LEGION TO ADOPT BOY SCOUTS HERE

A joint meeting of the Boy Scouts and the American Legion will be held tomorrow at 2:30 for the purpose of forming plans whereby the local post American Legion will adopt the local Scout troop and take the boys in charge. Scoutmaster U. Stephens has issued a call to Scouts to be on hand and the Legion members will be there as they are very interested in this movement. This will put a military organization over the boys who can drill them and at the same time give the boys a home.

The appointment of Marvin Atkins as scout master has been recommended by the Y. M. B. L., the troop, and the present Scoutmaster, and Mr. Atkins says that he will take the troop and do all he can for it. Mr. Stephens has had the troop since its organization and has given it much of his time and has developed a live, enthusiastic organization. He will be missed but will be a willing worker for the troop at any time he is called upon.

All members of both organizations are urged to be present on time so that no time will be lost in forming plans that will permit the Legion to adopt the troop. This is being done all over the United States by Legion posts and it is proving very satisfactory as it puts an organization behind the Scouts where heretofore in most cases there has only been a scout master.

SWEDEN TO RUN AIR SERVICE TO HAMBURG

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 26.—Sweden will be twenty-four hours nearer the continent when a new aerial company gets its four machines in operation in the near future. Stockholm, Gothenburg and Malmo will be linked with Hamburg, and then, still aerially, with Berlin, Paris and London. Letters for England will reach London in less than 24 hours. The daily trip from Malmo to Hamburg, 200 miles, will be made in two hours. The passenger tariff will be \$14.00.

FRENCH OCCUPY U. S. TERRITORY

(By Associated Press)

COBLENZ, Jan. 27.—The Coblenz area which had been occupied in Germany by American troops since the establishment of the allied "watch on the Rhine," was turned over to the French at noon today.

It is the assumption here that control by the French as stated will be followed by an application of the same disciplinary measures as the French have been imposing upon the Prussian civil authorities elsewhere in the Rhineland.

AUTHORIZE SALE OF NITRATES

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Secretary Weeks has authorized a modification of the regulations under which 25,000 tons of ammonium nitrates now stored at the Old Hickory, Tennessee army base will be sold at public auction on February 29th. The sale as authorized will be in carloads only. Weeks responded to the request of more than forty members of congress including Texas representatives and congressmen in which they said that their communities are extremely anxious to purchase nitrates for fertilizer compound. The regulation was made fixing the minimum purchase at five carloads and will prevent many communities from taking advantage of the army sales. One carload it is said could be used readily.

GERMAN YOUTH DEFRAUDS STAMP COLLECTORS

(By Associated Press)

BERLIN, Jan. 27.—One of Germany's oldest postage stamps, the three-pfennig stamp of Saxony, has been illegally produced and circulated to collectors recently, according to information obtained by the police. It has been found that a young man disposed of numerous of these forged specimens at an average price of 150,000 marks.

TAX ON OIL FAVORABLE

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Jan. 27.—The House revenue and taxation committee reported favorably today on the Coffee bill, providing a per cent tax on the gross receipts of oil production in Texas. The new rate would bring about \$5,000,000 into the general revenue fund the sponsors say.

BAVARIA UNDER MARTIAL LAW

(By Associated Press)

MUNICH, Jan. 27.—Bavaria was placed under a modified form of martial law today as means of preventing the week-end meetings of the socialists and Fascisti. The premier requested groups to cancel their plans for a series of outdoor gatherings, but was met by refusal from the head of the Fascisti, whereupon the "exceptional state" was proclaimed. The police and Reichswehr assured the premier that they would cooperate with the government.

ENFORCEMENT OF ALL LAWS URGED

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Jan. 27.—Federal Prohibition Commissioner Haynes called upon the officials and citizens of Texas to continue their efforts against law violations, particularly the prohibition violations, in an address today.

He said the danger confronting the nation is the possibility of "losing the vision of sanctity and majesty of the law."

TEXAS WOMEN TO MEET IN AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Jan. 27.—A call was issued for a meeting of the Democratic Women's Association of Texas here on January 30th and 31st. The call was made by the president, Mrs. Edith Wilkins, of Dallas, who is a member of the legislature. The purpose of the meeting is for the election of officers and to plan activities for the coming year.

FIGHT STARTED FOR SUPREMACY

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—The beginning of a fight for supremacy between the Federated Shop Crafts organizations which struck on July 1st, and the new unions formed to take its place was seen here today as the effect of the United States Railroad Labor Board decision ordering the Shop Crafts employees of the Grand Trunk railroad to hold a general election to determine what organization shall represent them.

AWAITS ACTION OF RAILROADS

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Jan. 27.—State officials who called a conference between the railroad operators and representatives of the striking shopmen, are awaiting returns from six lines invited. Two roads have already expressed adverse opinions towards an attempt to settle the strike started in July.

BANK DYNAMITED NO MONEY GONE

(By Associated Press)

COOPER, Tex., Jan. 27.—An explosion of dynamite in the rear of the Security State Bank building here early today damaged the building and also the Carter Anderson building across the street. The bank vault was undamaged and no funds were missing.

Officers are scouring Delta county in an effort to apprehend the dynamiters.

SAYS ROADS RAN A "MOB SPECIAL"

(By Associated Press)

CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 27.—Charges that a "mob special" was run over the Missouri & North Arkansas Railroad for the purpose of inflicting punishment on striking employees was made today by D. K. Robertson, president of the brotherhood of locomotive firemen and engineers.

Mr. Robertson asked the Governor of Arkansas for a thorough investigation of the recent trouble at Harrison and Heber Springs, involving the lynching of strikers by unidentified men, and the expulsion of others by a citizens committee.

SUSPECT FREE ON \$150 BOND

(By Associated Press)

WACO, Jan. 27.—Everett Smith, who the police said was being held in connection with the killing of W. E. Holt and Mrs. Ethel Deneamp, was ordered released on \$150 bond by District Judge Monroe and to appear Tuesday for the hearing. No complaint was made against Smith.

HELEN BREWER WINS HONORS

The Ballinger High School is feeling proud over the recommendations of two of her pupils who graduated in the Class of 1922. Supt. J. M. Skinner is in receipt of a letter from Dr. P. W. Horn of Southwestern University, Georgetown, in which he announced that the highest honors made in the university for the first term were made by Miss Helen Brewer of Ballinger, who is in her freshman year. Maxwell Rushing of Ballinger was also among those receiving distinction for grades made in the institution. Prof. Skinner is in receipt of a letter from Miss Brewer in which she expressed surprise, saying that she knew she had made good grades but that she had no idea that she was first in the entire student body. Miss Brewer won four distinctions, it requiring 90 or over to be recognized. Her grades were as follows: English, 90; History, 95; Spanish, 96; and Algebra, 98.

This is only another proof of the work that is done by the Ballinger High School. From all the higher educational institutions of the state come the same comment of the students who enter colleges and universities from Ballinger schools, and Ballinger students are taking honors in many different colleges.

Miss Brewer and Mr. Rushing received honors in the Senior class here last year, and this is only a continuance of their good work. Miss Brewer received the highest grade made in the class of '22 B. H. S. The two were cited before the entire student body at the Southwest chapel.

FRUIT TREES BUDDING OUT

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, Jan. 26.—Fruit buds are more advanced than usual generally over the section of Texas given over to fruit bearing trees, experts of the Division of Crop Estimates, Bureau of Agricultural Economics, United States Department of Agriculture, disclosed in making public today their findings of conditions on January 15th, which briefly summarized affirmed:

Peaches are in full bloom in Willacy county, while the citrus trees have scarcely checked the growth of new foliage. Peaches are in bloom in Kleberg county. Oranges and grape fruit show a two-thirds crop in Bee county. In some of the peach trees in Madison county the sap is flowing. Some fruit trees are in full bloom in Comal county.

Owing to the mild weather, the fruit buds in Washington county are abnormally advanced.

Counties showing more advance in fruit buds than usual include: Nacogdoches, Brazos, Knox, Calahan, Wharton and Lavaca counties.

Reports from others say: Angelina county, very few trees planted; Wood, 50 per cent; Wichita, danger of being killed on account of warm weather, some buds beginning to show green; Hamilton, fruit buds apparently advanced more than usual as no real cold weather has visited the county; Brown, fruit trees were advancing rather rapidly to about middle of December, since then cold weather has seemingly held them in check.

Collin county, no signs of budding yet; Young, not as far advanced as it should be considering the nice weather; San Saba, about as usual; Lampasas, fruit trees seem to be normal; Blanco, more advance than usual; Tom Green, more advanced, about ten days' advance.

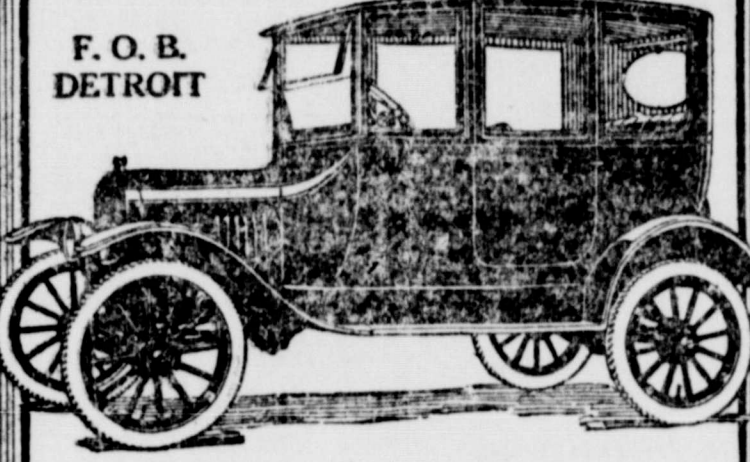

CHINESE ARRIVE TO EXHIBIT SILK

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 26.—With fifteen trunks of ancient silk and embroidery patterns, some of them centuries old, members of the Chinese silk delegation to the International Silk Exposition in New York, February 5, arrived in Seattle last week on the Admiral Oriental Liner President Jefferson. The exhibit was shipped through Seattle in bond and will be returned to China when the exposition is over.

How To Use Vicks VapoRub For Deep Grippy Colds

First, It Is Very Important That a Thorough Rubefacient or Counter-Irritant be Produced on the Surface of the Skin Around the Lungs.

This Draws the Blood From the Congested Lungs and Lessens the Danger of Pneumonia.

THEN TREAT WITH VICKS

Deep, grippy colds, frequently leading to pneumonia, have been unusually prevalent this winter. In some sections they are called influenza, but are not so virulent as the influenza cases during the first epidemic, then they are worse than ordinary colds. For these cases the usual light application of Vicks is not sufficient.

The Danger Is From Pneumonia. What is needed therefore is something to decrease the congestion of the lungs. For this purpose there is nothing like a rubefacient or counter-irritant, as witness the use of blisters, poultices and plasters for many generations. This reddening or irritation of the skin causes a rush of blood to the surface; the circulation is improved; there is a sensation of warmth and the possibility of pneumonia is greatly lessened.

A "Quick" Rubefacient Needed. The value of this counter-irritant effect is greatly increased if it is produced quickly. Nearly every family has its favorite method—onion poultices, turpentine stupes, mustard plasters and poultices of various kinds are all good.

How to Produce This Effect. Our experiments have shown that an ordinary mustard plaster is very effective. Use one part of mustard to two parts of flour or flaxseed meal for adults, and one to three parts for children under eight years. An even simpler method, particularly for adults, is to apply towels, wrung out in very hot water—as hot as the patient can stand. Whatever method is used, the application should be applied over the throat and chest until the skin is thoroughly reddened. In very deep colds, the sides and especially the back from the middle of the shoulder blades to a point just above the waist, should also be treated. For adults, a hot mustard foot-bath—one tablespoon of mustard to a gallon of water—given at this stage of the treatment will aid in drawing the blood from the congested parts.

Then Massage With Vicks. After the skin is thoroughly reddened it should be dried lightly and immediately and the patient should be given a brisk massage with Vicks all over the parts. Continue this for five minutes. This increases the counter-irritant effect. Then apply Vicks thickly over all the parts; that is, spread it on like you would a poultice—about one-sixteenth of an inch thick or more—and cover with two thicknesses of hot flannel cloths.

Vicks Acts Like a Vapor Lamp. The advantage of applying Vicks thickly over the body is this: Vicks is so made that the body heat gradually releases the ingredients in the form of vapors. The more Vicks applied, the stronger will be the vapors and the longer these vapors will last. The night clothing should always be loose around the neck and the bed clothes arranged in the form of a funnel. These vapors being lighter than air rise up from the chest and, if the bed clothing is properly arranged, pass by the nose and mouth and are thus inhaled with each breath, carrying the medication directly thru the air passages to the lungs. At the same time Vicks is absorbed thru and stimulates the skin.

Repeat the Entire Treatment. When the vapors begin to lose their strength, fresh Vicks should be applied over the parts. This to keep up the continuous supply of vapors. Can Add Mustard to Vicks. This redness of the skin should last for two or three hours, but varies with different patients. Some skins are much more sensitive than others. This redness can be prolonged by mixing a little ordinary powdered mustard with Vicks—about one part of mustard to four parts of Vicks, but this can be carried according to the patient's skin. Just enough mustard should be used to keep up the counter-irritant effect for two or four hours, so that the wet towels or mustard plasters will not have to be used so frequently as to prevent the patient from resting.

Use in a Tea-Kettle. Sometimes when the patient is badly choked up, the vapors from the application on the chest are not sufficient to make the breathing easier. In these cases drop a tablespoonful of Vicks into a kettle of boiling water and allow the patient to inhale the warm steam and vapors combined for about 10 minutes. She was visiting her niece at the time of her death, and while she was in feeble health, her condition was not considered serious, and the news came as a surprise and a shock to relatives. She was sitting up in bed, or had just raised up to eat her breakfast, when she suddenly died.

Deceased would have been sev-

enty-seven years old on the eighth day of May. For many years she had resided in Brown county, but for the past several years she had made her home here, coming here with her husband, who preceded her in death a few years ago. Since then she has been making home with her sons and other relatives.

Besides the two sons, she is survived by a sister, Mrs. Zena Thorp, of this city; and two brothers, Louis Womack, of Brown county, and Monroe Womack, of Hutto, Texas. The Hutto brother buried his daughter at Taylor, Texas, last Thursday.

Mrs. Shepperd was a consecrated Christian woman, a member of the Baptist church, and rounded out a life of usefulness in this world. The friendship and love of many friends was attested by the large crowd which gathered to pay the last tribute of respect to this good woman. The remains will rest by the side of her husband in Evergreen Cemetery.

H. H. Luckett

The remains of H. H. Luckett

will be laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery Tuesday afternoon, following the funeral services at the Methodist church at two o'clock. Rev. E. W. Bridges, pastor of the Methodist church, will conduct the services.

Mr. Luckett passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. P. Shepherd, 409 Eighth Street, Monday morning at two-thirty o'clock, following an illness of several months. It was generally known that Mr. Luckett was in feeble health and relatives and friends realized that the end was near, and while death did not come as a surprise, it brought sorrow to a large circle of friends and acquaintances of many years.

In this death Ballinger loses another pioneer citizen. Mr. Luckett came to West Texas more than forty years ago, and had a hand in the development of this country. He was born at St. Charles, Missouri, on June 6, 1848. When a small boy he emigrated with his parents to Kentucky, where he grew to manhood, residing near Louisville, Kentucky, until about twenty-one years of age.

At the age of twenty-one Mr. Luckett went to Galveston, Texas, where he studied law under Judge Chandler, a noted jurist, and while living at Galveston he was admitted to the bar. 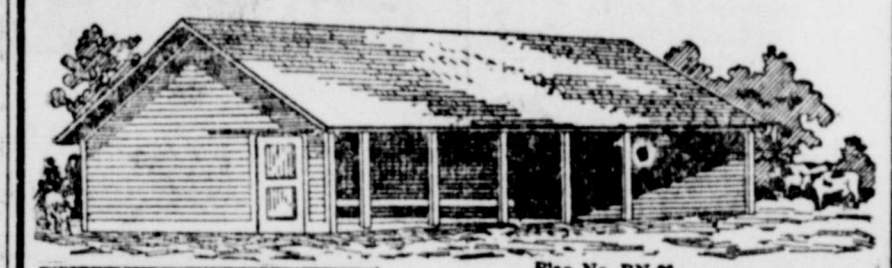
