Location

Brownfield is the County site of Terry County, Texas, and is in the best fruit and stock country on the South Plains. The climate is dry, cool and healthful.

In regard to railroads, the Texas Almanac for 1910, has the following: The Colorado, Hereford & Gulf railroad is projected north and south through the county, and the Texas Central is projected through it east and west. The Quanah, Acme & Pacific is proposed through the county from the northeast to the southwest to El Paso.

Methods

With many years of observation and experience, we aim to direct our work in a manner which will bear the closest scrutiny and produce the most lasting results. Our object will be to prepare youths for the actual duties of life; and, to this end, nothing in our power will be omitted which will tend to promote their mental, moral and physical growth.

Our methods of teaching are intended to be thorough, practical and progressive, and to awaken independent thought. They enable the pupil to acquire knowledge, training and development, educating him physically, morally and intellectually.

Attendance

Students who desire to avail themselves of the advantages of the school are earnestly requested to be present on the first day, and, if they expect to keep pace with their classes, to apply themselves diligently and attend regularly during the term.

The object of this first annual announcement of Brownfield Public School is to notify the people concerning our plans and purposes for the ensuing year, and to encourage the patronage of those in the surrounding communities, who are not conveniently situated to good schools. We wish to state that everything indicates a most interesting and profitable year's work. The teaching force has been carefully selected, each teacher being especially prepared for the work allotted to them. This, together with from five to ten years experience in teaching, will, we are sure, enable them to carry the work to a successful issue. Our

school house is a large two-story building, containing six rooms, three above and three below, all well furnished and well ventilated. Two of the rooms being built with partition walls that may be raised on public occasions, giving a seating capacity for a large audience.

We are proud of the interest that has been manifested in school affairs by the citizens of Brownfield. With such support and enthusiasm as they are giving us, we feel sure that we can make this the best school that the town has ever had.

As public servants, teachers expect their work to be scrutinized and criticized, and as far as possible such criticism to be constructive and not destructive. Teachers are but human individuals and as such share the common desire for approbation, and it is highly probable, in fact almost certain, that no teacher can ever do his best without the inspiring effect of the approval from his patrons. There are four principal facts that contribute to any public school, viz: The Child, The Parent, The School Board and the Teacher; each of these has his own proper duties to perform, and a failure on the part of any one almost compels a failure for the other three. The child is or should be the chief beneficiary of this great institution, and from the very condition of his being, is entirely under the control of the other three, it can and will perform its duties when the other factors harmoniously and unanimously discharge their functions. With reference to the Brownfield Public School, the board promises to perform well its duties; we believe the patrons stand ready to discharge theirs, and we feel sure that the Teachers will prove competent, efficient and faithful. Speaking for the Teachers, we ask the patrons and friends of education to visit them often, and spend enough time with them to observe what they do and how they do it. This will help them and will help you. If you give the teachers your hearty co-operation and they fail to do their duty as teachers censure them privately or publicly, but please do not condemn them unless you have first performed your whole duty toward your child, your school and them.

SCHOOL BOARD Teachers

Teachers shall notify the Principal at the earliest possible moment when they are unable to attend to their duties, that their places may be supplied at once.

When it shall become necessary to employ a substitute teacher, such substitute shall receive the same salary that is paid to the regular teacher, the same to be paid out of the salary of the teacher in whose place the substitute is employed.

Teachers are required to be in their respective rooms twenty minutes before school begins, and see that the pupils under their charge distinctly understand and faithfully observe all rules relating to pupils.

They shall exercise a vigilant care over the general conduct and morals of their pupils in the school rooms, on the play grounds and, as far as possible, on their going to and returning from school. And all teachers are required to maintain strict order and discipline in their class at all times.

They shall endeavor, upon all proper occasions, to impress upon the minds of their pupils the principles of morality and virtue, a sacred regard for truth, love of God, love of man, politeness, neatness, industry and frugality.

But no teacher shall exercise any sectarian influence in the school.

They shall make preparation for teaching and for hearing recitations, in order that they may present subjects in a forcible, attractive and practical manner. They shall seek to learn the character, disposition, capacity and quality of mind of their pupils and to govern them by the moral influences of kindness and by appeal to the nobler principles of their natures.

The teacher shall be careful that no part of the school building, furniture or apparatus be defaced or injured. They shall keep their rooms in neat order, well ventilated and lighted, and at a uniform temperature.

COURSE OF STUDY

First Grade

READING. Begin with simple, original lessons in script, given by the teacher, using blackboard. Follow with primer. Use word method principally; combined with it the sentence method. Teach new words when the lesson is assigned. Second and third term use first reader and supplementary reading. Have pupils to write, using script from the beginning.

SPELLING. Teach oral spelling, both by sound and by letter. For written work, copy words selected from the reading lesson and write words and sentences from dictation. Easy diacritical marks.

NUMBERS. Develop the idea of numbers by means of objects. Teach the numbers, and not the figures, from 1 to 15, inclusive. Writing and reading numbers from 1 to 1,000. Easy exercises in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Common coins and measures by objects.

LANGUAGE. Conversation lesson objects that are familiar and interesting to the children. Require pupils to express their thoughts in full, well rounded sentences. Write simple sentences, statements and questions. Explain the use of terminal marks, noting the use of capitals. Story writing from study of objects. Dictation lessons. Easy memory gems.

GENERAL LESSONS. Lessons on forms and colors, distance and direction. Easy lessons on plants and flowers. Free arm and breathing exercises, calisthenics; easy songs, simple lessons on the human body and morals, manners, order, drawing.

Second Grade

READING. Second reader completed. Careful study of new words before beginning to read the lesson. Attention to articulation and naturalness of expression and punctuation marks. Supplementary reading.

SPELLING. Oral and written spelling of new words in other lessons. Attention to correct spelling in all written exercises. Use of diacritical marks. Pupils learn pronunciation, meaning and use of each word spelled. Easy exercises in spelling and use of homonyms. Begin use of word primer.

GEOGRAPHY. Local geography. Begin early map drawing. Teach ideas of lake, mountain, river, and the cardinal points of the compass. Make a map of county, locating the rivers, mountains, towns, etc.

WRITING. Continue the slate exercises. Begin use of pen before the grade is finished.

NUMBERS. Review the work of previous grade. Observe same method in teaching the (Continued on Page 2.)

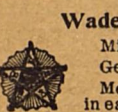

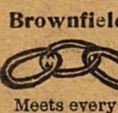

numbers to twenty. Much oral work. Addition; including carrying. Subtraction, including cases in which some of the orders of the the subtrahend are larger than corresponding orders of the minuend. Easy work in multiplication and division. Roman numerals to C. Time of day by the clock.

LANGUAGE. Conversation lesson, as in previous grades. Reproduction of easy stories.

GENERAL LESSONS. Continue the lessons on forms and colors. Lessons on morals and manners. Miscellaneous exercises and drills. Drawing.

Third Grade

READING. Third reader. Attention to new words. Supplementary reading. Special attention to pronunciation and distinct articulation.

SPELLING. Special attention to spelling important words, both oral and written. Defining words and marking them diacritically.

ARITHMETIC. Use beginners' book. Special attention to oral work. Multiplication table should be mastered in this grade.

WRITING. Attention to position, pen holding, movement, form, and neatness in all written exercises. Use copy books Nos. 1, 2 and 3.

LANGUAGE. Begin the use of the text book in this grade. Frequent exercises in composition, dictation and letter writing. Supplementary exercises.

GEOGRAPHY. Begin elementary geography with book.

PHYSIOLOGY. Begin with oral lessons, and in last half of year use primary text book.

GENERAL LESSONS. Lessons in morals and manners, on plants, biographical sketches, drawing; call attention to current events. Calisthenics.

Fourth Grade

READING. Fourth reader. First half of book; continue as in preceding grades. Correct understanding and natural expression must be cultivated. Sight reading should be encouraged. Supplementary reading.

SPELLING. Word book. Also select difficult words from reading lessons. Explain use and meaning. Continue instructions in diacritical work. Use of school dictionary as a book of reference may begin here.

WRITING. Same as before. Use copy book No. 4.

ARITHMETIC. Review work of Third Grade, and make pupils thorough in fundamental rules, multiples and divisors. Teach to part 4, page 184. Pay close attention to the analysis of the fraction. Teach from the concrete.

GEOGRAPHY. Elementary; first half completed and reviewed in this grade.

LANGUAGE. Language lesson. Modern English Lessons to chapter 3, page 138. Give close attention to correct expression and the proper use of words.

PHYSIOLOGY. Finish primary book in this grade.

GENERAL LESSONS. Oral lessons on the human body. Develop in the pupils ideas of self government and personal responsibilities. Calisthenics.

Fifth Grade

READING. Fourth Reader. Latter half of book. Lessons should be clearly explained and understood. Give strict attention to emphasis and naturalness of expression. Supplementary reading. Encourage the reading of current events. All new words must be defined.

SPELLING. Word book continued. Spell and define such words, especially as are in general use. Mark diacritically and use dictionary.

ARITHMETIC. Elementary. Begin at page 184. After reviewing the last fifty pages continue to page 280. Give special attention to analysis.

LANGUAGE. Continue Modern English lessons to chapter 6, page 261. The supplementary work.

GEOGRAPHY. Elementary completed and whole book reviewed in this grade.

WRITING. Use copy book No. 5.

PHYSIOLOGY. Adopted first book commenced.

HISTORY. Study biographies and current events.

PHYSICAL CULTURE. Daily practice, according to teacher's judgment.

Sixth Grade

READING. Fifth Reader. First half of the book, with selections as directed by the teacher. Give careful attention to the meaning of new words.

SPELLING. Complete second book and review same. Select words from other lessons in previous grades.

WRITING. Use copy book No. 6.

ARITHMETIC. Complete Elementary Arithmetic in this grade, and review from page 200. Give close attention to analysis. Give practical examples from other works.

PHYSIOLOGY. Adopted first book completed.

GEOGRAPHY. Adopted to page 104, with map drawing.

HISTORY. Pennybacker's "Texas History." Biographical and important current events continued.

LANGUAGE. Complete Modern English Lessons. Review the important parts; also use supplementary work.

PHYSICAL CULTURE. Daily practice as needed.

Seventh Grade

READING. Latter half of Fifth Reader, with selections as prescribed from time to time. Supplementary reading.

SPELLING. Continued as in sixth grade. Word analysis used in this grade.

GEOGRAPHY. Completed.

HISTORY. "Our Country." first half of the book.

GRAMMAR. Adopted. First half of book. Study the noun, pronoun, adjective, adverb and verb, omitting such discussions as are beyond the comprehension of the class.

ARITHMETIC. Adopted first half. Careful attention should be given to all new terms introduced in the text.

INTELLECTUAL ARITHMETIC. Adopted.

WRITING. Daily practice.

PHYSICAL CULTURE. As prescribed.

AGRICULTURE.

Eighth Grade

READING. Selections from English and American classics.

SPELLING. Word analysis completed.

HISTORY. U. S. complete and reviewed.

ARITHMETIC. Adopted. Also use Supplementary Arithmetic in this grade.

GRAMMER. Adopted. Grammar as a science, the work selected to suit the needs of the class.

PHYSIOLOGY. Completed in this grade.

ALGEBRA. Wentworth's "First Steps" finished.

LATIN. Commenced in the grade.

AGRICULTURE.

Ninth Grade

CIVIL GOVERNMENT. Commenced and completed.

RULES and REGULATIONS

for the

GOVERNMENT OF THE SCHOOL

General Rules.

The following percentages
shall be taken as the class stand-
ard for promotion to higher
grades: The Fourth and lower
grades, average upon all studies,
70; the Fifth and Sixth not lower
than 60, with an average not lower
than 75; the Seventh and Eighth
grades, not lower than 65, and;
with an average not less than 80,
the Ninth Tenth and Eleventh
grades, not less than 70, with an
average not less than 85.

Teachers shall require their
pupils to be in their respective
rooms at the appointed hour, and
all pupils not in shall be marked
tardy, or absent, as the case may
be, and, in all cases of unex-
plained absence or tardiness, the
teacher shall immediately ascer-
tain, in person or by written
note, the cause of same.

Teachers are required to attend
all meetings appointed by the
principal.

The utmost neatness and or-
der of things shall be preserved
by all teachers in their rooms.
Pieces of paper or other rubbish
shall not be allowed upon the
floor, in the pupil's desk, nor
thrown out in the yard. Each
teacher shall pay especial at-
tention to his own desk, that it
may at all times be a model of
neatness, and that everything
thereon is arranged with refer-
ence to taste. In fact, the
teacher is expected to be an ex-
ample in neatness, virtue, hon-
esty, truthfulness, amiability,
and everything else that pupils
should imitate.

Each teacher shall keep a class
book, in which shall be recorded
the standing of each pupil, and
shall make a monthly report to
the parent or guardian as to the
merits or demerits of each pupil
in attendance, recitation and
deportment.

Pupils

Every pupil is required to con-
form to all the rules and regula-
tions of the school, to obey
promptly all directions of the
teacher, to observe good order
and propriety or deportment, to
be diligent in study, kind to
school, to refrain from hasty or

improper language, to be clean
and neat in personal attire, and
to quit the neighborhood of the
school in a quiet, orderly man-
ner, immediately upon being
dismissed.

For the purpose of enforcing
proper discipline and maintain-
ing good order among the pupils
attending school, and that they
may receive the full benefit of
the instruction, the school au-
thorities and teachers shall be
deemed to have jurisdiction over
them from the hour they leave
home each morning until they
return.

Pupils will not be permitted
to use tobacco in any form in the
school house or on the play
grounds, or read novels during
school hours.

Pupils shall not assemble on
the school grounds earlier than
8:40 a. m., nor shall they loiter
about them after school is dis-
missed. Quarreling, fighting,
rude and discourteous conduct
and profane talk, about the
buildings or on the way to and
from school, will be deemed suf-
ficient cause for severe punish-
ment.

No pupil known to be afflicted
with a contagious infectious dis-
ease, or coming from a family
where such disease prevails,
shall be received or continued in
school.

All pupils must take the regu-
lar examinations.

Pupils shall not go into or upon
the play-grounds allotted ex-
clusively to the opposite sex.

Any pupil suspended under
any of the foregoing rules can be
restored only on such conditions
as the Board shall determine.

All pupils completing the full
course shall receive diplomas, the
form of which shall be prescribed
by the Board.

Promotions

No pupil shall be advanced
from any grade without having
passed a thorough examination
in all the studies of the grade,
except for special reasons satis-
factory to the teachers and
School Board. Pupils who leave
school before the close of the
session shall not be allowed any
preference, on re-entering, over
new scholars, nor shall they be
permitted to rejoin their classes
until they have passed a satis-
factory examination in the re-
quired studies. The idea that
children can remain out of school
one-half or one-third of the term
and keep up with their classes is
a mistaken one, and ruins the
education of many children.
The work laid out in each grade
of this Course of Study is in-
tended for one year's work, and
will take a large majority of pu-
pils a year to complete it, pro-
vided they attend regularly;
hence, to promote them would be
doing them a great injustice, as
well as those who attended the
entire year. Therefore, those
who have attended the whole
term, stood the examinations
and made the required grades,
only, will be promoted; however,
pupils will have a chance to
stand the examinations at the
beginning of the term, and, if
qualified, will be advanced to the
next grade.

Thy education of many pupils
is ruined because they have not
had the proper training in the
primary department. We have
teachers especially prepared in
this line of teaching, so if you
want your child properly taught
by the natural means of develop-
ment send him the first day, and
keep him in school, and thereby
save several years in education.

To Parents

Parents and guardians are re-
spectfully requested to have
their children enrolled at the be-
ginning of the session, as it en-
ables them to be properly classi-
fied; a few days delay may cause
them the loss of an entire grade.
They are requested, after the
children are enrolled, to see
that they attend regularly, as
the teacher can do nothing for
the child when he is absent.
They should see that their child-
ren have regular hours at home
for study, and that those hours
are after supper. The afternoon

is, perhaps, the best time for
little children to prepare their
lessons, but the boy or girl in the
high school who claims to be
doing his work thoroughly and
yet studies none in the evening
is deceiving himself, or his par-
ents, or both.

Lessons should be learned at
home and reviewed in the school
room. Parents should require
their children to report at home
within a reasonable time after
school is dismissed, and in case
they fail to do so an investigation
should be made, as of course
this would greatly lessen mis-
conduct on the streets.

Parents are invited and earn-
estly requested to confer freely
with the teachers regarding the
interest of their children. We
are always ready to hear sugges-
tions made in kindness and good
faith, as we are working for the
good of the child and the school,
and not for our own pleasure.

Literary Society

This will be a part of the work
of the pupil, and is under the
supervision of the teachers. It
constitutes a large part of the
student's preparation for life,
and is made practical as well as
disciplinary. All pupils of the
High School are requested to
attend and take part in its pro-
ceedings, and pupils from other
departments are not barred.
This will not interfere with the
pupils daily work.

Daily Recesses and Sessions

The daily sessions of the
school shall be from 9 o'clock a.
m. to 12 m., and from 1 to 4 p. m.
with a recess of fifteen minutes
in the forenoon and afternoon,
except that the First and Second
grades may be dismissed at 3:30
o'clock.

Bells and School Time

The first morning bell shall
commence to ring at 8:30 a. m.,
and continue one minute. Bells
for ranking the pupils in the
morning and afternoon shall be
rung at 8:55 and 12:55, and cen-
tinue three seconds. All pupils
not in their seats by 9 a. m. and
1 p. m. shall be considered tardy.

Janitors

It shall be the duty of the jani-
tor to keep the school building
and grounds in good order, to
sweep the rooms daily, and to
dust the furniture each morning
before the school assembles; to
make first fires and to wash
floors and windows whenever
directed by the School Board.

Rye is one of the best winter pasture crops we know of and is easily raised, and we hope our farmers will make an effort to plant a few acres at least. Seed can be obtained at Plainview we understand. If they do take a notion to plant a few acres of this hardy grain, they will have fat horses next spring to start another crop. It don't only make a splendid pasture, but leaves land in good shape for another crop.

We have seen Central Tex. people plant it in the cotton middles after the first picking and plough them in with a double shovel, and make a fine winter pasture. The same thing can be done here. Plant close to the house and you will have plenty eggs all winter. If rye will do well in Central Texas in the cross-timber it will undoubtedly do the same here as we have almost identically the same soil.

Two rousing games of ball were pulled off on the local diamonds Tuesday afternoon between the first nine and the school kids. The first game was won by the larger boys, but the kids defeated them in the second.

Yesterday afternoon another game was matched between them, and was easily won by the larger boys.

By three o'clock the entire sky was overshadowed by a dark mantle, and a heavy downpour began which was kept up, except at short intervals until dark. This splendid rain coming as it did right on top of the splendid rain of last week will put a good deep season in the ground.

We now have every assurance that a big feed crop will be made in Terry county this year, and grass will be better than it has been for two years.

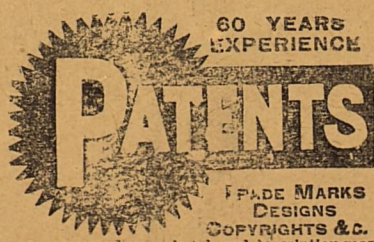

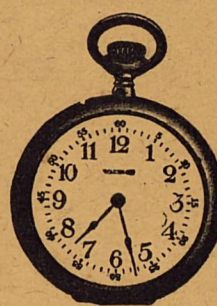

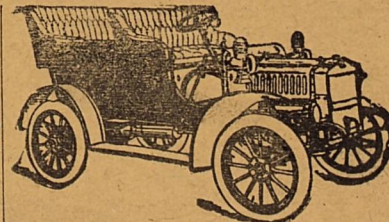

The Mail Order House.

Have you consulted your Mail Order house lately to see what terms they will give you on your grocery and dry goods bill? Try them, please, and see just how much accommodation they will give you these dull times. The merchants of Seminole have carried many of the people through a panic and two years of unusually dry weather. They have listened to your tales of woe and have helped you in your time of need. They have helped build your school and church houses and are always a willing

aid to any enterprise that comes up. On the other hand what has the mail order house done for you? Have they ever given you a dollar to help with your school or church work? Have they ever extended to you a dollars worth of credit when you need credit? No! and bless your soul, honey, they never will. They don't give a continental cuss whether you ever have schools or churches. They want your money and when they get it they will let you rustle your own credit and pass the panic the best way you can.

The practice of sending your ready cash out of the country for things that can be purchased at home and at the same time depending on your home merchants for accommodation when in need of help is the rankest kind of rot and will hinder the development of any country. When you sum the mail order practice up, it looks like the only way to remedy the evil is something like this: Let the merchants, through organization, find out the people who are patronizing these northern concerns, and positively refuse them accommodations until they quit it. The way to stop the merchant from sending out of the country for printing that should be done at home is to boycott him and encourage the merchant who is enterprising to come and take his place.—Seminole Sentinel.

Just the same across the line Bro. Our merchants have risked much to extend credit to some during the panic and these unusually dry years and then just as quick as some of them would earn a little ready cash which ought to have been spent at home you could find them at the post office window purchasing money orders in favor of Sears Roebuck.

We wonder what the mail-order houses are giving for chickens and eggs, onions, grapes peaches, plums, sorghum, maize, corn and watermelons these days? What did they give toward our schools and churches? Did they help you to pay the preacher, or did they contribute to your foreign mission fund?

New Orleans the Logical Point.

With a vigor that reflects credit upon southern initiative and aggressiveness, the people of New Orleans and Louisiana are fighting to secure governmental recognition of the former city as the logical site for the great exposition in 1915 that is to celebrate the opening of the Panama canal.

The latest development is the decision to submit to the taxpayers of the state the question as to whether or not they shall be subject to a special bonding tax to procure the funds essential to securing the big display.

The other day Governor Sanders; of Louisiana, issued a call for a special meeting of the legislature for August 15, at which the matter of a popular election on the issue will be debated and decided.

Congress is to hand down its decision in the forthcoming December.

The exhibition of an entire state seemingly willing to bond itself in the interests of public enterprise is an issue that ought to appeal to national patriotism and approval.

The Constitution has never viewed the claims of New Orleans from a sectional slant.

It is to the advantage of the entire country, regardless of location, to have so large a project so essentially national as the exposition celebrating the opening of the canal, held at the Crescent City.

In the first place New Orleans is to be the logical shipping point and of transshipment, once the canal is permanently open to traffic.

In the second place New Orleans is geographically about half way between the eastern and western coasts. Hundreds of thousands of Americans will want to visit the Panama exposition. The items of railroad fare alone, collectively speaking, will be formidable.

It is difficult to estimate the amount of money in transportation saved to the people of this country should congress decide on the Louisiana metropolis.

On the other hand, should San Francisco, however patriotic and praiseworthy her claims and promises, be fixed upon as the exposition city, thousands of eastern and southern Americans of moderate means will be barred from attendance. Inevitably, the attendance would be of a decidedly western, or trans-Mississippi, preponderance.

We believe congress may be relied upon to view the matter in this sensible light.—Atlanta Constitution.

School Money Apportionment.

Austin, Tex., Aug. 2.—The State Department of Education today made an apportionment of the available school fund for for August of 25 cents per capita for each child shown on the scholastic census. This apportionment was made to pay off the remainder of the apportionment of \$6.26 per capita for each child for the fiscal year 1909 1910, and will amount to \$237,251 for 949,006 children shown on last year's scholastic census.

At present there is to the credit of the available school fund in the State Treasury only \$105,000. The warrants for this

month's apportionment will not be sent out for several days, and it is hoped to have to the credit of the available school fund by that time the amount necessary to pay of the entire apportionment for this fiscal year. It is expected that later in the month the available school fund's portion of the liquor license money will be received. It is also expected that the fund will receive over \$50,000 in interest due it on the \$1,568,000 in old empire State bonds now held by the fund, which Governor Campbell has asked the Legislature to make provision for us well as to provide for the back interest for same.

Acting upon the assumption the Legislature will in an emergency bill compensate the available school fund for the back interest and that the liquor license money will be received during the month in the form of occupation taxes, the monthly apportionment was made today.

What the Election Means.

After the count of the ballots and the result fully known, men will stand in groups and ask—What does the election mean? Take a look at the votes. From 225 counties—Colquit, 137,094; Poindexter, 78,650 Johnson, 72,580; Davidson, 52,134.

Supposing that all of Poindexter's a Johnsons support were prohibition votes and all of Colquit's and Davidson's were anti votes, this would give the anti's a lead of 38,000 votes. Therefore, if the gubernatorial vote means anything, it means that the people of Texas are not in favor of state-wide prohibition by constitutional amendment. That the anti's believe this may be concluded from the resolution recently adopted favoring "submission," they are now willing to "submit" and risk their cause be-

fore the people in the constitutional campaign. They anticipate a victory for their side at the polls.

On the other hand, the Pro's believe that the state is ready for constitutional prohibition, but their leaders admit defeat in the recent gubernatorial election but assign as a reason the divided condition of the prohibition ranks. May not this occur again.

But they say many voters would not consider the question of submission in the campaign and hence could not and the votes as indicated.

It is safe to say however that Texas will have a prohibition campaign next summer. The legislature-elect will pass the necessary resolutions and fix the date.

It will have been 23 years since the state turned down state prohibition by a big majority. The people may reverse that as prohibition sentiment has grown wonderfully since then and has steadily gained ground. The contest will be entered eagerly by both sides.—Hereford Brand.

Railroad Work Begins.

Stamford, Aug. 4.—The work of establishing the line for the Stamford & Eastern railway began today, with H. L. Erisman as field engineer. The general direction will be east from Stamford, going to the coal fields to the east or northeast of the city. The engineering corps consists of some fifteen or twenty and the work will be pushed with every possible vigor. P. T. Burns is in general charge of the survey and is one of the best known railway builders in Texas. Further than the statement that work has commenced on the survey, nothing has been given out by the officials.
