Starved for conversation.—If you want to call one of the newly installed telephones around over Floyd county put in your call and the young lady will tell you the line is busy. For ten or 15 years the people have been without telephones and they are hungry to have conversation with their neighbors around about, some close by, some a considerable distance away. Be patient and they will be through talking as soon as they get through telling all the nice things that happened to them during the holidays or the bad spell. When a person goes long without talking to the people he wants to talk to he has got to catch up. There'll be a few who will disregard the neighbors' needs for the use of the line and just keep on talking just to show they've paid their bills. But mostly they won't. They will be considerate and let you use the telephone some, too. Meanwhile, don't get impatient. Remember, hunger for the voice to relate the happiness and woes of a friend that can be joined in is one of the basic things of life as we live it in this great plains country. We assure you it is the same everywhere in the world. Some are just a bit more insistent on having what they want the way they want it than others are. Over in Europe they have done without fats and starches. Here in our country we have done without the consolation of the voice of a good neighbor over the telephone. Don't think the women folks are not going to talk until they get through. We do not have any solution for your problem if you can't get the use of the telephone and somebody is bleeding.

The talk above gets sorter Smart Alecky about folks and their troubles and their little selfishnesses and their good ways and their sorter bad. 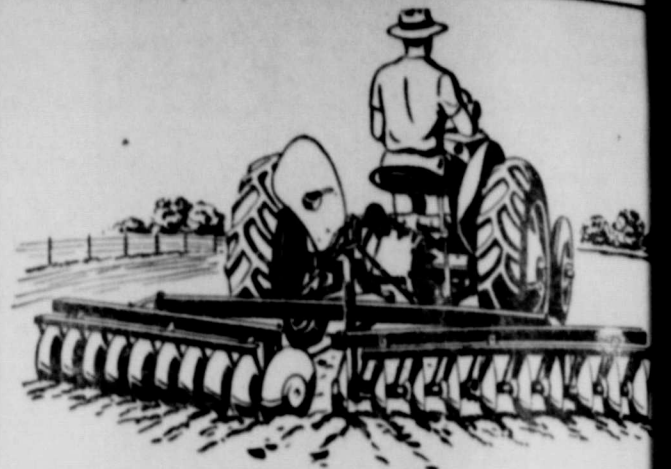

Propose Water District Bill

organizations of the High Plains Water Use and Conservation Association have been considering a bill proposed for the state legislature to pass. Among other things, the bill would allow farmers to create a water district within the boundaries of the district for all beneficial purposes, and to construct and operate water works and to use, distribute or sell underground water for such purpose or purposes.

(2) To provide facilities and approve the provision of facilities for the diversion of underground water within the boundaries of the district. To provide or approve the provision of facilities and reasonable regulations for the taking, diversion, delivery and control of such water to the end that the use thereof may be prudent and free from preventable waste. To preserve the purity and potability thereof, and to prevent such water from escaping to the surface of the earth in such manner as to injure land or pollute surface waters.

(3) To have the power to conduct surveys of the underground water, to provide for its recharge to the underground streams, and have power to make tests for deeper strata, power to prevent the pollution or harmful alteration of the character of the water in any stratum of the earth by means of water or other matter, power to formulate and regulate the method and manner of digging, casing or using of any underground water whatsoever.

Wells that use less than 30,000 gallons per day for domestic gardening and stock raising purposes are excepted from all control of said district. They also have the power to require records to be kept of each and every well, and to require driller's logs to be kept on wells, and copies thereof to be filed with the District and State Board of Water Engineers.

In other words, a Board of Directors will have about the same powers in connection with your water district and underground waters as a Board of Trustees of a School District has concerning the school's affairs. Admittedly these powers are wide and cover to a large extent complete control of the underground water.

Safe Guards
After the creation of the District, your safe guards lie with the land owners who are voters. In other words, if they do not vote the bonds, no debt can be created. You elect your own directors. ever since.

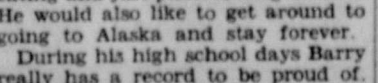
Barry would like to spend his va-

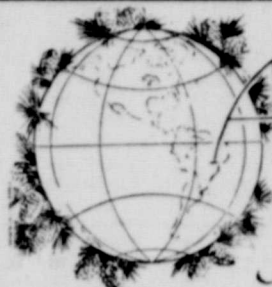

Atomic Tracer Research Tool

Use of radioactive isotope tracers as a new research tool is enabling plant scientists to learn new facts of the processes by which plants grow, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Radioactive elements give off a radiation as they disintegrate. This radioactivity makes it possible to detect or trace a radioactive element wherever it may go in the soil and through plants, says the Bureau of Plant Industry, Soils, and Agricultural Engineering.

Research with radioactive tracers is not limited to fertilizers. The new tool lends itself to a wide variety of uses. Scientists are already using it to learn how the many growth regulating chemicals modify plant growth. By "tagging" a compound with radiolabels they are able to follow it throughout the plant as it is absorbed and moves about.

In the fertilizer field, experiments with radio-phosphorus have revealed that crops vary in their use of fertilizer phosphorus. In field experiments, corn derived a large part of its phosphorus from fertilizer during the early stages of growth, but when the crop was near maturity fertilizer furnished only a small part of the phosphorus. In contrast, potatoes on the same soil leaned heavily on the fertilizer at all stages. Cotton and tobacco used more phosphorus from fertilizer during early growth than when they approached maturity, but the percentage differences, between the two stages were not nearly so striking as with corn. The significance of these differences is not yet clear, but it appears that radio-tracer research is pointing the way to more efficient use of fertilizers on farms.

Tracer experiments in the greenhouse indicate that phosphate from green manure is almost as efficient as superphosphate. This will call for field tests.

It is possible to use radioactive sulphur, calcium, manganese, zinc, iron and chlorine in the same way that radio-phosphorus is being used as a scientific tool. Scientists are now learning how to use this tool as an aid to answering their own questions.
