The Loraine Bulldogs picked the Hermleigh Cardinals clean last Friday night in one of the most exciting games for local fans this season by defeating them 54 to 9.

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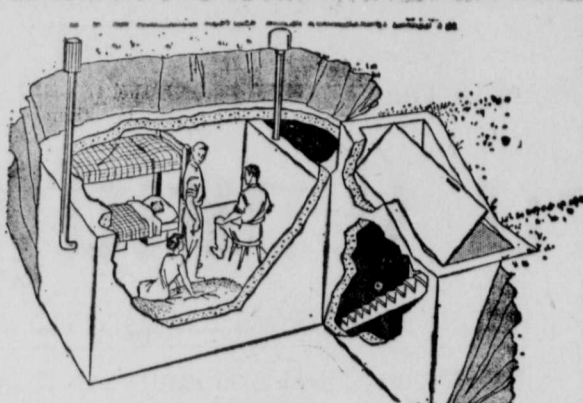

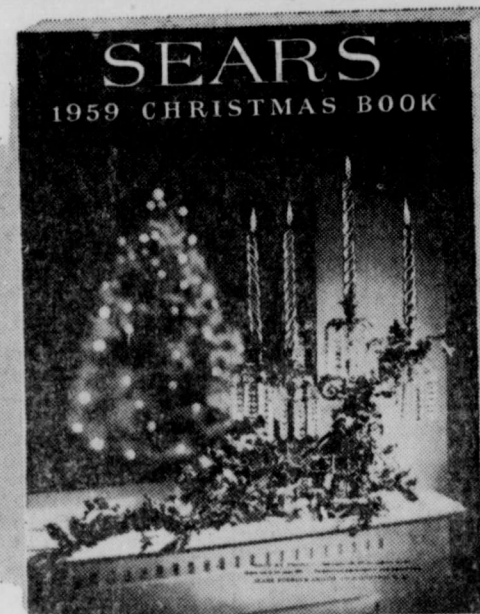

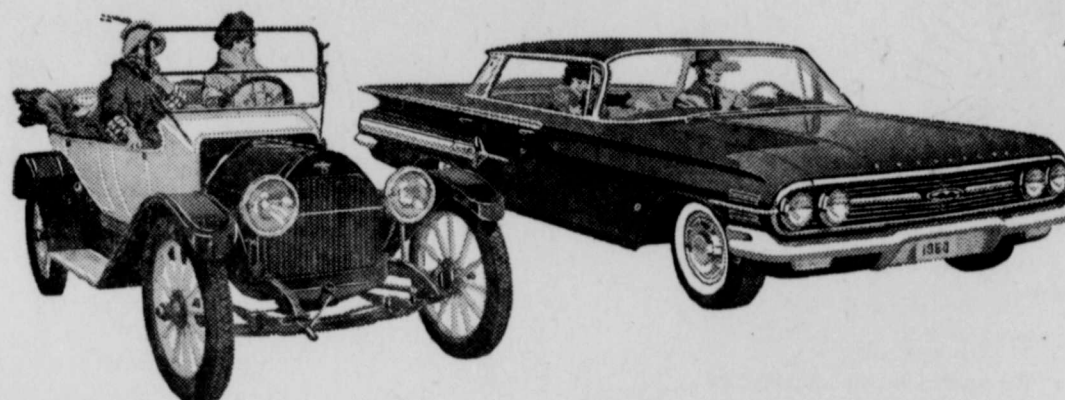
