oters were in an antagonis- mood toward three proposed changes in the Texas constitution last week, but they approved one amendment termed "a step forward for Texas cities and towns."

Down the drain went proposals to set up a state commission officials' ethics and legislative pay, to increase the fare ceiling and to permit institutional amendments to be submitted in special sessions. Whether welfare defeat will be an early cut in assistance to needy is the subject of disagreement. It's a cinch legislators will get no early raise, although they can get their own code of ethics statute.

Amendment adopted creates \$100 million bond fund for construction of city or regional Texas Water Quality Board. Texas newspaper publisher, Atlanta newspaper publisher, said option of the bond amendment is a "stride we very much need to make in order to reach our goal of meeting statewide water quality standards by 1975."

Clean water goals, said, cannot be achieved unless cities improve the quality of sewage discharges into rivers and streams. Financing has been a major drawback for municipalities.

Amendment provides for a matching grants program. State will make available on loan basis 50% of the eligible cost of sewage treatment plant construction.

With the state program, federal grants (now only 35%) can be increased to 50%. That gives cities with only 25% of project cost to bear immediately.

Fulcher said he is hopeful cities will move forward with the "greatest of haste" to take advantage of additional federal aid.

ALLOWABLE CUT

Statewide oil allowable for 1971 has been cut to 25.4% potential, lowest market demand factor since August.

Railroad Commission set the rate after four of 14 major oil purchasers asked for a cut, seven requested the same level for June as in May.

New allowable will permit maximum production of 3,806 barrels daily, nearly what oil purchasers requested. Reduction was the second in a row, after allowable remained at 81.1% for three months. Last June's market demand factor was only 25.4%.

NEW PARKS OPEN

Seven new state parks will be available for use this summer, but some of them are not yet "roughing it."

Three of the parks are expected to be open only. They are Pedernales Falls near Johnson City, Nueces Tanks near Johnson City, and Dinosaur Valley near Glen Rose.

No water supply is available at any of the three, and picnic tables and toilets are the only facilities.

Public access at New Galveston Island State Park is restricted to the beach area. Picnicking is allowed at Copper Breaks State Park in Hardeman County, but there is not water and no facilities.

Camping is allowed at Lake Arrowhead State Park in Aransas County, but no water is available.

Most completely developed of the new tracts are Nall's Creek and Birch Creek units in Somerville State Park near Natchitoches.

All of the new parks, with the exception of Copper Breaks and Galveston Island, are a one-dollar-per-vehicle fee.

COURTS SPEAK

Supreme Court in 20 minutes reversed a district judge's ruling that a legislator is entitled to automatic compensation of a case in which he represents a client seeking a legislative session.

Supreme Court ordered a retrial in the case of an island turkey farmer who is

suing an insurance company for collapse of a steel barn following a snow storm. Insurance company is fighting the \$7,450 claim, contending that the building collapse was partially caused by the snow storm and such damage is not covered by its policy.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the 10-year probation sentence of a Dallas man for shooting two Dallas police officers in 1968.

AG OPINIONS

Tuition equalization grants by the state to students at private colleges would not violate the constitution, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held in a new opinion. Martin said the grants, proposed in a bill before the Legislature, would not be counter to the separation of church and state doctrine.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

*Tax assessor-collector when designated by an independent school district to assess its taxable property at a greater rate of value than for state and county purposes has no choice but to comply. School district is expected to appoint its own board of equalization.

*The penal code prevents renewal of a contract with a school teacher who has not taught for two or more years prior to a brother's being elected to the school board.

*Bill allowing personal checks of bonded cigarette distributors to be treated as cash payments by the state treasurer when received for payment of cigarette stamps or meter settings is constitutional. Requirement that all cigarettes be stamped by all distributors within a stated period is proper exercise of legislative discretion in collecting state revenue.

DRAFT CALL 640 - State Selective Service headquarters announced the June draft call of 640 Texans.

May call nationally was for 15,000 men. Department of Defense announced a combined May-June call of 20,000 men with a lottery number limitation of 125 for the combined call.

State Selective Service Director Melvin N. Glantz said 1,750 Texans will be ordered to take pre-induction physical examinations next month.

Local draft boards have mailed orders for pre-induction and induction to men under their jurisdiction.

CRIME-FIGHT GRANTS APPROVED - Gov. Preston Smith approved 18 new grants totaling \$1,038,650 for crime-control projects.

Three are for police training in El Paso, Hudspeth, Culberson, Jeff Davis, Presidio and Brewster counties; Victoria and at Department of Public Safety headquarters. Twenty education service centers will get \$42,550 for drug education programs in Edinburg, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Victoria, Houston, Wichita Falls, Richardson, Austin, San Angelo, Lubbock, El Paso, Huntsville, Kilgore, Mount Pleasant, Fort Worth, Waco, Abilene, Amarillo, Midland and San Antonio. Seven grants for \$147,274 go to juvenile delinquency control in Harris County area, Nueces County, Dallas County, Brooks County, Dallas County, Texas and Webb County.

Big Spring, Lubbock and Dallas got \$474,873 for professional aids for police. Nueces County got \$21,692 for probation reform. Houston and Corpus Christi's Coastal Bend Regional Planning Council received \$182,877 and \$9,277 grants, respectively for research and development projects. Bexar County got \$30,000 to finance the plan and design a computerized subject-in-process system for arrest and trial records.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor Smith said he has no intention of running for the U.S. Senate, but may run for governor again.

Six hundred million dollar tax bill was signed by the Gov. and will go into effect July 1. Eight bills termed by Lt. Gov.

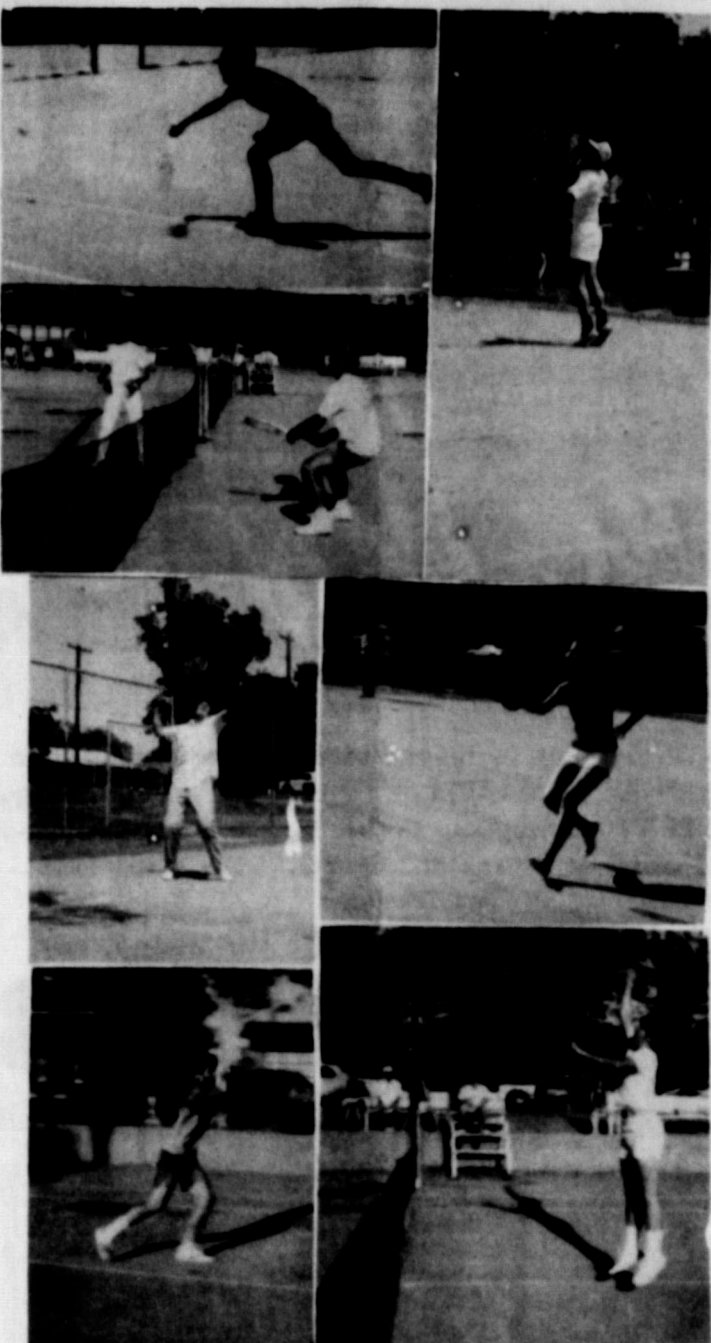
Country Club Pool To Open Sunday

Play began officially at 8 a.m. Saturday morning and continued non-stop until shortly after midnight. The remaining preliminary matches and most final matches were played Sunday afternoon, beginning at 1 p.m. The last point was won at about 9 p.m.

Tournament chairmen Sam Haynes and Terry Hugg kept the tournament moving, but the great number of entries in the men's division (19 singles and 10 teams in doubles) over crowded the two city tennis courts. Some matches had to be played on two private courts outside of town.

DROUGHT CONDITIONS

We hear a lot in the news about what is being done in the way of Government help. We also hear a lot of what is not being done.

I thought it might be interesting to analyze some of the relief measures that have been placed into effect.

First, emergency loans by the F.H.A. The last time I did any checking, there had been only six loans approved for Gray County residents.

The rule stating a farmer or rancher is ineligible if he can obtain credit elsewhere at a reasonable rate has been waived during this emergency period. There are certain requirements that must be cleared with a farmer or rancher's bankers before these loans can be made. Most farmers and ranchers feel they might jeopardize their regular banking channels to apply for these F.H.A. loans.

GRAZING DIVERTED AND CAP ACRES

Probably the most benefit has been received on this from farmers on High Plains that have droughted out wheat. They could graze this acreage after May 15th - cut off grazing date on diverted or set-aside acreage. Since most wheat grazing is over by June 1st, this will mean they are getting the benefit of grazing for two weeks for free on dryland diverted wheat acres. However on diverted irrigated wheat acres, there is a charge. The minimum time you can gain approval on wheat grazing is one month. I know one individual that paid \$62.00 to graze 62 acres and the wheat grazing played out after three days, a little expensive.

FEED PROGRAM

The much publicized approval of the feed program for basic livestock herds has been of no benefit to Gray County ranchers at this time, even though Gray County was among the first county in the Panhandle to be approved.

There have been only four ranchers make application for emergency feed. No doubt the strict regulations that govern this phase of the program have discouraged ranchers from making application. Here are these regulations.

This program is for those 1. who do not have sufficient feed for livestock, 2. have suffered a serious loss of crops, 3. feed purchases are larger than usual because of the emergency and 4. to those to whom it would be an undue financial hardship to obtain sufficient feed through normal trade channels. A financial statement will be required for all producers applying for this program. Only foundation livestock are eligible. Undue hardship is deemed to exist only when the applicant's financial resources would prevent his obtaining feed from normal suppliers, (a) imperiling continuance of his farming operations (b) defaulting on existing financial obligations; (c) unsound borrowing; or (d) excessive disposal of livestock. The program has been approved through June 30 and eligible producers may obtain grain from CCC stocks or convert the eligibility to purchase hay which they will locate.

For people in the McLean area that own the basic cow herds the approval to graze diverted or set-aside acreage is of little benefit since there is no vegetation on these diverted acres on the account of the drought.

Accent on Health

When most Americans think about cancer, visions of lung cancer and cigarette smoking usually come to mind. Yet, cancer can occur on any part of the body, and there are many kinds of cancer that occur as often as lung cancer -- cancer of the colon and rectum, for instance.

Cancer of the colon and rectum, parts of the large intestine, or bowel, is the fourth leading type of cancer in America. Only skin, lung, and breast cancer occur more frequently. Each year approximately 76,000 new cases of cancer of the colon and rectum are diagnosed. There will be about 2,800 new cases found in Texas alone in 1971, according to the Texas State Department of Health. More than 90% of the patients are past 40 years of age. Men and women are affected in almost equal numbers.

Cancer of the colon and rectum, like other types of cancer, is characterized by abnormal uncontrolled growth cells which can spread to other parts of the body. Since the tumors formed by the rapid cell growth of cancer interfere with normal body functioning and threaten life, they are called malignant. Benign tumors, on the other hand, are growths that remain localized and usually do not threaten life.

This type of cancer claims the lives of some 46,000 Americans every year. However, recent studies show an upward trend in the percentage of patients living at least 4 years after the diagnosis. This improvement in the "survival rate" may result, in part, from an increase over the years in the percentage of patients diagnosed early and treated by surgery.

The earliest sign of the disease in most cases is the presence of blood in the stools. Symptoms that may indicate the presence of a tumor in the colon or rectum include:

ANTLERLESS SEASON

A total of 73 landowners controlling some 121,563 acres of huntable deer lands received permits for harvesting antlerless deer in eight Panhandle
