TALCO TROJANS BLANK JAMES BOWIE PIRATES 30-0, FRIDAY

Talco's Trojans used a combination of bruising line play, the long run, passes and alert ball recovery to sink a game and scrappy band of James Bowie Pirates 30-0 in the opening District 17-A game Friday night in Talco.

Trojan linemen vied for honors with the flashy backs with some fine defensive play plus extra good blocking.

Guard Larry Slaughter roared down under a booming Sidney Bonds punt to stop the Bowie ball carrier on his own one yard line and put the Pirates in a hole from which they never fully recovered.

Two linemen, end Richard Parrish and guard Monty Rogers put the last two Pirate defenders to the ground to clear the way for Jackie Dixon's final sprint for a 55-yard touchdown.

The entire center of the line rushed the Bowie punter to set up the second Trojan TD with a fumble recovery on the one yard line.

End Albert Whitney along with tackles Roger Howard and Calvin Hammonds took turns at stopping Pirate ball carriers at the line of scrimmage in one of their best defensive games.

The Pirates moved the ball well to start the first period, racking up three first downs to one for the Trojans but neither team could muster a scoring threat. Two fine punts by Bonds plus the downfield speed and tackling of Trojan linemen kept the Pirates on the defensive.

Talco struck quickly in the second quarter after taking a Bowie punt on their own 45 yard line. Ronnie Nelson tossed a pass out of bounds attempting to hit Bonds going down the sideline on the first play, then on second down he handed off to the stocky Dixon who was cleared through his right tackle into the Bowie secondary.

From here the 165-pound

speedster alternated between fancy dancing and blasting to work his way back to the left sideline and a wave of Trojan blockers who cleared his way to the end zone and a great 55 yard touchdown jaunt. Bonds crashed over for the extra points.

The Pirates took the kickoff without a runback on their 21 yard line and in four plays ended up on their own one with the Trojans taking over. Bonds hit the line so hard he went all the way through the end zone before he could stop. Nelson called on Russell for the extra points and the blaster delivered to run the score to Talco 16-James Bowie 0.

The Trojans put on a sustained drive from their own 41 yard line to score their third TD. Russell, Bonds and Dixon alternated at the ball carrying. The drive included a 17-yard pass from Nelson to Bonds and 12-yard keeper play by Nelson. Russell made like a bulldozer again for the final twelve yards right up the middle with Pirate defenders literally bouncing off him as he plowed to the end zone. Talco was penalized back to the eight on their first attempt at the extra point then Nelson handed to Bonds who streaked around his left end to go in standing up and bringing the score to Talco 24-James Bowie 0.

The Trojans dominated the play in the second half though unable to score until the final period. The scoring drive was from the Talco 30 with a fine sprint of 33 yards by Dixon as the highlight and a six yard toss from Nelson to Parrish for the score. Another pass attempt for the extra points was broken up and the score held at Talco 30 and James Bowie 0.

The Trojans came through the game without injuries and have an open date this week to give them two weeks to prepare for the final three games with Queen City, Bogata and Jefferson.

Pub. Works Meet Scheduled Oct. 30

The passage of P. L. 87-658 setting up the Accelerated Public Works Program has created considerable interest throughout the Northeast Texas area. The provisions of this program were designed to help small towns and communities with their sewer and water programs, the development of recreational facilities, provides grants for airport projects, the construction of public buildings, sidewalks and drainage system.

Unemployment will be reduced during the construction period, giving the local economy a "shot in the arm" while enhancing chances for continued industrial growth.

Due to the large number of requests already received from towns asking for information about the program, it was felt that a general meeting would save everyone time and energy. Such a meeting has been set for October 30, at 10 a. m. at the Alps Cafe in Mt. Pleasant.

Employment Tax Return Is Due

Area employers are reminded that Oct. 31 is an important tax date. J. C. Bowen, administrative officer, Internal Revenue Service, Longview, said that date is the deadline for reporting and paying income and social security taxes withheld for the calendar quarter ended Sept. 30, 1962.

The IRS representative said employers should use Form 941 to report their tax liability for that period, and mail it, along with depository receipts and full payment of taxes due, to the District Director, IRS, Dallas, Texas.

He said employers who do not have a copy of Circular E, "Employers Tax Guide," may obtain it from IRS. This publication contains a full discussion of employment taxes, together with tables and percentage methods for computing such taxes.

The IRS representative said the law provides that taxpayers who made timely deposits in local authorized banks, or Federal Reserve Banks, of the taxes due, have an additional 10 days, or until November 12, to file their returns. Depository receipts must be submitted with the return, he added. He explained that November 12 is the due date this year because November 10 falls on a Saturday.

PRESIDENT PROCLAIMS NAVAL BLOCKADE OF CUBA SHIPPING

President Kennedy proclaimed a U. S. naval blockade against Cuba Monday night, saying the Russians have started to turn Cuba into an offensive military base capable of raining nuclear destruction on all the Americas.

Speaking grimly to the nation in a suddenly called radio-TV broadcast, Kennedy said the United States would wreak "a full retaliatory response upon the Soviet Union" if any nuclear missile is fired on any nation in this hemisphere.

Kennedy reported that within the past week the United States has received "unmistakable evidence" that—contrary to Soviet assurances—nuclear-type, long-range missile sites and atomic-capable Soviet jet bombers are being established in Cuba.

American and Russian ships Tuesday headed toward a possible showdown as President Kennedy officially ordered U. S. war-

ships to halt, search and seize if necessary all vessels nearing Cuba, effective at 10 a. m. EDT Wednesday.

The proclamation, entitled "interdiction of the delivery of offensive weapons to Cuba," authorized the Defense Department to use U. S. naval, military and air power to block delivery to the Castro regime of specific arms.

The Defense Department warned even before the proclamation was issued that any ship trying to run the blockade would be sunk if necessary to halt delivery of offensive arms. Such force would not be necessary if the vessels turned back from Cuba or if they submitted to search.

Officials said the proclamation was made effective at 10 a. m. EDT Wednesday to give all countries time to receive notice of the quarantine. They said that, in general, such notice is required by international law.

Principal speaker for the joint session will be Senator A. M. Aikin, Jr. of Paris. The memorial service will be held at 11 a. m. at the Presbyterian Church with Norlan Scudder in charge. Lunch will be served at 12:00 noon. Immediately following lunch the American Legion and Auxiliary will hold their separate business sessions.

PAROLE SYSTEM — Confidence is expressed by officials that delinquents are being rehabilitated under the Texas parole system which was set in motion in 1957. Program provided for an eventual organization of 70 parole officers which is now coming into being on schedule. Last 30 trainees, studying to take up their tasks, will complete the group whose activities are expected to reduce the work load for each parole officer in the field from 100 to 75 cases.

Parole system is under the direction of Ray W. Williams, acting in the absence, on leave, of Vincent O'Leary who is serving with the National Council on Crime and Delinquency. Officials of the Pardon and Parole office feel the public doesn't fully appreciate the fact that, if Texas didn't have a parole system, prisoners would serve their time and be released without any supervision whatever.

POLIO COUNT — Latest polio

count by the State Health Department showed 229 cases in Texas so far this year, with 174 of them paralytic.

Last year at the same time there were 29 paralytic cases on record. One new case each was recorded in Bexar and Coryell Counties.

TRUCK HEARING — Truck operators who have applied for permits to haul fruit and vegetables over the State were examined by attorneys for common carriers at a hearing before a Railroad Commission examiner here.

Some felt the hearing would last until Christmas. It is a continuation of similar sessions held earlier at San Antonio, Lubbock and McAllen.

More than 130 operators are seeking the permits authorized by the Legislature in 1961. Common carriers oppose granting the permits on the ground that there is no need for them.

ESCHEAT LAW — Reports to the State treasury department indicate there is approximately \$3,140,000 in personal property in Texas subject to the new escheat law.

So far the State has collected \$108,000 through three suits. But 346 reports of this kind of property have been certified to the attorney general. Involved is \$678,724 more.

It may turn out that the \$3,140,000 estimate is too high, so far as the state's expectations of getting the money are concerned. This since a lot of owners of the property are being found.

In other instances it was discovered that some property is not subject to escheat, or at least not yet.

Seven years have to elapse before the State can make a claim. At this stage, it appears that the best "mining" country will be old meter deposits.

TEXAS GROWTH — Industrial growth of Texas in the next 15 years is being projected by the State Industrial Commission in a brochure called "Goals for Texas."

It will be several weeks before

the brochure is finished and ready for distribution. But Commission officials feel it can be adapted to the needs of any area or community with benefits for all. Commission based its plan on National Planning Association studies, and got assistance also from the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

CRUDE DEMAND UP — Texas Railroad Commission reports that purchasers' nominations for Texas crude oil in November have increased.

November requests average 2,524,186 barrels daily. This is 33,853 more than for October.

Commission is expected to keep its 8-day schedule for prorated wells in November. This would increase the daily average permissible by almost 50,000 barrels. October is the ninth consecutive month on 8-day production.

INTEGRATION VOTE — Texas' governor apparently won't be plagued with integration nightmares like Arkansas and Mississippi.

University of Texas students in Austin will vote on the subject on November 14. Vote will be on integration of living and dining facilities and the school's athletic teams.

Currently, Negroes take part in intramural contests, but there are no Negroes on varsity teams. University cafeteria facilities are integrated and 15 Negro students live in an integrated men's dormitory.

University has one dormitory for Negro women but they are excluded from all other women's dormitories.

HIGHWAYS ON SCHEDULE — Texas is on schedule with its 3,033-mile portion of the 41,000-mile Interstate Highway System. Program is reportedly running behind in other states.

Texas has consistently led all other states in completion of its portion of the superhighways since the program was initiated in 1956. Texas' program also has operated at costs substantially below the national average.

THE EYES AND EARS of people all over the world are attuned to radios and television since Monday's proclamation by President Kennedy of a naval blockade against shipping of offensive weapons to Cuba. No one knows what to expect. It is a game of wait and see. But a strong stand has been taken by people of this hemisphere in a solid front against allowing Communism to have missile bases in this area to threaten our way of life. The Congress and Senate of the United States have joined unanimously in support of the President's proclamation.

MANY QUESTIONS in the minds of Christian people over the world are to be answered in the near future: Will the Communists slow down or retreat in the face of the blockade placed on Cuba by the United States on Monday; will they fight back; will they counter with another move in a different location; was our timing right. Hind-sight is always more accurate than foresight. Maybe we should have acted sooner—but when? Everyone knows we don't want war. We are opposed to force. But on one thing most all Americans will agree—time has been running out fast and something had to be done. Let us hope we have acted wisely in the past and right will prevail in the future.

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Brief Digest Of Amendments To Be Voted Nov. 6

A brief digest of the 14 proposed amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election on Nov. 6, follows:

No. 1 on the Ballot (HJR 25)—Provides workmen's compensation insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

No. 2 (SJR 9)—Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy blind and needy children from forty-seven million dollars (\$47,000,000) to fifty-two million dollars (\$52,000,000).

No. 3 (SJR 22)—Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochil-tree and Hopkins Counties.

No. 4 (HJR 46)—Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

No. 5 (HJR 51)—Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

No. 6 (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

No. 7 (SJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

No. 8 (SJR 7)—Establishes a ceiling of two million, five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

No. 9 (HJR 70) — Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to

authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

No. 10 (SJR 12) — Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

No. 11 (SJR 25)—Authorizes resale or repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

No. 12 (SJR 19) — Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

No. 13 (SJR 6)—Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is

in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

No. 14 (HJR 32) — Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.

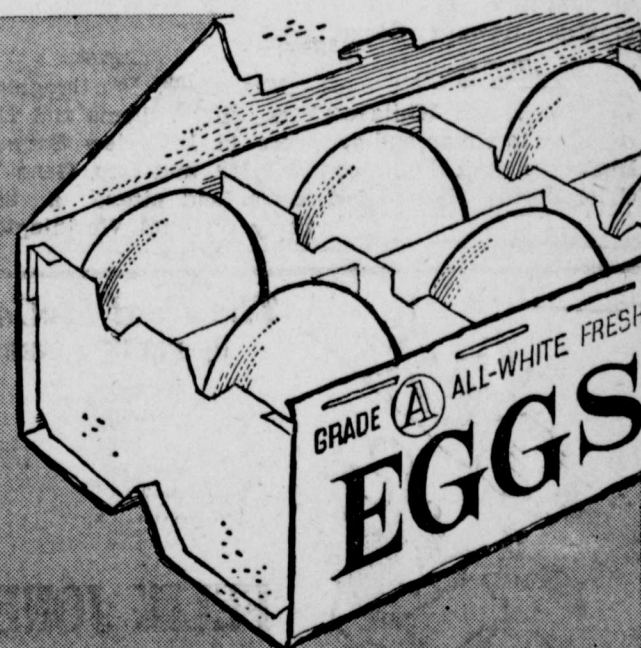
