Escapes with over \$825 cash ...

Armed robber hits liquor store

B and J's Package Store located on Second Street in downtown Colorado City, was robbed of over \$825 Saturday evening by a robber armed with a silver-plated handgun said Chief of Police David Montgomery.

The suspect in the armed robbery, described as a 6' 2", 140 pound black male, approximately 26 years-old, entered the store around 7 p.m. Saturday and purchased a six-pack of beer. Clerk Minnie Regalado said he then pulled out the pistol and demanded all the \$20, \$10 and \$5 bills in the register.

He fled south on foot from the store into some dense undergrowth according to Regalado.

The suspect was wearing a grey toboggan and a grey sweatshirt.

In Austin
City officials to meet with Water Board in hopes of funding for water and sewer

And on Friday Jan. 21, the mayor and city manager plus Glen Hemphill and engineer Dan Dowdy will meet with the Texas Water Development Board for a pre-application hearing in hopes of securing funds for the city's water and sewer development program.

Sales tax rebate increases by 11%

Colorado City's sales tax rebate is off to a good start for 1994 as Comptroller John Sharp's check to the city is up 11.18 percent over the first check of 1993.

The city will receive \$25,419 as compared to \$22,863 from one year ago.

These payments include taxes collected on November sales and reported to the Comptroller in December.

Statewide, rebates were up an impressive 24.8 percent.

County to ask city's participation in buying pagers for Fire Dept.

On a 3-0 vote with one commissioner abstaining, the commissioners' court voted to purchase 13 new pagers for the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department.

It was not that Precinct 4 commissioner Bill Preston did not want the CCVFD to have any new pagers - his motion to buy 20 new pagers had failed earlier for a lack of a second.

Pat McKinney addressed the court on behalf of the department and said they needed 20 new pagers to replace some that are not currently working and cannot be repaired. The total cost of his request came to \$7920.

Precinct 2 commissioner Carl Guelker stated that the City of Colorado City should purchase some of the pagers based on the percentage of calls the department responds to within the city limits.

Preston replied that the court had recently purchased pagers for the Westbrook Volunteer Fire Department and had not asked the City of Westbrook to participate in the purchase and his motion at this time died for lack of a second.

Guelker then made the motion to purchase 13 pagers and have the CCVFD ask the city to purchase 7 more.

The motion passed 3-0 with Preston abstaining in the vote.

Rob Junell honored by Dallas Crime Commission

State Representative Rob Junell of San Angelo was named as a "1993 Legislative Crime Fighter of the Year" by the Board of Directors of the Greater Dallas Crime Commission at a luncheon held Tuesday in Dallas.

Junell was one of 15 Senators and Representatives honored by the organization for their "dedication and commitment to improving the criminal justice system in Texas."

Junell has been a tireless worker for Mitchell County in securing TDCJ facilities.

The 1000-bed Wallace Unit is slated to be open this Spring and 300 more beds are to be added to the facility also. Plus, a 1000-bed state jail is to be constructed adjacent to the Wallace Unit.

Over 700 jobs will become available when these facilities open here.

Other area legislators receiving the award were Sen. John Montford of Lubbock, and Rep. Allen Place of Gatesville.

The Honorable Janet Reno, United States Attorney General, was the keynote speaker for the event.

1900-1994

Blanche Hamm passed away Friday, January 14, 1994 in Bishop Davies Center, Hurst, Texas, having been blessed with life of 93 years, 16 days.

She was the first of seven children of Thomas and Rose Service Durham. Born December 28, 1900 in Sterling City, she lived in several towns as her father established newspapers about this area of Texas. She graduated from Vernon High School in 1917. She attended S.M.U. Dallas in the school's early days, where she joined Sigma Kappa sorority. On January 27, 1925 she married Harold Ray (Sie) Hamm in the Methodist Church, Merkel, with Rev. Shea as minister. They moved to Colorado City in 1940 from Sweetwater. Mr. Hamm, who preceded her in death on March 21, 1986, was a druggist at the Colorado Drug Store until 1967 when they moved to Fort Worth. At the time of her death she was a member of Davis Memorial Methodist Church, Fort Worth, was involved in women's work and a Bible group of that church. Abilene is "Capital City" on Thursday

Governor Ann Richards has selected Abilene as the site for her fourth "Capital for a Day" program on January 20, 1994. The program, designed to bring state government to the people of Texas, is the first one to be held in the western area of the state. The first three were held in Carthage, Paris and Clear Lake respectively.

"We are delighted that the first West Texas 'Capital for a Day' program will be held in Abilene," said Mayor Gary McCaleb. "It is an honor for us to host the governor and state agency heads and a unique opportunity for Abilene to play a small role in helping government reach the people in [a] personal and meaningful way."

Virtually every major state agency will set up shop from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Abilene Civic Center to answer questions and address specific concerns of local citizens. "Our goal is to listen and to make ourselves available to the people of Texas," Richards said. "Local participation is critical to the success of the program. I encourage the citizens of the Abilene region to come to the Abilene Civic Center and personally tell those of us in government what's on their minds."

The day's events will culminate with a Town Hall meeting beginning at 7 p.m. in the Abilene Civic Center. Richards will make brief comments, then she and the agency heads will answer questions from the audience. Participants will be admitted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Hunter, Commissioner of Insurance; Andrew Sansom, Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife; John Poulard, General Services Commission, which deals with state purchasing, building services, etc.; Richard Ladd, Texas Department of Health and Human Services; David Smith, Texas Department of Health; Burton Raiford, Commissioner of Human

Services; Ronnie Krist, Texas Department of Public Safety; Bill Burnett, Texas Department of Transportation; Henry Flores, Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. Also expected are still-to-be-named representatives of the Attorney General's office, Comptroller's office and Public Utilities Commission.

Some officials are also expected to be available for tours or other activities in the community. Any-

OUTDOORS

Deer season is now over. There were some good deer killed and some nice young ones passed on until next year. Most of all I am proud of the fact that no one was mistaken for a deer or accidentally shot this year, even though there were a couple of floorboards that were slightly aerated. Maybe our efforts towards "hunter safety" are starting to pay off.

As I said, deer season is over but the hunting season is not. There is still plenty of hunting left. Quail season is still on and will continue until February 27 at 15 birds a day and a 45 bird possession limit. We had two good quail hatches this year but that cold 4-inch rain back in early October decimated the birds in some places, so the hunting has been below par with covies being spotty.

Sandhill crane season is also in full swing (November 13 through February 13). More and more people are beginning to pursue this long-legged migratory bird. Hunting them can be very challenging and addictive. Three birds a day with a plugged shotgun from 1/2 hour before sunrise to sunset is the rule on these migratory birds. In addition to a regular hunting license a "free" sandhill crane permit is required. Sandhills are good to eat but the breast is all that is worth

taking. Don't even think about eating the drumsticks unless you think boot leather is edible.

Furbearer season, sometimes known as "trapping season," started December 1 and runs through January 31. There are not many restrictions on furbearers, no size or bag limit. They may be hunted at night and a spotlight may be used (private property only). A \$15 trapper's license is needed. Furbearers include fox, raccoon, ringtail, opossum, badger, etc.

Coyotes, bobcats and cougars are not listed above. Even though they carry a pelt, they are non-game animals (predators) and may be killed any time, year round. Don't think that cougars are not around because they are. A 130 pound female was killed in Kent County.

a 150 pound male in Coke County and I've had a few reports of lions sighted in southern Mitchell County, with one being shot at by a local rancher.

Finally, Mitchell County also has a season (October 1 through February 27) on the javelina with a season limit of two. I've yet to run across any of these rodents nor have I seen any killed here but if anyone else has I would be happy to hear about it.

So before you put away your guns for another year, look at what other hunting is available. Now is the perfect time to introduce youngsters to hunting by starting them out on non-game animals and varmints with small caliber guns. Hunting can be a sport that is enjoyed not only for a few months but for the whole year.

It started with a letter from Dean Fisher of Archer City. He had read our story about old graves in Mitchell County.

"About two or three hundred yards due east of the old Cuthbert store and about a hundred yards west of FM 1229," Fisher wrote, "is the site of three early graves." The stone markers are now unreadable. "The late Mrs. T.D. Hendricks, who lived in the old Cuthbert school house in the late thirties, told me the history of the graves," Fisher added. "She said that a pioneer traveling west with his family in a covered wagon had his wife and two children become ill and die of a disease." The three were buried in what later became the Cuthbert community. The plot is fenced in by a chicken wire net fence in poor condition and falling down," according to Fisher, who last visited the site about a year or so ago.

Those aren't the only graves near Cuthbert. Five persons are buried in a pasture north of the townsite. The graves are enclosed within plastered adobe walls. A permanent marker was erected in 1993 by descendants of the deceased. Two of the graves belong to the great grandparents of Mrs. James (Betty) Barr of Vincent. She and one of her cousins, Wayne Johnson, had become concerned because trees were growing up around the adobe, causing it to crack. "We just wanted a permanent record in case something did happen to the graves," Mrs. Barr told us.

Those who are interred in what's now called the Eiland Cemetery are Charles Daniel Calvin Eiland, who died at the age of 78 in Shreveport, Louisiana; his wife Jerusia Winnifred Tolbert Eiland, who died at the age of 47 in Cuthbert; the third grave is that of the Eilands' tenth child, a son named Levi "Buddy" Eiland. He was shot to death when he was only about 14 years of age. The assailant shot him in the back, mistaking him for his father. (More on that in just a minute.) The remaining graves belong to "Baby Faussett," who was a child of Robert and Sarah Eiland Faussett (a daughter of Charles and Jerusia). The infant was born in 1890 and the date of her death is unknown. The last grave holds the remains of Buddy Whatley. Absolutely nothing is known about him.

Prior to the Eilands' deaths, they had a rock house just south and east of where their graves are. They were literally buried in their back yard. Now the house is gone and the graves are out in a pasture off the beaten track.

Getting back to Buddy Eiland, we couldn't help but wonder why the teenager was murdered. "They had range wars back then," Mrs. Barr explains. "My family, the Eiland family, raised sheep and they were in conflict with cattle people. That's my understanding of it. It was a war between the cattle people and the sheep people."

There was a time when Cuthbert was a bustling community. It had a post office, blacksmith shop, mercantile store, grocery store, a Methodist Church and various other businesses. Today all that remains of the community, which was founded in 1890, is the Cuthbert Cemetery and some graves spotted around the area.

Then, down on the Spade Ranch, there's the grave of Thomas Owen. He was a black cowboy who worked for an Englishman named Fred Rodway. Former Spade cowhand Fred McClellan says Rodway was a wagonboss back in the 1880s. He, his wife and their child lived at what was called the Peter-L Camp. "The child got sick," McClellan says. "Rodway sent that cowboy across the Colorado River (it ran right by the place) to get a doctor over in Coke County at a little place called Silver."

The river was up because of recent rains and the cowboy tried to swim across it. He got caught in a drift and drowned. "It washed him about a mile down the river," McClellan adds. When Owen's body was recovered, he was buried "in a horse pasture" that's now part of the Spade Ranch. The grave has a little barbed wire fence around it and McClellan says at one time it did have a wooden marker. "Mr. Otto Jones told me about it," McClellan adds. "He never said if Owen had any relatives or anything. It happened so long ago they've lost all the history on it. Very few people know about it."

Reckon how many other graves are located out in Mitchell County pastures? Unless stories like these are preserved or unless families like the Eilands erect markers those final resting places will eventually be lost to the ages. In the meantime, they serve as grim reminders that before we came men and women lived, toiled and died here. Just as we do today.

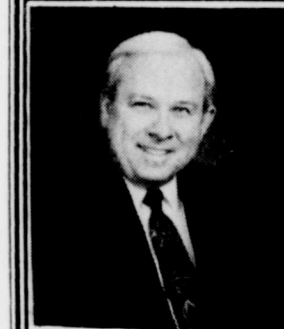
"Cindy and I have known Jere and Millie for many years," Stenholm said. "We count them among our dearest friends and appreciate their willingness to serve this year."

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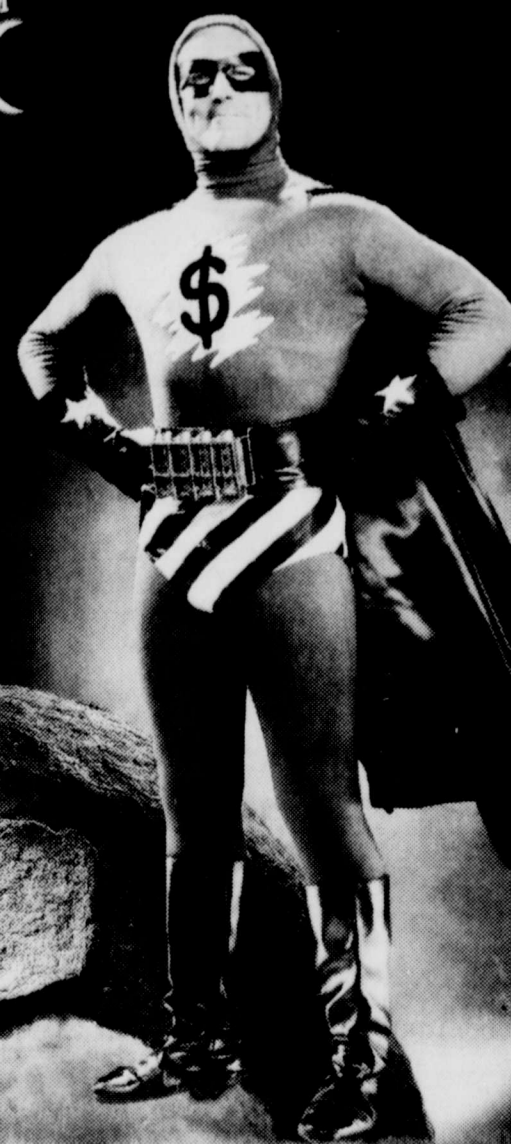
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LORAIN PERSONALS

FmHA gives loan approval locally

"Texas farmers applying for assistance from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will experience a breath of fresh air this year," George Ellis, FmHA Texas State Director, said this week.

"I have today taken action to delegate the full loan approval authority allowed under the Federal Regulations to FmHA County Offices in Texas," Ellis said.

This action means that FmHA supervisors at the county level will be able to exercise loan approval authority up to the full county limit without prior reviews being required at other locations or even by FmHA officials at the same location.

"As this new year begins, I feel this will be a real help to our farm customers and I intend to pursue this type of change in the future wherever I can," said Ellis.

FmHA county supervisors were previously subject to a complicated system of reviews and re-reviews of loan applications in order to approve an FmHA loan. This system was instituted several years ago in order to ensure fewer mistakes and more uniformity from county to county.

"I still intend to hold FmHA supervisors to the same high standards as in the past; however, I am also dedicated to streamlining the process so that our farm customers will have funds available to them at the time they are needed," said Ellis.
