Construction Ordered On Last Segment Road To Iraan From FM 33

The Texas Highway Commission has taken the first step to inaugurate a new two-year Farm-to-Market Road Program for Texas. Herbert C. Petry, Jr., Chairman of the Highway Commission, stated that the funds for this 1961-62 program are derived from federal-aid highway funds, matched with state highway funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

J. A. Snell, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at San Angelo, Texas, has stated that the following farm-to-market road in Crockett County is scheduled for work under this program:

From 22.3 miles West of R. M. Road 33, West to Pecos River near Iraan, a distance of approximately 5.2 miles.

Mr. Snell stated that the Commission has authorized the development of some area roads which will serve the dual purpose of providing service to the adjacent land as well as aiding in the development of the entire state. It was announced that work will begin on this project as soon as final planning is completed and necessary right of way secured. Resident Engineer R. A. McCulloch will be in charge of the work in this County.

Santiago Spots Second Davidson Ellenburger Test

New Venture 1 1/4 Miles South of No. 1 Strawn Gas Prospect

Santiago Oil & Gas Co., Midland, will drill the No. 1-A Joe T. Davidson, a 10,200-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 13 miles southeast of Ozona, and 1 1/4 miles due south of its No. 1 Davidson, active Strawn gas prospect.

Location, on a 648.8-acre lease, is 660 feet from the north and west lines of 5-TG-GC&SF.

The No. 1 Davidson, testing through perforations between 8,912-9,058 feet from completion attempt as a gas discovery, originally was scheduled to 10,200 feet for tests of the Ellenburger.

Gulf Oil Corp., Midland, No. 1-A Shannon Hospital, in 1-Archer well, Crockett County Ellenburger wildcat, 14 miles east - southeast of Iraan, recovered 120 feet of drilling mud and 120 feet of sulphur and gas-cut drilling mud on a one hour test between 6,500-567 feet.

The project, slated for 8,400 feet, was coring below 6,607 feet.

Women's Clubs Of Ozona Cooperate In Project To Build Up Fund For Club House; Memorials To Be Received By Supporting Clubs For Fund

Women's clubs of Ozona this year have banded together in adopting a project for the community, a clubhouse to serve the city's organized clubs, to provide a meeting place, a place for keeping records and a headquarters for club women of the city. The clubs have adopted a common project, that of receiving memorial funds for the clubhouse construction project, and many such memorials have already been given.

The investigation of the possibilities of a Clubhouse Fund began with the meeting of the Presidents -elect of the Ozona Woman's Club and Ozona Woman's Forum in April, 1960. A few weeks later a meeting was called, and the president of the Garden Club joined them for a discussion.

Realizing a need for a meeting place, and a place for keeping records of all the Women's Clubs of Ozona, members had expressed the desire that fund be started. A fund was established by members voluntarily sending contributions and designating them to be used for a Clubhouse.

The Woman's Club voted in May to start a Clubhouse Fund as a local project for 1960-61. In September the Woman's Club voted to donate all proceeds made from special projects this year to the Clubhouse Fund in memory of all deceased members, including Mrs. P. T. Robinson.

In 1959, the Woman's Forum voted as a civic project to investigate the possibilities of a Clubhouse. In September 1960 the Woman's Forum voted to cooperate with other clubs, and to support the Ozona Club house Memorial Fund.

The Garden Club voted at the summer called meeting to cooperate with other Clubs and to support the Clubhouse Memorial Fund.

The Woman's League, organized last summer, voted in September to cooperate with other Clubs participating in this project and to support the Ozona Clubhouse Memorial Fund.

The Music Club has expressed great interest and cooperation in this project. Its executive committee voted to support the project.

New Plaintiffs Press Injunction Suit Against Co.

Dump Ground Action Is Renewed In Amend- ed Petition Filed

With the listing of eleven new plaintiffs, replacing the three original petitioners who asked that their names be withdrawn from the action, the suit seeking an injunction against Crockett county against use of a plot of land on the southwest edge of Ozona as a pit type garbage disposal site, was renewed with the filing of an amended petition in 112th district court here last week.

The amended petition, which recites the same claims and contentions as in the original suit, names as new plaintiffs in the action, Rosendo Lara, Alejos Tambunga, Jr., America Tambunga, Anastacio DeHoyos, Herculano Delgado, Santiago Tambunga, Juan Delgado, Jr., Armando Reina, Heraclio Herreras, Leandro Flores, Jr., and Mike Pena.

The suit was filed as individuals and on behalf of the United Parents Organization in the Latin-American community here. The suit claimed use of the dump site so near the Latin-American section of Ozona will prove a nuisance to residents of that section and that a road through the residential area over which dump trucks will travel will prove a hazard to residents.

In explanation of the amended petition, filed by a Big Lake attorney, and the new plaintiffs, the petition reads in part:

"Shortly after said suit was filed, the original individuals petitioners were persuaded by a person or persons unknown to execute an affidavit indicating that they did not wish further to be a party of the suit, wherefore the above named individual plaintiffs request such suit be continued in their names."

The three original petitioners who withdrew from the suit were Gabriel Longoria, Romeo Perez and Adolpho Rodriguez.

County Taxpayers Receive Bills For '60 Taxes Now Due

Slight Decline In Val- uation; County Rate Cut 6 Cents

Crockett county property owners received statements late last week for their 1960 county, school and state taxes which became due and payable October 1st.

Tax revenues for county and state purposes this year will be based on a total county valuation of \$33,404,210, a drop of \$279,000 from last year's valuations. Because University of Texas lands are not subject to taxation for school purposes, the total valuation for school taxes is \$31,357,870, a drop of \$249,264 from last year's total.

Taxpayers will pay a total of \$3.36 per hundred dollars valuation for state, county and school purposes, a drop of 6 cents in the county rate. The state is 42 cents, the county rate 95 cents, special farm-to-market road and flood control levy of 30 cents and schools at \$1.69.

Taxpayers will be offered the usual discounts for early payment of taxes. A 3 percent discount will be allowed on county and state taxes paid in October, 2 percent in November and 1 percent in December. There is no discount on school taxes nor poll taxes, the latter at \$1.75 per person.

Split payment of taxes is possible, with the first half payment due in the regular payment period, with no discount, on the last half payment subject to the same discounts, 3 percent if paid before April 1, 2 percent if paid before May 1 and 1 percent if paid before May 31. Second half payments must be made by June 31.

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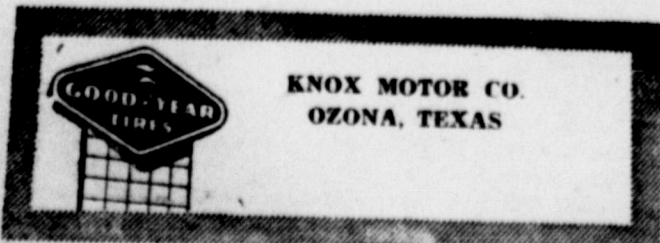

Allan Shivers Heads Democrats For Nixon Campaign In Texas

Austin — Former Governor Allan Shivers this week began organizing a statewide campaign among Democrats for the election of Richard Nixon and Henry Cabot Lodge, Republican candidates for president and vice-president.

Shivers, who directed the successful Eisenhower campaigns in Texas in 1952 and 1956, announced that state campaign headquarters were opened Monday (Oct. 3) at 308 West 15th in Austin.

The organization will be called the "Texas Democrats for Nixon and Lodge." At a meeting last week in Dallas of Texas Democrats who oppose the "socialistic" planks in the national Democratic platform and cannot accept the "naked liberalism" of John Kennedy, Shivers was elected chairman to direct the Nixon-Lodge drive.

In his opening speech, carried by many TV stations last week, the former Texas governor hammered hard at the socialistic aspects of the national Democratic platform, pointing out that it "advocates and promises socialistic measures that Norman Thomas never dreamed of."

He charged that by actual count the national Democratic platform contained more than 50 proposals that would weaken state and local governments or further concentrate powers in the federal government, or both.

"Federal aid" was the magic formula that the platform proposed as the cure-all for the ills of individuals, cities, states and foreign government, he said. . . . federal aid for almost everything "whether we want it or not."

Among the many other unacceptable planks in the national Democratic platform listed by Shivers were:

- (1) Repeal the authorization for state right-to-work laws; (2) Let the federal government set the standards for unemployment insurance instead of the states; (3) Close "tax loopholes" in mineral depletion allowances ("And anyone who doesn't think that means oil and gas should talk to Mr. Kennedy," Shivers advised); (4) Repeal the Connally Amendment; (5) Increased federal control of watershed developments and water conservation; and (6) Establishment of a national fuels policy ("Which happens to be the pet project of coal interests, aimed at the heart of the oil and gas industry," Shivers explained).

Shivers said that some people were claiming that platform do not mean anything. "Kennedy has given every indication the platform does mean what it says, and that he liked what it means." He said Kennedy's only criticism of the platform was that it was not liberal enough.

Another excuse for the platform was: "Don't worry, Lyndon and Mr. Sam will take care of us," Shivers said.

"I have a great deal of respect for — and some personal experience with — the way Senator Johnson and Mr. Rayburn can 'take care of things'. But let me remind you that they did not 'take care of things' at Los Angeles — not even themselves." Besides, he said, Kennedy not Johnson would be president.

Shivers urged every Texan to read the national Democratic platform and compare it with the Republican platform and this state's own Democratic platform.

Shivers said he considered himself a Democrat and wanted to remain a Democrat, but that in this election, as in the last two Presidential elections, a choice must be made between the Democratic Party and the best interests of Texas, what is best for the free world, what is best for the U. S. and "what is best for your children and mine."

"This country cannot afford to wander off with John Kennedy toward his socialistic New Frontier when the world is on fire," Shivers warned.

The Lions did not waste too much time getting started Friday night as they scored five times in the first two periods once in the third period and then twice more in the final chapter.

A large delegation of Ozona followers were on hand for the contest and the visitors stands were completely filled with a good number of Ozona followers in the Rankin stands.

Rankin kicked off to the Lions and after two line smashes picked seven yards a third down sweep failed to gain when the runner cut back out of an open field and was stopped for no gain.

Carl Montgomery kicked well into the wind and Rankin looked like it was going to make a contest out of it as they rushed for a first down in three plays before a fumble fell into the alert arms of Wayne Albers to give the Lions their first scoring chance.

On the first play Jim Doran cut outside of tackle on a counter and raced 40 yards to the end zone for the game's first score.

A few minutes later the Lions added a second counter when another fumble deep in Red Devil territory set the Lions up with Jim Freeman skirting end for the final 10 yards and the touchdown.

But, generally, the control of in-
sects in and around the household
is a very real problem, says C. F.
Garner, extension entomologist.

Certain pests may be found and
controlled outside but some live
entirely within the home. The on-
ly way to control these house-
dwellers is to apply insecticides,
either sprays or dusts, inside the
home, Garner continues. Fumiga-
tion is seldom necessary, but in
case it is, the homeowner should
rely on a professional extermina-

tor.
Chemical control should be sup-
plemented with sanitation and good
housekeeping if it is to do its job
properly. Insects live in cracks
under bits of wood and other ob-
jects, in the walls and beneath the
floors of homes, and in almost any
dark, quiet place. Hiding places
such as these should be cleaned
but even the most spotless homes
may occasionally become infested.

The Texas Agricultural Extension
Service has prepared a leaf-

let, L-311 "Texas Guide for Con-
trolling Household Insects", which
contains the latest recommended
controls for 24 pests. In addition
to the controls, the leaflet con-
tains a section on insecticidal for-
mulation and one on equipment
needed for application. A copy
guide may be obtained from the
local county agents office.

Ozona Child Treated At Gonzales Center

Brent C. Saunders, son of Mrs. Maxine Saunders of Ozona, Texas was admitted to The Texas Rehabilitation Center, Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, on September 26.

At the Center, he will have a program of rehabilitation treatments prescribed for him by the medical director, a specialist in physical medicine and rehabilitation.

The medical program at TRC is made up of physical therapy, occupational therapy, clinical psychology, speech therapy, 24-hour rehabilitation nursing, and recreational therapy. These are prescribed as needed for the individual patient.

In rehabilitation at the Center, the entire person is considered. Church services are offered, there is a school for children, and entertainment programs are held regularly. The goal is maximum rehabilitation — physically, socially, and emotionally — so the person can live and work to the best of his abilities.

TRC is a non-profit, non-sectarian hospital which assures needed care to Texans of all ages who have been disabled by many kinds of accidents and diseases. About 55 per cent of the operating budget must come from contributions of Texas citizens.

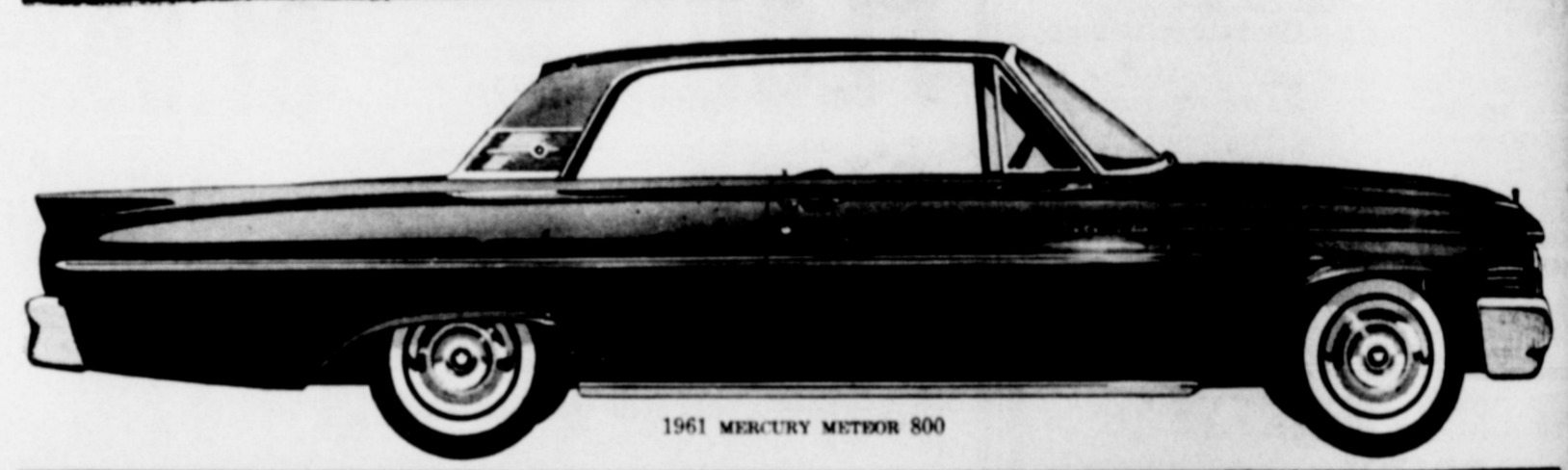
