Texas Teachers Are Now in Comparison Of States' Pay Schedule

Austin, July 16. — Twenty-five states, including traditional competitors like California and Florida, are paying their public school teachers more than Texas does, C. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association announced today.

In Texas the average classroom teacher is paid \$2,960 a year whereas in New York she is paid \$3,000 a year. California, the number one state in the nation, pays an average salary to teachers of \$3,100.

Others that rate higher than Texas are Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, Connecticut, Michigan, Washington, Arizona, Massachusetts, Oregon, Illinois, New Mexico, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Nevada, Montana, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Wisconsin, Utah, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Iowa.

Tennyson pointed out that teachers in Texas have not kept pace with the inflationary trend. In 1939, teachers' salaries averaged \$1,420 and the salaries of employed persons, including laborers, was \$1,269. Thus teachers were 12 per cent above the average. Since then the national average for all workers has climbed \$3,390 a year — \$430 more than average teachers get — leaving them 12 per cent behind the national group.

This trend is making it increasingly difficult to retain good teachers and to recruit new ones, Tennyson added. College graduates trained to teach are turning to industry where salaries and benefits match their professional knowledge.

An effort to equalize present salaries, the Texas State Teachers Association will ask the next legislature to increase the minimum beginning salary for public school teachers to \$3,000 a year. The legal minimum now for teachers is \$2,400 a year.

Fight Against Roaches Urged by Health Officer in Austin

Austin, A dime store paint brush and a few ounces of chlordane are the only tools you need to run off those pesky cockroaches, State Health Officer George W. Cox advises.

But he says that keeping them off is a bigger job. Roaches are disease carriers from way back, the health officer pointed out. They've been found naturally infected with polio virus. And that alone, is reason enough to declare war against the filth ridden pests. Here's one way to do it:

First: get a 2 per cent chlordane spray and a two-bit paint brush from the drug store. Then take all pots and pans from the cabinets and wash them in soapy water.

Now paint the chlordane into all the cracks where shelves join walls and around the drain and water pipes. That's all — don't paint the whole cabinet. While the spray is drying in the cabinets, paint in the corners of baseboards behind the stove and water heater where water pipes enter the house.

Paint the walls behind the refrigerator because roaches will hide any place they can find protection. Be sure to paint around the bathroom pipes, too.

In older houses it's possible that roaches will be hiding in cracks between the wall board and door and window frames. So don't pass up a crack because it looks too small to harbor roaches. The young insects are mighty small.

After the spray in the cabinets has dried thoroughly, cover the shelves where dishes and food are stored with paper.

You can get a can of caulking compound for just a few cents, which makes filling cracks permanently an inexpensive process.

But run some of the spray into cracks before sealing them up. This will kill ants, too.

All this will help you get rid of roaches, Dr. Cox explained. But if you leave food exposed, they'll soon be back at the same old stand.

Shivers Lashes Federal Control State Affairs

AUSTIN, July 15. — Governor Allan Shivers lashed out this week at federal control over state affairs, declaring that the initiative of Texans, properly supported by the state government, was better and less costly than having "great swarms of federal bureaucrats all over the place."

The governor said, however, that he did not take the position that all federal aid was bad. "Some projects are too large for one community or state to handle, and when several states are involved there must be cooperation at all levels of government."

He labeled as "vital and desirable" such programs as the state-federal matching of funds for old age assistance, farm-to-market roads and other well-established cooperative systems, which if altered would upset the present tax structure.

"But I am opposed to federal control over state affairs and any scheme that will take federal taxes out of the pockets of Texas people, carry the money to Washington and send some of it back with strings attached and a note saying: 'Look what Santa Claus is doing for you!'"

The governor said there were eight points in his program to build a great state into a greater state:

1. A water conservation program promoted, controlled and largely paid for by Texans.

2. Widespread and orderly application of sound soil conservation practices — continuation of the policy to work closely with governmental and private agencies so that every farmer in Texas will have the benefit of their programs to save and build back the land.

A paved road within sight of every farm and ranch house in Texas. In two years the state has built more than 7,000 miles of rural highways — an all-time high in farm-to-market building in Texas and the nation.

4. More support for public education. The state will have to do more for public schools in the next two years — not less. Texas must go forward with their education — not backward. The children of Texas, both in the cities and in the rural areas deserve equal educational opportunities.

5. Assistance to the needy. The first old age pension law ever passed in Texas was written by Shivers. It is important that deserving old people are properly cared for.

6. Continuing war on crime. The Kefauver committee has said that Texas has cleaned up its own house without the assistance of investigators from Washington. We must continue to keep it clean.

7. Completion of the state hospitals reorganization program launched by Governor Shivers two years ago, striving for the day when cure instead of care will be the watchword.

In carrying out this program, the governor said it would not be necessary to have a general sales tax or a state income tax.

"And so long as I am governor, we will never have a sales tax or a state income tax," he said.

Commissioners Agree Highway Paving Through Sanderson Is Needed Community Progress

Highway 90 through Sanderson will be repaved and regraded from curb to curb if the recommendation of the resident engineer, W. A. Davis, is granted by the Highway Commission. At the regular meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners Court here Monday it was

agreed that funds were available in the county for the county's part of the work on the curbing and gutter work and the culvert renovation in the event that the State Highway Department will continue the work as recommended.

After studying the recommendations of the resident engineer, it was found that the work can be accomplished without the necessity of moving back any permanent structures of property owners and the share-expense program will not work a hardship on anyone along the right-of-way.

With the new paving as specified in the recommendations one of the state highway requirements will be that parallel parking along that section of the street be enforced.

Terrell County has shown by the treasurer's quarterly report that the finances are in better shape than they have been in some time. The commissioners were able to retire bonds this week which clears up the entire indebtedness on the street paving project which was done three years ago. The Sanderson State Bank, holders of the bonds, agreed to accept payment of the unpaid bonds in the amount of \$6,000.00 so that the account could be cleared. The bonds were payable over a period of six years and the advance liquidation will afford a saving of considerable interest of that period.

The commissioners court has worked harmoniously in all the undertakings in the past and there has been a splendid cooperation shown in all affairs of the county's business.

Rodriguez, who was ninety-two years of age, had been in failing health for several months. A native of Mexico, he came to Sanderson about twenty-seven years ago and had been employed as a ranch laborer.

Following the service at St. James Catholic Church interment was made in Santa Rita Cemetery.

Besides the daughter, he is survived by two sons, Santiago and Atlano Rodriguez of Sanderson and ten grandchildren.

Shivers Agin Auto Inspection Law; "Shall Change it or Repeal it" He Says

By Ben Kaplan, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature)

Our nation's effort to secure world peace occupies the prominent position on the 1952 political stage. Major personalities of both political parties place that objective first. World War II. Foregoing strikes and sabotage we can do it again. Therefore, Stalin's sole hope lies in his ability to sabotage our production capacity and with the aid of his Fifth Column and its dupes, to so destroy the confidence of our people in our present system that they will offer little resistance.

These are elemental facts. Even a schoolboy ought to be able to understand them. Yet, the apathy of the American mind to these decisive facts is so apparent that ex-Communist Whittaker Chambers foresees the end of human liberty and the overrunning of the world by Communism. Chambers declares that most Americans do not know the nature of Communism and do not understand the mind of the Communist. This is strikingly apparent among some important government leaders—

witness President Truman's remark in 1948: "I like old Joe. Joe is a decent fellow."

In his best-seller book, "Witness," Chambers reveals that his break with Communism and his birth of loyalty to America was, to him, a return to a hopeless cause. The world, he explains, "does not know or even want to know two facts that it must know to survive: (1) the meaning of Communism, (2) the nature of the Communist mind."

"I wanted my wife to realize clearly one long-term penalty, for herself and for the children, of the step (deserting Communism) I was taking," Chambers writes. He says to his wife: "You know we are leaving the winning world (Communism) for the losing world (freedom)." Then he shows that during the 13 years between his break with Communism and the writing of his book following the sensational Hiss trial, he found little evidence to indicate an awakening by the American public to the terrible facts of our crisis. "Almost nothing that I have observed, or that has happened to me since (the break with Communism in 1938), has made me think that I was wrong about the forecast," he writes in his book.

Chambers' gloomy forecast of the defeat of the forces of freedom by Communism bolsters the grim warnings of others who understand Communism and the nature of Communists. In the past year I have talked personally and searchingly with Matthew Cvetie, who was a Communist nine years for the FBI; with Louis Budenz, ex-Communist editor of the Daily Worker; with Dr. J. B. Matthews, former chief investigator of the House Un-American Activities Committee; and with present and former FBI officials. None of them scoffs at Chambers' forecast. Like Chambers, they are trying to arouse the American people to the true danger.

Every citizen can do something to combat the Communists' high-

ly organized work seeking to weaken our industrial production, our love of country and our support for the American way of life. First, the citizen must become informed by reading books such as Chambers' "Witness" the three revealing books by Budenz, and Matt Cvetie's story. But it is even more important to understand Americanism and know the advantages of the American system, and understand what makes it tick. The informed citizen must then publicly challenge all activities undermining confidence in our basic American principles. 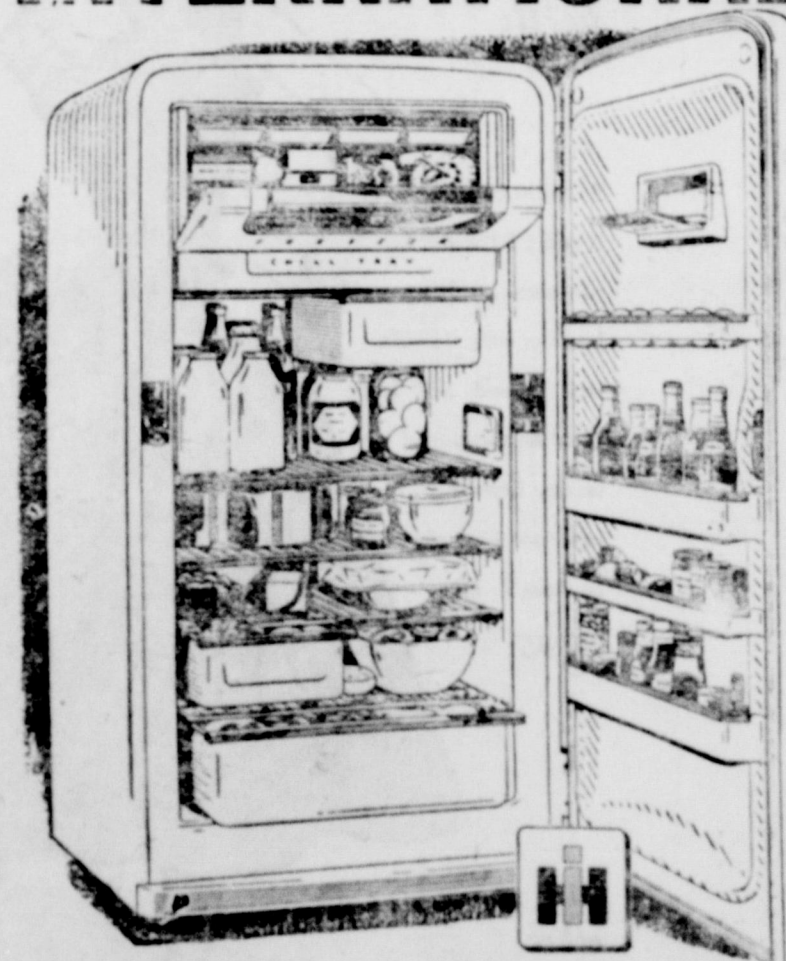

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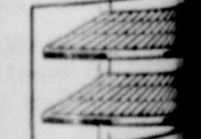
