Jerold Riordan Saturday announced sale of his interest in Riordan Hardware to his long-time partner, L. J. Taylor.

Riordan will retire from business Thursday, Sept. 1. Sale of his store interest will conclude 53 years of active participation in the hardware firm.

Taylor said the store, located at 121 E. Second St., will continue to operate under the name of Riordan Hardware.

Taylor, who became associated with the store in 1927 as an employee, became a partner in the business in 1944.

Now the firm carries a stock more than 10 times the amount which the store handled when Taylor first went to work there.

Taylor, who was the radio

specialists for Riordan's for years, has sold more than 3,000 radios during his association with the store. During the same period he has serviced more than 40,000 radios throughout the Colorado City trade territory.

The hardware store is the only one of its type in Mitchell County which has been in business since 1907.

CRAFTS — Class 1, Swedish weaving; Class 2, household article; Class 3, raffia or reed article; Class 4, holiday article.

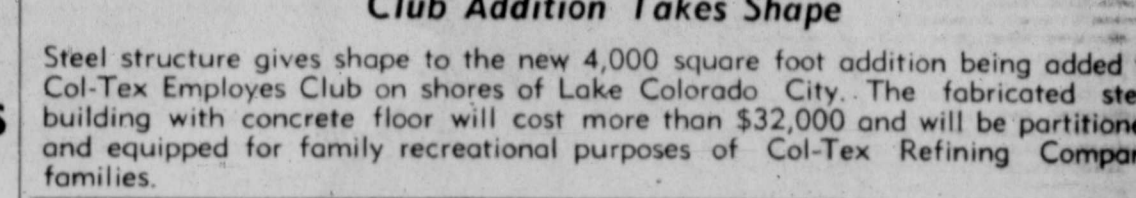
Just minutes before Hertenberger had apprehended a 13-year-old boy as he attempted to steal a hubcap from a car on the lot.

NEW FM PROJECT

Deeds Ready for Longfellow Road

Deeds for acquiring right of way for a new farm-to-market highway through Longfellow community have been handed the county.

This signals the start in obtaining the right of way, which will be followed by Texas Highway Department calling for construction bids.

The FM road, first given an okay by the state in 1958, will cut through the Longfellow area and connect with Interstate 20 freeway east of Colorado City and FM Highway 644 (to Hermleigh) north of Loraine.

It will extend from Interstate 20 at the first overpass east of the C-City (corner of property owned by Noble Walker and H. I. Berman). Moving north from the freeway, the road will extend more than 3 miles, then turn east and continue east by Longfellow school building for about 5.5 miles until intersecting FM 644 at the Lone Star community.

The deeds were handed to Commissioner Sam Thompson and Commissioner Moody Richardson of Loraine, whose precincts the road will be constructed.

County commissioners are awaiting deeds for obtaining right of way for another FM road within the county—this connecting with FM 1229 (to Cuthbert) and the Sterling City highway. This road would meet FM 1229 at Interstate 20 (to Midland) east of Colorado City and extend south from there and east of Lake Colorado City.

J. C. (Jake) Roberts, State

Highway Department district engineer from Abilene, sketched an uncertain future for other FM road construction in Mitchell County after these 2 projects.

Roberts conferred with Commissioners Court here this week and said state financing is the reason for the uncertainty.

The 13-county Abilene district was allocated 1,729 miles of FM construction in a program beginning in 1947. Some

of the counties have used up their allocations.

Mitchell County, still will have some FM construction due it under the original mileage allotment, will have to wait and see what funds are available, Roberts said.

Complicating the financing picture is the fact that more and more funds are necessary for maintaining highways — thus cutting into money that

Students who live in town and do not travel by bus will register on a come-and-go schedule, except at Primary where all students will remain at school from 8:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.

Teacher staffs at High School and Junior High will be busy at school Monday preparing for the opening of classes Monday. Other school staffs will engage in similar work Monday afternoon following the morning registration.

Regular school schedule — buses, classes, lunchrooms — will prevail for Tuesday when actual classroom activities begin.

COLLEGE PREXY SAYS

Teachers Must Have More Than Knowledge

Today's teacher needs more than knowledge, an educator-minister-youth advisor told Colorado City's public school staff here Friday.

The speaker was Dr. Guy D. Newman, president of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, and a member of President Eisenhower's National Committee for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth.

Newman was principal speaker for the orientation program preparing teachers and school administrative personnel for the new fall term.

He described a "3 keys" to successful teaching — preparation, motivation and positive faith. All three are interlocking in finding and guiding a youth to his best potential.

Newman who was in Valley Forge, this year to accept the Freedom Foundation's Thomas Jefferson award for the

Democracy-in-Action program initiated at Howard Payne by the college president, conceded that academic preparation is taken for granted in a teacher.

But there must be preparation emotionally and morally, too, he emphasized, so that the teacher will be enabled to understand the child as a unit.

"Knowledge is not enough," the educator declared. "A teacher must have wisdom and insight."

With this wisdom and insight must also be developed a driving motivation — a deep desire to help and guide a youth to his full potential in an act of freedom and dignity.

"There's a difference in potential and the actual," Newman explained. "And we'll never know who would have been a Congressman or Senator if only his potential had been developed and realized."

A teacher's faith must begin with firm belief in one's own teaching ability, he said, and envelope the realization that a teaching career is a trust — a commitment which serves society.

"And, therefore," he said, "every teacher can render a real service as he combines faith with a faith in a child's potential."

Newman, who quit high school and then returned 10 years later to studies which were to culminate in a college and university degree, credited his own career to an East Texas school teacher.

"When I received the doctorate degree in 1951," he related, "I went back to that woman who 40 years ago had inspired me... and thanked her for what she did for my education."

"Whatever I've done in life is her credit."
