

GUN DISCHARGE KILLS LAMB YOUTH

GLORIA AND MARQUIS PART WAYS

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 22 (AP)—Gloria Swanson's long heralded suit for divorce from the Marquis Henri De La Falaise De La Coudraye was on file here today. The screen star's attorney filed the suit yesterday, charging "willful and malicious desertion." Confirming statements made at the time the question of divorce was broached, the Marquis said he would not contest the action. The couple was married in Paris, January 23, 1925, and separated a year ago, the complaint stated. The first public intimation that Miss Swanson and her titled husband had reached the parting of their ways came in August of this year when the Marquis came to Hollywood from Europe and stayed alone at a hotel. At that time both said they had decided to live apart and Miss Swanson intimated she was considering filing a suit for divorce. Gloria and her husband are shown below.



MINE BLAST'S DEATH TOTAL IS NOW AT 231

(By The Associated Press)
ALSDORF, Rhineland Prussia, Oct. 22.—This mining town of 10,000 inhabitants was plunged into new grief today when the realization struck home that there was no hope for 61 miners still under ground in the Anna II coal mine.

With a certain death total of 231 and the bodies of 170 victims of yesterday's mysterious explosion already recovered, there seemed every likelihood that further increases in the death list must be made. The present figures make the disaster the greatest of its kind in Germany since 1908.

Ninety-nine persons remained in hospitals, many of them in critical condition.

See Ghastly Sight

When rescue crews wearing gas masks, penetrated to a pit 1,500 feet below the surface, a ghastly sight met their eyes. All about them the victims lay, apparently asphyxiated. From this pit not one person had emerged alive. It was only then that the would-be rescuers realized how must be given up for any others in that area.

There were heartbreaking scenes as the dead were taken from the shaft and their families identified them. Many persons came from surrounding towns, some even motoring over the nearby Belgian and Dutch borders. These thronged the town today but a strong force of mounted and foot police kept the crowds at a distance from the mine.

A government commission continued its efforts to learn the cause of the explosion. The blast at first was attributed to ignition of dynamite. Coal damp also was suspected but it was the belief that this latter deadly factor had not entered into the tragedy that encouraged those above ground for many hours in the belief that large numbers of the miners would be rescued alive from the deep but well ventilated galleries.

Army Engineers Find Aztec Ruins In Nicaragua Over Four Centuries Old

GRANADA, Nicaragua, Oct. 22.—High up on the side of Zapatero Island, surrounded by the blue waters of Lake Nicaragua, United States army engineers surveying a new canal route have discovered what they believe to be Aztec ruins.

Much of the relic site is in tumbeo, condition, but there still stand, unexcavated, four centuries old, four large human sacrificial

stones and at their foot a giant Indian idol with a carved man's body and the head of a grotesque vengeful animal.

Tomb Behind Idol
Immediately behind the large idol there is a tomb made of flat stones from which the binding cement long since has dropped away. Vines and undergrowth have conquered the spot and the tomb has settled to

a mound of earth and stone five or six feet high, twenty feet wide, and a hundred feet long.

On the four sides of the tomb, which is believed to contain remains of the humans sacrificed, including Spanish Spaniards who came into the Indians' midst, lay broken and headless idols where they have lain for centuries.

TWENTY-FIVE PER CENT TO CUT CROP

STATE OFFICIAL SAYS TEXANS SHOULD BE IN ACCORD

(By The Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—Under the present business depression it seems necessary to reduce cotton acreage next year, George B. Terrell, Texas commissioner of agriculture, says. He would welcome any practical plan to accomplish a reduction.

He said a cut of 25 per cent would be sufficient.

A 25 per cent cut would reduce the next crop to approximately 10,864,500 bales.

Small production in this country and resultant high prices might encourage greater production abroad, Terrell warned. The federal farm board Terrell said, "is endowed with broad powers and it already has exercised some of those powers indirectly and sustained a loss of millions of dollars to the government. The board is authorized to aid in preventing and controlling surpluses in any agricultural commodity through orderly production and distribution; to investigate the conditions of overproduction of agricultural commodities and advise as to the prevention of such overproduction and to make investigations and reports upon the following: land utilization for agricultural purposes and reduction of the acreage of unprofitable marginal lands in cultivation."

Powers Might Lend

"It seems that with its powers the farm board might lend financial assistance in preventing crop surpluses by aiding in the reduction of

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BANKS TO GET STATE FUNDS

HATCHER HAS PLAN TO AID DROUTH AREAS OF WEST TEXAS

AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—State Treasurer Gregory Hatcher announced today that all banks in the drouth-stricken area, making application and showing proper liquid security, would be given a preference as depositors for state funds for the fiscal year beginning December 1.

Hatcher's announcement follows: "If the banks of West Texas or any drouth-stricken section of the state will make application for state funds, and indicate their ability and willingness to furnish liquid security for the same, a preference will be given these banks in the designation of state deposits and allotment of funds for the ensuing fiscal year, beginning December 1."

"Liquid securities I mean such as immediately convertible into cash in case of a bank failure, so that the state will not be embarrassed by delay in collecting the amount of the deposit."

Parliament Member Says America Is Most Unfortunate and Poorest Nation in World; Visited 30 States

(By The Associated Press)
LONDON, Oct. 22.—Dr. E. Leslie Burgin, member of parliament, said today upon returning from the international law association conference in New York that there is no country in the world quite so hard on the unfortunate and poor as the so-called prosperous continent of America.

Dr. Burgin said he had traveled in thirty states while in the United States, adding "throughout the whole of America there seems to be little reserve in the pockets of the people. Thrift, foresight and saving all seem to

be little known and less practiced.

"There is no unemployment insurance, there is very little organized public assistance, and the poor law is administered with a rigor that savors of Prussianism."

"In America there seems to be a spirit of far greater callousness than exists in the old country. Apparently it is not uncommon for patients in hospitals and infirmaries to be told that the bed in which they are lying has been offered to some one who has bid a higher price."

Representative Of India National Congress Marries Colorado Co-Ed

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 22.—Gopal Singh Khalsa, one of three representatives in this country of the Indian national congress composed of adherents to the cause of mahatma Gandhi, last night took Miss Irene Hall, 20, co-ed of the University of Colorado, as his bride.

Khalsa met the girl a year ago while he was conducting a series of lectures at the University at Boulder. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Hall of Boulder and was a freshman at the university.

The Indian has been identified with the Gandhi movement since the Amritsar mas-

sacre in 1919. In addition to his writings, Khalsa operates the Hindustani, a newspaper in San Francisco.

After a honeymoon trip through Europe the couple will go to India where Khalsa intends to start a chain of newspapers, providing the British ban on native press is lifted.

COXEY ON HAND AT CAPITOL

VETERAN WORKER FOR UNEMPLOYED TALKS WITH SECRETARY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—General Jacob S. Coxey, who once led an army of the unemployed against Washington, was on hand today before the commerce department officially opened with a placarded automobile awaiting an interview with Secretary Lamont, chairman of the cabinet committee appointed by President Hoover to deal with unemployment.

Coxey was ushered in to a private discussion of his ideas—which called largely for expenditure on public works by governmental organizations to make jobs—and took his departure with the official thanks for his call.

In spite of the nearly 40 years which have elapsed since his famous march, the commander appeared still hale and hearty.

LEADERS' AWAIT WOODS' ARRIVAL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—While the cabinet committee on unemployment today awaited the arrival of Arthur Woods, of New York, to take charge of President Hoover's relief organization a group of statistical experts gathered at the labor department to consider existing government methods of collecting data on unemployment.

James J. Davis, secretary of labor, in an address to the gathering, said confidence in the accuracy of the department's figures on labor and wage matters was justified, but a probable need of extending this type of work now exists. He cited particularly the appearance of "technological" unemployment because of the displacement of manual labor by new machinery processes.

SUCCESS GREET STUDY OF ECLIPSE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—A message received today at the naval observatory said photographs of the sun's eclipse on the island of Niuafoa in the south Pacific were successful.

Commander H. J. Keppler, in charge of the United States naval observatory expedition, said 41 coronal pictures had been taken of the eclipse.

The message, as interpreted by Captain Julius F. Hellweg, superintendent of the observatory, said: "No clouds; sky of very fair quality; direct photographs entirely satisfactory; good flash of photometer and Einstein; Corona midway in type, fairly bright; two fairly long streamers, one at 300 degrees and one at 120 degrees, six medium streamers (direction not given); Bailey's Beads seen at edge of sun at beginning of eclipse; natives not alarmed, but interested; New Zealand (British) party work successful; all members of our party in good health; 41 coronal pictures and Einstein and spectrophotographs obtained; short showers one hour before totality."

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WOMEN HEAVIEST LOSERS IN COLLAPSE OF BOB STOCKS, RECORDS SHOW; SIX TO TWELVE MILLION DOLLARS LOSSES

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Women who live in Kansas, Kentucky and Ohio, in New England and Canada—long distance speculators too know little or nothing of finance—are the heaviest losers in the collapse of Charles V. Bob's Metal & Mining Shares, Inc., the attorney general's office said today.

This is the Bob enterprise to which Assistant Attorney General Washburn is directing most of the activity of an investigation into all Bob's manifold stock promotions. Bob has been missing since October 8, when he flew to Chicago in his own airplane, informing business associates he expected to return in a few days.

His friends remained convinced today that the financier had left the country, despite a report of a telephone call last Friday in which a man who represented himself as Bob talked from Akron, Ohio, with a maid at the Bob home here. Mr. Washburn said he would talk to Mrs. Bob about that today.

Many Women Losers
Examination of records of Metal & Mining shares, he said, disclosed that "an astonishingly large percentage" of investors were women holding minority shares. A majority interest in big blocks is held by Bob and his associates, here is nothing to indicate what the small investors paid for their stock. Similar investigations of 29 other Bob companies are in progress, and within a day or so, Mr. Washburn said, applications will be made for receiverships for a number of these concerns.

Since his inquiry began Mr. Washburn has estimated total losses to investors in Bob concerns between six and twelve million dollars, the figure increasing as his investigations progressed. His statistics, he said, have not tabulated the names of any small stockholders.

PRODUCERS OF MIDCONTINENT ARE WORRIED

ANOTHER SHADOW SEEN ON MARKET; CUT RATES CITED

(By The Associated Press)
TULSA, Okla., Oct. 22 (AP)—Independent refining concern continues to hammer away at the midcontinent crude oil market, the threat of a general crumbling of the price structure casts another shadow across the path of producers.

While the first announced reductions in prices had been anticipated because of scattered sales of oil at below posted figures and a drop in the gasoline market, oil men now believe that a general price cut may follow. They say that other independent refiners will be forced to follow the lower schedules and that producers will not be able to shift connections to the larger buyers because the latter have been decreasing rather than increasing their purchases.

Attempt To Get In Line
The ordering of lower price schedules by several Oklahoma and Texas refiners was explained by them as an attempt to place their prices in line with refinery revenues so they can at least break even in their operations. In statements announcing the reductions, they said posted crude schedules had been out of line with the refinery market for several months. Most of the refiners involved either do not produce crude oil or their production is small when compared to their total purchases.

Some of the responsibility for the present situation is laid at the door of the cut price jobber of gasoline. Selling at cut rate stations, several such jobbers have put into practice a plan of asking for bids.

COMPANION IS INJURED ON DUCK HUNT

GUN IS DISCHARGED AS CAR'S GEARS ARE SHIFTED

LITTLEFIELD, Oct. 22.—J. L. Wingfield, 17, is dead and Loys Dyer, about the same age, is suffering from a wound in his chest as the result of the accidental discharge of a shotgun near here late yesterday, as the boys, in company with three high school chums, set forth upon a duck hunting trip.

Wingfield and Dyer, together with Marvin Chandler, Andrew Wills, and Thomas Lowe, were occupants of a touring car bearing the party to a lake where ducks were to be hunted. A 12-gauge shotgun, its shells loaded with No. 4 or No. 8 shot, was propped in the front seat, its butt against the gear lever and its muzzle against the back of the front seat.

Started To Shift Gears
When the party reached a turn in the road, a little more than 7 miles northeast of Littlefield, Marvin Chandler, driver and owner of the machine, started to shift his gears to drive more slowly over a rough stretch.

As the gears were shifted the gun was discharged, sending its heavy load through the back of the front seat. A portion of the charge struck young Wingfield in the right, top part of the head, centering at the right eye. He was instantly killed as part of the right side of his head was blown away.

Young Dyer struck
Pieces of metal from the back of the front seat were torn away by the shot and struck young Dyer in the chest. The metal painfully but not seriously injured the lad in striking him.

The party is immediately returning to Littlefield for medical aid. The body of young Wingfield was placed in charge of the Hammond morticians here.

NO CHARGE ON DEATH FILED

ROBERT LOGAN IS GIVEN HIS RELEASE TODAY AFTER HEARING

Following a court of inquiry held this morning before Justice G. R. Scott, with questioning by County Attorney Vaughn E. Wilson, Robert Logan, of Sweetwater, driver of the automobile which Monday night struck and killed R. E. Branscum, was released without any charge being filed against him.

Four witnesses, Misses Rhuda King and Billie White, occupants of the car, and J. L. Croft and Jack Reeves, state highway patrolmen, testified at the hearing this morning. Logan also appeared before the court to make a statement in his own behalf.

Accident Unavoidable
After all witnesses had been heard Justice Scott announced that the testimony failed to bring out in his opinion that Logan had committed an offense and ruled that the fatal accident was unavoidable.

All of the testimony in the case and names of the witnesses will be presented to the Lubbock county grand jury for consideration, however.

R. E. Branscum, 55, of Hamlin, was run down by the car on state highway No. 7 about nine miles southeast of Lubbock, after he had been stopped by two highway patrolmen because he had no tail light burning on his truck.

Logan, in his statement to the court this morning, said that he had been blinded by the truck and had been unable to stop in time to avoid the accident.

"The oft quoted couplet," 'Tis easy enough to be pleasant when life flows along like a song,' applies particularly to the housewife with her multitude of interests," says Mrs. Ihig. "The real test of the housewife appears when her husband calls in from the office, thirty minutes before meal time, to inform her that he is bringing guests to dinner, whom he wishes to impress with his wife's cooking."

The Man Forgets
"It is not characteristic of the masculine mind to remember that on that particular afternoon his wife has been at the dressmaker's, or that it was the afternoon for the bridge club meeting," she continues.

"Pity the poor husband, who is greeted by a tirade of abuse based on imagined martyrdom from the wife he has chosen as a partner and helpmate, when he requests the privilege of presenting an unexpected guest! Pity more the poor housewife, whose limitations are such that she feels a fit of hysterics and a good cry will offer the best prelude toward creating a favorable impression at the dinner a short time later," the home economist says.

This problem of an emergency meal is one particularly feminine, according to the economist. The only defense available is for the housewife to prepare herself with a repertoire of recipes and products. This will permit her not only to serve a meal that will reflect to advantage, both herself as a cook and her husband as a householder, but will permit her presence at the table with a smile of welcome and appreciation for the guest of the evening, says Mrs. Ihig.

NEW CHINA IS PLAN SEEN BY KAI-SHEK

PRESIDENT ENVISIONS
GREATER NATION IN
THE FUTURE

(By The Associated Press)
NANKING, Oct. 22.—A new China, united and strengthened, rising above the ashes of rebellion and anarchy, is envisioned by President Chiang Kai-shek, who announced ambitious plans today for the republic.

With northern revolt apparently crushed and a punitive army sent into the south central provinces to subdue communists, who took advantage of the northern defection to pillage undefended cities, President Chiang expects a unified, chastened China to emerge and effect rehabilitation along the following lines:

His Plans
First, eradication of communism and banditry; second, rehabilitation of national finances; third, creation of efficient, honest governmental administration; fourth, achievement of industrial development; fifth, development of national and local autonomy, thereby paving the way for true democracy.

"Our campaign against banditry and communism already has begun," the president said. "It is expected that within six months the objective will be achieved."

"Rehabilitation of the national finances depends on enforcement of a budgetary system which long has been awaiting execution, but has been impossible because of regional unruliness of war lords in constant revolts against Nanking."

To Enforce Budget
"With these revolts ended, the budget will be enforced. Also, the unification of national currency and abolition of 'likin' or regional taxes, will be carried out as soon as possible."

"Creation of efficient governmental administration involves eradication of lethargy, inefficiency and corruption. The first two are due to ambiguous demarcation of powers and responsibilities of officials, while corruption is attributable to

Rainfall At Spur Shows 5.41 Inches

SPUR, Oct. 22.—(Special)—Rainfall as recorded at the Spur state experiment station between September 27 and October 14, amounts to 5.41 inches and with the ground now saturated with moisture, conditions in Dickens county are the best they have been since 1923, R. E. Dickson, superintendent of the station, declared.

"Conditions look more favorable than any year since 1923," Mr. Dickson said. "The long drought that has held the county in its grip for the past three years seems broken and the entire county has received soaking rains."

Creeks are now beginning to run over, indicating Mr. Dickson says, that the soil saturation has about reached its highest point. Rainfall this fall has been more than at any time since 1926. The steadiness, however, with which the rains came, indicated the moisture was more effective than any since the fall of 1923.

Concerning local autonomy, President Chiang said: "Upon its achievement depends our ability to establish a democratic form of government. These tasks await immediate realization if the nationalist government is to continue to live."

Chiang said the entire resources of the government would be thrown against any faction threatening to disrupt national unity by force.

EDITORS NOT TO ANSWER QUERY

WOODCOCK DECIDES TO ABANDON PRO POLL IN UNITED STATES

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—After several days reflection, Prohibition Director Woodcock decided today to abandon the poll of 3,000 newspaper editors on their prohibition views for fear its purpose might be misunderstood.

Mr. Woodcock said the purpose of the division of research in the dry bureau in originally undertaking the poll was merely to get data for its own information, but he observed today that "hindsight is better than foresight sometimes and lest the purpose be misunderstood I have called off the poll."

Many Answered
While many of the questionnaires to the editors have been answered, the prohibition chief directed that letters be sent the editors telling them to disregard the first letter of inquiry.

There were signs some members of the law enforcement commission as well as some government officials believed the prohibition bureau was going beyond its jurisdiction in conducting the poll, but Mr. Woodcock said he had ordered it

abandoned "entirely upon my own volition."

Some Objections
He said there had been some objections, but not many and he emphasized he was acting as he thought best and without orders.

The questionnaire, sent out by E. A. Grant, acting chief of the division of research, asked the editors if they favored the Eighteenth Amendment and Volstead Act, whether they were opposed to the dry laws, or whether they were neutral.

The letter transmitting the questionnaire said the prohibition bureau wanted to get the attitude of the press of the nation as a whole on the subject of prohibition.

Woodcock made the announcement of the change in plans after an earlier statement that answers to the questionnaires would not be made public, as originally planned. The decision to call the poll itself was made later.

To Give Out Facts
The director said his bureau would continue to issue monographs on prohibition, giving the facts developed against the dry laws as well as those in favor of them.

Discussing his recent trip to Chicago and Wisconsin, Woodcock said he had been impressed by the cooperation afforded federal agents by police in rounding up commercial violations, but he believed the federal force was "pitifully small."

The director described as erroneous stories saying he had advocated establishment of scholarships at universities for the study of prohibition. He said he had suggested only that students who must write these devote their research to prohibition and had expressed the opinion that the prohibition bureau

LUBBOCK HIGH GRADUATES RANK HIGH

PERCENTAGE FAILING IN COLLEGES IS 13.4 IN STATE

According to figures compiled recently by the State Department of Education and just announced, Lubbock high school graduates who enrolled in college classes during 1929 had 11.9 per cent failures, with an average failure of students during the three years 1927, 1928 and 1929 of 13.4 per cent.

A complete tabulation has been announced of each of the 191 member schools of the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the southern states.

According to this tabulation, Lubbock high school graduates who attended college in 1927, failed in 16.9 per cent of their courses. In 1928, 11.3 of the work was below passing grade.

These records were carefully compiled by the State Department. At the opening of each school year, each high school which is a member of the association, is required to send to the State Department a list of the names of graduates of the previous year indicating to what college or university each has transferred his high school credits. WELL PUZZLES OIL EXPERTS

NO. 1 TUBBS, CRANE, FAILS TO MAKE OIL AFTER SHUT DOWN

SAN ANGELO, Oct. 22—West Texas, with the world's shallowest and deepest oil, largest producers and the longest pipe lines, apparently had an enigma today in the Cranfill Bros. Oil Company's No. 1 J. B. Tubbs, west central Crane county well.

Several hours after it had been opened into tanks through a separator, after an increase in gas at 4,352 feet to an estimated 6,000,000 cubic feet—double the previous amount—the well had failed to make oil.

Gushes High Gravity It was opened for five minutes on Oct. 7, after topping pay line at 4,301 feet, beneath two sulphur water levels and at a record depth in the permian lime. The well gushed a six-inch stream of high gravity oil at that time.

Later, when a storage unit was built it flowed 1,315 barrels in 38 hours, before again being shut in for storage. Since it began deepening last Wednesday, at 4,310 feet, the well had been under 200-pound pressure, saving 75 to 80 barrels of oil daily and losing an estimated equal amount with gas, which was being "bled" off.

The well's performance until today had been heralded as West Texas' most important oil development since oil was discovered below 8,500 feet in Reagan county, in October, 1928.

The No. 1 Tubbs is in section 8, block B-27, public school land, 15 miles from the nearest production. Haylett field, in Ward county on the west.

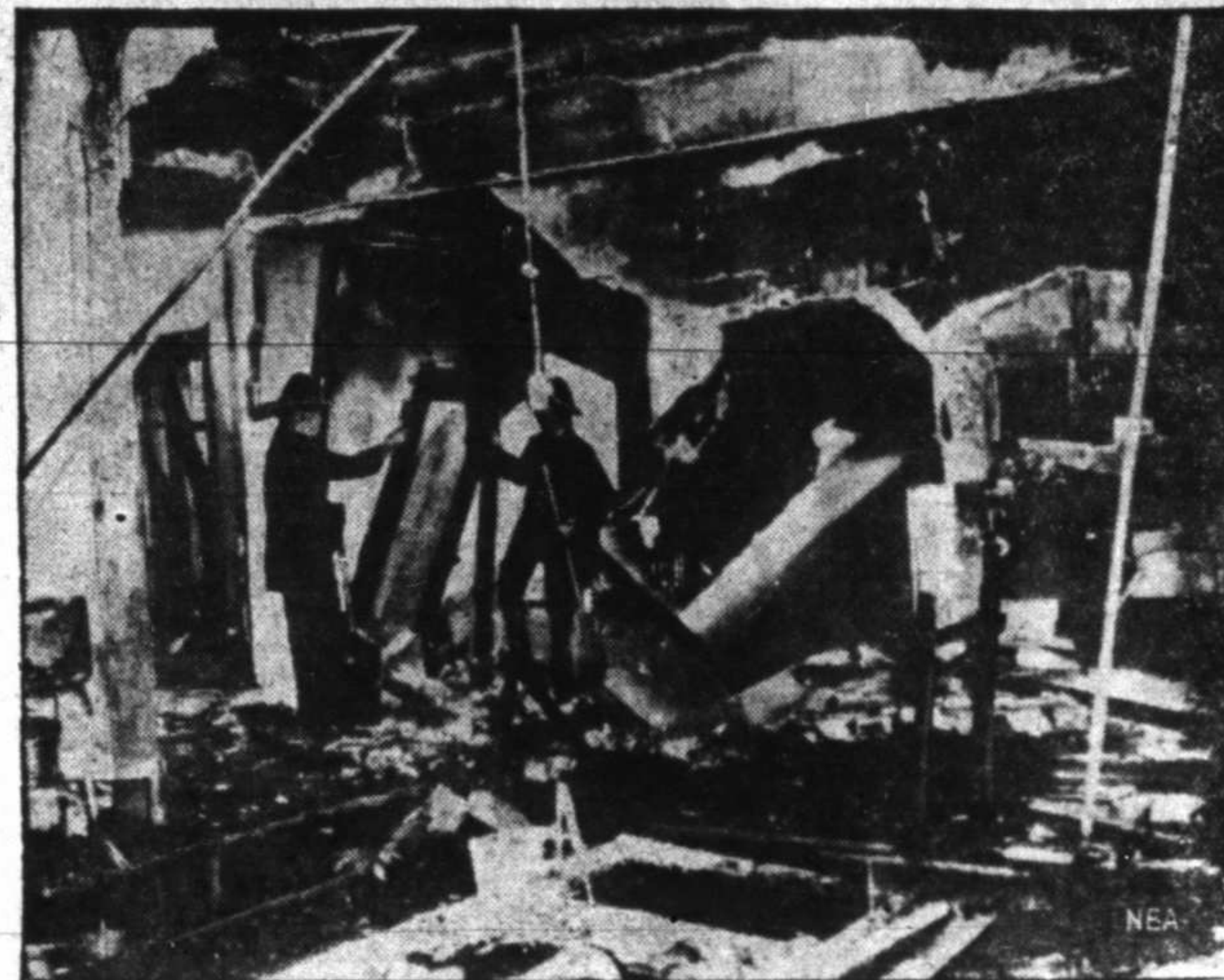

NEW TREATMENT TO SAVE INFANTS IN FIRST FEW WEEKS OF LIFE IS BEING USED; FIRE, POLICE METHODS USED

NEW YORK, Oct. 22 (AP)—From 25,000 to 50,000 American babies who now die under three weeks of age can be saved by use of fire and police department methods of restoring respiration, Professor Yandell Henderson, of Yale, informed the New York Society of Anesthetists, Saturday night.

This means that by substituting inhalators for the old-fashioned slap giving to start baby howling, and so to breathing properly, an army of young lives can be saved.

Is New Field

It is a new field, Professor Henderson said, which comes as a development of the knowledge about the value of breathing carbon dioxide that has virtually wiped out the pneumonia which once followed operations, and which holds encouragement for combating the greater

TENANT FARMER NEAR FORT WORTH IS MURDERED AND BODY THROWN IN OATS BIN; TWO HORSES AND CASH MISSING

(By The Associated Press)

FORT WORTH, Oct. 22—Apparently murdered early Monday night, the body of J. C. Cavender, 63, tenant farmer, was found last night covered with oats in the small grainery on a farm one and one-half miles northwest of Burdville.

Neighbors had searched several hours for him after their attention had been attracted by noise made by his corn in the milk lot, where they had been unsatisfied all day. Cavender's skull had been crushed from a blow struck from behind, and a heavy cord had been tied tightly around his neck so that it was imbedded in the flesh.

Neighbors first had searched the house and had looked in the grain-

ery, fifty yards east of the small farm house. A search of the country-side with lanterns failing, the searchers, Bill Mackey, Jack Parker, and Harley Mosteller, went through the house and farm buildings again. By the dim light of a lantern they saw the edge of a blue jumper in the oats. One of the men pulled at it and discovered the body, which had been covered with the grain.

What motive there was to the slaying neighbors could only surmise. They said Cavender would not have been robbed for money, though he had sold some oats several days ago. They could think of no enemy. Two horses of Cavender's were missing.

Prison Cotton Will Total 11,000 Bales

AUSTIN, Oct. 22 (AP)—Cotton production on the state prison farms will total approximately 11,000 bales, according to an estimate made today by George B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture. W. E. Williams, classifier of the department of agriculture in charge of prison cotton, reported that up to October 15 the prison farms had marketed 9,440 bales at an average price of 12.06 cents per pound for a total of \$581,373.

Premium on prison cotton amounted to \$6.06 per bale for a total premium of \$56,763. The price is at least two cents per pound higher than paid farmers generally throughout the state, due to an average staple of 1 and 3-32 inches. Terrell estimated that with feed crops grown on the prison farms, the state would have been good for \$1,000,000 in cotton. The prices being equal to the average for the past ten years.

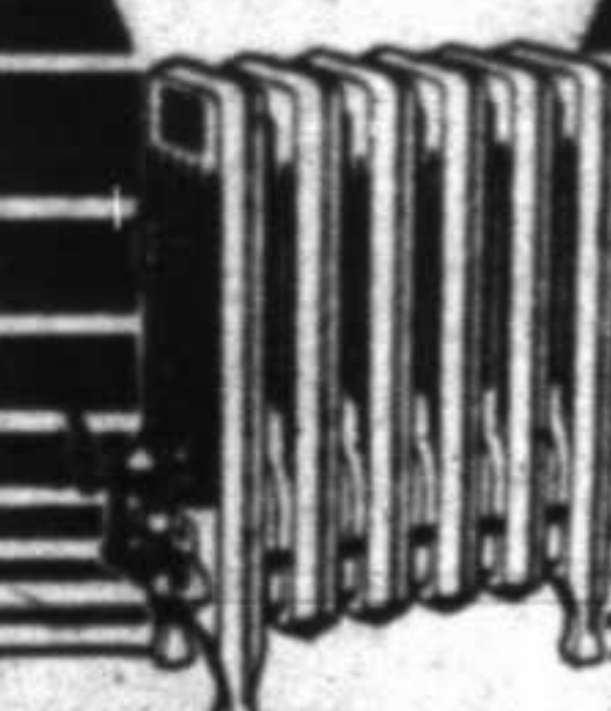
