Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

THE LIFE STORY OF OUR NATION. Our fine museums in East Texas have many displays which illustrate the hard work and valor of our pioneering ancestors. Recognizing the value of historic preservation, Congress has established a number of programs to aid museums, and to help local historical groups take full advantage of all available opportunities I have compiled a chart outlining this information which is available free to those interested.

INCREASE IN RAILROAD RETIREMENT BENEFITS. To continue the longstanding policy of keeping railroad retirement on a par with social security, the House last week approved H. R. 15922 to raise railroad retirement benefits by 20% effective September 1 of this year. The measure now goes to the Senate.

LOW-INTEREST LOANS FOR VIETNAM VETERANS. A new source of financial assistance is now offered to Vietnam veterans through an expanded Small Business Administration business loan program for men and women who have served in the Armed Forces anywhere in the world since August 5, 1964, and who cannot obtain financing through normal channels. Loans up to \$50,000 are available for 15 years at low interest rates (6%) and may be used to expand an existing business or establish a new one. Qualified veterans interested in taking advantage of this or other SBA programs may contact my office, and I will be glad to do anything I can to help.

PRODUCTIVITY (real output per man-hour) is the key to the economic strength which has given us the highest standard of living in the history of the world. Since 1965, however, we have ranked last among the 11 leading industrial nations in growth of productivity with an annual increase of less than 2% compared with Japan's 14.2%. The Joint Economic Committee, of which I am Vice Chairman, has examined this threat to our national well being, and a nine-page report of the Committee's initial findings is available free to constituents.

AMERICAN AGRICULTURE STILL TOPS. The one part of the economy where America holds an unquestioned lead is agriculture. Each U. S. farmer now produces enough food for himself and 50 other people — a three-fold increase over the past 20 years.

U. S. WHEAT AND RUSSIA. Bad weather has reduced the Russian wheat crop below requirements, and they will be forced to buy from us. Normally, Russia plants three times as many acres less crop efficiency, and even in good years their rainfall is only between 15 and 25 inches a year. Crop conditions in Russia have improved greatly since the days of the Czars when it was known throughout the world as "the country of the great famines" but Communism will never equal the productive efficiency of our free society.

\$81.3 BILLION is the value at the well of all crude oil produced in Texas from the first year of recorded production (1889) up to January 1, 1972. This is far more than any other state and is about 37% of the all-time U. S. production of \$222.8 billion. Texas also produces about 41% of all U. S. natural gas and has proven gas reserves of over 101 trillion cubic feet — 40% of the U. S. total. This makes Texas the leading energy-producing state in the nation.

THE LOWLY GOAT. Goats were domesticated long before either cattle or horses; in fact, prehistoric men kept goats for milk, meat, and clothing 7,000 years before the birth of Christ. And goats have literally changed the face of the world — careless herding by early nomadic tribes is often blamed for widespread deforestation and erosion. There are now 377 million goats in the world that are the main source of milk for over half the world's people. Goats in the U. S. are kept primarily for their fleeces (mohair) and about 85% of the total U. S. goat population is in Texas.

Austin. — Rep. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty apparently will take over the House of Representatives speakership without opposition next January.

Withdrawal of Rep. Frank Calhoun of Abilene from the speaker's race last week, after concluding that Daniel was too far out front to catch, left the 31-year-old attorney from Liberty free of a major challenger.

Rep. James E. Nugent of Kerrville, who had planned to enter the contest earlier, endorsed Daniel.

Before Calhoun's withdrawal, Daniel claimed more than 100 commitments from House members or nominees.

"So many of the old and new members had committed to my opponent before I got into the race, that my continuance in the campaign would place a burden on my supporters that I do not feel justified in causing," said Calhoun.

Daniel, son of former Governor Price Daniel, came from a long way back to emerge as the shoe-in candidate for speaker.

When Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine won the post in special session last spring after resignation of former Speaker Gus Mutscher, he was considered a cinch to keep the job during the 63rd Legislature.

But Price was defeated for reelection to his House seat in the June 3 Democratic runoff primary by Rep. Fred Head of Troup.

Daniel, meanwhile, had been busy rounding up commitments from incumbent lawmakers and new nominees. He tries to dodge being labeled a liberal and prefers the term "progressive." He has emphasized need for legislative reform and is pledged to hold the speakership only one term.

SAFETY COURSE OFFERED — Texans who complete a new defensive driving course after September 1 can become eligible for a 10 per cent reduction in their annual auto insurance policies.

Texas Safety Association has accepted responsibility for coordinating the National Safety Council course.

The course will cost about \$10 or less per person, and the resulting credit is good for three years.

Individual savings over the three-year period are estimated at about \$45 — or \$43 million statewide. Duplications are not allowed for the new course in addition to the driver training course.

In families with two or more cars, the principal drivers of each car will have to take the course to qualify for credit on all vehicles. After the three-year period, the course must be repeated by drivers to continue qualification for the 10 per cent credit.

PARTIES CERTIFIED — Two new political parties, La Raza Unida and the Social Workers Party, have been certified for places on the November 7 general election ballot in Texas.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said it was his duty to certify the parties since they filed more than the required number of 22,365 signatures necessary for ballot

position. The American Party and the New Party, which did not file enough signatures, seek to get on the ballot anyway by federal court action.

La Raza Unida is waging an aggressive campaign for governor with Ramsey Muniz of San Antonio as its candidate. Both parties also have candidates for U. S. senator, lieutenant governor and most other major statewide offices.

SPECIAL SESSION COOLING? — Governor Preston Smith may be cooling a little on the idea of a September special session on insurance reform, but he insists the idea is still alive.

"I'm pretty flexible," said Smith. "If somebody can bring me in some facts that would show me there would be no purpose served in calling a session, I would not even pretend to be in a mood to waste \$33,000 a day (estimated session cost) of the taxpayers' money."

On the other hand, Smith said, if he could be shown that legislation to reduce insurance rates could be passed, he would not hesitate to summon lawmakers back to work.

Main business of the session, he indicated, would be a proposal for competitive insurance rates, which he said are in effect in 49 states. He seemed to be backing off his proposal to abolish the present insurance regulatory board.

"I don't know that we will attempt to abolish the board," he said. "If we come to the conclusion it would be helpful, we will. If we don't, we won't. We'll know something (about whether to call a special session) in a couple of weeks."

TO BUILD OR NOT TO BUILD The Highway Department, frustrated repeatedly in its plans to erect a new \$20 million state headquarters near the capitol, has asked the attorney general to clarify whether it can legally proceed with construction.

After the department was ready to advertise for bids, the Legislature called for a re-evaluation of the site, which was made. Finding: the site was the best available. After that, the Legislature appropriated \$1.5 million to the Parks and Wildlife Department to buy the building site (a barren city block which served as a parking lot) and make a scenic park out of it. Governor Smith then vetoed the appropriation. That left the Highway Department confused as to what to do next. It can't desert the site without being paid for it.

DDT BANNED — DDT registrations in Texas will be cancelled August 31 with few exceptions, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced. White had banned DDT registration for household use earlier under Pesticide Advisory Committee recommendations. The Committee said the action would have little impact on Texas agriculture.

Exceptions will permit registration for DDT to use on stored sweet potatoes, disease control programs by public health officials, in prescriptive drugs and by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the military in health quarantine programs.

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, August 1, 1972. The major item of business of the meeting was to conduct a public hearing on the adoption of the official school budget for the 1972-73 school year. Board members had previously received a proposed budget which they had had an opportunity to study for some time. After further discussion at the meeting, the 1972-73 budget was approved calling for expenditures of \$683,128.00 as compared to \$724,259.00 for the previous year. Superintendent Talmadge Morgan said that the \$40,000.00 decrease from the previous year's budget was due largely to less needed for Capital Outlay for the coming year for athletic facilities at Rivercrest.

Values in the school district for the 1972-73 school year are \$21,800,000.00 based on 50% of true value.

Superintendent Morgan stated that the tax rate for the coming school year was not set at the meeting pending on further information.

Free Lunch Policy Announced

The Talco-Bogata School today announced a free and reduced price lunch policy for school children unable to pay the full price.

Families falling within a certain income scale or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms to be sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the principals will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Talmadge Morgan, superintendent whose address is Box 125, Bogata, Texas, has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of, or discrimination against, any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch. A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the superintendent, where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

Construction Tech. Program Begins At PJC

Approval has been given the Construction Technology program to begin August 23 at Paris Junior College, Dr. Ross Alsop, dean of applied sciences instruction, announced today. Joe Crigler will be instructor for the new course which was approved this week by the Texas Education Agency.

First year of the program will include instruction in the three major housebuilding trades, carpentry, electricity, and plumbing. Crigler explained. The second year will include courses in construction management, architectural and construction technology, and environmental technology.

Upon successful completion of the two-year program, an associate in applied science degree will be granted. A vocational certificate may be obtained after one year in the program. On the advisory committee for the new program are Doyle Whitaker, Don Wilson, Al Yeager, and Leslie Stedham.

Crigler, who has had 25 years experience as a carpenter, taught building trades for high school students last year at PJC. This year, Leroy Burke will teach the high school students and Crigler will devote full-time to Construction Technology. The program will include both classroom lecture and cooperative training working for a contractor. In the future, the college plans to expand the program to include related trades of construction.

The new program is open to both men and women students. Crigler said, and is approved by the Veterans Administration.

To enroll, students may call Crigler or Ken Dailey, vocational counselor. Early registration is in process now at PJC.

PUBLIC NOTICE

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

"(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.

"(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.

"(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants

shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.

"(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publishing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.

"(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p. m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.

"(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the

State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time another office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that new State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a nonemployee officer may hold other nonexclusive offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature or this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and plead in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Results Annual Cotton Variety Survey Released

Results of the annual cotton variety survey conducted by the Cotton Division of the USDA, Agricultural Marketing Service for the 1972 season has been released.

In the Texas Counties served by the Dallas Cotton Classing Office, Lankart 57 continues to be the leading variety according to Roy W. Gilreath, Officer in Charge of the Dallas office. The biggest percentage of switch in varieties compared to the previous season was between Lankart 57 and Lankart LX571. Planting of Lankart 57 accounted for 55 per cent of the acreage compared to 84 per cent the previous season. The percentage planted to LX571 this year was 34 compared to a little less than nine per cent last season.

Ranking in third place were Deltapine 16 and Lockett 4789 at three per cent each. These same varieties were also in third place last season with about one and a half per cent each.

Other varieties accounted for one per cent each or less of the total acreage according to Gilreath.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

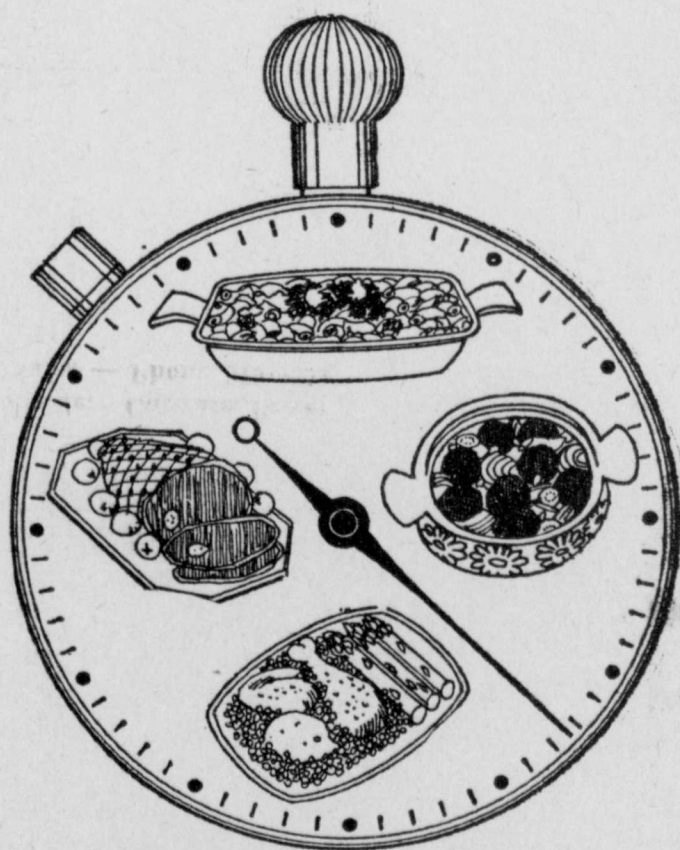
