IN FILM PROBE

Second Writer Refuses To Admit Membership In Reds

WASHINGTON, October 28. (AP)—A second screen writer, Dalton Trumbo, refused today to tell a House un-American activities subcommittee whether he is a communist, and the group voted to cite him for contempt.

Trumbo, as did John Howard Lawson yesterday, took the stand that the committee had no right to question him about his political beliefs.

The 42-year-old writer was excused from the witness stand amid loud applause from spectators in the hearing room.

Chairman Thomas (R-NJ) pounded with his gavel and warned the audience to refrain from demonstrations.

After Lawson refused to answer a question yesterday as to whether he had been a communist, the committee voted to cite him for contempt. This is an action which has to go to house officials, but could eventually lead to prosecution in the courts.

Churchill Calls For An End To Price Control

LONDON, Oct. 28. (U)—Winston Churchill called upon the British labor government today to follow the lead of the United States in removing price controls and to toss aside socialist planning which he said was holding up national economic recovery.

Making his fourth attempt to unseat the labor government by parliamentary motion, the opposition leader declared that nationalization of basic industries had failed and weakened the nation in time of economic crisis.

"I feel fortified by what has happened in the United States," he declared, adding:

"The sovereign remedy to our present ills and darkening misfortune is to set the people free."

"Nationalization has proved a failure," the Opposition Leader told the House of Commons. "Dear food, dear coal and soon dearer transport—gravelously weaken our competitive powers in foreign markets."

With Churchill leading the attack, the conservative party mustered its forces for an assault on the labor government's legislative program for the coming year which calls for further nationalization of vital industries and curtailment of the powers of the House of Lords.

CIO Resolution Hits Communism

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 28. (U)—A resolution condemning communism was approved by the Texas state industrial union council, CIO, after rejecting a minority report assailing the resolution.

The resolution denounced the communist party as a "subversive organization bearing allegiance to a foreign power." It also denounced action of the communists for joining "with the enemies of labor in Texas by appearing before the labor committee during the last (Texas) legislative session pretending to intervene in their behalf, thereby assuring passing of anti-labor legislation."

The minority report assailing the resolution as "an opening wedge to make targets of any group for reasons of race, creed, color, or political belief" was backed by Luther L. Cosby, Houston, and Martin Johnson, Port Arthur, both of the national maritime union, and E. R. Brock, Fort Worth, transport workers.

Mahon Says Aid Is Political Must For U. S.

Congressman Says Democracy Is At Stake

STANTON, Oct. 28. —George H. Mahon, representative from the 19th congressional district, told a capacity crowd at the high school auditorium here Monday evening that aid to Europe is dictated by hard political necessities.

Even without consideration to humanitarianism, the U. S. is confronted with the challenge to sustain democratic elements in countries not yet behind the iron curtain of Russia, he said.

He told his listeners candidly that a withdrawal by the U. S. at this time would create a vacuum into which Russia would move promptly, setting up more puppet regimes receiving orders directly from Moscow.

He looked upon an aid program as a probable investment toward peace, for spread of Russian domination to the Mediterranean and Atlantic would create a situation which might cost the U. S. vastly more in preparing for any eventualities, he believed.

The congressman reviewed his inspections on England, Germany, France, Italy, Trieste and Greece as a member of the 19-member special Herter committee charged with responsibility of recommending a course of action to the Congress when it reconvenes on Nov. 17.

In order to crystallize opinions of the committee, Mahon will leave for Washington from Colorado City on Nov. 4, he said, to attend sessions preparatory to submission of a report of findings to Congress.

In his talk here, which followed a visit with the Stanton Lions club, Mahon reiterated his findings of privations, of a consciousness among the masses that a big tug-of-war was being waged. Elton Gilliland, county attorney, introduced Mahon here.

Cabinet Approves Ramadier Speech

PARIS, Oct. 28. (U)—Premier Paul Ramadier's middle-of-the-road cabinet unanimously approved today the fighting reply to Gen. Charles De Gaulle which the socialist premier is to deliver this afternoon in the National Assembly.

Interior Minister Edouard Depreux said Ramadier had outlined to the cabinet the "defense of the Fourth Republic" he intends to make in answer to De Gaulle's call yesterday for dissolution of Parliament and subsequent new elections.

Depreux said the socialist, radical-socialist and popular republican ministers in the cabinet which Ramadier streamlined last week in the face of a De Gaulle victory in the municipal elections endorsed the speech outlined.

City Tax Payments Near Halfway Mark

Wheat Again Hits Three Dollar Mark

Three dollar a bushel wheat reappeared at the Chicago board of trade today for the first time since President Truman's call for a special session of Congress to fight inflation and aid Europe sent prices tumbling.

December wheat hit the \$3 mark, after opening strong and moving steadily higher during the first hour of trading.

Hog prices continued to decline at the principal livestock markets in the Midwest. The decline of 30 to 75 cents a hundred pounds at Chicago followed a slump yesterday as much as \$1.50.

Egg futures declined slightly at Chicago but butter figures moved up nearly a cent a pound.

Reports Spur Searchers For Missing Plane

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, Oct. 28. (U)—Plagued by continuing bad weather, a steadily growing fleet of air and surface craft set out again today in search of a missing Pan American World Airways clipper—spurred by new unconfirmed reports of smoke and flares near the Alaskan-British Columbia border.

As all earlier clues to the fate of the four-engine DC-4 which disappeared Sunday with 18 passengers and crewmen aboard proved unfruitful, the Coast Guard announced receipt of reports of smoke on Dundas Island, 55 miles southeast of Ketchikan, and of flares on Graham Island, just south of the Alaska-British Columbia border. Rescue ships were assigned both areas.

The weather bureau forecast continuing low visibility and some rain, conditions which hampered considerably yesterday's search of higher mountain elevations along the coast.

Shuttling plane pilots and surface vessels alike brought back a discouraging "no clues" report after beating a blanket path over the 280 mile route from Ketchikan to Juneau and return.

The ill-fated DC-4 airliner disappeared Sunday after radioing the Annette airport at 1:44 p. m. that "extreme turbulence" prevented a scheduled landing.

Mine Plan May Use Subsidies

EL PASO, Oct. 28. (U)—Subsidies aimed to keep mines in operation and build up strategic stockpiles, may be included in a "dynamic" minerals program to be presented Congress, Sec. of Interior J. A. Krug declared here.

Krug told the American Mining Congress yesterday that the program would be submitted by the Truman Administration.

He indicated that the several subsidy proposals under consideration would be for the purpose of keeping mines operating and to build up reserves.

Rep. Fred A. Hartley, Jr., (R-NJ), co-author of the Hartley labor law, was to follow Krug today as featured speaker at the Congress.

Krug further told the miners that he planned to name a minerals council to advise the Congress and the President "in the further development of a sound national minerals policy." He said he expected to name the group next month.

Red Revolt In Bolivia Reported

RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 28. (U)—The justice ministry said today that Col. Joaquim Rondon, governor of the Brazilian frontier territory of Guapore, had informed it that communist elements had captured the Bolivian border town of Guayara.

The Governor's province is on the Bolivian frontier.

The ministry quoted Rondon as saying his information was based on a report to him from a Capt. Hernan of the Bolivian Army at the Brazilian frontier town of Guayara Mirim.

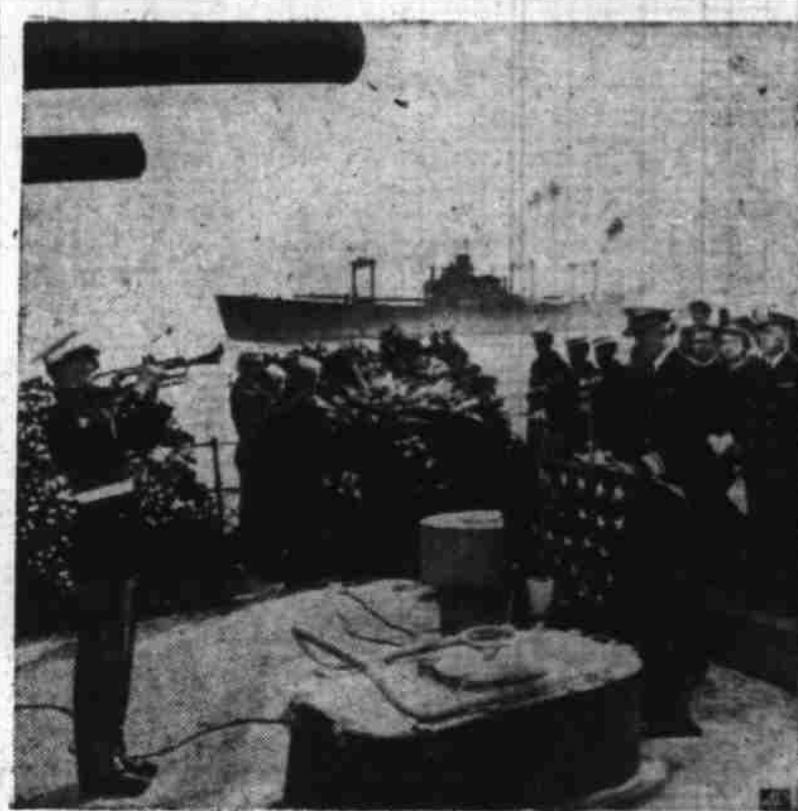

IN NEW PLANE

Oilman Crashes To Death Near Here

Body of Fred Childers, who crashed to his death in a private plane in a cotton field some 22 miles northwest of Big Spring at approximately 9 o'clock last night, was taken overland by an Eberley Funeral home carrier to Seminole this morning for burial.

Childers, about 38 years of age, apparently was seeking to land the light craft, a Cessna 140, when he crashed. Observers said the ship did a cartwheel in a field on the Claude Russell place apparently killing the occupant almost instantly.

Papers removed from Childers' person showed he left San Antonio earlier in the day and apparently was headed for his home in Seminole. His ship was heard to roar over Big Spring shortly before the crash-up. Investigators theorized he was looking for the local landing field but missed it in the rain and fog, which kept the ceiling at about 300 feet.

The victim was a prominent oil operator in the Seminole sector. He is survived by a wife and two children, the names of whom could not be learned immediately.

Investigating officers said Childers was flying a new craft, which was all but demolished in the accident. Internal injuries and a broken back are believed to have caused Childers' death. He lost very little blood.

Milk Price Hike Shown In Survey

The price of milk has been or will be increased in all sections of Texas, a survey showed today. Upward revisions of retail and in some cases wholesale prices have already gone into effect or are scheduled in Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Denison, Lubbock, Paris, Greenville, McAllen, Abilene, Lubbock, San Angelo, Austin and Tyler.

At Corpus Christi, milk is 24 cents per quart, an increase from 22 cents. Homogenized milk there is bringing 25 cents per quart.

Results of the survey, city by city: Denison: pasteurized milk will go from 19 to 20 cents per quart Nov. 1.

Lufkin: dairies plan a price hike of two cents a quart to 23 cents Nov. 1.

Fort Worth: boosts in both retail and wholesale prices. Effective Oct. 15, the following retail schedules went into effect: pasteurized milk, 20 cents quart, up one cent; homogenized, 21, up one; buttermilk, 16, up one; cream per quart, 75 cents, up four; whipping cream, \$1.30 quart, up 20 cents; half pints whipping cream, 35 cents, up five.

Success Will Depend Upon Self Denial

Luckman Will Meet Soon With Meat Packers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28. (AP)—The Citizens Food Committee today estimated that it is 35 per cent along the way toward President Truman's goal of saving 100,000,000 bushels of grain for the relief of winter distress in Europe.

Industry pledges will account for some 35,000,000 bushels in the next 90 days, a committee official said, but most of the rest must come from public self-denial and in farm savings of grain fed to livestock.

In the hope of tapping another industry source, committee Chairman Charles Luckman will meet shortly with meat packing representatives, the official disclosed.

Meantime the White House and legislators of both parties made plans for the Nov. 17 special session of Congress which Mr. Truman hopes will furnish about \$1,000,000,000 to get the grain and other products overseas while setting up controls against inflation at home.

Senator Taft of Ohio, candidate for the GOP presidential nomination, summoned the Senate's Republican steering committee into a meeting three days ahead of the special session. Republicans have undertaken to write a price program of their own, to match anything that Mr. Truman sends to Capitol Hill.

One high White House adviser said last night that a proposal for price control at the level of the producer—but not the consumer—is getting "serious consideration" within the government and among Congress members.

He indicated such price proposals would embrace only a limited number of basic foods and commodities in world-wide short supply and could by no means be compared with OPA-style price ceilings.

Taft told reporters in Boston yesterday, he believes the special session can wind up by December 19 and in that time can complete action not only on prices and foreign emergency aid but possibly on the Marshall plan for long-range reconstruction of Europe.

There was speculation, in view of the food committee's approaching meeting with the meat industry, whether Chairman Luckman might ask the packers to refuse hogs and beef cattle fattened to the quality of "choice."

Texan Perishes In Swedish Plane Crash

LIOPESI, Greece, Oct. 28. (U)—Some 180 Greek Army stretcher bearers were to make the rocky descent of Mt. Hymettos today bringing down the broken bits of bodies of the 44 persons killed Sunday night when a Swedish airliner struck the peak.

The Swedish Airlines System has announced that among the dead were Miss Gloria Marie Russer, 34, of Dallas, and Edwin Wanner, 39, of Washington. The wreckage burned after striking the mountain.

IN SPEECH

Clark Supports Tideland Decree

BOSTON, Oct. 28. (U)—refuting his remarks by asserting he was a Texan and a staunch supporter of states' rights, Attorney General Tom Clark yesterday called upon state attorneys general to support a U. S. Supreme Court Government's claim to off-shore coastal land.

Clark told the 41st annual meeting of the National Association of Attorneys General he believed agreements could be reached in 90 per cent of present disputed cases.

He said the Federal government made no claim to inland or "man-made" land or waters and that among areas excluded from consideration was submarine, oil-rich terrain off Long Beach, Calif.

"All that we claim," he said, "is that the Federal government owns the bottom of the ocean three miles out."

Clark said the government contended oil wells in disputed areas off the coast should continue in operation in escrow until settlement is reached, by agreement, if possible.

He suggested a committee of attorneys general "try to work out some effective way that we can carry out the mandate of the Supreme Court of the United States."

Clark told the attorneys general "We are trying to ferret out" the adherents of "isms" who advocate overthrow of the American form of government, and that they are being deported—"in the American way, not by any gestapo methods or kangaroo court."

Many of the attorneys-general from various states expressed opposition to the supreme court decree.

Attorney-General Price Daniel of Texas, called on the association to continue its efforts for congressional legislation to establish state dominion definitely over tideland waters, and Attorney-General Walter R. Johnson of Nebraska, president of the group, said that a resolution to that effect may be acted upon today.

Newspaper Food Page Editors Hear Appeals From The President

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 28. (N)—Newspaper food page editors in conference here yesterday heard appeals from President Truman and Charles Luckman for aid in the nation's food conservation program.

The President's message was read to the group of 80 women editors by J. H. Sawyer of Chicago, Ill., chairman of the conference.

"This is a voluntary campaign in the best American tradition and it depends for its success on the cooperation of farmers, industry and consumers," the President's message said.

"Food editors can be helpful by keeping consumers fully informed about lower-priced foods and by helping disseminate information regarding food-saving recipes and diets."

Luckman's message, read by

Katherine Fisher, head of the Consumer Service section of the Citizens Food committee which Luckman heads, said in part:

"You influence the day-by-day food buying of millions of families who want help and guidance in following this program. We are counting on you to give them this help."

Miss Fisher, principal speaker at a banquet at a leading French restaurant here, said the objective of the committee is to "find 100,000,000 bushels of wheat" to make up the difference between Europe's minimum needs of 570,000,000 bushels and the 470,000,000 available in this country for export.

"The obvious way for consumers to help is by the moderate use of wheat products," she said. "But an even more effective way is reducing the consumption of poultry and livestock, because three fourths of all the grain raised in the United States goes into livestock feeding."

IN CHINA

Nationalists Outlaw Democratic League

NANKING, Oct. 28. (AP)—China's governing party outlawed today its minority-party, liberal opposition, the Democratic League—which termed the action "most unfair" but indicated it would be wise for members to obey and disband.

The league's principal spokesman, Lo Lung-Chi, left his closely-guarded house today and met the press in the reception room of the American embassy. No one else was permitted to leave or enter Lo's house, ringed by government secret police and with its telephone lines cut.

Lo said the government order outlawing the league was "entirely unexpected," but "I think it wise for league members to obey."

He estimated there are 20,000 league members in government-controlled sectors of China who would be affected.

(In Shanghai, the league's local chairman said no definite action had been taken as yet against members there.)

Lo reported that the league had written Premier Chang Chun and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek recently, asking for a conference to clear away "whatever misunderstanding existed," but that there had been no reply.

Announcing the outlawing of the league this morning, a ministry of the interior spokesman said the action was necessary because of league activities "calculated to overthrow the government." He said everybody knew the league was participating in "the communist revolt" against the government, and he blamed it for trying to start a Manchurian revolt, for student agitation in several Chinese cities last May, and for labor troubles in Shanghai.

The government spokesman predicted widespread arrests of league members; but Lo, he indicated, might not be bothered "if he lives peacefully."

SHICK SAYS

Potential Patrons Are Not Ready For New Mail Service

Potential patrons of the approved extension on free mail delivery must get into high gear this week if the service is inaugurated on Nov. 1.

Postmaster Nat Shick made a survey Monday of the 85 blocks approved for addition to the post office's mounted carrier service. This is what he found:

No mail boxes erected.

No calls or notification for change in delivery address.

One of the boxes was on Bluebonnet street, the other on George street. There were no boxes on any other streets, including the North Side.

At least 50 per cent of the potential patrons should be equipped for service before it can be inaugurated, said the postmaster.

To expedite matters, he urged those on the blocks to be added to arrange at once for mail boxes. These should be the rural route type of box, bottom of which is to be four and a half feet from the curb level.

When this is done, notice should be given at once to the post office to start delivery to the home address.

Labor Piracy Is Reported

AUSTIN, Oct. 28. (AP)—Labor piracy among employers is springing up again with Texas undergoing a serious labor shortage becoming more acute each week.

Texas Unemployment Commission Chairman Harry Bengtson reported yesterday.

Crozier said job applicants are fewer than ever before in the employment service's history.

For the first time since 1945, we are conducting intensive recruitment drives for common and semi-skilled labor and for secretaries, clerks, and typists. The demand in these categories far outstrips the supply," he said.

"The metropolitan press carries from three to eight columns of 'help wanted' advertising every day. Those ads are from employers bidding in the open labor market for people now on jobs.

"Frequently, large numbers of applicants will be in our offices waiting for the highest bidder. This is a thing over which we have no control."

Sheppard Tells Of Progress In SA Work

Encouraging results have been obtained in three months of open-air meetings, Capt. Olvy Sheppard of the Salvation Army said Tuesday in connection with release of his quarterly report.

In addition to the 24 downtown meetings, which had an estimated 3100 audience within range of a public address system, there have been a series of meetings in tourist camps.

In 27 of these meetings in the past quarter, young people distributed 350 Gospel portions, 450 pieces of literature, visited the sick, contacted 1,624 other young people about Sunday school and church attendance, visited 368 families, and enrolled 10 members as a result.

Meetings are held regularly on Tuesday and Thursdays, alternating between these camps during the month: Russell's, 1101 W. 3rd; Cap Rock, Lamesa highway; Owl Camp, 1226 W. 3rd; Shipley camp, 1211 W. 3rd; De's Camp, 1215 1-2 W. 3rd; Palace, 1011 E. 3rd; Magnolia, 1408 E. 3rd.

During August, September and October, a total of 194 young people took an active part in the downtown meetings, in which 192 persons requested prayer and one conversion reported.

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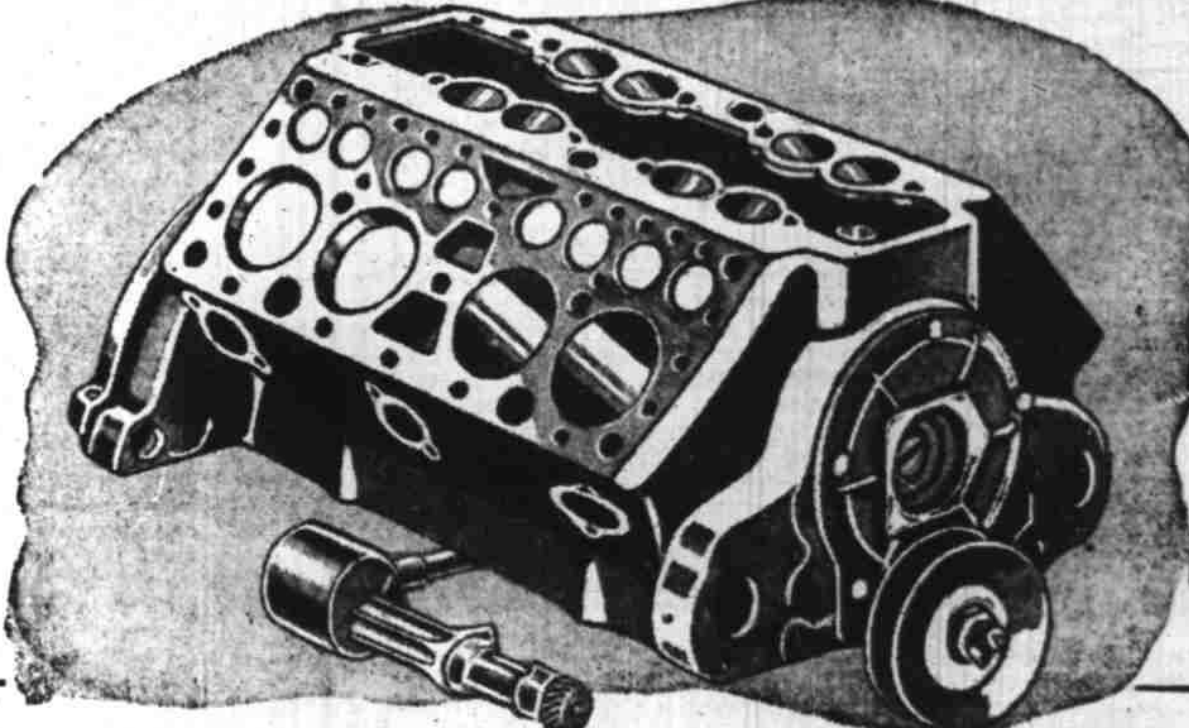

Naval Development Due Support

We have just passed another Navy Day, which has its significance in directing the attention of the nation, at least once a year, to the importance of this arm of the service.

Admiral Nimitz is correct in his premise that the Navy can serve only to the extent which it is supported by the public. It might fall short of that mark, but it cannot exceed it.

We follow extremes in our regard for the services in general, and particularly the Navy. At one moment the Navy seems to be the one thing needed to insure security. The next moment we believe it is outmoded.

Between these extremes is the truth. The Navy remains a potent force, for it is our long arm for fending off attack, our

left jab for in-close fighting and bombardment; it is our oceanic reconnaissance and patrol. It is not, however, the quarantine against spread of war from distant shores to our own.

There might come a day when the Navy will be no longer needed, but it is not in the immediate future by any means. This instrument of defense will still play a vital role in outpost work, possibly launching guided missiles closer to the scene of action and far from home shores. Designs and battle formations may change drastically, and the air arm is destined to play an increasingly greater part of the team. All in all, the Navy still has an important job to fulfill in this nation, and the people should see to it that it is not constricted in its efforts to meet its obligations.

Contribution In Time And Service

This is Girl Scout week, and fitting recognition is being paid to the program which utilizes the leisure time of girls in constructive channels.

Most people are familiar with the objectives of Girl Scouts, which, reduced to fundamentals, is to make our future women more useful individuals in our communities and nation. They learn by doing, and in the process have their thinking directed to becoming stronger citizens and acquiring the attributes of solid character.

While girls are to be congratulated upon their participation in the movement, adults who give their time and influence to directing young girls are to be commended especially. Whatever merit any program may have is meaningless unless there are

those who will sacrifice some of their own pleasures to press for objectives.

This is particularly true in the Girl Scout program, for after all is said and done, the real point of effectiveness is the woman who will assume and discharge the responsibility of leading a troop. This is not easy work. It does not pay one penny.

It does return great reward, however, in the satisfaction of seeing young lives develop, in seeing youngsters catch visions and learning to grow as leaders, in seeing energies expended in wholesome manner, and in watching the rapt expression of youngsters in moments of inspiration. There are few of any greater contributions a woman could make to society than to volunteer for this fruitful experience.

The Nation Today—James Marlow—

Meanings Given To 'Americanism'

WASHINGTON, (U-P)—What is "Americanism?"

You've seen that word—and others, like "un-American," "disloyal," and "security risk"—more and more in recent weeks.

Right now a committee of the House of Representatives is investigating communism in Hollywood. Its name is "the committee on un-American activities."

"Un-American"—what does it mean? Webster's New International Dictionary gives this definition: "Not characteristic of, or consistent with American customs, principles, etc."

And for "Americanism," Webster's says: "Attachment or loyalty to the United States, its traditions, interests or ideals."

But the dictionary doesn't say which customs, principles or

ideals. Back in 1939, the committee on un-American activities, reporting on its first year of existence, defined Americanism in several hundred words.

Here are some of the things the committee said then:

"In the first place, Americanism is recognition of the truth that the inherent and fundamental rights of man are derived from God and not from governments, societies, dictators, kings or majorities."

Some people in this country don't believe in God. Are they un-American? The committee didn't say. But it continued:

"The essence of Americanism is class, religious and racial tolerance. x x x therefore, a man who advocates class hatred is plainly un-American, even if he professes racial and religious tolerance."

"It is as un-American to hate one's neighbor because he has

more of the world's material goods as it is to hate him because he was born into another race or worships God according to a different faith."

Recently, both President Truman and the state department have added some definitions dealing with the same subject.

The President, asking Congress for money to investigate "disloyalty" in the government, defined "disloyalty" this way:

"Membership in, affiliation with or sympathetic association with any foreign or domestic organization, association, movement, group or combination of persons, designated by the attorney general as totalitarian, fascist, communist or subversive."

Also members of groups which favor taking away the constitutional rights of others by force, or which want to change the form of the United States government in some way not allowed by the Constitution,

Well, in time he went into business for himself. He and Aunt Stella opened a small neighborhood grocery store. He did well during the war and now he's sold his store and decided to take life easy. He still is a few years shy of 60, and the old wanderlust has got him. The rest of the family can't get over the fact one of the tribe really has retired, and they want him to stay put.

"Well, I haven't seen California," says Uncle Boobly, "and I ain't getting any younger."

A Look At Eisenhower Bandwagon

WASHINGTON. — Some of General Eisenhower's comrades-in-arms are licking their lips over the prospect of his being President of the United States.

At a Washington dinner party the other night, guests crowded round vivacious Anthony Drexel Biddle of the Philadelphia banking family whom FDR elevated from court tennis champion to U. S. ambassador to Poland.

As guests gathered around Tony, admiring his medals, Gen. Edwin Sibert, intelligence officer, remarked:

"Tony, you'd better not go back to Europe. Stay in this country and get aboard the Eisenhower bandwagon. It's going places."

Tony looked wistful but said nothing. Perhaps he remembered the \$90,000 he contributed to the Roosevelt bandwagon before he got his ambassadorship, and also how Chip Robert, then treasurer of the Democratic national committee used to phone him in Europe, brazenly hinting that Democratic coffers were very low and the state department was avidly eyeing his job.

Whether he remembered or not, the democratic Mr. Biddle did not move to join the Eisenhower bandwagon.

Note—Gen. Sibert, in charge of Gen. Bradley's intelligence and who let the U. S. Army get caught asleep in the battle of the bulge, has now been promoted to a top spot with central intelligence group, the super-duper intelligence agency of the entire government. Twelve people recently were kicked out of central intelligence for suspected disloyalty, but the man who refused to believe in Germans were massing in the Ardennes remains a top executive. HOLLYWOOD VS. CEMENT

While the House un-American affairs committee made headlines with its Hollywood hoopla, the Supreme Court, just across the capitol lawn, was quietly making history but no headlines. Scores of newsmen and photographers jammed the house caucus room to hear Congressman Thomas of New Jersey demand a right to be heard. In the Supreme Court, however, only one newsmen was present, while about \$5,000,000 worth of the best legal brains New York could muster listened to a dreary but vital argument going to the roots of American free enterprise.

The case was the Federal Trade Commission's opposition to the cement industry's basing-point formula, by which the cement manufacturer in Keokuk, Ia., sells cement to the builder in San Francisco for exactly the same price as he sells to the builder in Keokuk. In other words, it is charged that all the nation's cement manufacturers conspire to fix prices, so that no matter what the cost of freight shipment, the price of cement throughout the entire U. S. A. is just the same.

Actually far more than cement was at stake in the Supreme Court hearing. For the cement industry follows the same basing-point monopolistic system, so that upon the Supreme Court's ruling partly depends the future of American competition.

That is why so many of the nation's top lawyers overflowed the court to such an extent that they had to sit in the spectators' seats. "Wild Bill" Donovan, grizzled World War I hero, represented the cement institute. At his side sat fiery, silver-haired Nathan Miller, ex-governor of New York, backed by 75 other high-salaried barristers, including U. S. Steel's chief counsel, Roy Bough.

Facing this overpowering array were two government lawyers, Charles Weston of the justice department and Walter Wooden of the Federal Trade Commission, whose salaries are less than \$10,000 a year each. Weston opened the case for the government by citing the sealed bids submitted to supply cement for the U. S. penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas. Seven independent producers submitted bids—each identical down to a ten-thousandth fraction of a cent—regardless of how far they had to ship the cement. On another occasion, the Illinois highway commission requested bids for delivery to 102 different destinations. Nine producers bid an identical price.

"Here are some 75 different producers," squeaked Weston, "selling at thousands of places, and all using the same system in substantially all sales with minor variations."

SHOE OFF IN COURT

Answering the charges, war hero "Wild Bill" Donovan, once GOP chief of the antitrust division, denied that the FTC ever found any evidence of an industry-wide agreement not to undersell each other. Supreme Court justices, however, were

skeptical. "If a customer in Ohio wanted to buy cement from Atlas," interrupted Justice Stanley Reed, "How would Atlas know what price to quote?"

"Well, he would get it out of the field," explained Donovan. "He would have his own intelligence system to do that. They all have. All they need to do is to send someone out in that area. They pick it up. They get it over the phone."

"For each transaction, each inquiry, they have to go through that?" snapped Reed.

"Well," hedged the man once entrusted with enforcement of the anti-trust laws under Coolidge, "they have salesmen in the field too, in all of those areas, and those salesmen telephone in. That information is coming in every day."

As the hearing ground on, Government Attorney Weston, who was dressed in long tails and striped pants, idly removed a shoe and freed his toes.

Hoary Ex-Governor Miller wound up the argument for the cement industry. As we steam-rolled down the homestretch, Justice Frank Murphy tried to ask a question.

"I've only got five minutes, your honor," barked Miller, rushing on with his oratory.

CRACKDOWN

When Wall Street's gilt-edged legal talent arrived at the justice department to make one last effort to sidetrack the big antitrust crackdown on investment bankers, they had not seen the column of that same morning.

However, Gerhard Gesell, attorney for Smith, Barney & Co., pulled the column out of his pocket, passed it around among his colleagues. With long faces they read that President Truman and Attorney General Tom Clark were determined to crack down on Wall Street's investment monopoly, would not compromise on the long-delayed antitrust case.

Nevertheless, Donald C. Swaland of Cravath, De Gersdorff, Swaine & Moore, representing Kuhn, Loeb & Co., acted as spokesman. He made a plea to justice department officials that the seventeen big houses which had always been allowed to combine on financing were unwilling to disband now.

Justice department attorneys listened, stood pat. The government suit against Wall Street is expected shortly.

It should come as good news to enthusiasts of the Longhorn baseball league, if not to the players themselves, that the circuit directors are adopting a deader ball for 1948 play.

In place of the old pelota, which ricocheted like a bullet off the bats of the Longhorn hitters during the 1947 season, the board has voted to use the Worth ball, which is doctored but by no means has had all the rabbit taken out of it.

The league, in its first season of operation this year, produced 42,300 hitters who played regularly, an amazing total even for a Class D organization. Of that number, three clouted 400 or better with Jim Prince of Midland setting the pace with a .426 mark.

Such averages look tremendous on paper but, at the same time, tend to make the pitching appear inferior. In reality, the hurling was, as the worst, ordinary. The ball, coupled with the penchant of the official scorers to be too liberal with their favorites, was mostly to blame for the astronomical averages.

The player who hit less than .350, unless he drove in an enormous amount of runs, simply did not rate in the eyes of the ivory hunters. Pitchers and the clubs' infielders in particular should breathe a sigh of relief. Apparently all the skipper within the circuit had complaints from their mounting casualties—frightened young short fielders who were losing teeth when "screaming meanies" took bad hops and bashed them in their respective faces.

A grand total of 621 home runs were hit by the six teams in the league during the 1947 campaign. Three of the troupes each drove out 100 or better.

That figure is bound to fall and, despite all arguments to the contrary, the circuit will not suffer for it. All a matter of fact, the circuit smash will become



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Aggie Offense Built Around Stan Hollmig

DALLAS, Oct. 28. (U.P.)—The value of Stanley Hollmig to Texas A. and M.'s football team is best illustrated by the figures.

Statistics of Southwest conference football for the season to date, released by James H. Stewart, executive secretary, show Hollmig not only is a great punter but that he's the heart and soul of the Aggie offense.

The big boy from Hondo has booted 45 times and averaged 40.0—and he's done this despite the fact that he always aims at the coffin corner and most times places the ball inside the 20-yard line.

But Hollmig also is a top passer. He ranks second to Texas' Bobby Layne with 362 yards on 31 completions in 75 attempts. He has racked up five touchdowns with his tossing.

Layne has completed 34 out of 58 for 587 yards as one of the nation's top passers. Ranking third behind Hollmig in the conference is Jack Price of Baylor with 28 out of 61 for 321 yards.

Doak Walker of Southern Methodist continues to lead the ball-carriers although Clyde Scott of Arkansas is sorely pressing him. Walker has gained 390 yards on 79 runs. Scott has made 387 on 81. George Wainsley of Rice is third with 291 on 46 carries.

Byron Gillory leads the pass-receivers with 190 yards on 10 catches. J. D. Ison of Baylor is second with 130 on eight and Ross Pritchard of Arkansas is third with 122 on eight. Gillory has taken three passes for touchdowns and Ison and Pritchard two each.

Howard Hughes of Arkansas is the punting leader in actual average but has kicked only five times for a mark of 45.4. Frank Guess of Texas has 41.6 on 13. But Hollmig is the real leader.

Aubrey Fowler of Arkansas leads the punt-returners with 233 yards on 11. Gillory is second with 163 on 10 and Perry Samuels of Texas is third with 72 on five. Their averages are 23.0, 16.3, and 14.4 respectively.

Texas is the leader in team offense with 2,007 yards in six games. Baylor is second with 1,546 in five and Arkansas third with 1,479 in six.

Texas Christians top in defense, having allowed an average of only 130.6 yards rushing and passing per game. Baylor is second with 150.4.

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Texas Is Third, Mustangs 8th

NEW YORK, Oct. 28. (U.P.)—Notre Dame, still toying with the opposition as it moves toward the Nov. 8 meeting with Army, was back as No. 1 college football team of the country today on the basis of returns from the weekly Associated Press poll.

After giving the Irish second billing to Michigan for two weeks straight, the nation's sports writers voted Frank Leahy's men their old familiar first-place ranking and dropped the Wolverines to the runner-up position.

Notre Dame, choice of the writers as the top team of 1946, had started off in the same spot this year. The Irish slipped past Iowa 21-0 last week for their fourth straight victory and, still supposedly playing "under wraps," headed for Saturday's meeting with Navy.

Michigan's narrow squeak in pulling a 13-6 victory from Minnesota out of the fire apparently lowered the voters' estimation of the Wolverines. Last week they garnered 147 of 167 first place votes. This time they collected only 69 while Notre Dame was awarded 78 of the 195 ballots.

The most extensive weekly poll in many years gave Notre Dame a point score of 1734 (10 points for a first-place ballot, 9 for second, 8 for third, etc.). Michigan's total was 1689. Texas remained in third place with 1516 as a result of the Longhorns' triumph over Rice.

Two new tenants appeared among the top ten, with Southern Methodist and Duke supplanting California and Illinois. S.M.U.'s Mustangs climbed from 12th to eighth on a 7-0 win over U.C.L.A. and now face Texas this Saturday to decide the Southwest conference title. Duke's 13-6 conquest of Wake Forest moved the Blue Devils from 15th to 9th in preparation for their forthcoming clash with sixth-place Georgia Tech this week.

Pennsylvania's success of Navy shoved the Quakers from eighth to fourth. Princeton, the foe which upset Penn last year, has a chance to knock down the Red and Blue ratings on Saturday.

Southern California, which takes on thrice-beaten Washington Saturday, zoomed from 19th to fifth place on the basis of its 39-14 whipping of California. The defeat dropped the Golden Bears from No. 4 spot to 14th. Unbeaten Penn State climbed from ninth to seventh off its 21-14 verdict over previously undefeated West Virginia.

Army, still smarting from the 21-20 setback by Columbia that ended the cadets' non-losing streak after 32 games, tumbled from sixth place to 10th, just a notch ahead of Illinois, Saturday victim of Purdue. Illinois and Michigan collide in the key game for the big nine title this week, while Army draws an apparent breather in Washington and Lee.

The exception probably was easier to get for the reason that Marshall himself is a Texan by marriage and adoption. His wife is the former movie actress Corinne Griffith of Texarkana, and he has personally been close to Texas since 1936 when he helped stage the Texas Centennial celebration.

Although Sammy Baugh is now in his eleventh year of pro football, since joining the Redskins after leaving T. C. U., he's going stronger this season than ever before. Redskin press agents hail him as the greatest pro of all times, and you can get support for that belief from virtually everyone among the 36,000 fans who pack Griffith Stadium on the Sunday afternoons: the team plays at home.

Dick Todd, a '39 output of Texas A. and M. college, is probably next to Baugh in popularity among Washingtonians. While Baugh quarterbacked the R's Skins, Todd plays a bangup game in halfback position. The pair are close friends too, for they are roommates at the Roosevelt hotel where most of the team lives.

Occasionally Mrs. Baugh comes up from their ranch home near Rotan in West Texas during football season. Todd is a native of Thrall and now resides in Crowell.

Another Texan is Ki Aldrich, the big Red Skin center from Fort Worth who came out of T. C. U. in 1941. The team's officials say he's an "inspiring leader" when the going gets hot.

Others on the team include Geo.

Wilde, A. and M. 47, a halfback from Olney, Henry (Demp) Harris, University of Texas, 47, who plays tackle and hails originally from Camden, Ala.; Harvey Jones, Baylor U., 44, a half back from Beaumont, and Jack Jenkins, full-back from Texarkana, who went to Vanderbilt.

Two other Texans who were in training with the Redskins out in California before the season opened, but are not now with the club are Leon McCormick, center, who comes from Eldorado and went to Baylor, farmed out to the Wilmington, Del., Clippers; and Paul Grayson, a Fort Worth boy who went to Allen Academy at Bryan, and recently retired from pro football.

FOR FUND RAISING Structure Is Set For Givers Agency

Organizational structure for a local "givers' foundation" for handling fund raising and distribution for Howard county welfare agencies was completed at a citizens meeting Monday evening, with formal approval of a corporate setup for the Howard County Community Fund.

The fund, which has a score or so business leaders as its incorporators, is applying for a state charter as a non-profit organization. Officers of the corporation will be named later, but temporarily, Ira Thurman was named to serve as organization chairman.

Also named was a budget committee, which will review budgets of four social service agencies expected to share in fund distributions this year, and the agencies are being advised to submit their budgets for review next week.

When these are given final approval by the fund committee, total goal of a fund drive will be announced, and solicitation will be started, probably the latter part of November.

The drive will be headed up by four men, who will elect one of their own number as general chairman. These four include Dr. R. B. G. Cowper and G. H. Hayward, to handle big gifts; Lewis Price to direct special gifts, and Ted Groebel to supervise the general fund drive.

The budget committee is headed up by R. T. Piner and includes also R. L. Tollett, Dr. P. W. Malone, C. S. Blomshield, R. W. Whipple and W. L. Mead.

Joe Burrell is to serve as general secretary of the organization. This organizational setup was approved after the group heard an extensive discussion on the fund potentialities by L. G. Wells of Fort Worth, who heads up a firm supervising money-raising projects.

Wells gave his time and attention to the Big Spring problem at no charge.

He stressed the fact that the Howard County Community Fund, as currently being organized, will be a "givers' organization, and that the interests of the community who combine to raise welfare funds also will have complete supervision as to the basis of their distribution.

Organizations to be served by the fund this year will be the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Salvation Army and YMCA. This includes all local social service bodies with the exception of the American Red Cross, which conducts its own annual roll call in the spring.

PRISON SLAYING CASE FBI Photos Introduced In Trail Of Warden, Four Guards

BRUNSWICK, Ga. Oct. 28. (AP)—An FBI agent's photographs of a Georgia convict camp where eight Negroes were slain were included in evidence today as trial was resumed of the former guards on den and four former guards on charges of violating civil liberty statutes.

The warden and guards are accused by the government of killing the eight "unnecessarily" after a disturbance at the camp last July 11.

Defense counsel told a Federal court jury at the opening of the trial yesterday that 27 convicts rebelled and turned on the guards before the latter blasted away at them with shotguns.
