Dakota Demos Vote For 'Smith and Moody' Ticket Boy Scout Membership Campaign Will Start Today

Enthusiasm Goes To Peak At Meet Here Last Night

R. J. Murray, Named New Head of South Plains Council; Certificates for Training Course Given.

FITCH, REGIONAL EXECUTIVE, TALKS

Teams Will Meet This Morning In Determined Drive to Put Over Biggest Local Scouting Program.

Spurred by the desire to further enhance the assets of Lubbock and the South Plains as a home for boys, more than 100 men went away from the First Presbyterian church last night, following the final program of the Scout Leadership Training Course, determined to support the greatest program ever attempted for the South Plains Area Council of the Boy Scouts.

Still further determined, the group will meet at the city hall this morning at 8:45 to open the membership and finance drive in the city. Levine's Trip To Havana Success

Plane Which Crossed The Atlantic Safe In Cuba; "Queen of Diamonds" Gets Praises of Crowd.

HAVANA, March 6 (AP).—The balance plane Columbia, which once flew from the United States to Germany, arrived here on a non-stop flight from New York at 1:36 p. m. today. The plane carried its owner, Charles A. Levine, who made the flight to Germany, and Miss Mabel Boll, with Wilma Studia as pilot.

It was a speedy flight over the 1400 air trail, which was covered in 14 hours almost to the minute. Instead of large crowds, which the aviators apparently looked for, there was only a small gathering—a few friends of Miss Boll, a few newspapermen, a few photographers. But they made a happy party at the landing field, Campo Columbia.

At the plane glided to the ground, Miss Boll, who is sometimes known as the "Queen of Diamonds," and who spent much time last year trying to arrange for a flight across the Atlantic was seen leaning out of the machine, fresh and smiling after her long journey.

Levine appeared as though a good rest would benefit him, and he soon went off to the hotel to enjoy it. There will be some entertainments in honor of the flyers, but no fixed program has been arranged.

FRENCH PACT PASSES

Senate Approves New Arbitration Treaty

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP).—The French arbitration treaty with its declaration against war was ratified today by the Senate with little discussion and without a roll call. Senate approval of the treaty marks completion of the first step in the administration project for modernization of all existing arbitration treaties and re-enforcement of the machinery for peaceful settlement of international disputes.

SCHOOL APPORTIONMENT

AUSTIN, March 6 (AP).—A per capita apportionment of \$3 will be made March 10 to the public schools from the remaining \$10 of the \$15 apportionment available for each school child for the current school year. State Sup't. S. M. N. Harris said today.

Censorship Of Movies Is Asked In Resolution By Parent-Teacher Council

Censorship of Lubbock motion pictures through a board appointed by the city is asked in a resolution passed by the City Parent-Teacher council, which met at the junior high school yesterday afternoon.

Boards of censors wield authority over the cinema entertainment of numerous Texas cities, but this is the first move along this line in Lubbock. The custom of such bodies is to view all cinema entertainment in pre-showings and then either a k. or turn thumbs down. "Cutting" of objectionable scenes and complete refusal of pictures is sometimes resorted to by such boards.

No expression could be obtained from city officials by the Avalanche last night. Mrs. E. W. Camp, president, was in charge of their meeting and there was a good attendance of board members. A nominating committee was appointed, consisting of Miss Stella Thurman, chairman, Mrs. E. M. Smith and Mrs. B. H. Warren. Plans for the district convention to be conducted here in April and for a play to be given Thursday night were discussed.

ANGELO AIR LINE

New Route Is Sought By Texas City

SAN ANGELO, March 6 (AP).—Walter Vazzy, Mayor D. D. Holcomb, E. A. Tucker and Claud Wild, secretary of the board of city development, left here tonight for Oklahoma City to attend meetings of the Anglo Air Line relative to an air mail line from Tulsa to San Angelo. Delegations from Wichita Falls and Abilene also are to be present.

The aviation committee of the board of city development here recently bought 250 acres for a landing field and the city will be asked to vote \$25,000 in bonds to acquire and equip property.

LAINE TESTIFIES

Pleads Self-Defense In Murder Trial

HOUSTON, March 6 (AP).—Taking the stand in his own defense Tuesday, Morris C. Laine, county road inspector, charged with murder, told the jury that he shot T. F. Conway, husband of the former Mrs. Laine, because he "had threatened my life and I was afraid he was going to kill me."

Conway was shot in front of the First Baptist church here on October 2. He had just left the two Laine children out of his car to go into Sunday school.

Ancient Battle of Cross and Crescent Revived In Trial of Christian Girls

Teaching of Doctrines Foreign to Mohammedanism In Public Schools of Turkey Charged Against Three American Women; Minarets Over Court

BROUSSA, Turkey, March 6 (AP).—Three American women, involved in the historic battle between the cross and the crescent, are on trial in Turkey, accused capital for violation of the rules of the ministry of education through the alleged discussion of religion in a mission school.

Within sight of the minarets of 150 Mohammedan mosques lying at the foot of Mount Olympus, a Turkish court is hearing the charges against Miss Edith Sanderson, Miss Lucille Day and Miss Jennie Johnson, who are accused of teachings which resulted in the conversion of Mohammedan girls to the faith of the Man of Galilee.

Belligerent Shiek Prepares to Send 30,000 Men In War

British Have Only Royal Air Force Detachment On Ground To Cope With Hardy Desert Warriors.

(By the Associated Press) LONDON, March 6.—The "Holy War" in Arabia came nearer to reality tonight when an exchange of telegrams between the British and the Shiek of Nejd, King of the Hedjaz and Sultan of Nejd had made a formal declaration of hostilities against the three British mandates that border his desert realm from the Red Sea to the head of the Persian Gulf.

Official quarters are silent here but allow an inference that active steps are being taken to meet the situation. English newspapers open today discuss the problems of defense against this menace of the Wahabi tribes.

The situation was created when the Arabian desert king, formerly a friend of Great Britain, decided to cast his lot with the war-like groups which long have been raiding their northern neighbors. Ibn Saud, with typical Mohammedan tactics at once put the movement on a religious plane.

He is, however, directing his wrath at "renegade and unfaithful" sects against whom he will lead "true Moslems."

SCHOOL FUNDS

Moody Assures Aid For The Summer Sessions

AUSTIN, March 6 (AP).—C. E. Evans, president of the Southwest Texas Teachers college at San Marcos, spokesman for the eight teachers colleges, was assured last Tuesday by Governor Dan Moody that some action will be taken soon in the schools' request for \$75,000 deficiency appropriations to operate their summer sessions.

Quarantine Rules Recommended for Boll Worm Fight

Non-Cotton Zone In Only One County, Brewster, Is Suggested by Board Making Report To Moody.

NEED FOR SPECIAL SESSION IS ENDED

Fumigation of Lint And Crushing of Seed Among Measures Proposed By Restrictions.

(By the Associated Press) AUSTIN, March 6.—Quasi-quarantine regulations for seven West Texas counties newly infested with the pink boll worm were recommended late Tuesday by the state pink boll worm commission which announced it would continue its executive session into Wednesday.

The commission said no non-cotton zone should be declared except over Brewster county, among the original seven counties which have been embattled with the pest for years. "In this county the commission finds that there is but a single plantation and that badly infested and regulations cannot be provided to cope with the situation, the statement said.

County recommendation probably will be made to Governor Moody Wednesday.

The body's decision to begin no-sweeping non-cotton growing procedure this year was believed to obviate the need for a \$10,000,000 federal appropriation which George B. Terrell, state agriculture commissioner, had requested in the event such drastic measures were found necessary.

Fumigation Required. After the governor is given the full report, he probably by proclamation will request the commissioner of agriculture to put into effect the desired restrictions, which

SUBMARINE BAN LOSES

Committee Refuses to Put House On Record

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP).—By a margin of one vote the house foreign affairs committee refused today to approve the Frothingham resolution to place congress on record as favoring the abolition of submarines by international agreement. Six members voted against the proposal, five for it, and ten were not recorded.

Leading the fight against the resolution Chairman Porter declared the submarine in many instances was the sole weapon of defense for smaller nations against larger ones.

New Railroad In Panhandle; Will Open Vast Empire

Direct Connection From Pampa to Oklahoma City Assured As Contract Is Signed Tuesday.

(By Associated Press) AMARILLO, March 6.—Pampa today was assured of another railroad, a direct connection with Oklahoma City, when a contract was signed by Frank Kell, Wichita Falls capitalist and railroad builder, and a committee of three Pampa business men guaranteeing the requirements.

The contract calls for immediate construction of the Clinton Oklahoma Western railroad of Texas from Pampa to Cheyenne, Oklahoma where it will connect with Mr. Kell's railroad to Oklahoma City.

The new line will tap a vast empire in the northwestern part of the Texas Panhandle already famous for its oil, grain and cattle.

Pampa men who signed with Mr. Kell were B. E. Pinney, president of the First National Bank, M. K. Brown, president of the chamber of commerce, and J. M. Dodson, president of the Gray County State Bank. They guaranteed terminal facilities, 30 miles of right-of-way east from Pampa, and \$5,000 in cash.

CLEMENT CLEARED

NEW YORK, March 6 (AP).—As quickly as he had appeared in the picture by his unannounced surrender to the police, Louis Clement Van Norden, alias "Dr. Louis Clement," was cleared today of connection with the slaying of Miss Margaret Brown, governess.

The police appeared satisfied Clement had worked in Manhattan all of the day on which the woman was killed and could not have been in New Jersey where her burning body was found. Mrs. Elizabeth Miller, another governess, declared Clement was not the man with whom she had seen her friend.

Failure of Attorney To Show Up Is Cause

EASTLAND, March 6 (AP).—The failure of J. K. Baker, counsel for Captain Ratliff, convicted of capital murder, to arrive here today caused the postponement of the arraignment of the prisoner on two charges of murder in connection with the slaying of G. E. Bedford and W. G. Carmichael, Cisco police officers.

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MOORE FOR MOODY IS THUS STIRRED ANEW

Begin to Appear As If Texas Governor Might Be Again Thrust In Line for Vice-President.

(By The Associated Press) PIERRE, S. D., March 6.—Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York was proposed tonight by the South Dakota Democratic convention as its preference for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The endorsement of Governor Smith was voted in opposition to that of the United States Senator Thomas Walsh of Montana, the New York executive receiving 48,576 votes as against 45,213 for Senator Walsh.

For the vice-presidency, the Democrats endorsed Governor Dan Moody of Texas as Governor Smith's running mate, expressing their preference unanimously.

If W. Howes of Hugen was re-elected Democratic national committeeman, defeating Hollen Davenport, Smith's manager for South Dakota.

Mrs. Anna E. Struble was re-elected national committeewoman.

MOODY CAN'T IMAGINE HOW IT ALL HAPPENED

AUSTIN, March 6 (AP).—"I didn't imagine they had ever heard of me," was Governor Moody's only comment when he learned Tuesday night of the action of South Dakota democrats in endorsing him for the vice-presidency. "This comes too suddenly for me to comment on it," was his reply to questions.

AUSTIN, March 6.—Fire insurance rate credits ranging from 3 to 15 per cent were awarded 16 towns Tuesday by the State Fire Insurance Commission on the basis of good records.

Fifteen per cent credit went to Brownsville, Goose Creek, Groes, Laredo, Lockney, Palo Pinto, Plainview, Slaton, Stephenville and Tulia.

Childress and Mercedes got 12 per cent credit, Elgin 9 per cent, Glen Rose 6 per cent and Littlefield 3 per cent.

How and Why

CURVES BEST FOR SQUARE ACES

In giving advice for proper make-up for the square type face, we have in mind such a face unmodified by rounded or tapering chin or oval forehead. Generally, all square faces should have the hair waved and dressed in curves over the forehead, and the neckband should be cut in points or curves in order to break the too geometrical straight characteristic lines.

There is, however, just one exception to these instructions. When the features are classically beautiful or distinguished, emphasize your type. Bring it out strongly by adding more straight lines to those you already possess. However, square faces should have the roue applied more deeply in the central part of the cheek, fading to light pink near the ears. The short square face should be deeply rouged to the inner cheek, close to the eyes, fading out gradually toward the ears.

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General Motors Stock Up Again

Climbs to \$150 a Share in Second Day of Feverish Trading On New York Stock Exchange.

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, March 6.—General Motors common, establishing a new high record for the third consecutive session, raced up to \$150 a share today. Total transactions in the issue on the New York stock exchange reached 452,000 shares, representing a value at the top price of \$67,875,000. The day's net gain was \$3.50 a share. Since last Friday, when the sensational buying of General Motors began at the expense of a crowded short interest, the stock has gained \$12.50 a share, or half its par value. The aggregate market value of the 17,400,000 shares outstanding has risen \$217,500,000 to \$2,610,000,000. The total par value of the stock is \$485,000,000.

The day's transactions were studied with purchases of huge blocks of the stock. At the top price, reached a few minutes before the close a block of 23,900 shares changed hands, followed almost immediately by another of 14,800.

The March upward movement, was not unopposed. Sharp weakness of rubber issues — around midday brought a sympathetic reaction of about \$1 a share. This loss was quickly recovered, and with the upward swell under way again touching off a new batch of "stop-loss" orders, "shorts" once more resumed their headlong rush to cover.

Many other active speculative stocks were subject to eager bidding throughout most of the session, advances ranging from \$2 to \$6. United States Steel, which has been left far behind by General Motors, whose price it formerly topped, fell back slightly on profit-taking.

Hunter, former president of the Panhandle-Pecos Valley League, ex-operator and owner of the Oklahoma City franchise in the Western Association, one time ball player and one of the main-springs in local baseball for the past several years, those present at the meeting discussed the proposition from top to bottom and then voted, unanimously, for Lubbock's entry into the newly formed Class D organization provided suitable operators could be obtained.

A committee, composed of S. D. Hunter, chairman; Frank Jones, R. O. Shelton, F. G. Shepard, Dick White and Boyd Adcock, was appointed to lay the proposition before various local business men with the end in view of securing at least five men to take over the franchise here and operate it as a private business. Members of the committee will spend part of today, tomorrow and Friday, if necessary, to secure the franchise holders and at a meeting, set for Friday night at 7:30, in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, will make their final report.

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Mr. Hunter also divulged that he had sent \$30 to the league to safeguard Lubbock's territory so that if Lubbock did want to enter its way would be clear. Rules of the league thus far include a payroll limit of \$2400 per month, a 16 man player limit, and the salary top exclusive of the manager.

A BOTTLE OF LIQUOR

The Denison Herald says: The approved method of conducting political campaigns nowadays seems to be to cover the opposition with as much slime as the mortar boxes of misrepresentation hold; to impugn the honor of those who differ with us and impute to them the basest of motives in all human conduct. For such we have no sympathy to express, no charity to extend, no plea for exercise of the forgiving spirit when life ceases. To win a political controversy it is customary to rely wholly on the demerits of the opposition and denunciation of those associated with the cause. In other words, if we can show up the other fellow as a fool it matters not at all if we be a knave. Which leads up to consideration of a recent issue of the esteemed Bonham Favorite:

"Albert S. Burleson says that political parties can not make national issues. That may be true as a general rule, but give them a bottle of liquor and they can go out and make a national issue mighty quick. A few years ago practically everybody admitted that the prohibition issue had been settled with the adoption of the eighteenth amendment. But Ritchie and Al Smith grabbed a bottle in one hand and a keg in the other and they are making an issue of prohibition all right. So far as we are concerned the issue is welcomed. If the democratic party wants to follow such men and adopt their policies we want to know it so we can get out. If the party wants to relegate them to the rear, we want to help do it. Prohibition is an issue and a very live one, and it will continue to be an issue until the distillers and beer barons and Tammany and the Mellon machines learn for a certainty that the people of the United States have adopted dry laws and intend to not only retain them but enforce them."

The Favorite assumes, as does the great majority on his side of the prohibition question that everyone of contrary view is influenced by his love of liquor, despite the fact that his patron saint, Woodrow Wilson, gave only half-hearted support to the eighteenth amendment and actually vetoed the Volstead act because of its unreasonable and unenforceable conditions. Not only that, but when he vacated the White House he secured permission of Congress to move his stock of liquors to his Washington residence. And yet, his is a memory to be worshiped, while Burleson, Smith, Ritchie and Reed, who stand just where Mr. Wilson did, are referred to as having "grabbed a bottle in one hand and a keg of beer in the other," for no other reason than they recognize the far-sighted wisdom of the late president.

The fact that neither Burleson, Smith, Ritchie nor Reed ever taste intoxicating liquors doesn't alter the case. They are sloshing around the country with a "bottle in one hand and a keg of beer in the other" trying to force others to wallow in it.

What we need in this country is a little more temperate language in our political converse.

THE MARK OF THE BEAST

The continued and seemingly ever-growing number of heinous crimes, whose revolting details are so lavishly portrayed by the privileged press, indicate that the mark of the beast is still present, despite the boasted advance of civilization. Vice is paraded and virtue unnoticed. A newspaper pays enough for the life story of a murderer written by himself, to keep his family in luxury for the remainder of their lives. A woman working in the slums to stem the tide of wretchedness is left to the dregs of a slow awakening charity's bounty for support. The criminal is magnified in importance and his victim is forgotten.

The newspapers claim that the public demands the revolting minutiae of the criminal's acts. If this be true, then, indeed, is the mark of the beast more general than the supposed high state of civilization would warrant in assuming. If this be true, then, indeed, has the emphasis of morality through all these ages failed to raise the standard of ideals of human relationship. If the claim can be verified then man is degenerating and, instead of a development toward a high

moral concept, is retrograding toward the mere animal.

This pandering to a low instinct on the assertion that it is what the people want is an insult to the people generally. It is not true that newspapers, theatres and moving pictures are compelled to depict in colorful extravagance the mark of the beast in order to gain an audience. These forces could combat the increase of crime and lift the thoughts of the public to the good, the true and the beautiful if they would, and each of them in its particular avenue, has the choice of appealing to the man or the beast. The argument that the public demands that the mark of the beast be recognized as a matter of business is met by many manifestations that the public will and does give liberal support to cleanliness in thought and utterance. Clean publications, clean dramas, clean moving pictures find a patronage unquestioned, liberal and satisfied, happy in the fact that they need not apologize for the reading or the presence.

There is an indication that the pendulum is swinging against those publications and those theatres which have loaned themselves to indecency and that in some instances it will take some time for those which followed the mark of the beast to recover the ground thus lost in the respect of the public. It may have been a temporary financial advantage, but it will prove a permanent lessening of their hold on the minds of the people and their influence on thought and action. The mark of the man shall be restored as the sign of public favor and the mark of the beast again take its place among the discarded insignia of a past generation.

FARM AID IN SIGHT

Federal farm aid is going to be an accomplishment of the present session of Congress, unless the president stubbornly refuses to sign a bill that congress is going to pass. The McNary-Haugen bill was passed at the last session of Congress, and Mr. Coolidge vetoed it. Senator McNary and Congressman Haugen revised the bill and it was again introduced at this session of Congress. Features the president had objected to last fall were all eliminated, except the "equalization fee," and that feature was retained, but in a modified form, providing that the Farm Board could only invoke the fee when every other plan to buy and absorb surplus crops had been exhausted. So, the bill as now endorsed by the agricultural committee of the Senate, and which will no doubt be endorsed for passage by the House agricultural committee at its session on the fifth or shortly thereafter. It is now generally believed that with the lights before him President Coolidge is favorable to aid for agriculture, but living in one of the far eastern states, where agriculture is not predominant, the president had never come face to face with the farmer's problem until he went west this summer. The proponents of the McNary-Haugen bill now believe the president will sign the modified farm bill, because he realizes that it is a step in the right direction, if no more, and the only hope of providing aid for the impoverished agricultural industry at this session of Congress. Committee hearings on all the farm aid bills have closed, and at conferences being held by members of the House and Senate and others interested, it is being generally understood that the McNary-Haugen bill is the one that will be favorably reported. President Coolidge and Senator McNary are close personal friends, and they had a conference last Tuesday at which, no doubt, the equalization fee feature of the bill was discussed, but neither of them disclosed what was agreed, if anything. Senator McNary is a man who does not talk, almost as silent as "Cautious Cal," so it has not leaked out what the result of the conference was, except that Senator McNary still expresses the hope and desire that the bill be passed on its merits by the Congress. All these indications are now most favorable to the final passage of the bill and its endorsement by the president. If it became a law, those who are making an effort to reduce cotton acreage can suspend, because even with a surplus of five million or six million bales the price will be stabilized and the surplus held for a lean year when flood and drought, or insects like the boll weevil destroy the crop, or some other unforeseen cause results in a short crop. It is a matter of history that a surplus crop of cotton has never happened for three consecutive times, and the only reason why cotton has sold under the cost of production at any time has been that there was no agency to control the surplus crop, and it was thrown on the market to become the easy pawn of gamblers and market sharks. The outlook for farm aid legislation is better now than it has been for five or six years and in fact the best informed men in Washington believe now the McNary-Haugen bill will be passed by Congress and the only thing that can prevent it from becoming a law will be the veto of the president, and they do not believe the president will veto the bill in its present form.

The western farmer who has prayed for farm aid and relief can easily say to the 52 southern congressmen and 11 southern senators who voted against the farm aid bill, "Give us our farm aid now, if you expect us to join you in a demand for flood relief." And that is exactly what they are saying.

YOUR HEALTH

BY DR. MORRIS FISHER

Recent investigations of the body's growth have indicated that the maintenance of the supply of calcium and phosphorus is of the greatest importance.

Large amounts of these minerals leave the body in various ways. A nursing mother loses much calcium and phosphorus in the milk. A mother who is to have a child must have sufficient of these substances to maintain both her own requirements and those of the prospective child.

Investigations by American experimenters have shown that cod liver oil is a well recognized stimulant to the absorption of calcium and phosphorus in the body.

Dr. Douglas Harvey of the Roswell Research Institute in Aberdeen has recently completed a series of investigations as to the effect of cod liver oil on animals giving milk. The experiment was done on goats and the effects of cod liver oil in the diet were compared with the effects of olive oil as a control.

A study was made not only of the effects of the cod liver oil on the assimilation of calcium and of phosphorus, but also of iodine. He found that the feeding of cod liver oil to goats improved the balance of calcium in the body, since much less calcium was excreted.

The effects on phosphorus were variable. If the animals were given milk, the percentage of the total amounts of calcium in the milk were increased by feeding cod liver oil. The amount of iodine in the milk was increased by feeding either cod liver oil or by giving a preparation of potassium iodide as a control.

The giving of cod liver oil did not in any way affect the fat content of the milk. When cod liver oil was replaced by olive oil, similar effects were not produced.

If there is a way to get rid of them without such a measure, we hope this will be done.

Directors of the six counties forming the Plains Poultry Producers' association who met at Plainview yesterday had glowing reports to make of the work in their counties, and consolidated reports showed that at present 27,000 hens have been pledged to the cooperative marketing plan by their owners.

Directors attending the meeting were J. E. Bowman, Kress, and J. H. Long, Tulsa; Swisher county, W. H. Tanner, Motley county; J. D. Christian, W. H. Faver and Leell Jones, Floydada, for Floyd county; J. D. Daugherty, Olton, Lamb county; L. B. Hendrick, John Wayland, Mrs. M. S. Hudson, Ed. Burns, Robert Hudson, E. B. Miller and J. T. Hatch, Hale county. In addition the following county agents were present: R. M. Mithollin, Hale; W. P. Leaming, Motley; Harmon Benton, Swisher.

The largest number of hens has been secured in Chisum county of Swisher while Hale county comes second on the list. In this county more individual chicken raisers have signed contracts than in any other county. Since the last meeting of the association more than 35 producers in this county have signed up with more than 1,500 hens.

Directors returned to their respective counties following the meeting more encouraged than ever, and with more determination to make the association an assured success. They will work intensively to get more and more signers. It has been declared that the minimum requirement for the success of the organization is 40,000 hens producing for it. To make it a notable success it must ultimately have 200,000 hens.

J. T. Hatch of Plainview, manager, believes that the counties will reach their goal. The six counties concerned are Floyd, Motley, Briscoe, Lamb, Swisher and Hale. Mr. Hatch has been receiving letters in every mail seeking information on the marketing plan and also has received letters from producers asking for all he can deliver.—Plainview News

There is hardly anything we can think of just now that will be of more benefit to the poultry raisers of the South Plains than a good system of cooperative marketing. Many years ago it was thought that just any kind of yearling was a marketable animal, but it developed a little later that uniform colors had much to do with the price they would bring on the market. The same is true with nearly everything that is on the market today. Eggs, chickens and hens and turkeys. They all bring a better price if there is uniformity of color and size, and then quantity has much to do with it. If there is sufficient quantity of a certain grade of eggs available, it brings competition.

THE LEAP YEAR GIRL

among other things would require fumigation of lint, and the crushing of seed and would prevent the shipment of infested cotton into "clean areas."

Belief was that the meeting dispelled the possibility of a special legislative session to appropriate money for combating the worm, and paying damages to farmers in the event they were ordered to discontinue growing cotton.

While the West Texas chamber of commerce, in a meeting at Colorado, resolved that the governor should convene such a session in the event planting was prohibited or Congress failed to set aside the money for eradication work, the request probably will not be pushed due to the turn of affairs, it was learned.

\$235,000 Available Fund

Homer D. Ward, manager of the chamber, said a call was suggested only in the event of revolutionary action or shortage of even the relatively small amount of funds necessary for regulated zones. The state has about \$235,000 available and Congress has appropriated \$200,000 a year for the biennium. Commissioner Terrell announced some time ago that he believed the affair could be handled with about that amount.

Counties reported newly infested were: El Paso, Brewster, Reeves, Ward and Pecos counties. A. L. Mariatt, chairman of the federal horticultural board, had recommended in a letter to Governor Moody that planting be prohibited in Brewster county.

He also proposed that the regulation be continued in the old infested area and put on in the new "but that notice be given that a non-optional zone will be established as to this area as soon as plans for adequate compensation of farmers are provided for—such plans to cover both the cost of any planting which may have been done prior to its approval as well as any losses due to substitution of other crops."

Mr. Mariatt pointed out that the federal government is more inclined to give aid where eradication and not control is the objective.

Pitch Makes Plea

Following a banquet served by the ladies of the church last night a short program featured by the unveiling of the training school totem pole and the presentation of 37 certificates, 23 local and 14 national, James P. Fitch, executive of the 15th region comprising Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, addressed the group, making a plea for more concentration on the youth of today.

"Never in the history of the world have youth been more earnestly striving to do what is right than they are today," Mr. Fitch declared in his talk in which he outlined the purposes of scouting and told of the benefits which it creates.

"When you think of youth, think not of them as the citizens of tomorrow but as the citizens of today," he continued. "Give youth a chance, let them realize that they have a place in the world as well as the future."

"The greatest menace to modern civilization is the fact that the boys of today, the men of tomorrow, are not physically developed. They are allowed to become soft and flabby in muscle in their earlier years. The United States is a nation of rosters and what it needs is to become a nation of players," he said.

Outline Scouting. Here he outlined scouting and its needs which it satisfied. Paramount is physical development, then comes moral education, in which scout work is an important factor aiding in vocational guidance of the youth. Character development is another need satisfied by the movement while participating citizenship is the ultimate aim of all scouting.

Closing his talk, he made a plea for increased interest in the movement, keeping in mind the fact that the interest of the boys should also be maintained.

"I realize I did wrong to carry on religious discussions, but I am ready to accept the consequences."

The American teachers were not charged with infringement of the civil code on their arraignment on February 13, the charges being merely disobedience of the ministry of education rules. The maximum penalty for the latter offense is imprisonment for one month and a fine of fifty lire.

Moderate Slash In Taxes, View of Cal and Treasury

Appropriations Will Not Make Reduction Impossible, Coolidge and Other Heads Believe.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Barry Coolidge and high treasury officials believe there will be a moderate tax reduction at this session of Congress.

Despite the opinion from some congressional sources that appropriations by Congress will make the tax reduction impossible at this session, the president holds that present appropriations have not jeopardized the \$225,000,000 reduction proposed by the administration at the opening of Congress.

He is supported in this view by treasury officials who contend that their estimates of income and budget bureau's recommendations of expenditures would be proven substantially correct when the final figures are at hand.

Await March 15 Payments
Both the White House and the treasury, however, are awaiting the result of the March 15 tax payments, which will represent the first installment of 1927 incomes and from which accurate calculations can be made of the total tax receipts for the fiscal year 1929.

President Coolidge bases his belief in a moderate tax reduction on the theory that Congress will exercise care in future appropriations at this session. If Congress holds down to normal expenditures he sees no reason why the tax reduction cannot be carried through.

Contrary to opinions in some quarters, the president sees no threat to tax reduction in the measures for settlement of the alien property question, increased pensions and flood relief.

ORDER SAMPLES

Large Enrollment Expected In Cotton Course

Three thousand cotton samples have been ordered by Texas Tech to take care of the large enrollment which is expected during the coming summer in the special cotton classing course which is to be offered in the Tech textile department. This was the statement yesterday of Prof. E. W. Camp, head of the Tech textile department.

Forty-three were enrolled in the class last summer and a large increase is expected for this year. Assisting Mr. Camp in the work will be Harry E. Blocker, local cotton man.

Efforts will be made to have students grade as much as three thousand bales during the term.

\$350,000 LAND TRADE

3500 Acres of Wheat Land Changes Hands

FLOYDADA, March 6.—The second trade in 30 days by which two Hale County citizens became possessors of some 3500 acres of Floyd county wheat land was consummated this week when Gamble Land company of this city closed a deal between Dr. J. H. Massie of Wichita Falls and Solon Clements of Plainview in which Massie acquired the Plainview theater building and Clements became owner of 1600 acres of land six miles north of Floydada.

The Plainview theater building is one of the best in that city and the land acquired by Mr. Clements is known here as the Williams and Price land, most of which is sowed to wheat.

Dr. Massie, formerly of Floydada, recently closed a deal with Chas. Vinegar of Plainview in which he secured the Viegel office building in return for 1519 acres of wheat land in the county. The two trades represent approximately \$350,000.

SENATE COAL QUIZ

Two Score Witnesses Are Summoned In Probe

WASHINGTON, March 6. (P)—More than two score witnesses have been summoned or invited to appear before the senate interstate commerce committee at the beginning Wednesday of its inquiry into conditions in the central bituminous fields where union miners have been out of work for nearly a year.

John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, will be the first witness and is expected to occupy the stand practically all of the first day. Other union officials also will be heard and afterward the committee will call to the stand officers of both the coal companies in Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio, and the railroads which serve those mines.

CANADIANS WIN

May Cross Border Line For Place of Work

NEW YORK, March 6. (P)—Canadian residents holding or seeking employment in the United States may cross the International Boundary daily without respect to immigration laws, the United States circuit court of appeals unanimously ruled today.

The decision affects thousands of Canadians who cross the International Boundary daily to work in industrial centers on the United States side of the border.

The decision was based on the Jay Treaty of 1794 between the United States and Great Britain which was interpreted as granting residents on either side of the border the right to cross and recross daily to transact business without the usual immigration restrictions.

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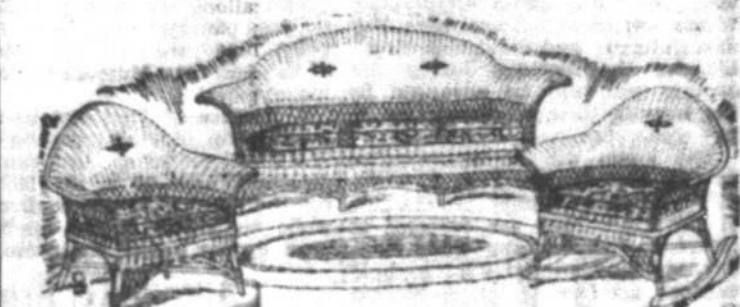
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Major Hoople Says Gardening Beats Golf When It Comes to Exercise; He Urges That Everybody Plant a Crop

Philosopher Admits Few of Us Can Make One Profitable But Believes Plan a Good One.

For some time we have been turning our attention to politics, but from now on you may count us out. We have written up every prospective candidate we know of and so far none of them have even so much as dropped us a card of thanks. Now if they think we are going to continue boosting their

coming. We are not very strong for any of them, and so far as we are concerned they can run the race in single harness, and defeat for any of them won't fill our eyes with tears.
After all politics amounts to very little. What we are interested in is something to eat. If we can get this we will then try and buy a few gallons of John D. juice to run our old concrete mixer (car) as we think next to food fresh air is necessary. But we are going to discuss gardens.
Any man with a strong back and a dime's worth of seed may have a

garden, and a good one. All he has to do is break the land, plant the seed, keep the weeds killed out and his neighbor's chickens scared off. If he has a good credit with the city and can use all the water he wants he may expect to sprout a few plants. Of course most of them will perish before maturity, but it is worth a lot to have a garden—kind of a homefied talking point when you have nothing else to discuss.
We think every man should have a garden—it makes good business for the seed man. Of course the average garden isn't worth much in dollars and cents, but if the owner does his duty it will give him plenty of exercise—it beats golf a lot and isn't so expensive. The trouble with most people is they expect too much. They read a few seed catalogs, look at the colored pictures and figure they can take a block of land 30 feet square and supply the whole town with vegetables. Nature-

ally they can't do it, and this disappoints them.
Education Is Neglected
Shortly after we left home and took a wife we began studying the high cost of living. At that time we didn't make very much money, but boasted an abnormal appetite for good food. We were especially fond of vegetables, so the first spring after we went into double harness we began considering the possibilities of a garden. We had a good piece of land and lots of ambition, but we later found that our education along agricultural lines had been sadly neglected.
We plowed the land—that is we had it plowed, and bought a few seeds of every known plant. We tried to grow everything from Irish potatoes to coconut palms, and the only reason we didn't plant some rubber trees and raise our own tires was because we couldn't find any rubber tree seed.
For three long, hot months we

toiled, but nary a spud did we raise. We hauled gyp water half a mile (it happened to be very dry that year) and sprinkled the plants daily. The vines grew up like sunflowers, but the roots failed to produce. Our onions did pretty well. We planted a couple of rows and for a time it looked as though we were going to be in position to supply a few produce houses with this more or less pleasing plant, but a neighbor's pig "gathered" them for us one morning while we were at Sunday school.
We planted radishes—a whole 4 foot bed of them, but they were so thick they could not grow, so we used the tops for cow feed. Of the hundred tomato plants we set out only three survived the hot sun and gyp water, and they looked like invalids and refused to bear until late in August. Then all at once they came to life and we actually got six or eight small tomatoes before frost killed them. Figuring

water at 2 cents a barrel we have since discovered that the tomatoes cost us about \$11.89 a pound, and then we didn't get anything for our work.
In this garden were other plants, but is needless for us to say we bought our vegetables this year. The worms got the beans, the okra died, and the peas refused to come up. We just didn't plant any more gardens—our hopes were blighted.
If you have never tried growing a garden you can not imagine how we felt unless you have had an old cow warp her cudgel appendage across your face at a time you were thinking of your girl and the cow was thinking of flies. If said cudgel happened to be filled with cockleburrs you dropped the milk pail and made a hurried exit from the cow pen muttering language that wouldn't do to print. That is the way we dropped the garden—just like it was hot.
Since that time, however, we have

learned a little about gardening, and as a result we very often harvest enough vegetables to pay for the seed. Of course we won't count water, fertilizer or work—that would be unfair to the garden. We now know you can't grow strawberries in January, and that turnips don't grow on bushes. We have also discovered that an egg plant in no way resembles a hen, and that white seeds will produce dark colored vegetables. In fact we have learned a lot, but as yet not enough to justify our growing a garden.
If congressmen were not so tight we might consider one, but for some reason or other they have about quit sending out seeds. (Maybe they think they will hold their jobs for life any way.) But with spring right at our door we will tell them right now that "seeds will have some power."
Some Better Trust Grocer
There are a lot of people in Lubbock who should grow gardens.

They know how. There are some who might try it—they can't lose very much, but there are others who should trust to their grocer for vegetables.
Of course it is an easy matter to grow a garden here, but it takes work. If a fellow is willing to give up golf and cigars and listen to his wife for an hour every afternoon, he may expect to come out winner. If you put seeds in the ground, give them a little water and keep the weeds away, you may expect home grown vegetables here for the South Plains has California skinned forty ways from Sunday when it comes to climate and soil. Out there they have to grow their vegetables—here they grow themselves. Try a garden.
WIDE CRACKS
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DAILY MARKETS

CHICAGO GRAIN
CHICAGO, March 6. (P)—Wheat prices advanced a set-back today and corn advanced. Although unfavorable wheat crop reports continued, some authorities held that growing weather is needed to determine the extent of possible damage. On the other hand, likelihood of smaller receipts strengthened the corn market.

Closing quotations on wheat were unsettled, 3-4c to 3-4c net lower, with corn varying from a shade decline to a shade up and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1c.

Oats averaged higher with corn. Provisions reflected upturns in the value of hogs.

CHICAGO, March 6. NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK, March 6. (P)—The cotton market was quiet today but the undertone was generally steady and early declines were followed by rallies. May contracts selling up from 18.47 to 18.57 or 9 points net higher, and closing at 18.57. The general market closed steady, net 5 points higher.

The market opened steady at an advance of 2 points to a decline of 3 points and eased off in trading under liquidation combined with local selling inspired by the relative ease showing of Liverpool. There was also some near month liquidation, probably incident to the circulation of March notices which were estimated at about 3,000 bales, and the old crop months were relatively easy. March sold off 18.31 or 13 points net lower, while October declined to 17.99 or 5 points under yesterday's closing quotation. Offerings tapered off at these figures, as if the March notices had been stopped, and the midday market steadied up.

Absence of selling pressure here no doubt emphasized reports of a generally steady spot situation in the south and some trade buying was reported as well as covering by early sellers.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON
NEW ORLEANS, March 6. (P)—The cotton market was rather steadier, but comparatively inactive today. Following an early decline prices rallied on expectations of bullish textile statistics and reports of large accumulation of cotton at Gulf ports for Russian account. The advance was not maintained, however, realizing carried May contracts down from 18.31 to 18.20, where the option closed, or 3 points net down for the day. The general market closed steady at net declines of 1 to 3 points.

Liverpool cables were 8 to 10 points lower than due and first trades here showed declines of 6 to 8 points. July contracts soon eased off to 17.96 and October 17.67 5 to 12 points under the previous close.

At these levels the demand in-

creased owing to the Russian and hostile influences. By mid-afternoon July reached 18.16, and October 17.83, 25 to 26 points up from the low and 8 to 11 points above the previous close.

In the final trading moderate realizing developed and July closed at 18.07 and October 17.76, 7 to 9 points down from the highs and one point under the Monday's close.

Exports for the day totaled 9,492 bales.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK
FORT WORTH, March 6. (P)—Trading in the livestock market here today was quiet and a little draggy in the cattle division with the bulk of the supply made up of mixed lots and generally lacking in quality. Slaughter steers sold from \$9.00 to \$11.00, cows around \$8.00, calves and yearlings \$11.00 to \$12.50, common bulls \$5.50 to \$6.00 and heavier ones \$6.00 to \$6.50.

More than half of today's sheep receipts were on direct billings to packers. Values were fully steady with some woolled fat lambs making \$13.50 and feeder woolled lambs \$14.50. Three decks of clipped fat wethers made \$9.00 and some shorn feeder lambs went at \$11.00.

Hog prices advanced from 10c to 15c. The top price was \$8.00 with bulk of receipts selling from \$7.50 to \$7.85.

WALL STREET
NEW YORK, March 6. (P)—General Motors led another spirited advance in prices in today's stock market, touching a new high record at 190, up 3 1-2 points net, on a total turn-over of more than 450,000 shares. Gains in most of the other active issues ran from 2 to 6 points although U. S. Steel common, Consolidated Gas, Paramount Famous Players and a few other recent favorites showed small revisions on profit-taking.

Business was not in as large a volume as yesterday although the day's sales ran well above 2 1-2 million shares.

Except for the continued ease of money rates, there was nothing in the outside news to explain the rise in stock prices. The sluggishness of the market last month had resulted in the creation of a large short interest in many issues, which was taken advantage of by "bull" pools plentifully supplied with funds to carry on their operations.

WOOL MARKET
BOSTON, March 6. (P)—Mills are showing some interest in fine domestic combing wools, but foreign lines continue slow. A few small sales have been closed on new Arizona wools, which are beginning to arrive on the market. Around 1.08 to 1.12 cents is the estimated basis price of the limited amount of business that has been done. The sales are of about average French combing staple. 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Mrs. West, Hammer
Slayer, Sentenced

Blonde Beauty Must Serve Life Sentence in Reformatory for Killing of Her Husband.

(By The Associated Press)
PAINESVILLE, Ohio, March 6. —Mrs. Velma West, the blonde hammer slayer of Perry, Ohio, will enter the women's reformatory at Mansfield, tomorrow to begin a life sentence for the slaying of her young husband, Thomas Edward West, son of a wealthy nurseman.

Velma escaped trial for first degree murder this morning when Prosecutor Seth Paulin accepted the plea of guilty to a second degree murder charge.

The 21-year-old girl, jubilant over the disposition of the charge, looked forward to life within the reformatory walls as a change to be desired.

Her cell in the Lake County jail, though brightened a bit with flowers and pictures since her incarceration three months ago, has been a place of terrible solitude, she declared.

Looks to Parole
"Within ten years I will be eligible for parole," said Velma, "that gives me hope. I expect to work to occupy my mind, to get away from it all. I long for the fresh air and for something to do. I love life, and I want to live it. That's the way of youth, I guess."

The attractive young woman was full of smiles as she received newspaper men after Common Pleas Judge J. D. Barnes had passed sentence upon her.

But later in the day she lost her calm demeanor when her mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Van Wert, of Cleveland, called upon her at the jail to bid her farewell.

In Sudden Collapse
When in the arms of her mother she suddenly collapsed. Several minutes passed before she was revived. The leave-taking then was cut short on account of her condition. Velma asked to be taken to the honeymoon bungalow at Perry, where she beat her husband to death with a hammer last December. She wanted to get some of her personal belongings, she said, but Prosecutor Paulin refused to give his consent.

Velma's plea of guilty to a second degree murder charge was a routine affair. Judge Barnes remarked that no part of her term is to be spent in solitary confinement.

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'Lame Duck' Term Is Target House Amendment Bill

Extended Debate Over Availability of Accepting The Norris-White Resolution.

(By the Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 6. — The House took counsel with itself today on the advisability of accepting the Norris-White amendment to the constitution proposing to abolish the "lame duck" or short session of Congress and to change the presidential inaugural date from March 4 to January 20.

The amendment also would provide for succession to the presidency by the vice-president-elect in event of the death of the former and empower Congress to provide by law for the succession in case of death of both.

The debate drew to the House floor one of the largest attendances of the session and endorsements of the amendment by both representatives, Garret of Tennessee, the Democratic leader, and Burton of Ohio, one of the powers of the Republican Congressional ranks, were heard by considerably more than a quorum of the membership.

For four successive years the Senate has passed a similar resolution, but today was the first time that the question has been called up in the House. The Senate in approving the resolution early this session did so with a two-thirds vote, which also will be necessary in the House. Ratification by three-fourths of the state legislatures then would be necessary.

Presidential approval is not required.

Abolition of the "lame duck session" would be obtained by providing that Congress convene January 4, after the pending November elections.

This session, coming in odd numbered years, could run for 12 months and in even numbered years, under the resolution there would be a four-month session ending May 4.

At present the long sessions come in the even numbered years and the short or "lame duck" session, in the odd numbered years, following the November elections.

SHANGHAI FORCE

Only 10,000 Foreign Soldiers There Now

SHANGHAI, March 6. (AP)—The Shanghai defense force, composed of American Marines and troops of Britain, France, Japan and Italy is steadily getting smaller. From a total of 35,000 men at the height of the disturbances of a year ago which brought them here, the force is reduced to approximately 10,000.

A recent check-up of the men showed the United States to have 1,200 and Great Britain 5,700.

Affairs of Orient Line To Be Investigated

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., March 6. (AP)—A federal grand jury inquiry, surrounded by unusual secrecy, began here today in connection with affairs of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad. The road was recently reorganized under the direction of W. T. Kemper, formerly its receiver and now its president.

Two hand truck loads of books and records of the Orient were taken into the grand jury room shortly before noon today.

What phase of the case was the subject of inquiry could not be learned. Controversy has raged about the Orient since its receivership and reorganization under the sanction of Federal Judge John C. Pollock, who appointed Mr. Kemper receiver and authorized the reorganization sale, by which he became president.

HARPER PRESIDES

Accused Judge Sits Over Murder Trial

OROVETON, March 6. (AP)—District Judge Carl T. Harper, of Madisonville, Texas, himself charged with murder last week at Huntsville, presided briefly here today in another murder trial.

After three jurors had been chosen, he announced he was too ill to proceed and set the case for hearing June 11. Other cases on the docket are to be taken up next week.

Judge Harper was at liberty on \$5,000 bond, charged with shooting and killing Jack Lee Rich, of Houston, on a street at Huntsville last Friday night after the judges auto had collided with Rich's machine. He was presiding today in the trial

of Russell Groves, charged with killing Melville Hinson in the street here several weeks ago.

Both Judge Harper and Groves are about 50 years of age. Each of the men they are charged with killing were under 30.

Judge Harper appeared in court today with an injured eye from which he has suffered since Friday. He said just before adjourning the Groves case, that it pained him to the extent that his vision was temporarily impaired.

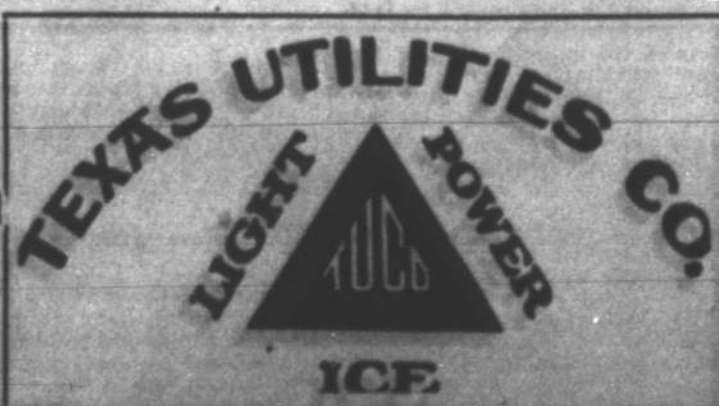
