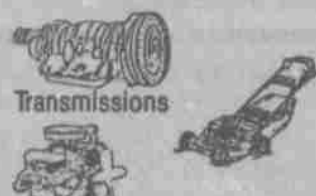

High-tech Texas has deep roots in agriculture

From the Superconducting Super Collider in Waxahachie to Sematech in Austin, high-tech enterprise has placed Texas on the cutting edge of new and exciting industries. Economic sectors that were just a dream a few years ago now are diversifying and expanding our economy.

This economic transformation clearly is remarkable. Yet, it shouldn't blind us to the tremendous contribution still made by our most fundamental industry—agriculture—not only to our economy, but to our lifestyle, our values and even our outlook. To be sure, today's high-tech industries are being built on the strong foundation laid by agriculture, by farmers and ranchers who long have been and continue to be innovators of technology.

Farming and ranching is now our state's second largest industry—providing work, either directly or indirectly, for one out of every five Texans. Today some 186,000 farms and ranches—more than in any other state in America—dot our landscape, generating \$11 billion a year in sales and pumping more than \$32 billion into the Texas economy.

In fact, we now are the nation's top producer of four leading mainstream commodities: livestock, cotton, wool and mohair. Our annual livestock sales total nearly 50 percent of our state's agricultural income. We generate 16 million pounds of wool a year and raise 90 percent of the country's Angora goat population. Last year, we produced four million bales of cotton—one-third of the entire U.S. production.

It should come as no surprise, then, that Texas is the second largest agricultural producer in America, behind only California. Our food and fiber system is one of the most vital in the world, and the quality of our goods

and products is unbeatable. Truly, we stand head and shoulders above all others when it comes to the production of good and wholesome commodities.

However, too much of what we produce is being sent out of state for processing. Others are adding value to our commodities and profiting as a result.

The unfortunate fact is Texas now lags far behind the rest of the world in treating, preparing or refining what it produces. For instance, two-thirds of all foreign imports entering our country are processed goods. Nationally, 20 percent of all commodities are taken to the processing stage in the state where they are produced.

But in Texas, that number is 8 percent. We ship 92 percent of all Texas-grown commodities to others for processing—meaning we also send them our jobs and dollars that otherwise would go into Texans' pocketbooks.

It's time we changed all that. It's time we increased our exports not only of raw commodities, but of processed goods. It's time we kept our jobs and our opportunities at home. As your new

Let me give you an example of the potential in adding value to our commodities through processing. If Texas processed an additional 5 percent of its raw products, an estimated 30,000 new jobs in agriculture and manufacturing would be created. Income would increase by \$500 million, and our state's economy would enjoy a \$2.5 billion boost.
