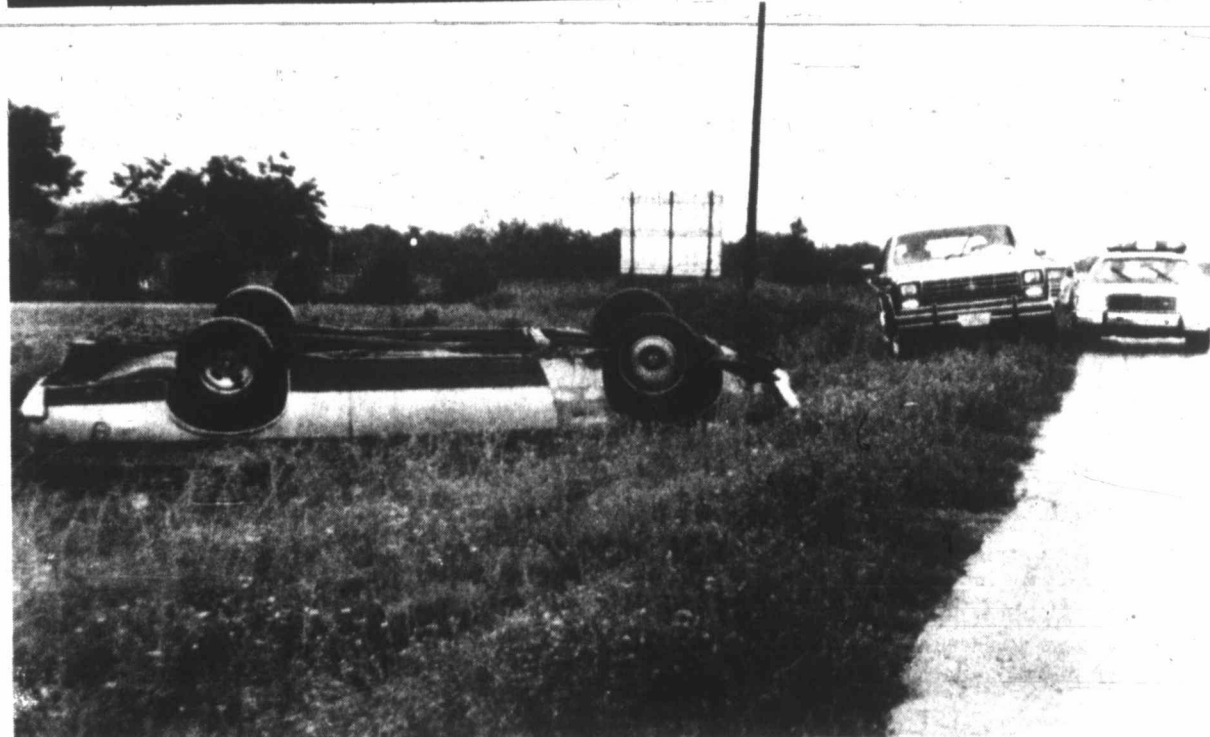

Rain slick streets result in accidents

Rain and slick roads were the cause of several traffic accidents here last Friday and Sunday.

On July 8 about 1:50 p.m. the City's refuse collection truck failed to negotiate a turn from Highway 208 onto CR 141, apparently due to faulty brakes, skidded into a ditch and rolled on its side. The driver, Epifanio Mendoza, was not hurt but workers Jose Pilar and Isidro Haro received minor injuries. Henson Wrecker Service of Big Spring had to be called to upright the truck.

Also Friday at 3:07 p.m. a 1986 Dodge sedan driven by Billy Bob Hardee of Colorado City, backed out of a parking space at Eddie's Pharmacy parking lot, 1000 block of Hickory, and collided with a 1986 Chrysler, owned by Inez Shephard Howell of Colorado City, which was parked in the next space.

Sunday, July 10 at 7:30 p.m., a 1972 Ford pickup driven by Eusebio Garcia, Jr. of Colorado City, was traveling east bound on the south I20 service road. It apparently hit some puddles of water, went out of control into a ditch and overturned on its top. The driver was injured but the pickup had to be removed by Dossey Wrecker Service.

Later Sunday, about 10:50 p.m., a 1978 Chrysler sedan, owned by Adelada Deleon of Sweetwater, whose driver was unknown, failed to make a turn off Cedar Street onto East 3rd, due to wet street, went through the intersection and hit a dirt mound.

Mitchell County acreage included in vet land sale

A track of land in Mitchell County is included in the next Texas Veterans Land Board forfeited land sale that is scheduled August 31.

Some 386 tracts, ranging in size from five acres to 53 acres, located in 119 Texas counties will be offered in the sale, exclusively to eligible Texas veterans, with no down payment.

The Mitchell County track is 20 acres, located about 2 miles south off Highway 208. Minimum bid is \$18,941.

The Texas Veterans Land Board will finance the entire loan amount of winning bids. There is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However, eligible Texas veterans are limited to one land purchase in the sale.

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said, "I want to encourage all eligible Texas veterans who have been looking for quality rural land to take advantage of this sale. These tracts have never been offered for sale by the board and for the first time in our

history, we are financing 100% of the loan on forfeited tracts."

Mauro noted that these tracts of land are offered exclusively to eligible Texas veterans because the Board has always given Texas veterans the first chance to buy forfeited tracts. If any of the tracts do not sell in this sale, they will be offered to the general public in the next sale.

Eligible Texas veterans will receive an 8.75 percent interest rate with a 30-year assumable fixed-rate loan. A \$25 non-refundable bid fee for each bid submitted has been set by the board.

The sale will be by sealed bid only, with the minimum bid set by the Texas Veterans Land Board. All bids must be received by August 31 at 1 p.m. Any and all bids received after that time and date will be rejected.

FROM THE SCRIPTURES—"Buy the truth and do not sell it..." Proverbs 23:23.

I never cease to be amazed at the amount of money that is offered in various sporting events—

\$20 million to a heavyweight boxer, \$150,000 the the winner of a golf tournament each week, \$200,000 to \$300,000 for a tennis match or a bowling tournament.

Just as astounding are some of the prizes offered in numerous bass tournaments. Longview's Big Bass Classic recently offered \$105,000 first place money. More than \$60,000 was in the offering for the best catch at an Abilene bass tournament, and there are others every week.

Fishermen are sometimes known for their "big fish" stories. But with the big money in the offering, some have had a tendency to exaggerate a bit more than necessary. In the Longview tournament, a man was charged with attempted felony theft by fraud when he brought a 7.64-pound bass to the scales with lead weights in the fish's stomach. Without the .66 pounds of lead weight, the fish would have taken the \$25,000 second-place money. In another Texas tournament, a man brought an 8.61-pound Florida bass to the weigh-in. He, too, was convicted of

fraud. It was getting so bad that a state law was enacted in 1985 to deal with cheating in bass fishing tournaments. Nowadays, temperature and metal detector tests are often used, and the big fish are cut open for examination. Fortunately, most of the fishermen are honest.

This brings around today's fish story. A fisherman had run out of bait and was headed back for more, when a large fish leaped out of the water near shore. He scrambled for any scrap of bait, but none could be found in the boat. Then he spotted a snake on the bank with a frog in its mouth. The fisherman jumped out, grabbed the snake and wrenched the frog from its mouth. To mollify the snake, the fisherman took out his flask and poured a couple of nips of bourbon into its mouth. He quickly affixed the frog to his hook and began casting out where he'd seen the big fish surface.

Council has busy agenda; Councilman Don Webb to resign

After wading through a lengthy agenda of important matters requiring considerable discussion and action Tuesday night, the City Council was surprised to hear of the intended resignation of Councilman Don Webb.

Webb, who has served on the Council for three and a half years, was just informed of his appointment as Postmaster at Rotan effective July 16, and would have to move there within a year. He has been a long-time resident of Colorado City, but has been Postmaster at Loraine. His formal resignation will be on the agenda for the next Council meeting and in the meantime, the Council will be considering a replacement.

Action taken at the busy meeting included:

- Acceptance of the low bid of \$14,230.00 submitted by Hutchins Ford for a new police car. Only other bid received was from Joe Weaver Chevrolet for \$15,063.49; • Four bids were received for a new health and

hospitalization program. The investigating committee's recommendation was approved by the Council to accept the program offered by The Hartford Co. through the Texas Municipal League. Other programs were offered by Williamson & Steakley Insurance of Snyder for programs by BSC Life Insurance, Time Insurance and Blue Cross & Blue Shield.

- Approved a negotiation contract with Mid-West Co. of Abilene, represented by Bob McCathren, for possible erection of an outdoor advertising sign in the 200 block of Hickory on City property. Details of the space lease arrangement will be worked out with the City Manager and inspector.

- Approved a contract for \$6,800, to be paid in four installments, for a complete Municipal Ordinance Codification Service, submitted by a former City Assistant City Manager, Jack Russell.

County appoints election judges; takes seal coat bid

Mitchell County Commissioners Court appointed election judges and accepted the lowest of two bids for seal coating as the main business of its regular meeting Monday afternoon.

The election judges appointed for the upcoming August 13 special election for State Senator as well as the November general election are as follows:

Prec. 1, Courthouse, Arlene Morris, judge; Louise Sweat, alternate.

Prec. 2, Westbrook School Tax Office, Douglas Barber, Keith Williamson.

Prec. 3, Housing Authority Community Center, J. M. Munoz, Jr. and Marie Jackson.

Prec. 4, Ag. Building, Loraine, Neysa Beights and Sally Compton.

Prec. 7, Oak St. Baptist Church Annex, Billie Ruffin and Juanita Vest.

Absentee Box, County Clerk's Office, Bob Ratliff and Bob Reilly.

Since a small turnout is anticipated for the Aug. 13 special election, Judge Bill Carter was authorized to check with the elec-

tion officials about combining Prec. 1-3-7, boxes to one voting place at the Courthouse, in order to save election expenses.

Two bids received for requested seal coating needs for roads in Precinct 1 and 2, were received from Nobles Road Construction of Colorado City and Jones Bros. Dirt and Paving of Odessa. The Court accepted Jones Bros. low bid of 61 cents per square yard for approximately 70,000 square yards needed for the project, a saving of approximately \$2,800 over Nobles bid of 65 cents per square yard.

In other business, the Court: • Authorized payment of current bills, totaling \$155,100.18; • Approved the current two-week payroll in the amount of \$38,512.07.

• Authorized payment of \$240 for travel and housing expenses for a local child scheduled for treatment at the Texas Crippled Children's Hospital, which will be reimbursed by Department of Human Services. On the subject, Judge Carter reported that the Texas Department of Human Services had spent an average of \$216,368 per month for various services in Mitchell County.

• Approved monthly reports from the various county offices.

• Turned down a request from Fire Chief Gary Parker, who had requested financial help to repair a fireman's vehicle damaged while pulling a stuck fire truck out of mud.

• Authorized Sheriff Wendell Bryant to attend a Sheriff's Conference in Lubbock, July 24-27.

• Called a public meeting for next Tuesday, July 19 at 9 a.m. for the 1989 Budget Workshop.

Russell pointed out the many cost and time advantages and other benefits that would be gained since the current Codes had not been updated since 1976. Loraine Mayor Catarino of Loraine was also present for the presentation.

At a public hearing, the Council approved the rezoning of lots at the corner of 9th and Hickory—the old Wallace Place—from business back to two-family residential zone, that had been requested by neighboring property owners.

Ron Goebel presented the preliminary plans for modifications of the City Hall and Police Station to meet required handicap person access and facilities. Modifications included reserved parking area, a ramp to the City Hall porch, a new easy-to-open door, new service counter, widened corridor, an auto/visual area to be eventually replaced with an elevator, and new restroom facilities. Police Station would require only a curb ramp, front door and restroom facilities, as would the Museum if included in the project. Goebel estimated the cost to be between \$28,000 and \$30,000. Council agreed to proceed with the project and authorized Goebel to draw up the plans and specification for seeking bids.

A new contract for the period July 1, 1988-December 31, 1989 was approved with Mitchell County Appraisal District, based on the City's proportionate share of the District's operating budget.

Authorized an expenditure of approximately \$1,600 for examination by Insituform Co. to pin-point the sewer line problems being experienced in the alley next to the Record Office, as well as in the Housing Authority area. Repair needs will be considered later.

Approved a 5-year Capital Improvement Plan totaling \$3,984,100 for planned improvements, including \$229,420 already budgeted in 1988, \$206,420 in 1989; \$208,920 in 1990; \$3,181,920 in 1991; and \$157,420 in 1992. The plan was submitted by Tom Carlock, Dee Hearn and former Councilman Dan Johns, as well as city employees who had worked for several months on the plan. Details of the lengthy document will be reported in the next issue of *The Record*.

Approved the monthly

report of the Mitchell County Ambulance Service, although the services financial statement was unavailable due to a computer breakdown.

Agreed to reimburse the Fire Department approximately \$1,500 it had paid for a fireman's truck that was damaged when pulling out the County-furnished fire truck, which was threatened by a spreading tank battery fire, while stuck in the mud.

Approved Secretary Kay Craghead's financial report which showed June revenue of \$89,914.13 to the Water & Sewer Fund and \$99,211.62 to the General Fund. Current balances in the funds are \$102,472.18 and \$291,542.95 respectively.

And in final action approved current vouchers totaling \$66,286.52.

OTHER BUSINESS

Other items that came up for discussion by the Council was a presentation by Kenneth Rogers and other members of the Airport Board, recommending the renovation of the old fire station building at the Municipal Airport into a Pilot Lounge to contain comfortable furnishings, restroom facilities, refreshment center, pay telephone. Estimated cost of the project would be about \$6,500, and would greatly enhance the airport facility and increase the utilization of the airport. A large canopy to facilitate the annual fly-in, as well as regular mowing, weed control, sweeping of runways and taxiways and widening and paving of a connecting taxiway were also recommended by the Airport Board.

Council members generally agreed that the Airport had not been a high priority project, but recognized the benefits of the Airport to the community and area and need to prevent deterioration. And if it could be shown some documentation of the present and potential utilization and surveys to justify the expenditure of tax dollars, the recommendations could be given future consideration.

REPORTS

In her City Manager report, Brenda Hammond stated that efforts are going to be made to lower the Key Rate for fire insurance in Colorado City. The rate is now 32 cents and it is believed it could be lowered to the 20 to 25 cents area by proper documentation and meeting numerous provision available without a great deal of expense.

Council was strongly in favor of seeking a lower Key Rate noting the potential savings to local property owners. Mayor Jim Baum appointed Tom Carlock, Bob Reily and Dee Hearn to a committee to study the Key Rate provisions.

The City Manager also reported:

Problems experienced with two trucks down that have interrupted garbage collection, but they were back in service and trying to catch up.

The flag poles at the City Hall and Civic Center have been painted.

After reporting that the State Health Department no longer required restaurant employee health cards, the Council agreed to discontinue this requirement by the City.

Had Water Superintendent David Sanders display new "Leak Locator" equipment that had been purchased to facilitate finding water leaks; and also complimented the department on extra work required with system problems last week.

Mayor Jim Baum reported the prospect of the construction of possibly 32 more units at the

Colorado City Apartments by Calhoun Builders, Inc. of Mansfield, LA. If there is no strong opposition or resistance to the project, about all that would be needed would be rezoning of approximately 3 acres just east of the present complex.

Councilman Webb reported on the initiation of the county-wide Emergency Management Plan that has been mandated by the federal government. Some 60 persons have been appointed to the committee that he chairs to draw up the emergency plan.

He also asked about permission for razing an old building by the Law Enforcement group and if permission cannot be obtained from the property owner, another similar project was requested.

Other councilmen inquired about some reported water problems, the delay in the cemetery survey and plat, and mosquito spraying needs.

Councilmen Rex Thackerson and Howard Nelson were absent from the meeting. Several other citizens with interest in the matters before the Council were present.

The question of discharging air rifles and BB guns is a common concern which comes into City Hall frequently.

COLORADO CITY CODE, Sec. 13. UNLAWFUL TO DISCHARGE GUNS, AIR RIFLES IN CITY. Any person who discharges any gun, pistol, or firearm of any kind, or who discharges an air rifle or air pistol of any description, by whatever name known, that by means of compressed air, compressed gas, springs, or any other means is capable of discharging shots, pellets, or any solid object for a distance of fifty (50) feet or more from the point of discharge, on, across, through, into, or against any private property of any description, on or across any public square, street, or alley, or within one hundred (100) yards of any business house within the City Limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished as provided in Section 13-24 of this article up to one hundred dollars (\$100.00). This section, however, shall not apply to any policeman or other peace officer in the actual discharge of his official duty; nor shall the provisions of this section apply to any person operating or assisting in the operation of any shooting gallery or other place designed for practice with any of the instrumentalities named in this section where the location and manner of construction of any such shooting gallery or other place designed for such practice is approved by the City Council of the City after hearing evidence satisfactory to it.

Any person who shall aid, assist or abet any other person in violation of any provision of this article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to the same fine. (This Ordinance was passed and approved in 1958).

TU buys nuclear plant share

DALLAS - TU Electric has agreed to purchase the 3.8 percent share of the Comanche Peak nuclear plant owned by Brazos Electric Power Cooperative Inc. and settle pending litigation between the parties. The agreement is subject to regulatory approvals. Since May 1986, TU Electric has been in litigation with the minority owners of Comanche Peak—including Brazos and Texas Electric Power Cooperative of Texas. A settlement with a third minority owner, Texas Municipal Power Agency, was announced in February.

Under terms of the agreement reached with Brazos, TU Electric will pay Brazos a total of \$213 million, plus interest, for its share of Comanche Peak, nuclear fuel,

transmission facilities and legal and other expenses related to the pending litigation. The purchase price for the plant is based on the cost per kilowatt that TU Electric has incurred for its existing share of Comanche Peak.

Michael D. Spence, president of TU Electric's Generating Division, said the agreement is in the best interests of TU Electric and its customers. "TU Electric will obtain an additional 87,400 kilowatts of generating capacity, which is needed to serve growth in our service area, and we will obtain it essentially at our cost."

The settlement also reduces the company's expenses associated with litigation over ownership of Comanche Peak.

Comptroller representative to assist taxpayers July 14

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that a representative of his agency will be in Sweetwater on Thursday, July 14, to answer questions about Texas taxes and assist taxpayers with paperwork and problems.

"I don't want to see state taxes turn into a burden for folks who can't get to a field office. Our visits are a service we're happy to provide to Texas taxpayers," he said.

Mary Sue Riskus, enforcement officer at the Abilene Field Office, will be at the TU Reddy Room from 2-4 p.m. The public is welcome and there is no charge.

"I'm sending my employees out to help people with questions, filling out forms, and working out

problems on a local, one-to-one basis. There's some things you just can't do as well over the phone or through the mail," he said.

Sweetwater areas taxpayers who can't attend the seminar can still get individual tax assistance by calling the comptroller's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-252-5555, from anywhere in Texas.

Bush promises LULAC a hispanic on cabinet

AUSTIN—When Vice President George Bush promised a Dallas LULAC convention he would appoint a Hispanic to his cabinet, Capitol Democrats immediately ripped him publicly for catering to one of their traditional voting blocs.

Obviously, Bush is trying to make inroads with Hispanic voters, while Democrats are determined to keep their territory intact.

It's a rare sight to see a Republican campaigning in Texas with innovation. Liberal Democrats who regard Hispanics as "ours" may be in for a surprise.

Bush's son married a Mexican national, and his grandchildren are bicultural. And as he pointed out, no Hispanic has ever served in the cabinet, and it's about time.

Certainly, Mike Dukakis is intelligent enough to correct that inequity should he win the election, so Hispanics stand to get a seat in the cabinet no matter who prevails.

Appointments Blocked

After Gov. Bill Clements' appointees to the board of regents fired Southwest Texas State University president Bob Hardesty last month, Austin state Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos warned of retaliation to future Clements appointees.

Barrientos, a friend of Hardesty, seems to be keeping his word. Last week he rattled his power, of senatorial courtesy by blocking the appointment of Moak Rollins, a former commissioner, to the Public Utility Commission.

When Clements, acting on tradition, sent Rollins' name to his hometown senator for approval, Barrientos asked to see alternatives and didn't explain.

Rollins served on the board from late 1979 until March 31, 1983. Appointed during Clements' first term, he resigned after Mark White was elected governor.

An opening was created on the three-member commission last May 31 when chairman Dennis Thomas resigned. The remaining two members have reached an impasse on several issues.

Marketing Scams Eyed

that advertise free three-man bass boats and instead award consumers an inflatable raft.

At a Capitol press conference, Clemons showed stacks of direct mail offers that promised customers expensive prizes and instead awarded cheap merchandise. "They go out and tell you that you are going to win a BMW and \$10,000 in cash," he said.

Clemons showed reporters examples of prizes consumers have received after listening to sales pitches. An "executive refrigerator" was a small plastic cooler; a combination washer-dryer was a plastic container with a spinner inside.

Public School Funding

The state's appeal of a ruling that the public school funding system is unconstitutional continues, but Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox, who will run for governor in 1990, is not arguing the state's case.

Instead, Kevin O'Hanlon, an assistant AG, is defending the constitution in the lawsuit filed by poor school districts seeking more state funding.

In a legal brief, O'Hanlon asserted that framers of the Texas Constitution knowingly created a system that allows school districts to spend unequal amounts of money educating children.

"It is apparent the framers of the constitution intended to create a system of school finance which allowed unequal property tax wealth between school districts," O'Hanlon wrote.

Investigation Ends

The Travis County district attorney's office, has ended its investigation into possible misapplication of state funds by state Rep. Charles Staniswalis, D-Amarillo. "We will not be filing any crim-

inal charges or seeking prosecution of Mr. Staniswalis, said Rosemary Lehmburg, director of the Public Integrity Unit.

The inquiry began when a former House staff member alleged that she was given pay raises by Staniswalis with the agreement that some of the extra pay would be returned to the lawmaker. He has repeatedly maintained his innocence.

In explaining why the case was never presented to a grand jury, Lehmburg said, "We examined bank records, campaign reports and many other documents, and we interviewed everyone we could find who might know anything about it."

Other Highlights

Helen Farabee, who withdrew from a North Texas state senate race after Democratic county chairmen backed another candidate, is hospitalized in Austin with lung cancer and phlebitis.

She is the wife of former state Sen. Ray Farabee, now vice chancellor and legal counsel for the University of Texas System.

The Legislative Budget Board ordered a review of a plan to buy a mostly vacant luxury office building for use by the attorney general and Supreme Court.

The Austin building near the Capitol complex is owned by one of former Gov. White's closest advisors, Robert Baldwin III.

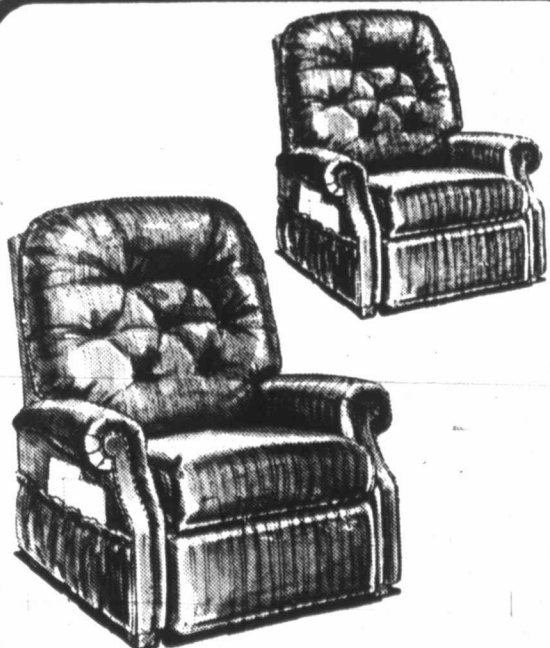

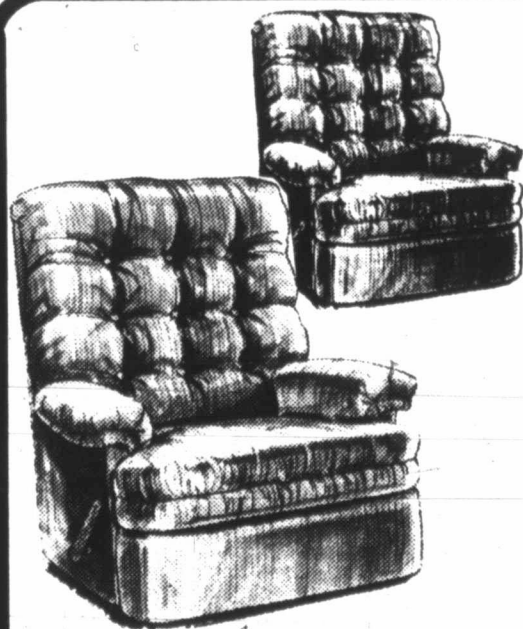

Wolf basketball

New coach likes winning

Billy Ray Duncan, new head boys basketball coach for Colorado High School, once spent time in jail. His father, a law enforcement officer, put him there.

Duncan hopes his enthusiasm for life rubs off on the Wolves.

Life as he knows it is centered around the basketball gym. That's what landed him in jail and in Colorado City.

Duncan had a habit of leaving a window open or a door ajar so he could sneak back into the gym and work on his game. He got caught in the middle of a layup and landed behind bars. Not even the stay in jail diminished his love for the game.

Born October 31, 1952 in Dandridge, Tennessee Duncan went on to play college ball at Tennessee Tech of the Ohio Valley Conference. "I was the smallest player in the conference and one of the very few white ones," said Duncan Tuesday.

He left Tech after two seasons to play at Belmont College. He did his graduate work at the University of Tennessee.

Duncan wasn't even finished with his own schooling when he was thrown into a coaching job. A heart attack to a head coach thrust Duncan, then a 19 year old assistant, into the coaching profession. Since then it's been a love affair between Duncan and the world of hoops.

Duncan has a 320-98 record as a head coach. A head coaching job at Droughons Junior College and an assistant coaching job at Marshall University in Huntington, West Virginia followed high school stops at Tennessee.

Those were followed by his move to Texas where he enjoyed great success in the Panhandle. His first job in the Lone Star state was at Sanford Fritch where he spent the 1981-85 school years.

Duncan saw his teams go 30-4, 29-2 and 33-1 his last three seasons at Fritch. The 83-84 team finished the regular season at 28-0. That was followed by a 29-0 mark. Both teams lost in the

regional finals.

The 1985 loss to Morton was the "state championship" as far as Duncan is concerned. Fritch was nipped by Morton which went on to win the title at Austin by 30 points. The regional final was played at Lubbock's Civic Center before 12,000 fans and gave Fritch a final 33-1 record. The contest brings back fond and bitter memories for Duncan. His overall record at Fritch was 115-12.

After Sanford Fritch came a trip to Dumas for the 85-88 school years. Dumas hadn't had a winning season in 26 years. Duncan gave the school back-to-back winning seasons.

Dallas Smith became Dumas' first basketball signee in 26 years. The 5'9" point guard won the Texas free throw title. "I have 31 former players furthering their education," said Duncan. "That's success."

Duncan brings only himself and his record to Colorado City.

"I've never been married," said Duncan. "I live in a gym. I'd have to marry a saint and there's not too many of those around. I'm sure one of these days..."

"I left one of the best school systems at Dumas," said Duncan. "I had a staff of eight coaches but no athletes. I came here to build a basketball program and it takes discipline."

"I really get after them (players)," said Duncan. "We'll practice hard and be disciplined. I expect the kids to be gentlemen on and off the court. The bottom line is work and winning."

"Winning develops character. Once you get a taste of winning and the things it takes to win you develop character. It's just the little things."

"I've been successful because I've had great kids and great coaches that have been willing to work. I came here to get to the playoffs. It will take time. Other coaches have told me Colorado City has the athletes."

Duncan said he likes to play pressure basketball and likes to push the ball "as fast as we can."

"The Pit" will be open for use during the summer said Duncan. Workouts during the season will include 90 minutes on defense, 45 on fundamentals and the rest on offensive concepts. "Points get you there and defense wins the

games," said Duncan. "I'm real excited about starting school, not only basketball but football too."

Duncan said he wants to make Wolf Basketball more of a happening with the introduction of things such as a Tip Off Banquet. "I love kids and I love basketball. I'm here for them. I give up everything for the athletes because I love to win. It's like my insulin."
