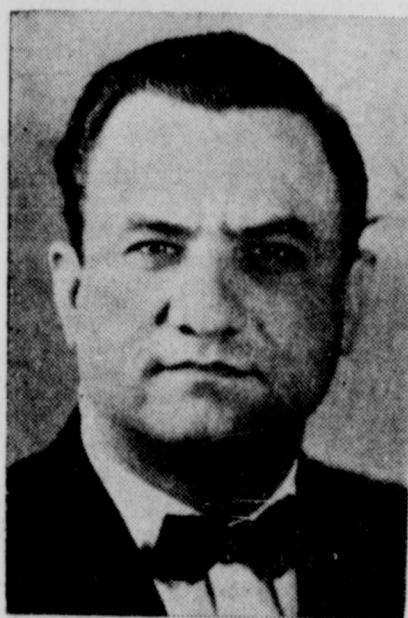


Halsey Issues Announcement For Congress



Hop Halsey, Lubbock, paid Abernathy a visit Saturday, conferring with local supporters in his race for Congress in the 19th district. While here, he authorized the Review to list his name in its political column as a candidate, subject to the Democratic primary in July, for the 19th district office.

Halsey, who said he would announce his platform at a later date, nevertheless nailed down a few planks in his talk with a reporter. He said he was opposed to any income tax on persons making less than \$3,000 a year; for a 20 percent increase in teachers' salaries; for establishing the highest priority for veterans in securing war surplus goods; for payment to all people past 65 years of age \$20 per month, regardless of whether the payment was matched by the state pension set-up.

He also said, "I am for government of the people, by the people, and for the people," and against government of the bureaus, by the bureaus and for the bureaus."

Graduated from Lubbock High school in 1931, Halsey attended Texas Tech from 1932 to 1936. After one unsuccessful campaign for the legislature, he ran successfully in 1940 and 1942 and was re-elected without opposition to a second term.

Halsey went into the army in May of 1942, as a flying cadet in the Air Forces, received an honorable discharge after nine months to finish his term in the legislature. On June 31, 1943, he enlisted in the Marine Corps in which he served until late 1945, following the conclusion of hostilities. He had 14 months at stations in the Gilbert, Marshall and Mariana Islands and upon honorable discharge he returned home to re-enter business. He was a corporal during most of his Marine service.

Halsey and his wife, the former Harriet Roach, reside at 3308 Twenty-first street, Lubbock. They have two children, Hop, Jr., 6, and Susan, 4. He is a member of the Church of Christ, Masonic bodies, Knight of Pythias, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Marine Corps League and the Lions club.

The 19th Congressional district is composed of the following counties: Andrews, Bailey, Borden, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Dickens, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Haskell, Hockley, Howard, Kent, King, Lamb, Lynn, Martin, Mitchell, Scurry, Stonewall, Terry and Yoakum. The district has a maximum voting strength of something in excess of 70,000, although 65,000 ballots in either of this year's primaries would be considered a heavy vote.

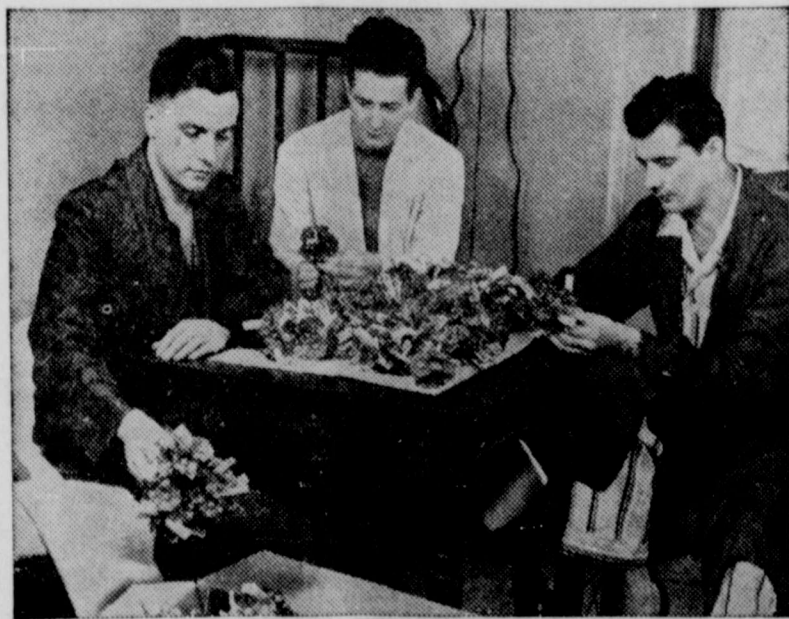

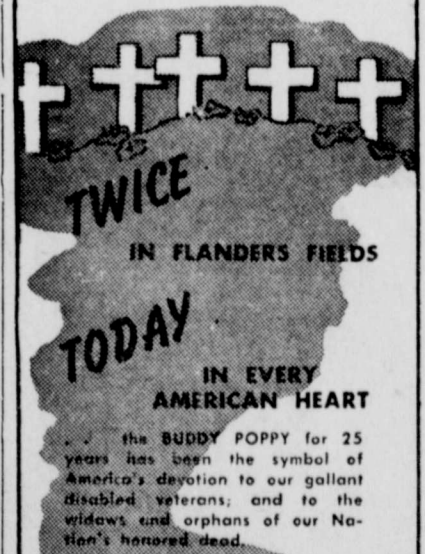
