The two bold, methodical young men who robbed Hale Center First National bank of \$9,426 on a sunny Friday afternoon, Nov. 28, were behind the bars of federal jails this week as F. B. I. agents on each side of the nation made arrests after tracking the men across the continent. One man, Telford J. Layton, was arrested in Los Angeles late in December, after two small boys noticed him parked on a country road, counting a lot of money, informed officers of the unusual sight. The other man, Flavis Gilbert, was arrested Wednesday this week in Tallahassee, Florida.

Both are to be returned to Lubbock Federal jail. County officers said they might be tried in Federal court in Lubbock but that the Hale county grand jury will act on their charges of bank robbery and hijacking in the present term of district court.

The two men whose identities were established by photos viewed by members of the Carl Ellis family of Abernathy, who were tied to articles of furniture in their homes a short time before they came to Hale Center to rob the bank here, and also customers of the bank here, and bank employees who were forced to lie on the floor while the robbery was committed.

Sheriff O. R. (Oat) Martine said both men had prison records, with one of them having served time for murder in New Mexico. Bond of \$50,000 was set for the man arrested in California. It was said he attempted to bribe arresting officers with all the cash he had on him, about \$1,900.

The other man had a late model Buick, considerable amount of whiskey and a .30-30 rifle and automatic pistol with him when arrested in Florida. It was not known if he had any money with him.

The latter man had been trailed from Georgia into Florida by the F. B. I., Martine said.

Although most persons already have the first book, there are some late registrants, largely those who eat most of their meals out and have had no need for ration book one as long as its use was for buying sugar and coffee. Persons may register for the book in Hale county in the courthouse at Plainview, or in Lubbock with the county board there.

that I have of knowing where the other boys are located. I wish to thank everyone responsible for sending me the Review.

I was at sea Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's, but we surely had a swell dinner Christmas and on New Year's, too. Well, that is about all for now. Sincerely, Delvis Hallmark, RM 3/c, U. S. N.

(Editor's Note: Here's another of those interesting letters from Capt. Gorman Webb, U. S. M. C. R., which was received here early this week. He's somewhere in the Pacific.)

(Passed by Naval Censor.)
December 29, 1942

Dear Buford:

I've been intending to drop you a line for quite some time, but you know how it is. There's just about a certain quota that you just must write and the others you write when you feel your days of grace have just about played out.

Well, I want to thank you for the Review. I've gotten several copies since I've been here and I certainly enjoy them. The Review means an awful lot to the fellows away from home. We naturally enjoy the letters from the boys and the letters to the boys as well because there's nothing in the world a fellow had rather have than a letter except actually being back, and of course, we know, it's not time to go back yet. Of course we hope it will be before too long. As for what I've seen and heard of the way our boys are taking matters in their own hands, it shouldn't be too far off.

We are getting much better mail service than we were and for that reason a fellow feels that he might get a letter in return now and then, so he's more interested in writing. Don't think there's not plenty of censoring to do either.

I'm still in tanks. I have the com-

pany now as my commanding officer moved on up. We don't do much training in them now because of different reasons. We're keeping them in tip-top shape, though, for the day we may need them again.

We didn't stay long in the Solomons. This company, I mean. We were there three days and sent four tanks ashore. One got into a bog hole and it was lost to action but it has been recovered and repaired. Our outfit withdrew and moved out to where we are now. Everything is quiet here and we are comfortable enough and the place is secure from enemy activities.

We had a nice turkey dinner for Christmas and a Christmas party

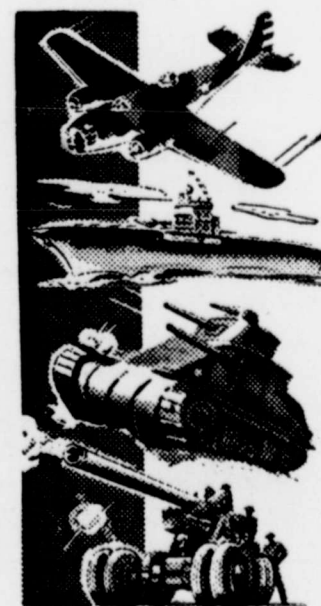
