State Park To Be Dedicated

Formal dedication ceremonies of the Lake Colorado City State Park will be held at 9 a. m. Saturday at the new entrance to the state park.

The regional director of the parks and wildlife department from the Ft. Davis State Park will represent the state at the ceremony.

Also present for the ceremonies will be city, county and chamber of commerce officials along with representatives of Texas Electric Service Co. from Fort Worth.

The state park has been open for almost two years but there were few improvements for campers to enjoy.

Now all but very little of the 574-acre park will be open to the public with many new facilities.

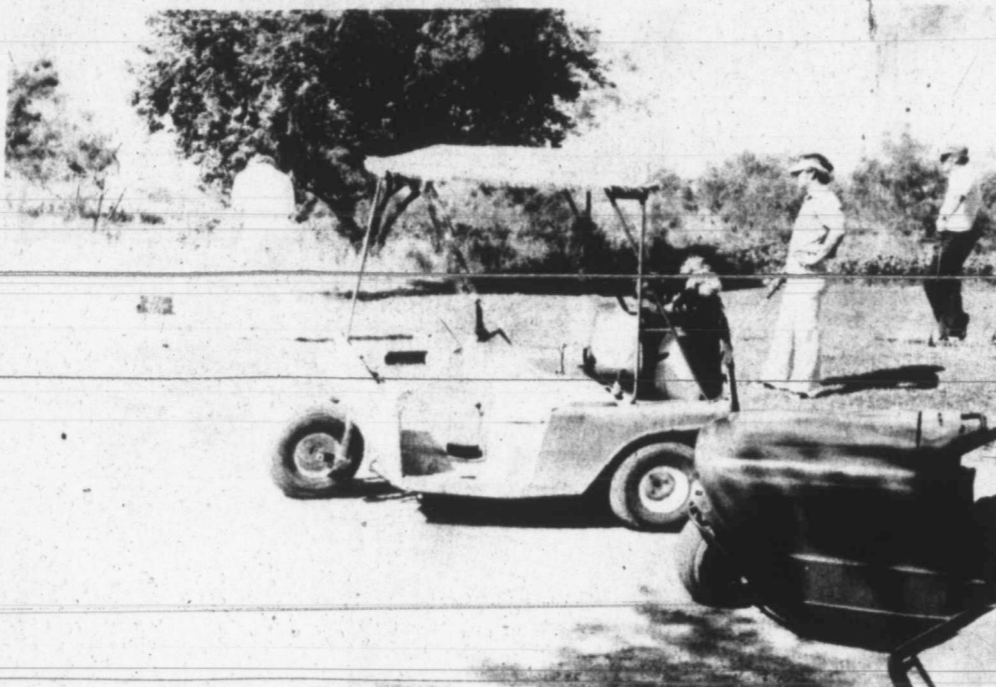
The cost of the new facilities which were financed through a \$228,040 federal grant with matching funds from the state, totaled almost \$500,000.

All of the new improvements under the Phase I construction at the park have been completed except for a 500-foot long fishing pier with lights crossing the first cove inside the lake park.

Included in the development are a park superintendent's house, a headquarters building with office complex, 3.5 miles of new paved roads for access to various park areas (in addition to the paved loop in the old city park area), 2,000 square yards of parking areas, 30 picnic areas with shade shelters, 35 multi-use camp sites with electricity and water, two restrooms (one with showers) each with hot and cold water, ceramic tile floors and walls, butane system and underground sewage.

In addition, there is a swimming beach with beach sand, a boat launching ramp (which has already been opened and is in use), and parking space for about 30 trailers.

The park was inspected by a state official Tuesday.

Powell, Hughes Win Local Golf Tourney

Competition was rugged in the annual Colorado Country Club golf tourney last weekend with George Powell of Colorado City

and his partner Raymond Hughes of Stamford winning the championship flight by one stroke.

Powell and Hughes also were medalists winners in Saturday's competition which did not count in the championship flight.

Powell and Hughes led most of the way in the 27-hole championship flight competition as they played with last year's winners, Ted Gross and Marvin Williams.

Gross and Williams ended up in a second place tie, only one stroke behind the winners. In a playoff for second place, Dan Wilkins and Jim Matthews won on the first hole with a par while Gross and Williams bogeyed the hole to take third place.

Powell and Hughes had a six-under-par 99 to win the tourney.

Two Big Springs - Ray Bluhm and Charles Bailey - won the first flight with a 142 for 18 holes. Sterling Parker and Jim Erwin of Snyder carded 143 to come in second, and three teams played extra holes to determine third place.

All three teams were tied at 145 and Larry Anderson of Snyder and Mike Strickland of Lubbock dropped out with a bogey on the first hole. The teams of Red McCullah and David McCullah of San Angelo and Jim Feagan of Sweetwater and Bob Grimes of Lubbock were all even on two, but Feagan and Grimes took third place when the McCullahs, father and son, bogeyed the number three hole.

John Middleton and Dr. Wesley Strahan of Lamesa won the second flight with 151 on 18 holes, and in a sudden-death playoff to settle second and third Carl Shelton of Knox City and Smt Swafford of Colorado City took second. Ben Sparks of Colorado City and Phil Fortune of Snyder were third.

Sheriff Bill McGuire of Colorado City and highway patrolman B.J. Butler of Sweetwater locked up first place in the third flight with 165. And, in a playoff to determine second and third places, Don Stewart and Buddy Fuller of Colorado City won on the second extra hole. Kelton Green and Harry Jordan of Sweetwater were third.

Highway Contracts

The Texas Highway Commission has let contracts for work on highways in and connecting with Mitchell County.

The work will be done by J.H. Strain and Sons, Inc. of Tye. The work will take an estimated 100 days to complete.

The projects include:
--Almost four-tenths of a mile for seal coat work and two course surface treatment on U. S. 84 in Mitchell County from Mitchell County Line to Scurry County Line.
--9.1 miles of U.S. 84 from South Front Street in Roscoe to Mitchell County Line.
--11.2 miles of U.S. 84 from Mitchell County Line to Hermleigh.

Bob Motley To School Board?

The Colorado Independent School District board of trustees will be busy during the summer as they have agreed to meet once or twice a week as they prepare to call a bond issue for the construction of new school facilities.

During these special meetings, the board will talk to fiscal agents and architects regarding the cost of construction and the financing of new facilities.

Among school activities this month will be the public hearing today (Thursday) by the school tax board of equalization in the school cafeteria.

Anyone who wants to air grievances regarding their school taxes is invited to attend the meeting.

Monday night, the school board will hold its regular monthly meeting and during that meeting a new school board member is expected to be appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Truman Nix.

Nix was elected in April and resigned last month after he accepted the coach's job at Loraine.

There has been speculation that the board will appoint Bob Motley to fill the vacancy until an election is held next year.

Motley ran third in the April

school board race for two positions. Jimmie Bolln and Nix were elected to the board.

Supt. Lloyd McKee announced Wednesday that Tracey Barnes, the superintendent's administrative assistant, has been selected to become superintendent of schools at Guthrie.

The job of administrative assistant in Colorado City schools has been eliminated with the end of the school year.

Barnes is the fourth Colorado City administrator who has been named superintendent of another school district within recent years.

McKee also pointed out that some 100 youngsters turned out Tuesday morning to apply for 36 jobs under the summer youth program. There are 46 jobs available in the county under the program, four of which will go to Westbrook six to Loraine and 36 to Colorado City and the county.

The school board in May received a report by a study team on the needs for Colorado City schools.

The report called for a number of changes including the closing of Wallace School, changing the junior high into an administrative and warehouse facility,

renovating the high school into a junior high and building a new high school building. The report also called for renovating Kelley and Hutchinson Elementaries.

When asked about a rumor that someone has offered to donate 40 acres of land for the new high school, McKee said he did not know about the offer.

During a special meeting of the school board Monday night, the board discussed several possible sites for a new high school.

Under the study made on school facilities, it was estimated that renovating the school facilities and building a new high school would cost some \$1.75 million.

A number of groups have been formed and offered help to the school system to help pass such a bond issue if the school board decides to follow the course of action as presented in the study.

Lewis' Colorado City relatives include two nephews and one niece, Thomas Lewis, Robert Lewis and Mrs. Joe Morren.

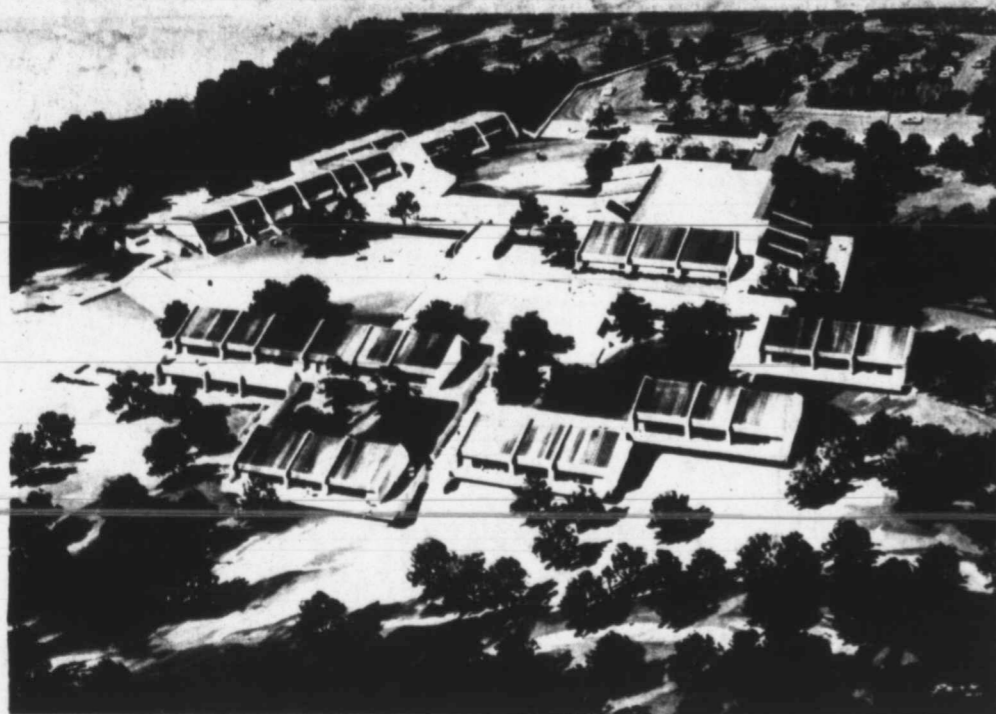

TWQB Grants Local Permit

After a two-month holdup for a staff study, the Texas Water Quality Board has granted a waste control order providing for no discharge for the Rogers Delinted Cottonseed Co. of Colorado City.

The board granted the permit in exactly the same form as it has considered in its March meeting.

The permit provides that there be no discharge, that the waste-water from the company be put into holding ponds that are lined to protect against seepage.

Skiing Time

Safety Precautions Outlined

Texas lakes are warming up and this brings out the water skiers.

Skiers mean an extra responsibility for boat owners. The first skier sighted on the water should be a signal for boat operators to be extra cautious.

A skier down in the water is hard to see, and your propeller could make a mess of him.

Of course, a skier is responsible to a large degree for his own safety. The first step in this direction is making sure that his boat driver is competent and reliable.

The driver should know how to keep the rope taut and avoid jerks which will injure the skier's shoulders. He should know that horseplay in a boat can have serious consequences. And he should be alert for a fallen skier so that he can circle immediately for the pick-up.

Many experienced drivers insist on having a second person in the boat as a spotter. This is not a legal requirement, but the law does require a four-inch square mirror mounted in the boat if the skier is being towed.

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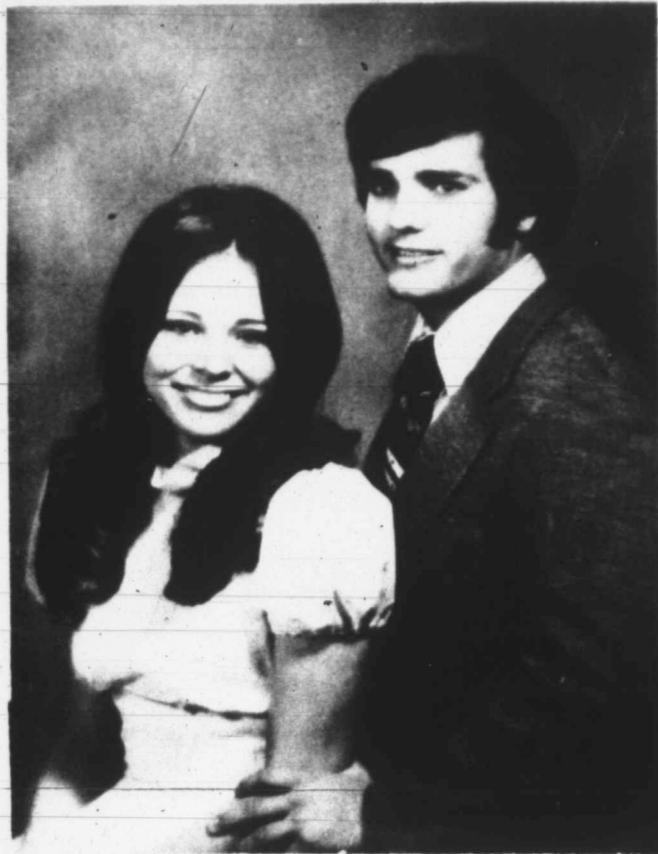

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WHAT IS A FARMER?

A farmer is a paradox--he is an overalled executive with his office; a scientist using fertilizer attachments; a purchasing agent in an old straw hat; a personnel director with grease under his fingernails; a dietitian with a passion of alfalfa, aminos & antibiotics; a production expert with a surplus; & a manager battling a price-cost squeeze.

He manages more capital than most of the businessmen in town.

He likes sunshine, good food, State Fairs, dinner at noon, auctions, his neighbors, his shirt collar unbuttoned, & above all, a good soaking rain in August.

He is not much for droughts, ditches, throughways, experts, weeds, the 8-hour day, grasshoppers, or helping with housework.

Farmers are found in fields - plowing up, seeding down, rotating from, planting to, fertilizing with, spraying for, and harvesting. Wives help them, little boys follow them, the Agriculture Department confuses them, city relatives visit them, salesmen detain them and wait for them, weather can delay them, but it takes Heaven to stop them.

A farmer is both Faith and Fatalist - he must have faith to continually meet the challenges of his capacities amid an ever-present possibility that an act of God (a late spring, an early frost, tornado, flood, drought) can bring his business to a standstill. You can reduce his acreage but you can't restrain his ambition

make himself as visible as possible when he falls in heavy boat traffic. He can do this by holding one ski in the air as a signal to other boaters.

The skier should also wear some sort of life-saving device. Although many skiers prefer the ski-belts, they should keep in mind that the belts are not designed to keep them upright if unconscious.

A skier should have communication with his driver, and this can only be done with hand signals. These signals should be worked out before the skier takes to the water since misunderstandings could lead to an accident.

Letter

I would like to clear up the misconception about farmers earning payments for not growing crops. Payments to farmers are based on yields proven or projected for individual farms. These payments are price support payments. For the 1973 crop year it is not mandatory for a cotton or feed grain producer to participate in any program. If a farmer wishes to participate and earn payments he is required to set-aside 10% of his feed grain base. This 10% set-aside acreage is only idle 5 months. It is not even idle 5 months if the farmer chooses to take a small reduction in payment and graze these acreages.

At least 75% of these payments are assigned to banks or other financial institutions. Our farmers in Mitchell County cannot survive on 22 cent cotton. The price support payment of 15 cents per pound allowed the farmers here to earn around 35-37 cents a pound for allotment acres in 1972. Any cotton planted above the farm allotment only earned around 22 cents.

Sure there are some fat cat farmers but I urge the consumer to look at the overall picture.

Representative Elmer Martin was mentioned as earning \$14,257 in price support payments in 1972 which is true. However, that same \$14,257 will not purchase one tractor and equipment. Think about that! That \$14,257 is not even one third profit.

If the American people and some of our leaders choose to continue to use the farmer as America's punching bag this country will be hungry soon. None thought there was really a fuel shortage either did they? Don Stewart
