One dead after Thursday afternoon shooting

One Big Spring man is dead and another is in custody after what Big Spring police are calling an altercation between two men.

Sterling Donald McIntosh, 34, was pronounced dead Thursday afternoon after BSPD officers were dispatched to the 1600 block of Settles in reference to "shots fired".

"Upon arrival, officers detained Calvin Jacob Lawson, 34, who was walking away from the scene," read a BSPD news release. "Upon further investigation, within the residence, (McIntosh) was found deceased."

According to the BSPD, an altercation occurred between McIntosh and Lawson which resulted in the death of McIntosh.

"At this time, detectives with the Criminal Investigations Division are submitting an affidavit for a search warrant for the residents and an arrest warrant for Lawson for the murder of McIntosh," read the release. "Lawson has since been arrested for outstanding warrants (theft of property, less than \$100; and failure to appear)."

McIntosh was pronounced dead at 2:35 p.m. Thursday afternoon and an autopsy was scheduled for this morning.

CISD to hold second meeting over bond election

A second public meeting over the upcoming \$4 million bond election on the November ballot will be held at 5:30 p.m. Friday in the Coahoma High School Auditorium.

Coahoma ISD trustees have called for a \$4 million bond election to help finance district-wide infrastructure improvements, upgrades to existing athletic facilities, and the purchase of artificial turf for the football, softball, and baseball fields.

During the meeting, CISD Superintendent Dr. Amy Jacobs will give an in-depth presentation on how the money will be used if the bond passes by the voters in November as well as the financial im-

pact on property owners.

The last meeting will be held on Friday, Oct. 20, at 9 a.m. at the Coahoma ISD Cafeteria.

If passed, the bond will add approximately \$7.50 per month or \$90 annually of additional taxes to a property owner who owns a home valued around \$100,000. Taxes are expected to increase \$11.25 per month or \$135 annually for a home valued at \$150,000 and \$18.75 per month or \$225 annually for a home valued at \$250,000. All estimates are based on the district's current taxable values.

For property owners over the age of 65 or disabled, their home property taxes will not increase if they have been granted the "Over 65" or "disabled" homestead exemption. This tax freeze is on the homestead only, and may be adjusted up if major renovations are done to the property after the exemption is granted. For

Social Security benefits to rise by 2 percent in 2018

WASHINGTON (AP) — Millions of Social Security recipients and other retirees will get a 2 percent increase in benefits next year. It's the largest increase since 2012 but comes to only \$25 a month for the average beneficiary.

The Social Security Administration announced the cost-

of-living increase Friday.

The COLA affects benefits for more than 70 million U.S. residents, including Social Security recipients, disabled veterans and federal retirees. That's about one in five Americans.

By law, the COLA is based on a broad measure of consumer prices generated by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Advocates for seniors claim

the inflation index doesn't accurately capture rising prices faced by seniors, especially for health care.

"It's squeezing them. It's causing them to dip into savings more quickly," said Mary Johnson of The Senior Citizens League. "The lifetime income that they were counting on just isn't there."

Some conservatives argue that the inflation index is too generous because when prices go up, people change their buying habits and buy cheaper alternatives.

Consumer prices went up only slightly in the past year despite a recent spike in gasoline prices after a series of hurricanes slowed oil production in the Gulf Coast, said

Max Gulker, senior research fellow at the American Institute for Economic Research.

"For the most part, there was a decline in energy prices for a lot of the year," Gulker said. "But at the end of the year we saw that uptick in gas from the hurricanes."

The average monthly Social Security payment is \$1,258, or about \$15,000 a year.

Congress enacted automatic annual increases for Social Security in 1975. Presidents often get blamed when

increases are small or zero. But President Donald Trump has no power to boost the increase, unless he persuades Congress to change the law.

In 2009, President Barack Obama persuaded Congress to approve one-time payments of \$250 to Social Security recipients as part an economic stimulus package.

Over the past eight years, the annual COLA has averaged just above 1 percent. In the previous decade, it averaged 3 percent.

Johnson noted that multiple years of small or no COLA's reduces the income of retirees for the rest of their lives.

"Think about the length of a retirement period. Eight years is about a third of a (healthy) retirement," Johnson said.

The COLA is based on the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, or CPI-W, a broad measure of consumer prices. It measures price

changes for food, housing, clothing, transportation, energy, medical care, recreation and education.

The August report says energy prices are up 6.5 percent from the previous year, while the cost of medical care is up just 1.7 percent. The cost of food is up 1.1 percent.

The COLA is calculated using the average CPI-W for July, August and September, and comparing it to the same three months from the previous year.

Officials: Trump will scorn but not bolt from Iran nuke deal

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump will say Friday the Iran nuclear deal is no longer in U.S. national security interests, but he won't withdraw from the landmark 2015 accord or immediately re-impose sanctions against Tehran, according to U.S. officials and outside advisers to the administration.

Trump's speech from the White House will outline specific faults he finds in the pact but will also focus on an array of Iran's troubling non-nuclear activities, four officials and advisers said.

Those include Tehran's ballistic missile program, support for Syrian President Bashar Assad, Lebanon's Hezbollah movement and other groups that destabilize the region, including in Yemen, human rights abuses and cyber warfare. In his speech, Trump will notify Congress that he is "decertifying" the deal, arguing that while Iran may be complying with the letter of the agreement, the accord itself is not sufficient to be in U.S. interests. The decertification will not pull the

U.S. out of the agreement or re-impose sanctions, but it will kick those matters to Congress. U.S. lawmakers will then have 60 days to decide whether to snap the sanctions back into place or modify the legislation that governs U.S. participation in the deal. Under current U.S. law, Trump faces a Sunday deadline to notify Congress whether Iran is complying with the accord that was negotiated over 18 months by the Obama administration and determine if it remains a national security priority. Although Trump will allow that Iran is living up to the letter of the agreement, he will make the case that the deal is fatally flawed and that its non-nuclear behavior violates the spirit of the regional stability it was intended to encourage, the officials and advisers said.

The officials and advisers, who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to publicly preview the speech, said Trump will not call for a re-imposition of nuclear sanctions on Tehran. He will instead urge lawmakers to codify tough new requirements for Tehran to continue to benefit from

the sanctions relief that it won in exchange for curbing its atomic program, they said. And he'll announce his long-anticipated intent to impose sanctions on portions of Iran's Revolutionary

Guard Corps by designating them terrorist organization under an existing executive order, according to the officials and advisers. "The reckless behavior of the Iranian regime, and the IRGC in particular, poses one of the most dangerous threats to the interests of the United States and to regional stability," the White House said in a statement released ahead of the speech. The statement, which did not reveal Trump's decision, denounced the Obama administration for its "myopic focus on Iran's nuclear program to the exclusion of the regime's many other malign activities" and said the same "mistakes" would not be repeated. "The Trump administration's Iran policy will address the totality of these threats from and malign activities by the Government of Iran and will seek to bring about a change in the Iranian's regime's behavior," it said.

Ali Larijani, Iran's parliament speaker, said Friday that any U.S. move against a nuclear deal with Iran would be an "insult" to the United Nations because the U.N. had given the deal its blessing.

He added that any revision of the deal would allow Iran to take its own actions, and warned that the U.S. move could destabilize the international situation.

"We will continue to adhere to our obligations ... for as long as other parties observe the agreement," he said

on a visit to Russia.

In his speech, Trump will ask Congress to amend or replace legislation that currently requires him to certify Iranian compliance every 90 days. Officials have said that Trump hates the requirement more than the nuclear deal itself because it forces him to take a position every three months on what he has repeatedly denounced as the worst deal in American history. That frequency has also irritated aides who have complained that they are spending inordinate amounts of time on certification at the expense of other issues.

White House aides had initially sought a venue for Trump's address that would project American power and determination. The shuttered former Iranian embassy in Washington was briefly considered before being deemed inappropriate. Officials also considered the Iwo Jima Marine Corps Memorial, which was ruled out because it is currently being renovated. The Diplomatic Reception Room at the White House was eventually agreed.

House to remain in the nuclear accord, will be closely watching the president's address. Trump wants to impress on the European parties to the accord — Germany, France and Britain — the importance of fixing what he sees as flaws in the nuclear accord and addressing malign behavior not covered in the agreement. The Europeans, along with the other parties, Iran, Russia and China, have ruled out reopening the deal. But some, notably France, have signaled a willingness to tackle unresolved issues in supplementary negotiations. Among those issues are the expiration of several restrictions on advanced nuclear activity under so-called "sunset clauses" that will allow Iran to begin ramping up its enrichment capabilities after

10 years, the end of an arms embargo and the eventual easing of demands for a halt to its missile program. In the speech, Trump hopes to "recruit" the Europeans into joining his broad strategy, particularly by punishing the Revolutionary Guard, which he and his national security team believe is fomenting instability, violence and extremism throughout the Middle East and beyond, according to one official.

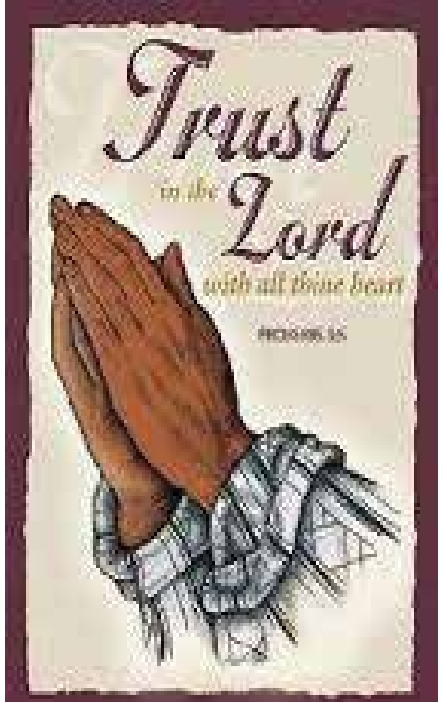

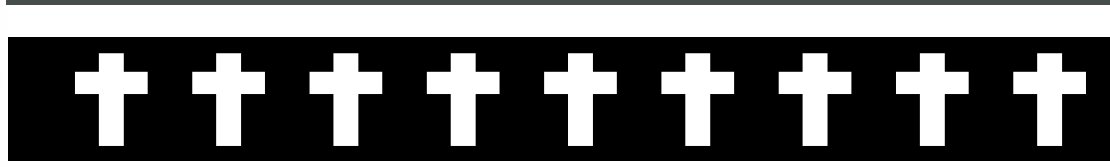

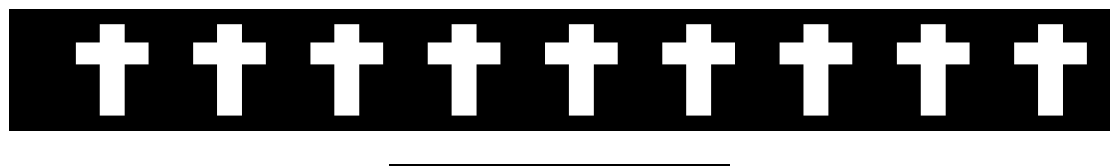

Did you ever wonder? Naaman is healed

Elisha performed many, many more miracles. Isn't that the way we usually say it? Actually the Lord God performed the miracles through Elisha!

Elisha was not a magician or a wizard. He was a willing tool in the hands of the Lord God, and he carried out the Lord's will without fear.

One notable miracle concerned Naaman, a commander of the army of Aram. Naaman had suffered with leprosy for some time. He had sought healing through the god of Aram, but there was no response from the idol.

A young girl from Israel served Naaman's wife. Probably she was captured in border raids between the two nations. The girl assured Na-

man that if he sought out Elisha, the prophet in Samaria, he would be healed.

Naaman brought much silver and gold because he expected to have to pay the prophet for healing.

When Naaman reached the house of Elisha, Elisha would not go out to see him. Instead he sent his servant out to Naaman with instructions, "Go, wash yourself seven times in the Jordan, and your flesh will be restored and you will be cleansed." (2 Kings 5:10)

Naaman had expected to see Elisha perform the incantations that were typical of the prophets of the baals. He was insulted that Elisha did not come out to greet him.

He said in his heart, "There are two great rivers in Aram that have clean, flowing water! Why did I travel all this way to bathe in the muddy Jordan River?"

So he went away angry. Naaman's

servants convinced him that since he was already here, why not try dipping himself in the Jordan River?

Naaman did as Elisha had instructed and he was immediately healed of leprosy!

Now Naaman and his entourage returned to Elisha's house. "I know now there is no God in the entire world except in Israel. Please accept a gift from me." (2 Kings 5:15) But Elisha refused.

"Then permit me to take back with me some earth from Israel so that I may make an altar to the God of Israel. I will never again make sacrifices and offerings to any god other than the Lord," Naaman promised.

When Naaman was out of sight, Gehazi, the servant of Elisha, went after him. He insinuated that Elisha had changed his mind; he would take a small payment. Naaman gave him two talents of silver (one hundred fifty pounds) and two suits of royal

raiment.

When Gehazi returned to Elisha's house, Elisha asked where he had gone. Gehazi lied and said, "Nowhere."

Elisha replied, "Was my spirit not with you when Naaman stepped down from his chariot and gave you two talents of silver and two suits of raiment? Therefore Naaman's leprosy will cling to you and your descendants forever." (2 Kings 5:26, 27 paraphrased)

Jesus tells us, "You cannot serve God and mammon (a word meaning riches and worldly treasure) for you will love one and despise the other." (Matt 6:24 paraphrased)

Gehazi showed which god he served when he chose riches over obeying the word of God. The Lord removed His favor from Gehazi and allowed the penalty of the world to reach him. He became as white as snow.

My sin's not as bad as your sin

Sometimes it is easy to find fault in others. We all have our own lists of what we consider to be good and bad or better and worse. If there is something you are guilty of doing which is on my "worse" list, then I can point my finger at you while at the same time make myself feel better, even if I might be guilty of a different sin.

We may even begin to view ourselves as righteous simply because of certain routines that we have established in our lives.

In Jesus' day, the Pharisees were masters of the routine. They were very focused on the externals of the law.

Over the years, they had added rules, regulations, and more routines onto the law.

They thought of themselves as being the best at keeping the law, and anyone who did not follow their traditions was viewed as a sinner.

In Matthew 12:1-8, we read about a cer-

tain interaction between the Pharisees and Jesus and his disciples. According to the Law of Moses, work was not permitted on the Sabbath day.

However, God allowed certain acts of necessity to be performed if needed. For example, if an animal fell into a pit and became trapped, the owner could pull it out on the Sabbath. God's law also made allowance for those who were hungry and in need. A landowner had to allow someone access to their crops if they were hungry.

On this occasion, the disciples were hungry, so they began to pluck the grain from the stalks and eat it.

Some Pharisees nearby accused them of breaking the law since it was on the Sabbath. Jesus points out that in spite of all their rule-making and list-checking, they were not keeping all of God's law. They were arrogant, judgmental, and self-righteous.

Hopefully, we are not guilty of thinking that the sins that others are involved in are worse than our own.

If I've never murdered someone, then

it is easy to condemn someone who has.

At the same time, I may be holding a grudge against someone or even feeling outright hatred toward them. Jesus taught that the latter was as bad as the former.

If I've never been attracted to a person of the same sex, then it is easy to condemn the sin of homosexuality.

Yet, if I have ever harbored feelings of lust in my heart, then I am just as guilty as the fornicator and adulterer.

We must be aware of sin. We must not overlook it or "sweep it under the rug" when it affects us or those we love.

We also must not trust in our ability to check things off a list - go to Bible class, check; attend one of the church services, check; throw some money in the plate, check - and think that all of that makes us good until the next week.

Am I showing compassion and mercy like Jesus did?

Am I focusing on others' sins and excusing my own? May we all be more like Jesus and less like the Pharisees.

Pope: Catholic guide needs updating on death penalty issue

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Francis marked the 25th anniversary of a landmark compilation of Catholic teaching by saying Wednesday it should be changed to address an issue close to his heart: the death penalty.

During an anniversary ceremony at the Vatican, Francis repeated his insistence that capital punishment is "inadmissible" under any circumstance. He said the death penalty violates the Gospel and amounts to the voluntary killing of a human life, which "is always sacred in the eyes of the creator."

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, issued a quarter century ago by St. John Paul II to give Catholics an easy, go-to guide for church teaching, doesn't exclude recourse to the death penalty.

While saying its need is increasingly rare "if not practically non-existent," the Catechism says capital punishment is permissible if it's the only way to defend life against an "unjust aggressor."

The death penalty has been abolished

in most of Europe and South America, but it is still in use in the United States and in several countries in Asia, Africa and the Mideast.

Francis acknowledged that in the past even the Papal States had allowed this "extreme and inhuman recourse." But he said the Holy See had erred in allowing a mentality that was "more legalistic than Christian" and now knew better.

Noting that church doctrine can develop over time, Francis said the Catechism "should find a more adequate and coherent" way to express the Gospel message about the dignity and value of every human life.

"It's necessary to repeat that no matter how serious the crime, the death penalty is inadmissible because it attacks the inviolable dignity of the person," he said.

Francis has long made prison ministry a mainstay of his vocation. On nearly every foreign trip, he has visited with inmates to offer words of solidarity and hope, and he still stays in touch with Argentine inmates he ministered to during his years as archbishop of Buenos Aires.

This Date In History

Today is Friday, Oct. 13, the 286th day of 2017. There are 79 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Oct. 13, 1792, the cornerstone of the executive mansion, later known as the White House, was laid by President George Washington during a ceremony in the District of Columbia.

On this date: In A.D. 54, Roman Emperor Claudius I died, poisoned apparently at the behest of his wife, Agrippina (ag-rih-PEE'-nuh).

In 1307, King Philip IV of France ordered the arrests of Knights Templar on charges of heresy.

In 1775, the United States Navy had its origins as the Continental Congress ordered the construction of a naval fleet.

In 1843, the Jewish organization B'nai B'rith (buh-NAY'brith) was founded in New York City.

In 1932, President Herbert Hoover and Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes laid the cornerstone for the U.S. Supreme Court building in Washington.

In 1944, during World War II, American troops entered Aachen, Germany.

In 1957, CBS-TV broadcast "The Edsel Show," a one-hour live special starring Bing Crosby designed to promote the new, ill-fated Ford automobile. (It was the first special to use new videotape technology to delay the broadcast to the West Coast.)

In 1962, Edward Albee's four-character drama "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" opened on Broadway.

In 1972, a Uruguayan chartered flight carrying 45 people crashed in the Andes; survivors resorted to feeding off the remains of some of the dead in order to stay alive until they were rescued more than two months later.

In 1981, voters in Egypt participated in a referendum to elect Vice President Hosni Mubarak (HAHS'-nee moo-BAH'-rahk) the new president, one week after the assassination of Anwar Sadat.

In 1999, the Senate rejected the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, with 48 senators voting in favor and 51 against, far short of the 67 needed for ratification. In Boulder, Colorado, the JonBenet Ramsey grand jury was dismissed after 13 months of work with prosecutors saying there wasn't enough evi-

dence to charge anyone in the 6-year-old beauty queen's 1996 slaying.

In 2010, rescuers in Chile using a missile-like escape capsule pulled 33 men one by one to fresh air and freedom 69 days after they were trapped in a collapsed mine a half-mile underground.

Ten years ago: Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, after meeting with human-rights activists in Moscow, told reporters the Russian government under Vladimir Putin had amassed so much central authority that the power-grab could undermine its commitment to democracy.

Five years ago: Republicans Mitt Romney and Paul Ryan rallied college students in all corners of all-important Ohio and hammered at President Barack Obama for going easy on China over unfair trade practices; Obama took precious time off the campaign trail to practice for the next debate against his GOP rival. The Detroit Tigers beat the New York Yankees 6-4 in the first game of the American League Championship Series. Actor and TV host Gary Collins, 74, died in Biloxi, Mississippi.

One year ago: Donald Trump heatedly rejected the growing list of sexual assault allegations against him as "pure fiction," hammering his female accusers as "horrible, horrible liars." Bob Dylan was named winner of the Nobel prize in literature. Death claimed Thailand's longtime monarch, King Bhumibol, at age 88 and Nobel Prize-winning Italian playwright Dario Fo at age 90.

No. 24 Texas Tech looks to break 3-game losing streak to WVU

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. — No. 24 Texas Tech's resurgent running attack could throw off West Virginia's focus on slowing down quarterback Nic Shimonek.

The Red Raiders (4-1, 1-1 Big 12) had their best game on the ground in five years in a 65-19 win last week at Kansas, and they'll be eager to try it again Saturday against a West Virginia defense that has struggled to stop the run.

"It opens up everything for us offensively," said Texas Tech coach Kliff Kingsbury. "We know going in that's what we have to do, and we'll work to do that."

Lately, Texas Tech has done more than just rely on Shimonek, who is third nationally with 362 passing yards per game.

The Red Raiders compiled 313 rushing yards on 52 carries against the Jayhawks. Justin Stockton ran for a career-high 161 yards while 235-pound Desmond Nisby had 94 yards and four touchdowns. Nisby has six TDs in his last three games.

"The amount of times that they are handing that thing off is more than what they have been doing," said West Virginia coach Dana Holgorsen. "Their philosophy is to have guys back there throwing it all over the place, and they can still do that. They have four wideouts that can go. They are all very capable of being able to score any time they throw them the ball. Then you add that running game element to it, it is a different deal."

West Virginia (3-2, 1-1) had several defensive players return from injury last week and limited No. 6 TCU to 50 yards below its season rushing average. That may have been one of the few bright spots in the 31-24 loss, which knocked the Mountaineers out of The Associated Press Top 25 poll.

A year ago in Lubbock, Texas, West Virginia raced to a 24-7 halftime lead and forced Texas Tech to throw the ball to try to catch up. The Red Raiders were limited to 34 rushing yards in the 48-17 loss.

"When they get you in that one-dimensional mode where you're having to throw it, that's playing it right into their hands," Kingsbury said.

Texas Tech won two previous road games this season but has lost three straight to the Mountaineers.

"They've had our number, and we've got to go up there and try to execute at a high level," Kingsbury said.

Some other things to know as the Red Raiders and Mountaineers meet on Saturday:

IN THE RANKINGS: Texas Tech is ranked for the first time since 2013 and Kingsbury said it makes no difference to him. "I just show up and coach football, so I don't have much to say on that," he said. West Virginia has lost nine straight times to ranked opponents.

POTENT OFFENSES: Texas Tech is second in scoring nationally to Central Florida at nearly 47 points per game.

West Virginia is ninth at about 44 points and has surpassed 500 yards of offense in every game.

CAMPUS SHOOTING: Kingsbury offered his condolences to the family of a Texas Tech campus police officer who was fatally shot Monday night in Lubbock, Texas. The school's more than 36,000 students were ordered to shelter in place during the search for the suspect. "We obviously work closely with those guys at Texas Tech PD and it's a tough situation for everybody involved," Kingsbury said.

SPECIAL TEAMS GAFFES: West Virginia has seen its share of problems on special teams this season, including last week when a botched punt return led to a TCU short drive for a touchdown. The Mountaineers also missed a short field goal.

COACHING PALS: Kingsbury was the Red Raiders' quarterback under Mike Leach from 1999-02 and credits Holgorsen for getting him into coaching. Holgorsen was an assistant coach at Texas Tech from 2000-07. When Kingsbury was an offensive quality control assistant at Houston in 2008, he shared an apartment with Holgorsen, who was the Cougars' offensive coordinator.
