Sleet, Ice Grip Area For Second Week

The first 18 days of January may not have set a record but it should come close to it where cold weather, sleet and ice are concerned.

There have been 15 of the 18 days since January 1 that the temperature was 32 degrees or below. During the period there were five days the low was in the 30s, five days the low was in the 20s and eight days the low was 19 degrees or below.

The weather information given below was recorded at the weather station in Mt. Vernon for the 24-hour period ending at 7:00 a.m. on the day listed for the period of January 12 through January 18.

There were only nine days during the period the high reached 40 degrees or above. There were nine days the high was in the 30s, four days in the 40s, two days in the 50s and three days in the 70s.

The high temperatures from Monday, January 9 through Sunday, January 15 remained below 40 degrees with the low for this period ranging from 13 degrees to 28 degrees.

Sleet that fell on Wednesday, January 12 measured 2½ in-

ches Thursday at 7:00 a.m. The moisture content of this sleet measured 1.31 inches.

Roads and streets remained hazardous throughout Thursday with many slick spots remaining through Friday. Considerable ice remained along roadways and shaded areas on Wednesday.

It was noted that the city and State Highway Department personnel worked diligently Thursday and Friday to clear

roadways and highways of the sleet and ice.

Predictions of snow Tuesday night did not materialize but forecasters were predicting precipitation to begin Wednesday afternoon with freezing rain and sleet Wednesday night followed by snow on Thursday.

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School Board Tours Vocational Facilities

Prior to the business session Tuesday, Jan. 10, the Talco-Bogata School Board toured the

Vocational Agriculture and Industrial Arts facilities at Rivercrest. The tour was conducted by Vocational Agriculture teachers, Pete Taylor and Craig Ingram; Industrial Arts teacher, Kenneth Pirtle, and Rivercrest principal, Mike Vinyard. Vocational teacher, Johnny Swarts, was absent due to the arrival of a new baby girl in his family who has been named, Jaime Lynn.

The first item on the agenda was a discussion of plans to begin work on the old Joliet School Campus facilities for a Youth Project Show and other activities. During the past summer and this school year, this site has been cleaned and all the rubble and debris has been removed or buried. Board approval was given to the long range plans for this project and for the purchase of some used pipe for the beginning phase of this work. The work, which will be done mostly by vocational students and teachers, will probably take a couple of years to complete at an estimated cost of \$1500.00 to \$2000.00. Some individuals and local firms have already donated materials for this project with promises of more help as the program develops. It was mentioned that Rivercrest held its first Calf Show last year at temporary facilities set up at the football field. The show was well attended and the Joliet facilities will serve as the permanent location for the Calf Show and related Youth Project Activities. The Board

expressed a feeling that this was a worthy project and one that could be of much benefit to our youth and community.

In a matter related to a request that had been made to fly radio controlled model airplanes from the Rivercrest Campus, the request was denied due to the feeling of possible injury to student who might be on campus and or damage to school facilities.

Board approval was given to the audit of various school funds for the 1976-77 school year as completed by the firm of McClanahan & Holmes. The firm stated that the Talco-Bogata Schools fiscal records were in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles.

In other matters, the various

financial reports were approved and other general school information was presented. It was reported that the air conditioning work at the Talco School cafeteria had been completed. In an attendance report, it was stated that the average daily attendance in the school district for the first two six weeks reporting periods of this year was 754 as compared to 792 for the previous year.

Since the school district must offer the Breakfast Program beginning with the 1978-79 school year, Board approval was given for the three campuses to make a "trial run" of the Breakfast Program later in the year. This will be contingent on approval by the School Lunch Division of the Texas Education Agency.

In a matter related to a school bus, it was the decision of the Board that the bus would not be put back into service prior to Board approval and verification that the bus is in sound and safe mechanical condition.

In matters related to personnel, the contract of Superintendent Talmadge Morgan was extended for an additional year. Also, the Board reemphasized its feeling concerning the importance and necessity of a thorough evaluation program of all school personnel's job performance.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be Tuesday, February 7, 1978 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Basketball Season Entering Second Half

Tuesday night's basketball games ended the first half of the conference season.

Slated to play were Commerce at North Lamar, Rains at Rivercrest, Quinlan at

Winnsboro, and Mount Vernon at Prairiland.

The second half of play will begin Friday, with Rivercrest at Quinlan, Winnsboro at Prairiland, Commerce at Rains and North Lamar at Mount Vernon.

Standing before Tuesday's games place Commerce in first place with five wins and no losses; Rivercrest, North Lamar and Prairiland tied for second place with four wins and two losses; Winnsboro with three wins and three losses, and Rains, Quinlan and Mount Vernon in the cellar with one win and five losses.

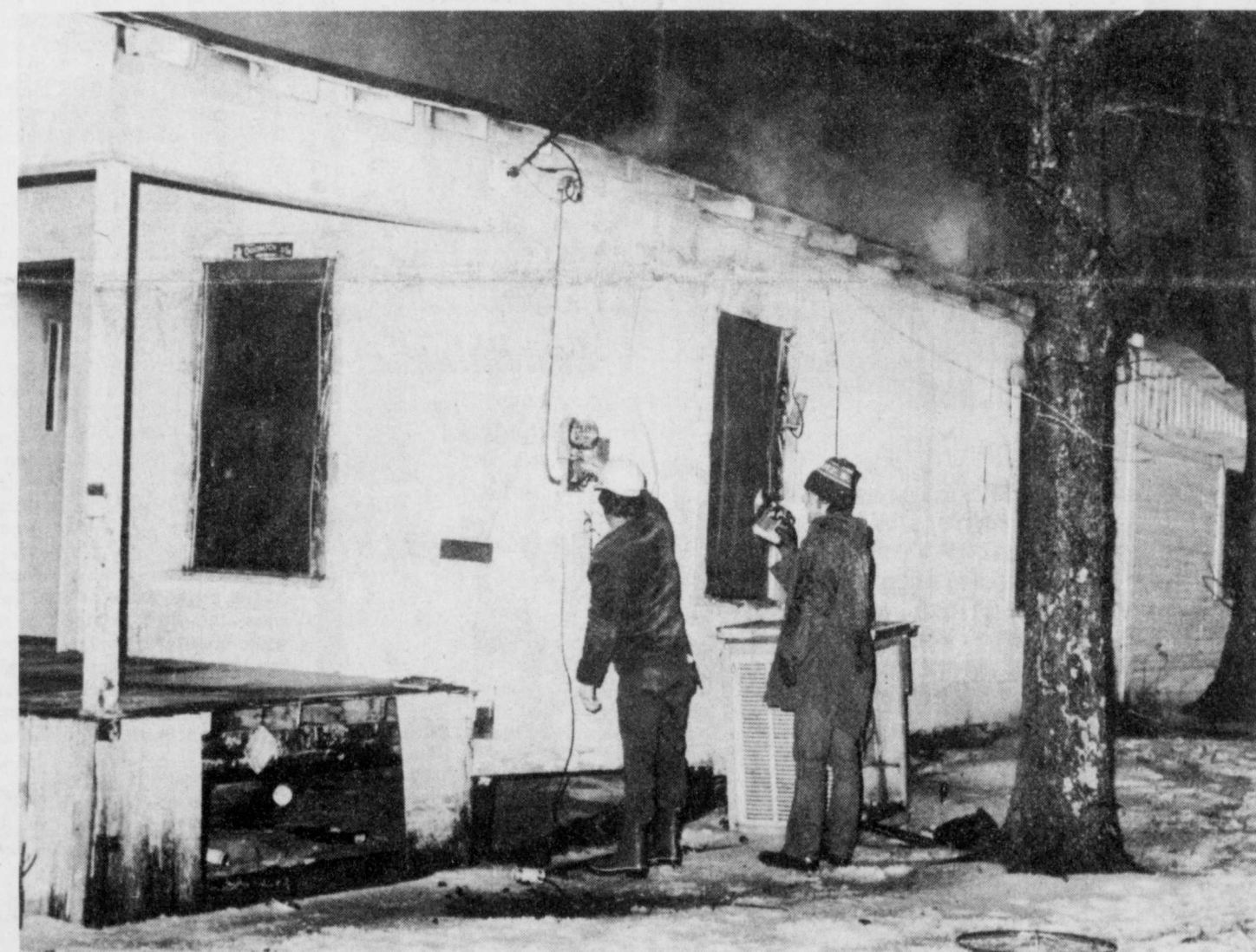
Commerce has scored 417 points to 303 for the opponents; Rivercrest has scored 331 points to 270 for the opponents; North Lamar has scored 338 points to 260 for the opponents; Prairiland has scored 334 points to 252 for the opponents; Winnsboro has scored 303 points to 320 for the opponents; Rains has scored 264 points to 380 for the opponents; Quinlan has scored 288 points to 371 for the opponents; and Mount Vernon has scored 267 points to 372 for the opponents.

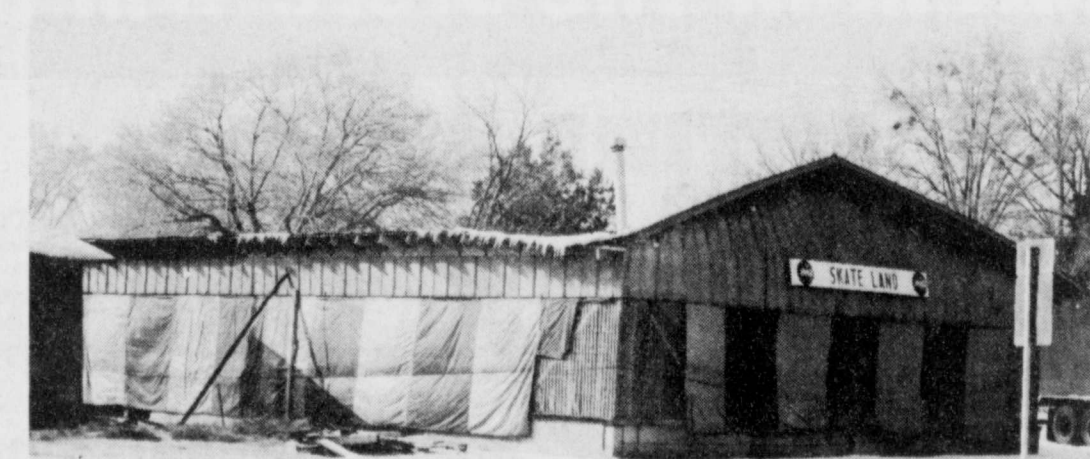

The name was changed to J. P. 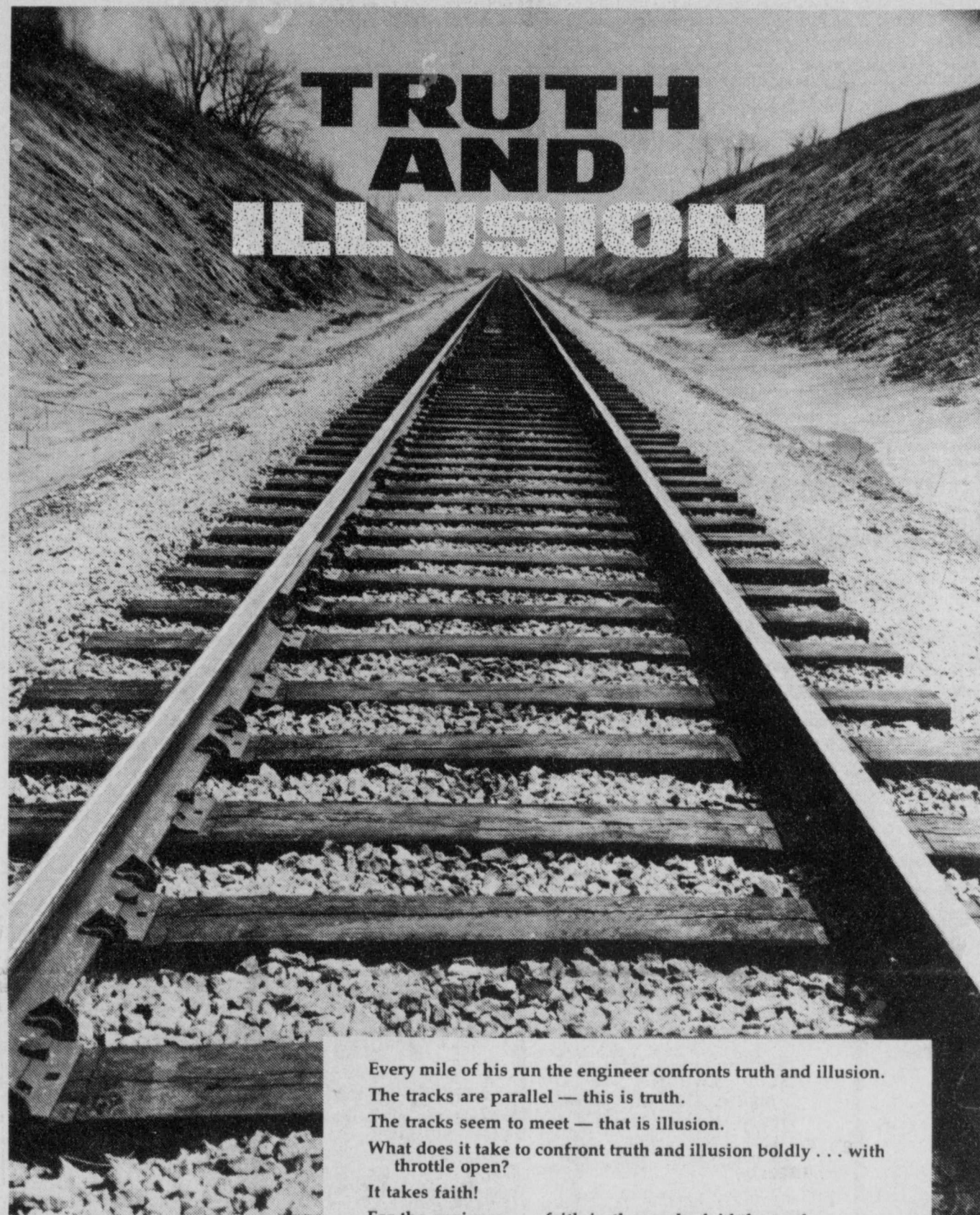

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF BLOSSOM PRAIRIE, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That the monthly rates or charges for water furnished by the Town's Waterworks System shall be and the same are hereby revised and established to be as follows: Monthly rate will be charged as the first 2000 gallons, \$8.50 (minimum); all over 2000 gallons, \$1.40 per 1000 gallons.

SECTION 2: That the rates or charges herein provided for water shall be effective immediately and applied on the next billing date.

SECTION 3: That all ordinances, orders or resolutions, or parts thereof, heretofore passed and adopted by the Town Council in conflict

herewith, shall be and the same are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict.

SECTION 4: That the fact that it is to the best interest of the Town to formally increase rates for water furnished by the Town's Waterworks System at the earliest possible date constitutes and creates an emergency and an urgent public necessity requiring that this ordinance be passed and take effect as an emergency measure, and that any rule requiring ordinances to be read more than one time or at more than one meeting be suspended, and any such rules are hereby suspended and this ordinance is accordingly passed as an emergency and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Landowner Guide Published

A forest landowner assistance guide for the South has been published by the Southern Forest Products Association (SFPA). Single copies of the guide are available free of charge from SFPA.

The guide lists those members of SFPA who provide forest management assistance to neighboring private landowners, explains what kind of

help each company will supply and tells who to contact.

SFPA is a trade association of lumber manufacturers from 12 Southern states. Its members produce nearly half of all the Southern Pine lumber in the nation, enough to build some 300,000 homes a year.

Over half of all SFPA active members provide forest landowners assistance. Landowners in Arkansas and Louisiana each have 13 members offering such help. Only in Oklahoma and Tennessee are there as few as two SFPA members offering help in growing trees.

Assistance provided by these companies includes on-site inspection of the woodland with a report of findings and recommendations; tax guidance; boundary line survey and maintenance; planting or seeding; timber stand improvement; fire land construction; prescribed burning; guidance in utilizing cost-sharing funds; and timber sale preparation and harvesting.

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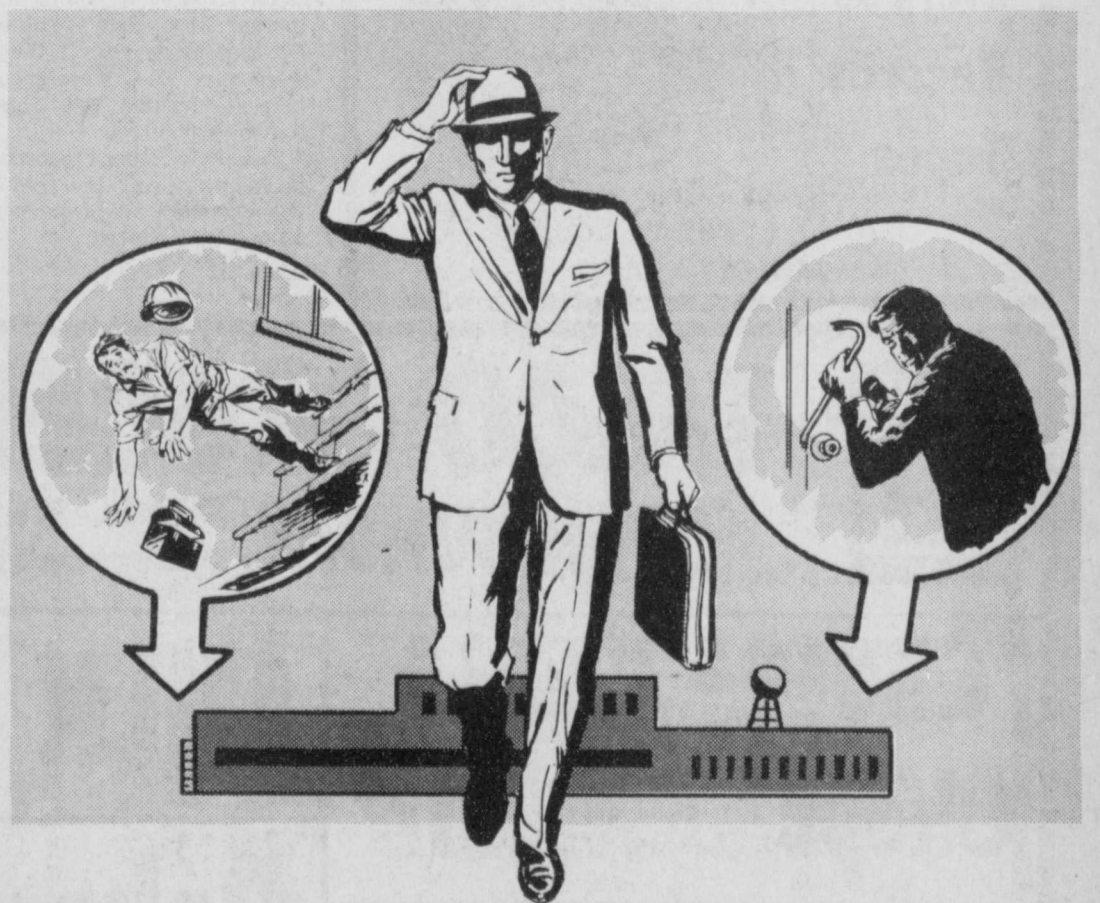
