First Of Parking Meters Arrive To Be Installed Soon

The first shipment of parking meters, to be installed in the business area of Cisco, arrived here Monday for assembly, city officials reported today.

Actual installation was expected within the next week. Mayor G. C. Rosenthal said Tuesday. Approximately 300 meters are to be set up.

Grand Jury Indicts One; Adjourns

The 12-man Eastland County Grand Jury recessed Thursday night, after being in session one day and returning an indictment against W. T. Caldwell of Cisco.

Caldwell was charged with a recent burglary of a Cisco residence. He was being held in an Eastland County jail.

The jury was expected to reconvene this week, probably Thursday.

Cisco Contributions To Flood Relief Climbs To \$325

An additional \$230 in contributions was received by the Daily Press for the Fort Worth Flood Relief Fund and the money was forwarded to that city Tuesday.

The First Baptist Church contributed \$125 and the Walker Bible Class of the First Baptist Church sent an additional \$100. W. P. Caldwell contributed \$5.00. The above sum brings the total contributed thus far to \$325.

The Fort Worth Relief Agency issued a plea for additional help and the Press will accept contributions as long as the need remains. A call for clothing, bedding, furniture and food was also made and the Sunset Motor Lines will continue shipping the merchandise to the area without charge.

New Bridge For County Is Approved

Approval of a \$21,000 expenditure for construction of a new bridge and approaches on State Highway 6, between Eastland and Carbon, was announced this week by the Texas State Highway Department.

The new bridge, the department said, will replace an antiquated one-way structure, just south of Eastland on Highway 6. Construction was expected to begin soon.

Rains Cause Postponement Of ABC Club's Summer Swimming School

Rains which drenched Cisco over the week-end caused postponement of the ABC Club's "Learn to Swim School," scheduled to get underway today. Athletic Director Jack Everett announced. A second date was not disclosed.

Local Man Injured By Accidental Shotgun Blast Tuesday Night

LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEM TO GET ADDITIONAL TEACHERS

Arlin Birt, superintendent of the Cisco Public Schools, announced that the teacher load for the coming school year has been figured and that the local schools would employ two additional instructors to carry on the work under new school regulations.

A total of 42 teachers were used last year and under new school laws which figure teacher needs on an average daily student attendance record, 44 will be required. The loss of Ocular and Grapevine districts will cost the local system two teachers if the students attend Eastland schools. However, most of the students have made application to continue in the Cisco schools and if the entire group returns it will require 46 teachers.

In the recent action by the County Board the local school system increased its taxable valuation to approximately \$5,000, 000 and school board members reported that the financial condition of the schools were better than they had been for many years.

Mr. Birt reported that the teachers elected would continue in the assignments they had handled for several years with a possible exception of one or two who would be changed because of the increase in some of the classes.

Joe Cook, Former Eastland County Newspaper Man, Wins High Honor

With the election of Joe T. Cook, editor of the Mission Press, and son-in-law of H. A. Canlies of Cisco, as president of the National Editorial Association in Salt Lake City, a host of memories was opened to his former home.

Born in Weatherford, December 9, 1909, Cook attended grade school there before his mother, Mrs. Mattie Cook, decided to move to Eastland. There, Joe Cook, her only son, was enrolled in high school and was employed as an apprentice printer in the Oil Belt News plant during school days.

Following his graduation from Eastland High School in 1927, he enrolled in the University of Texas. Long before he received his Journalism degree, Beta Kappa key, Cook had decided to follow the lure of a writer's ink.

During the years as a successful newspaperman, Cook brought many honors to his profession, ranked with his elevation this week to head the organization which has a membership of 5,600 in metropolitan newspapers, weeklies and small town dailies in 48 states.

Such recognition was a fore-runner to honors which have come in his profession since he led the staff of the Mission Press in January, 1933. He was one of four, now the staff includes 29.

A 25-year-old Cisco dry goods salesman was accidentally shot shortly before 10:30 p. m. Tuesday, by a 12 gauge shotgun he was cleaning in his downtown apartment.

F. N. Hassen, Jr., the victim, was in a local hospital today suffering from a severe gunshot wound that penetrated his right shoulder and chest.

Hospital attendants described his condition as "fair," but could not say whether the pellets from the discharge endangered his lungs. They said he lost considerable blood.

Hassen was first found by a passing motorist who saw him collapse in front of the Lemore Pharmacy, near the scene of the accident. Joe Lea Moore, a druggist, who heard Hassen's cries for help, summoned police and a Thomas Funeral Home ambulance. He was rushed to the hospital.

From indications, Hassen was sitting in his room with the shotgun in his hand when it was accidentally discharged, spraying the room with shot. A west wall and closet door facing were shattered. The gun was found on the floor.

From his room, Hassen apparently made his way downstairs in search of help. He fell twice on the sidewalks before collapsing on the corner of Avenue D and Fifth Street.

Mr. and Mrs. Hassen, owners of the Hassen Dry Goods Company here, were returning from Eastland at the time of the mishap. After parking the car in back of the building, they were told of their son's accident.

A tank crewman, Hassen served nearly one year in the Army at Camp Hood, Texas. He was given a medical discharge, and in 1944 returned to work for his father here.

WHEAT IS CIVILIZATION

It has been said that "wheat is civilization." Much of the history of the world has been determined by whether grain crops were good or bad. War, pestilence and famine have followed the failure of plantings.

This country is one of the largest grain producers, and the quality of each year's crop has a very direct bearing on the prosperity of agriculture and the national welfare as a whole. But grain in the fields has small value. It must be moved to the elevators at the major terminals and to the various centers where it is processed and turned into usable products.

This year, moving the grain presents an additional problem. Until recently, 300,000 carloads of last year's crop was held in storage

under government loans. That had to be moved before the beginning of the new harvest, to make space.

What agency of transportation can perform, swiftly, efficiently and economically, the big task of handling the wheat, barley, oats, corn and the rest? The only answer is, the railroads. The other carriers, valuable as they are in certain fields, just haven't the capacity. When it comes to mass transportation — the kind of transportation on which our industrial and agriculture economies rest — the iron horse is still supreme.

The grain crop is on the move — and it's moving on rails.
