Funeral Rites for E. L. Hendrix, 74, To Be Held Today

Funeral rites for E. L. Hendrix, well known farmer and resident here since 1922, will be held at the Trinity Lutheran Church at 1 p. m. today, with the Rev. Bruno Gaskamp, pastor, officiating.

Burial will be in the Roberts Cemetery north of Haskell under direction of the Haskell Funeral Home.

Mr. Hendrix, 74, died at 6:45 p. m. Tuesday in the Haskell Hospital. He had been ill for several weeks.

A native of Texas, he was born March 24, 1880, in Travis County, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Hendrix. He married Miss Clara Mae Hodge July 10, 1904, at Sipe Springs, Texas and they later lived in Wichita County before moving their family to Haskell County 32 years ago. Mr. Hendrix had been engaged in farming during his entire lifetime.

Mr. Hendrix is survived by his wife, of Haskell; two daughters, Mrs. Daisy Frier of Magna, Utah, and Mrs. Lena Petrich of Haskell; five sons, Bill Hendrix, J. L. Hendrix and Clyde Hendrix, Haskell, Jack Hendrix, Topeka, Kan., and Bob Hendrix, Moberly, Mo.; four sisters, Mrs. Addie Long of Haskell, Mrs. Cella Hale of Baird, Mrs. Mary Brown of Albuquerque, N. M., and Mrs. Emma Cornwell of Sundown, Texas. Twelve grandchildren and one great-grandchild also survive.

Funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. Hendrix, 1000 North Avenue D, Monday night, when the casket was placed in the hearse for the funeral home.

Three Barracks At Weinert Gin Burn Monday

Property loss estimated at between \$2,500 and \$3,000 resulted from fire which destroyed three barracks type structures and damaged a fourth at the Paymaster Gin in Weinert Monday afternoon.

Firemen and trucks from Haskell and Munday fire departments brought the fire under control shortly after flames had spread to the fourth building.

The small buildings are occupied as living quarters by transient farm laborers during the cotton gathering season.

Two of the burned buildings were occupied by Negro families, who lost most of their household goods in the blaze.

The fire is believed to have started from burning trash. T. D. Earles is manager of the Paymaster Gin.

Heavy First Primary Voting Leaves Six Races To Be Settled In Second Primary

Six run-off races for county and precinct offices remain to be decided in Haskell County as a result of first primary voting Saturday, in which a total of 3981 votes polled.

The unprecedented vote turn-out exceeded all pre-election estimates, and for the first time in recent years the vote surpassed by 638 the number of poll tax receipts and exemption certificates issued.

In addition to the six county and precinct races, three State races—for Governor, Supreme Court, and Court of Criminal Appeals—will be decided in the runoff.

In the Governor's race, final unofficial figures showed Shivers with 666,226 to Yarborough's 642,374. Votes remaining to be tabulated could not eliminate a runoff.

Commissioner W. A. Leonard of Precinct 2, with 237 votes is opposed in the runoff-off by Leon Newton with 356 votes. Other candidates were Herman Jossel 170, and Claud Covey 72.

In Precinct 4, Commissioner David Strickland, with 183 votes, goes in the runoff-off with Francis Blake who received 135. Unsuccessful candidates Vernon Wofford polled 62, Roy Clark 130, Ted Marugg 128, W. C. Collins 45.

In Precinct 3, Commissioner Estle Gilleland, with 233 votes, defeated three opponents: L. L. Kuenstler 122, Noah Lane 61, and Gene Tonn 25.

In the runoff-off for Justice of Peace, Precinct 1 will be the incumbent, Eal Treadwell 956 votes, and Robert Fitzgerald 811. Third man in the race, G. W. Piland, received 319.

For Constable, Precinct 1, Incumbent Sterling Edwards with 630 votes, is in the runoff-off with Bob Marlow who received 803. Other candidates were Frank Lewellen 338, and Frank South 261.

In the race for State Representative, 83rd District for Haskell, Throckmorton, Baylor and Knox Counties, the incumbent (Continued on Page 8)

Four Indictments Reported Monday By Grand Jury

Three felony indictments, and a misdemeanor indictment for aggravated assault were returned by a 39th District Court Grand Jury in session here Monday.

Elander Louis, Rule Negro, was charged with aggravated assault in a misdemeanor indictment. Complaining witness was his wife, Jewell Marie Louis. The charge was the outgrowth of a domestic row which occurred on July 18, during which the Negro woman wounded her husband with a shot from a .38 caliber pistol. In turn she was "pistol whipped" with the gun after Elander had wrested the weapon from his wife.

Another Rule Negro man, Tom Brazell, about 40, was charged with fondling in a felony indictment. Complaining witness was a 13-year-old Negro girl.

Named in the remaining two separate felony indictments for burglary were two Haskell men, Joe J. Weaver and Bobby Don Rogers. The two men were charged with entering an apartment in South Haskell occupied by E. E. Sippel, and taking some beer.

Sixteen witnesses appeared before the investigating body during Monday's session.

Red Cross Seeks
Nurses During
Polio Season

The American Red Cross has issued an urgent call for registered nurses to serve during the polio season. From January through June of this year, the incidence of polio cases has been 4-141, an increase of 1,125 cases over a 5-year average for a comparable period, according to statistics released by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

"The demand for more nurses is particularly great in Texas right now," according to Kay Fitzpatrick, Red Cross Director of Nursing Services for the Midwestern area. She explained that the Southwest Texas floods have created a large demand for trained nurses to assist in relief operations and that, in addition, in many other parts of Texas polio cases are on the upsurge.

"Furthermore," Miss Fitzpatrick stated, "past experiences indicate that with the approach of the polio season, the services of registered nurses will be needed in many areas throughout the country. It is not our intention to drain nurses from other duty in which they are vitally needed, but to find, particularly, inactive registered nurses who can serve."

Nurses recruited by the Red Cross are requested to serve for a minimum 3-month period. Their salaries are paid by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and the hospitals in which they serve.

Eighty Children In Third Group
At Lions Camp for Crippled Children

Kerrville, Texas (Spl.)—The Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children, situated here in the rugged, green Texas Hill Country, is currently playing host for the third of the six large groups of crippled children it will provide with recreation and rehabilitation this summer.

Eighty children from all parts of Texas are currently enjoying a fortnight's stay at the free camp, which is open to any crippled child in the state. Age limits are 7 through 16.

Application for the camp should be placed with the nearest Lions Club, V. V. Vaughn, executive director of the camp, said.

Included in the current group, which will be at the camp through July 17, is Carla Kay Manske, 8, whose trip to the camp is sponsored by the Haskell Lions Club.

Also at the camp from this area are Richard W. Sprinkles, 8, and Bobby Ray Walden, both of Albany and sponsored by the Lions Club of that city.

Supreme Court Backs Jayton
In Battle Over County Seat

The Supreme Court of Texas last week upheld a ruling of the Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland, in effect declaring that the Kent County seat should be moved from Clairmont to Jayton.

The Supreme Court's only action was to answer three questions submitted to it by the appellate court, certifying in each of the three instances that the Court of Civil Appeals did not err in affirming the trial court judgment.

The appeal was from a suit brought by Euell D. Harrison and others against M. V. Jay and others contesting an election held March 29, 1952 for removal of the Kent County seat from Clairmont to Jayton. The contestants maintained that Jayton did not have the necessary two-thirds majority for the election to carry.

By agreement of both parties to the suit the trial was held in Haskell. The trial court excluded 26 votes for Clairmont which were cast in election precincts other than that in which the voters resided.

The three questions submitted to the Supreme Court by the Eastland court were:

1. Did we err in holding that votes cast in an election precinct other than the precinct in which the voters resided could not be counted?
2. Did we err in holding that the contestants could not, in this election contest, attack the validity of the orders of the Commissioners' Court establishing the election precinct?
3. Did we err in holding that the votes cast by voters so obtaining their poll taxes at Jayton were not illegal?

The Supreme Court gave "No" as the answer to each of the questions.

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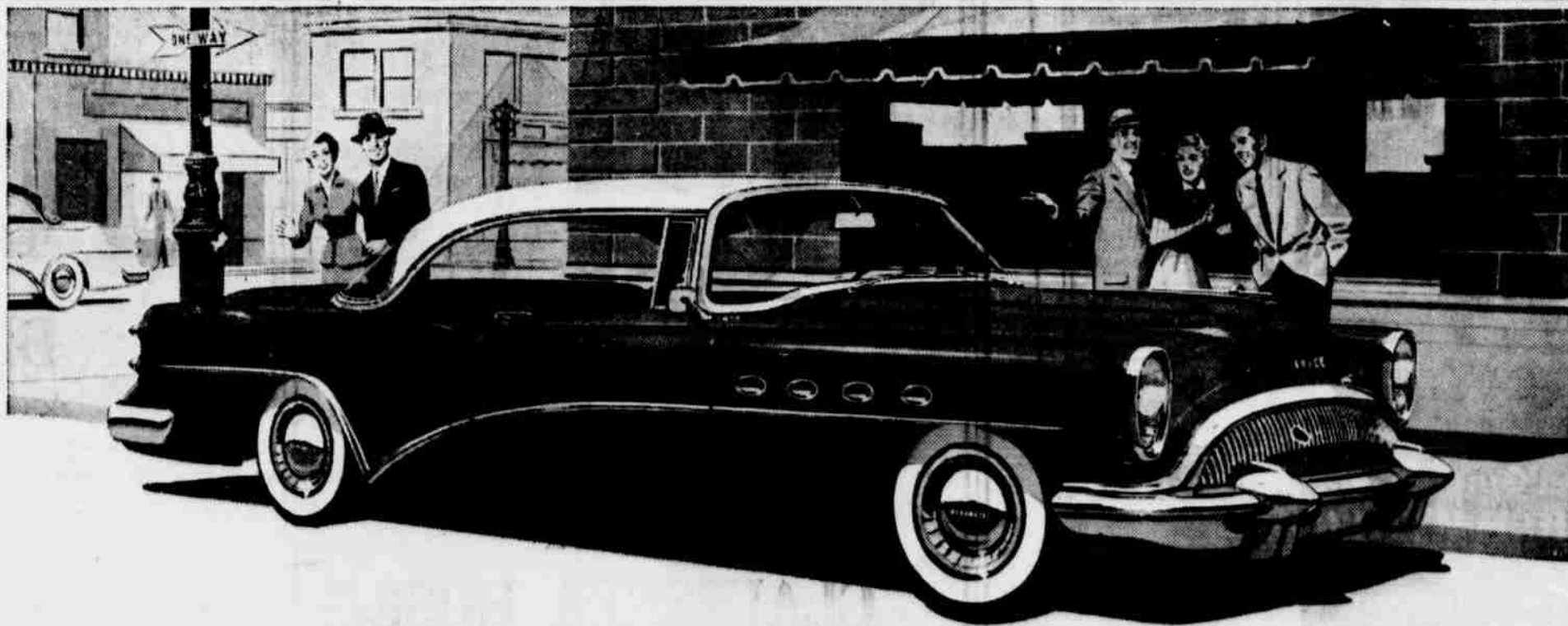

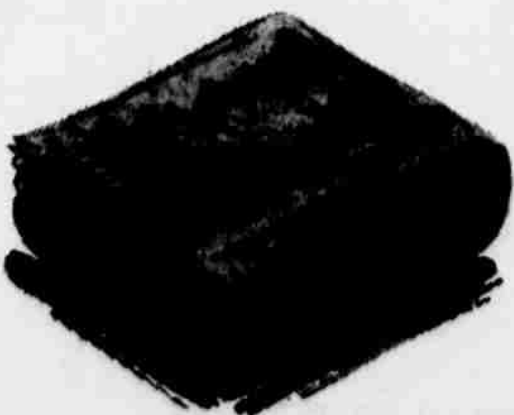

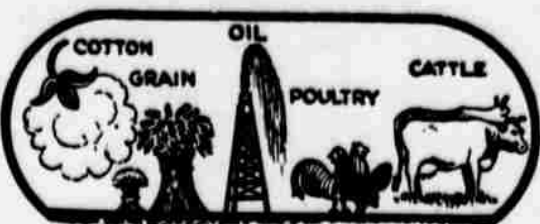

Haskell County Farm Families Benefit From Local FHA Credit and Services

Farm families in Haskell county have made good use of Farmers Home Administration credit and services this past year and have stepped up the efficiency of their farming operations, Bill Lawson, the agency's county supervisor headquartered at Haskell said this week.

Additional funds have been made available, he said, to lend through the next year to farmers to operate, buy, enlarge, or improve farms.

A large proportion of the money loaned in this county during the past 12 months has been to veterans and other young farm families who are establishing better farm setups. Their greatest needs were for adequate credit and some help in developing sound systems of farming and adopting efficient farm management practices. No loans were made to farmers who were able

to obtain financing they needed from other local lenders. A total of \$425,000 was loaned in the county for equipment, livestock, fertilizer, feed and seed that farm families needed to make better use of their land and labor resources.

Farm ownership and housing loans amounted to \$24,700, including direct loans from appropriated funds and loans from money advanced by banks or other private lenders and insured by the Farmers Home Administration.

Emergency loans, including livestock loans, totaled \$277,435. The county office of the FHA serving Haskell and Stonewall counties is located in the Haskell County courthouse.

Loans for the entire Haskell unit, serving both Haskell and Stonewall Counties, total \$785,615 for the year ending June 30, 1954.

New Booklet Cites Impact of Oil on State's Economy

Dallas, Texas—Texas oil's billion-barrel-a-year impact on the state's economy as well as a history of its use—ranging from 16th Century boat patching material to jet fuel—is covered in "Texas Oil and Gas," published this week by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

The 40-page booklet is the newest edition of the Association's periodic roundup of facts and statistical data on the state's petroleum industry. Its chapters cover oil search, production, natural gas, transportation, refining, petrochemicals, industry taxes, conservation, and history.

Pointing out that petroleum is a principal reason for Texas' changing from an agricultural to an industrial state, the book aims at a "better understanding of this important influence in contemporary Texas life."

District Game Warden H. B. Iverson Is Speaker at Lions Club Meeting

Members of the Lions Club heard an interesting talk by District Game Warden H. B. Iverson at their regular meeting last week.

Rex Felker was in charge of the program for the day and introduced Iverson, who told something of the duties of game wardens in conserving wild life. Sole revenue of the State Game and Fish Commission, Iverson related, was from hunters and fishermen. There are 183 wardens throughout the State whose duties are to enforce State game regulations.

To illustrate the attraction of lakes and outdoor spots, Iverson said that last July 4th there were 87,000 people at Possum Kingdom Lake.

Of particular interest to his hearers was Iverson's statement that only the general laws of the State apply to Paint Creek lake, which he described as a "Nice lake and one which everybody in this section should take pride in." He admonished that it was up to the people of Haskell County to keep the lake surroundings clean and attractive and predicted that it would become one of the popular recreation spots in this area. Relative to fishing, he said that lakes and ponds should be re-stocked every 5 or 6 years.

The game warden told Lions that quail and dove were due to be fairly plentiful this year in the Haskell area. He explained that the annual hatch of game

birds was an index to good or poor hunting seasons, pointing out that 87 per cent of doves killed each season are less than a year old.

He gave a graphic illustration of distance travelled by doves in telling that a dove banded in Throckmorton County was killed by a Mexican hunter below Guatamala, Old Mexico, 1800 air miles from the place where the bird was banded. The band taken from the bird was mailed to the Game Commission office in Austin with a brief note from the Mexican which read, "Please send reward." Iverson related in a humorous vein.

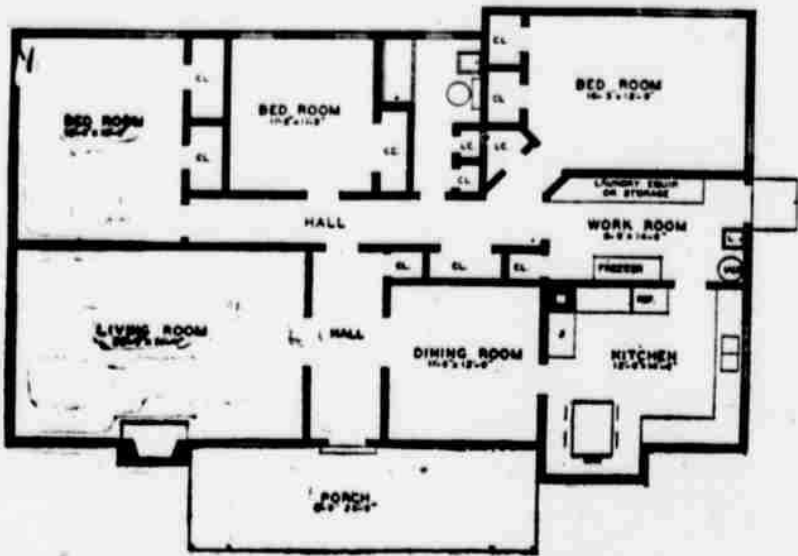

Haskell Man Saves Aged Rancher From Raging Grass Fire

A 75-year-old Clay County rancher was saved from possible death in a grass fire near Bowie last week by a Haskell man who had called at the rancher's home on business.

The near-victim was O. M. Shipp, rancher living near the little Clay County community of Newport, and the man credited with saving his life is Carl Wheatley, local oil lease broker and president of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce.

Shipp was burning grass on a small plot near his home when he suffered a heat stroke and fell in the path of the blaze. Minutes later Wheatley stopped at the Shipp home to see him on a business matter. Noticing the grass fire burning toward a barn and other buildings, with no one in sight, Wheatley investigated. As he approached the path of the flames he heard Shipp's groans and found the unconscious man.

Mrs. Shipp was in their home and knew nothing of the tragic accident. Wheatley summoned neighbors to help extinguish the fire and called an ambulance to remove the injured man to a Bowie hospital.

Vacancies Open For Highway Patrol Jobs

Captain G. L. Morahan, who commands the Abilene District of the Texas Highway Patrol, told the Free Press today that he is conducting a search for young men in this area who would like to become Texas Highway Patrolmen.

According to Captain Morahan, about 30 vacancies now exist in the Patrol Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, and examinations will be given during September to fill them. In the meantime, applicants have until midnight of August 25 to file for positions.

Captain Morahan said that you are eligible for one of the positions if you can meet the following conditions: You must be a male, between the age of 21 and 35 years, inclusive; not less than 5 feet 8 inches in height; and weighing not less than 2 pounds or more than 3 1/2 pounds per inch of height.

You must have a high school education or its equivalent and must be a citizen of the United States and resident of Texas for at least a year immediately prior to application. Finally, you must satisfactorily pass an exhaustive character and mental examination.

Salary of Patrolmen is \$305 per month with \$10 per month extra for each five years of service up to 15 years. An annual 2-weeks paid vacation is afforded, and uniforms and equipment are provided to all members of the Patrol.

**Cattle Prices Up
First of Week
At Fort Worth**

By TED GOULDY

Fort Worth—Again the week opened with moderate offerings of cattle and calves on hand at Fort Worth and the buying side was forced to pay strong to higher prices for virtually all cattle and calves.

Packer buyers furnished the major impetus in the trade and indications were that most of them needed supplies. Prices ranged from fully steady to strong, to as much as 50c higher on cattle and calves as a result of this situation.

There was a reliable demand for stocker and feeder cattle and calves which had some quality to recommend them, and some sales of these kinds shared the better market.

It has become obvious this month that despite the high temperatures and the fact that some sections of the Southwest are in critically dry shape, that the major part of the region is still in good enough position for grass and water to be able to market their cattle when they want to, instead of when they have to.

This situation, of course, does not always apply in those areas now classed as distress drought regions, however, it is significant that the first designation included only 23 counties, whereas, a year ago the Western two-thirds of Texas was set in the drought distress area on the first go-around.

Good fat steers and yearlings, \$18 to \$22, and plain to medium grassers drew \$10 to \$17, some cull kinds under \$10.

Fat cows sold readily from \$9 to \$12, a few heiferish kinds higher, canners and cutters drew mostly \$6 to \$9, few emaciated canners under \$6.

Best weighty bulls \$12 to \$13, with lighter and plainer kinds \$8 to \$11.50.

Good and choice fat calves \$14 to \$17, few fancy heavyweights around 600 lbs., above that, Common to medium sorts \$10 to \$13, with rannies from \$7 to \$10.

Good and choice stocker steer calves \$15 to \$19, with some load lots above that range. Stocker steer yearlings of good and choice kinds \$14 to \$17, few lightweights higher. Stocker heifers and heifer calves usually \$2 or more under comparable steers.

Pigs saved per litter in Texas this spring averaged 6.7, the highest on record. The total Texas spring pig crop is now estimated at 757,000 head and compares with the 10-year average of 1,254,000 pigs.

**Hogs Rally From
Year's Low at
Fort Worth**

Hogs topped at \$22.50 at Fort Worth Monday and with the good and choice variety selling at \$22 to \$22.50, that represented an advance over last week's close of 50 cents.

Hogs topped at \$22 on the previous Friday and this was the lowest point since November, 1953.

Sows were also steady to 50c higher selling at \$13 to \$18.

Hogs moving to market so far this month have been in unusually large numbers for the season, and there is considerable speculation as to whether the traditionally "high" summer market will develop this year in late summer. Some observers feel that the heavy offering of hogs in July this year foreshadow a crop of fall butcher hogs from the farrowing early this year and that prices of the year may already be past the high mark for 1954.

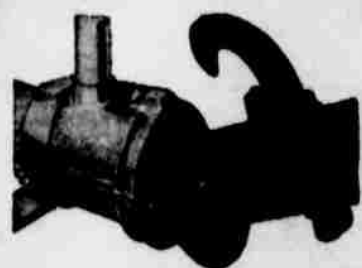

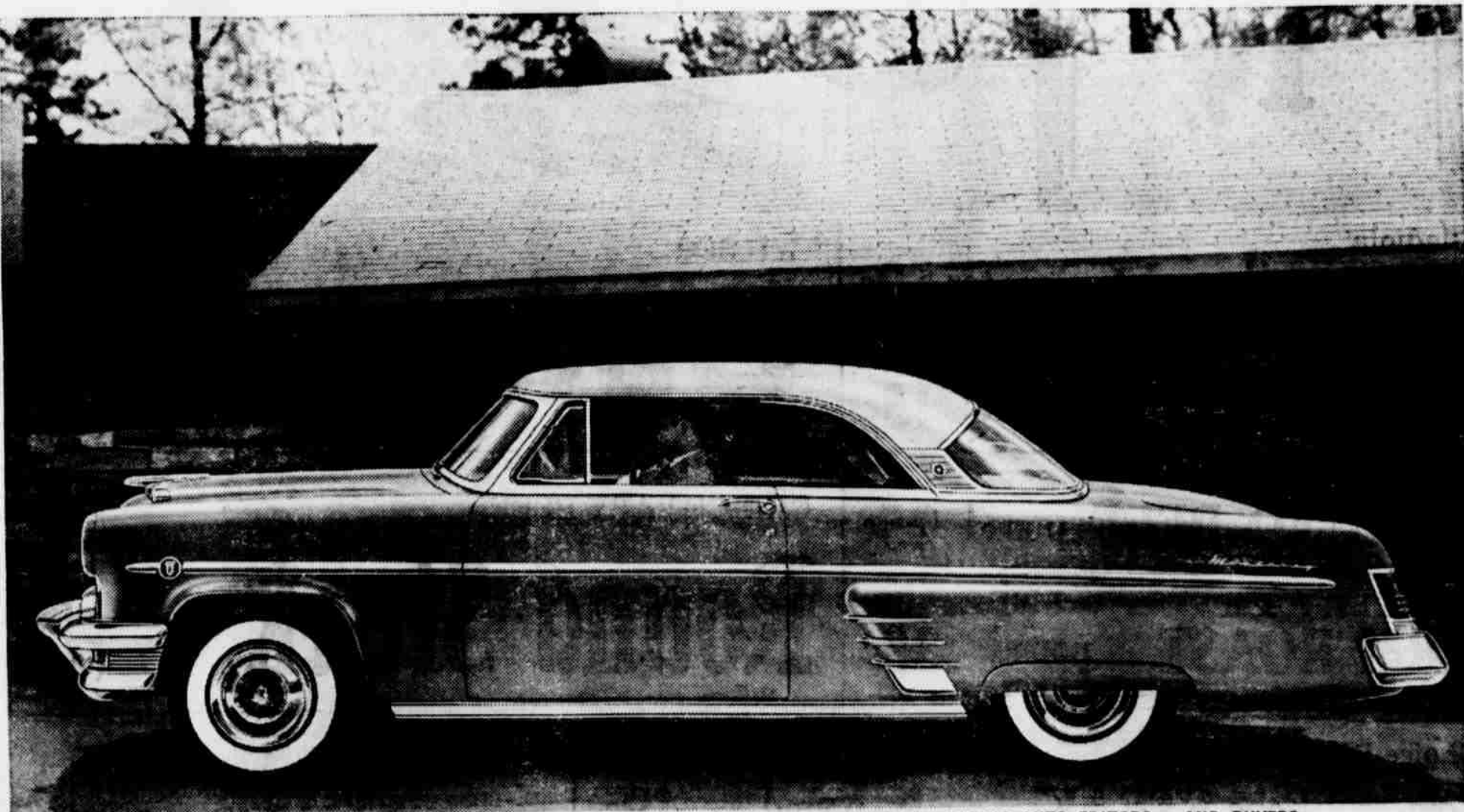

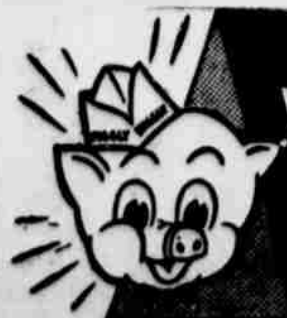
