Game Saturday Marks Official Close of Season

Saturday afternoon the Lampasas Badgers, Class B champions of District 11, defeated the Junction Eagles, champions of District 12 by the score of 14 to 0, before a crowd of approximately 2,000 fans on the local field.

Playing inspired football, the Junction Eagles put up the best fight they have shown this year, but the Lampasas veterans proved too much for the Eagles. Combined with the powerful defensive strength of the Badgers and several bad breaks for Junction, the Eagles were unable to score. Lampasas is the second team in as many years, that has held the Eagles scoreless. Last year, the powerful Ballinger aggregation's stubborn defense refused to allow the Eagles to cross the goal line. This was also the second game that Junction has lost in two years.

In the first three minutes of play, Lampasas scored a touchdown when Fuller made a 40 yard run on a spin play. In the second quarter, Junction

Collector's Office Is Ready to Issue New Automobile Numbers

Tax Collector Frank Patterson announces that all receipts and supplies for the issuance of car numbers are now in his office. These numbers are supposed to be on the cars by January 1, 1931. Thus far only nine numbers have been sold. The collector's office hopes car owners will not wait until the new year to buy numbers as January is the month in which practically all the taxes are paid. It will be a help to all concerned if the auto numbers would be secured before January 1.

The numbers for 1931 begin at H2-3501 and they do not contain the words, "front and rear." The regulations for securing the numbers are practically the same as previous years. A receipt stating that lights have been tested just previous to applying for the numbers must be secured from an authorized testing station. These stations are now ready to test lights and issue receipts.

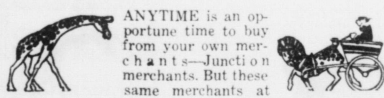
STATE SECRETARY OF NATIONAL RIFLE CLUB WILL BE IN JUNCTION

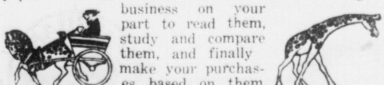

Last Saturday afternoon at 2:30 the Junction Eagles lost to the Lampasas Badgers by the score of 14 to 0 in a game for the bi-district championship of districts 11 and 12. The Eagles kicked to the Badgers and downed them on their forty yard line. The Badgers began spilling their fakes and tricky plays which made them a touchdown and they kicked for the extra point. 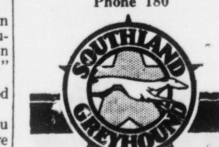

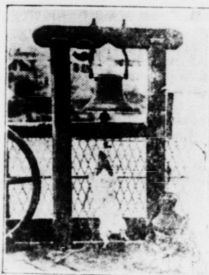

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Cock Hungarian Partridge Has Strong Motherly Instinct

The cock Hungarian partridge is one hubby who will fight his wife for the honor of being nurse-maid to his children. The mothering instinct is so highly developed in the male of this game bird, which is being imported to this country in thousands by many state conservation departments, that mating "Huns" often have hectic conjugal days ending in tragedy or divorce, with the cock strutting proudly away with the offspring.

This marital secret of the partridge family is a big reason the bird is increasing in America. It enables the young birds to survive even if the mother meets with some accident, and also causes the female to bring forth two broods in a season, in a vain attempt to rear more loyal youngsters. But the lady has her day prior to matrimonial disillusionment. Unlike the female of some species, she makes no coy effort to conceal the fact that she is the chooser, but selects

the lover she prefers, whether he likes it or not. And game farm keepers have found that if they try to sell her on the idea of a mate not to her liking that unlucky swain is fortunate to escape with his neck.

After the birds have mated in the spring, however, and the female has laid her nest of approximately 23 eggs—an accomplishment at which even this motherly male can boast no special ability, the cock insists on incubating the eggs. Should the mother bird leave her nest, he takes possession, and it is often quiet a task for the female to drive him off again.

As soon as the young hatch out, the cock commences calling in his most coaxing manner, and soon all the chicks have deserted their mother to nestle under his wing.

This often brings warm family dissension, but usually ends with the mother contenting herself with a second brood.

FINDS BEAR TRAP NEAR CAMP WOOD

A few days ago, while in a cedar brake about a mile and a half north of the Miles ranch near Camp Wood, Carl Huterson found an old steel bear trap. Notwithstanding the fact that the trap had been exposed to the weather for years, it is in good condition and will still function.

The trap is about 30 inches long, and has a four foot stake chain. When found the chain was wrapped around a tree. The old trap is a rare curio and has aroused quite a lot of interest—especially among those who were

present here in the Nueces Canyon when bear were as plentiful as deer are nowadays.—Camp Wood Crony.

\$10 a Day Legislature Salary is Ruled Legal

AUSTIN, Texas.—Members of the Forty-Second Legislature will get \$10 a day compensation for the 120-day session as provided in a constitutional amendment carried at the last general election. First Assistant Attorney General Rice M. Tilly said Saturday.

Mr. Tilly decided that the payment is legal and will issue a formal ruling to that effect.

HARD TIMES IN TEXAS

We are having a hard time in Texas; the streets are full of automobiles, going, as Will Rogers says, nowhere in particular but in a great hurry to get there; times are so hard that it is difficult to find a parking place for our automobiles; we have only about one for every three of us in the state; if times were not so hard, we would no doubt all have an automobile.

A Texas editor muses on the hard times situation thusly.

"We are right up against it; we saw a girl last week so hard up she did not have silk stockings, and rather than wear nylon she wore none at all; of the thousands of girls in Texas, it is almost unbelievable that one should have to do without silk stockings, but that is not all—the consumption of cigarettes increased only about 5,000,000 packages in the state last year, whereas everybody knows it should have increased by twice that amount.

"Times are sure hard—we were able to obtain a seat at the movie after waiting only twenty minutes, when by rights we should have had to wait at least an hour. The drug store got along by installing only two extra fountains this summer, which shows how bad things really are, but an extra showcase for lipstick, two extra magazine racks and a lunch counter cut into the druggist's earnings and made him realize how hard times are.

"And to make things worse, every vacant lot in America has a miniature golf course on it and it looks like times are getting so hard that they're going to have to start tearing down perfectly good buildings to make room for more 'pewee' courses. And if a fellow wants to play on one of the pesky things he has to wait nearly an hour before he can get to start, and then gets run over and knocked down and hit by balls before he finishes. Yes, times are hard.

"When will times be better? It's impossible to find a parking space near a movie theater or other place of amusement—a terrible condition. Something really ought to be done to require the hot-dog stands to carry on hand a sufficient supply of food to feed the crowds; and this way of building grandstands, movie theaters, stadiums and other places of amusement only half large enough to seat those attending ought to be handled vigorously.

"Yes, times are hard; the grocer can hardly sell any flour, grits or bacon; it takes all his time to sell canned salmon, canned soup, canned meats and even canned apple sauce; the dry goods merchant is crying because his bolts of gingham, muslin and demin remain on his shelves while the clerks waste all their time selling such things as silk and rayon; the hardware stores have no demand for plows, wire fencing, and nails, but cannot supply the demand for radios, electric percolators, vacuum cleaners, et cetera; yes, the times are hard."—Cotulla Record.

9 Jews Win Seats In Congress and 2 Elected Governors

With the complete national election returns from all parts of the country now at hand the results show that for the first time in the history of American Jewery two Jews were elected governors of their respective states and nine Jews were elected to Congress, eight of them incumbents. In New York Lieutenant Governor Herbert Lehman was re-elected by an overwhelming plurality while in Ohio Gilbert Bettman was re-named attorney general on the Republican ticket despite the fact that the rest of the ticket went down in defeat.

The new Jewish governors are Arthur Seligman, democrat of New Mexico and Julius Meier, republican of Oregon. In addition to the eight sitting congressmen, David Goldstein, democrat, of Worcester, Mass., was elected in a close contest. Emanuel Celler, Samuel Dickstein, Dr. William Sirovich and Sol Bloom, democrats of New York; Benjamin Golden, republican of Philadelphia; Isaac Bacharach, republican of Atlantic City; Mrs. Florence Prag Kahn, republican of San Francisco and Adolph J. Sabath, democrat of Chicago were also re-elected.

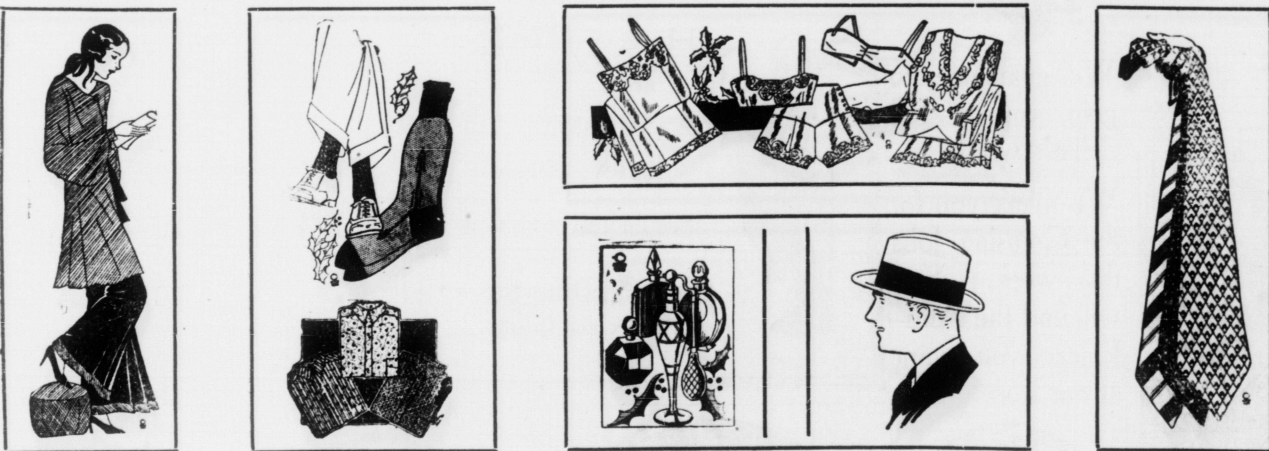

MASON 102 YEARS OF AGE CLAIMS RECORD FOR U. S.

PARIS, Mo.—William Fitzhugh Buckner, born in Virginia in 1828 and now residing here, is claimed to be the oldest Mason in the United States, both in years and in Masonic service, at least the Missouri Committee on Necrology says so. THE HEEL FLY

A toll of from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000 is taken each year by the cattle grub, or heel fly. Stockmen, dairymen, feeders, butchers, packers, hide dealers, tanners, and manufacturers of leather goods are the losers, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The department has issued a new bulletin describing the damage done by this insect and giving methods for its control. Farmers' Bulletin 1596-F, Cattle Grubs or Heel Flies with suggestions for their control, can be obtained free from the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

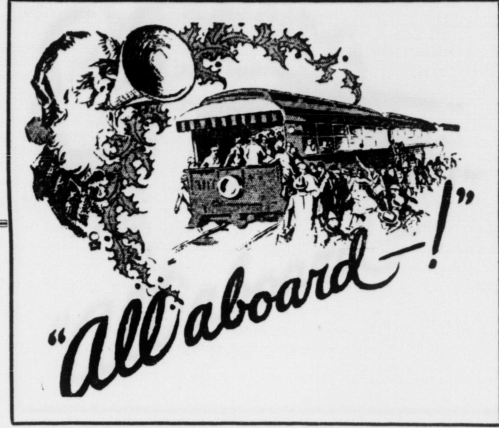

The executive committee of the association recommended that the association have a representative at Washington during congressional sessions and proposed that it join with the National Wool Growers Association and the National Wool Marketing Corporation in employing such a man. The association is to have a man at Austin during legislative sessions, and the selection has been left up to Coke R. Stevenson and T. A. Kincaid.

The committee expressed itself in accord with the "Eat More Lamb" campaign and voted to turn over to the National Wool Growers Association the lamb advertising money collected up to the last annual convention in Brady. Mr. Kincaid expressed the belief that Texas will raise the sum allotted to it in the campaign this year.

Messrs. Kincaid, Gillis and Mayer were instructed to use their judgement in matters pertaining to Texas affairs when they attend the National Wool Growers Convention at Colorado City, Colorado.

The committee also proposed a change in the constitution causing the executive committee to meet in December, in March, in June and on the day preceding the regular annual convention.

Roger Gillis, vice-president of the Association and the president of the National Wool Marketing Corporation, said the tariff might be attacked. A number of schedules are under fire now.

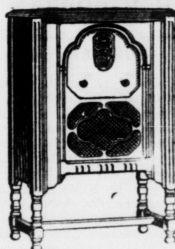
