 persons attended the Haskell (City-County) Bicentennial Designation held inside the Haskell National Bank Community Room Saturday due to the rains. About 300 persons were on hand for the ceremonies.

Master of Ceremonies, Royce Adkins welcomed the guests to the designation. Presentation of Colors were presented by Boy Scout Troop #136, and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Haskell Girl Scouts. Band Director Wendell Gideon led the group in singing, "The Star Spangled Banner".

Special guests were introduced including Rep. W. S. (Bill) Heatly, Mayors and City Councilmen from Weinert, Rochester and Haskell, County Commissioners, also guests from Abilene and Anson.

Joe Hodges, Abilene member of the Texas Bicentennial Commission and representative of the American Revolution Bicentennial Association presented Bicentennial certificates to the Mayor of Haskell, Mr. Belton Duncan, and County Judge B. O. Roberson. Also he presented the two with the Official Bicentennial Flag.

Congressman Omar Burleson was introduced by Adkins. Burleson recounted part of the colonists' struggle for freedom 200 years ago.

"Personal freedom is our most cherished freedom", Burleson said. He said there is a difference between revolutionaries who seek to disrupt society and revolutionaries who seek a free society.

The Congressman stated by ending his talk, "While flying down here from Washington, I thought of these lines which seem to me to fit well in our exercises commemorating the beginning of the Bicentennial, and maybe you will think so."

"Listen all people and you shall hear how the United States came to be here. Tune your minds and listen well, so that our children may live to tell.

Our forebears crossed the ocean, and braved the seas to reach this land of liberty. Cherish your freedoms, and guard them well so that our children may live to tell.

They fled oppression and tyranny to find a home for you and me. Cherish your freedoms, and guard them well, so that our children may live to tell.

They came here to worship as they would and protect our beliefs for the common good. Let's cherish our faith, and guard it well so that our children may live to tell.

They left behind hunger, want and poverty; they found fruitful land of opportunity. Conserve our resources and use them well so that our children may live to tell.

They rejected a king upon a throne and established a government of their own. Let's respect its laws and obey them well so that our children may live to tell.

They pushed the frontier from east to west across mountains and forests from crest to crest. Keep moving forward—all obstacles repel-

so that our children may live to tell.

United for strength, a mixture of all, divided in contention we are apt to fall. Make bonds of unity and weld them well so that our children may live to tell.

We stand free—a light to all—stand up straight and do not fall. Those who govern do it well, so that our children may live to tell."

The group then sang "Battle Hymn of the Republic", and the closing prayer was given by Rev. Otis Jackson.

A reception honoring Congressman Burleson and other guests was held. The Young Homemakers served at the reception.

Cattlemen's Round-Up For WTRC Sept. 29

As the September 29 Cattle Sale approaches, trailers are beginning to crisscross the Southwest picking up cattle donated to the 16th Annual Cattlemen's Round-up for Crippled Children. Since 1960, the annual fall Round-Up has been a major source of income for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene, a private, non-profit treatment and diagnostic complex serving the handicapped of the

Southwest. Since the Center first opened its doors in 1953, it has extended a helping hand to almost 24,000 handicapped children and adults without regard to race, creed, color or ability to pay. Last year alone, almost 4,000 individuals were served by the Center, one of the largest and finest of its kind in the nation. From its inception the Center has been largely dependent upon the

generous contributions of friends from throughout the Southwest for its operation.

The Annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children has traditionally helped to fund the Center for the last quarter of the year.

Round-Up Chairman Charlie Morris of Abilene stated, "if folks could see what is being done for handicapped youngsters and adults at the Center, I know that they would want to be a part of it." Morris added, "in spite of the fact that last year was awfully rough on the cowman, he helped us raise almost \$150,000." We're hoping that a lot of folks who have not been a part of the Round-up in the past will give us a helping hand this year", Morris continued.

Bicycling Can Be A Gasser

AUSTIN—The surging popularity of bicycling as inexpensive transportation and physical fitness recreation poses well known hazards in a roadway shared with heavy auto traffic. But the Texas Safety Association warns that the hazards go beyond being hit by a motor vehicle. A new area of concern is exhaust fumes!

Cyclists frequently ride too close behind the exhaust pipes of cars and trucks, and because the strenuous physical effort causes them to breathe deeper and faster than normal, they may inhale excessive amounts of carbon monoxide.

Texas Safety Association offers this advice for healthier cycling:

—Avoid congested streets. The greater the traffic, the greater the CO concentration.

—When stopped at traffic lights, either move ahead of the exhaust pipe of the first car or stay well behind the last car in line.

—Don't tailgate a motor vehicle. Even if he wears a gas mask, a cyclist is easily concealed within the driver's blind spot—and that brings us back to the original traffic danger to cyclists.

Texas Safety Association asks that bicycling enthusiasts give themselves some "breathing room" when cycling in traffic—and help keep bicycling a healthier as well as safer activity.

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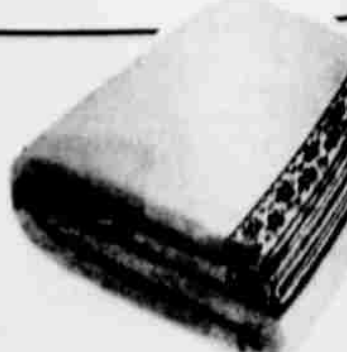

Vocational Training At Weinert

Texas State Technical Institute, in cooperation with Weinert Public School District, is preparing to offer vocational courses for educationally disadvantaged adults.

Vocational courses being offered include auto body, used car reconditioning, automotive brakes, automotive front end and tire balancing, automotive maintenance and repair of the automobile engine and electrical systems, automotive tune-up, arc and oxyacetylene welding, and

refrigeration fundamentals. Others include bookkeeping, filing, office machines, office practice, typing I and II, electronics, television, nurse's aide, brick and rock tending, and building trades (pre-apprenticeship).

The courses, mostly basic in nature are open to any person 18 years of age or older who qualifies as an educationally disadvantaged individual.

There will be no fees or other charges for the courses. For more information, interested parties should contact Mr. H. L. Guess at Weinert High School.

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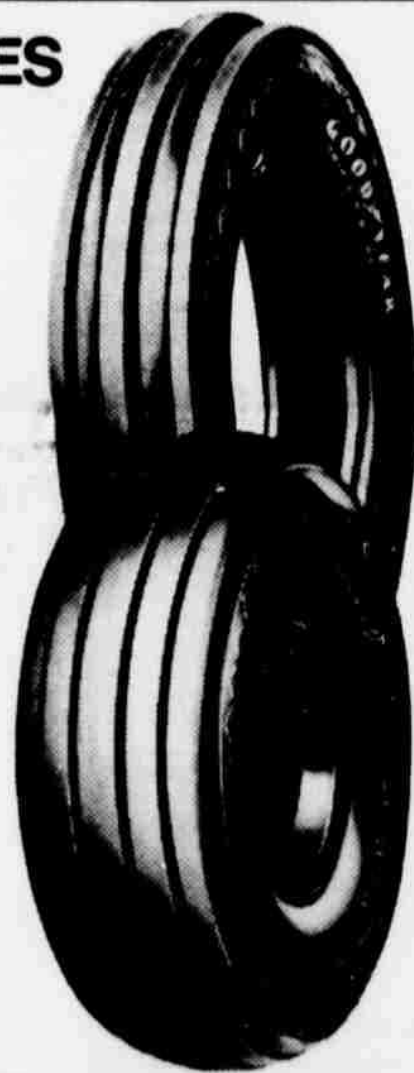

This was 54 more accidents, 14 less killed, and 22 less injured in 1975 at the same period of time. The 16 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1975, occurred in the following counties: three in Castro; two each in Potter, Wheeler, Hale, and Palo Pinto; and one each in Archer, Parker, Yoakum, Hardeman, and Wilbarger.

4-H's Star In Home Management Roles



The spotlight this year is on 114,000 girls and boys 9-19 in the national 4-H home management program sponsored by Tupperware Home Parties. Under the supervision of the Cooperative Extension Service, 4-H's learn by doing to set realistic goals, put their plans into action and evaluate the results—all steps to starring roles in the management scenario.

CHICAGO—"Americans tend to think of money as their only valuable resource," says Carolyn Gaddis, family resource management specialist with the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service.

"However," she says, "It's important to look closely at another resource that we seem to have less and less of as we become busier and busier. That resource is time."

Use resources to advantage

Time, money, energy, skills, material things, brain power: all are valuable resources. Learning to mobilize them to reach specific personal and household goals are 114,000 girls and boys from 9 to 19 in the national 4-H home management program.

4-H's will be aided this year by "Spotlight on Management," a new 32-page member manual in "lights, camera, action" format. The manual was developed jointly by the Cooperative Extension Service, the National 4-H Service Committee, and Tupperware Home Parties. It focuses on the four steps to effective management: setting a goal, planning how to reach

it, acting to put the plan in motion, and checking up on the results.

Learning by doing 4-H members learn that decision making is what management is all about. They might tackle family food bills and come up with cost-cutting techniques. Or organize personal work schedules that set realistic goals and conserve time and energy.

Whatever projects they choose, 4-H's can earn awards donated by Tupperware Home Parties and arranged by the National 4-H Service Committee. Eight outstanding 4-H's are awarded national college scholarships of \$1,000. One top program member from each state receives an expense-paid trip to the 54th National 4-H Congress, Nov. 30-Dec. 4 in Chicago. And four members per county are eligible for medals of honor.

All winners are selected on the basis of their records of accomplishment by the Extension Service, which conducts the 4-H program. Additional information is available from county extension agents.

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Now Eligible For Social Security

A widower with one or more children in his care may be eligible for Social Security survivors benefits under a recent decision of the U.S. Supreme Court.

Widowers can get information about applying for the benefits by calling or writing any social security office, according to Glyn Hammons, Social Security District Manager in Abilene.

Under the court decision, a widower taking care of his wife's children can get monthly survivors benefits on her records if she worked long enough in jobs covered by social security. Previously, a widow with children in her care could get survivors benefits, but a widower could not unless he proved he was dependent on his wife and was either 60 or over or 50 to 60 and disabled.

A widower's survivors benefits can be affected by his earnings, and only about 15,000 widowers are expected

to get payments under the court decision, according to Hammons.

Children continue to get Social Security survivors benefits on either their mother's or father's record.

Generally a widower who doesn't remarry can get survivors benefits until the children in his care are 18. If there are sons or daughters 18 or over who were severely disabled before 22, he can get benefits as long as they're disabled and cannot work.

"The amount of widower's monthly survivors benefit is based on his wife's average earnings over a period of years, and it may also be affected by his earnings," Hammons said. "He can earn \$2,520 or less for this year and still get his full social security benefit. Over \$2,520, his benefit will be reduced by \$1 for each \$2 earned—but no matter how much he earns for the year, he can get his full social security benefit for any month he neither earns \$210 nor does substantial work in his own business."

The children in a widower's care can get social security checks until they're 18, or 22 if

STORM DAMAGE TO TERRACE SYSTEMS

Summer storm damage in Haskell Field Office work area (Haskell County) appears to be rather intensive even though scattered about the entire area.

The Haskell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee is considering requesting additional funds to assist in repairing this damage. If you consider that you had significant damage to warrant rebuilding your system of terraces, make this fact known to your county committee. Each case will need to be examined in the field by an SCS Technician.

The extent of damage within the county will be helpful in determining the need for formally requesting assistance from the State Committee.

TERRACE MAINTENANCE

In my travels about the work area, I have noticed that many producers are chiseling or disking across terraces. Unless you plan to come back and plow the terraces on the contour, you are in violation of regulations governing cost-share assistance furnished you in the construction of your terraces.

The ASCS County Committee and the GPCP Contracting Officer can file charges against any producer who wilfully destroys a cost-shared conservation measure. And plowing across terraces is considered an act of destroying the terrace. The results—loss of cost-shares originally paid to you for the installation of the system, regardless of the age of the system.

Normal terraces maintenance is the annual responsibility of the producer, and is

the best insurance for continued service in erosion control. Every effort should be made each year to fill breaks and plow the terraces up. This type of maintenance assures longer life of the structure. And if done annually, the expense is only slight in comparison to a major rebuild.

There is no cost-share assistance available for maintenance or rebuilding terraces. This cost-share program was eliminated several years ago. It is not likely that it will ever be re-instituted in our county program.

Make every effort to maintain, in a good working condition, your present systems of terraces. Cost-share funds for replacing with parallel terraces are very limited. There is no assurance that we will have funds in the future for this type of construction work.

DAIRYING KEYED TO FEED PRICES

Dairying in the U.S. and Texas through the remainder of the year and well into 1976 will depend heavily on the price of feed-grains, contends a marketing economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Lower feed prices will boost feeding of the dairy herd which, in turn, will increase milk output. Dairy cow numbers are expected to remain stable as culling and slaughter will continue at a low level due to poor market prices. U.S. milk production should be up about 600 million pounds this year compared to 1974; yet gross cash receipts are expected to be up only 2 per cent from the \$9.4 billion of last year. Retail prices of dairy products should increase moderately through the remainder of 1975.

Check Your Bermudagrass

During late August or early September fall armyworms often damage bermudagrass lawns in Haskell County. The damage appears as light brown patches in the lawn where fall armyworms have skeletonized the leaves. Unless the fall armyworms are controlled when the damage is first noticed, the grass in a large portion of the lawn may be stripped of its foliage leaving the grass stems.

Fall armyworms feed mostly at night remaining concealed in the grass during the day. After stripping most of the grass of its foliage the fall armyworms will migrate to other lawns.

The female fall armyworm moth lays eggs in masses of 50 to several hundred on the leaves of grasses. These eggs hatch in 2 to 4 days. The newly hatched larvae are white with black heads. As the larvae develop they become darker and when full grown they will range from light green to almost black with several light stripes along the body. Full grown larvae are about 1½ inches long. The front of the head is marked with a white inverted "Y".

Carbaryl (Sevin) when applied according to label directions will give effective control of fall armyworms. Homeowners should read and carefully follow the directions on the label when applying any pesticides.

Watch For Ear Ticks In Cattle

VERNON, Sept. 11 (Special)—Rolling Plains cattle producers pay heavily every year for the injury their livestock suffer from the spinose ear tick.

"This mean pest, however, can be controlled," says Emory P. Boring, Area Entomologist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Boring urges producers to search out at least twice a year the infestations of such ticks deep within the ears of their cattle—and of their sheep and goats as well as swine.

Five materials are approved and available, any one of which controls spinose ear ticks effectively: Coumaphos (Co Ral), lindane, malathion, toxaphene, and Ronnel (Korlan). The treatment is applied into the ears.

Infested cattle rub their ears and shake their heads because of the extreme irritation caused by the ticks. Heavily infested animals become dull, unthrifty and may even lose weight.

Boring says that in the winter when cattle may already be stressed by the lack of grazing and poor nutrition, heavy infestations of ticks in the ears are extra burdensome.

When they use malathion or any of the other recommended materials, Boring says, livestock producers should heed all cautions and restrictions printed on the label.

County Extension agents throughout the Rolling Plains have more information about ear ticks, and also a publication for producers: "Suggestions for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry."

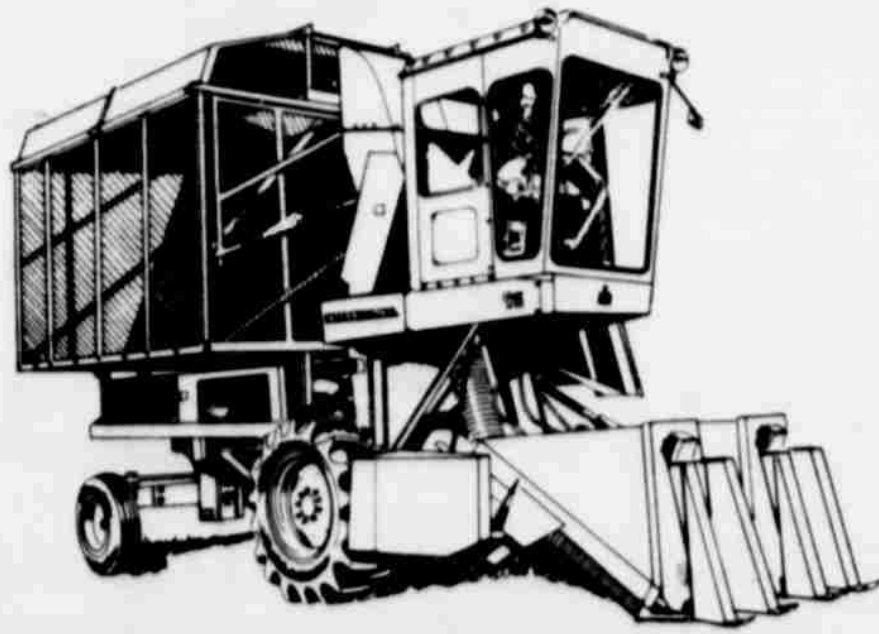

BANKING IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS



Package Accounts—Do You Really Save?

Chances are that at least one bank in your market area is now advertising a "package" of consumer services. Whether it's called a "Red Carpet Account," "Favorite Person Account," "Super Key Club" or "Valupak," the concept is the same—increased value and convenience for a fixed monthly fee.

Although package accounts began just two years ago when Wells Fargo introduced its "Gold Account" in California, a recent American Bankers Association (ABA) survey indicates that about 20 per cent of the 14,000 banks in the country are now offering them. Why? Customer response. Wells Fargo opened 100,000 "Gold Accounts" in the first year, and many other banks are reporting similar interest.

The make up varies not only from bank to bank, but also from one region of the country to another, since customer preferences are taken into consideration and often surveyed directly. Typical packages include: no-service-charge checking, unlimited personalized checks, check-cashing cards guaranteed to some dollar limit for bank branches and/or merchants, a safe deposit box of a certain size (or credit towards a larger one), unlimited travelers checks, overdraft checking, cashier's checks and money orders and reduced rates on some loans.

Other features might include financial counseling, money

market investment services, a bank charge card, automatic transfer of funds from checking account to savings, automatic payment of instalment loans, club privileges, life insurance, notary service and even special seminars explaining social security and medicare benefits.

But do you really save money? That depends both on the package and your banking needs. Monthly fees range from \$1 to \$4, but most banks are charging \$3—and a few have attracted so many new accounts they've been able to drop the fee altogether! If you use a broad range of banking services, you should check into the package idea; if you're more interested in flexibility in exercising your options, it's probably not to your advantage.

Some banks offering package accounts include a form for figuring out potential savings on the application, but all you really need is a record of your banking expenses for one year and a sheet of paper. Be sure to include: service charge for checking account, lost interest if there is a minimum balance, fee for personalized checks, cost of safe deposit box, fee for travelers' checks, savings from loan discount, over-draft checking charge and any other applicable fees.

When you've added them up and subtracted the annual charge for the package, take another minute to figure in the intangibles—such as convenience and a pre-arranged line of credit. How much they're worth of course is up to you.

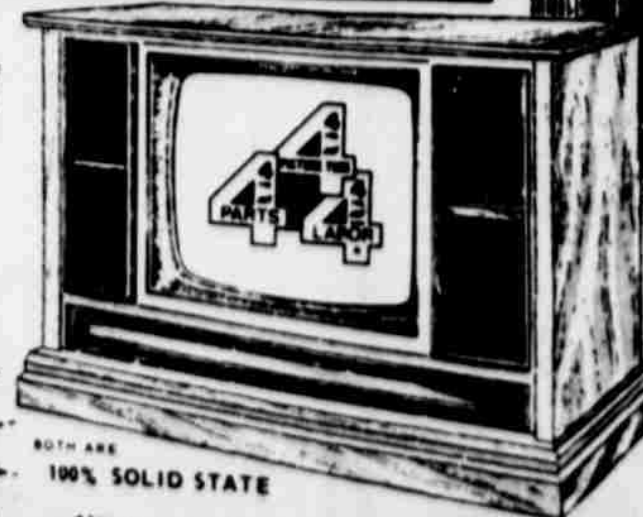

Get Your New Bicentennial Coins Now

Director of the Mint Mary Brooks announced today a new and innovative marketing program developed expressly for the purpose of providing the greatest number of Americans an opportunity to participate in our nation's Bicentennial Celebration through coins.

The Bank Bulk Rate Program has been designed to comply with Public Law 93-127 in which Congress authorized a new coinage design emblematic of the American Revolution for the dollar, half dollar and quarter and the minting of 45 million of these coins of 40% silver.

The colonial drummer boy, Independence Hall and the Library Bell and Moon are the three designs chosen in a national competition to appear on the backs of the Washington quarter, Kennedy half dollar and Eisenhower dollar respectively. The double date of 1776-1976 is on the front of the coins. A Bicentennial set of these three 40% silver uncirculated coins retail for \$9.00. The 40% silver coins in these Bicentennial uncirculated sets are distinguished from regular circulating coins which are 92% copper and 8% nickel.

MANAGING YOUR FAMILY'S FINANCES

By Dr. Carl F. Hawver

Q. I've got a good job but I can't seem to get ahead financially. In fact, in recent months I can't even pay all my bills. I don't know where the money goes! How can you manage money if you don't have any left over to manage? It's all spent before I get it.

A. If you really don't know where your money is going it's time you found out. Put all of your income in your checking account and pay all your bills by check. For cash needs like lunches, car fare, etc., have each member of the family write down expected needs for the next week and write one check on the same day each week for your total cash needs. At the end of a month you'll have a reliable record of where your money is going. At the end of three months you'll have a pretty good average as a guideline.

Then make a list of everything you spend money for each month and how much. Next mark the list, #1 for most important to you, #2 for next most, and on down to the least important. Then consider giving up some of those on the bottom of your list. Cut till you get the monthly figure well under your monthly income. If you have too many monthly payments for credit purchases, consider consolidation to lower the monthly payments—and stop using credit till it's paid off. There is just so much money—YOU decide what you want it to buy for you. Don't leave it to chance.

Dr. Carl F. Hawver, Executive Vice President of the National Consumer Finance Association, is a widely recognized counseling expert in family money and credit management.

Watch for food sales—but beware of items that are simply "featured" in a store but aren't really special sale items. Just because a row of items has been labeled with a big red price sticker doesn't necessarily mean the item is a sale bargain. 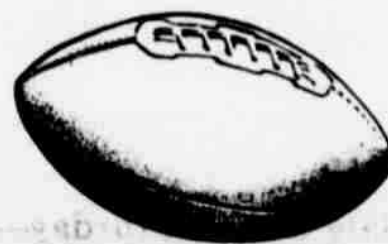

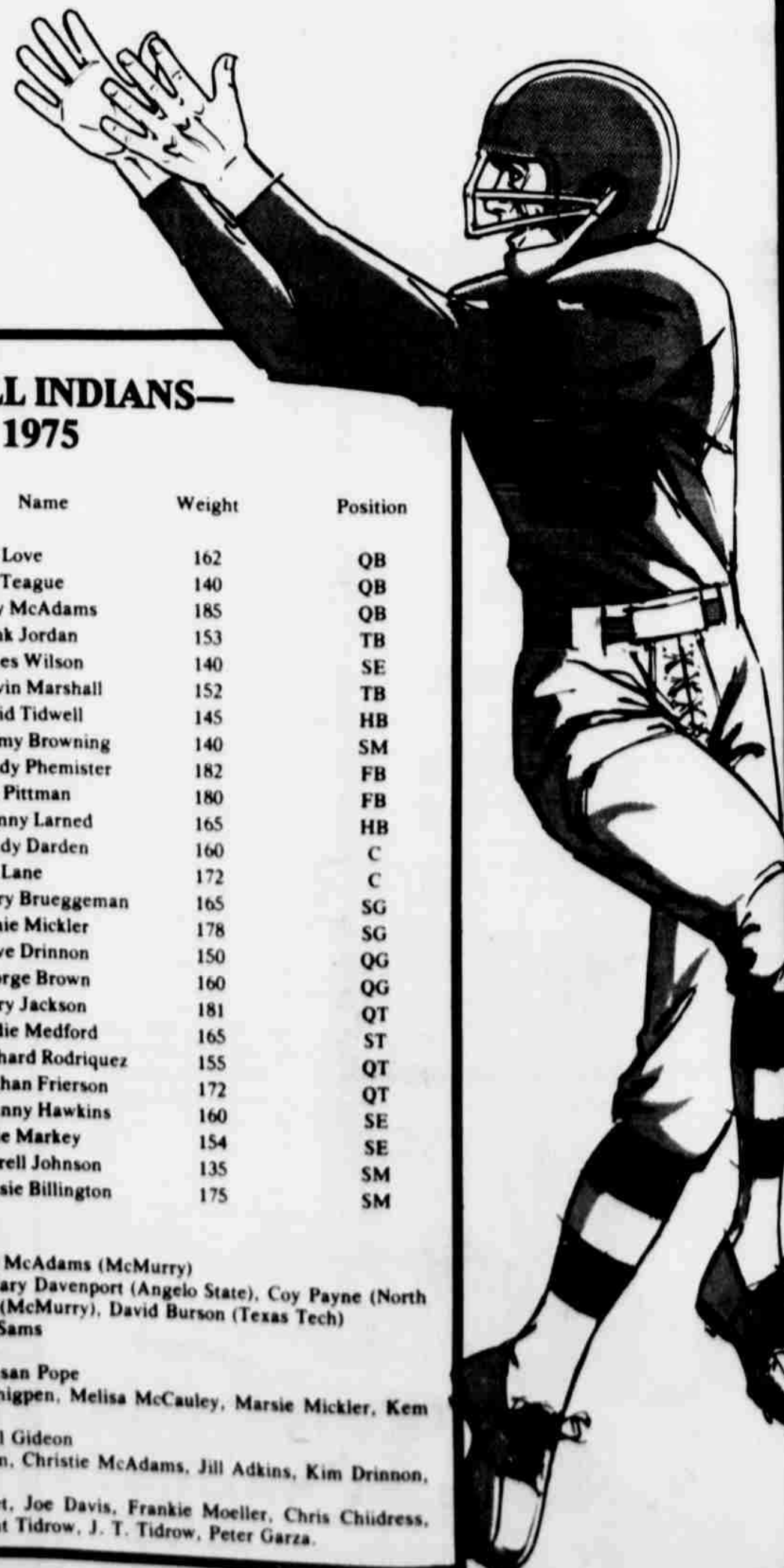

Tax Relief For New Home Owners

COLLEGE STATION—Consumers expecting a tax credit for buying a new house should check with the Internal Revenue Service first—to be sure they meet the qualifications, Denise Beigbender, a housing and home furnishings specialist, says.

"The Tax Reduction Act of 1975 does include a section designed as an incentive to buyers of new unoccupied homes currently on the market and to people custom-building their homes."

"And it provides a direct five per cent tax credit, figured on the purchase price of the house. The purchase price can't exceed an adjusted base of \$40,000, for a maximum credit of \$2,000."

But not every new home—or new home buyer—qualifies, she cautioned.

Miss Beigbender is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M

University System.

Specific criteria for buyers of new homes include:

—The new dwelling must be a principal residence, not a second or vacation home. It may be a single family house, a unit in a condominium or co-op, or a mobile home.

—Construction must have begun before March 26, 1975.

—The taxpayer must acquire and occupy the home between March 12, 1975 and January 1, 1977.

—Certification from the seller must be attached to the buyer's IRS tax return stating that the purchase price was the lowest at which the residence was ever offered for sale since February 28, 1975.

It also must certify that construction of the dwelling began prior to March 26, 1975.

For persons building their homes, qualifications are:

—Only the cost of construction after March 12, 1975, can be considered in determining the amount of credit allowable.

—The taxpayer-purchaser

must be the original owner. Purchasing the home from a relative may result in ineligibility for tax credit.

Maximum credit allowed under this bill is \$2,000.

Married people filing separate returns can receive up to \$1,000 each.

Also, if a buyer has unrecognized capital gains—

the money he made over the original cost of a previously-owned house, not including any improvements he made—this reduces his tax credit," she explained.

She reminded consumers to keep up to date on possible modifications of the bill by checking with the Internal Revenue Service.

Farm-facts

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Compiled From Sources

Exports And Income ... Prompt Payment In Effect ... Poultry Production Shows Increase ... Seed Hearing Sept. 26.

Texas agriculture producers continue to be in the spotlight in sales of farm commodities to overseas nations. Texas is a major provider of grains and cotton.

This fiscal year, U.S. agricultural exports are now expected to be at least as high as fiscal year 1975. The exports may in fact total \$21.6 billion. That would not be far behind total farm income this year now estimated to be in the mid 20-billion dollar range.

Texas is the nation's leading producer of grain sorghum, and also supplies a major share of cotton exports. Sales of exports of cotton this fiscal year are expected to be about the same as a year ago, or around \$1 billion.

Exports are important to both the general economy and agriculture economy. Sales of farm products overseas help to stabilize our dollar abroad as well as assisting in the deficiency of payments problem. Export sales are also the key to good farm prices at the domestic level.

Agricultural producers in this state and nation can and do produce more than we in this nation can consume. Wheat is a prime example. Our production of wheat this year is set at 2,141,000,000 bushels. The U.S. will consume only about a third of that total.

A BILL which will likely be copied by other states is now in effect in Texas. It is known as the prompt payment bill. It protects livestock producers by giving them greater assurance they will get paid for cattle they sell. Main provisions are:

Livestock sold for slaughter must be paid for by check, cash or wire transfer of funds on the day that transfer of possession occurs.

The seller maintains a superior lien on animals sold for slaughter.

In the past, the seller of livestock has not had any protection which assures payment in case of default by the packer. Previously, livestock producers have become "common creditors" and have been paid only after other claims were honored.

POULTRY PRODUCTION IN TEXAS is showing increases of as much as 33 per cent from a year ago.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes that the July egg-type hatch of chicks is up 33 per cent from a year ago. Broiler chick hatchings are up five per cent from a year ago; however, they are down five per cent from a month ago.

Turkey poult hatch is up 15 per cent from a year ago.

Egg production in Texas is one per cent below a year ago at this time. Layers on hand are down six per cent from a year ago but one per cent higher than a month ago.

A HEARING relating to proposed changes in the Texas seed law will be held Sept. 26 in Room 1046 of the Stephen F. Austin Building in Austin beginning at 10 a.m. Items to be considered include definitions of terms, noxious weed seeds, service testing, minimum germination standards for vegetable seeds, agricultural inspection fees and vegetable seed license fees.

HERE'S ANOTHER AREA in which Texas ranks first in agriculture: number of farmland owners.

Of the 3,300,000 people who own land in the nation, there are 267,000 of them in Texas.

Texas also leads the nation in the number of nonfarm landowners.

And naturally, the average amount of land owned by individuals is higher in Texas than anywhere else in the nation. In Texas, the average amount of land owned per landowner is 548; elsewhere it's only 320 acres.

There's a Danger In Loss Of Vital Agricultural Land

Energy and food are gone. Many people, and millions of who hadn't given thought have to realize we could run out of both food and energy. That's why there is increasing concern about the future use of "prime" agricultural land in the United States. It becomes

apparent that agricultural products, and our fantastic ability to produce them, are our greatest resources in trading for energy and other resources held by other nations. And more and more foreign resources are a part of the lifeblood of our highly complex and industrialized economy.

Much confusion exists, and accurate data is hard to obtain on the kinds and amounts of land being converted, according to Dr. Ivan Schmedemann, Experiment Station economist and specialist in real estate economics. He also has responsibilities with the Texas Real Estate Research Center.

Current USDA estimates indicate that only 2.7 percent of the total land mass in the United States is used for urban and industrial uses and that no more than 4 percent will be used for such purposes by the year 2000.

At present, agricultural land conversion is most critical in those areas where specialty crops require unique land resources or climatological conditions. But, Schmedemann says, as population pressures grow, non-productive use of good land will put increased pressure on remaining available land. And it will tend to magnify the effect of present non-agricultural uses.

New policies are being considered at the state and federal level to keep prime agricultural land for agricultural use. These new land policies, Schmedemann says, should be carefully formulated and must include careful analysis of both the long-run and short-run costs and benefits.

"The tremendous productivity of the U. S. agricultural system is unique," Schmedemann points out, "and while many nations have attempted to duplicate it, none have succeeded. It must be remembered that it is much simpler to destroy an efficient system than it is to build one."

"There are some factors that are 'musts' when we consider formulating new and innovative policies for agricultural land. A major factor in the rural land market in Texas has been the consumptive use of agricultural land. By consumptive use, we mean that many are buying

land for what it yields to them and their families in the form of enjoyment, and economic returns, while important, become secondary."

"For example, agricultural land for more than three decades has had a steady increase in value. Agriculture since World War II has been financed to a large extent by accumulated equities in farm and ranch land. So, it follows that any policy which affects the growth in agricultural land values will have a significant effect on the capital structure of agriculture."

"Another factor is reversal of rural population trends. As a result of new land uses, many

rural areas and small rural communities have had an increase in population numbers after many decades of decline. The new residents have brought new wealth, leadership and talents.

"With these population increases have come changes in the social and political structures and increased demands for public services. Shortages of public revenue along with other urban problems quickly follow."

"A paradox is that with the conversion of agricultural land into consumptive uses in Texas there has not been a corresponding reduction in total agricultural output."

"Much of the land is being used more intensively in agricultural uses than it was before conversion. Consumers are benefiting to some degree from lower cost products due in part to the increased output and because part of the production costs are borne by the consumptive landowner. This is especially true where cattle enterprises are involved."

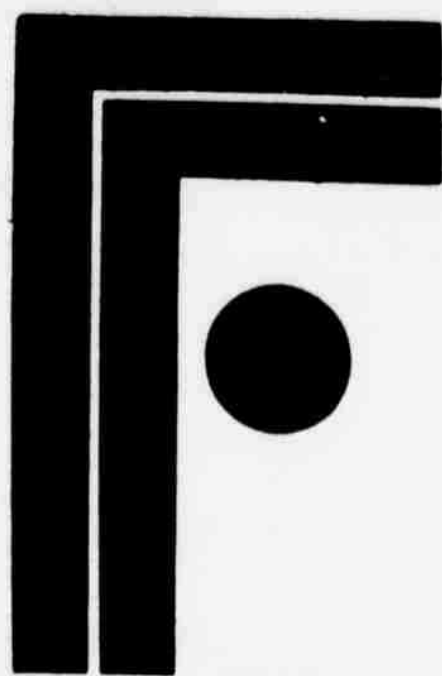
"Still another factor is that land values in many regions of Texas are no longer tied closely to the net returns of the land. And while rising land values have furnished a ready source of land equity financing for agri-

cultural producers, it has made the expansion of farms and ranches very costly."

"The land conversion process now going on is a function of a freely operating land market in 'prime' agricultural areas of the U. S. If artificial constraints are to be applied to certain types of land uses, their impact should be analyzed thoroughly with respect to their effects on the commercial agricultural sector, rural communities, and with respect to the long-run effects on the distribution of ownership of agricultural land", Schmedemann concluded.
