Saturation Is Reported In Albaugh Test

Oil production for Dawson County seemed virtually assured with logging of first saturation from 4,931 to 4,936 in the Ray A. Albaugh No. 2. John Robinson, in the center of the NW 1-4 NW 1-4, Section 54, Block M. This puts the well approximately 59 feet higher structurally than the John Robinson No. 1, 1 1-4 miles southeast. First saturation in the Robinson No. 1 was logged at from 4964 to 4969.

The Robinson No. 2 was drilled Thursday afternoon at 4940. Operator looks for a break in the line in the next 10 or 12 feet.

Housewives Who Intend To Do Canning This Season Should Inspect Equipment

Rural housewives who contemplate beginning work on their farm and home food budgets within the next few weeks had better get ready right away if they haven't already. Adequate preparation in advance will greatly improve the quality of the canned products, reduce the actual time of the canning operation, and help insure against spoilage, according to Grace I. Neely, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

First, the family pressure cooker should be checked over to be sure that it is in good condition and safe for use. Frequently county home demonstration agents train local home demonstration club leaders to conduct "pressure cooker clinics" back in their own communities. In some cases it may be necessary to return the cooker to the factory in the event there are major adjustments to be made.

Where glass jars are used, it is a good policy to inspect them for cracks and chips before the canning season. New supplies of lids and rubber rings are means of insuring against canning failures, the specialist points out. Successful use of glass depends upon the quality of the rubber rings or composition tops and upon the rings being free from nicks and chips. The tops should fit and the bales be tight. If cans are to be used, it is better to secure new ones each year rather than reusing the old ones. Miss Neely says sanitary or enamel-lined cans preserve the color of such highly colored foods as berries, prunes, and beets and prevent corrosion in pumpkin and squash. C enamel-lined cans will help prevent discoloration of products such as corn, peas, hominy, chicken or fish products, but these should not be used for acid products or fat meats.

Dust Storms Are On The Decrease Report Reveals

Dust storms are definitely on the decrease in the Southern Great Plains, but constant vigilance on the part of every farmer is necessary if these gains in controlling wind erosion are to be maintained, according to H. H. Fennell, regional conservator of the Soil Conservation Service.

Records maintained on the Guymon, Okla. Soil Conservation Service demonstration project in the heart of the wind erosion area show there were 101 dust storms of 655 hours duration from July 1937 through June 1938. During the 42 dust storms of 301 hours duration, from July 1939 through April 1940, there were only 28 storms of 199 hours duration.

"These figures are especially significant when it is considered that the severe drought last year placed 3,500,000 acres in condition to blow as compared to only 1,300,000 acres that were not protected against wind erosion in 1939," Fennell said.

This reduction in the number of dust storms during the last three years is due to a great extent to the progress that farmers are making in protecting their land against soil blowing, the conservator believes.

Through erosion control demonstration projects and by working in cooperation with CCC camps, the Soil Conservation Service has been demonstrating soil and water conservation practices for six years, Fennell stated.

Farmers now are organizing to cooperate in carrying on the fight against erosion through formation of soil conservation districts, it was pointed out. Twenty-five soil conservation districts, organized under provisions of state laws, now are functioning in the Southern Great Plains in addition to eight county wind erosion districts in the Texas Panhandle.

"Winter snows undoubtedly have made land-tilage operations more effective this year by making the soil moist so a cloud surface to resist soil movement was created," Fennell pointed out.

"Also, there has not been as many long periods of high winds as in some recent years.

"Farmers should remember that dust storms can come at most any

season of the year," the conservator said. "The Guymon records show dust storms in every month since February, 1936 with the exception of November, 1939 and January 1940. There were 17 dust storms in May and June, 1938, and eight during the same months last year.

"This means that every effort must be made to maintain a protective cover of vegetation on the land at all times. Farming operations on the contour this spring will hold most of the water on the land where it falls and give better chance of producing a protective cover.

"It is only through such soil and water conservation practices that the necessity for costly emergency tillage operations during the periods of high winds can be eliminated and agriculture placed on a sound, long-time basis in the Southern Great Plains," Fennell declared.

S. C. S. Notes

"The responsiveness of the American public to unsound health suggestions from friends, acquaintances, and other less impersonal sources is very general. Fads and fancies, lacking basic truth as well as common sense, thus literally are rampant throughout the land. While many of the so-called friendly suggestions that are ardently applied by the too-trusting or gullible are not responsible for more than temporary harm or inconvenience, others are likely to result in serious complications and may even terminate in death," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"As a case in point, some time ago a man, while at an evening gathering suddenly experienced abdominal pain, and was advised by no less than three of the party to take a dose of oil. This suggestion he immediately adopted. He actually was suffering from appendicitis, and taking oil aggravated an extensive peritonitis which caused the loss of his life. His fate, however, may influence others who experience pain of this type, or in fact any illness of any kind to seek professional counsel rather than to rely upon the usually spontaneous suggestions of well-meaning though ill-informed persons.

"While health and illness are high up in the conversational scale, the fact remains that only those skilled in the practice of medicine should be relied upon for advice of any kind relating both to bodily health and to the curings of an ailment.

"Doctors, through long training and wide personal experience, are qualified to recognize the cause of symptoms and thus define the illness. Proper diagnosis is essential to proper treatment and those outside the profession, bright as they may be in their particular fields, cannot safely assume the role of the family physician, either for themselves or for others.

Analyze Water Of 150 Texas Counties

University of Texas engineers have completed an analysis of underground water supplies in approximately one-third of the State's counties. Dr. E. P. Schoch, director of the Bureau of Industrial Chemistry, has announced.

With the triple purpose of discovering water supplies suitable for industrial use, detecting sources of water contamination and checking drought shortage by spotting new fresh water taps, University chemists have already compiled reports on 23,000 water samples taken from 150 counties, Dr. Schoch said.

Findings of an 80-county survey—results of four years work—have been published by WPA, a project

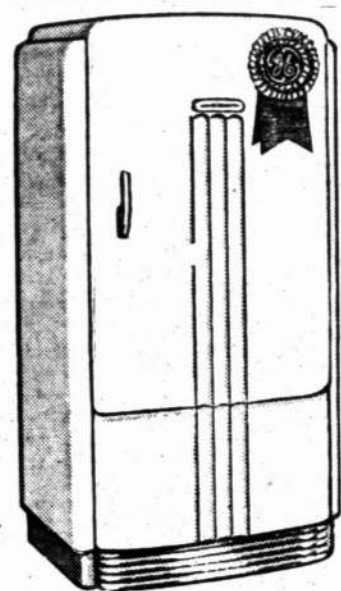

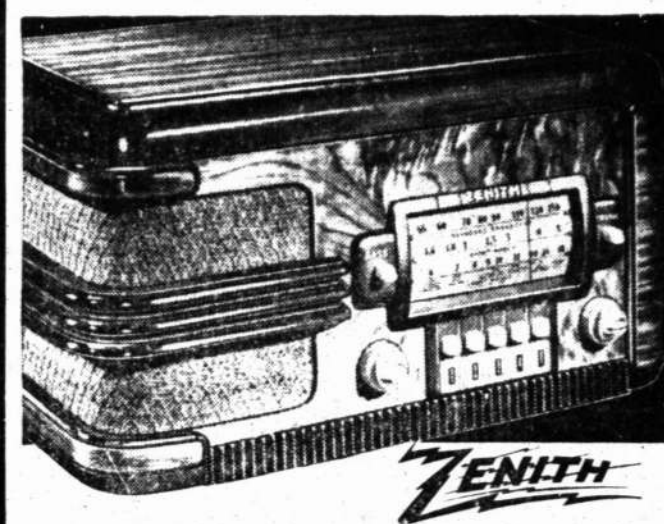

Cooking School Visitors To See Technicolor Show

"Refreshment Through the Years" a motion picture in technicolor dealing with the romance and growth of the carbonated beverages industry will be shown to Dawson County on Friday June 14 at 2 p. m. at the Majestic.

The theme of the picture is man's constant search for refreshment. The story begins in the early days when natural springs of carbonated water were places that only people of wealth could visit. According to the picture, it was Joseph Priestly who made carbonated water avail-

able to everyone, by discovering how to make it in his laboratory around 1767. Later, Townsend Speakman, of Philadelphia, hit upon the idea of flavoring carbonated water to produce what people began to call "soda water."

"One of the interesting sections of this picture," according to Harmon Daffern, manager of the Lamesa Coca-Cola Bottling Co., "are the scenes showing how the old-time bottling plants were operated at the beginning of the century. To make these scenes, an old time plant, with its foot power machinery, was set up in a studio on the United Artists lot in Hollywood.

"Then the problem developed—how could this forty year old equipment be operated? Property men and technicians were sumped. Someone discovered that a man

now living in Los Angeles, and identified with the Coca-Cola bottling business, once ran a set up of this old time machinery in his youth in Alabama. He turned producer for a day—and saved the day.

Contrasting with the crudity of the old fashioned bottling methods, are modern scenes detailing the scrupulous care with which every detail of the modern manufacture of syrup and the modern bottling of carbonated beverages is carried out.

"These modern bottling scenes," says Harmon "dramatized the safeguards which surround the bottling of Coca-Cola today and are typical of the operations in the more than 1,000 Coca-Cola bottling plants located in the United States."

The scenes around the soda fountain of the "Gay Nineties" constitute another interesting historical portion of the picture. Great care was taken to have the colorful costumes of that day authentic and details of the background true to life. An old soda fountain of our grandfathers day was reconstructed in the studio as the setting for these scenes.

"Refreshment Through the Years" also provides glimpses into related industries such as the making of bottles, the manufacture of crowns for bottles, and the harvesting of sugar, as well as scenes made in steel mills and other plants which

supply materials for the carbonated beverages industry.

The picture has just been released after having its premiere showing before the recent convention of bottlers of Coca-Cola.

The three great democracies of the world today are France, England, and the United States of

America. There are four major dictator nations in the world today. On the battlefields of Europe there is being waged a colossal struggle between two of the great democracies and dictator states, with apparently the democracies in danger of being completely destroyed, or seriously crippled.

The Press carries the statement today that the German government says it will destroy both England and France. In today's paper also Winston Churchill, England's Prime Minister, is reported to have told the English House of Commons that the allies, to-wit, France and England, had lost a colossal conflict in the battle of Flanders. He made the significant statement that if the worst should come to the British Isles, or England as we know it, that the government would move to some of the British possessions and continue the conflict even if they had to continue it alone. He further stated that England could not at this time give to France the aid that France needed in what seems to be another threatened colossal drive by the German army, and the further statement that the French army in the Battle of Flanders had been greatly weakened by loss of many thousands of men. Apparently from this bold statement of Winston Churchill to the House of Commons, he admits that both England and France are in a very bad way and it is apparently in his mind that France may be overrun in a short time and England have to continue the battle alone. It also is apparently in his mind that the British Isles, or England itself, may suffer the same fate as is threatening France, and that the British government would have to move to Canada or to some other British possession. If the worst should come to France and England, the United States of America is the only democracy left with any great power and influence and is the only power that might be in the way of dictator nations.

To me, the danger to the freedom of our people and our nation seems imminent and present. We have only to recall that since the drive started upon the French and English of the 10th of May, there have appeared along the oil fields and other places of West Texas numerous groups of people parading under the screen of religion who refuse to respect our national emblem, and it is significant that this religious propaganda would start along about the time of the drive of the dictator armies in Europe. There may be nothing to our fears

in this regard, but it still seems significant.

I am apprehensive that our nation is unprepared to defend itself at this time if a major invasion be made or attempted. It is a generally conceded fact that propagandists, saboteurs, fifth column activities and spies have been as great a force on the battlefields of Europe as the soldier carrying a gun. I think it is safe to say that propagandists, fifth column activities and spies are at work in our own state, nation, district and county on a large scale. It has been only a short time since the Governor of Texas sent a committee to Washington to report to the President unamerican activities within our own state.

It occurs to me that it is high time that our citizenship, from the humblest to the very highest concentrate himself to the preservation of the American nation and American liberties and that our government from the top to the bottom be placed in the hands of most able, experienced and capable officials Events transpiring

within our own judicial district and adjoining districts in the past two weeks should convince us all that subversive interests are busy within the shadow of our own homes.

I would like to do something for my State and my District. I was District Attorney over twelve large West Texas counties during the last world war, and as such became acquainted with the manner in which our enemies acted.

This week I made application to have my name placed on the ticket for the democratic primaries for nomination to the office of District Attorney of the 106th Judicial District.

I have been on the South Plains of Texas for thirty-four years and have been practicing law on the South Plains of Texas for Twenty-six years, six years of which I served as District Attorney and two years as Assistant Attorney General for the Court of Criminal Appeals, and I have tried cases in approximately fifty counties in West Texas. I want to serve my state in what, I believe is a period of dangerous, or threatened danger. I feel

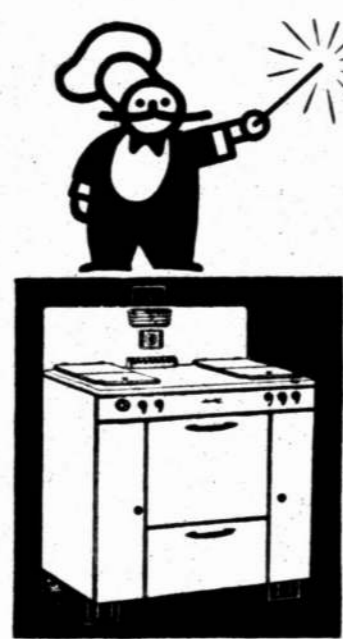

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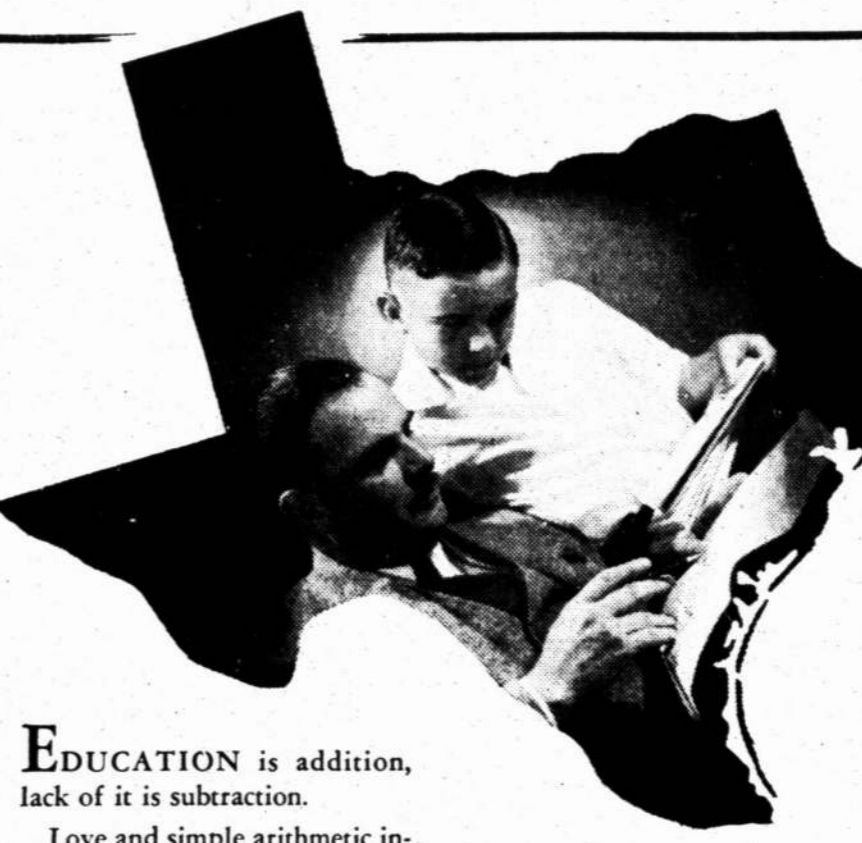
