The band has a recording of the Goldman Band playing "Call of Bagdad." They will compare their records with that of the Goldman Band as a means of improving their own playing.

The records made will be played in assembly at an early date.

The Date of Easter May Fall Between March 22, April 25

In 193, Easter Sunday will be celebrated on April 25, which is the latest date in the Easter month that Easter will ever be celebrated. In 1886 Easter was celebrated on April 23.

This year Easter is unusually late as Easter is celebrated as early as March 22 in some years as in 1761 and 1818.

In the first celebration the Jews celebrated "Passover Day" on the day the Christians celebrated Easter. The Jews objected until finally the Christians began reckoning time according to the Jewish method.

This method does not tally with astronomy with the result that it is difficult to tally the correct day for Easter and in 1812 Easter was celebrated on the wrong day.

When the right day for Easter is found, it will also determine a long series of ecclesiastical days involving the dates from Ash Wednesday to Trinity Sunday.

Easter is tabulated by the first Sunday after the 14th day of the moon. If the equinox moon was 14 days old on Saturday, March 21, then the next day, Sunday, would be Easter.

The closest Easter dates to be identical was the Easter celebrated on March 23, in 1856, and 1913.

Easter, as everyone knows, is the Sunday on which Christian Churches commemorate the resurrection of Christ. The name is probably derived from the Goddess of the Saxons, Eastre, the personification of the East.

Easter originally lasted eight days and gradually dwindled to the celebration concerning only one day.

Mr. Abel finally went back to the Indians but he was not welcomed very cordially.

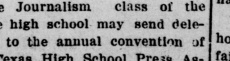
He went back to Rima and the three of them decided to go on a journey to Riolama, the place where Rima's mother was found after being lost a long time and also the place from whence Rima was named.

Students Study Highways, Roads, In Crane County

According to R. B. Rice, dist. supervisor of the Hiway Planning Survey, who was recently in this city, local hi school students have been granted permission by Mr. Bankston, superintendent, to assist in a special study to be made of the use of state highways, county roads, and city streets by car owners living in Crane county. This is a part of a state wide and nationwide program to collect information needed in planning the construction and maintenance of the state highways, roads, and the city streets.

The information which is being collected through the local high schools is an important part of the Hiway Planning Survey, according to Mr. Rice. The state and local officials have co-operated fully in this work and it is anticipated that local students will furnish a great deal of much needed and valuable information concerning Crane county.

Mr. Rice said that the Hiway Planning Survey, which is a new branch of the Hiway Dept. and is financed both by the state and federal government, is doing several different types of work. A detailed road map is being prepared for each county. Traffic counts have been made on all state highways and are now being made on county roads; traffic flow maps will be prepared from this information.

The trucks which travel on state highways have been weighed in order to find out how great a strain they impose on the road surfaces. The average life and cost of each of the various types of road are being studied.

Cactus Golf Club Will Tax Players For Six Months

Rules Are Discussed at Recent Meeting of Members

Assessment of \$2 per month as dues for golf playing was made at a recent meeting of golf members at the Gulf recreation hall, 16 being present.

Brittain Jobe was unanimously elected president of the Cactus Golf Club and H. C. Harris was elected treasurer. S. S. Summers was elected captain of the team and C. L. Cauble was elected co-captain.

The greens committee consists of C. L. Cauble, Ted Hubbard, Dick O'Neal and R. T. Hubbard. These men are for the purpose of hiring a caretaker and supervising the physical condition of the golf course. They also act as a rules committee.

In view of the poor condition of the course, it was voted that a caretaker be employed, taking care of the greens and fairways.

To raise money to employ the caretaker, it was agreed that each family would be charged \$2 per month for a period of six months effective April 1. The members are entitled to play for 12 months, but play only six months. If players want to play six months they will have to pay \$2 each month and after that you do not have to pay.

It was decided that those members delinquent would not be allowed to play on the course unless paying 25c greens fees, and all persons playing who are not members would be charged the same fee.

The ladder recently established, which is now in the Keltner Pharmacy, was on display at the meeting and various by-laws concerning the ladder were voted on as follows:

The movement from one position to another on the ladder will be made by a successful challenger.

Challenges will not be issued more than once in any one week.

If the challenger succeeds in defeating the party challenged, then the defeated party may not challenge until one week from that date; also if challenger does not succeed in defeating the party challenger, he cannot challenge same party again until one week has elapsed.

Challenges will not be issued to more than three positions above on the ladder.

No. 10 on the ladder may challenge No. 7, but no higher. All challenges must be accepted in three days or forfeit position and take place of challenger. If he is out of the city or sick, it will be all right, but he must play the match as soon as possible.

Crane has been voted into the Sand Belt League, and they play 8 men on a team. If a man is one of these eight and is sick or on a vacation, the ladder will step up one to get a man to fill his place.

When he comes back or gets over his emergency, he will have to wait a week before he can re-secure his position.


