Fiction Story On Water Sales Proves Thought Provoking

Eastland County Water Supply District has submitted the following article that was recently published in the Journal American Water Works Association.

This article should prove very thought provoking for water customers. Water For Mr. and Mrs. Smith "Let us assume a nice young couple, Mr. and Mrs. Smith, with two children, have just bought a new \$40,000 up-to-date home in one of our better suburban towns.

Now this couple has never heard about water costs. They had always lived in a New York apartment where their water was a \$ thrown in with the rent. In going to market, this young wife cannot order just so many pounds of dinner. She has to specify meat, peas, potatoes, bread, milk and so on.

So, instead of letting the young husband order a lump sum of water to take care of their needs, lets invent a water department at city hall which has various divisions, like a supermarket.

"Mr. Smith, the proud homeowner, is seated on his porch when a man approaches and introduces himself as head of the drinking water division of the water department. They discuss how much drinking water the Smith family will want, but who could estimate that? "How about this," suggests the man, "a blanket contract whereby you can all drink as much water as you wish? The cost—1 cent per day per person."

Smith knows that at his office downtown they pay 80 cents per bottle for drinking water, which comes to 16 cents per gallon. At home he can drink a gallon a day,

"Only 2 cents per day per person," says the man, Smith, knowing that you use heaps more water for bathing than you possibly could for drinking, and here it is only double the drinking water cost, promptly signs for that.

"Then comes the head of the sanitary division. "You'll need water for your washing machine about 40 gal. per load, and the toilets (7-9 gal. each flushing), and the garbage disposal unit in the kitchen sink. It's cheap—same as the bathing water, in fact—only 2 cents per day per person. And remember, you might use a more of this sanitary water than bathing water."

Smith signs for that too. "The next man is from the miscellaneous water division. "Now," asks Smith, "just what is miscellaneous water and how much does that cost?" "A cent a day per person," says the man, "and it includes a lot of things—rinsing the dishes, cleaning windows, washing screens and storm shades, hosing the garage, washing the car, cooking, making lemonade, mixing drinks, bathing the dog, air conditioning—"

"Hold everything," interrupts Smith, "did you say air conditioning?" Well now, Smith is a fellow bragging to his office associates how his air-conditioning unit was going to be worth \$50 a month extra during the hot summer weather. And here, for a few cents a day, he can virtually freeze himself into an ice cube if he wants to. So he buys that water too.

Babysitters were hard to find, so Mary Jane decided to take her year old son Billy with her to the supermarket. She placed him in one of the many shopping carts provided by the supermarket which have a seat for young children, and began shopping for groceries. A few minutes later, while Mary Jane was still shopping with Billy in the cart, the seat in which he was sitting came apart, letting him fall to the floor.

Mary Jane brought a legal action against the supermarket for the medical expenses she and her husband had incurred as a result of Billy's fall and resulting injuries. The store manager claimed that the mothers, not the supermarket, were liable for the safety and well-being of children brought into the store, and that any injury to Billy was not their fault.

Can the supermarket be held liable?

Yes, said the court. The proprietor of a place of business furnishing his customers or invitees with shopping carts or baby strollers must exercise reasonable care in the selection and maintenance of such devices. The storekeeper who invites mothers and children to his establishment for the purpose of selling them his goods is duty bound not to injure them through the lack of due care. The very nature of a device such as a baby stroller or shopping cart calls for particular care in examining them at such intervals as would assure their users of their safety and reliability.

Shoppers in supermarkets must themselves use ordinary care not to injure others with shopping carts. The "rules of the road" do not apply to carts in grocery stores, and ordinarily the storekeeper will not be held liable for

a total of \$30.55 per person per year. With four in the family, his annual water bill would be \$122.20.
"When I compare that with my water bill, I admit it sounds high. But take a quick look at our other utilities. I would guess that our electric charges in the average home come to \$10 per month. That totals \$120 a year. Telephone service reaches a comparable figure. I cannot for the life of me see why water, with its multiple uses, is not worth as much as either of those two utilities."

Auto Insurance Up Only \$6 Since 1938 - For Few In County

Approximately 55% of the private passenger automobiles in Eastland County can now be covered for basic limits public liability insurance for only \$6.90 more than the same insurance cost in 1938 due to the use of insurance classification plans, the State Board of Insurance announced this week.

To give a specific illustration: basic limits public liability insurance (bodily injury and property damage combined) on a private passenger car, used only for family purposes, and not owned or operated by a male under 25 years of age, and principally garaged in a town of city in this county now costs \$36.00.

If the owner and his co-resident operators are accident and conviction free under the Texas Safe Driving Plan a 20% differential is allowed which would reduce the rate to \$29.00.

In 1938 the same insurance on a private passenger car in a city or town in Eastland County would have cost \$23.00.

Approximately 55% of the non-farm private passenger cars in such county are entitled to this reduced rate.

Farm automobiles carry a lower rate because they are not exposed to hazard in the same ratio of benefit from the Safe Driving Plan in relation to former costs as the non-farm cars will receive.

The purpose of insurance classification plans is to allocate more of the cost of insurance to the class of risks which result in the most losses.

Classification begins with type of motor vehicle. If a private passenger car, then classification for liability insurance is by territory where principally garaged, use of the vehicle and driver characteristics.

On physical damage, including collision, fire, theft and comprehensive insurance, the first price of the insured automobile and its age are also considered.

Rates are made separately on commercial types of motor vehicles from private passenger cars, and on private passenger cars according to the use made of them.

The State is now divided into 26 statistical territories and 10 rating territories.

Large metropolitan counties are separate territories since there are a sufficient number of cars in such counties to afford a sound basis for separate rating.

Smaller counties are grouped with other counties having a reasonably similar loss experience for rating purposes. Each rating territory can largely control its own rates by reducing accidents and consequently the number of insured losses.
