Farm House Burns

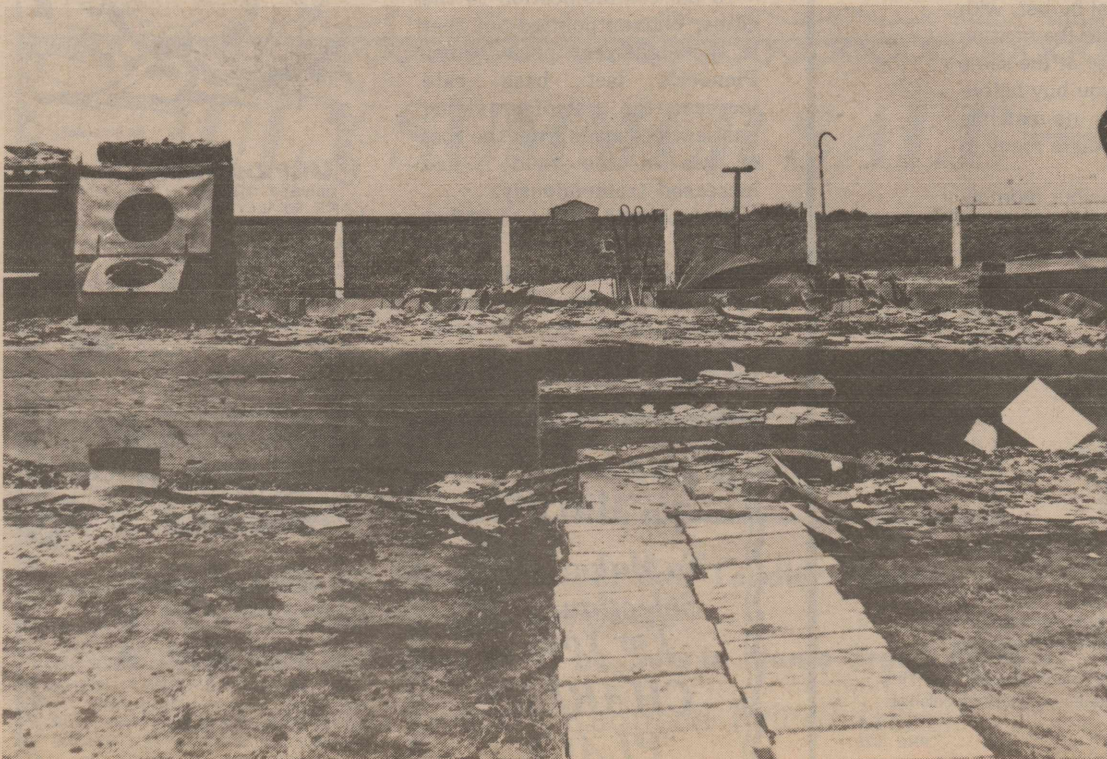

The house was used for boys

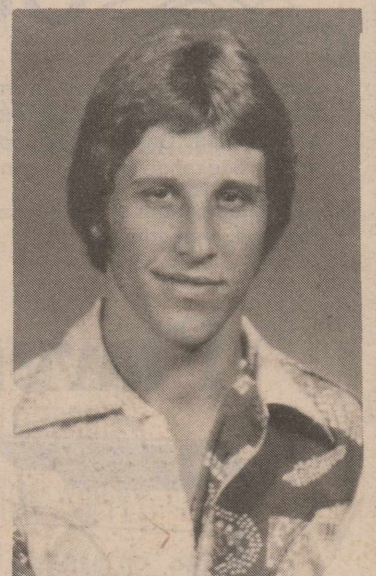
from Lubbock State School who were working on the farm. Cause of the blaze has not been determined.

Natural Gas Co. Asks Increased Base Rate

Pioneer Natural Gas Company has notified the city officials on its West Texas System that the Company is applying for an increase in its base rate for gas service within the cities on its West Texas distribution system.

In his letter to the cities, K.B. Watson, Company President said, "As you are probably aware, Pioneer's last base rate increase became effective during the year 1970, based on recommendations of the Company and a committee of city representatives." Watson went on to say, "Since that time, in spite of the increased cost of

gas to the consumer, the Company's rate of return has decreased substantially due to many factors and an increase in the base rate is now essential."

Watson pointed out that the increase in the customer's cost of gas over the past several years has come about by the "cost-of-gas adjustment, an adjustment that is designed to pass the increased cost of gas in the field directly through to the consumer." "Pioneer does not retain any of the increased cost of gas and does, in fact, fail to recover much of the increase because of several cost items not recovered in the cost-of-gas adjustment," Watson said.

Company officials have pointed out on numerous occasions in the past that the cost-of-gas adjustment has been the assurance that Pioneer Natural Gas Company has been able to maintain an adequate gas supply to protect the interest of the customers it serves and to enable the Company to continue to serve the growth of its service area.

Pioneer has not specified the new rates needed in this initial request to the cities and said it would supplement the application. The Company has retained the services of H. Zinder and Associates, Inc., utility consultants, to assist in the study currently being made to determine the appropriate amount of the deficiency in the gas service revenue at Pioneer.

Watson told city officials that a preliminary draft of a report of studies made by utility consultants indicates the current value of the properties used to serve the West Texas Distribution System to be in excess of \$178 million in addition to the value of properties used to serve irrigation and other rural customers. The deficiency in annual revenues has increased substantially in very recent years and is approaching \$30 million according to the study.

In his communication to the cities, Watson pointed out that in the eight-year period since Pioneer's last base rate increase, the cost of providing gas service - aside from the cost of gas in the field - had increased tremendously.

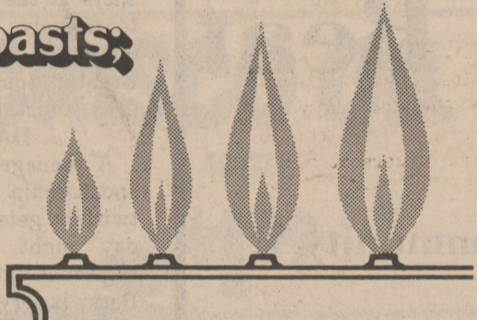
Watson said, "I am sure that you, as businessmen, understand this tremendous increase in the cost of doing business." He went on to say, "In most businesses, much of this cost has already been absorbed in

price increases passed on to the customer and returned to the business. In Pioneer's case, this is not true. The increased cost of natural gas to the customer has been reflected only in the cost-of-gas adjustment which has been flowed through directly to the gas producer." Watson emphasized that Pioneer's rate of return on investment has dwindled significantly in the past eight years.

BEEF MARKETS TO WEAKEN - Beef markets will likely weaken a bit during the second half of the year, says a livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Prices of both fed and feeder cattle will probably be at their lowest levels in September or October and then begin to gather strength once again. Beef prices will come down somewhat in response to some consumer or retailer resistance. Beef production will be down about 2 percent during the third quarter, but overall meat supplies could be up about 3 percent due to increased supplies of pork, broilers and turkeys.

ACCIDENT CONTROL - Children under 15 are involved in about 20 percent of the nearly 57,000 lawn-mowing mishaps that occur each year. - 1 c granulated sugar
- 1 c brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 t vanilla
- 1 c peanut butter
- 3 c sifted all purpose flour
- 2 t soda
- 1/2 t salt

Thoroughly cream shortening, sugars, eggs and vanilla. Stir dry ingredients into creamed mixture. Drop by rounded teaspoons on ungreased cookie sheet. Press with back of floured fork to make criss-crosses. Bake in moderate oven (350°) about 10 minutes. Makes about 5 dozen cookies.

MAGIC COOKIE BARS

- 1/2 c butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 c graham cracker crumbs
- 1 can condensed milk
- 1 pkg (6 oz) semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 can (3 1/2 oz) flaked coconut
- 1 c chopped nuts

In 13x9 inch baking pan, melt butter, remove from heat. Sprinkle crumbs over butter. Pour sweetened condensed milk equally over crumbs. Top with chips, coconut and nuts. Press down gently. Bake at 350° for 25 min or until golden brown. Cool, cut into 3x1 1/2 inch bars.

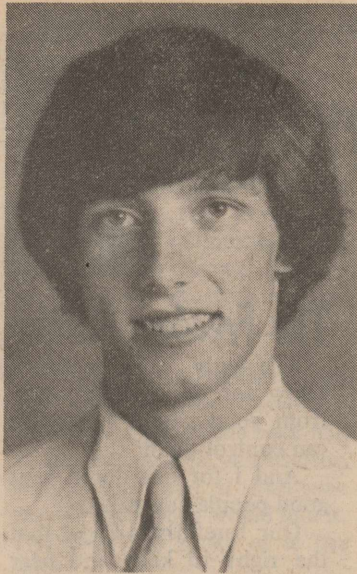

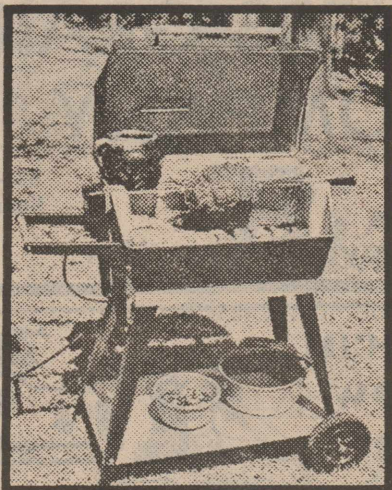

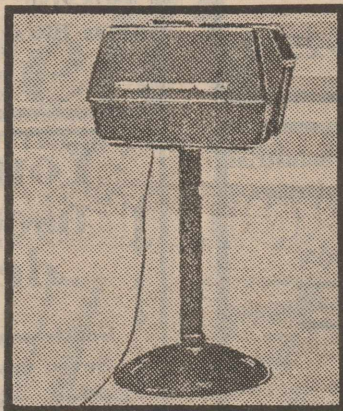

The Freedom Militia

The only valid reason I know for taking guns away from good people is so you can control them.

And I for one don't want good people controlled.

Our forefathers knew that the right to keep and bear arms was essential for us to remain free.

Guns don't kill people any more than knives or cars kill people. It's the people behind those guns, knives and cars that kill people.

Except for accidents, that happen with knives and cars as well as guns, there is no good reason to deprive good people of their guns.

Criminals will always have guns no matter what laws are passed.

So if any laws are passed regarding guns the laws should require every household to have a gun.

You could lock yours up, or dismantle it, or throw the firing pin in the river. But every household should have a gun. Burglary would then be a much less desirable occupation.

The Second Amendment to our Constitution says "A well regulated Militia being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed."

A person who was opposed to guns once said he would NOT oppose gun ownership for anyone who

was a member of "a well regulated Militia."

So two years ago I formed the "Freedom Militia," and I invite every good American to join.

There are no dues, no meetings, no registration.

The rules and regulations as revised to date are as follows:

ARTICLE 1: Any person residing anywhere in the world may join if he has never used a firearm for an unjust purpose.

ARTICLE 2: Any person wishing to join shall take the following pledge: "I pledge my life, my worldly goods and my sacred honor to the defense of freedom and justice. I will use firearms only (1) in defense against unjust attempts to confiscate my property, my freedom or my life; (2) in the defense against unjust attempts to confiscate the property, freedom or lives of others; (3) in target practice; and (4) in legitimate hunting of animals."

ARTICLE 3: Members must exercise regularly and drill regularly in the handling of firearms so that they will be able to use them safely and effectively.

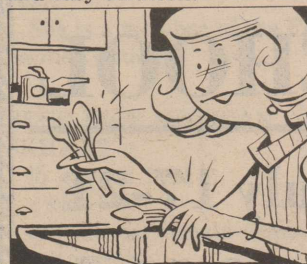
ARTICLE 4: No member shall ever be required to register either his name or his firearms with any other person, organization or political unit, since such registration could target him for destruction by the enemies of freedom. It could also reduce or destroy his effectiveness as a member of the Freedom Militia.

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Helpful Household Hints

SILVER SHINING MADE EASY

There's no reason for tarnished silverware to keep you tied to a polishing rag for a day. There's a quick and easy solution.



Take an oblong cake or roasting pan and line it with Reynolds Wrap aluminum foil. This soak 'n shine approach can be used on silver or silverplate that you want to have a mirrorlike finish. Do not use it if you want to retain the appearance of



antique silver, because this cleaning method will remove all tarnish—even that in recessed areas. Also, with antique silver, tarnish or dirt may be masking corrosion which may then appear as pits or surface blemishes after cleaning.

With a method as easy as this, giving silver a shimmering luster is no longer an all-day chore!

Darla Underwood Chosen To Attend Trainee Program

Darla Underwood, Title I migrant reading teacher and coordinator at Hart Elementary School, is one of only 85 school personnel selected throughout Texas to participate in the Administrative Trainee program at Stephen F. 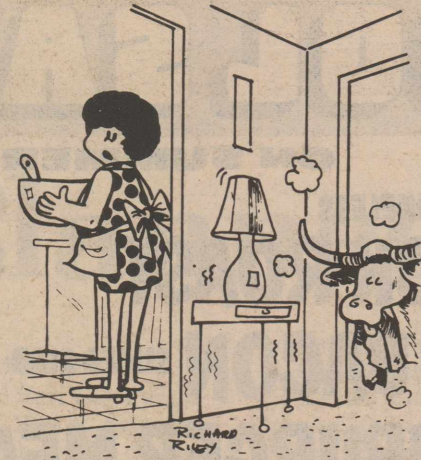
The trainee program is sponsored by the Texas Center for the Development of Human Resources. The center encourages minorities and women to enter leadership positions in the educational system to solve problems related to race and

sex discriminations. Today there are few minorities in Texas in such leadership positions. But it is the quality of administrators that the center stresses, not the race or sex.

"The greatest problem in education today is the fact that so many students are graduating from high schools nationwide who are lacking the basic skills necessary to be socially and economically competent," Miss Underwood said. "A simplified solution to this problem would be a curriculum more structured and developed for the individuality of

students. Higher standards and expectations are needed for teachers and students." Miss Underwood plans to continue teaching and eventually enter the administrative field at the elementary level and later begin work on her doctorate degree in elementary education.

Miss Underwood, who has taught for five years, will complete 12 hours of administrative courses this summer. Twelve "packaged" hours will be completed during the fall and spring when she resumes teaching. Next summer she is planning to return to SFASU and finish the final 12 hours needed for her master's degree and certification. She then will lack only nine hours for mid-management certification.

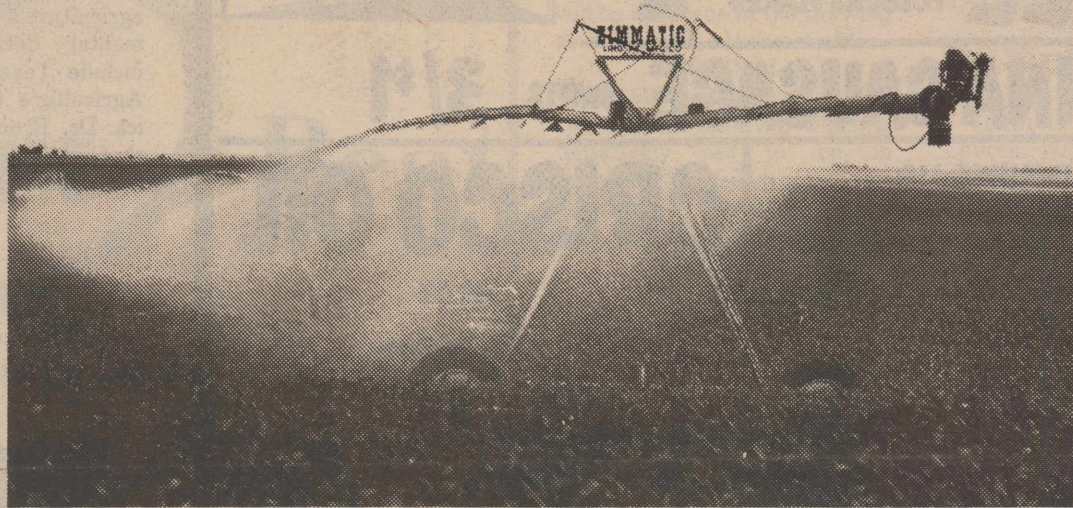

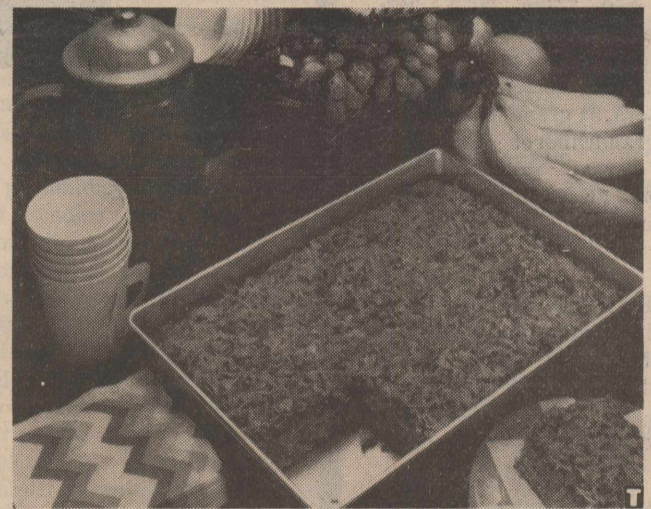

Cinnamon And Nutmeg Flavor Yogurt 'Picnic' Cake



YOGURT SPICE CAKE

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup plain yogurt
- Spiced Coconut Topping*

Preheat oven to 350° F. Grease and lightly flour bottom and sides of 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking pan. Cream butter with sugar until smooth. Add eggs; beat until blended. Combine flour, baking powder and soda, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. Stir alternately with yogurt into egg mixture. Pour into prepared pan. Bake for 35 to 40 minutes. Remove from oven. Let stand for 5 minutes. Spread Coconut Topping over cake. Place under hot broiler until golden.

*SPICED COCONUT TOPPING

- 1/2 cup firmly-packed light brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon butter, melted
- 3/4 cup shredded coconut
- 1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 cup milk

In a small bowl cream brown sugar with butter. Stir in remaining ingredients; mix well. Yield: 15 portions.
