NO NEED FOR SMEARS

The hot debate now raging in the United States between the growing conservative, anti-communist movement and what is generally known as modern-day "liberalism" — sometimes called the "liberal" left — has brought the inevitable name-calling and wildly exaggerated oratory. None of this is very conducive to sound and reasonable analysis of the great issues we face. There is nothing unusual, of course, in irresponsible charges during political campaigns. But this is something more serious, because at the base of today's great debate is the very nature of our American system — whether and how we shall preserve and protect it, and how it shall meet the challenge of the worldwide communist conspiracy.

This may be a good time, before everything becomes obscured in a flood of invective, to see if we can discover what is behind all the charges and countercharges, what is at the bottom of those phrases you hear used so indiscriminately — extremist, radical right, left-wing radicals, right-wing radicals, ultra-right, ultra-left and so on.

First, this is not exactly old-time political name-calling. It is a smear technique — an effort to brand men and beliefs with words that call up unpleasant or distasteful images, and to lump together under one nasty phrase everybody who doesn't agree with you. This smear technique was not begun by people who call themselves either conservatives or anti-conservatives or both. It wasn't even originated by those generally classed as "liberals" and leftists, though they have been among its most prevalent practitioners. It was really started in a big way by the communists. But as happens with so many other communist aims and ideas, they are innocently picked up by otherwise well-meaning and perfectly loyal Americans who do not understand the insidious ways of communism and thus do not realize they are copying communist techniques.

In any case, in the last year or two there has come about, as the result of years of educational effort on the part of dedicated Americans, a great and growing awareness of the meaning of the worldwide communist conspiracy and its threat to American institutions. Along with this has gone a tremendous resurgence of conservative thought, effort, and analysis not only among our people generally but most particularly among our younger people. The so-called modern "liberals" have been in the saddle in America for nearly 30 years. During that time we have seen communism spread its tentacles ever farther in the world at large, while here at home we have seen collectivist and socialist inroads on our constitutional Republic. The "liberals" and leftists in our political life, in our schools and colleges, in the press, magazines, TV and radio who have held sway for so long, naturally are frightened and angry at the growing conservative movement.

Frightened and angry men are not reasonable men, and so they strike out at their opposition with words like "extreme right-wing," "ultra-conservative" and worse.

It would not be human if equally frightened and angry men on the conservative side — frightened and angry at what they see happening to their country — did not reply in kind. Just as certain "liberals" try to lump all conservative, anti-communist Americans into one smear-category, so certain conservatives begin to see the hand of the communist behind every move on the "liberal" side. This does not make for effective opposition. Charge a "liberal" who wants to bring more power to Washington with being a communist or communist-directed, and his ability to correctly deny such a charge then makes his grab at more federal power seem all right. A man who wants the national government to run our schools may be a perfectly loyal American — misguided, lacking understanding of the nature of our system, a believer in Big Government — but loyal to the United States. A man who wants to appease Soviet Russia is not necessarily a communist — he may merely have scared himself into the thought of nuclear war, or may not think freedom is worth fighting for.

Deadline For Auto Inspections Is Sunday, April 15

Austin — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today there will be no extension of the April 15 deadline for inspection of all motor vehicles in Texas.

"The April 15 deadline this year falls on a Sunday, a day when most inspection stations are closed," Garrison noted. "We are not asking these stations to remain open on that day, and under the law, there can be no extension of the deadline."

He said approximately 2,000,000 vehicles in the state remain to be inspected during the remaining 10 weeks of the 1962 inspection period. He urged motorists to get their inspection stickers early, pointing out that as the deadline approaches waiting lines will begin forming.

"We would like to point out that the purpose of motor vehicle inspection is to discover any defect that might become a link in a chain of events leading to an accident," the DPS Director said.

"It is encouraging to note that since the inspection program began in 1951, vehicles having defects that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 percent to three percent."

Under the law, persons operating vehicles without the 1962 inspection sticker on and after April 16 are subject to arrest. Authority to enforce the provisions of the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Act is vested in the patrolmen of the Department of Public Safety, Sheriffs and their deputies, and city policemen.

No Contest In City Election

No contest developed in persons seeking election to city offices as the filing deadline passed at 5:00 p. m. Monday. The same four men now filling the four places are seeking re-election.

Lewis Miles Guthrie was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Ozro Eubank, deceased, until election time in April. He filed his name for election to the remainder of the term, which will be one year.

Those presently on the council and seeking re-election to another two-year term are: Ben W. Yarborough, Oscar Etheredge and Kenneth Bowker Jr. Doug Moore is the only Alderman on the council whose term does not expire at this election time.

The term of the mayor does not expire this year. W. Ford Barnes has been serving in this capacity for the past several years.

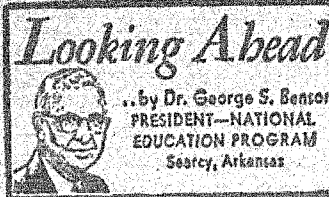

THE WIELAND QUESTION

If our State Department has men working for it who have reputations similar to that of William A. Wieland (the subject of a recent exchange at a Presidential press conference), the nation's foreign service is seriously handicapped in looking after our best interests in international affairs. This pro-Castro "specialist" in Latin American affairs has been described by several ambassadors in previous Congressional investigations as working for policies detrimental to the best interests of the nation. He, along with any others of similar attitudes, should be the subject of new inquiries by the Congress.

If men like this are going to be employed in handling our Latin American problems, then we certainly may expect trouble and confusion in the years ahead. The Alliance for Progress, a program of economic aid to our neighbors below the border, for example is going to require the most expert administration lest in the long run it foul up our relationship in this hemisphere. More ambitious even than the Marshall Plan, this program proposes to supply long term loans at little or no interest to lift our Southern neighbors up the economic ladder.

Push Toward Socialism
Central and South America have vast resources and poten-

tial, yet poverty and squalor are widespread. There is no quarrel with the idealism of those who projected the program. But we may have committed ourselves to a program having serious flaws in it. First of all, various long-awaited reforms in Latin America can be hardly wrought suddenly by outsiders. Internal problems in the various nations will not be solved except through internal action.

In the next place, reforms for which we offer our tax money are vaguely referred to as government "planning," "land reform," "redistribution" of income, and welfare "housing." Generally, these policies are urged upon the governments of the countries, with money promised for action. This appears to mean that the United States is pushing Latin America still further toward socialism and welfare state. Why must we do this?

Sell Them Enterprise?

Very little is said at Punta del Este that would encourage our Latin neighbors to pursue freedom of enterprise, the principle that has most helped this nation become strong economically. Instead of urging the Latins to remove stifling controls, safeguard private property, reduce government extravagance, lower taxes, balance national budgets and curb inflation, we offer dolos from the American taxpayer that are used to support socialist measures. We do little, apparently, to discourage them from driving away the foreign investments that they need desperately.

Actually, the most effective help we can provide our neighbors (if we keep our balance of payments in line) is private in-

vestment capital. Private investment already accounts for about \$9 billion invested from the U. S. in Latin countries so far, and it would undoubtedly be greater were it not for fear of the seizures and expropriations of property that have so often been experienced. The very socialist measures we encourage tend to scare off foreign capital that might otherwise seek opportunities there.

Work and Profit

Instead, we offer government tax-raised money to be administered through their governments for products and services, which they often sell to their citizens and keep the money. The Latins, like the people of certain other foreign countries, use resources of this nature to support their own socialistic ideas. One wonders how many Wielands we shall have in the vast structure that administers the \$20 billion promised the Alliance for Progress. One may also wonder about the Latin friendships these men may have, and about their seriousness of purpose with respect to the long range best interests of the American people.

What is it that can remove disease, poverty and illiteracy from nations that are economically backward, and at the same time thwart Communism? The only remedy is work and profit, which results in funds for reinvestment and for tools. If our Latin neighbors are to raise living standards and retain personal freedoms, they must reject all forms of collectivist regimentation. The most serious question before us is whether men in Washington, like William A. Wieland, realize this.

DOG BITES

Dogs are wonderful pets and companions. Just about every American family at one time or another has a dog. They're great company for the kids and the older folks enjoy them too.

But dogs are, after all, animals. Sometimes they bite. Often, if you or your child are bitten, it's at least partially your fault.

While training your dog in how to get along with humans, it might be well to train your children in how to get along with dogs, advises Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. The child who treats a dog with proper respect runs much less risk of being bitten. A few simple rules will help to keep you from becoming one of the 600,000 Americans who were bitten by

dogs last year.

Don't give a dog to a very small child, say, under six, unless you are prepared to be constantly on the scene when dog and child are together. The toddler doesn't realize that pulling the dog's tail, vigorous cuddling, trying to ride piggy-back, pulling his ears just aren't appreciated by the animal. Too much such attention and the dog may snap back.

Never allow the child to abuse or tease the dog. Check with your local branch of the anti-cruelty society for advice, or check out a library book on dog care and training. Make your child a partner in the training and care.

Let the dog alone while he is eating. Even the best trained of dogs resent interference with their feeding time.

Sometimes dogs, just like children, get over-excited running or playing. If the dog is running and barking while the child runs, or races on a bicycle, he might bite from sheer excitement.

Don't waken a sleeping dog abruptly. Startled, he may snap out.

Be careful in trying to separate fighting dogs. One or both of them may turn on you.

Learn these rules, teach them to your children and enjoy your pet. The dog wants love and affection. He deserves respect.

Vets Benefits In
Texas Nearly \$355
Million In 1961

Veterans and their families in Texas received a total of \$354,890,488 in cash benefits and services during the fiscal year of 1961, the Veterans Administration announced today.

Actual distribution of this sum is outlined in the 1961 annual report of the VA, now on sale at the Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.

In Texas, compensation for service-connected disabilities and pension for total and permanent nonservice-connected disabilities were paid to 162,912 living veterans in the amount of \$144,363,403.

Death compensation and pension were paid to the dependents of 55,584 deceased veterans in the amount of \$50,266,038.

Certain GI insurance dividend and indemnity payments totaling \$54,943,798 were made to veterans and their beneficiaries.

An average of 371 disabled veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict in Texas trained during the year under the vocational rehabilitation act to overcome the handicaps of their disabilities. They received \$787,612 in substance, tuition, supplies and equipment.

An average of 9,570 veterans trained during the year under the World War II and Korean GI Bills. They received \$12,613,092 in cash allowances.

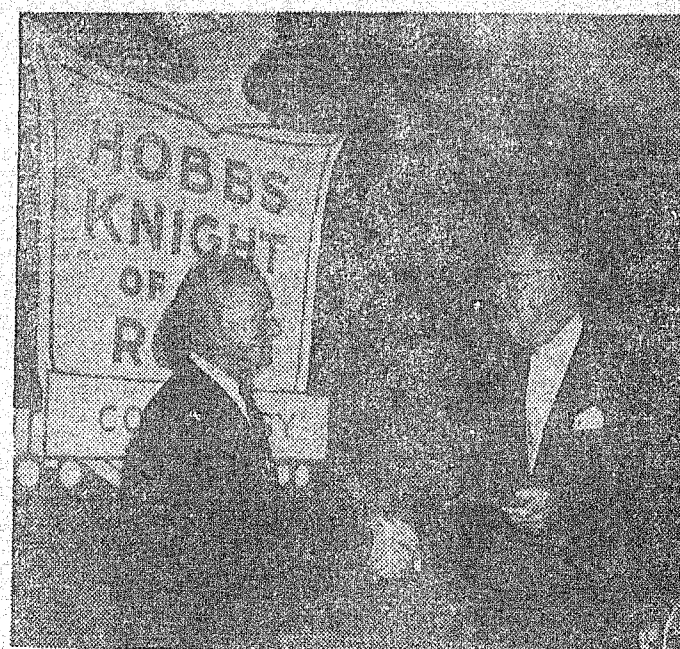
The remainder of cash benefits, services and other VA expenditures in Texas during the year totaled \$81,933,927.

Experts Back Versatile Youths

When 400,000 men and women volunteer their time and know-how to help 2.3 million 4-H Club members "learn, live and serve," the results are no less than spectacular.

For instance, the Head, Heart, Hands and Health youths finished nearly 4 million projects in more than 40 different categories just this past year.

In almost every instance, the completed project benefited the entire family and in many cases, the community as well.

The information comes from the Cooperative Extension Service which directs 4-H Club work.

Further proof of the far-reaching effect of 4-H was found in 1,900 record books maintained by state award winning club members. The records were reviewed in the headquarters of the National 4-H Service Committee last November, said Norman C. Mindrum, director, for the purpose of selecting boys and girls for scholarships and trip awards to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Miss Sheila Nixon, 20, of Pomona, California, winner of a \$400 Ford scholarship, commented: "The awards we win in 4-H work aren't totally ours. Many people have helped us win them."

Another national champion, who won a Sears-Roebuck Foun-

dation scholarship for leadership, is 20-year-old Hoosier farmer Wayne Buck. He has a 4-H record so long "it would fill a book." Now a student at Purdue University, Buck credits 4-H training with teaching him how to accept responsibility, and to better understand the world and the people in it.

President Kennedy expressed a similar feeling when he said in a recent message to 4-H members: "I would commend you especially for your constructive and worthwhile efforts in learning to live and work cooperatively with others."

In the beginning, 4-H Clubs were intended for farm youngsters, and offered only projects in crops, livestock, home canning and cooking. The present program embraces a wide range of agricultural, home economics and scientific programs. With the exception of a few such as livestock, tractor and field crops, the projects can be carried on in town as well as on the farm.

4-H Moves to Town
Today, membership in 4-H Clubs is about equally divided between farm and non-farm boys and girls. The main reason for this shift is the disappearance of the small farm from the American agricultural scene.

Meanwhile, more and more business people are participating in 4-H as it moves into suburban and urban areas, Mindrum points out. National 4-H Club Week, National 4-H Club Congress, Farm-City Week, achievement days, county and

state fairs, Farm-Safety Week and the like are but a few examples, he said.

Director Mindrum, who is a former 4-H member and state extension official, has this to say: "To sum up 4-H achievement one should call special attention to the concurrent efforts of many which, over the years, have made the 'learn by doing' program the success it is."

Business Gives Cash
"Besides the paid and volunteer workers who carry out the teaching-training aspect, there are business people who contribute know-how and money," he added.

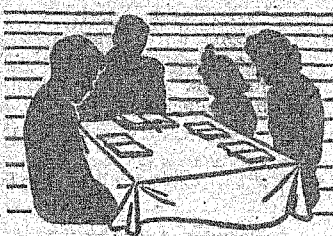
Approximately 60 different business concerns provide funds for 4-H through the National 4-H Service Committee, he said.

Donors of awards for the last 25 years or more include: International Harvester, Montgomery Ward, Westinghouse Educational Foundation, Kerr Glass Mfg. Newer 4-H backers are the Sperry and Hutchinson Co., Ralston Purina, Moorman Mfg. Co., General Foods, E. I. du Pont de Nemours and John Deere. Also, Pyrofax Gas and International Minerals & Chemical corporations. These firms have supported the program for five years or less, according to the 4-H Service Committee.

Eligibility Under War Orphans Program Does Not Change

The eligibility of children of deceased veterans for benefits under the War Orphans Education Assistance Act is not affected by subsequent adoption or even by marriage, P. J. Mims, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco said today.

They remain "children" as far as this benefit is concerned even if one parent is still living or if the remarriage of that surviving parent results in their legal adoption, Mims said.

Eligible ages are between 18 and 23 years but exceptions provide earlier or later use of the benefits, in certain cases.

Students approved for training may receive \$110 a month for as long as 36 months.

Guardians of prospective students meeting these requirements and the children themselves are urged to arrange for vocational counseling at the nearest VA regional office in order to select the proper course of training and make the necessary application for enrollment, the VA official said.

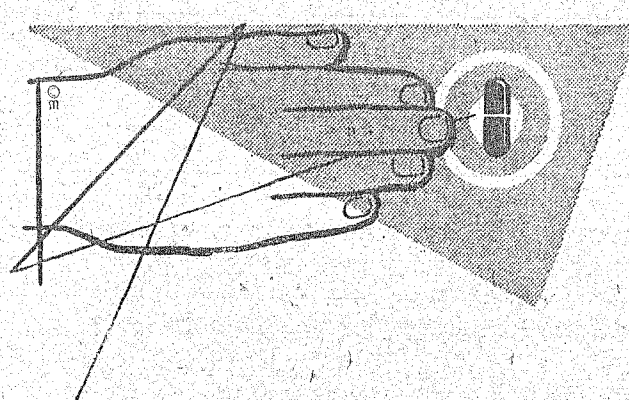

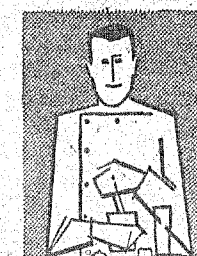

Family Shelter Handbook Ready For Distribution

A handbook titled "Family Shelter Designs," which contains practical instructions for building any one of eight types of home fallout shelters, is being distributed by the Division of Defense and Disaster Relief of the Governor's Office to local civil defense directors for re-distribution to the public without charge.

The new publication issued by the national Office of Civil Defense supplements the booklet "Fallout Protection: What to Know and Do About Nuclear Attack" which was made available for public distribution in January.

The handbook explains that the eight shelters are "designed for construction in backyards and basements and for use by families who do not have access to community shelters or who prefer that their shelters be in their homes." The estimated cost of construction and complete bill of materials are given for each of the eight shelter designs.

4-H Beef Team To Be On TSCRA Program in Houston

The demonstration will be presented Tuesday morning, March 20, during the general session in the Rice Hotel.

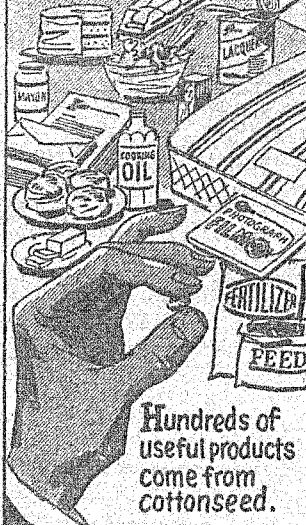
Farm Facts

The seed separated from cotton lint during ginning once was a waste disposal problem. Now it's a valuable by-product of the cotton crop.

The fuzz on cottonseed is removed at the oil mill. These short fibers are called linters and they're an important source of cellulose for rayon, transparent packaging materials, plastics, photographic films, smokeless powder, lacquers, and paper. Absorbent cotton and felts for upholstery and mattresses also come from linters.

Next, the kernels, or meats, are extracted from the hulls. Crude oil from the meats is refined for salad and cooking oils, mayonnaise, shortening, margarine, and other foods. From the "foots," or residue after refining, come glycerine for explosives, cosmetics, and pharmaceuticals.

Cake and meal, left after the oil has been taken from the meats, provide livestock

feed, a flour for bread and cookies, and fertilizer.

Hulls also are used for feed. Furfural made from hulls is utilized in synthetic rubber, petroleum refining, and plastics.

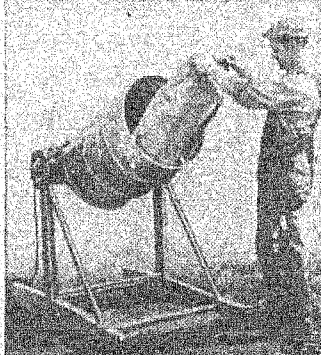

Contributions in 1961 resulted in aid for 8,647 persons of all ages in Texas.

Soil Conservation District Agreement Revised

College Station — Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has announced the updating and broadening of the agreement which provides the official basis for cooperation between the USDA and local soil conservation districts.

According to the announcement, the USDA is now ready to enter into this revised agreement which will offer help to districts "in conserving and improving soil, water, vegetation, wildlife and related resources, and in reducing damage by flood and sedimentation."

The new memorandum will be used with all newly formed districts. Agreements with existing districts will be re-negotiated using the new document as rapidly as they wish to do so, the Secretary said.

Updating USDA's assistance to districts comes on the 25th anniversary of the district movement. In Texas, 182 soil conservation districts, including 98 percent of the state's privately owned agricultural and forestry land, have entered into agreements with USDA for help in conserving soil and water resources, says Lynn Pittard, extension soil and water conservation specialist.

Secretary Freeman made the first public announcement of the revised memorandum of understanding in an address before the annual convention of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts, held recently in Philadelphia.

It's the Law in TEXAS



Division of Estates

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property—cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate—is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters, and descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

Vets Selling GI Homes Should Be Free of Mortgage

More warnings for veterans planning to sell or trade their GI guaranteed homes to "proceed with caution" came today from P. J. Mims, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

"An unfortunate number of veterans who did not heed previous VA advice to relieve themselves of future liability in these deals are now faced with unexpected and substantial debts because later owners defaulted on the loans," Mims said.

"Many veterans believe that deeding their GI house to some third party automatically relieves them of any further liability on their loan," Mims added, "but this simply is not true. The note a veteran signs when he gets his GI loan is a contract in which he obligates himself to pay off the loan according to the terms of the note."

If the new owner or some subsequent owner fails to make payments on the outstanding loan the lender has to foreclose, the veteran will be held liable to VA, along with any others who may have assumed the loan, for any loss VA sustains on the guaranty, Mims said.

There are only two ways a veteran can be relieved of future liability for his GI loan in these sales and trades, Mims emphasized. First, he can require the purchaser to pay cash or finance a new loan which will pay off the balance of the veteran's loan. If this is not feasible, the VA can and will give the veteran a release if the purchaser of the GI house is an acceptable credit risk and will personally assume the outstanding debt and liabilities, the VA manager added.

He warned that frequently a purchaser will take a deed from a veteran which provides that he is receiving title "subject to the GI loan," but without assuming or agreeing to pay the indebtedness. Under this type of transaction, the new owner can not be held responsible for any loss sustained by the lender or VA. If the mortgage is later foreclosed, the veteran will be held responsible for the loss, but not the person or company to whom he deeded the property.

In some parts of the country, a racket known as "equity milking" has been encouraged by this kind of deed, Mims said. Under this scheme, the operator pays the veteran a nominal sum for his equity and the deed to the GI house. He rents or manipulates the property to make a quick profit and then allows it to go in default. The veteran is stuck with the loss.

"Other than full repayment of the GI loan," Mims concluded, "the only guarantee against future liability for the veteran

is for him to require the purchaser to personally assume the indebtedness and to secure from VA a release from liability."

VA can furnish a veteran advice and guidance how to best protect his interests if he calls on VA for help before he deeds his home to someone else, Mims said, but if he waits until the new owner or subsequent transferee defaults on the loan, it's too late.

Foreign Travelers Invited To Visit Us

"In carrying out its aims," Mr. Meyers said, "the USTS works in close cooperation with the international travel industry, travel agencies, carriers and related services, federal, state and local government agencies, travel trade associations, and international and regional organizations concerned with promoting travel and tourism throughout the world."

A one-day regional conference will be held April 9, 1962, in the

Sheraton Dallas Hotel, Dallas, Texas, to discuss ways to attract and make visitors from foreign countries welcome in our midst. Officials of USTS; governors and state officials of Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas; mayors and civic leaders, representatives of transportation agencies, hotels, motels and restaurants will be in attendance.

The objectives for the meeting are twofold: to improve world understanding of the United States, its institutions and people by encouraging as many foreigners as possible to see us firsthand; and also to reduce the imbalance between this nation's foreign travel expenditure and travel receipts.

Night Hunters

Top Violations

During January

Austin — Night hunters plagued Texas game wardens during the month of January, according to the monthly violation report of J. B. Phillips, coordinator of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. There were 142 hunters who paid fines for hunting at night and headlighting. In most instances, the court forfeited the hunting license in addition to imposing fines ranging up to \$200 for each violation.

In all, there were 438 arrests during the month, with fines and costs totaling \$19,949.74.

A number of the hunters seemed to forget that the season was over, and had continued to shoot dove, deer, ducks and quail during the closed season. Twelve arrests were made for dredging oysters in closed season. Twelve arrests were made for water pollution.

Despite warnings that fishing licenses should be bought by all persons between the ages of 17 and 65, who fish with rod and reel, or who fish outside their home county, 20 persons were charged with this violation. The Texas fishing license costs just \$2.15 for both residents and non-residents.

AIR TRAVEL INCREASES

Worldwide air travel was the greatest ever in 1961. International and domestic scheduled airliners of 90 United Nations member states carried 112 million people 72 billion passenger miles during the year, reports the International Civil Aviation Organization, a UN agency. These figures represent a six percent gain over 1960, according to ICAO.

Crop Rotation Good Plant Disease Control Practice

College Station — Methods of disease control in crops have been getting fancier and fancier in recent years, but the practice of crop rotation is still one of the most effective, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Continuous cropping of the same field with the same closely related crops year after year will result in increased plant disease troubles, Smith points out. A disease of only slight importance the first year may carry over in the soil and become more serious each succeeding year.

Many disease organisms, such as those causing downy mildew, wheat rust and tomato or potato late blight, are wind-borne. Others are carried on or in the seed. All of these diseases may occur on new land. After a disease organism is introduced into a new field it may linger until the infection finally reaches serious proportions. Corn smut is a good example of a fungus that is carried to a new field by wind-borne spores, and then survives in the soil for several seasons.

Newly cleared woodland or recently plowed grassland is usually as free of soil-inhabiting plant disease organisms as any land that can be found, Smith says. Farmers and ranchers should make every effort to keep such soil disease-free.

A plant disease already established in a field often can be avoided by planting a crop that is not susceptible to that disease, Smith advises. Farmers should learn to recognize disease, and when they occur, should plant a different or resistant crop for several seasons. Some disease organisms may live in the soil for years, even when a susceptible crop is not grown. Others can be controlled after the land is planted to non-susceptible crops for only a few seasons.

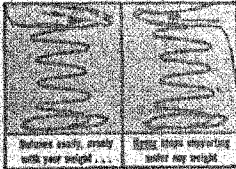
