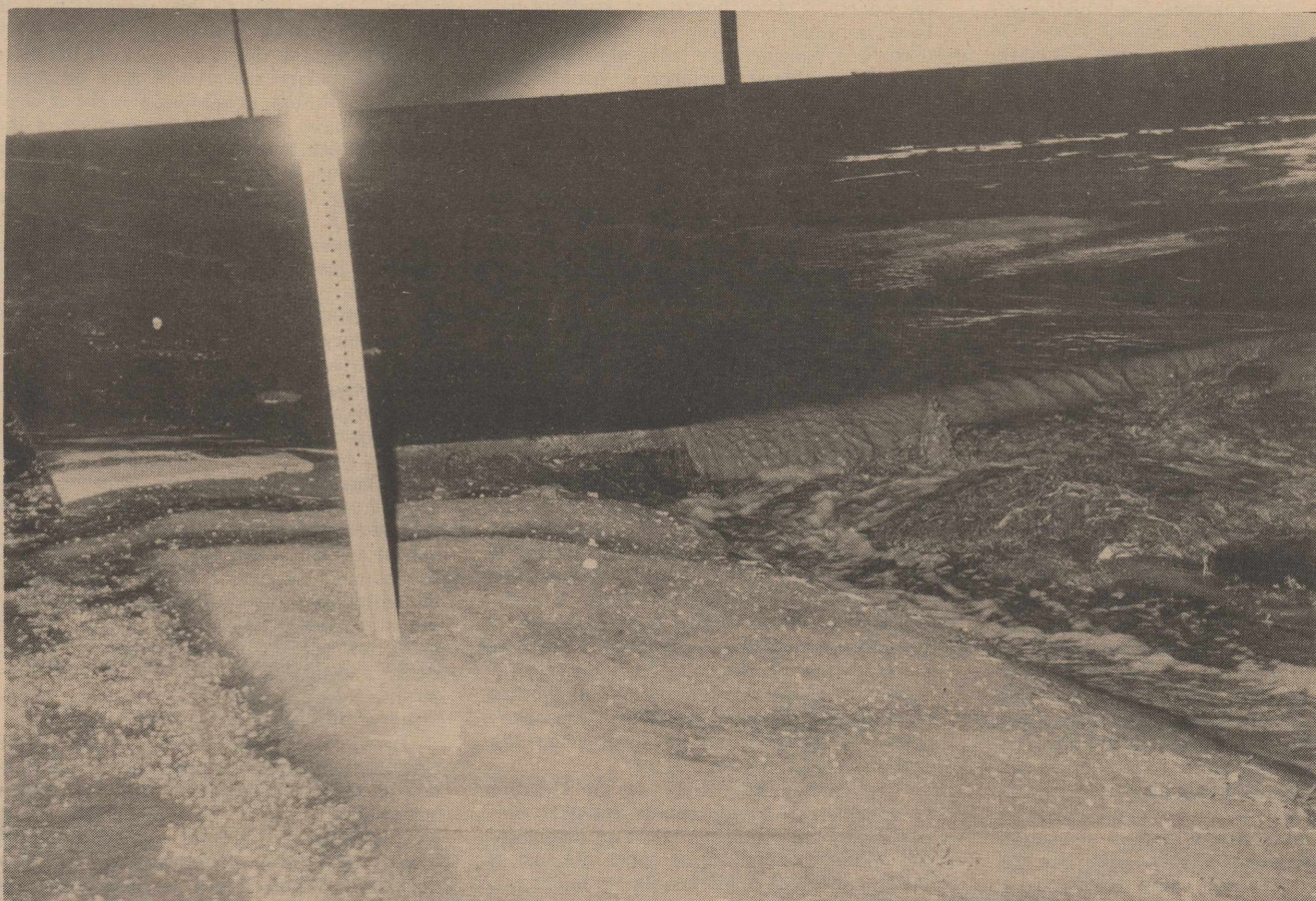

Former Residents' Home Heavily Damaged By Fire

A fire last Thursday afternoon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Gallion in Dimmitt completely destroyed the contents of one bedroom and severely damaged furniture and electrical appliances in other parts of the house. The Gallions are former residents of Hart.

The cause of the fire was said to be faulty wiring and began in the bedroom which was destroyed.

At the time of the fire, Mrs. Gallion and four of her children were at a local grocery store. Only one daughter remained at home, Roxanne age 12. She was in the living room at the time and did not notice the fire until smoke began to come into the room. She tried to get to the phone, but was unable to reach it as it was located in the bedroom which was ablaze.

She immediately ran to a neighbor's house and asked them to call the fire department. Clothing which belonged to Mr. and Mrs. Gallion and the youngest member of the family, Melissa age 3 were all lost in the fire. Most of the family's under clothing, socks, sheets and bedspreads and curtains were also lost.

A fund for the Gallions has been started at the Farmers State Bank and persons wishing to help may leave their do-

nations there or with Mrs. R. G. Henderson or Myrt Loman. They are collecting clothing for the family and sizes needed are available by calling 938-2355 or 938-2368.

Hail Batters Crops Here

Storm clouds swept over the South Plains late Tuesday afternoon dumping rain over the Panhandle and leaving a large swath of Castro County ravished by hail.

Reports indicate that the hail damage began two miles inside the western Castro County line and continued four miles past the Swisher County line. Hail damage came from clouds which swept over the county about 5:15.

Very high winds struck when another cloud about 7:30 p. m. hit the area. Winds broke a storm door, twisted a television antenna and damaged a fence at the Max Marble farm. F. L. Bass Jr. reported winds broke a tree at his place.

Marble reported from two to three inches of rain and hail piled up six to eight inches deep.

Three and a half miles east

of Hart, Theron Morrison reports a total loss of his onion crop and fears a total loss of his 40 acres of potatoes. Also destroyed were 90 acres of cotton, 40 acres of wheat and some soybeans, Morrison said he believed his corn and maize would come out.

Storm windows were broken at the Bill Rich farm and heavy hail damage was reported by Arthur Cheaves, Everett Heller, Lee and Albert Jones, Barney Campbell and O. C. Campbell.

Farmers report that washing of fields was "real bad."

Two Hart Youth Attending American Legion Boys State

Keith David Lemons and Roy Flores Coronado are attending the thirty-first annual American Legion Boys State on the campus of the University of Texas, sponsored by the Department of Texas.

Registration began Tuesday with 840 high school boys from all parts of Texas and two from Mexico registered.

Each citizen is assigned to one of two political parties - the Nationalist or Federalist. Each then functions as a member of his party, attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy "learns to do by doing."

The program takes on an added significance this year as the vote is extended to 18 year olds. Most Boys Staters are in the 16 to 17 age category.

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol Friday morning where each elected Boys State Official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day, followed by the Governor's Ball Friday evening.

Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 15,779 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

Seniors at Hart High School next fall, Lemons and Coronado are sponsored by American Legion Post 311 and Hart Lions Club.

SENSING THE NEWS

Another school year has come to an end. And in many communities thoughtful citizens are wondering whether quality public education is near an end. The public schools are in greater disarray this year than at any time in memory.

Freedom of choice has been banned by the courts. Forced bussing of students has been imposed on many communities. Students and teachers are being shifted around so as to achieve arbitrary sociological formulas that have nothing to do with education. In many communities, parents despair of the children receiving a worthwhile preparation for their future work.

More than ever, the U. S. Supreme Court has usurped the role of the school superintendent, thereby denying states and local communities any meaningful control of the educational process. No principal can make an administrative decision without wondering whether the federal courts will decide that the action is a violation of a constitutional "right." It is a sad -- indeed a tragic -- state of affairs. The federal courts have completely lost sight of the purpose for which a school system is created, namely, to impart learning and NOT to accomplish a sociological revolution.

Many parents feel the hopelessness of the situation. They contemplate moving to different communities, but the Supreme Court is determined that the very nature of neighborhoods be transformed through the use of the instrumentality of the public schools. In this situation, the children in the affected school systems are the sacrificial victims of a handful of arrogant judges who aren't selected by the people and over whom the people have no control.

The outrageous nature of the situation is compounded by the double standard employed by the Supreme Court in determining which systems must meet the test of the sociological formulas. In its latest ruling, the Supreme Court established the double standard as the law of the land. The Southern states must be constantly juggled to meet a variety of formulas, whereas the schools in other states -- despite conditions of de facto segregation -- are to be virtually untouched by the federal judiciary. Massive bussing is mandatory in Southern school systems, but is not required outside the region. This is the ultimate in sectional discrimination. All the hardships are placed on people in one part of the country while

the people in others parts are spared the necessity of making very difficult adjustments in human relations. This double standard means that education per se will be much more difficult and frustrated in the Southern States than in other sections of the country. How the members of the Supreme Court can rationalize this regional bias is hard to understand.

Bussing, for example, works a hardship on students irrespective of race or color. Children shifted around to achieve a rigid formula have to spend long periods of the day en route to and returning from school. This means that they are deprived of the opportunity to participate in extra-curricular activities. This deprivation of opportunity doesn't seem to bother the Burger Court, which is just as irresponsible as the Warren Court.

The real irony in the recent decision of the Burger Court on bussing and related matters is that -- for a time undefined and to an extent undefined -- the attendance of children at public schools may be shaped and prescribed solely according to race and color.

A distinguished attorney, who has carefully studied the arguments in the recent school cases -- the Charlotte-Mecklenburg school cases before the Supreme Court -- has pointed out that "the court has adopted the philosophy that wherever there has been an old state compulsion based on race, there shall now be a federal compulsion based on race, and that the U. S. Constitution gives no individual protection against the imposition of this new racial compulsion."

In view of this interpretation of the Constitution by the Burger Court, there is now no relief except to write into the nation's fundamental charter an explicit provision banning this new federal compulsion. It is likely, therefore, that opponents of this compulsion shortly will propose a Constitutional Amendment reading simply and briefly as follows:

"No governmental authority shall at any time, nor for any purpose, shape, determine or prescribe attendance or assignment of students and-or teachers on the basis of race or color."

Until some such provision is inserted into the law of the land, judicial tyranny will prevail and the public schools in the United States will continue to worsen, becoming more chaotic all the time.

If a lot of water is necessary; "They are doing more damage with water than the flames."

If a fireman gets hurt; "He was a careless guy."

If a citizen gets hurt; "It's a crazy department."

If a fireman inspects a citizen's property; "He's meddling in somebody's business."

If he wants a fire hazard corrected; "I'll see the mayor."

If he gets killed and leaves a family destitute; "That's the chance he took when he joined the fire department."

LACK OF NITROGEN OR IRON CAN YELLOW LAWNS -- A deficiency of nitrogen can cause the grass in a lawn to take on a general yellowing appearance, says Al Novosad, Extension pasture and turf specialist. Iron deficiency is characterized by yellow bleached spots in the turf. Spray applications of iron chelates or iron sulfate are corrective suggestions for the iron deficiencies. Early spring and fall applications of a balanced fertilizer plus ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate applications at 4 to 6 week intervals during the growing season should correct nitrogen deficiencies, says Novosad.

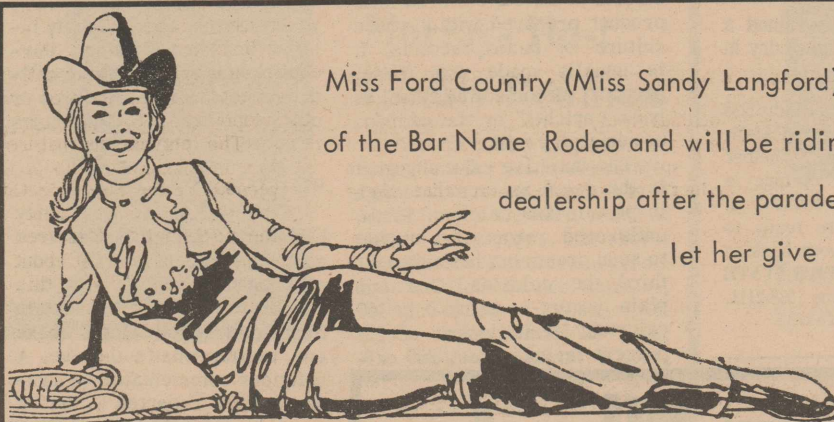

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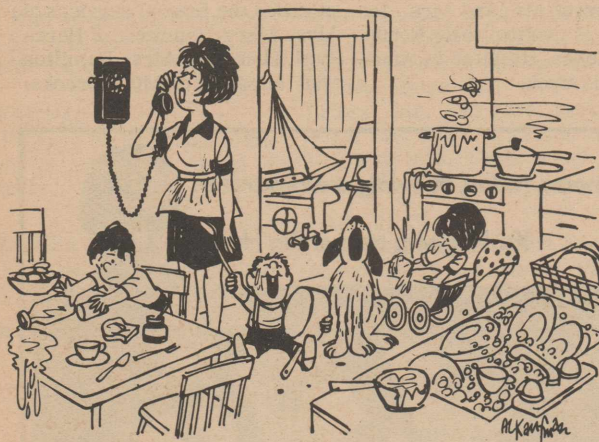

CASTRO CO. H.D. AGENT

The Home Demonstration Clubs have all had programs on 4-H this month. We have a new club with nine girls that was organized last week. They haven't selected their name yet. That gives us seven 4-H Clubs in the county.

This year the National Extension Homemakers Association will be meeting in Dallas. Our county is making 25 tote bags to take. Our county merchants are donating items for them. The club women are making the bags out of blue fabric and they also can be used as aprons, clothespin bags or sun bonnet. The reason for blue is that we're the bluebonnet state. I am real pleased that Nell Ingram has been selected to serve as a flag bearer for the National meeting. Only 51 women from the state were selected. They will be dressed in yellow for the "Yellow Rose of Texas".

Our club women are compiling a cook book that will be printed this fall. I know many of you will want a copy.

June is dairy month and I want to share some ideas on an often unused dairy product - yogurt. Yogurt is a thick, smooth-textured, cultured milk product prepared with a mixed culture of lactic bacteria. It is usually made with fresh, partially skimmed milk that has been enriched by the addition of nonfat dry milk.

The nutritive value of yogurt is the same as in milk - high in protein and calcium. Plain, unflavored yogurt is a cousin to sour cream but has only one-third the calories. One cup plain yogurt contains only 160 calories; fruit yogurt of 2.5 percent fat has about 250 cal-

ories per eight ounce cup.

Yogurt should be stored at a temperature of 40 degrees, and should be consumed within three or four days. If it is stored for longer periods, the acidity may continue to increase to produce a sharper-flavored product. If entire contents of the yogurt container are not eaten at once, remove the portion to be eaten then cover the container and return it to the refrigerator.

Freezing yogurt is not recommended. The freezing and thawing affects the texture adversely.

When cooking with yogurt, stir or fold it into the other ingredients. The custard-like texture of the yogurt will be broken down by any vigorous beating, so treat it gently. Yogurt also thins out during cooking - even more than sour cream.

Yogurt can be eaten from the carton or spooned over fruit for a dessert. It is also good in dips, toppings and salad dressings similar to those composed of sour cream as a base.

Accent On Health

Just last month, on May 14, the world medical community marked the 175th anniversary of the first vaccination against the dread disease smallpox.

Why would this be of interest to the average Texan today? Because one of the true victories for the science of immunology is now apparent.

The eradication of the disease organism that causes smallpox is now almost complete. It is now estimated that only six countries in all the world will continue to report the occurrence of this once dreaded disease by the end of 1971. That cheerful word comes from officials at the Texas State Department of Health.

During the first four months of 1971, less than 14,000 cases of smallpox were reported by 13 countries to the World Health Organization. Over half of these cases were reported by Ethiopia, with the balance spread out over scattered areas of Africa, Asia, South America, and a few cases in Europe. Health officials now estimate that approximately 25,000 cases will be recorded in 1971. That marks a substantial decrease from the 131,000 cases recorded in 1967, the first year of the world-wide Smallpox Eradication Program.

Still, you continue to ask, how does this affect me? While smallpox is still considered a problem in some parts of the world, the disease does not at present occur in the United States. The last outbreak in

America occurred in 1949 in the lower Rio Grande valley of Texas.

In 1938, the United States recorded nearly 15,000 cases of smallpox. Ten years later, in 1948, less than one per cent of that number of cases was reported. Only 50 cases were diagnosed in the United States. For almost two decades now there have been no smallpox cases reported in this country.

So why should you continue to be concerned over a disease that is now almost eradicated? The answer is quite simple. The only way to afford you and your children 100 per cent protection from smallpox is to completely eradicate it from the face of the earth. This can be accomplished only through strict control efforts, and continued mass vaccinations. Universal vaccination is still the most reliable safeguard in prevention of this disease.

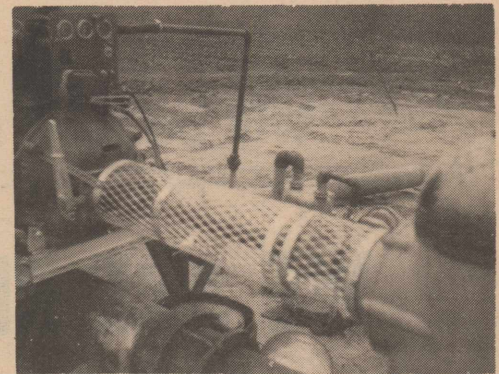

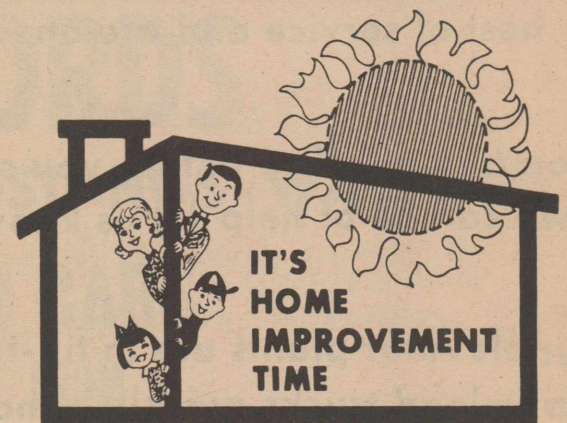

American Medical Ass'n. Tells Emphysema Findings

If you're still smoking, think about the next drag you take.
