242 Lives Is Cost Of America's Holiday Celebration

Fireworks, Heat Drowning, Autos Exact Heavy Toll

Pyrotechnics, Once Source Of Most Fatalities On July Fourth Claim Dozen Lives This Year.

DEATHS BY DROWNING TOTAL OVER HUNDRED

Fatalities Resulting From Automobile Accidents Total More Than Three Score; Airplanes Figure.

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, July 5.—Celebration of Independence Day cost the lives of at least 224 men, women and children.

That number was shown to have died from fireworks, automobiles, drowning, heat, lightning, airplane accidents and other causes, according to figures compiled by the Associated Press last night from the best reports of the Fourth of July fatalities.

Fireworks, once the source of most Fourth of July deaths, took a dozen lives this year but was far out-ranked by drownings which totaled more than 100 and by automobile fatalities which numbered more than three score.

Death From Heat Wave Greeting Texans

TEXARKANA, Ark., July 5 (AP).—The first death attributed to the heat wave that has gripped Texas for three days occurred today when J. M. Goffin, 54, dropped dead while mowing his lawn.

For three straight days the mercury has gone above 100 degrees.

A "SOBER FOURTH"

Not a Single Fine Paid For Drunkenness

The police blotter's story of the Fourth of July showed that it was not only a safe and sober Fourth but a sober one.

Not a single fine for drunkenness was paid yesterday, police records show.

Of the four fines paid yesterday, one of \$10 was for fighting, one was for burning trash and the other two for traffic violation.

Both police and county officials declare that the Fourth was quieter than an ordinary day. Desk sergeant Inman said if everywhere was as quiet as Lubbock there would have been no use for police departments.

Butts of Austin, candidate for governor, and Orville C. Bullington, Wichita Falls, candidate for United States senator.

NEGRO RUNS AMUCK, CRAZED BY HEAT

OMAHA, Neb., July 5 (AP).—Extreme summer heat is believed to have caused Bill Lewis, 32, negro porter, to run amuck in a local five and ten cent store restaurant today, shoot two women clerks and create a reign of terror among the shopping throngs. Both victims are expected to recover.

The wounded clerks are Nina "Babe" Dodson, 21, shot in the breast by two bullets and Mrs. Julia Comer, mother of eight children, hit in the leg.

Lewis was taken to the police station and later rushed to the state penitentiary at Lincoln for confinement. Lewis was adamant on the affair except to say that the girls had "called my mother names."

Malt Pillered By Burglars In Raid Upon Local Store

"Must Have Been Bootleggers' Muses Sheriff, Surveying Loss Of Five Cases Brew Ingredient."

Gaining entrance by prying open a rear window, burglars early yesterday morning robbed the Texas Malt and M. company, 708 Avenue H, of about five cases of malt and several cartons of cigarettes. Sheriff Fred Johnston said yesterday.

The loss was estimated at \$125. No attempt was made to open the safe and nothing other than the malt and cigarettes was bothered, the sheriff said.

No clues were left and no one was arrested yesterday. The robbery was not known until the building was opened by employees of the company yesterday morning.

Members of the sheriff's department said the robbery must have been bootleggers or home brew addicts as malt was the principal item taken.

Officials of the Texas Malt and M. company last night refused to divulge any information concerning the robbery. They said they "had no idea of how much was taken," and that they "had not missed anything."

Perry Roethman was a high school football coach.

Hickman Penalty Upheld In Ruling Of Supreme Court

California Appellate Tribunal Affirms Sentence Of Death Meted To Slayer Of Los Angeles Girl.

INTIMATE FURTHER APPEAL IS PLANNED

Supreme Court of United States May Have Chance To Rule Upon Youth Whose Crime Caused Stir

(By Associated Press)
SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.—The California supreme court today upheld the constitutionality of the law under which William Edward Hickman was sentenced for the murder of 12-year-old Marian Parker of Los Angeles.

The decision, sustained the trial court in Los Angeles which after a jury trial found Hickman sane when he committed murder and sentenced him to death. The opinion held that in pleading "not guilty by reason of insanity," under a recently enacted provision of the state penal code, Hickman had not been denied his rights as a defendant under either the state or federal constitution, as his appeal petition alleged, and that hence his sentence must stand.

Goos to Highest Tribunal

Immediately after the supreme court's ruling, Hickman's attorney, Jerome Walsh in Kansas City, announced that the case would be appealed to the supreme court of the United States.

The appeal would be taken under the fourteenth amendment to the federal constitution which guarantees a trial by "due process of law" and "equal protection" to all defendants. The state supreme court today ruled that the fourteenth amendment was not violated in this case as no defendant is compelled to plead "not guilty by reason of insanity." In so pleading, the court held, the accused admits commission of the acts alleged but denies responsibility for them.

The supreme court in today's decision sent the case back to the Los Angeles superior court where Hickman will be resentenced. Under the law a period of 30 days must elapse before this is done.

J. B. Holahan, warden of the prison, said today that he would not notify Hickman of the decision until a copy of the opinion had been received by him.

CORAL GABLES BROKE

California Project Goes To Receiver

MIAMI, Fla., July 5 (AP).—Lending claims aggregating \$4,000, three creditor companies today asked a receivership for the Coral Gables corporation, developers of the largest sub-division project in Florida.

Hearing on the involuntary bankruptcy petition which was filed in federal district court here was set for next Tuesday in Jacksonville.

Officials of the corporation and the larger creditors have waged a long fight to renege the organization and continue without liquidation.

HEAT WAVE

High Marks of Summer Is Passed or Equalled

KANSAS CITY, July 5 (AP).—A heat wave in the southwest continued today and temperatures equalled or passed the high marks of the summer recorded in the last two days. P. Connor, government observer here, promised to reflect tomorrow.

Supplies Dropped from Airplane to Aviators

Marooned In Frozen Wastes of Arctic Region

ROME, July 5.—An official communication from the Citta Di Milano says that Swedish fliers today succeeded in dropping provisions, medical supplies, and new batteries to the marooned members of the Italian crew who are camped on the ice near Foul Bay.

INDIANS PROTEST AGENT'S RULE

SALT LAKE CITY, July 5 (AP).—The steady beat of tom-toms in the hills back of his home tonight remind S. E. Brangan, Indian agent on the Deep Creek reservation, near Bepah, Utah, that the Goshute Indians oppose his administration of reservation affairs and that they are waging a campaign to have him removed.

This was the report brought to Salt Lake City today by two federal prohibition officers and a Salt Lake City newspaperman who went to the reservation to conduct an unofficial investigation of reported trouble between the Goshutes and white residents of the region.

The investigators heard charges from the Indians that Brangan had made improper advances toward three young Indian girls, had purchased an automobile with government funds and had been negligent in dealing with an influenza epidemic which took a toll of forty lives in the tribe last spring.

STOCKS FALL DUE TO LOWENSTEIN'S MYSTERIOUS DEATH

Issues In Which Belgian Financier Interested Tumult As Rumors Suggest Suicide.

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, July 5.—The mystery of the death of Captain Alfred Lowenstein while flying over the English Channel caused an unexpected sensation throughout Europe because of his hobbies—racing, betting and aviation.

London newspapers devoted columns to the dramatic end of this picturesque character. His extraordinary rise from obscurity, his lavish mode of living and the effect which his sudden end is likely to have on various financial concerns gave opportunity for lengthy articles and numerous anecdotes and pictures.

First effect of his death on European financial markets was a heavy slump in the shares of companies with which he was associated. Later, however, better feeling prevailed with a partial reaction in prices. This reaction was largely due to statements issued by the governing boards of his concerns, optimistic of the prevailing note of these communications.

No Reason for Fear
Henri Wauters, an intimate friend of Captain Lowenstein, told the Brussels paper National Belge that all of the great financier's affairs were managed by competent administrators in whom the captain put implicit trust. These men were fully conversant with his ideas and methods, and M. Wauters concluded that there is no reason to fear for the future.

The National Belge says Captain Lowenstein first came to notice as a broker on the Brussels stock exchange. He always was interested in questions of electricity and rapidly built important connections through which he became interested in enterprises in Canada, Brazil, Mexico and other places.

One of his greatest enterprises was Barcelona Traction, a company

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP).—A check for \$25 sent to Senator Heflin of Alabama by Peter J. Maloney, broker and president of the Holy Name society, of the Arch Diocese of New York, in appreciation of the senator's anti-Catholic speeches has been turned over by Heflin to the Fellowship Forum published here.

In his letter of last month Mr. Maloney said: Heflin's speeches were of great service to the Catholic church, adding that he knew of "no one who has done more to make bigotry appear unlovely and headachy sound absurd."

ASSASSINATION PLOT

Scheme To Slay Albanian President Unearthed

TIRANA, Albania, July 5 (AP).—A new and daring plot to assassinate Ahmed Zogu, President of Albania, was unearthed today by police who arrested a number of Bulgarian suspects and Major Ismail Spahiu, alleged to be a representative of former premier Hassan Pristina.

The plot had two ramifications, police declared. The would-be assassin first planned to waylay the president and to shoot him from ambush as he traveled from Tirana by Kucina by automobile. Their design was learned and the trip abandoned at the last moment.

Shortly afterward a huge time bomb was discovered in Ahmed Zogu's villa at Durres which he intended to visit.

EARHART WELCOME

Gutham Plans to Greet The Woman Flier

NEW YORK, July 5 (AP).—New York's official welcome to the first woman successfully to complete an air crossing of the Atlantic will be extended tomorrow to Miss Amelia Earhart, due to arrive at quarantine tonight, with Wilmer Stuts and Lou Gordon, her copilot, aboard the liner President Roosevelt.

The ship was to be at quarantine overnight. Oliver A. Ahlsen, the chairman of the mayor's reception committee, announced he would go down the bay aboard the city steamer Macom tomorrow morning with representatives of the mayors of Chicago and Boston, and with Mrs. Stuts and Miss Annie Bruce, of Brookline, Mass., Gordon's fiancée.

RASKOB SON KILLED

Scion of General Motors Magnate Is Slain

CENTREVILLE, Md., July 5 (AP).—William F. Raskob, 19, son of John J. Raskob, vice-president of the Dupont company and chairman of the finance committee of the General Motors corporation, was killed today when his automobile left the road near here and overturned.

Young Raskob was driving from his parents' home at Claymont, Del., to the family summer home at Plover Point, Md. His car crossed the road west of the edge, overturned in a shallow gully and then righted itself. The youth was thrown through the windshield and was found with his head crushed.

PLANES REACH TEXAS

All But One In Reliability Tour At Fort Worth

FORT WORTH, July 5 (AP).—All but one of the 24 airplanes used in the national air tour had landed safely at the municipal airport here this afternoon. A Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company plane piloted by Al Henley was the first to cover the 340 mile non-stop from Tulsa, Okla., arriving here at 11:30 a. m.

A Ryan Broughman, piloted by E. W. Cleveland, was forced down in a field near Krum, Texas, about 40 miles north of Fort Worth, according to a telephone message received this afternoon from Cleveland. Engine trouble was given as the cause of the descent.

All Brazil Joins In Praise To Men Who Braved Perils Over Turbulent South Atlantic Ocean.

LANDING MADE ON BEACH NEAR NATAL

Brazilian Capital Prepares Joyous Welcome For Two Italian Navy Fliers; Sea-plane Was Used.

(By Associated Press)
RIO JANEIRO, July 5.—Breaking the flight record set last year by Chamberlin and Levine in their trans-Atlantic flight, Captain Arturo Ferrarin and Maj. Carlo P. Del Prete landed on a little beach near Natal, Brazil, some 4600 miles from their take-off at Montecarlo Field, Italy.

They brought their big seaplanes, the Savoia-64 in which they previously had established a world record for duration flight, to land after a flight that took them across the Mediterranean, through the Straits of Gibraltar and then southward over the Atlantic via Cape Verde Islands.

They had difficulty in maintaining their bearings after they reached the coast of Brazil. They were sighted over Port Natal at 4:35 p. m., and were then believed to be heading for Pernambuco. But three hours and 45 minutes later they came down 10 miles north of Natal, at Point Genipaba.

Crowd Is Disappointed.
The failure of the two intrepid Italians to wind up their flight at Rio Janeiro brought disappointment to a huge crowd of spectators in this city. Word that the fliers had gone beyond Natal flying to the south, coupled with absence of any report of their landing near Pernambuco, spread rapidly through the capital and brought

One man was known to be dead and scores of persons who were picnicking or motoring had narrow escapes at several parks and along highways in the Monongahela river valley.

Children Develop In An Orderly Manner

If a parent thinks that a child
develops in a haphazard manner
either mentally or physically he is
mistaken. Nothing is more inter-
esting for a trained observer than
to watch the evidences of mental
power developing in young baby
from day to day.For such development in an av-
erage child occurs almost accord-
ing to schedule. It is no longer
instinct, the little animal impulses
that evidenced themselves at birth,
but real thought power, the mani-
festation of the senses, and reac-
tion to surroundings and events.For instance, at 12 weeks a baby
can recognize faces. At 13 weeks
he looks for something that has
disappeared. At 16 weeks he reaches
for an object. At 24 weeks
great interest is shown in events
around him.They Like Music
At 4 weeks a baby begins to pay
attention to sound, such as a radio
or phonograph, at 8 weeks there
is such an interest in music that
if he is crying he will stop for a time.
He begins about this time to smile
when he recognizes a voice or a
sound that pleases him. At about
12 or 13 weeks he turns in the di-
rection of the sound. A month later
he will try to reproduce sounds
himself.A sense of perception develops
rapidly from the third to the sixth
month. After six months he be-
gins to pay close attention to things
that interest him.From this time on his mental
processes develop rapidly and psy-
chologists claim that this time is
the most important in his behavior
training. Habit training, so closely
related to character training,
should now be begun.Here's What He'll Do
If you are interested in the de-
velopment of his perception pro-
cesses at this period and his reac-
tion to events, these are a few of
the things you may expect him to do:He will seize objects and throw
them down.
He will use his carriage, and his
mother with her hat on, he will
know he is going out and will show
unmistakable signs of joy.He will show a delight in ani-
mals.
He will recognize his name.
At 7 or 8 months he will re-
cognize names of his sisters or
brothers.At 10 months he can make sev-
eral sounds with meanings.
At 11 months, incredible though
it may seem, statistics show that
the average baby can understand
the meaning of 34 words—51 nouns,
20 verbs, and a few others.At 12 months he reacts to dis-
cipline, understanding the meaning
of a very mild reproof or punish-

ABOUT SUCCESS

John Lunsman, St. Louis junk yard keeper, died the other day at the age of 86, leaving a fortune of slightly more than \$250,000. For long years he had lived a life of privation, engaged in mean tasks, depriving himself of pleasure, comfort, decent surroundings, friendship, devoting himself solely to the task of making money. He had succeeded; his quarter of a million dollars attest it. Yet even in America, where money is placed on the highest of pinnacles, it would be hard to find many people to agree that the old chap had led an enviable or admirable life. You can get just about what you want out of life if you care to pay the price. You can use life as the means to an end, subordinating everything in it to the one thing you are seeking, making every act have reference to your goal; and, like the old St. Louis junk dealer, you will be successful. Or you can look on life as something of an end in itself. You can view it as an experience; something that can be made to yield richness and fragrance from first to last. If you do that you will have time for little diversions along the way—time for the experiences of love, friendship, devotion, self sacrifice, fidelity and courage. Those are the things that often have to be thrown overboard if one has too much singleness of purpose. But they are, in the main, the things that make life worth living. Old John Lunsman had 86 years and \$250,000 when he died; yet for all that, he can hardly be said really to have lived at all. He had his goal and he gained it, but you could not find anyone to say that it was worth the price he paid. And while few people sacrifice as much to get as little as he did, his case is nevertheless a valuable object lesson. There is too much of a tendency to regard material success as the sole criterion by which life can be judged. It would be fine to be Henry Ford, no doubt; yet, beyond question, there are mechanics in Henry Ford's own factories, salesmen in his own salesrooms who have had more honest enjoyment out of life than Ford has had. We need to be a little bit less in earnest about life. Too much looking to the future is apt to lead to an ignoring of the present. There is something to be said for the wisdom of the grasshopper as opposed to the wisdom of the ant.

SECOND FIDDLE

This is a fitting time to meditate upon the vice presidency—whether it is better to play second fiddle, or to be entirely out of the orchestra. This office has been regarded as the graveyard of the republic. When a real statesman becomes objectionable to the bosses and cannot be downed, they often dispose of him by making him vice president. He is supposed to be harmless in that office. To force a man into second place is sometimes complimentary. It is acknowledged that he has to be reckoned with. But here is a tomb that has its resurrections. Providence frequently has opinions of his own and does not hesitate to take a hand. When least expected the president of the Senate becomes the president of the nation and all the politicians are pined. The second fiddler is always in line for the first fiddle. Indeed, playing second fiddle is not a bad school for becoming the conductor of the orchestra. A person who can be led successfully may make the best leader. Because of the amenities of life, it is hardly safe to think that almost any sort of automation will do. Selecting a person just because he balances the east with the west or vice versa, to keep the regime from tipping up at one end and spilling the whole administration into oblivion may not be the best way to save a country. Andrew Johnson succeeded to the presidency upon the death of Lincoln. He also inherited the sensitive situation of the Reconstruction days and his bungling was responsible for much of the mess of that time. In selecting a man for the second job, it may be well to pick a president at once. And yet the present system has done surprisingly well. The politicians assisted by the guardian angel of the republic sidetrack a strong man have him in waiting for the hour of destiny. However,

no thanks to the politicians! Even the tail of the kite has its value in keeping the whole institution from turning upside down.

JAPAN'S ONWARD MARCH

We like to think that no country on earth has advanced so fast in the last century as ours has. Perhaps we're right; but did you ever stop to think what Japan has done?

An American news photographer in Tokio recently sent back a picture of a rite at a Japanese temple, in which handfuls of beans were tossed into the air by priests to placate the evil spirits supposedly responsible for the influence now sweeping Japan. The priests were dressed in widely barbaric costumes; their faces were hideously painted. The scene looked as if it might have been lifted bodily from a primitive jungle town in New Guinea.

Yet in Tokio, where those rites were held, there are Japanese hospitals and surgeons, every bit as skilled as any you could find in New York, doing their part to fight the flu. There are street cars, electric lights, steel buildings, daily newspapers, moving picture theatres, automobiles, research laboratories, universities, modern sanitation, schools and factories. Every up-to-date mechanical device is in use there. Tokio is as modern as New York.

But side by side with these fruits of the twentieth century, exist the ancient temples with rites unchanged from prehistoric times. In some ways, Japan's advance is even more marvelous than our own.

A century ago Japan was a forbidden kingdom, isolated in its ancient ways. It was just like the Japan of the middle ages. The advance of European civilization had not touched it.

Today it is one of the world's most progressive nations. It recently granted universal suffrage to its people, who had lived for ages under despotism; and it had installed schools and liberal educational facilities so wisely in the last generation that the people were ready for it.

It would pay us to study Japan more, to get better acquainted. There must be something very fine about a nation that can do what Japan has done. Its individuals must be worth knowing—worth having for friends. For all the difference in race and culture Japan and the United States are much alike; alike in their progressiveness, their adaptability to new ideas, their readiness to make the most of new inventions, and new ways.

FRIENDLY ENEMIES

Ten years ago they were hating each other magnificently. They were saying it with shot and shell, with bayonets and bombs, with hand grenades and poison gas. It was pretty fierce while it lasted, if you ask one of the lads who came back with a flock of wound stripes. But time plays the dickens with hatreds, especially hatreds worked up more or less on the spur of the moment. So the other night they were fraternizing right merrily, these boys who served in the trenches of the allies and the trenches of the Germans. They were saying it with felicitous speeches, with music, with hot dogs and hard-boiled eggs or other satisfying comestibles. It was surely a happy thought which led to this get-together party of American Legion men and veterans of the Imperial German army who have been drifting to America with a view to staying and establishing citizenship. It was, as Mayor Dahlgren characterized it, a "noble and generous gesture of friendship." And if there was any embarrassment at the beginning about how the fee of misunderstanding was to be broken it must completely have disappeared with Allan Turkey's hearty invitation to "let's just be good fellows together." It is an example in hatchet-burying that may well be imitated in a society made up of elements of such diverse origins as that of America. It gives point to the fundamental principle of Americanism which is the inalienable right of every citizen to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

A man throwing away a cigarette butt by the roadside easily may set fire to a large area of brush or woodland and never know that he had caused the wide destruction. One reason why cigarettes are a greater menace to the forest than cigars or pipe-droppings is that they burn longer. Six popular brands of cigarettes recently were experimented with by government officials, and it was found that all of them after once being lit burned steadily until reduced to ashes. Certain Turkish cigarettes require 30 minutes to burn out. New warnings have been issued by the Automobile Club of Southern California as a result of the tests and cigarette-smokers touring the wooded districts would do well to heed them.

Up in Kansas things have changed. It used to be that farmers would go to town and send out a wagon load of chuck for the harvest hands, but now they merely go to town for a tank of fuel oil for the tractor, and the wife and daughters do not have to prepare the meals for the tractor.

Starnett of Floyd, and Prince's Combination 514, owned by W. C. Whitte of Hale Center, with Oxford Mayest's Rosebud of R. R. also made the honor roll for May.

Trevette's double, champion producer in Texas for the month of May, is a coming 3-year old Jersey which was brought to the Plains country by N. C. Nik, cashier of the First State Bank at Abernathy. The cow was placed out for Mr. Hix by Paul Huey, former county agent for Hale county, from the Beaumont herd at Beaumont, Texas.

Mr. Hix kept the cow for some time, then sold her to J. W. Karmel, later buying it back, and selling her in February of this year to H. O. Pettit.

The cow has a coming two-year-old heifer owned by Mr. Pettit, which was exhibited at the Panhandle-Plains Dairy show this

Public Opinion

POULTRY ASSOCIATION IS FUNCTIONING

Members of the Crosby County Poultry association are receiving some real benefits from their sales through the association. A saving of premium of five cents per dozen on eggs has been secured which goes a long way toward making the poultry industry a paying enterprise. This premium was secured because a quality product was sold in car loads to a market that demands good eggs in large quantities.

It is the object of the association to get the roosters off the yard, pull out the poor eggs at home, and take better care of the flock in order that quality eggs may be assembled in such quantity that the large markets can be sold the eggs with the least cost per dozen in handling them. It is this effort that has saved the members about forty five dollars on two small shipments of eggs.

At the present time the association is selling the produce through the Central West Texas Poultry Association at Stamford. This association has grown from a very small organization with about twenty-five thousand hens to a mammoth association with eighty-five thousand and hens since January, 1928. The volume of business has increased from a few cases a week to the point where a car load is assembled on the track and shipped to all points of the country. This association with three others of a like nature are now establishing a storage plant in Fort Worth to increase the volume of their business and reduce the cost of handling the products marketed.

When enough eggs are produced in Texas of this kind and put on the market the poultry that is now put on Texas eggs will be removed and there will be more inducement for the Texas farmer to take better care of his flock and make the poultry industry a paying enterprise.—E. E. Young in Crosbyton Review.

We are spending much money to assist the farmers of our nation, and our state has been very liberal in providing for many needed improvements, but for various reasons the land belt has been neglected. One very great reason for this neglect is that the people of the cotton country are unused to assistance in solving their problems, and know very little of co-operating with the many agencies that can be useful to them. Their attitude toward demonstration is not friendly, so they must be shown that the cotton belt will help them, that the cotton belt will hold their land and prevent washing, and that cotton is not the only crop that will bring money and that it is rather expensive to raise under any condition.

One Cause Accepted.

We are told that our population is to double in the next twenty years. Already our cities and towns are crowded with people, many of whom have given up farm life because it no longer was remunerative. Most of this class of people are in far worse condition in the city than they were even on the farm. For knowing little of any work except that of the farm they must take the lowest positions with the least wages paid. This forces the entire family to seek work, which often results in idleness and destroys the moral fiber of their being, while the crowded districts in which they are able to procure some underlings their health and aids in their destruction.

It appears that it would be real economy to spend whatever amount is necessary to prove to the people that the sand country is worth saving, for it would save the people as well. It is the natural home of all kinds of fruits and vegetables of our climate, and livestock thrive in it in other sections. With proper care it can be made to produce almost the entire food necessary and

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harm is done in the loose sandy soil with terracing and fertilizing it can be rendered very rich and productive, where more people can live comfortably than in most other parts of our country, and if 116,000,000 more people are to live in the United States we must save every acre of land possible for them. Already our virgin soil is almost exhausted, so it is time to save the sand belts of Texas.—By Mrs. T. K. Jones in the Crosby Review.
