Prince Sees Other Side Of Picture

NEWCASTLE, Eng., Jan. 30.—His heart heavy by the grim reality of poverty stricken homes in the mining regions, the Prince of Wales today continued his tour of the coal fields going to the Northumberland district.

"It makes one heart sick to see and hear of such conditions," said the prince, who one day is destined to be monarch of these regions as well as of the rich and well fed communities of the British realm.

The first call was at the Wallend training center where men in the despair of the mining villages are trying to become efficient at some other trade.

Going to another village consisting of 24 cottages, each containing one room and an attic, the prince accompanied a miner to his home. Stopping to enter, he learned that nine persons, six of them adults, lived there. It was then he spoke of being heart sick at such conditions.

The future king visited Mrs. McCann, a widow in whose family of eight only a lad of 15 is working. The prince met the boy returning from a mine, his broken shoes revealing his mud covered feet.

"Can't you get better shoes than those?" asked the prince. "We haven't been able to buy clothes for years," replied the youth.

LIVESTOCK ON SHORT COURSE STAGE

SESSIONS TO CLOSE AFTER MEET TODAY

REGISTRATION TOTALS 500 THROUGH TODAY; LECTURES FEATURE

Livestock this morning took the center of the stage of the first annual Farmers' Short Course of Texas Technological College which concludes its two-day session this afternoon.

Registration of the short course, the initial event of what is expected to become an annual institution, approximates 500, according to unofficial figures compiled by college authorities today. The total registration of both men and women yesterday was about 300, of which more than 200 were men. This morning 108 additional farmers from various sections of the South Plains registered for the second day's program.

Following the marked success of yesterday's session in dealing with general farm problems, today's program was concerned principally with livestock and animal husbandry discussions and demonstrations. All men's meetings are held in the Tech Livestock Judging pavilion and the women's sessions in the Home Economics building.

Demonstrations given Selection of livestock, including both lectures and demonstrations filled the morning's program. Professor W. L. Stangel, head of the Tech animal husbandry department, gave a brief introductory talk on livestock in general, then led the discussions and was in charge of the selection demonstrations in the sheep and beef cattle divisions. Ray C. Mowery, of the Tech animal husbandry department, talked on hog selection and directed the demonstration; and Dr. F. G. Harbaugh, of the same department, was in charge of the draft horses and farm work stock division.

The hog selection demonstrations were held from 9 until 10 o'clock with Durocs, Poland Chinas and Tamworth breeds represented. Sheep

WURZBACH IS LOSER IN RACE

CORRECTED RETURNS SHOW MCLOSKEY WON OFFICE

AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press) The returns from Guadalupe county in the returns from the vote from Bee county in the 14th congressional district race were authorized by the state canvassing board, today, the new totals showing Judge Augustus McCloskey of San Antonio with 319 votes more than Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach of Seguin.

Counsel for Wurzbach did not urge that the Guadalupe county correction be made giving the congressman 725 more votes than he was accredited with in the returns to the state to the exclusion of the Bee county returns which gave McCloskey a majority of 417, admitting that if either was permitted both should be considered.

Hugh Robertson, counsel for Wurzbach, made an effort to have the board reconsider the Bee county returns, alleging that they were illegal and fraudulent and did not show the true result there.

The board decided it had no authority to go behind the returns as certified to it by the Bee county commissioners.

LICENSE INSPECTOR IS BACK ON THE JOB IN LUBBOCK

John Kellar, measure and weight inspector of the state highway department, returned to Lubbock this morning following an absence of two weeks.

Arrest of motorists who are operating cars without 1929 license plates will begin immediately, Mr. Kellar said today. He stated that he had intended to begin the check of motorists sooner although other urgent business prevented it. The checking probably will begin today, it was intimated.

Up until noon today 7,175 cars had been registered in Lubbock county the records of Tax Collector A. J. Clark show. This is about 1,000 below the total number of registrations of last year.

With the car registration about completed, poll tax and other tax paying experienced a considerable increase this morning as citizens began the usual last minute rush. Taxes will become delinquent February 1 with a 10 per cent penalty added.

LIFE PENALTY GIVEN SMITH IS AFFIRMED

HIGH COURT UPHOLDS DECISION IN BANK CONSPIRACY CASE

AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—The life sentence for murder given Lee Smith in Callahan county, for his alleged participation in a slaying claimed by Texas Rangers to have been a conspiracy to collect bank robbery rewards offered by the Texas Bankers Association, was affirmed by the court of criminal appeals today.

The indictment charged Smith with murder of Hilario Nunez, one of three men shot while standing in front of the Home National bank of Stanton, Martin county. Two of the men were killed and one was wounded. The case was sent from Martin to Taylor county, thence to Callahan county on change of venue.

The court affirmed four and reversed and remanded two robbery by firearms cases.

Charles Knox's 25 year term assessed in Limestone county for alleged robbery of the First State bank at Tehuacana of \$1,600, was reversed and remanded.

Allen Demus, Midland county, lost his motion for rehearing on his appeal from the 10 year conviction for alleged murder of Arch Robb on March 14, 1927.

Twenty-Eight Lives Is Nicaragua Toll

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press) Twenty marines have been killed in action in Nicaragua, eight have died of wounds received in action, and 51 have been wounded. Major General John A. LeJeune, commandant of the marine corps, revealed these figures before a hearing of the house appropriations subcommittee on the navy department appropriation bill.

QUEER SUICIDE STORY QUIZZED

COUPLE JUMPED INTO RIVER; MAN SWAM TO SAFETY

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 30.—A perfume salesman's story of his survival of a suicide pact in which a woman was drowned was under scrutiny today.

As floating ice and low temperatures hampered efforts to retrieve the body of Miss Verna Klink, 30, from the Susquehanna river, police contemplated making a formal charge of murder against Harry Bowman, 39.

Bowman said that by agreement he and Miss Klink had jumped into the river, that the woman was drowned, but that the icy water had brought him to his senses and he had clung to safety.

The salesman was arrested with Miss Ethel Miller, 30. She was accused of carrying concealed weapons. He admitted having obtained \$1,025 from Miss Klink, part of \$1,700 which Mrs. Alma Esheim, mother of Miss Klink, had obtained by mortgaging her home to set up her daughter in business.

Shortage Of Water Is Caused By Cold

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press) Cold and snow, which continued to hold the Pacific Northwest today, have caused shortages in water, fuel and cattle fodder in widely separated areas of the northwest.

Shutting down of a score of lumber mills and logging camps in Grays Harbor, Western Washington has caused a crisis in hundreds of homes that cannot find fuel.

Cowboys on two ranges in upper Snake and Salmon River countries of Idaho got ready to start today on a three day trek to the lowlands with cattle which are facing starvation.

DEATH BLOW DEALT STATE ROAD BONDS

AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—The state-wide bond issue plan as advocated by two committees appointed by Governor Moody to recommend a legislative program which would insure a permanent connected system of state highways, was rejected by the house committee on constitutional amendments yesterday.

While the road legislation was receiving what will probably prove to be its death blow, the senate committee on privileges and elections was voting down five measures by Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas, leading bolter of the Democrats against the party presidential nominees, which would have forestalled any attempt on the

part of the party to punish those of its members who forsake it in the general election. The same committee reported favorably a bill by Senator Martin of Hillsboro designed to keep the names of "Hoovercrats" from the ballots in the 1930 as party candidates.

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Last Of Notorious Gang Is Slain In Gun Battle

EVERGLADE DESPERADO GOES DOWN WITH GUNS BLAZING

WEST PALM BEACH, Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press) When Haywood Register fell mortally wounded yesterday under a leaden hail from an ambush of officers, Sheriff Bob Baker finished a job he undertook four years ago when he set out to exterminate the notorious Ashley gang.

Register died with his boots on and with his guns blazing defiance at the officers who attempted to return him to the state penitentiary and a life sentence for murder.

The last of the gang of desperadoes who from their hidden retreats deep in the swamps of the Everglades preyed for years on the villages along the Florida coast, escaped last December 5 from the state penitentiary at Raiford.

Yesterday he walked into an ambush, arranged with the aid of a friend of Register whom the outlaw last Saturday held up and relieved of \$2,000.

The victim conferred with Sheriff Baker, and when he went to keep a rendezvous with Register near a canal at Boynton, 17 miles south of here, he was followed by Baker and his deputies. Baker, hidden behind a bush, called on Register to "throw up your hands."

Instead, Register whirled, a blazing pistol in each hand. He emptied three pistols at the five officers and was attempting to draw a knife when four bullets from the posse's pistols took effect.

The Ashley gang terrorized the lower east coast for many years, committing highway robberies and holding up banks, until four years ago, when Sheriff Baker and his deputies surprised the outlaws at Sebastian bridge near here. In the gun battle that ensued four of the gang were killed and several captured.

Republican Vote Cost State \$2000

AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press) It cost Texas about \$2,000 to cast its vote for the Republican presidential nominee. A bill appropriating \$2,000 or as much thereof as necessary to pay mileage and per diem of the 20 presidential electors who met in Austin recently to cast their ballots for Hoover and Curtis, was passed out by the house committee today.

LEBOUEFS ENTER NEW COURT PLEA

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 30.—With the noose waiting to claim their lives Friday, Mrs. Ada Bonner Leboeuf and Dr. T. F. Dreher, convicted of the slaying of the woman's husband today pinned their hopes for escape from death on a habeas corpus application in federal court.

Counsel for the condemned pair planned to apply for the habeas corpus writ before Judge Wayne G. Borah in federal district court today and to appeal to the Fifth United States Court of Appeals in case the writs are denied. The defense seeks appointment of a lunacy commission.

Mrs. Leboeuf and Dr. Dreher have been saved from the noose three times by reprieves.

DAMAGES ARE ASKED BY OIL SCOUT, HALL

POSSE AFTER BANDITS FIRED AT AUTOIST ON HIGHWAY

DALLAS, Jan. 30.—Believing he was being held up, E. V. Hall, Tom Green county oil scout, speeded up his automobile when a posse attempted to stop him on the highway near Justiceburg, Garza county, a year ago and received 37 gunshot wounds in his legs, he sets out in a petition for \$51,000 damages against two Garza county peace officers and others.

A bank had been robbed at Sylvestre, Fisher county, the day Hall was shot, defendants have said in their answering petition, and when Hall refused to stop and crouched down in his machine it was supposed he was one of the bank bandits. Several members of the posse were alleged to have fired into the automobile.

Harve Browning, alleged member of the posse, testified at yesterday's hearing, as did also Schuyler Marshall Jr., former sheriff of Dallas county, one of the defendants named by Hall. Marshall declared he was not a member of the posse and had no connection with the shooting. He and Gordon W. Kenney, he said, had been stopped by the posse just before Hall came along.

Other defendants are Constable J. C. Key, Deputy Constable Perry Crowley, Otto Nance, Elton Nance, Harve Browning, Jr., Carl Wood and Charles Bargesley, all of Garza county.

McCullom Sentence Affirmed By Court

The one year sentence of B. C. McCullom of this city, who was convicted of the sale of liquor about a year ago in the 99th District court here, today was affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin, according to advices received here this morning.

The firm of Blodose and Crenshaw, representatives of Mr. McCullom, this morning declared that a motion for a re-hearing would be filed.

Double Guards At Bailey Jail Cell

PEEOS, Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press) Friends of E. E. Bailey, alleged accomplice of Alvin "Doc" Pettibone, might attempt to deliver him, authorities posted a strong guard about the Reeves county jail last night. Bailey was arrested yesterday at Wink, oil town, on a forgery charge, but will be taken to Shreveport, La., for investigation in connection with an attempted bank holdup.

Grant Permission For Valley Route

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press) The St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexico Railroad obtained permission from the Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday to build ten miles of new railroad in Hidalgo county, Texas. The road will run from a point near Edcough to Weslaco, connecting with the Brownsville line's Mission branch at the latter point.

Lauderdale Countess Dies At Palm Beach

PALM BEACH, Fla., Jan. 30.—(By Associated Press) The Countess of Lauderdale died here today at her winter home, "Villa Azura."

TECH MAY OFFER AIR COURSE SOON

Possibility of the establishment of a class of aeronautics at Tech college by the next regular school session loomed nearer a possibility with the announcement this morning that the board of regents would ask the special session of the state legislation appropriations for this course.

According to Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college, this appropriation is not included in the emergency bill before the legislature at this time. It is planned to ask for appropriation to care for the salary of one professor in aeronautics and for the construction of a wind tunnel which will be used to give instruction in the various air currents encountered by a plane in flight.

The Texas Air Transport company has intimated establishment of a landing field here and the possibility of furnishing Tech college with certain facilities, including planes. If the desired appropriations are secured, the aeronautics course will be offered next September, Dr. Horn said.

WALES VISITS IN MINE AREA

PRINCE VIEWS SCENES OF POVERTY IN COAL FIELDS

NEWCASTLE, Eng., Jan. 30. (AP)—The Prince of Wales was heartily cheered by a big crowd when he visited the Northumberland coal fields, reputed to contain some of the blackest spots in the country. The weather was rather more favorable than yesterday.

The prince was deeply moved by some of the appalling conditions he saw yesterday and refused to leave the distribution depot until he was thoroughly satisfied that everything possible was being done to help the distressed people.

The prince is expected to make another appeal to the nation to continue support of the Lord Mayor's fund for relief of the distressed miners after the conclusion of his personal investigation.

LONDON, Jan. 30. (AP)—Brought face to face with scenes of sorrow and suffering such as he had never encountered before, the Prince of Wales sometimes had difficulty in finding words to express his sympathy in his tour of the Northern coal fields.

This was illustrated by an incident at Winstanley where he was visiting the cottage of a miner who had been without work for three years. The prince was struck by the evidences of extreme poverty.

"You must find it very difficult to live," he said to the miner's wife. Describing the visit afterward, she said: "He didn't seem able to say much. He just looked around and his voice sounded broken-like."

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PRODUCTION AT NEW HIGH MARK

CRUDE OUTPUT KEEPS UP SHARP TREND TOWARD TOP

(By Associated Press)

ULSA, Okla., Jan. 30.—Continued the sharp upward trend which marked crude production during past month, the estimated daily production of oil in the United States set a new high mark this week ending Jan. 28. The estimated daily production was 17,956 barrels, 17,826 barrels more than for the week ending Jan. 19, according to the Oil and Gas Jour-

The new record is attributed to continued increase of production of oil which for some time has gained constant. Santa Fe shows production during the week ended 15,000 barrels daily. The total United States increased 931 barrels daily. Despite an approximate increase of 2,500 barrels daily in the Greater Oklahoma area during the week, Oklahoma production remained virtually constant. West Virginia registered an increase of about 2,000 barrels daily. Midcontinent daily production increased about 1,900 barrels.

Coast and Southwest Texas oil increased noticeably to the heavy oil average. California light oil increased approximately 12,000 barrels daily.

Water Survey Along Pecos River

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—An appropriation of \$25,000 for a survey to determine the best method of using waters of the Pecos river in New Mexico and to find a site for building a dam, was introduced today by Representative Hudspeth of Texas. The measure also would provide for a federal appropriation to be met from a similar amount from the state of Texas or other local sources.

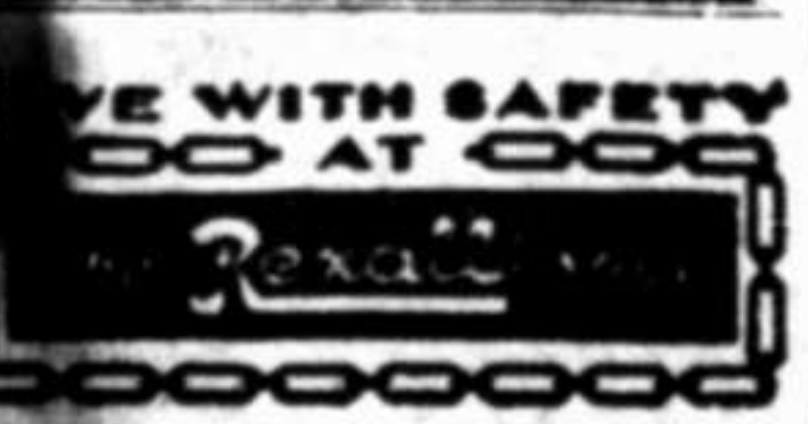

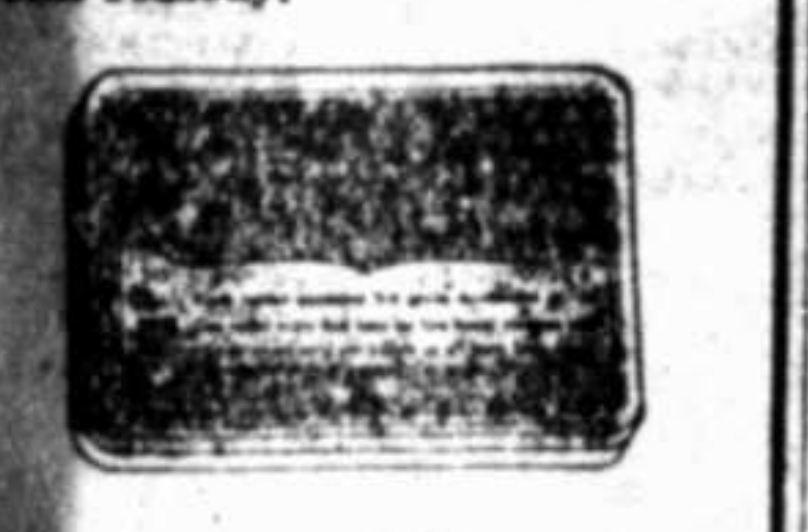

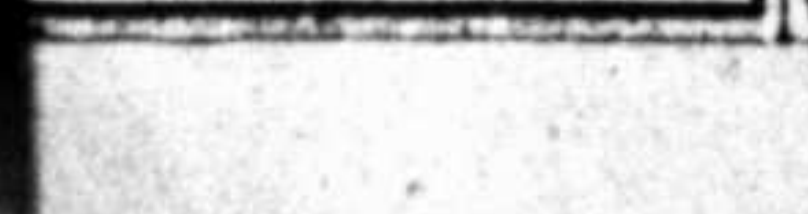

Nibs Price Played Rugby But Not Football

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 30. (P)—Coach C. M. (Nibs) Price, who took his place this season among the best of Pacific coast gridiron mentors, started off on his coaching career here in 1916 without the usual qualification of having played football.

A few more pages of the life of this 38 year old University of California coach must be turned back to get a clear insight of his career's beginning. Back during the days when football at California meant rugby in knee pants, a little fellow about five feet five inches in height, and weighing not more than 120 pounds, turned out for practice. He learned a lot of rugby before he graduated in 1914. A spell in the army followed.

He came to this extreme southwestern corner of the country in 1916 to take over the coaching reins at San Diego high school. In his third year he produced an outfit that swept through all opposition and was declared the best prep team in the state. Whereupon the coaching fraternity sat up and took notice and the result was that Price was offered by the University of California a job coaching a game he had never played. He was just as successful leading the bear cubs as he was at San Diego.

The rise of Price at the Berkeley institution from that date on is an open book to gridiron fans.

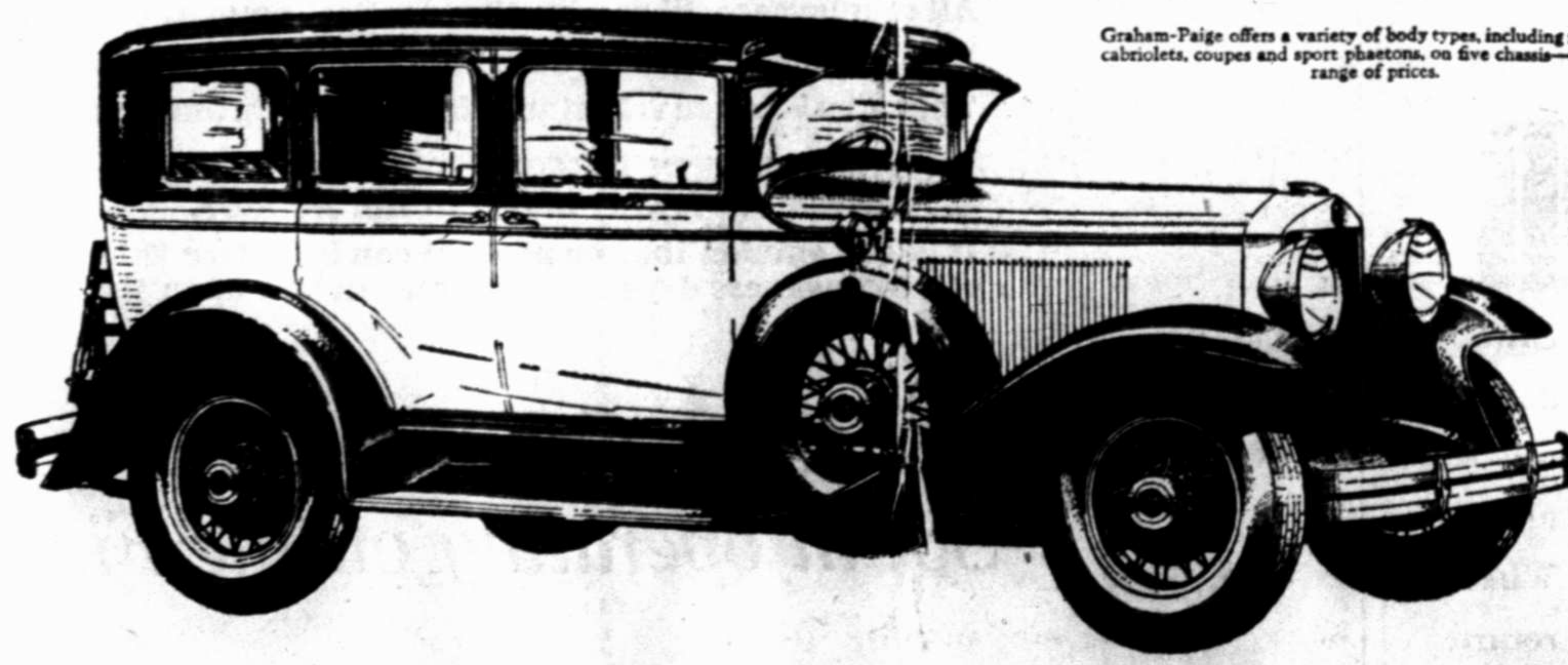

SENATE WILL HALT DEBATE

PATH IS CLEARED FOR FINAL VOTE OVER CRUISER BILL

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Agreeing to apply the brakes on debate of the long pending cruiser construction bill next Monday, the senate has assured a vote on this bill and apparently cleared the way for disentanglement of its legislative calendar before March 4 adjournment. An agreement unanimously entered into late yesterday calls for limitation of debate on the cruiser measure beginning Monday and Senator Curtis of Kansas, the republican leader, who negotiated the understanding believes a final vote can be taken Monday night.

Meanwhile the senate will discuss President Coolidge's request for elimination of the clause requiring a start on all of the proposed 15 cruisers and airplane carrier within two years. Friends of the bill passed a year ago by the house insist they have the votes to defeat the president.

Another contest is in prospect over moves to cut down the authorization for cruisers from 15 to 10 or to 5, but the big navy men are confident of defeating these attacks.

The debate limitation agreement is believed to have signalled the collapse of the battle against the cruiser bill, and during the remainder of the week, senate leaders hope to get work done on some of the stack of necessary appropriation bills which have piled up as the senate argued over the Kellogg antiwar treaty and the naval construction program.

An overture from the president was sent yesterday in word from the White House that Mr. Coolidge would send an immediate budget recommendation to congress for a start on construction of the cruisers if he is given control over the naval program he asks.

SPANISH REVOLT SPEEDILY QUELLED

MUTINY SQUELCHED IN FIFTEEN HOURS WITHOUT SINGLE SHOT FIRED, AND NO INJURIES

(By Associated Press)
CIUDAD REAL, Spain, Jan. 30.—The mutiny of the first artillery regiment, comprising eight hundred officers and men and 28 light field pieces, lasted but fifteen hours without a single shot being fired or anyone harmed.

As the sun broke over the city the regiment left its quarters under command of its officers. Shortly afterward Colonel Paz, commander of the regiment and Lieutenant Colonel Britz, his aide, went to provincial police headquarters. They informed the police chief he must surrender and return to your quarters and which may result in impeachment charges.

The Frontier

The men whose lives connected
modern America with its colorful old
western frontier are passing rapidly
and each time one goes the news
paper announcements of the fact
are tinged with regret.

Wyatt Earp, who wore—and used
—his two six-shooters in the days
when Dodge City, Kan., was a cen-
ter of picturesque lawlessness, is
the latest of the old-timers to
pass on. A few days before he
went Tex Rickard died—and Tex
for all that he was identified with
the ultra-modern business of large-
scale boxing, really belonged to the
old frontier.

The old frontier seems very re-
mote to us now, but it is still amaz-
ingly close in point of time. Though
their number is diminishing fast,
there are still men who can recall
the mad, bad days of Deadwood,
Tombah and Dodge City, and the
wild frenzy of the Klondike is still
a memory to a great many.

But we have moved away from
the things those names symbolize
faster than the calendar would in-
dicate. Wyatt Earp, Dodge City
peace officer, was not an extreme
old man when he died; yet the
Dodge City he knew is in reality,
as remote from modern America as the
Boston of 1776. A whole cycle of
history has been compressed into
the last 50 years. The country has
lived extremely fast. Processes of so-
cial evolution that ordinarily take
centuries have been compressed into
decades.

It is not without significance that
the death of every man whose life
was identified with those old fron-
tier days is chronicled in the news
paper. We have a more or less
subconscious regret at the speed
with which the old days are rushing
back into the past. Life on the
frontier was hard, wild and tumul-
tuous and it never fostered the soft-
ness and ease of the modern era.
Straightforward and comparatively
simple, it had none of the bewilder-
ment that the decade since the
World War has brought.

Probably we outgrow it faster
than we grow it. We are geared to the
tempo of leisurely, obvious social era,
we have plunged down into the mid-
dle of an era that is hurried and
complex. Unconsciously, we try to
solve our present problems by stand-
ards that were devised for an earlier
day. Men who grew up in a day of
horse-drawn buggy transportation are
compelled to spend their maturity
amid automobiles and airplanes.

This, as much as anything, is
responsible for the turmoil and be-
wilderment that are so apparent in
modern life. Things come a little too
fast for us. We read of the death
of a man like Wyatt Earp with a
 pang because we feel, deep down,
that we are somehow better fitted
for his day than our own.

The generation now growing up
will see things differently. It will
be used to the age of machinery
from the cradle and will be able to
cope with it without giving way to
doubt and perplexity. Instead of
having to adjust human life to me-
chanics it will be able to adjust me-
chanics to human life. For that
reason we can look to the future
with hope. We ourselves are in a
bit of a muddle, but its only
natural. We're still close to the
frontier.

fied voters of this county. Better
rush over to the tax collector's
office today and get it over with
for tomorrow there will be a
great rush.

And there seems to be quite a
shortage in the number of automo-
biles being registered in the county,
too. Something like two thousand
are still out, and the number is
not likely to reach the number regis-
tered last year. After the first day of Feb-
ruary it will be your fault if the
highway officer runs you in for the
violation of the registration law of
the state.

The highway officers have been
very lenient with the automobile
drivers of this county this year.
They have given a whole month to
secure licenses for the car you own
and if you have not secured one,
it will be your fault if you are brought
before the officials of the county on
a charge of violation of the license
laws of the state.

tite. But it is much better for one
to take the foods containing this
vitamin, for in this way other val-
uable elements are taken also. The
foods high in vitamin B are: Yeast
and yeast extracts, tomatoes (raw,
canned or dried), spinach, cabbage,
beans.

One cake of yeast is 20 calories.
"During the early part of this

she came down pretty hard. She had
terrible pains in her stomach the

some blood passed from her. She
noticed it for two days, but now it
has stopped."

that could be cancer of the womb,
or if you think it was the result of
the jolting she got? When cancer
of the womb is present, does blood
pass?

Any passing of blood for other
discharge (after the menopause)
should be investigated, A. for it is
one of the symptoms of cancer.
It may also be a symptom of
some other condition that is not
cancerous, but the thing to do is to
have an examination immediately
so that treatment can be given.
It may be possible that your mother's
jolt caused some little injury. In
any case, heed my advice.

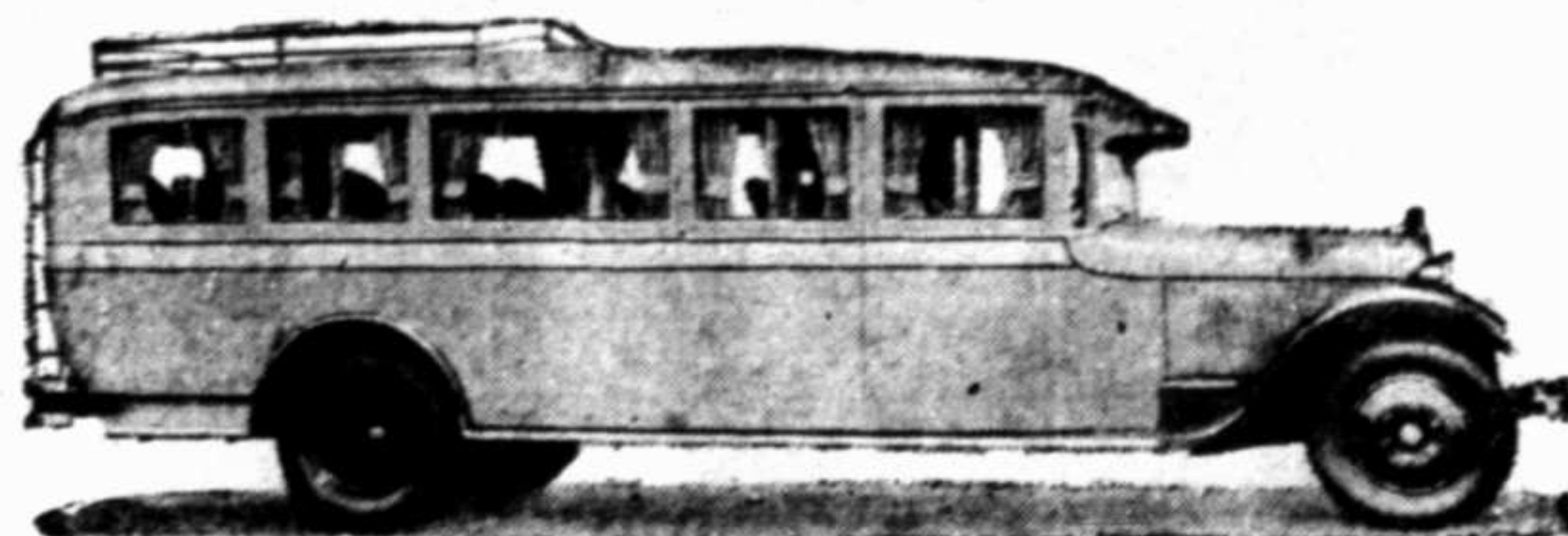

LEGISLATURE PRIES DEEPER

PUT FINISHING TOUCH TO CASE AGAINST JOHNSTON

(By Associated Press)

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 30.—The legislature delved deeper today into governmental activities of Oklahoma's official family and put final touches on its case against Henry S. Johnston, suspended governor, who goes before a senate impeachment court tomorrow to answer articles of impeachment.

In a session marked by belligerent argument, the house yesterday added three charges to the eight to which Johnston will plead, two dealing with the illegal issuance of deficiency certificates and one charging general incompetency.

Testimony before the house committee has been sprinkled liberally with sensational testimony and rumors, the most recent being the statement of a representative that he had heard the governor discharge Mrs. O. O. Hammonds, confidential secretary, on the day he was removed temporarily from office. Johnston refused to comment on the report, but Mrs. Hammonds denied it.

Criticizes Court

Strong criticism of the state supreme court and particularly of Charles W. Mason, chief justice who will preside over the impeachment trial of Johnston was heard from M. E. Trapp, former governor testifying before a house sub-committee investigating courts. Trapp told the committee that during his administration Chief Justice Mason, then a member of the court, asked him to instruct the highway commission to specify the use of bricks for road construction in Nowata county, Mason's home county. Trapp told the committee he understood Mason was to receive one dollar per thousand from a "brick combination," for bricks used. In turn, Trapp said, the supreme court justice proposed to aid him with a case then before the supreme court, in which he was interested. Trapp said he refused the proposal. Chief Justice Mason, in a statement issued after Trapp's testimony said there was no foundation for Trapp's charge, and declared it was inspired by a supreme court decision adverse to Trapp.

Robison Land Suit Decision Tomorrow

AUSTIN, Jan. 30 (P)—A decision in the Robison land suit will be handed down by Judge J. D. Moore of the Travis county district court tomorrow, it was announced today.

J. T. Robison, land commissioner, and several intervenors are resisting a permanent injunction sought by the state, joined by the regents of the University of Texas, to prevent sale of oil and gas rights in University lands advertised for sale last January 2.

Constitutionality of the law passed by the present legislature on January 11 taking all mineral rights off the market is involved.

Manton Davis, vice president of the Radio Corporation of America, charged that the commission had declared its intention of creating monopoly by making the award the Universal interests.

FIND BODY OF UNBORN CHILD

DOG SCRATCHES AWAY DIRT ON SHALLOW GRAVE IN FIELD

Buried only six inches below the ground, the body of an unborn child was uncovered by a dog yesterday afternoon in a cotton field, two and one-half miles northwest of this city.

The infant was wrapped neatly in a cloth, and the footprints leading from the shallow grave to the highway had been partially covered over. These footprints and a laundry mark, which officers refused to divulge, were the only clues upon which the sheriff's department had to work.

Positive proof was found that the body had been buried the previous night. Officers took the body and buried it yesterday under orders of Dr. W. L. Baugh, county health officer. According to City Health Officer Dr. J. W. Rollo the body was perfectly formed, and indicated a development of about five months. The body was discovered when a dog owned by W. E. Dooley who was pulling bolts in the field with O. W. Weed, began scratching it up. The workmen notified officers immediately. Pictures were taken of the footprints found and officers stated that the investigation would continue.

a primary if, after the primary, he finds he cannot conscientiously support the nominee.

The house committee voted against two resolutions proposing constitutional amendments, one proposing a \$225,000,000 bond issue and the other a \$175,000,000 issue. The first represented the recommendations of the governor's committee of 31 which discussed highway financing prior to convening of the legislature, and the other embodied the results of the deliberations of the second committee of seven.

The bond issue amendment was espoused before the committee by Judge W. O. Higgins of Houston; Representative R. M. Hubbard of New Boston, former member of the highway commission; Representative W. H. Beck, of Fort Worth, and Clarence Ousley of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The vote, taken in executive session, was announced as 10 to 5.

In the senate committee meeting on the Love bills, Alvin Moody of Houston, chairman of the anti-Tammany Democrats of Texas, and Mrs. Claude De Van Watts of Austin, president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, advocated the "freedom of conscience" measure.

Love stated that the Democratic party would be transformed into a wet party if the 250,000 dry Democrats who voted for Hoover last November were driven from it.

The senate passed the Hornsby bill making chicken stealing a felony. A senate committee killed Senator McFarlane's Anti-Lobbying measure.

HAWAIIAN AVIATOR IS FORCED DOWN SOON FOLLOWING START

(By Associated Press)
ROOSEVELT FIELD, NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Unable to gain altitude in an attempt to establish a new solo endurance flight in which he was using automobile gasoline, Martin Jensen, Hawaii flier, made a forced landing on the beach of North Shore of Long Island today.

A telephone message was received from him shortly before 1 o'clock, however, saying he had been unable to get his ship up and had to land on the beach near Northport.

He suffered no injury and the plane was undamaged, Jensen said, but the tide was coming in and he feared the plane might be submerged.

He barely got up from the end of the long runway and missed the telephone wires at the edge of Curtis field by inches. He disappeared over the Sound to begin shutting back and forth between Boston and Washington.

Jensen, barnstormer and flying instructor, first won general fame when he came in second to Arthur Goebel in the tragic Dole air race to Hawaii.

CRIPPLED SHIP SAFE IN PORT

FREIGHTER DRIFTED AT SEA, HELPLESSLY FOR THREE DAYS

(By Associated Press)
BOSTON, Jan. 30.—The disabled British freighter Silver Maple was safely in port today, after she had drifted helplessly in heavy seas for 250 miles since last Saturday.

The United States coast guard Cutters Tampa and Mojave reached the crippled vessel yesterday after a 900-mile dash from New England waters, and they started towing her to Bermuda, 480 miles away. Her rudder was disabled.

Meanwhile hope was revived for the missing trawler Seiner and her crew of 20. The destroyers Shaw, Davis and Wilkes acted on a report that a trawler resembling the Seiner was seen last Sunday drifting 12 miles southwest of Nantucket shoals.

Help was on the way today to the Norwegian freighter Terne, caught in the ice off Priar's Head, Nova Scotia, for nine days. The government steamer Sydney was dispatched from Halifax after Captain Bjornst of the Terne wireless his water supply was running low.

Another ship made good its escape from the winter perils of the Atlantic when the New Bedford dragger William H. Killigrew was towed into port here by the trawler Kingfisher after she had drifted helpless for eight hours last Sunday 165 miles southwest of Highland Light. A 60-mile an hour gale first swept her nets into her propeller and then twice parted the tow line which held her to the Kingfisher.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. (P)—The senate interstate commerce committee devoted several hours again today to hearings on the nomination of Pat M. Neff, former governor of Texas, to be a member of the railroad board of mediation but no decision was reached.

The time was consumed largely by argument of certain Texas labor unions against the nomination on the ground that Neff is not temperamentally suited to sit as a mediator in labor disputes.
