Abilene To Play Tornados Friday

Free Gate Feature At Annual Exposition To Be Continued

Only Two Weeks Remain To Get Ready For Big Annual Fair Opening October 23rd

Feverish Activity Is Shown As Final Preparations Are Being Made For Big Three-Day Exposition

A crew of workmen have been busily engaged for the past several days in making preparations for the opening of the Fifth Annual Dawson County Fair, Thursday, October 23rd.

Abilene Coach Is Overlooking Ten Lamesa Gridders

If Gus White doesn't get beyond the line of scrimmage Friday night at Lamesa, Coach Vernon Hilliard of Abilene is confident the Eagles will win.

Holding White is the problem. A touchdown threat practically every time he takes the ball, White must be stopped quickly if at all.

Abilene has a good line, Hilliard admits, but the offense must be improved over last week. Jim Brennan, only local boy, who resembles a climax runner, took part in a scrimmage yesterday but still limped noticeably.

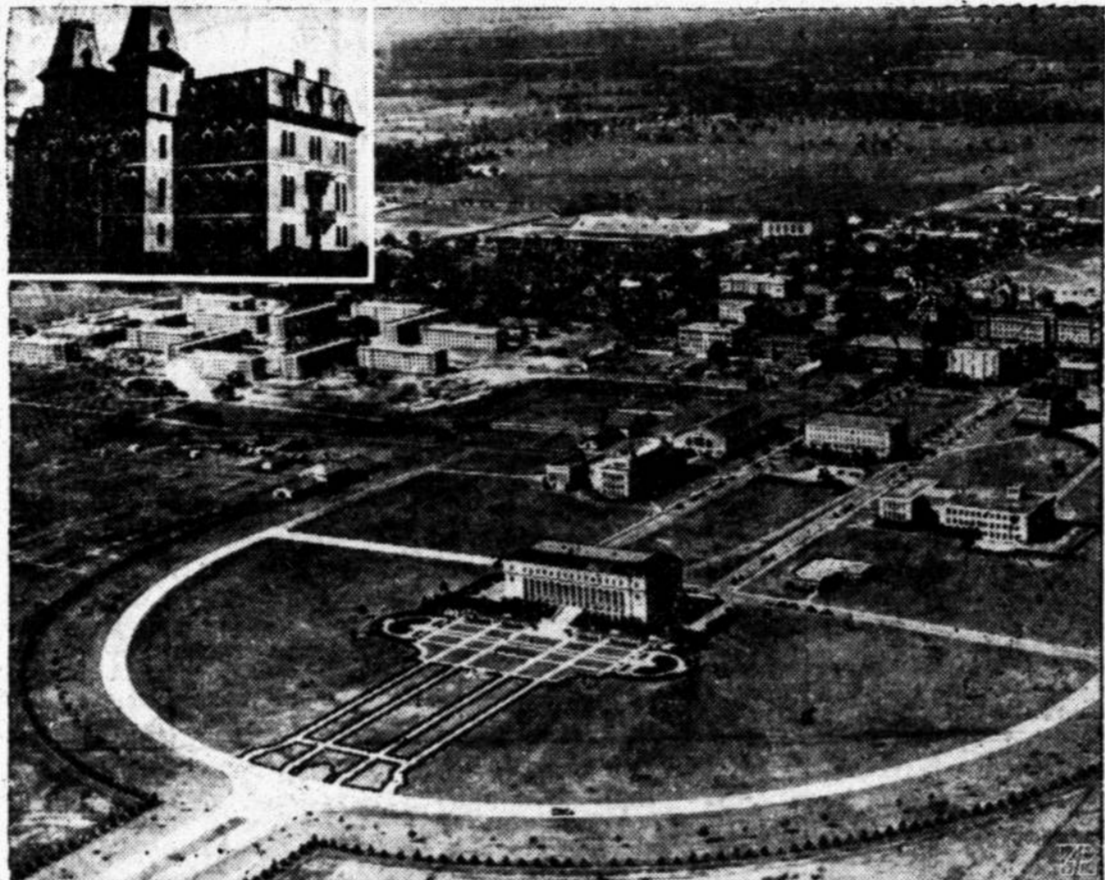
The Eagles, who have had virtually no contact since before the Plainview game, scrimmaged until dark.

White is such a running threat, Hilliard believes, that Abilene could make two touchdowns and still lose. Too, the line could bottle up everything for almost an entire game and then lose on just one play, White is that dangerous.

The Tidwell Bros. shows, which will be the feature attraction on the midway, is expected to arrive in Lamesa on Sunday before the Fair opens on Thursday. They will follow their usual custom of showing three days before the fair opens.

Work Progresses On New Theatre

Work on Lamesa's newest theatre building is going along at a rapid rate, following several days' delay due to the heavy rains which fell over this section during the past two weeks.

It was expected to have the walls jolt high this week, at which time ceiling joists will be immediately set.

The new theatre, located on the east side of the square, is being constructed by Allen and Waller for Audrey Cox, owner and manager of the Palace, Majestic and Mesa theatres. It will be modern in every respect, with the very latest type of equipment and comfortable upholstered chairs. The building will be equipped with balcony and will have a seating capacity of about five hundred. No name for the new show house has yet been announced.

Resident Engineer Arrives To Construct Migratory Camp Southeast Of Lamesa

Martin L. Rees, Resident Engineer, who will be in charge of the construction on the Lamesa Migratory Camp, arrived in Lamesa Tuesday night to take up his residence during the construction period. He has recently been transferred from Dallas to the Amarillo division.

The huge project is expected to get started within the next few days, according to Mr. Rees, and will be pushed through to rapid completion.

Parity Checks Totaling \$45,000.00 Covering 247 Farms Have Been Received Here; More Arriving Daily

An additional one hundred and forty-seven checks were received in Lamesa Thursday, which added to those already received, brought the total for the county up until that time, to 247.

These represent approximately \$45,000.00, according to Vernon Martin, secretary of the Dawson County A. C. A.

Martin stated that other checks are arriving daily and are being distributed as rapidly as they arrive. He stated that it was practically impossible at this time to estimate the total which Dawson County would receive.

The checks are a little later arriving this year than they were in 1940, as more than \$131,000 had been received in the county September 26th, 1940.

Farmers are being notified as rapidly as their checks arrive, Martin stated.

AAA Allotments Are Speeded Up

Speeding up the work to get 1942 AAA allotments to farmers by November 1, 1941, is the gigantic task facing the County officers now.

Allotments are being issued about six months before the usual time since all decks must be cleared for the house to house canvass in the National Defense program. The farm plan sheet method, through which farmers plant crops for maximum payments under the AAA program, will be used by Committee members in the feed and food campaign.

Since greater production of milk, eggs and other foodstuffs are being asked of Texas farmers, county goals will be announced within a few weeks. Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard outlined details of the defense program to Southern workers in Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 29 and 30.

Flexibility of the AAA program to curtail production of surplus commodities and at the same time increase production of commodities essential to defense needs is evidenced in the 1942 AAA program which has been designed to meet a national emergency.

Cotton and wheat allotments will be established as in former years, but no general allotments will be made because of the increased emphasis on feed and food.

When details of the 1942 program are received, educational meetings will be held to explain the 1942 program.

The following is a memorandum received in the County AAA office relative to wheat mixtures and "acreage planted to wheat" for 1942: "Acreage planted to wheat (on wheat allotment farms) means (1) any acreage seeded to wheat (except it is seeded in a mixture containing less than 50 per cent by weight of wheat and the crop which matures contains sufficient seed other than wheat that the crop cannot be harvested as wheat), and (2) any acreage of volunteer wheat which is harvested or remains on the land after May 15, 1942."

Rain Totals 32.55 Inches Thus Far In 1941 To Set Record For Wettest Year

Compared to other days this fall this section is in a comparative drouth, as no rain has fallen since Friday, as this is being written on Thursday afternoon. The sunshine has been welcome company to farmers, pickers and merchants alike, as the gathering of cotton and feedstuffs rapidly gets under way.

A record fall of rain for the first nine months and two days of the year has been recorded by the local weather gauge, totaling 32.55

inches since January 1st.

With the exception of May, when 8.99 inches were recorded, September has been the wettest month of the year with a total of 7.29 inches.

Although October is only nine days old, and as stated above, there has been no rain measured since last Friday, a total of 4.94 inches has already fallen.

1941 bids fair to top all previous years in the total amount of rainfall in any year, with 1932 total amounting to 33.39 inches which, unless '41 is wetter, is the wettest year on record. When it is considered that 1941 is only 34 inches short of '32 and there yet remains almost three months of the year, this could easily set a record.

Luke Steele Is Death Victim

Funeral services were held Tuesday for Luke Steele, well known farmer and stockman, who died at his home in Lamesa, following an illness that had lasted since last May.

Mr. Steele was born September 3, 1884, at Prescott, Arkansas, where he grew to manhood. He served as sheriff and deputy sheriff of his home county there for eight years.

He came to Lamesa in 1924 and has lived here since that time, being engaged in farming and livestock raising.

Services were held at the First Methodist Church with Rev. E. D. Landreth officiating, at 4 p. m. Tuesday. Interment was in the Lamesa Cemetery.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Luke Steele, one daughter, Mrs. L. E. Standifer of Turkey, two sons, George and Ray, of Lamesa, two brothers, G. P. of Long Beach, Cal., and B. K. Steele of Dallas, both of whom were too ill to attend their brother's funeral.

Two football teams, undefeated in Conference 3-AA, meet here Friday night when Lamesa's Golden Tornados meet the Abilene High School Eagles.

Abilene's showing in previous games gives the Eagles a six or seven touchdown advantage over the Tornados. This comparison is based on results of the two schools showings against the Plainview Bulldogs. Abilene defeated Plainview soundly, 25 to 0, while Lamesa lost to the Bulldogs, 12 to 0. Abilene defeated Lamesa last year in Abilene.

Abilene boasts of three backfield men who can do all the tricks of the game, running, kicking, passing, pass receiving and blocking. The trio weight 122, 170 and 190 pounds. The midget 122 pounder is reported to be a ball totter deluxe. The 170 pound Brennan is rated along with Lamesa's White as one of the district's and state's best broken field runners. The heavier man, at 190 pounds, is the advance man for clearing paths and a ball carrier on the type of Evans of Odessa.

Young Men Of World War I Now Command Army

WASHINGTON — If the United States were to go to war tomorrow, it would be the young men of World War I who would direct the military affairs of the country in World War II.

Ask the War Department for a list of the top-ranking generals—the real brass hats—from Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff,

down. Thumb through the list of 19 and you'll find that every one of them served in World War I—12 of them overseas, and all of them with a temporary or permanent rank of major or higher.

Their average age today is 58 years (the two oldest are 62, the two youngest 52), which gave them an average age of 35 when the A. E. F. was pouring men and steel into the western front.

Nine of these ranking generals are graduates of West Point; three are graduates of Virginia Military Institute (including General Marshall); five first showed up on the army rolls as second lieutenants, without previous army training; two came up from the ranks.

But right about there all efforts

at grouping must come to an end. It's not hard to look at the record and pick out our two most distinguished soldiers. They would be Gen. Marshall, who as a colonel was in the thick of the Meuse-Argonne and the St. Mihiel offensives and later was aide-de-camp to Gen. John J. Pershing; and Lt. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who has just come out of retirement to become commander of the armies in the Far East.

General MacArthur was formerly chief of staff, was a Brigadier General at 38, has more citations for bravery and distinguished service than any man in the Army today. He represents the best Army tradition—a West Point graduate whose father was a lieutenant-general before him.

On the other hand, how about Lt. Gen. Leslie J. McNair, who now is chief of the general headquarters? General McNair went to France with the "Fighting First" and so distinguished himself that he was moved up to general headquarters of the A. E. F.—a brigadier general at 35.

And how about Maj.-Gen. Henry H. "Hap" Arnold, chief of the Army Air Force? His first view of the World War battlefield came on an inspection tour after the Armistice was signed. A second lieutenant in 1911, General Arnold was considered by some of his associates "crazy as a loon" because he went into that idiotic branch of the signal corps, aviation.

He whooped around in an old

Wright biplane crate that boasted a 40-horsepower engine with two propellers driven by chains and sprockets. He soared nearly a mile and a quarter into the blue to leave the world gasping over a new altitude record. He set the signal corps quivering with excitement by using radio telegraphy to report artillery fire. He organized the first air defense of the Panama Canal and from a swivel chair in Washington was one of the key men to "keep 'em flying" through the World War.

This could go on forever, but I'd like to skip the rest and tell about the two boys who came up the hard way. First there's Lt.-Gen. Ben Lear Jr., now in command of the second army and the same who got himself in print for chastising his "yoo-hoo" boys. Forty-three years ago, Ben Lear, Jr., was an 18-year-old printer's devil on a Colorado newspaper. His father was in the composing room. Came the Spanish American war, and father and son enlisted.

In less than a year the "First Colorado Infantry" had made proud history in the Philippines and one of its famous top sergeants was Ben Lear, Jr., and favorite soldier in his platoon was Private Ben Lear, Sr.

The other is Lt.-Gen. Walter Krueger, in command of the Third Army, with headquarters at San Antonio. Also a veteran of the Spanish American war, he enlisted while a student in Technical High School, Cincinnati. General Krueger has a record that is rare for high officers in this man's army.

Not only did he cover himself with blood and glory in the World War (ending it as chief of the A. E. F. infant tank corps in the thick of things at Chaumont), but if the United States were to go to war tomorrow—and that war should be against Germany—General Krueger would be carrying the American flag for the second time against his native land. He was born in West Prussia January 26, 1881, and was eight years old before he set foot in the country for which he was to distinguish himself as a great soldier.
