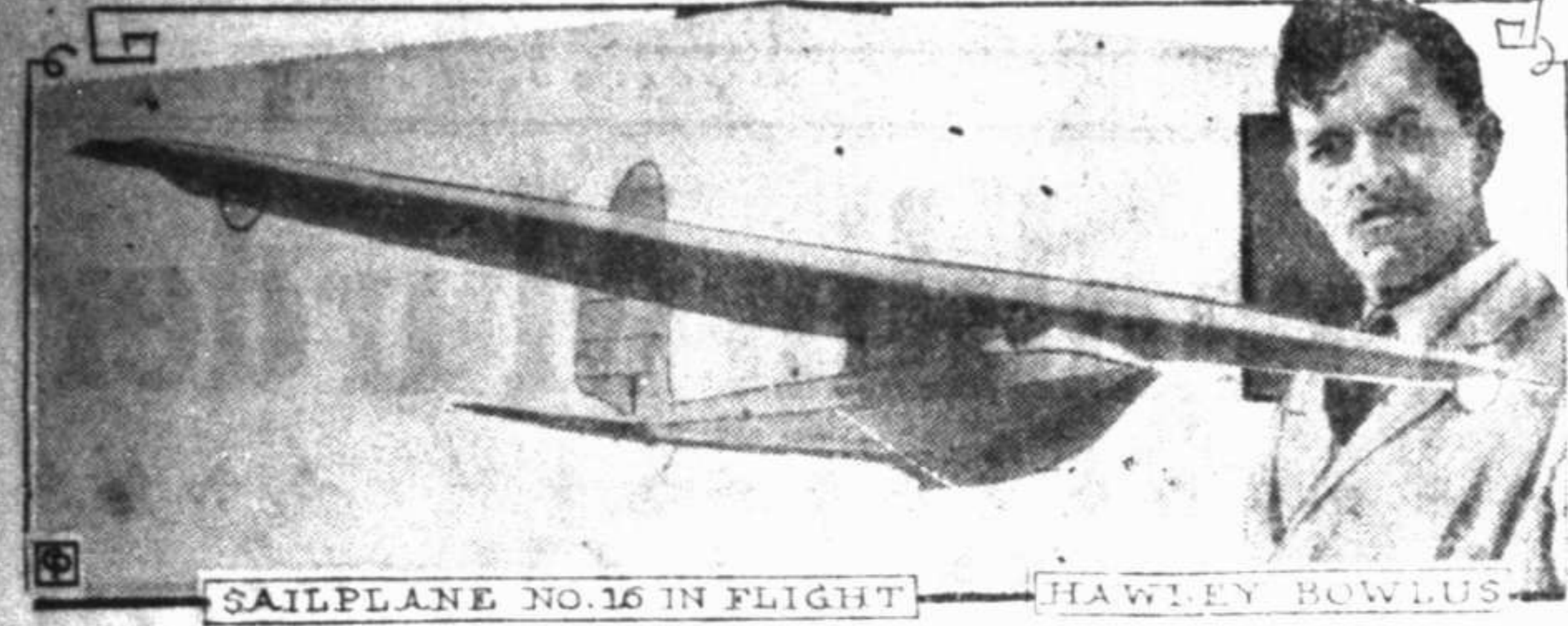


Builder Of Lindy's Famous Plane Returns To First Love—Gliders—And Establishes New U. S. Record

SAN DIEGO, Dec. 17—Whether in ocean-crossing airplanes or motorless gliders, Hawley Bowles is a champion.

The world knows him best as one of the men responsible for building the "Spirit of St. Louis." Now he is America's foremost glider pilot.

It was Bowles who had charge of the physical construction of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's historic plane. After that flight, Bowles continued building airplanes, then he shifted his field suddenly.

His first love.

To say he shifted hardly expressed it correctly. He returned to his first love—gliders—and now holds the United States record. Recently he remained aloft in his sailplane over Pt. Loma, here, for one hour

and 21 minutes.

For 16 years Bowles had been building gliders. With his first he won a school-boy meet in Los Angeles. With his sixteenth he broke the record of nine minutes and 45 seconds, set by the Wright brothers at Kittyhawk, N. C., in the early days of their experimentation.

This, incidentally, is believed to be the only American aviation record to stand unblemished since previous days.

Bowles' first motorless ships were true gliders. His most recent creation, whose wings spread 54 feet, is a true sailplane, capable of soaring to great heights before returning to earth. More than once in No. 16, as he calls it, he has swooped upward

500 feet in a single spectacular rise. You read of gliders, but see few of them. Yet Bowles presides, glider clubs will become as numerous as golf clubs. In Germany there are more glider enthusiasts than golfers.

Muscle and Judgment.

"Glider teaches a pilot, almost co-ordination of muscle and judgment," he says. In a light sailplane and under proper wind and ground conditions, a glider pilot can make his ship respond to the controls in a way a heavy power-driven plane cannot approach.

"A sailplane pilot is absolute master of his craft, can steer in any direction. It is possible, I believe, for one to sail in a light plane of this

type entirely across the United States. He would have to make advance trips to study wind and terrain, however."

Bowles says gliding has hardly reached its infancy stage in this country. Where his glider set a new American record, German gliding enthusiasts think nothing of flying several hours in a single day.

But what makes a glider glide? Or a sailplane sail? And what is a sailplane and why a glider?

Bowles' machine is a sailplane only because it weighs less than most gliders. It has a greater lifting area under the wing. His machine weighs 150 pounds empty.

Differentiation.

"A glider, generally speaking," he explains, "glides downward because of its weight. The lighter sailplane, having long, tapering wings can take advantage of even the slightest upward air movement and remain aloft indefinitely."

Bowles came down at the end of his record-breaking try because he was exhausted physically. With training, he says, one could remain aloft in a sailplane long enough to beat any heavier-than-aircraft non-revolving endurance flight.

A walk of three-quarters of a mile can be enjoyed around the promenade decks of the new Orleans liner, the Orontes. There is also an open air swimming bath on board.

America, Japan Give Naval Views

Satisfaction Evident In First Joint Session Of Principal Delegates To London Navy Parley

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—Satisfaction over results of the first exchange of views between the principal American and Japanese delegates to the London naval conference was evident today as the visiting delegation laid aside official work for the time.

Conversations initiated yesterday at a conference at the home of Henry L. Stimson, secretary of state and chairman of the American delegation, will be completely terminated in the Japanese capital by New York to sail for London.

In the first talk, conducted through the offices of Hiroshi Satoh, secretary of the Japanese delegation, an interpreter, both governments made a frank statement of their views as to their respective requirements in auxiliary naval armaments, submarines and destroyers, with which the London conference is to deal.

Secretary Stimson and former Premier Reirin Wakatsuki passed a joint statement concerning the limits of the conference, which will be signed by the plenipotentiaries.

Avoid Technical Subjects.

Technical subjects were avoided during the first session, which dealt almost wholly with broad

general questions, chief among which is the Japanese insistence upon a 10-10-7 ratio in auxiliary craft with 10,000 tons cruisers and submarines predominating as types necessary for the defense of the island kingdom.

The head of the American delegation discussed with equal frankness the defense needs of the United States in which also the 10,000 ton cruiser has a dominant role. There also was a broad treatment of political aspects involved in the conference.

The visitors turned today toward Mount Vernon and Arlington to pay tribute to the memories of Washington and the Unknown Soldier by laying a wreath upon the tomb of each.

A state dinner will be given in their honor at the White House tonight by the President and Mrs. Hoover.

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Tenth Interscholastic League Title At Stake Saturday

Breckenridge-Port Arthur Tussle At Waco Brings To Close One Of Successful Seasons In All History

No Team In Texas Disputes Right Of Buckaroos And Jackets To Fight For Championship; Waco Plays Host To Contending Teams

DALLAS, Dec. 19. (AP)—The Texas Interscholastic League, said to be the largest and most compact schoolboy athletic organization in the country, will celebrate its tenth year of existence in the meeting of the Breckenridge Buckaroos and Port Arthur Yellowjackets at Waco Saturday for the state football crown.

Organized in 1920, the league has been a powerful factor in the up-building of high school athletics in Texas. From an annual aimless scramble, in which something like a dozen teams always ended up with a claim to the title, the league has transformed the state race into a closely-knit affair, the winner recognized as champion.

A Great Season. The race just coming to a close has been the most successful in the history of the state league. Not a school that entered the chase was forced to withdraw for any reason, and eligibility rules of the league are notably strict. "I wish to deny emphatically the report that motion pictures of the Oregon-Stanford football game were sent by me to West Point. These pictures were taken for the specific purpose of showing my own players the mistakes they made against Stanford so that they could correct them. No West Point coach of player has ever seen those pictures. The report that I had sent them is unwarred and untrue."

"My plans for the ensuing year are to continue my duties at the University of Oregon. I shall return to Eugene, Oregon, about January 6. I expect to fulfill my contract, which has one year more to run completely, and I trust the university will do the same."

Captain McEwan's statement was issued as a result of confusing reports as to his plans, arising from the fact he announced in November his resignation at Oregon, effective upon the termination of his contract in 1930.

Passing Of Many Notables Is Seen

Miller Huggins And Tex Rickard Succumb In 1929—Both Famous For Making World's Champions

(Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—Two of the most famous makers of world's champions died during 1929, a year that marked the passing of many notable figures of sport.

Tex Rickard, the most picturesque and successful of all boxing promoters, died during the first week of January at Miami Beach as he was in the midst of plans for developing the Florida resort as a winter boxing capital.

Miller Huggins, mighty little manager of the New York Yankees, died late in September, his health undermined by the strain of the pennant race in which his club was beaten for the first time in four years in the American League.

Gotham Lost Pair. New York was hit hard by the loss of these two dominating forces in its sports activities. Each, along separate routes, had contributed many of the most dramatic features of the competing in which they figured. Each was forced to overcome extraordinary obstacles to success after coming to New York at about the same time to undertake their biggest jobs.

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All told, death took a heavy toll in professional sports ranks. The turf was hard-hit by the loss of such noted figures as John E. Madden, the master of Hamburg Place, Sam Hildreth and James Rome Sr., for years among the most conspicuous trainers, and Mars Cassidy, veteran starter.

The dare-devil sport of auto racing claimed among its victims Lee Bible, killed in a crash on the sands of Daytona Beach in an attempt to break the world's straightaway record, and Ray Keech, one-time holder of this speed-record. Keech was killed at Altona shortly after he had won the blue-ribbon of American long-distance racing in the 500-mile Indianapolis Sweepstakes.

Baseball Lost. Baseball, in addition to Huggins, lost John Conway Toole, president of the International League, George Staines, one-time "miracle man" of the Boston Braves when they won the world's series of 1914. Harold Prazze, famous as the man who sold Babe Ruth to the Yankees, Sherwood Magee, former National League batting king, and later an umpire, and Joe O'Brien, former president of the American association.

The Philadelphia Nationals, before the season started, lost Frank "Dutch" Ulrich, their leading pitcher in 1928, who died after a brief illness at Baltimore. After the season the star young Philly catcher, Walter Lerman, died following an auto accident, also in Baltimore.

Old Time Passes. Among old-time ring figures to pass on were Frank Slavin, a heavyweight in the days of John L. Sullivan, and Eddie McGoorty, a clever boxer.

Young men of wealthy families in Greece are taking up motorcycling as a sport. The British flyweight champion, Johnny Hill, died from a ruptured blood vessel while training for a title fight with Frankie Campbell of New York in England. The fatal accident was recorded as being among obscure boxing events.

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Wrecked Steamer Lies 10 Fathoms Under Oily Seas

Crew Of 165 And Passenger List Of 206 Safe After Vessel Is Ramm'd Near New York Harbor

NEW YORK, Dec. 19. (AP)—Under an oily sea ten fathoms deep the Furness Bermuda Liner Fort Victoria today lay on the muddy bottom of the Atlantic ocean just off Ambrose lightship, but her 206 passengers and crew of 165 were safe ashore.

A half mile or more away, still held to anchorage by a binding for that had sent her crashing into the Fort Victoria late yesterday afternoon was the Clyde Steamer Algonquin, her ship's bell ringing out a doleful dirge through the heavy air. Her bow was stuck, but she was said to be in no danger.

Search For Ship—A salvage tug that within a week of the U. S. lighthouse service had been searching with grappling hooks through the night for the hulk of the ship, lay alongside the watery grave of the Fort Victoria warning other vessels entering Ambrose channel of the new menace to navigation.

It had been hoped by Clyde line officials that the Algonquin could return to New York during the night to allow transfer of her passengers to other ships for a continuation of their journey, but the fog raised a. impenetrable barrier

Ashore four investigations were started into the disaster which caused the loss of a \$1,250,000 ship, its \$250,000 cargo and uncounted personal losses to her passengers, most of whom lost all their traveling equipment and clothes, except those they wore when transferred to pilot boats and tugs from the sinking ship.

Passengers Sleep—In the Hotel McAlpin, where 220 rooms had been reserved for them by the Furness line, the passengers and crew of the Fort Victoria slept late today as the line went ahead with preparations to send all those who wanted to continue their voyage to Bermuda in another ship, the Fort St. George.

Several of the early risers said they had not made up their minds as to whether they would continue their voyage, several said they wished to get in touch with relatives first, while others pointed out that they would have to stop for new clothing and traveling equipment before continuing their journey.

Loath To Talk—Capt. A. R. Francis of the Fort Victoria, last night to leave his ship and then not until he had turned on his side, was loath to discuss the crash, reserving any comment he might have to make on the ears of the line's officials and official investigators of the cause.

It was feared the ship would be a total loss and might have to be abandoned to clear the strait for Ambrose channel.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 19. (AP)—Governor Kohler of Wisconsin today drafted a reply to a telegram from Governor Dan Moody of Texas, who asked for more consideration before banning the sale of certain Rio Grande Valley lands in Wisconsin. His reply yesterday prevented the governor from studying the case and assuming the Texas executive of his attitude.

At a hearing before the state real estate brokers board, application of the Progress Development company of Houston, Tex., for a 1200-acre tract in Rio Grande Valley was considered.

Claims Gamble—E. W. Watt, president and general manager of the water district in which the Progress property is located, said the person who buys irrigated land in the Rio Grande valley was gambling as irrigation was essential because of both rainfall.

Watt said citrus fruits could be grown successfully in the valley if irrigation was provided that only in national sale of financial setbacks since 1922, had there been a plan to move into Rio Grande valley.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Judged on points, like an animal in a bench show, Patrick J. Hurley looks almost 100 per cent perfect for his new job as secretary of war.

He is Mars of an up-to-date type, to be sure.

The old model was of the knock-down-and-drag-out style of construction, strong, doubtless, but bulky, thick-skulled. Built for wear and tear, not for speed.

Activity is the keynote of Secretary Hurley's pattern. No hint of fragility, however. But steel, rather than solid masonry.

The new war secretary is a fine erect figure of a man, with a handsome face.

Reckoning him at 47 (which he is not by a few weeks) he is half a dozen years the junior of Secretary of Agriculture Hyde, hitherto the baby of President Hoover's cabinet, 28 years Secretary Mellon's junior; nearly 12 years under the average age of the entire cabinet.

Just over each of his ears is a speck of grey; otherwise not a streak of it in his thick brown hair or clipped mustache. Clipped, but (thank heaven) not in the toothbrush fashion which some military men still affect—a dire aftermath of the war.

Tallish and wiry, the latest addition to the official presidential family is broad of shoulder and deep of chest but carries no superfluous weight about with him.

At a guess, he would tip the beam around 175 pounds—practically all bone and muscle.

If any of his medicine ball training partners make President Hoover pant considerably, Pat Hurley probably is most successful at it. Well, he ought to be—with youth and an evident training in his favor—for he would pass for the late 30's and his pose and carriage are an athlete's.

Besides "Pat," they call him "Colonel."

He was a cavalry captain in the Indian Territory militia and later in the Oklahoma national guard, but rose to a lieutenant colonel's rank in the A. E. F.

The colonel, then, is bold and agile of feature, but his expression is amiable, in fact, humorous.

It is an expression which does not belie him.

"Have you had many telegrams?" asked one of his callers, at his initial audience to the newspaper boys following his elevation to a full secretary's post in the cabinet, meaning congratulatory telegrams, of course.

"Yes, Lots. Condoling with the government," said Pat, with a wide grin.

Pat Hurley does not give the impression of being particularly a politician.

Maybe he really is not.

It is quite a custom with presidents to appoint the members of their cabinets for political reasons, and their first assistants to do the actual work.

The late Secretary of War Good certainly was chosen for his political reasons, so perhaps it was deemed expedient, essential to provide him with a more than usually able assistant—and, as the country knew, Colonel Hurley got the job.

At any rate, the war department speaks of it as a happy augury that Mr. Good's successor has had a few months' experience working his way up to the top.
