Voters go to polls Saturday

Voters will go the polls Saturday to elect school board, city council and hospital district board members. Polls will be open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m.

The candidates for the various offices include:

Hospital District

Mitchell County Hospital District voters will choose from a field of four candidates when they fill three expiring board places.

The candidates are Margaret Baum, Connie Cooley Penland and incumbents Virgil Stone and A.K. McCarley Jr.

Not seeking re-election is Linden Solomon.

Voting places are the Civic Center in Colorado City, the Loraine Senior Citizens Building and the Westbrook Tax Office.

Colorado ISD

Five persons are unopposed in their election bid for places on the Colorado ISD board of trustees.

The candidates are Gary Parker, Place 2; Anita Biggers, Place 3; Yolanda Molina, Place 4; Dwayne Harris (incumbent), Place 6; and Floyd Ritchey (incumbent), Place 7.

Places 2 and 3 are three-year terms and places 4, 6 and 7 are two-year terms. Places 1 and 5 will be up for election next year. Kathy Bassham holds the Place 1 position on the board and Dr. Billy Bridgford holds the Place 5 position.

The other board members whose terms are expiring are Brenda Aguillon, Ruben Alvarez and Eddie Gregory.

Voting locations on Saturday will be Place 2, Kelley Elementary School, 1435 Elm; Place 3, Hutchinson Elementary, 440 Cedar; Place 4, Colorado City Housing Authority, 439 Oak; Place 6, Colorado High School,

Colorado City Council

Colorado City will not have council election this year because of a suit filed against the city by LULAC which is seeking single member voting districts. Until the suit is resolved, no elections will be held.

Loraine City Council

In Loraine, four persons are seeking election to three places open on the council this year. The candidates include incumbent C.H. Hamilton, Sally Compton, Roy Price and S.L. Valeris.

Loraine ISD

Five persons are seeking election to three places on the Loraine ISD board of trustees.

County eyes alcohol/drug abuse program

The Mitchell County Commissioners' Court Tuesday morning agreed to support a Community Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse in conjunction with a Sweetwater-based organization which hopes to expand its services to Mitchell County.

Tom Watson, project director for Sweetwater Council on Al-

coholism and Drugs, said the program would provide counseling of individuals with substance abuse programs and in followup after the release of individuals from the Big Spring State Hospital and the Big Spring VA Hospital.

The Sweetwater organization presently provides services for

Runnels, Fisher, Nolan and Coke counties.

Commissioners agreed that there is need for such services, but said that because there is no money allocated in the 1990 budget, the county at this time can not help fund the program other than for in-kind services such as providing space to con-

duct DWI schools for felony probationers.

Watson said the council is applying for a \$35,000 matching grant from the state which, if granted, would provide money to hire another person who could be assigned to work in the Mitchell

 Fronstin said, "It is always a pleasure for the SBA to be a part of local activities where outstanding and deserving small business persons are recognized and honored."

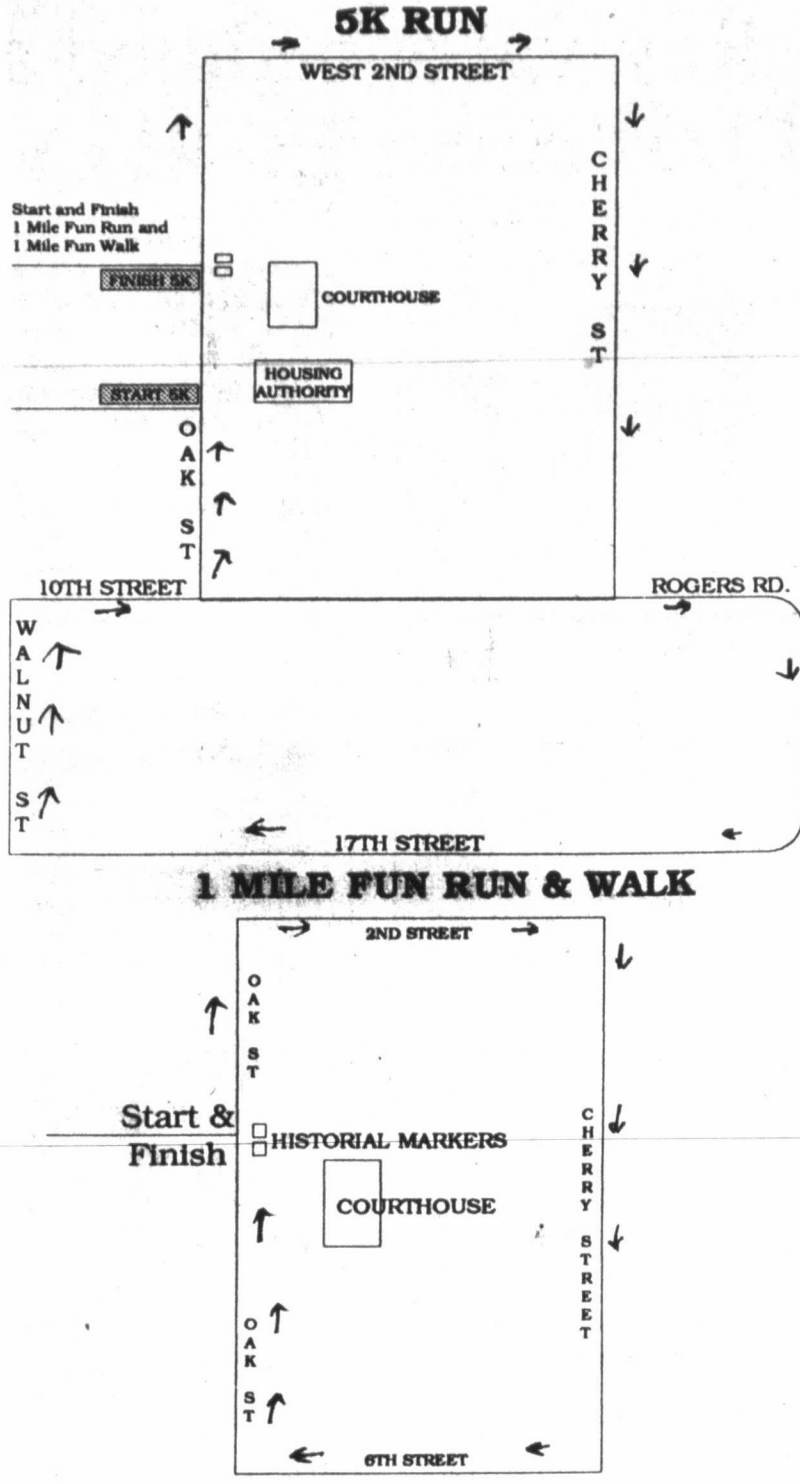

Pallbearers were James Lipham, Larry Blassingame, Bill Blassingame, Gene Blassingame, Cecil Odum and Royce Feaster.

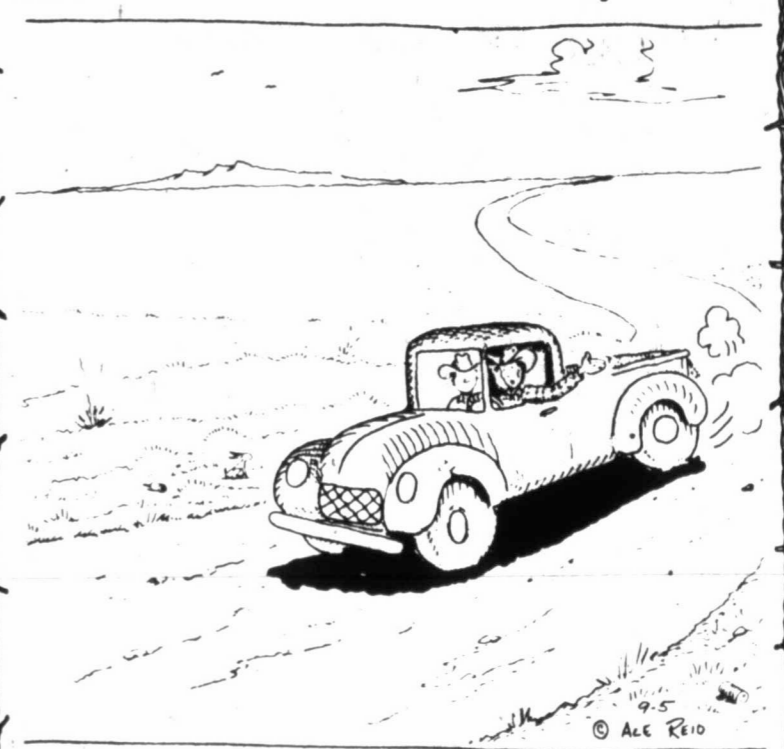

Kindergarten round-up slated

Kindergarten and pre-kindergarten round-up will be held May 8-9 from 8:15 a.m. to noon and 1-3:30 p.m. at the Wallace Center.

The child enrolled for kindergarten must be five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1990. The child enrolled for pre-kindergarten must be four years old on or before Sept. 1, 1990. Please be aware that no child will be enrolled for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten without a state birth certificate (not the hospital certificate with the footprints on it). A state certificate may be obtained from the county seat where the child was born.

The child enrolling in the pre-kindergarten program must also qualify under the bilingual program or the free lunch program. The pre-kindergarten program is a half-day program where the child will either attend the morning or afternoon session but not both. Transportation to and from school must be provided by the parents. Meals will not be served to children in the pre-kindergarten program for those that qualify under the lunch program.

Please help us plan for the next school by bringing your child to the round-up. We will be able to start the new school year in a better way if we know how many students to expect. Please notify anyone else that you may know of with pre-school age children.

Also, when enrolling your child in pre-kindergarten or kindergarten, please have the Social

Security number and their immunization record with you or the address from which the immunization record can be obtained. The following immunizations are required upon enrollment to the Colorado Independent School District, according to Texas law:

Oral Polio: At least three doses of oral polio vaccine are required. At least one of those must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

DTP: At least three doses of DTP vaccine are required. At least one of those doses must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

Mumps: One dose of mumps vaccine is required or provide a physician-validated history of mumps illness.

Rubella: One dose of rubella

vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the 12th birthday.

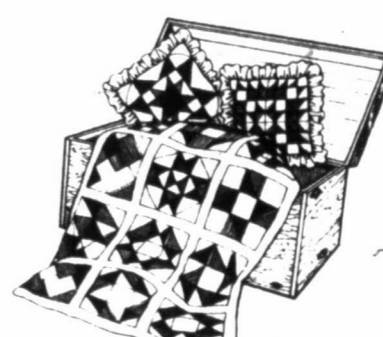

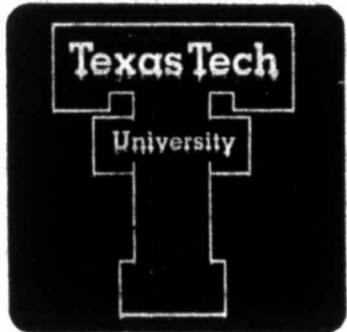

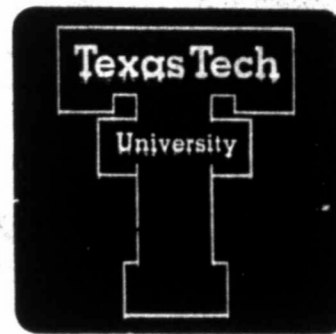

Ross qualifies for state

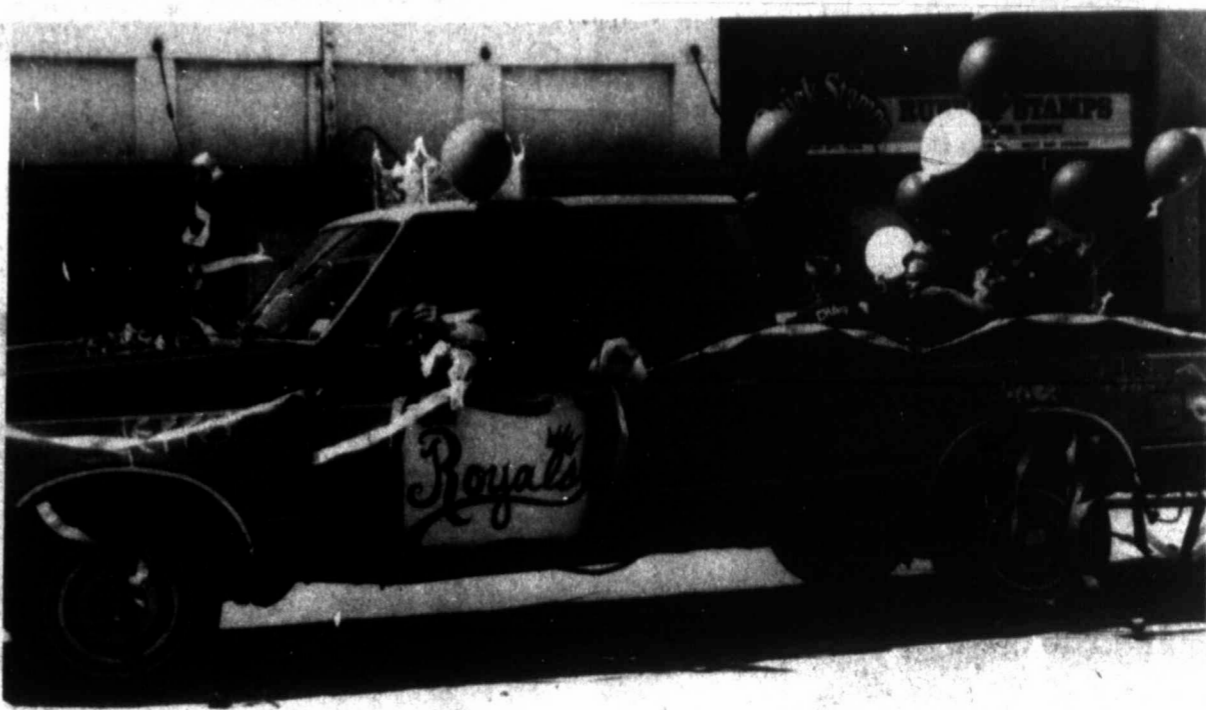
STATE-BOUND - Crescent Ross, a freshman at Colorado High School, ran a 12.30 in the 100 M. Dash at the Regional Track Meet in Odessa on April 28. Ross placed second which qualifies her as a participant at the State Track Meet to be held in Austin on May 11-12.

Crescent Ross, a freshman at Colorado High School, is state-bound in the 100 Meter Dash with a phenomenal time of 12.30. Ross placed second at the District Track Meet, and she placed second at the Regional Meet behind Tammy Starks of Wylie who ran a 12.25. Ross had the second fastest qualifying time, and the Lady Wolf showed great determination to come from behind to finish in a close second. Also placing well for the Lady Wolves were Christi Hulme, who is also a freshman, and sophomore, Rosemary Rosas in the discus. Hulme placed third in the discus with a sound throw of 115'2 in gusty wind, while Rosas placed sixth with a heave of 112'9.

Kevin Green had the best showing for the Wolves. Green, only a sophomore, ran a 22.7 in his preliminary heat in the 200 M. Dash, but in the finals, Green ran a much slower time of 23.71 to finish seventh overall. In the Pole Vault, George Ramsey and Cade Proctor ended the season strong. Ramsey vaulted 12'6" to tie his personal best, and Proctor soared over 11'6" to establish his best efforts of the season. Gabriel Ornelas has ran extremely consistant in the 800 M. Run throughout his final track season, but in his final competition of the year, Ornelas' time of 2:04.14 was not fast enough to compare with a young man from Canyon High School who won the event with a time of 1:54.8.

Although the track season is over for a few senior leaders, Colorado High will experience track success with young, competitive athletes. 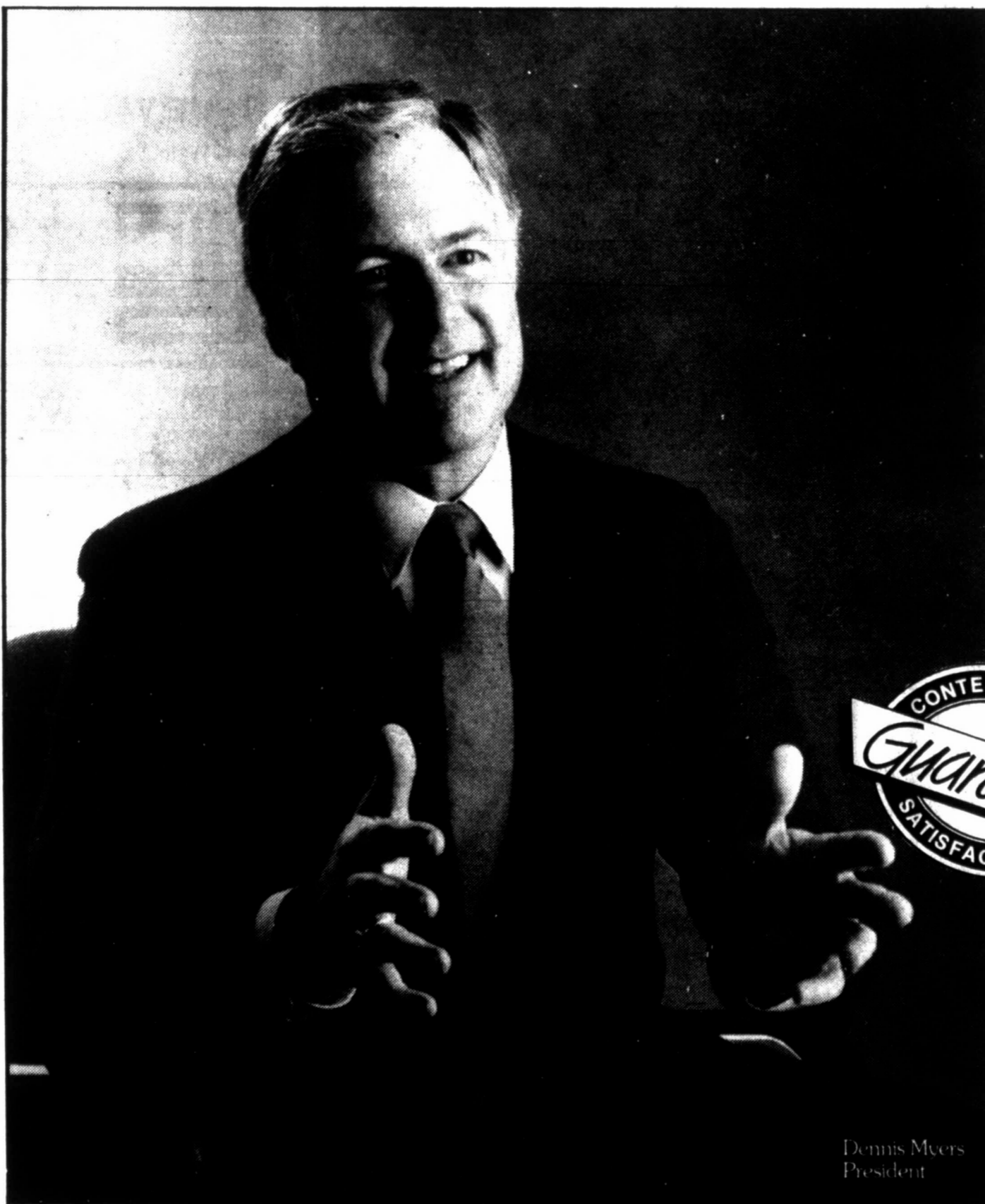

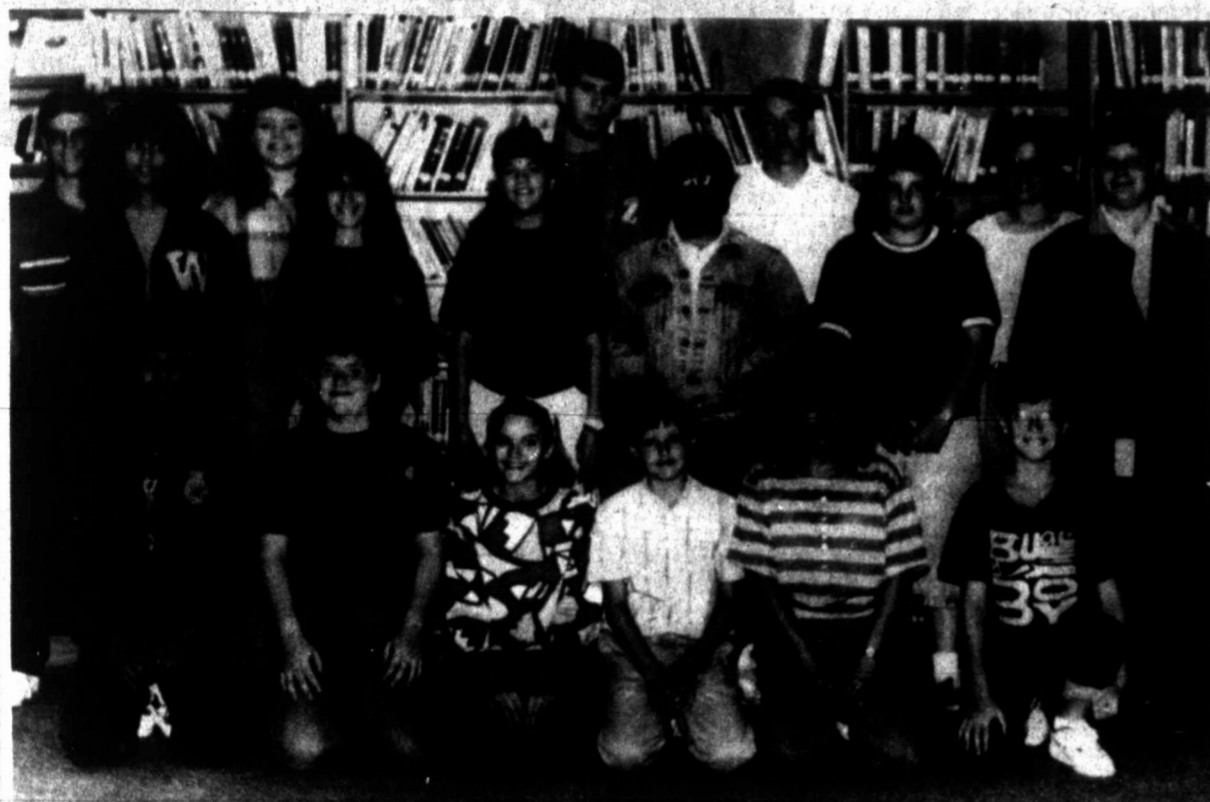
Jesus,' by encouraging them to attend our revival!"

Students plant seeds from space

Budding student scientists in the eighth grade earth science class at Colorado Middle School are planting gardens to experiment with tomato seeds from space.

During the spring semester, students are growing and monitoring space-exposed seeds and Earth-based seeds, searching for differences caused by long-term exposure to cosmic radiation, said teacher Sonja Hanks. Results gathered by the students will be forwarded to NASA by June 15 for a final report.

For nearly six years, the seeds were exposed to the harsh environment of space, subjected to cosmic radiation, temperature extremes, weightlessness and the vacuum of space. Students are looking for possible mutations to the tomato plant, such as changes in fruit size and color, growth rate and leaf, stem and stalk shapes and sizes. The pink grapefruit is a mutation resulting from irradiating the white grapefruit seed.

The Space Exposed Experiment Development Students (SEEDS) was one of 57 experiments housed on the recently recovered 11-ton Long Duration Exposure Facility satellite. After a nearly six-year voyage in space, the 12.5 million tomato seeds were rescued by the crew of the Space Shuttle Columbia on Jan. 12, 1990.

SEEDS is a cooperative project between NASA and Park Seed

Company, Greenwood, S.C., offering to students a one-of-a-kind, hands-on experiment to study the effects of long-term space exposure on living tissue. In March NASA distributed 180,000

SEEDS kits containing space-exposed seeds and an equal number of Earth-based seeds to teachers from the upper elementary school to the university level for experiments and study.

Awards Day is sponsored by the WTC faculty Association each spring to extend recognition to students for exemplary achievement. The students recognized and their families were honored at a reception in the Scurry County Museum following the program, held in the Fine Arts Theatre.

sessions was awarded 20 hours of educational credit by Texas A&M's Office of Continuing Education. The treasurers are required to complete 20 hours every

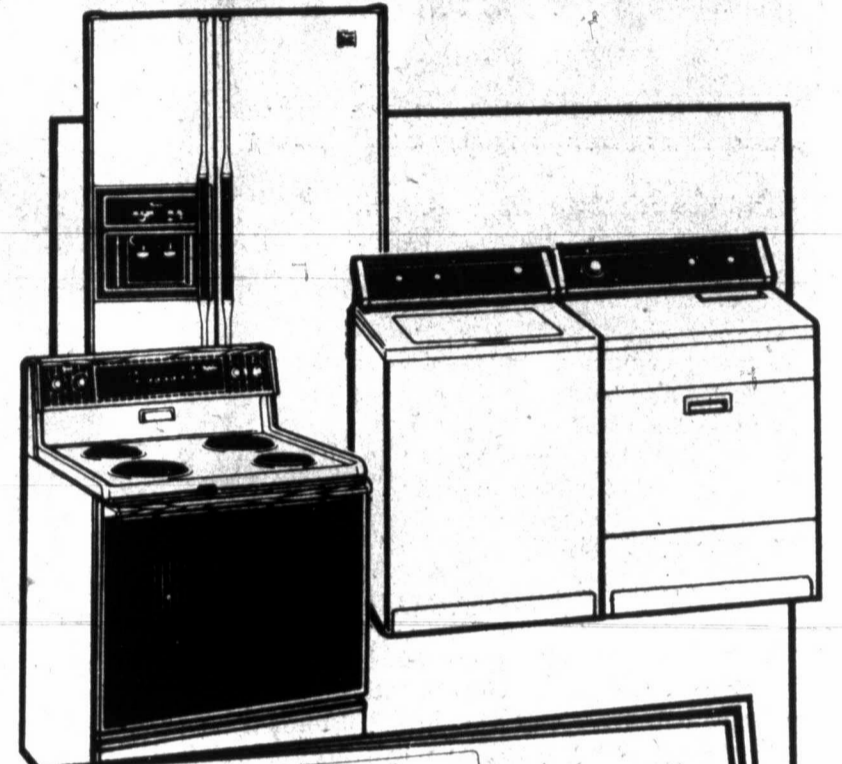
two years according to state law. The County Treasurers' Association of Texas cooperated in planning and implementing the training.
