The Duncan Demons of Oklahoma won the Wichita Falls Invitational Basketball Tournament at Coyote Fieldhouse Saturday over Burkburnett 55-52 before a large crowd of cheering fans.

The Duncan crew saw a 12 point first quarter dwindle to one point after three quarters to a fired up Bulldog team. Although the Demons were never behind in the game, they had to fight hard in the final quarter to keep their lead.

Jumping Jim Johnson led the Demon attack with 28 points. Johnny Koller was high pointer for Burk with 17.

Johnson, a state champ high jumper in track was outstanding with his set and lap up shots. He was also outstanding off the boards along with teammate Paul Taliaferro.

Johnny Koller was hitting with uncanny precision from his left corner and consistently kept Burk in the game with his goals. Bill Chambliss and Don Mason were Burk's standouts on defense.

Duncan started the first quarter hitting practically every shot and holding Burk to a very few. It seemed the Demons were going to run away with the game as they ended the first quarter with a 17-5 lead.

Burk started playing better off the boards in the second stanza and Barney Fudge and Koller began ripping the cords to pull within six shots of Duncan as the second quarter buzzer sounded.

The Bulldogs charged out in the third stanza and quickly took advantage of Duncan miscues and came within one point of the Demons with forty seconds remaining in the third quarter. Duncan missed a desperate last second shot as the buzzer sounded.

The score rocked from one to three points in the early minutes of the fourth quarter and Burk never could overcome the deficit. The game ended 53-52, but a foul gave Johnson two free throws for a final 55-52.

Carpeted Floor Tried In New School Library

A permanent hush is expected to fall over the new Burkburnett High School Library when its opens in September. The library is carpeted, just like the bankers office.

In fact, the quality of carpet laid on the library floor would make most North Texas bankers turn green with envy. It is a pin stripe round wire commercial carpet, one of the best all-wool carpets available at any price.

The Karaset pattern Gulistan carpet in the library is the second such installation in Texas and fourth in the U. S.

The American Floor Covering Institute has published figures proving that over a ten-year period, including savings on heat and maintenance, carpet proves cheaper than even asphalt tile, traditional favorite floor covering where traffic is a problem.

Burkburnett's carpeted library was designed by James R. Killebrew Associates, Architects and Engineers, of Wichita Falls after figures from the experimental installation at the Andrews, Texas high school were made available.

According to the published reports, carpeting was laid over one-half of the floor of the new school at Andrews. The building superintendent began keeping figures on cost of maintaining the carpeted floors and the tile floors. After a short time it became obvious that carpeting was vastly cheaper to keep clean and required no periodic polishing.

In addition, the boisterous manner of most students became subdued as soon as they stepped onto the carpet. Distracting noises were muted and dropped pencils made no noise at all.

The four installations of carpet in schools includes one in New York, one in California and the two in Texas but architects all over the U. S. are studying the results of the first three applications and carpeting may become the rule rather than the exception in new schools.

THE NATIONAL OUTLOOK THE GOOD AND THE BAD OF 1962

There were many developments of a cheerful character in 1962, and there also were quite a few that were, and are, disturbing. On the good side the following were outstanding:

The total value of goods and services produced in the nation, or gross national product, increased quarter by quarter. For the years as a whole the figure is estimated to be about \$554 billion, as compared with \$519 billion in 1961.

Personal income rose month by month throughout the year. In November, the last period for which data are available the total was \$447 billion; in 1961 the comparable figure was \$428 billion.

The total of new construction private and government combined—made a new annual high of \$61 billion, as against a shade above \$57 billion in 1961. Private non-farm housing starts did remarkably well. In November the seasonally adjusted annual rate was 1,533,000. A year earlier the comparable figure was 1,345,000.

Retail sales also did well for the year as a whole and apparently the Christmas trade was a little above that of 1961. However, the picture was rather spotty, both by line of goods and by regions. One significant complicating fact was the news-paper strike in New York just at the crucial Christmas shopping period.

The 1963 automobile model year has started off at a terrific pace — and the industry is widely forecasting a total volume of sales for 1963 of about seven million. If this turns out to be true it would be the first time in history that we had two great automobile years back to back.

Wholesale prices have continued their stability. The index has not varied as much as a point for five years. Consumer prices, in contrast, have shown a slow upward creep. The increase during the year has been about 1½ percent, but that has come on top of a similar rise for each of the past five years. The money supply has re-

mained plentiful throughout the year and interest rates have tended to decline slightly in many categories.

Farm income in the third quarter was at an annual rate identical with that for 1961 as a whole.

In the Cuban crisis the Kennedy Administration revealed maturity and courage. This may foreshadow a generally better foreign policy.

On the disturbing side there are the following:

Total industrial production, seasonally adjusted, has been unable to move off its plateau since last July. For this item this is an unusually long period of stability.

The rate of unemployment remains distressingly high. In November it was 5.8 percent of the civilian labor force, and no one sees appreciable improvement in the coming months.

Business profits remain squeezed. The last official figures are for the third quarter, and they still are below the final three months of 1961. Some companies and some industries are doing better, but for the economy as a whole the total is well below what is needed.

Expenditures for new plant and equipment are now predicted to show a slight decline in the first quarter of 1963, and business inventories no longer are being accumulated at a stimulating rate.

The international balance of payments will show a larger deficit this year than had been anticipated a few months ago. It is expected to be about \$2 billion, as against a hoped for total of \$1.5 billion.

Federal government expenditures continue to rise and rise. For the fiscal year ending next June 30 it is officially estimated they will be \$93.7 billion, with a deficit of \$7.8 billion. Both of these figures are regarded as the minimum. In Washington it is widely expected that for the following fiscal year, the President will submit a budget of about \$99 billion expenditures.

There are, of course, many other good and many other bad and many other disturbing factors which might be mentioned. But the above should be sufficient to prove that 1962 was a difficult and troublesome year, and that 1963 is certain to have many great problems that must be met in some manner.

WITH CATFISH PEPPER

Have you ever taken Junior or Little Sister out to catch "Lepomis aurtus or Lepomis macrochirus"? By now, you will likely wonder what kind of a nut would even mention such names in the same sentence with Junior or Little Sister; but, a few more lines should explain everything.

Actually those vicious sounding names are the Latin names of two species of our very common Sunfish. The "Lepomis aurtus" is our common "Yellowbreast Sunfish," while the "Lepomis macrochirus" is a very sporty "Bluegill." As we all know, both species are very common to all our local waters and are caught in large numbers by anyone who wets a fly, plug, worm, or what-have-you. Regardless of what we use, these hungry little demons will try it. This fact, linked to the small size, makes this fine-fighting fish a prime target of the young fisherman in your family.

Don't misunderstand me for my statement concerning the children, for on a light fly rod, these Sunfish can give the most experienced angler a lot of fun. After getting the small ones located (preferably near a brush pile) with a can of worms or most any kind of fresh meat; break out that trout rod, tie on a Black-Knat fly, popping-bug, small spinner or any small lure of your choice. By using a lure, you will eliminate the greater amount of the smaller fish due to the motion of the lure. Now if there are any stumps, large rocks, moss beds, or any type

of surface obstructions in your fishing hole, try working your bait as close to these obstructions as possible. If this method doesn't produce plenty of action and a nice string of pan-fish for dinner, then Ole' Catfish just doesn't know much about the "Lepomis."

A little information that may cause you to take the youngsters more often. Only about one per cent of all inmates of our penal system, have ever owned a fishing license. Now this doesn't particularly mean that these people have never fished; however, it gives a strong indication that people who are taught the fun of fishing and respect of our game laws are much less likely to come afool of the law. To me, this is enough reason to cause a person to sacrifice more freely of their own pleasures in order to help our youth be a more sport loving group.

Another thing that may cause the youngster to take more interest in the out-doors. If you have a local place that you fish year after year, try letting the children plant pecans, acorns, or any other tree nuts or seedling that may be available. This will cause the youngster to have more desire in returning to this spot each year to tend to "His or Her" tree. As these trees grow and bear fruit, the child will be growing right along with it. This growth will naturally be both mental and physical. As the knowledge of accomplishment grows, so will the desire to do larger and better things. If a pecan seed planted by a child should survive and bear

fruit, "I'll wager a "Plastic Worm" against a broken hook, that in time Junior will be returning to the same spot with his child to let them plant a seed near by. By this time there should be a nice shade tree, and there may have been a picnic table and benches added. Then too, there is a possibility that "The Tree," (for there never be another one like it) will be the home of a friendly family of squirrels. At least I'm sure that there will be a few nests of song birds in the branches.

With this in mind, it is the hope of Ole' Catfish, that you may take Junior out to try for "Lepomis aurtus" more often and find an excuse for not going with your fishing buddy to try for "Hura Solmoides."

Something you may have never tried — "Sunfish Patties." Just prepare the fish as you do for frying, then grind them through your food grinder. Mix as you would Salmon Patties and fry. That broken hook will still get you a "Plastic Worm" if you don't like them.

A Tip — if the youngster is, too, small to do his own baiting and those little demons are robbing the hook to fast to please you, here are three baits that will catch them and stay on the hook — a small piece of tin foil (from a cigarette pack) wrapped on the hook — the eraser out of a common pencil — or a small piece of cigarette filter from an unsmoked cigarette. The later will work, but not as well as the foil or eraser. Be hearing from me again, soon.

A Destructive Tax Policy

The government has moved to stimulate industrial development and investment, principally by providing more liberal depreciation allowances. But, at the same time, other measures, existing and potential, would produce very different and unfortunate results.

An officer of a principal American Oil company, which operates, as many of our oil companies do, on the international scale, recently touched on one of these. It has to do with a tax bill provision which would tax investment in developed foreign countries on a different basis than investment in high-risk emerging nations. In his words, "American companies doing business internationally should not have to decide whether to make an investment in Europe or in Asia, for example, on the basis of relative tax structures."

It would seem that sound governmental policy would seek to free American industry of all the restraints possible and to encourage it to expand in the way its managers think best, whether in our own country or in others. In the case of oil, this need is particularly evident. Free World demands for oil exceeded the incredible figure of 20 million barrels a day last year, is larger now, and is expected to pass the 27 million a day stage by 1968. And there is more to this than the usual economic considerations. Oil is a primary weapon in the implacable war for prestige, power and influence between the West and the Communist bloc.

It is not the province of government to determine, by tax policy or other policy, where industry shall invest. It is the province of government to encourage investment, for the benefit of the United States, if for no other reason.

Think This Over

For many years numbers of labor unions have, as a matter of routine policy, endorsed government owner-

ship and operation of the electric industry.

But this is not true of all the unions. And—most significantly—it is not true of the union which is directly and intimately concerned.

That union is the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. A short time ago one of its publications carried a statement by its Director of Utilities in which this was said: "The IBEW cannot support an arrangement which denies collective bargaining and which results in the destruction of its local unions. Because of these labor considerations we have opposed and will continue to oppose, the extension of government ownership and operation of electric light and power facilities beyond the actual necessities of the situation. Of 1,782 municipal electric systems in the United States, only 3 percent even recognize the union. Of the 1,057 REA cooperatives, only 17 percent recognize the union. While in the investor-owned and business managed electric utilities, 92 percent are organized and of these, IBEW represents 75 percent of the membership of all organized electrical utility workers."

That story needs no amplification—it is a case where facts speak with the utmost eloquence. But one basic moral might be appended. Organized labor, whatever its field, can bargain on even terms with any company or industry. But no group can bargain equally with government or an arm of government. For government is always the boss, and its word is law, whatever the merits of a case and when government is boss of living, working and wage standards you have the Communist system.

Inflating Air Mattress

Why waste breath inflating an air mattress on a hunting or camping trip, when for a few cents, you can buy a cylinder of gas such as is used on emergency rubber rafts?

If you balk at this expenditure, start the motor of your car and hold the mattress valve over the exhaust pipe until the mattress is filled.

There is no danger of monoxide poisoning, if reasonable care is observed.

Training Hunting Pups

If you can't afford the services of a professional dog trainer and want to do the job yourself, remember these important rules in dog training.

Don't start training until pup is eight weeks old, except for housekeeping and other simple behavior lessons.

Teach commands only as fast as they can absorb them. Quit the lesson the instant the pup stops wagging his tail.

Resolutions, often made, often broken, monopolize much of our thinking these days. With 1963 upon us, it's time to think of what we'll be doing, or perhaps not doing, during the New Year.

For the housewife, break-resistant dinnerware can provide subject matter for a break-resistant resolution. According to a recent Gallup Poll, things will be different at the average American dinner table this year.

The survey, designed to "separate fact from fancy," according to Melamine Council authorities, took a penetrating look at the degree of acceptance being accorded melamine dinnerware by the nation's housewives.

According to Gallup analysis, 14.8 million housewives now have at least one set of melamine dinnerware in the pantry.

Practicality, resistance to breakage, and modern appearance are three factors leading to an all-time popularity high for plastic plates and platters, the survey points out.

As an average housewife, it's quite easy for me to determine why there is a set of melamine dinnerware in my home. The dinnerware's durability and chip resistance make it perfect for the home that also boasts durable youngsters.

A third obvious asset, colorful modern appearance, makes melamine an equal partner in cupboard space that also includes china and earthenware.

According to the Gallup pollsters, some survey results were predictable, some quite surprising.

Most interesting, I think, was the reaction of non-owners interviewed.

Eight of 10 non-owners described melamine as break resistant and practical. Almost as many non-owners, seven of 10, described the dinnerware as modern, chip-resistant, and colorful.

It's important to remember that these opinions were gathered from individuals who didn't own, but did know about, melamine dinnerware sets.

Obviously, with this kind of reaction, one can expect quite an increase in the use of melamine in American homes.

For my part, one set may not be enough. I'm likely to add to the melamine plates, cups and saucers I already own. Not, however, until my husband adds to our cupboard space.

Farm Facts

Dr. Herrell DeGraff, Professor of Food Economics at Cornell University, notes that on a worldwide basis the typical family spends about 60% of its income for food (devotes about 69% of its productive effort to securing food).

"In this country, by contrast," he said in an address to the Super Market Institute, "the typical family acquires a far superior diet for barely one-quarter of its disposable income."

"Moreover," says Dr. DeGraff, "ours is a food supply without limitations of geography or seasonality, and with a large part of the work of preparation done by the food industries instead of burdening the homemaker."

"We eat as well and as cheaply as we do only because of the enormous contributions which science has made to food production, processing, and distribution."

"Fully a third of the quantity of food available to us has resulted directly from new contributions of science

that have been discovered and applied during our own lifetimes."

Dr. DeGraff observes that we are feeding 70% more people than in 1920, although there has been no increase in cropland.

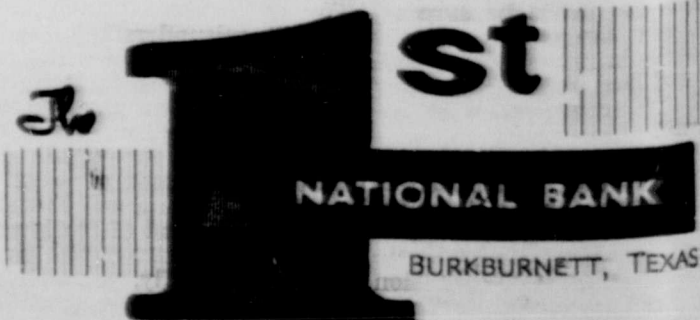

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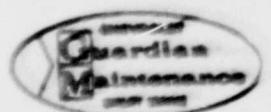

Cakes, Candles, Commemorations Light March of Dimes 25th Year

Throughout the nation this month, candles will be lit on birthday cakes to symbolize the 25th anniversary of the March of Dimes.

The cakes will range from real ones of conventional size to monster, multi-tiered models as much as 12 feet in height and 10 feet in diameter—the approximate dimensions of the one to be erected in New York City's famed Times Square. Guests at anniversary events around the country, where cakes will be of more modest proportions, will be invited to decorate them with coins for the March of Dimes.

Many "parties" commemorating a quarter of a century of disease fighting will be held at special treatment centers for birth defects, arthritis and polio which March of Dimes contributions are financing today in more than 40 cities across the U.S. Other gatherings will be held in county chapter offices of The National Foundation—March of Dimes, in the homes of volunteers and elsewhere.

In many instances, guests at these campaign "kickoffs" will include governors or their wives, mayors and outstanding authorities in health fields. Other guests will be Americans of all ages who received March of Dimes aid during and after polio epidemics and outbreaks. Also present will be children and adolescents with birth defects or arthritis who have been treated at these March of Dimes centers.

To raise the millions required every year for patient aid and research in birth defects, arthritis and polio, each March of Dimes campaign is carefully planned many months ahead. There are millions of contribution envelopes and coin collectors to be distributed around the nation; hundreds of thousands of posters to be erected in every hamlet, town and city; two million volunteers to be organized for the Mothers' March (the climax to the campaign at the end of January), and March of Dimes films to exhibit to explain the work of the voluntary health organization.

Arrangements must be completed for the visit in January of the National March of Dimes

Child—who this year is Jimmy Boggess, 5, Coy, Ark.—with President Kennedy at the White House and with various Senators and Congressmen and other dignitaries as well as with personalities of the stage, screen and television.

Special events for the March of Dimes are staged in all the big cities, many lesser ones and in some small towns. These include March of Dimes bowling tournaments, with "roll-offs" to select a national man or woman champion, fashion shows, auctions, telegrams, Coffee Days, Tag Days and street sales, neighborhood bread sales, air-lifts and a long list of sports activities.

The theme of this 25th Anniversary March of Dimes,

which is "Give for the Life of a Child," will be stressed in all these special events, and the story told of the first 25 years of the organization. Highlights of that story are:

Patients aided, 338,000; expended for the medical care program, \$385,500,000; for scientific research, \$73,600,000; and for professional education, \$38,000,000.

Basil O'Connor, president of The National Foundation—March of Dimes, referred in a recent speech to the 25th anniversary of the health agency.

"Most certainly we take pride in our past 25 years, and we rejoice. But deep down we really think of that quarter of a century as only the springboard for our future."

AFTER it became clear that our State Department not only helped to promote Castro in Cuba but would do nothing to dislodge him, money began to leave Latin America. Some observers think that it is going out at the rate of about \$700 million a month. That's about twice as much money as we have put into Latin America during the past 12 months.

Our failure to stop communism in Cuba is therefore responsible for driving capital out of Latin America much faster than we can ever hope to pour it in.

It will be infinitely harder to destroy communism in Cuba now than it would have been during the early days of Castro's revolution, but no matter how hard it is, it is much better than the alternative and it must be done.

The naval blockade of Cuba by our government was a proper move. Let every patriot hope and pray that the same firm policies will be followed against Communist aggression everywhere especially at this time in Berlin. The longer we wait, the higher the price will be. If we want to remain free and self-governing, we had better face the issue squarely right now.

Farm Facts

Fluorescent powder, a material often used in law enforcement, now is used by scientists in tracking boll weevils.

The technique was developed at the South Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station and with it workers are able to "tag" weevils with a coating of the powder and find them after they are released in fields.

An ultraviolet light is carried at night by workers and any weevil in its glow will light up, allowing researchers to see the insects from as far as 12 feet away. They can even be seen through a young, thin cotton leaf, according to scientists.

Even the path taken by the boll weevils will show up, allowing study of their movements on the cotton plant. The powder has no apparent physical effect and remains effective for more than three months.

Previous methods forced re-



search men to search slowly and painstakingly through each plant in making population studies of field-released test weevils. The new technique makes it possible to count the weevils as fast as the worker can walk.

Early Vehicle Safety Check Urged By Department of Public Safety

"Our weather is getting worse all the time and April 15 will come before you know it," Captain Alan Johnson, Texas Department of Public Safety Supervisor, commented this week.

He was talking about the time left for Texas motorists to get 1963 vehicle safety inspections. The seven and one-half month period for getting inspections is more than half finished. Inspections started September 1 and will continue through April 15.

Since the period is so long, Johnson stated, no allowances are made for bad weather. He pointed out that inspections may not be made when streets are wet. "From now until April 15, we usually have a siege of

bad weather in this part of the state which eliminates many inspection days," Captain Johnson said.

He also pointed out that inspection of vehicles now will insure that they are safer for the rest of the winter driving period when good lights, brakes and other equipment are so vital.

Failure to have a 1963 inspection sticker displayed on the windshield of your vehicle after April 15 is a violation of the law and is punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars.

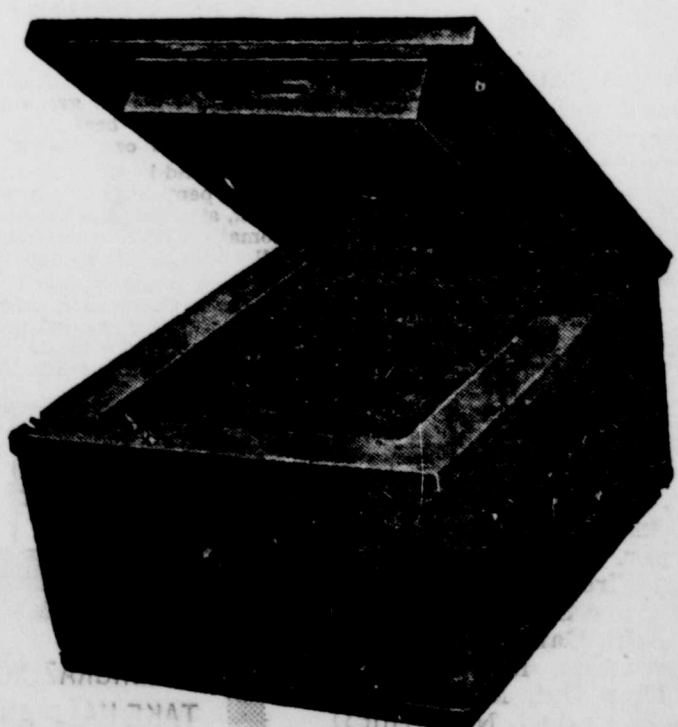

Pollholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. Did life insurance companies have big losses in the recent stock market decline?

A. Like virtually all other investors, life insurance companies experienced a sharp drop in the market values of the common stocks they owned. However, the decline had very little effect on their overall assets. Common stocks amount to less than 14% of the total assets of life companies in the United States. They



invest most of their resources in bonds and mortgage loans, which are virtually unaffected by fluctuations in the stock market.

In fact, the life insurance companies performed a stabilizing role in the stock market decline during the second quarter of 1962 by purchasing more than \$100,000,000 of common stocks. They bought more common stocks in that period than during any other quarter in history, except the final quarter of 1961.

Q. My son is considering a job opening with the home office of a life insurance company in our town. But, since it is a fairly small company, he wonders whether he would have a secure future there.

A. If your son seems otherwise well-suited to a career in life insurance, the fact that his prospective employer is a smaller company need not deter him from taking the job. The life insurance business is a prime example of how growth and progress can be achieved by new and smaller companies. In the past ten years, the total insurance in force of the 10 largest life companies has increased 127 per cent, while the insurance of the balance of smaller companies rose 154 per cent. Smaller companies have thrived on their regional concentration. With less than 1 per cent of the life companies operating in all 48 states, the smaller companies have emphasized regional specialization.

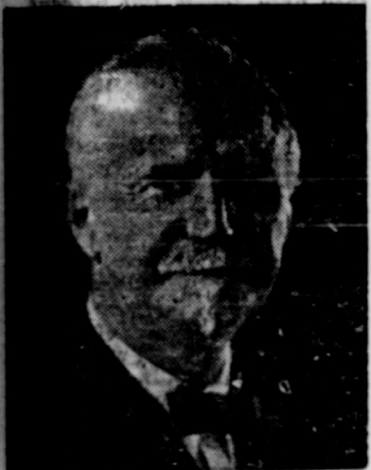

Roger W. Babson Weekly Report



Roger W. Babson
RETAIL TRADE

Naturally, there will be a seasonal letdown in retail trade after Christmas and the mark-downs which follow January 1. That will be the time to look for bargains. Scan the advertisements well. This especially applies to merchandise that depends more or less on style, such as dresses, coats, hats, and shoes. Buy good-quality items that can be passed down to the younger children. Over all, I expect 1963 to see a somewhat higher level of retail trade than has prevailed in 1962.

Purchases made at real mark-downs could be good cause for opening a new charge account. But be very careful to build up a name for good credit. You can arrange to pay some in 30 days, some in 60 days, and some at 90 days; but be sure to pay a little before your account is due. Good credit at a good retail store will help you and your husband (or wife) when you may need this credit later to buy real estate or start a business of your own.

CUBAN OUTLOOK
I forecast that the Cuban problem will not be settled in 1963. It may extend until after the 1964 presidential elections. The Russians have removed their missile installations and bombers from Cuba, in accordance with President Kennedy's demands. In return, Mr. Khrushchev will undoubtedly want some concessions in Berlin, or in Turkey—which now bottles up Russia in the winter due to Turkey's control of the Dardanelles.

Khrushchev must placate his people at home by improving rather than reducing their standard of living. I saw this very clearly when I was in Moscow. He helped Castro only so that he would have something to trade with the United States, either in connection with Berlin or with our bases which we now have in Europe. Khrushchev expected to later withdraw from Cuba when he first decided to help Castro. He knew Russia could continue to use Cuba as a base for Russian submarines. Now both Khrushchev and Castro are looking to have face at home.

Some think the Cuban fracas will make President Kennedy much tougher with labor here in the United States, but I disagree. Labor leaders may be more reasonable in their demands, but they will continue to have friends at the White House.

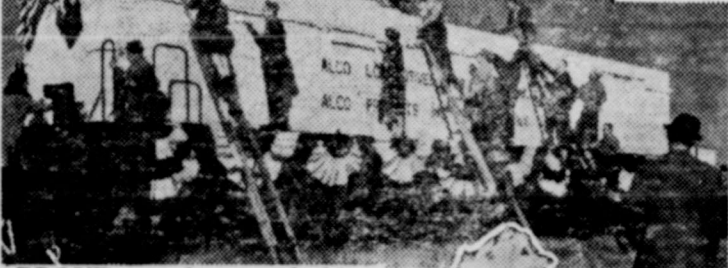

their wage contract after May 1, 1963. The settlement of this contract will be very likely to influence other labor disputes, depending largely on international conditions.

I feel that our country is becoming "immune" to crises, believing that the cold war will continue for years to come. There, however, will be no unclear war within our generation; and no international war of any kind in 1963.

Labor should begin to realize in 1963 that wages finally depend upon the employer's margin of profit. The year 1962 has seen many employers close down because of their slight margin. Small businessmen — both manufacturers and retailers — must have a larger margin of profit in order to exist. There are too many mergers into bigger units and too many failures of worthy employers. Labor leaders are largely responsible for this unfortunate development and are slowly pricing themselves out of business. Sooner or later this can result in much unemployment. A tax cut will not solve this difficulty.

COMMODITY PRICES
Nineteen-sixty-three will see many basic commodities sell for lower prices. Despite DOMESTIC production cutbacks for many raw materials, WORLD supplies will continue their uptrend. These surpluses in world markets will place additional downward pressure on commodity prices in the U. S. There will be exceptions in hybrid corn, Idaho seed potatoes, and other selected crops. Much depends upon the weather and

the ability to hold over surpluses.

Prices of peaches, apples, citrus and other fruits depend principally upon the weather. Improvements in canning, freezing, and storage have been greatly advanced, while the big supermarkets have been beneficial in stabilizing prices. The hope of the fruit growers rests in co-operative advertisements in newspapers and other media.

TAXES AND INFLATION
Before the Kennedy Administration retires, I forecast that we will have either more taxes or more inflation. Neither, however, need come in 1963. The stock market may discount the expected inflation by temporarily continuing above 600 on the Dow-Jones Industrial Average. The November elections indicate that the voters want a "welfare state" and I believe this means more inflation rather than more taxes.

The old saying, "We cannot have our cake and eat it too," is certainly true today. The elections referred to above indicate that the majority of voters really believe they can have all these temporal benefits such as medical care for the aged, medical and hospital payments, more social security, etc., without having to pay the bill either through increased taxes or thru inflation.

With all that is promised to young people in the form of free education, college scholarships, etc., in addition to the above mentioned, help this means that the employed people, from ages 25 to 65, must carry the entire burden. Sometime they will rebel, but it will

not be in 1963 although it might come at the next presidential election. Certainly the enactment of a "real" all inclusive tax cut is no sure thing. It may look good to the "working man" but not to investors or employers.

THE UNITED STATES DOLLAR AND GOLD

The purchasing power of our dollar will gradually be less, but this statement applies also to the currency of all countries. If our dollar declines in value it will be the same for every nation. If we devalue the dollar or temporarily look prosperous by phony bookkeeping, the other nations will gradually follow suit and we will all wind up where we started.

The dollar will not be devalued in 1963, although the Wall Street and Lombard Street brokers will put out propaganda to the contrary.

Now, a final word with regard

to gold. The United States will continue to lose gold on balance during 1963. The only way to prevent it in 1963 is for us to export more goods and import less. This would require certain sacrifice on the part of our people.

Since my trip to Africa, I have concluded that the answer is in producing more gold rather than leaving it underground. If gold had a free market, its production would increase naturally and it would then represent one of the safest and most profitable investments available today. Another one may be uranium oxide.

Of course, large quantities of gold may be found on the surface of the moon — which brings me to my final subject, which I hope readers will take seriously.

GOING TO THE MOON
Nobody will reach the moon in 1963 or in 1964, but you will

see more and more about it in the newspapers during 1964 — or 1965. Do not think that the United States will be the only country preparing for this trip. Russia, England, France, Germany, and possibly China are preparing today to go to the moon. With labor getting 15 cents for a twelve-hour day in China and with booster engines purchasable abroad China may be the first to get to the moon. China does not need to be a member of the United Nations in order to send a rocket and three men to the moon and return. China's trip to the moon may be financed by foreign capital. China will win the territory it wants in India and ultimately get Burma.

Buying of "going to the moon" stocks may become a very active speculation. The original boosters will be paid for by some government, but their operation will be left for profit.

The situation may compare with our great "gold rush" in 1849. However, it will not be limited to gold, but will also include diamonds, platinum, and perhaps other elements which are not yet in our chemistry books. My great-grandparents were all seafaring men taking people from New England down the East Coast of South America around the Horn and up the Pacific Coast — a trip of two months. The astronauts say that they can make the trip to the moon easily in less than four days. One final thought: If the Kennedy Administration gets into too much of a jam between taxes and inflation, the promotion of trips to the moon may pull them out of their troubles. By enticing private capital which is now in need of some attractive speculative investments, this might even bring about another big stock market boom in the late Sixties.

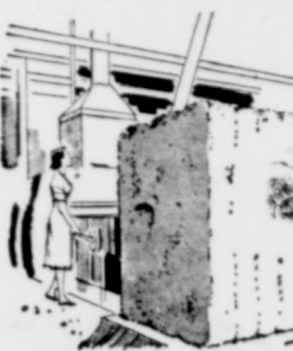

A Question of Safety

Q. I would like to have some information on the new pills to prevent pregnancy. Have they been found 100 percent safe?

A. OK, here's the latest roundup. Results of wide scale clinical studies indicate that when the pill is taken regularly as directed, it is highly (99 percent) effective in preventing ovulation (and thus preventing pregnancy). It is estimated that over one million women are now using the pill. In some instances the pills cause side effects such as nausea, vomiting, bleeding, breast tenderness, weight gain. So far, use of the pill has had no known effect on the fertility of women when the stop taking the pills. What effect of the prolonged use of the pills may be on the pituitary gland and ovaries; how the pause may be affected; or what effect prolonged use of the pill may have on offspring, are questions which may take years to answer. There is some concern of danger in almost all medicine.
