THIS IS IT!

The "straw that broke the camel's back" came to The Reporter office this week with a shipment of newsprint from our supply house. The old saw may be somewhat out of place here but just the same the price of this bundle of newsprint "broke the back of the price we have been charging for a year's subscription to The Reporter.

Beginning with November 1, the subscription rate to The Reporter will be advanced from \$1.00 a year to \$1.50 sent in Martin County and \$2.00 a year when sent to a subscriber residing outside of the county.

The price of this shipment of newsprint was almost double the price paid a few months back. The increase of price is due to the three deep cuts made in the supply made in recent months.

Drastic steps must be taken to conserve newsprint to keep our readers supplied with the home paper. Outside of refusing to accept new subscriptions at any price, our next best bet is to drop all subscribers who are in arrears, and fortunately, that is a dog-gone few. The date your subscription expires is opposite your name stamped on the paper. If the figures read 10-43, it means your subscription expires in October, this month, and so on. If the decrease in the supply of newsprint continues and the price continues to soar we may be compelled to refuse accepting new subscribers, as many of the large daily newspapers have done. For a small weekly newspaper to refuse accepting any new subscribers, may sound ridiculous, but this war has created many surprises, and by heck this war is not over yet by a long shot.

So if you are behind with your subscription, we will be compelled to drop your name from the list if the matter is not attended to by November 1st.

Fact of the matter we hung on to the \$1.00 and \$1.50 subscription price longer than many weekly newspapers in this area, as they raised their prices some weeks ago. There is no other alternative but raise the subscription price of the Reporter, and we trust the subscriber will see the advisability of the move and continue to take the paper.

THE BIG FISH AND THE SMALL FRY

Why is it that the metropolitan daily newspapers and their satellite daily newspapers published in smaller cities of which they own and control are "teeth and toe-nail" opposed to the bill approved by the Senate Banking and Currency Committee authorizing the appropriation of approximately \$30,000,000 for newspaper advertising to stimulate War Bond sales? The chief reason of the opposition is that the weekly newspapers and daily newspapers published in smaller towns are scheduled to get the bigger end of the appropriation, and that it might lead to the government placing other advertising, all leading to getting mixed up in politics. As matters now stand the metropolitan newspapers have been so over-run with advertising they have actually had to refuse accepting any more, due to conserving newsprint. Had there been no conservation of newsprint these newspaper would be going to the readers in mammoth editions in order to accommodate the great increase in advertising lineage.

The pages of these metropolitan daily newspapers are teeming with advertising of aircraft concerns, automobile concerns that have converted their plants into the manufacture of airplanes, tanks, guns, shells, and other war equipment, the purpose of which is to let the people know that when the war is over they will be back at the "old work bench" making automobiles, signed by some of the former automobile makers. The financial institutions of the country, soft drink manufacturers, cigarette makers, breakfast food concerns, crowd the advertising space of these large daily newspapers. I want to say here, where does the greater percentage of the patrons of these concerns come from... I can tell you... from the rural population of the country... the boys and girls on the farms and the small towns where the weekly newspaper is published. And reader, how many of these concerns do you see represented in your weekly newspaper? No they pass up Stanton as if it were dynamite dump when it comes to putting back a penny of the amount they have reaped from the people of Stanton and Martin County. But the neighboring daily newspapers get the advertising some of which should go to The Reporter, if for no other reason than to show to this community its patronage is appreciated.

I'm not criticizing the metropolitan press for getting all the advertising it can, but at this critical stage when it is hard enough for a weekly newspaper to survive at best, for these "brass collared" members of the press who are enjoying the greatest increase in advertising in their history, to oppose a measure that would be of great assistance to the weekly press of the country to help "weather the storm", borders on the scheme of the "big fish eating up the small fry"... to hell with the weekly newspapers—we are crowded with advertising to where we have to refuse accepting any more, but we are opposed to the government appropriating any money to pay for War Bond sales in weekly newspapers," is their attitude.

The metropolitan press is claiming that the \$30,000,000 appropriation is politics... a scheme of Senators to get votes in the rural districts, etc. When it comes to accusing any issue as one of politics, the metropolitan press is about as "deep in the mire" of "wiping the political platter clean" and joining up for political favors as any Senator ever dared to be.

Not boasting, because it was the duty of every weekly newspaper but I want to praise the weekly press of the country for the valiant services they rendered in the previous War Bond campaigns, and the service they will continue to render in all campaigns that will have to do with helping to win the war and to aid the prisoners of war, and relieve the sufferings of needy humanity, and want to praise the noble response of the people of Martin County in over-subscribing a quota of \$210,800 in the recent War Bond campaign. The amount came from a rural population in which a weekly newspaper is striving to make both ends meet and who would be numbered among the weekly newspapers in line to get some of the \$30,000,000 that the Senate Banking and Currency Committee has approved to pay for advertising War Bond sales. Many weekly newspapers solicited merchants and business men to underwrite War Bond advertisements when it meant closing the doors of the shop to perform the task, because the editor was the only man in the shop. MILK PRODUCERS CAN MAKE APPLICATION SUBSIDY PAYMENTS

OCTOBER PAYMENTS MUST BE MADE BEFORE THE 30TH NOVEMBER

"Martin County milk and cream producers are now eligible to make application for subsidy payment for the month of October under the Commodity Credit Corporation, milk subsidy plan," stated H. J. Winchester, chairman of the Martin County Committee after attending a meeting at Big Spring.

The rate of payment will be 50 cents per hundred weight for milk and 6 cents per pound of butter fat for cream. Producers of sweet cream butter will also be eligible for payment.

Evidence of sale such as sales slips or invoices will be acceptable. Payments will be made direct to producers from the county AAA office each Saturday. All producers who are eligible for payment are urged to bring in their sales slips and make application for payment as soon as possible.

Payments for October positively must be made before November 30th. Applications for subsidy received after November 30, for the month of October, cannot be paid.

tions for various war relief agencies being met by the local merchants in a small town like Stanton, under conditions as they are, mounting taxes, and various kinds of taxes to meet, has depleted the merchants' funds for carrying their individual advertising in the Reporter, and this is the experience being felt by the many weekly newspapers that comes to our exchange table, from the looks of the many columns that are barren of any paid advertising.

I can't figure it out, though I'm not one of the country's top "brain busters," where it would be out of place for the government to pay for advertising, and where it would be such an awful crime to spend some of the money with the weekly press, especially, when this class of journalism is hard-pressed to survive because it has suffered the loss of all foreign advertising, and local advertising has decreased all of 50 percent and more. It may be boasting to say it, but the country as a whole, would be in one hell of a fix if there were no weekly newspapers.

You can call it politics, as the big newspapers want you to believe, but I'm here to tell you the Senate Banking and Currency Committee have approved a measure that is no more out of place for the government to spend money for advertising than it is for the local merchant.

MEETING NOV 6TH TO DISCUSS PLANS FOR FREEZER-LOCKER

MEETING BE HELD AT COURTHOUSE—SIGN-UPS MOVING ALONG NICELY

According to O. B. Bryan, superintendent of the Cap Rock Electric Co-operative, a meeting has been called for Saturday, November 6th, 3:00 p. m., in the district court room at the courthouse, to discuss further plans for the freezer-locker plant. Those who have not left their applications at the REA office may apply at the meeting.

"Sign-ups are progressing very satisfactorily," Mr. Bryan stated.

"May we again remind the citizens of Stanton and Martin County that if they want a modern, convenient freezer plant, they must sign for their locker by November 15," Mr. Bryan said. "The War Production Board is approving only a small number of these plants for Texas, therefore, the sooner the plans are in their hands, the better the chances for an early approval of the Stanton plant."

O. B. Bryan, superintendent, French Gray and Jim McCreless directors of REA, made a trip last week to Quitman, in East Texas, to see the freezer-locker plant there. REA is establishing plants at Wimsboro and Mincola, nearby.

This proposition is too vital to Stanton and Martin County to let slip through our fingers for the lack of subscribing for 400 lockers. For the stockman or farmer to know the meat and vegetables stored in this plant is safe from spoilage, is worth considerable more than the rental fee of the locker amounts to.

SLOW PROGRESS IS BEING MADE IN WAR FUND DRIVE

\$1137 BEEN RAISED ON \$2,080 QUOTA—STANTON RAISES \$661 ON \$27.50 QUOTA

The slow progress being made on the \$2,080 Martin County quota, is not due to the folks not having the money to contribute but due largely to the solicitors not being able to work at the job as much as they would like as many members of the soliciting committee are in business, and being shorthanded on help its hard to get on the job. However the State officials of the War Fund campaign can rest assured that Martin County will meet its obligation. It has never failed so far to raise its quota in every drive for war funds yet, and it's not going to fail in this one.

A lot of work and time can be saved the County war fund committee if the people will voluntarily make their contributions to George Blocker, county chairman of the War Fund campaign, instead of being produced up by a solicitor.

The county's quota in this campaign is \$2,080, and the amount contributed so far is \$1137. The town of Stanton has a quota of \$927.50 to raise and the amount contributed to date is \$561.

Grover Springer, chairman of the War Fund drive at Lenorah, was a caller at the Reporter office Saturday, and reported his community had exceeded its quota of \$195.20, and was still going. At the time he made his report the community had contributed \$211.02. Response from Latin American cotton pickers was practically 100 percent contacted. Though the amounts, in many instances were small ranging from 25c to a \$1.00, yet it signified a willingness of the pickers to contribute to a fund that would help relieve the wants of the needy, and to assist in supporting a fund that would provide entertainment or our fighting men.

Mr. Springer said all persons contacted either contributed or agreed to contribute as soon as they realized on their cotton.

Assisting Mr. Springer in the drive are Mrs. A. C. Fleming and Mrs. L. B. McClain, teachers in the Lenorah school of which Mr. Springer is the principal.

Flower Grove, Elmer Miller chairman, has turned in \$204.55 on a quota of \$217.60.

Valley View, Mrs. Grady Standefer, chairman, has raised \$58.66, against a quota of \$130.80.

Brown, F. L. Bass, chairman, has contributed \$101.60, against a quota of \$129.20.

A MARINE WRITES OF THE CLOSE FRIENDSHIP OF BLANTON STOVALL

Astoria, Oregon
October 29, 1943

Dear Mrs. Stovall:

Just received a letter from my

ton. I know you didn't give up

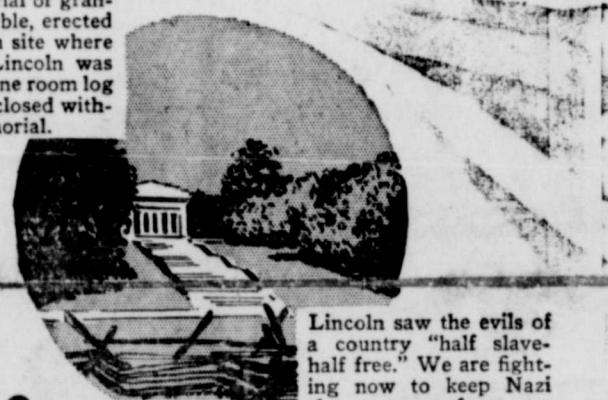

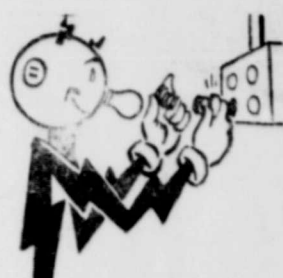

HOW TO CHANGE A BLOWN OUT FUSE

"LIKE CHANGING A LAMP BULB"

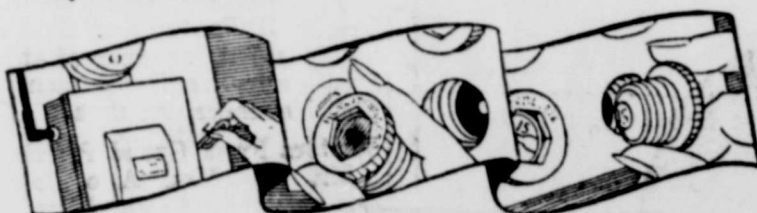


A blownout fuse is nothing mysterious. Fuses are safety valves of your electrical system. When a cord becomes worn or an appliance develops a defect, the fuse "blows" to prevent more serious trouble. Too many lamps or appliances on one circuit may also cause a blown fuse.

Replacing a fuse plug (the common type) is as easy as screwing in a light bulb. Make the replacement yourself—

save yourself inconvenience and get your lights back on quicker.

The first thing to do is to disconnect the lamp or appliance that caused the fuse to blow. Then, take a new fuse of the right size, go to the fuse box and carefully follow the three steps outlined below.



STEP ONE—Locate the main cut-off switch near your meter box, and standing on a dry surface, turn off the electricity.

STEP TWO—Unscrew the "blown out" fuse, touching only its top. You can tell it by the burned patch in the window on top of the fuse.

STEP THREE—Replace burned fuse with new fuse of proper size. Then turn on main electric switch.
