Cases Alleging Welfare Fraud Presented To Grand Jury

The Investigation Division of the Texas Department of Human Services and Coleman County District Attorney Ross Jones presented cases alleging welfare fraud against six individuals to a Coleman County Grand Jury on June 3.

All of the individuals are accused of illegally obtaining welfare benefits from the Department of Human Services. The total dollar amount of the cases is \$22,853.79, which includes \$12,168.00 food stamp benefits; \$5,942.00 financial assistance; and \$4,743.79 Medicaid benefits.

A case against another individual was filed in Coleman County Court.

Allegations of welfare fraud are investigated by the Department of Human Services Office of Inspector General. When investigators have obtained enough evidence to substantiate a charge of fraud, the cases are referred to the District Attorney's office for prosecution.

Persons accused of welfare fraud may face charges of Tampering with a Governmental Record, Securing Execution of a Document by Deception or Theft by Unlawful Taking. All are felony charges.

All of the above persons charged had completed applications for assistance and were also interviewed by a caseworker. Welfare fraud occurs when a person obtains benefits from the Department of Human Services by giving false information in order to obtain those benefits. Some of these individuals charged had given incorrect information on their applications and/or during a face-to-face interview concerning their income or the income of a household member. One gave incorrect information regarding money held in a bank account by a household member.

During the last fiscal year (ending Aug. 31, 1997) the Office of Inspector General statewide completed 11,961 investigations involving \$16,132,020 in theft in all program areas.

The conviction rate for those cases actually ending up in court is currently 98%. Upon conviction,

the accused is generally ordered by the court to make restitution to the taxpayers through the Texas Department of Human Services.

Some cases are settled without court action, through an administrative hearing process within DHS. This process used by the department primarily for the lower dollar amount cases, to prevent clogging of the court's docket. During the last fiscal year OIG obtained 2,623 court adjudications and 7,292 disqualifications in administrative hearings. This resulted in \$7,190,346 being returned to the taxpayers through restitution as a result of cases investigated similar to the ones presented to the Coleman County Grand Jury.

Restitution may be in the form of payments made directly to DHS by the offender, by lowering the benefits of those currently receiving assistance or by intercepting the government refunds, such as Income Tax refunds.

Overall, these figures represent only a small percentage of those applying for or receiving benefits. Figures for the same fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1997, indicate that in Coleman County there were 1,383 participants in the Food Stamp program, receiving total benefits of \$1,033,962.00. There were 302 participants in the AFCD (Aid to Families with Dependent

Children) program receiving \$208,172.00 in benefits. Medical benefits were paid for 812 participants.

Persons who apply for or receive benefits to which they are not entitled by giving false information are subject to a 12-month disqualification for a first offense, 24 months for a second offense and permanent disqualification for a third offense.

The Department of Human Services considers welfare fraud a criminal offense and feels that it should be treated as such. In doing so, DHS personnel actively seek out and attempt to prosecute welfare recipients who are cheating the system. Citizens participation is definitely encouraged. If you know of anyone who is abusing or has abused any DHS program, please contact the Office of Inspector General at 915-690-3220, 1-800-436-6184, or your local Department of Human Services office. Anonymous complaints will be accepted. However, if you leave your name it will be held in strict confidence.

The end result of the survey is that the county will not fund an additional trapper out of tax revenues.

The two trappers who have been employed the past several years. The county funded one trapper with funds for the second coming from the Animal Damage Control Association, whose membership includes local farmers and ranchers.

A recent state mandate raised annual trapper salaries by \$4,800 to \$21,600.

Myrtle A. Baker

HOUSTON—Myrtle Alexander Baker, 89, of Houston died at her daughter, Mildred's home in Houston on Feb. 18, 1998.

Services were held Saturday, Feb. 21, 1998 at Forest Park Lawndale Chapel conducted by her son Warren Baker who was assisted by Jay Leach, pastor of Covenant Baptist Church of Houston. Her grandchildren provided musical tributes. Burial followed in Forest Park Lawndale Cemetery.

She was born Jan. 19, 1909 in a tenant's house on the Stewardson Ranch beneath the Santa Anna Peaks in Coleman County. She was the fifth child of William Jackson Alexander and Ada Goodman.

She joined Loretta (Smith Beasley), Lucille (Mullen), William Steaven, and Frances (Roberts) Alexander as first-generation Texans.

The Alexanders and Sheltons had come from East Tennessee to McLennan County, and the Goodmans from Georgia and Alabama to Robertson County in the early 1880's.

Only Frances (90) and Bill's wife, Minnette survive her.

Myrtle was raised in South Texas where her Papa and family operated the gin, store and hotel. After her Mama's death in 1923, she and Papa operated cafes in Corpus Christi, then in Waco where Jim Baker was one of the trainmen who stopped in to eat.

James Daniel married "that blonde" in 1932, and thereafter Myrtle followed him "on the road" in a boxcar bunker except when she needed to be in Houston for the birth of a child or school years.

In 1940 she paid \$190 for a lot and \$1300 to build a one-bedroom house on Los Angeles Street in Kashmere Gardens. The little house sheltered an amazing number of people and livestock and hosted many a joyous family gathering.

One of the last was Jim's funeral in March 1962 after his death overnight from a stroke.

Myrtle's chief pride in life must have been her first born Warren James Baker, now pastor of Old Moulton Baptist Church, and teacher and systems administrator for Gonzales School District. Mildred Joan joined them in 1934 and Roger Lee in 1936. Baby Myrna Lou's death at eight months was the family's worst tragedy.

Gramma/Granny has supported her nine grandchildren in many days and nights of devoted service. The first, Catherine Ann Baker got that special attention when Grandpa was still alive and adoring her. The grandchildren kept Grammy busy many weekend. Nine great-children have been added.

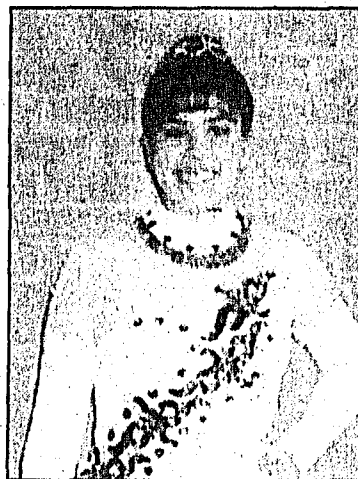
