67-year-old Business Will Close After Sale

Record News Editor by their father J. P. Majors, who owned the J. P. Majors Jewelry Store in downtown Colorado City for decades. The trio will close their Majors Jewelry Store when their current selling-out sale is finished. The pioneer business family have each lived in Colorado City since before the turn of the century and their faces have long been familiar to shoppers here.

The original Majors family arrived here in 1887. Just one year before, 1886, Mabel Kahl had moved to Colorado City with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael C. Kahl. Mrs. Edgar Majors, born in Ireland, came here to live with her husband in 1889 after she was orphaned. She lived with the E. A. Barcrafts in the famous old St. James Hotel which was later destroyed by fire.

Both Majors couples have long been familiar faces on the downtown business scene. In the store when their children grew up, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar have one son, Dr. Marvin Majors, 3 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren. Mrs. Edgar Majors and her husband are parents of two daughters, Mrs. Gus D. Chesney, nee Mary Frances Majors, and Mrs. John T. Merritt, the former Mabel Majors. There are two grandchildren, Linda Chesney, Texas Tech student and John Merritt, also in Tech, town's business world.

Long prominent in this work of their churches, civic clubs and community life, the Majors family hopes, after the sale is over and the store closed, to "rest some and catch up on a lot of things," said Mrs. Oscar Majors.

Oscar is member of the Lions Club and First Methodist Church along with his wife. The late Edgar Majors was a Kiwanian and was for decades

headmaster at First Baptist Church. The brothers also held membership in the Masonic Lodge since their youth. Mrs. Edgar Majors is a member of Hesperian Study Club.

Mrs. Oscar Majors is a fisherman. "I just may fish some, after, she said, 'after I just plain rest a while.'

Mrs. Edgar Majors, widowed this year, has planned many things she needs to do as now, first. After that, she wants to work again—at least part-time, she said.

Oscar Majors, himself, busy with the selling-out sale thinks maybe he will just be for a change.

The building housing the jewelry store is owned by the firm. They bought and moved into their present building in 1918. J. P. Majors jewelry store has been located in the same block of the same street, 2nd St. which is Colorado City's main street, for 67 years.

Selling of the stock and closing of the store marks the end of a business era. It also ends a family business partnership which lasted more than 30 years for the two brothers and their wives. The brothers began operating the store when their father moved to Sweetwater in 1911. They have owned it since the mid 1920s.

Wolves of C-City grabbed first place in District 3 AAAA baseball contest again Tuesday when they took Snyder Tigers 4-1 in a game on Wolf Field.

Colorado Wolves, snatching at the title all season, now rate 8 wins, 2 losses in district play. Their three-way tie for chances at the crown was broken this week with the win from Snyder.

Snyder and Brownfield teams have each won 7 district games. Snyder has 3 losses, Lamesa 2. C-City has

two more dates with destiny in the '64 baseball season—a game against Sweetwater there, Tuesday, May 19, and the finale against Brownfield, Cubs coming up here on Wolf Field, Saturday, May 23.

Snyder takes on Sweetwater Mustangs, Brownfield plays Lamesa this week as the suspense grows.

Game against the Tigers Tuesday gave Wolf pitcher Larry Danborsky his 5th win in district play with 1 loss. His season's record is 7-3.

First inning ended without a run for either team. Second inning saw Perry Millsap, Wolf catcher, drive in Danborsky with a single, after Danborsky had walked and stolen 2nd base. Score 2-0.

Kahler Rites In Chapel

Last rites for William Kahler, 82, were held in Kiker & Son funeral chapel here, at 10:30 Saturday morning with Rev. O. C. Floyd, pastor of Primitive Baptist Church, Snyder, assisted by L. L. Bodine.

Born in Limestone County Sept. 8, 1881, he was married to Miss Julia Ann Robertson March 10, 1927 in Brownfield. The couple moved to Mitchell County that same year and located in the Cuthbert community where he was a farmer. After his retirement Mr. and Mrs. Kahler moved to Colorado City in 1950.

Death came to Mr. Kahler Thursday at his home, 1925 Hemphill St., after a long illness. He was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church.

Surviving are his wife, two sons and two daughters. Jack Kahler, son, and Mrs. Kenneth Wilson, daughter, live in Colorado City. Karl Kahler, son, lives in Ft. Worth. Mrs. Ray Sneath of Bryan is the other surviving daughter.

Four sisters, 8 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren also survive. Sisters are Mrs. Emma Vincent of Lawn, Mrs. Mollie Hoffman, El Paso, Mrs. Gussie Lutz of Santa Anna, Calif., and Mrs. Addie Taylor of Oklahoma City, Okla.

Nephews were pallbearers for the funeral service. Burial was in Colorado City cemetery under direction of Kiker.

The two apparently went to sleep on the bank of the creek. As officers and friends of the Castillo family reconstructed the drowning tragedy, Castillo rolled over in his sleep and was drowned in 6 feet of water.

He was unable to swim, his friends here said. Searching parties combed the park area. A friend located the body at 11 a. m. Monday, after officers had begun grappling in the creek waters.

No evidence of foul play was found, said Justice Arnold who ruled the death of Castillo to be result of accidental drowning after he received an autopsy report. Autopsy was ordered by Arnold after the body was found. Abilene pathologists "performed the autopsy and reported cause of death to be drowning."

Funeral for Castillo was held Wednesday morning at 10 in St. Ann's Catholic Church with burial in Mitchell County cemetery. He was son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Castillo, route 3, and was employed by a local appliance store as maintenance man. He was unmarried.

NUCLEAR SYMPOSIUM

Student & Teacher To Hear Scientists

John Tiller, Colorado High School student, and Bo Merket, CHS teacher of physics and math, will represent Colorado High June 7-10 at the Fourth Texas Nuclear Science Symposium, to be at University of Texas.

Symposium is to be jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and by the University of Texas.

The Foundation is made up of 10 investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas. Texas Electric Service Co., one of the 10 companies, will pay

expenses for both student and teacher for the June 7-10 Symposium. Students to attend are chosen by the University.

Meetings sponsored by the Foundation are for the purpose of bringing high school science students and teachers latest information on nuclear physics and nuclear fusion research. Outstanding scientists will present lectures during the Symposium.

Students will also be given an opportunity to obtain answers to their questions about scientific careers and college curricula.

Improve Mailbox Week Set

Postmaster Arlene M. Morris announces that the week of May 18-23 is to be mailbox improvement week.

Purpose of the week, he said, is to "Call attention to the need for providing mail receptacles which are conveniently located, neat in appearance, safe to use and receptacles which protect the mail from the weather."

All patrons on rural City mounted and box delivery Star routes are asked to examine and improve where necessary appearance of their mailboxes. Mailboxes meeting requirements of neatness, convenience and protection make for a more efficient delivery operation and results in improved service to the entire route, Morris said.

The postmaster added these suggestions: Boxes and supports should be kept painted and free from dust; name of owner should be shown on the side of the box the carrier approaches and name should be plainly visible to him. Mailboxes on both rural and Star routes must be located on the right-hand side of the road in the direction of travel of the carrier. This requirement is for the protection of the lives of rural mail carriers, Morris said.
