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What The People Have Given . . .

In a recent editorial, the Portland Oregonian drove straight to the heart of the coal labor problem when it said:

"The labor bosses forget that what the people have given, they may also take away. The 'rights' to organize in unions, to bargain collectively, to strike and picket, have been confirmed by law. They are inherently just, for they represent the freedom of action to which an individual is entitled. But in their group application, such rights are subject to limitation and restraint . . .

"The government, by successive grants of power to the organizers of labor, has itself become the victim of the abuse of this power. This feeble attempt to reassert its legal authority, after a series of abject retreats, is nauseating. The government which took the mines away from their owners so Mr. Lewis' demands would be met, less than six months ago, has proved itself incompetent and powerless. Who may talk of nationalization of the coal mines as a remedy after this demonstration?"

"The government had best get out of the mining business as fast as it can, and set itself the task of devising laws with teeth in them to guarantee the responsibility of workers and their leaders commensurate with the responsibility of employers."

Elsewhere the Oregonian observes that one effect of prolonged interruptions in coal production will be to force users to turn to other forms of energy—thus gradually reducing the demand for coal and the jobs the industry provides. The attitude of the mine union's leadership spells ruin and despair for the workers—as it spells depression and industrial stagnation for the nation. Labor must learn that no man, and no group of men, is greater than the people of the United States.

THE VETERAN'S FRIEND

Q. Can a disabled veteran taking a course under Public Law 16 continue his training for more than four years?

A. Training in excess of four years may be approved when the veteran's disability is such that no course of training which does not exceed four years will restore him to employability, circumstances beyond the control of the veteran necessitate the extension beyond the prescribed four year period.

Q. Can an amputee veteran select the type of artificial limb he wants and the firm he wants to buy it from.

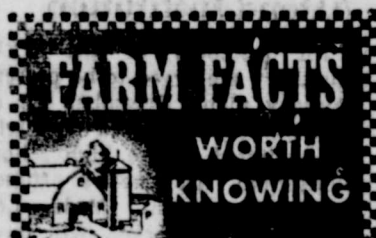
A. Yes, the veteran will be permitted to select the artificial limb of his choice but it must be purchased from an approved prosthetic appliance manufacturer under contract with VA.

Q. Am I entitled to field trip expenses in gathering material for a thesis while I am in school under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act?

A. Veterans Administration will not pay for occasional field trips, whether to summer camp or for data for research or thesis, where the charge to the student is a separate charge not included in the tuition or laboratory fee customarily paid by all students enrolled in the course.

Q. How may application be made for domiciliary or hospital care of a veteran?

A. Veterans Administration Form P-10, "Application for Hospital Treatment or Domiciliary Care," should be executed by the veteran or nearest relative, guardian, or representative and forwarded to the nearest VA hospital regional office, or contact office. If found to be eligible for admission, the veteran will promptly be notified and if admission cannot be authorized, the veteran will be informed and the reason stated.



Q. Is it all right to feed hogs moldy corn that is dry?

A. No. Moldy corn, wet or dry, may cause heavy losses and should not be fed to your hogs.

Q. How can I get my turkey hens into egg production in February?

A. Artificial light will give the stimulus. A 12 to 14-hour light day should be given.

Q. What kind of quarters are necessary for a breeding bull?

A. A strong bull pen and shed are important. Suitable quarters need not be expensive but must be of sturdy construction. A

mature bull can be controlled more effectively if he is properly housed in a pen with a large exercise lot. Detailed plans for bull pens are available through dealers of the Ralston Purina Company or from State Agricultural Colleges.

Q. How much hog feed does an acre of pasture replace?

A. A single acre of pasture in the Corn Belt may take the place of as much as 1,000 lbs. of corn and 500 lbs. of tankage, or their equivalent in other feeds.

Q. What is the cause of blindness among my laying hens?

A. Blindness may be caused by a disease known as Avian Leucosis. This disease is probably the cause of most of the blindness in laying flocks. This type of blindness is characterized by "fish eyes" in which the normal reddish bay color of the iris becomes a slaty gray, and the pupils may become irregular in shape.

In some cases, the blindness may be due to nutritional roup, or vitamin A deficiency. This type of blindness is much more rare, and the blindness results from destruction of eye tissues.

ments, but sold some trucklots at barns for \$20 a ton. Limited offerings of alfalfa brought fairly steady prices.

A let-up in demand following the holidays weakened the egg market. Current receipts on Friday brought 37 to 40 cents a dozen in Dallas, 40 to 42 Fort Worth, and 36 to 38 Denver. Interest shifted from turkeys to chickens, and fair receipts of hens and fryers found good demand at steady prices.

Seasonally light livestock receipts kept the trend steady to strong except for some weakness on cattle. Early week gains on hogs were maintained to the close at Texas points, but were partially lost in Oklahoma City, Denver and Wichita, although all markets closed \$1 to \$1.50 higher than a week earlier. On Friday, good and choice medium weights were quoted at \$21.50 per hundred pounds in Fort Worth, \$21 in San Antonio, \$21.75 Oklahoma City, \$21.75 to \$22 Denver, and \$21.35 to \$21.60 Wichita. About the only changes in southwest sheep and lambs were in Denver and Wichita where gains of 25 to 50 cents were reported. Cattle prices had weak spots on steers, cows and bulls in San Antonio, cow and stockers at Fort Worth, steers and heifers in Denver, and on stockers and feed-

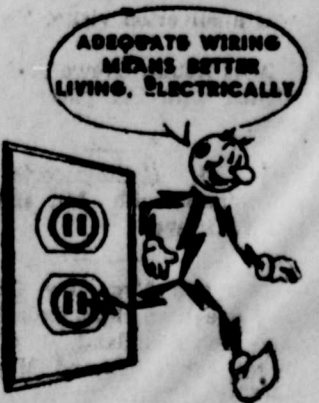

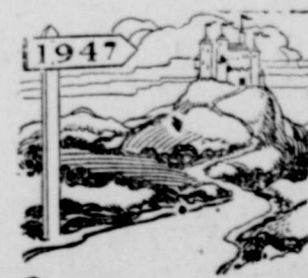

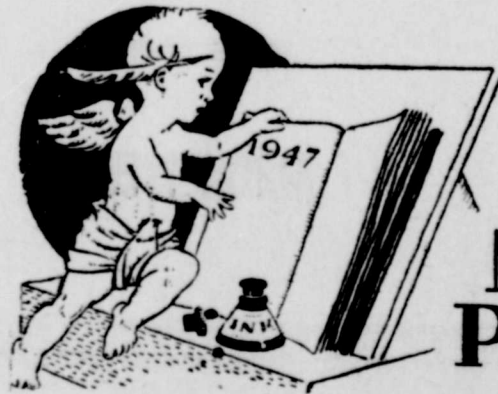

To save time in the morning, the dry ingredients can be measured and sifted and the lard blended into them the night before; or a quick biscuit mix (either homemade or a commercial product) may be used.

Currant Turns

2 cups sifted enriched flour

- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 tablespoons lard
- Milk
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup currants

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut in lard with two knives or pastry blender, until mixture has a fine even crumb. Add enough milk to make a soft dough. Turn onto floured pastry cloth or board. Knead dough until smooth. Roll as nearly round as possible, 1/2-inch thick. Spread with softened butter or margarine and sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon, currants and nuts. Cut circle into 8 wedge-shaped pieces. Roll each piece, starting at the wide end. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) for 20 minutes.

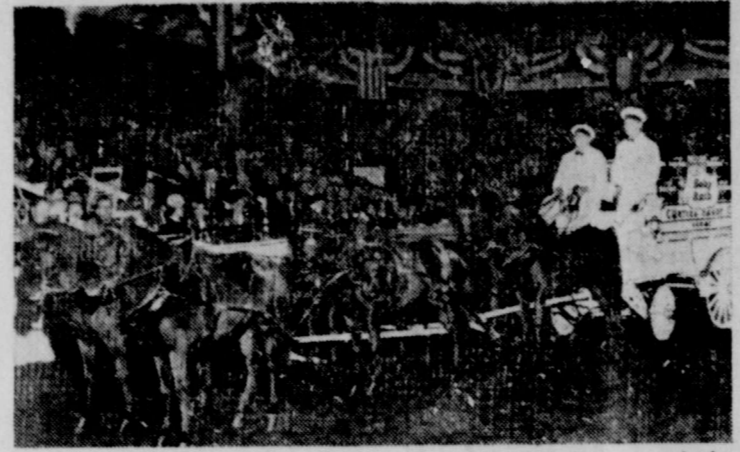

Cotton Demands For 1947 Call For Lots of Cotton

Foreseen continued demand for cotton products in 1947 has set Texas' cotton planting goal for next year at 8,460,000 acres.

This information comes from specialists of the Texas A. and M. college extension service who attended the annual Agricultural Outlook conference in Washington, D. C., to see what's in store for farmers next year.

The consumption rate of cotton has continued high since the end of the war, and no immediate change can be foreseen, the specialists say. Certain factors that may tend to weaken the demand for cotton goods, as well as most all farm products, are expected to become more prominent during 1947 however. As home construction and production of automobiles and household appliances increase, consumer expenditures will be shifted to purchase these goods and less money will be spent on food and clothing. Cotton consumption in the nation for the first six months of the 1946-47 season is expected to be at approximately the same high level as it has been during the past few years, but may run at a lower rate the last half of the season.

Concerning prices that farmers are due to receive for cotton next year, the specialists say that the 1947 loan rate is fixed at 92.5 percent of parity as of August 1, 1947.

Of the 1,725,000 tons of major warships lost by the Japanese in the last war, American carrier-based aircraft accounted for most with 680,000 tons sunk. Submarines destroyed 507,000 tons and surface ships 257,000 tons. Land-based aircraft accounted for only 62,500 tons.

Turkey meat consumption is becoming less seasonal, as a larger proportion of birds are being consumed in the "off-season"—February to August.

Dairy cows need three-fourths of an ounce of salt a day for each 1,000 pounds of liveweight, and one-third of an ounce for each 10 pounds of milk produced.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE WORLD MADE FLESH

LESSON TEXT—John 1:1-18. MEMORY SELECTION—No man hath seen God at any time; the only begotten Son, which is in the bosom of the Father he hath declared him.—John 1:18.

A new year always carries with it a deep sense of responsibility and at the same time a thrill of expectancy.

That is why we need to begin this new year—and continue it—in the study of God's Word, so that we may know his will. You will find it to be a joy and blessing to you, not only as you study it by yourself, but also in the fellowship of those in the Sunday school and church.

Our lessons for the next three months are of unusual interest; they take up the Gospel of John which was "written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name" (John 20:31).

Jesus Christ is here presented as the Word (Logos), and he is indeed the living Word come to reveal God to us.

I. The Living Word is the Light of Men (vv. 1-5).

Men ask questions about Christ. They want to know whether he is to be regarded as a good man and a great leader, or must we recognize him as being God?

The answer is here. He "was" in the beginning (Gen. 1:1),

which means that he "was God" even as he was "with God." This eternal, living, divine Word was the "express image" of God (Heb. 1:3), and so perfectly revealed the Father (v. 18).

He is the Creator (v. 3) and giver of life both natural and spiritual.

This eternal Word became (as he was) the light of men. He came to shine into the darkness of a sinful world with the only light of redemption. We say again, "This is the Lord!"

II. The Living Word is a Divider of Men (vv. 6-13).

The darkness of sin was deep and still is so deep that the glorious light of God is not received with gladness, nor accepted at all. We see that in the close of verse 5.

Now the question comes, Does it make any difference how a man regards Jesus Christ?

The answer is clear. You must decide what you will do with him. You cannot avoid that decision or evade that light which shines. You must either accept or reject, and a failure to accept is a rejection.

God has witnesses to the Light. John was such a witness and he, like all true witnesses for Christ, directed attention to him. John's great testimony was just a lesser light to point men to the true Light. That true Light is shed abroad for all men (v. 9).

As they face Christ, men divide into two groups. His own people, and his own creation rejected him when he came (v. 11). How utterly tragic! And yet the same thing goes on today. Men hear the gospel, are made acquainted with Christ and his claims, yet fail to accept his proffered salvation, and are eternally lost (John 3:19; 2:1).

But, thank God, there are those who receive him (v. 12), and to them he gives the power, the right or authority, to be the sons of God.

This change is expressly declared to be (1) not by reason of family or heredity—"not of blood"; (2) not by natural instinct or development—not "of the will of the flesh"; and (3) not by human violation or by man's will power—not "of the will of man."

III. The Living Word is a Revealer of God (vv. 14-18).

The eternal Word, the Lord Jesus Christ, laid aside his place of honor in heaven, came to earth and took upon himself our flesh that he might redeem us from sin. What infinite condescension, what unfathomable love!

He dwelt among men and showed forth the grace and truth of God, for he was full of these heavenly attributes. But it was in his giving of himself as Redeemer and Saviour of mankind that he fully revealed God in all his gracious love for us.

Notice the antithesis here. "Law" is set over against "grace"; "given" stands in contrast with "came," and "Moses" with "Jesus Christ."

The law was a schoolmaster to bring us to Christ (Gal. 3:24), but it could not save anyone; but grace—oh, it is by grace that we are saved (Eph. 2:8).

Moses was God's honored servant, but Jesus was the Son in the household (Heb. 3:5, 6). It was this Son of God who came to reveal the Father and to declare his grace in salvation.

The law was sent through a messenger, but no messenger, no matter how great or worthy, would do to bring the gospel of the grace of God. That message of "grace and truth" came by Jesus Christ. (v. 17).

Veterans' News

In order to afford veterans all possible protection against overpriced properties in the current high market, the Veterans Administration announced that effective January 2, 1947, VA, and not the lender, will pick the appraiser to evaluate "reasonable value" for purposes of G. I. loans.

Under the revised procedure, VA will designate by name the person to appraise each piece of property offered for sale to veterans under the guaranty loan provisions of the G. I. Bill.

This contrasts with the system in effect for the past 15 months, under which the lender was permitted to select any appraiser he desired from a panel of local appraisers whose general qualifications had been reviewed and approved by VA.

The revised procedure, VA said, will eliminate the tendency on the part of some lenders to use exclusively the services of "obliging" appraisers who are most amenable to turning in a high appraisal where necessary to meet the asking price.

As of November 30, more than 31,000 G. I. loans had been approved in VA's Dallas Branch Area of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi. These loans amounted to \$164,900,315, of which VA guaranteed \$78,072,915.

The Veterans Administration is providing reader service for blinded veterans who must have their study material read to them in order to go to school under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, VA said today.

Readers are picked, VA said, not only for their ability to read intelligently, but for their understanding of the problems of newly blinded persons and their ability to test the veteran's understanding of what he is hearing. Hiring of readers is done by VA regional managers, either through arrangements with the school or by contract with outside individuals or agencies.

VA has recommended to its regional managers a criterion of two hours of reader service a week for each credit hour the disabled veteran student is taking.



A true happening that is more amazing than fiction: During World War I, a group of soldiers on a troop ship en route to France sat around talking. None knew any of the others beyond a nickname, "Bill" or "Joe" or "Tex". One of them said: "When the war is over, I know what I'm going to do. I'm a geologist and a pretty good one, too, if I do say so. I'm going to open up an oil field."

The man who had been asking all the questions said, "My father and I own that farm."

He was H. S. Hilburn, now publisher of the Plainview News. After the war, a well was drilled and the Hilburn field was discovered.

A bill was introduced in the Texas Senate some years ago which would have deprived Texas Christian University of a good many thousands of dollars from lands it owns. T. C. U. is supported by members of the Christian denomination and their friends. This was during the depression and, if the income of T. C. U. were reduced, those whose contributions were its main support would have had to make more sacrifices, when already many were giving all they felt they could.

Through this little column, the public was told about the situation. A flood of letters poured in to the Senate and the bill was defeated. It was a privilege to have had some small part in helping the cause of Christian education.

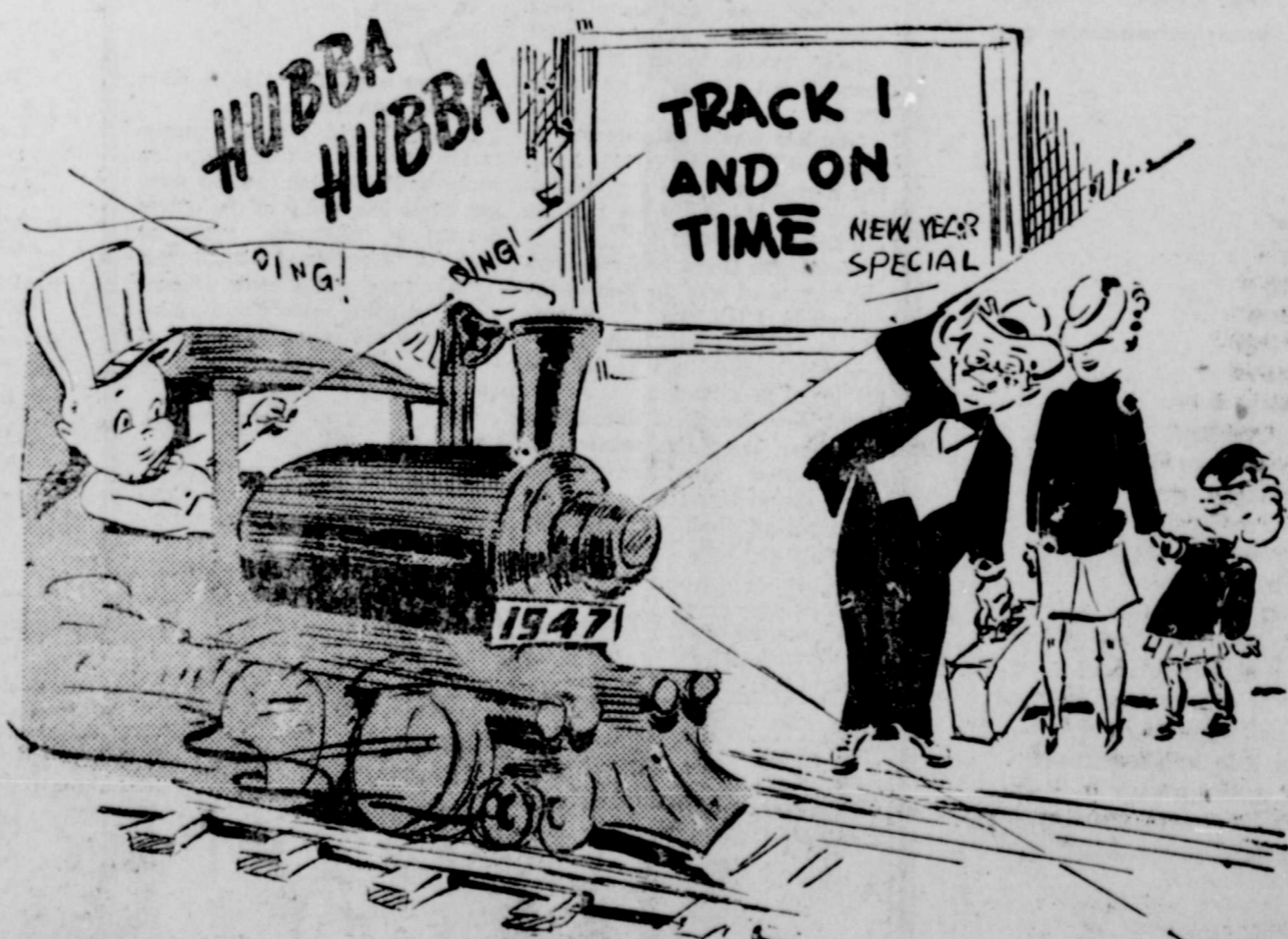
