Run-off elections Saturday

Mitchell County voters of precinct 1 will get a second chance to pick a Commissioner on June 2. The second primary will feature the run-off between Warren Anderson 62 and Edward Roach 59. Both are successful farmers who have

made contributions to their communities and to the county.

They are the only local candidates on the ballot in the second primary and are the only candidates for an office in which the incumbent did not run. All incumbents were re-elected.

The run-off between Kent Hance and Lloyd Doggett for the U.S. Senate will also be on the ballot. Editorially, the RECORD urges local citizens to take time out on Saturday to vote, and editorially favors

Kent Hance for the United States Senate. It is felt that Hance can do more for West Texas, and it is felt that he will do so.

Other state races appearing on the Mitchell County ballot will be for the Judges, Courts of

Criminal Appeals, place 2 and 3, between Roy Greenwood and W. C. Davis and between Tom Thorpe and Bill White.

Joan Beach, County Clerk, reports that 102 voters had cast ballots at the 5 p.m. Tuesday deadline for absentee

voting. There will be four voting boxes: No. 1, Courthouse; No. 2, Westbrook School Tax Office; Nos. 3 and 7, at Housing Authority Building and No. 4, Lorraine Senior Citizens Building.

Drought doesn't effect visitors to area lakes

Despite a low lake level caused by the continuing area drought, Lake Colorado City State Park attendance for the past Memorial Day weekend fell only 342 people short of last year's count.

Fifteen thousand, four hundred-sixty persons visited the state park from Friday, May 25 through Monday, May 29, according to park officials.

When asked if any particular conditions kept the count lower than it might have been, park ranger 3 Barry Townsend said, "No, except maybe the level of

the lake and the unseasonably hot weather."

"The majority of the people came in Friday but quite a few came Saturday," said Townsend. "We turned some people away Sunday because there weren't any campsites left."

Townsend said the weekend was "a good, smooth weekend with few disturbances. A lot of people left Sunday, because of the storm that was coming in."

Though the thunder storm failed to bring needed relief to dry lands, it did make for some cool weather on Monday—the actual Memorial Day that saw the park with little or no attendance.

One hundred-forty-three thousand, six hundred-forty-four persons have visited Lake Colorado City for the year, and as for fishing, Townsend said "It's been pretty slow. They've been catching small crappie, white bass and small channel cat but I have seen one good size six pound bass."

As for the park's new dining hall facility, Townsend said, "We're getting good use out of it. They're really using it a lot. It was rented out everyday of the weekend."

City swimming pool still being discussed

"I think the council made the right decision," said Interim City Manager Gary Smith of the Colorado City Council's recent closing of the municipal pool.

"This is a very emotional issue," Smith added. "Although parks are necessary, the public safety and health must be the first concern of a governing body."

He noted that there were several projects that need attention in Colorado City, most prominently the water distribution system.

Smith estimated that repair of the swimming pool, which was built in the mid-thirties as part of a WPA project, would cost approximately \$20,000 to \$30,000.

The major problem at the pool is the water loss, Smith said. The water level at the pool goes down one foot every 12 hours, an amount equal to 37,400 gallons for that time period, or 6,283,000 gallons per summer.

A spokesperson at city hall reported that last summer, approximately \$6,000 was spent for repairs, while about \$3,300 was the income for the facility.

"I found it extremely difficult to make this decision. My family has always used the pool—they learned to swim there. My own sons have told me they were not pleased with the decision," commented council member Dee Hearn. However, she conti-

nued, "With the economic situation as it is, with the drought conditions and so forth, I cannot see tying up a lot of money in a structure as old as our city pool."

"We have stressed time and time again that the water lines are in very poor shape and need replacing. As I told my children I'd rather have water coming out my faucet than leaking out the pool."

Council member Brenda Tarter stated, "My main concern is for the kids. Many mothers used to take their kids to the pool at noon and leave them until they got off work."

"Without a pool, I'm afraid that kids on the streets may cause more problems and expense to the city than repairing the pool."

She added, "I'm also concerned that if the

pool is closed this year, it will just fall by the wayside."

Speaking of the expense, Mrs. Tarter said, "There is always operation money, minor renovation money available."

"It happened too quickly. There was not enough preliminary study."

Possible solutions to the problem of the pool suggested by Smith include seeking a government grant, floating a bond issue, budgeting for a new pool or repeatedly repairing the old pool.

Some members of the council have discussed the possibility of working with other governing bodies within the county and with various civic organizations in hopes of collectively funding a new pool.

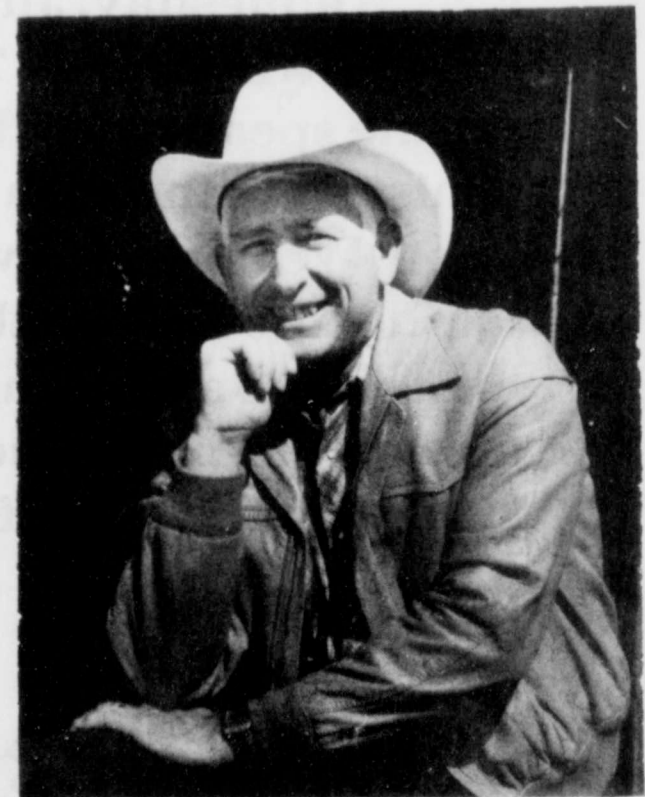
Deadline Thursday for AJRA rodeo queen contestants

Shaddix to be featured at exhibit

The success that Bill Shaddix has achieved in his life and in his art work has been hard fought and well deserved. The oldest of eight children, Bill knew intimately the grinding poverty of the Depression years. His parents lost their own farm in Oklahoma and worked as laborers to hold the family together. Bill can still remember working along side his mother in the cotton fields. But the painful memory of lean times is tempered by more happy thoughts, of fishing in the creeks, giggling for frogs and occasionally "stealing a melon and eating the heart out right there in the patch."

Seeing the struggle of his parents, Bill was determined to achieve some success in his own life. After the family moved to California, Bill attended Whittier High School where he came under the influence of a very fine teacher. Bill remembers, "We not only learned the fundamentals of art but we were taken on field trips as well. I guess I learned more from Miss Russell than from any other person."

The Korean war prompted Bill to enlist in the U.S. Army and he served three years, being discharged with the rank of Sergeant. He became a Deputy Sheriff in Orange County in 1956 and advanced to being an investigator with the District Attorney's office in 1959. All these years Bill had been painting in his sparetime. His lack of ac-

ademic training was an additional burden. He learned by trial and error. He says, "I made a lot of mistakes—I just had to do it over and over. But I learned from observing a lot of good art, by talking with successful artists. And I've been lucky, a lot of good artists encouraged me."

In his first years as a full-time professional, Bill was painting seascapes and the varied landscapes of Southern California. As his success grew he could travel and he found renewed inspiration in the Rocky Mountain areas. His increased awareness of the color and Romance of the Indian and the cowboy added a new dimension to his canvases. For several years, Bill has been flying his own plane, a very helpful adjunct to his work since it allows him to get quickly into new areas of the West, searching for new and broader backgrounds and subjects for his paintings. Through his uncle's wife, a full-blooded Assiniboin-Sioux, he has been able to participate in tribal reunions, visit-

ing in tipis and studying and sketching ceremonial costumes and customs of several different tribes.

"A narrative element is important in my paintings," Bill says, "but I also work hard for a special kind of mood. I want my viewers to have a good feeling when they see my work—to feel calm and secure. When I paint a violent storm over the mountains, I'll put a small cabin in the picture with a lighted window—so it offers a warm haven. In my cloudiest painting you just know the sun is going to break through pretty soon."

R. D. Hunt, 51, Wichita Falls was indicted for the theft of a pickup from Jimmy Scott on August 25, 1983.



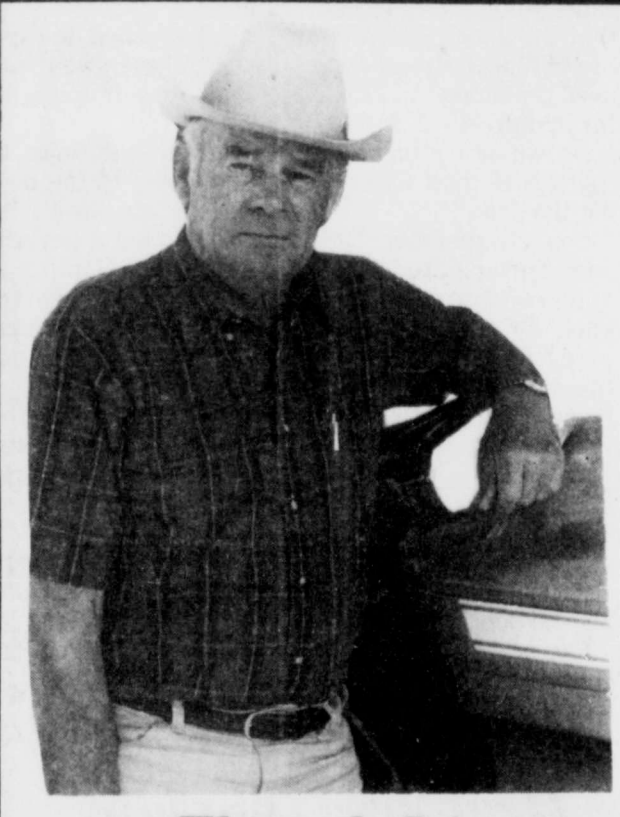

Entomologist Report

Borers in shade trees are a recurring problem in shade trees in the Mitchell County area. Most of the time, owners do not realize they have borers in their tree until the damage has been done.

The larval or grub of the borer is the stage which does the damage to your tree. The adult is a beetle and will emerge from your tree in late spring through early fall. Generally the hole you see was caused by the adult boring so the damage has already been done. Holes caused by larvae may also be seen but most of the time they will be packed with sawdust or sap will be around the hole. If you have holes that circle the tree at about the

same level it was probably caused by a woodpecker.

Although there are exceptions, borers do not usually attack trees unless the tree is weakened or stressed. So, it is very important to keep your trees well-fertilized and watered and to prune dead or dying branches. Ash, cottonwood, linden, soft maple and poplar are especially susceptible to borer attack. Trees may be sprayed four times yearly, April, late May, mid-July and late August, to aid in protection. Lindane or Dursban (R) may be used.

The trunks of young or newly transplanted trees can be protected with nursery wrapping paper, burlap, aluminum foil or newspaper.

Spray the trunk with lindane and keep the wrapping on for a year—replacing it if it gets torn.

If your trees already have borers you may be able to locate the larval holes and dig them out with a wire if there are not too many. Spray on insecticide will not reach the grubs within the trunk, but a fumigant may be tried. Neither of these methods are a guarantee. Your chances of grub-control are much better using the preventative measures.

The fumigants, paradichlorobenzene (PDB) crystals or ethylene dichloride in liquid or crystal forms may be used. PDB is the active ingredient in some kinds of mothball crystals, however, some contain na-

phthalene and should not be used on your tree. The fumigant should be applied at the base of the tree and should not touch the bark. Over-treatment of PDB can further damage your trees so care should be taken. Crystals should only be applied when the soil is dry and the temperature is 55 degrees or above.
