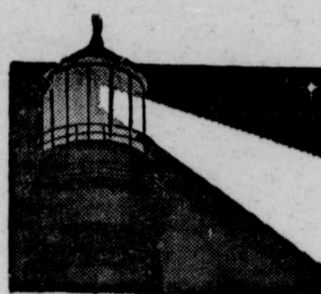


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On The BEAM

We haven't had any floods on Champion Creek in recent years that did any serious damage but floods have occurred in the past when considerable damage was done. It might happen again this year or next.

Considerable flood control work can be done now, more than is ordinarily the case because of the desire of the federal government to create work projects.

We have thought at times how nice it would be for the Champion Creek valley to have flood control dams all along.

The Soil Conservation Service, according to Mr. Sheppard, is interested in working to help secure such a project for Champion Creek and also for the creek north of town.

Those two creeks drain off a lot of water. Wouldn't it be nice to have it go to the Gulf? Anyway the matter is being looked into.

The First State Bank more than doubled the number of sweet potato plants it originally planned to order for experimental purposes. More interest was shown than was anticipated Mr. Taylor said. Former Lorainian Appointed To Science Institute

Dan D. Morgan of Borger received word last week of his appointment to attend the Institute for Teachers of Science and Mathematics during the summer of 1958.

Endowed by the National Science Foundation, this Institute is held annually at various colleges in the nation. Howard Payne College at Brownwood conducts the institute for this area.

Recipients of this appointment may receive up to nine semester hours of college credit with pay for attendance, travel, allowance for dependents, and no charge for tuition. Total compensation, other than tuition, averages \$650 per person for the term of six weeks.

Selection of teachers is made on the following qualifications: the individual must be teaching in the field of mathematics or science; evidence interest in professional improvement, show capacity for benefits; and be recommended by his superintendent of schools.

Mr. Morgan is teacher of mathematics in the Borger schools and Mrs. Morgan, former homemaker teacher in Loraine school, is a member of the home-making department in the Borger schools.

While the Morgans lived in Loraine, Mr. Morgan taught in the Hermleigh schools. He was Scoutmaster here and the couple were consistent workers in the First Methodist Church.

Questions and Answers

Q. My State has just paid me a veterans' bonus. Must I count it as income for VA pension purposes?

A. No. Under a recent law, state bonuses are not to be considered as income for pension purposes.

Q. I exchanged my permanent GI insurance policy for a paid-up policy of a smaller amount on which I no longer have to pay premiums. Will I continue to receive dividends on this paid-up policy?

A. Yes. Your paid-up policy will share in any dividends declared.

Q. Would the fact that I previously had attended a farm school prevent me from taking on the farm training under the Korean GI Bill?

A. The law would prevent you from taking GI farm training if the proposed course is substantially equal to the course you already had in school. If it's not the same as your school course, you could take it under the Korean GI Bill.

Q. Since I am eligible for VA outpatient treatment, could I use go to my family doctor and have him send VA the bill for his treatment of my service-connected disabilities?

A. No. You first must obtain VA approval for medical care by your family doctor.

Reduce Delinquency

XIV

AT GATESVILLE

(A distinguished Texas judge offers pointers on combating our rapidly increasing juvenile delinquency problem.)

By JUDGE SARAH T. HUGHES

For many years whippings and solitary confinement were routine punishment at the state reformatory at Gatesville. We heard that sadistic guards punished the boys unmercifully.

Several years ago a drill-master jumped on a boy who refused to drill any longer and choked him. The boy died.

Like Hardened Criminals

"The boys in this institution are subject to the same harsh and strenuous rules and regulations as you would expect to find in controlling the hardest criminal in the penitentiary," a legislative committee said about the Gatesville reformatory.

Despite the harsh treatment (which included 10-year-olds who were there because they were neglected but who were learning crime from the older, more serious offenders) there were gang fights, hunger strikes, and many escapes.

In 1932 a new policy was inaugurated. Today the whip is gone. Bars have been removed. Boys are punished by being deprived of privileges. There have been no gang fights or hunger strikes. Escapes have decreased.

Institutional Whippings

Authorities believe that whippings in institutions often build up resentments that cause the boy to commit other offenses.

Those who have actually worked with teen-age offenders believe that institutions for delinquents should have treatment seeking the causes of delinquency, together with a program of education, rehabilitation and vocational training.

SOIL CONSERVATION

John D. Beal, a cooperator of the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District, has recently signed a Great Plains Conservation Program Contract. He has just finished plowing and seeding a mixture of native grasses, blue grama, sidecoats grama and buffalo grass on 284 acres of old fields. Beal plans to defer these areas and construct 420 rods of permanent fence to protect the seeded grasses until they have become established.

Jimmie Maddox and Bruce Byrne, cooperators of the Mitchell County SCD, have recently completed 3 ranch ponds which will furnish them with permanent livestock water. These ponds are a part of their ranch plans being applied on their ranches.

Virgil H. Wimberley and Arthur R. Miles, who farm in the southeast part of the district, have recently completed several diversion terraces which will divert runoff water from cropland and will protect terraces in the fields below.

The technicians of the Soil Conservation Service have recently checked and certified the following terrace systems as being complete:

Albert Beights 5.8 miles; Mrs. Ruth Powell 4.3 miles; Oscar L. Simpson 3.5 miles; Bennie A. Hooks 4.7 miles; Anna C. Buchanan Est. 6.1 miles; Pruitt Keel 4.5 miles; Pernesa Hart 0.1 mile; William H. Narrel 5.3 miles; L. Lefevre 2.1 miles; George Dawson 4.0 miles; Edd P. Gressett 3.5 miles; Mrs. Willie Byrd 4.7 miles; Douglas Barber 2.2 miles; Tom Morrison 4.8 miles; T. P. Sanford 5.2 miles; Joe Earnest 5.0 miles; R. E. McMillian 5.3 miles; Elwood Estate 6.3 miles; R. L. Solomon 2.3 miles; Ora B. Green 5.3 miles; James F. Kelley 5.1 miles.

These terrace systems were designed, laid out and constructed to make maximum use of the rainfall that we receive.

The land protected by these terraces will be farmed on the contour which is also a good conservation practice that is accepted and used by the majority of landowners and operators.

Most of the above operators received cost-share payment from the A. S. C.

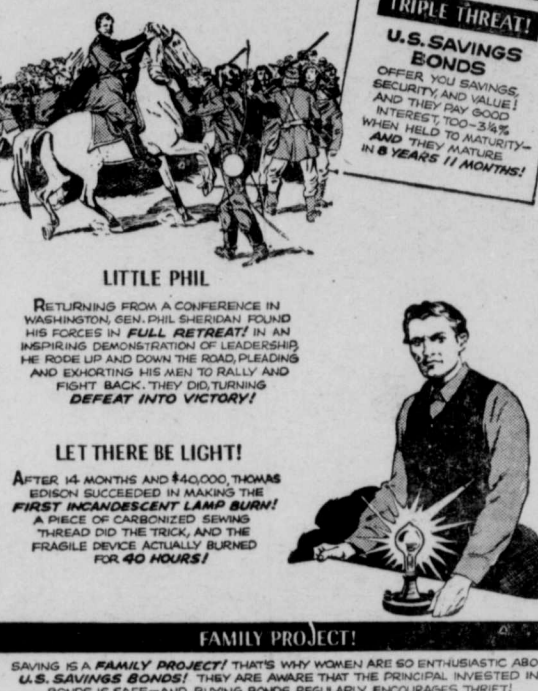

Traffic Laws Are On Your Side

"Traffic laws are on your side—you should know and obey them!"

J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, made this statement today as he urged the public to support the traffic laws program currently being conducted by TSA and the National Safety Council as a part of the nationwide Back the Attack on Traffic Accidents campaign.

"You can't afford to be careless or thoughtless in traffic," Musick said. "Your life depends on your behind-the-wheel behavior." The safety expert urged the citizens of Texas to obey traffic laws to the letter. He said that some drivers knowingly play dangerous angles and short cuts—they jump red lights at intersections, never really stop at stop signs and overdrive the speed limit. He said that these drivers too often end up paying a high price for their lawlessness—a serious injury and sometimes death.

"If every driver would realize that the traffic laws are on his side, he wouldn't think of disregarding them," Musick said. "When you drive faster than the speed limit, make wrong turns, go through red lights or stop signs or pass improperly, you run these risks—traffic fines, costly car repairs, towing costs, medical bills, lost wages, damage suits, lawyer's fees and loss of your driver's license. Add to these the suffering and anguish even a minor traffic accident causes and you have a real case for safe driving."

He emphasized that every Tex-

YOUR Social Security?



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Note: The information below is compiled by H. C. Haney, Field Representative of the Abilene Social Security Office. It is designed to answer questions you may have concerning social security.

Q. Does working for certain relatives prevent an employee from acquiring social security credits?

A. The law excludes certain types of employment from social security coverage. Wages received from a husband, a wife, or a son or daughter are not covered by social security. Neither are wages paid by a parent to his child if the child is under 21 years of age.

Q. How long do I have to pay the social security tax, I am over 65?

A. You must pay the social security tax on all wages or self-employment income that you earn. This is true even if you are now drawing social security benefits.
