

# Clements Defeats White For Governor

## Red River Follows Statewide Trends Except In Governors Race

Voting returns were unavailable at press time Wednesday morning for Red River County because of computer problems in tabulating the vote. Red River County Clerk Mary Hausler said that, unofficially, Mark White carried the county and Barry

Telford, who was running for State Representative District I, carried the county, against opponent Jim Parsons.

Red River County's majority for White did not reflect state voting trends, as Bill Clements defeated in-

cumbent Mark White.

The Republican party took a near sweep of court races statewide. Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby received a statewide total of 1,427,029 votes against Republican David Davidson, who received 867,745 votes

and Libertarian Bill Howell, who received 32,445 votes.

Democrat Jim Mattox received 1,214,780 votes for Attorney General, retaining his seat against Roy Barreira Jr., who received 1,121,541 votes. In the Supreme Court, Place I,

Oscar Mauzy received 1,220,653 votes to defeat Charles Howell, who received 996,609 votes. In Place II, Robert M. Campbell, Democrat, received 1,206,264 votes against Nathan White's 926,860 votes. In Place III, Jim Wallace garnered 1,535,553 votes

against Wiley Rollins 150,948 votes. In Place IV, Raul Gonzalez received 1,153,908 votes against John L. Bates' 1,022,965 votes.

The banking amendment which would allow branch banking, passed overwhelmingly, as did the other three amendments.

## Rebels Lose To Bulldogs 55-0

The Cooper Bulldogs came calling last Friday night and made Halloween 1986 a night everyone would like to forget. The Rebels wound up on the short end of a 55-0 contest, but never came up short on effort as they had one of their best offensive games of the season.

The Rebs won the coin toss, but opted to kick. An onside kick attempt failed and the Bulldogs had the ball on the 50. The much heralded duo of Chris Carter and Bart Tatum wasted little time establishing dominance by marching 50 yards in nine plays.

Quarterback Jason Holcomb carried the ball in from the 1-yard line. The point after attempt was good giving the Bulldogs an early 7-0 lead. Rebel back Amos Brown returned the ensuing kickoff 17 yards to the 37-yard line.

The Rebels combined the running of Brad Woods and Amos Brown to move the ball to the Cooper 20-yard line before giving up the ball on downs. Cooper wasted little time here as quarterback Jason Holcomb connected with Byron Morris for a 75-yard TD on a second down play. The extra point made it a 14-0 game midway through the first quarter.

Rivercrest took possession on the 36-yard line following a 15 yard return by Justin Roach. The Rebels managed two first downs for this series before the Bulldog defense forced the ball over on downs again.

Cooper took over on their own 43-yard line and once again gained massive chunks of yardage via Carter and Tatum. Carter carried the ball in for the score. The extra point gave Cooper a 21-0 lead early in the second quarter.

Rebel Chris Anderson fumbled the kick off and Cooper recovered on the Rebel's 20. Two plays later, Rebel defender Wesley Hood recovered a Bulldog fumble on the 9-yard line. A tough Bulldog defense forced the first punt of the evening as the Rebs could not muster any offense. Cooper took possession on the Rebel 45, following a 37-yard punt by Brad Woods. Cooper used a combination of passing and running to find the endzone for their fourth TD of the game. The half ended with Cooper 28 and Rivercrest 0. The Rebels opened the second half

on their own 32. Unable to move the ball, they punted. The Bulldog return man fumbled and Reb defender Clint Stephenson recovered the ball on the Cooper 31.

Rivercrest punched the ball to the 11, before giving up on downs. Cooper ran the ball to the 26-yard line and once again quarterback Jason Holcomb hit Byron Morris with a scoring strike of 74 yards. The point after gave Cooper a 35 point lead.

Rivercrest only managed to keep the ball one play before fumbling on a second down. Again Bulldog quarterback Jason Holcomb threw a long scoring strike. This time it was to Brad Lancaster, who raced 64 yards to score. The conversion was good, making the score 42-0. Rivercrest set up on their own 33 and managed 28 yards on eight plays before another fumble gave Cooper possession on the Reb 41.

Cooper running back Brad Lancaster struck again, this time for 43-yards out for the Dog's seventh TD of the evening, making the score 48-0. Rivercrest returned the ball to the 40-yard line, but quarterback Jimmy Lewis was intercepted on the first play of the series. Cooper used six plays to score the final touchdown of the contest, giving them a lopsided 55-0 victory.

Rivercrest travels to Wolfe City this week for the last game of the season. Kickoff time is 7:30.

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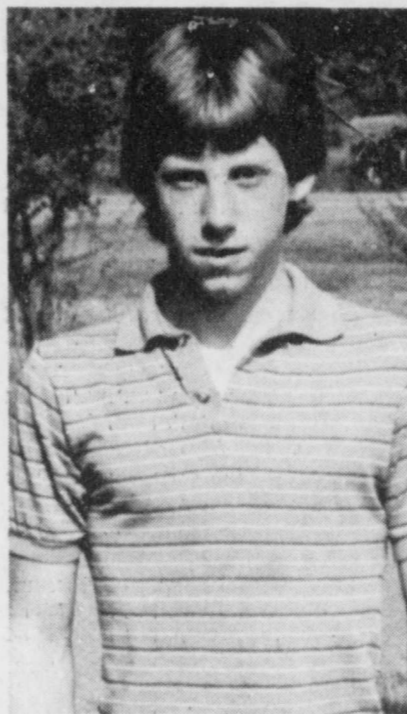

## “Mr. Ned” Recalls Bygone Days

Look around on the streets of Bogata on almost any morning, regardless of rain or sunshine, and you'll see a tall, thin, black man, whose silver hair marks the many years he's seen come and go. Although he's 86 years old, Ned Morgan, better known to most folks as “Mr. Ned”, still walks with steady steps and holds himself straight and erect.

Mr. Ned was born September 9, 1901, one of 17 children, in Bogata and he has lived his entire life here. He married the former Esther Bremby of Sulphur Bluff, April 20, 1930. They have no children and all 16 of his brothers and sisters are deceased. Mr. Ned remembers a few things about the town during his younger days, like the first grocery, drug and dry goods store all combined in one, owned by Truman Lassiter. A saloon was located just back of the store and whiskey sold for 10 cents a glass, but most of Mr. Ned's memories are about his days growing up. Although these days of his youth are filled with hard work and little to eat, he recalls the events from them with fondness. Mr. Ned was never given the opportunity to attend school and receive an education, but rather, was put to work at a very early age. He, his father and brothers, cleared land and cut wood for \$1.50 a day. They were paid \$1.00 a day for chopping cotton, and when picking time came they got 50 cents per hundred pounds. Most of their meals consisted of cornbread and water, and a full work day was from sun up to sundown.

“We were always glad when the peas came up,” chuckles Mr. Ned, “then we could eat good for a few days.” When pay day came, Mr. Ned's father would take the family's earnings to Clarksville to buy food. A sack of flour was always on the list and then the children were given one biscuit each, and only on Sundays. One of the better “treats” Mr. Ned remembers eating as a boy was his mother's hash cake. This was a cor-

meal cake wrapped in brown paper, covered with a wet cloth, and buried beneath ashes to brown. This was served with rabbits which were caught and skinned by Mr. Ned and his brothers.

There wasn't enough money to buy baking powder, so a substitute of a special lye, made by wet ashes dripping from a device called an ash hopper, was used quite successfully to make bread.

Another task the family undertook was growing and preparing tobacco. This was done by a process involving several days of wetting the leaves down with sorghum syrup, drying, wetting with water, and then forming into long twists. Mr. Ned admits to a time when he and his brothers decided to sample the produce and, declares Mr. Ned, “It just about killed me.”

Mr. Ned and a brother learned to carve shoes out of wood. They would line them with crow sacks and fill the cracks with beeswax. These kept their feet dry through the mud and water. On occasions, when the children would be sick, Mr. Ned's mother would doctor them with a medicine she made from mint seeds and sorghum syrup.

Mr. Ned says he's lived his 86 years without ever being jailed, receiving a fine, or having been cursed by any white man. “I've always tried to live in a way that if I ever needed help, I could get it,” says Mr. Ned.

Mr. Ned's grandmother was an Indian and came to Detroit, Texas from Pennsylvania. He says she told him of an old Indian custom practiced by her people. When the time came for them to die, they would wrap up in a blanket, go off into the woods alone, and die. “This is the way I want to go,” says Mr. Ned, “when it comes my time to cross over, I just want to wander into the woods, and pass on just like my grandmothers ancestors used to.”

From the sincerity in his voice and the far away look in his eyes, I just believe Mr. Ned means what he says.

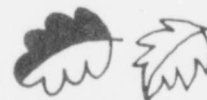
