Courthouse Will Have Two Floors Re-done

Bids on the remodeling of Mitchell County Courthouse first two floors will be opened at 2 p. m. Tuesday, Nov. 24, and will be accepted by county commissioners until that date and time.

Modernization of the two floors will be undertaken as one major project. Original planning discussions here had talked re-working second floor first, then remodeling first floor at a later date. Third floor renovation was completed last year.

Installation of an elevator, to have cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000, has been left off the current specifications. No plans for an elevator are included in the outlines for bids.

Mitchell County Commissioners Court, in its long range plan, has decided to remodel the courthouse.

Dr. Ralph Graham, pastor of First Christian Church, will attend the bi-annual planning conference for Christian churches in Austin, Nov. 10, 11 and 12.

Dr. Graham will take part in the planning conference for adult church work.

Jaycees Need Toys For Holiday Giving

Jaycees of Colorado City face a need. They need toys for their annual Christmas cheer for less fortunate children.

Per-holiday project of Colorado City Jaycees each year is the collection of toys for the town's Christmas baskets. Toys which can be mended, re-painted, fixed-up to look like new, are very much needed for this year's Santa Claus special, said Rev. Neil Rogers Saturday.

"Response, so far, has been very disappointing," Rev. Rogers said. "Jaycees appeal to parents and to children who have outgrown toys, books, clothing, dolls, games to donate the unused or superfluous things to the basket project."

Colorado High School shopwork teacher, Mike Burt, and his students are waiting for toys to paint, repair and fix up. Rev. Rogers said. High School Principal Joe D. Burdick is also interested in helping the boys' collection get underway.

Collection center is the Farm Bureau office, 130 Walnut St. Toys and other contributions may be taken to that office until 5 p. m. each week day.

Young mothers or other donors who have no way to bring toys for the collection

goal of making the courthouse completely modern, is proceeding on a "pay-as-we-go" basis. Cost of the elevator installation would have made remodeling of both first and second floor financially impractical at this time, a member of the court said.

Contract between the county and bid-winning contractor will call for the start of work this month with a total of 75 working days allowed for completion.

Plans call for replacing wood windows and wood trim with aluminum windows and glazing. Partitions will be moved to enlarge the offices of county clerk and of tax-assessor-collector.

The old steel spiral steps leading from first to second and to third floor will be removed and replaced with modern and safer stairways.

First and second floors will be completely air-conditioned and centrally heated. Rest rooms will get installation of new tile floors and wainscoting. All other floors of first and second floors will be covered in vinyl asbestos tile. Old-fashioned entrance doors will be replaced with aluminum and glass entrances with pull and push bars.

Ceiling will be lowered and when complete will be like those of third floor—the suspended acoustical type.

Miscellaneous work will include plate glass mirrors for rest rooms; new tack boards and bulletin boards, or the refinishing of existing bulletin boards, in corridors; cleaning and polishing of the bronze building tablet.

Complete paint job will brighten all interior areas of the two lower floors.

Plumbing specifications call for replacement of all plumbing lines and drains with certain plumbing fixtures salvaged from use.

United Fund Drive Eyes Friday, 13th

Friday, the 13th, unlucky day for the superstitious, has been set as "lucky day" by United Fund workers of this county.

JUST 6,600 BALES

Short Cotton Crop Shows Up At Gins

Affect of the prolonged summer drought on the cotton crop is showing up in gin totals throughout this county.

Mitchell County gins have processed a total of 6,600 bales, according to check made Thursday.

That total is just over one-third of the number of bales ginned up to Nov. 7, 1963. This same week, last year, the total stood at 20,404 bales.

To date Colorado City gins have baled 2,596 bales with Producers Processing 860; Guitars 462; Swift 345 and Farmers 929.

In Loraine, Guitars gin has a total of 814 bales, Co-op No. 1,093 to bring the town total to 1,907. Co-op No. 2 has not yet started operation for the season in Loraine.

Belford Gin has run through 1,014 bales. Planters at Westbrook has baled 208. China Grove Gin has processed 875.

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Landowners in Southeast Part of County Informed

Part of Mitchell County, the extreme southeast corner including about one-fourth of the county area, has been designated for deer harvest season for the second year.

Deer season in this county opens Nov. 14 and closes Dec. 31.

Thursday, Nov. 12, permits for the deer harvest will be issued to land owners in the designated area. Royis Tucker, game warden, will be in Mitchell County courtroom from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m. that day to issue permits.

Landowners will, in turn, issue hunting permits with deer tags to hunters they grant permission to hunt on their deer harvest lands.

Landowners may obtain the deer harvest permits by coming to the courthouse, Nov. 12. An owner unable to pick up permits may obtain them by sending a signed letter by an authorized agent to apply for him.

Area for the deer harvest in Mitchell County has been increased this season. The area is bounded by the road just southeast of Lake Champion, then on to Highway 163, down Highway 163 to Sterling County line, continuing on to Coke County line. East boundary is the Nolan County line.

Parts of Nolan County along the Mitchell County boundary are included in deer harvest season, also with permits to be issued in Sweetwater, Nov. 13.

Last hunting season about 550 deer were killed in Mitchell County during the first season deer permits were ever issued here. Deer census made by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department show an estimated 4,000 deer on Spade Ranch, now Tucker said.

A total of 59 counties in Texas are included in the 1964 deer harvest which is part of the vast deer management program in this state.

The program is designed for sections overpopulated with deer and areas where food for the wintering animals could become too scarce for the deer to survive.

Limit will be three deer and can not exceed two bucks. Bag limit can be one buck and two antlerless deer; two bucks and one deer or three does.

Permits are not to be attached to the carcass, Tucker said Saturday. Permits must be carried on the persons of hunters at all times. Tags from the hunting license must be filled out and attached to the carcass. Bonus tag may be used on antlerless deer only.

The program has grown in popularity with both landowners and hunters, each year, said E. A. Walker, assistant director of Texas Parks & Wildlife Department.

Antlerless deer harvest has become a sizeable part of the annual deer bag now estimated to 300,000 animals in Texas.

Last year saw a number of Mitchell County ranchers applying for the deer harvest permits and leasing their lands to hunters from throughout the county and this area.

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COUNTY COURT

Judge Fines Six After Guilty Pleas

Docket for Mitchell County Court was called Wednesday morning.

Frank Ginzle, county attorney, was prosecutor for the State.

Judge Elmer Martin heard eight pleas with six defendants entering pleas of guilty as charged. Two other defendants entered pleas of not guilty and chose trial by jury next week.

Pleading guilty to a charge of Driving While Intoxicated, first offense, was Jeff W. Adkins. Judge Martin assessed a fine of \$20, plus court costs of \$27.50, and sentenced Ad-

kins to three days in jail. Bobby Gean Dossey entered a plea of guilty to driving a motor vehicle on a public road in Mitchell County while his driver's license was suspended. Dossey was fined \$25 and court costs.

Contributing to the delinquency of a minor child was the charge to which Ismael Garcia entered a guilty plea. Judge Martin fined Garcia \$100 plus cost of court.

Moises Garza Garcia pleaded guilty to a charge of Driving While Intoxicated. He was sent to jail for the mandatory

three day sentence and fined \$50 and costs.

Dorothy Russell pleaded guilty to possession of alcoholic beverage, wine, for the purpose of sale in a dry area, Mitchell County. The judge fixed her fine at \$200, and \$27.50 court costs.

Tommy Miles entered a plea of guilty to a charge of possession of alcoholic beverage, beer, for the purpose of sale in a dry area, and was assessed a fine of \$100 with \$27.50 court costs added. A jail sentence of 15 days in Mitchell County jail was also handed Miles by the county judge.

Took a licking along with our candidate Dr. Homer Price Rainey when he ran for Governor. And another when Ralph Yarborough fought Price Daniel for the Governor's post.

"Into each life some rain must fall."

NEVER HAVE taken our political choices and losses to heart like our Daddy before us did, though.

Can recall, as if were yesterday, Daddy's sitting in front of the radio in Dallas when a Republican named Herbert Hoover defeated a Democrat Al Smith.

Daddy cried. And he was almost never the weeping kind. Another staunch Democrat, our husband's father, cussed. And profanity was as rare to him as tears were to Daddy. The old guard took their political party lives pretty seriously.

Four Local Delegates For State Convention

Four voting delegates from Mitchell County Farm Bureau, Mr. and Mrs. Murrell Blas singame and Mr. and Mrs. Tom C. Moore, will attend the Texas Farm Bureau convention which starts Sunday in Houston.

Also planning to go to Houston is Miss Martha Putman, winner of this area's "Talent Find" contest, and Miss Leann Moore.

Farmers and ranchers from all over Texas will convene in Houston starting this week-end for the 31st annual convention of Texas Farm Bureau, largest general farm organization in the state.

Registration begins at 2 p. m. Sunday, Nov. 8, at the Rice Hotel, and adjournment will be late the afternoon of Nov. 11. Some 2,000 persons including about 800 voting delegates, are expected to attend.

Main business of the convention will be adoption of state policies for next year and recommendation on national issues which will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation convention Dec. 6-10 in Philadelphia.

Mitchell County Farm Bureau members, in a recent convention, prepared seven resolutions to consideration of the State convention.

"Grass roots" recommendations on state and national issues already have been adopted in annual meetings of the 201 organized county Farm Bureaus in Texas. These resolutions have been forwarded to the TFB headquarters in Waco for consideration at the 31st annual meeting.

Delegates will also elect directors from seven districts to be members of the state organization's board of directors. The board will elect officers for the coming year immediately following the convention.

Featured guest speakers include Charles B. Shuman, Chicago, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation; Texas Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Lubbock; Texas Congressman O. C. Fisher, San

Angelo; and Dr. Edward R. Annis, Miami, Fla., immediate past president of the American medical Association.

Shuman, Smith and Fisher will speak Tuesday morning Nov. 10. Dr. Annis will be banquet speaker that evening.

TFB President C. H. DeVaney of Waco and Conshoma will deliver his annual message to the convention Monday morning, Nov. 9. Edwin Sanderson, Paris, secretary-treasurer and Dist. 5 director, will make the annual report during the same morning session.

Vesper Service speaker Sunday evening is Carl G. Hecker of the Central Church of Christ, Pasadena, Tex.

A highlight of the convention will be the state finals of the annual Queen Contest. Dewey Compton, farm director for radio station KTRH and KTRK-TV, Houston, will be master of ceremonies for the

and Talent Find competition. Finals for the Discussion Meet will be Sunday evening with the "Talent Find" finals slated Tuesday evening. Winners in each event will represent Texas at the AFBF convention next month in Philadelphia.

Special conferences on commodities and other matters of interest to Farm Bureau members will be held immediately after lunch Monday. District caucuses of voting delegates will be at 4 p. m. that day.
